O. Tarnstrom sails for Europe next week for a visit to Norway and Sweden.

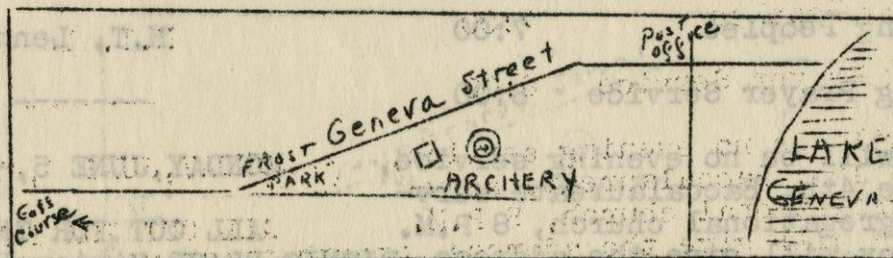

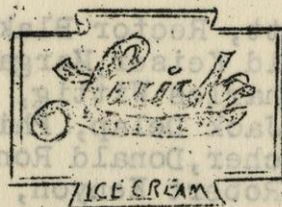
