PRESENT: Regents Arveson, Gelatt, Renk, Rennebohm, Steiger, Wanvig, Watson, Werner. (Regent Arveson entered the meeting at 10:30 A.M.)

ABSENT: Regents Jones and Laird.

Regent Jones was present for committee meetings on Thursday.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the annual meeting of the Board held on June 18, 1953, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

At the request of President Fred, Dean Fowlkes appeared before the Board and reported on the 1953 summer session enrollment and reported on steps taken to improve the summer session program.

At the request of President Fred, Vice President Little appeared before the Board and reported on enrollment prospects for the fall semester. He also reported data which indicate that the shortage of University dormitory accommodations may be a controlling factor on enrollment.

Regent Rennebohm voted "No" on Item I (a) above relating to an agreement covering the lease of a passenger automobile for a driver training program because he did not believe that State funds should be used for that purpose.

IV. Report of Actions Taken by State Emergency Board

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented, for the record, the following report of actions taken by the State Emergency Board:

At a meeting of the Emergency Board on June 25, 1953, the following actions affecting the University were taken:

- a. Granted \$88,784 (in lieu of the University's request for \$105,000) from the appropriation made by Section 20.74 (3) of the Statutes for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1952, to supplement the appropriation made by Section 20.41(10)(a) of the Statutes to help finance increased costs.
- b. Ordered that rate to be charged for state-county patients at Wisconsin General Hospital shall not exceed \$16.00 per day and at Wisconsin Orthopedic Hospital for Children shall not exceed \$12.50 per day effective July 1, 1953.
- c. Deferred action on request for deficiency appropriation for Wisconsin Orthopedic Hospital for Children.

VI. Budget Transfers

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, budget transfers made during June, 1953 (EXHIBIT A attached) listed under the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (VI. Budget Transfers) were approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Secretary reported that the Regents in some years had dispensed with the August meeting of the Board and inquired as to whether they desired to give consideration to the question of holding an August meeting. It was pointed out that, if the August meeting were postponed, the Executive Committee could act for the Board or a special Regent meeting could be called, if necessary. Upon motion of Regent Arveson, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was

VOTED, That the By-Laws be suspended and that the meeting of the Regents

scheduled for August 8, 1953, be cancelled.

Regent Renk presented the following recommendations of the Educational Committee:

- 1. That Jesse B. Kommers, professor of mechanics, be retired at his request; to take effect July 1, 1953.
- 2. That Wakelin McNeel, Emeritus Professor of Agricultural Extension, be reemployed on a special service contract from July 1, 1953 to June 30, 1954, to serve as superintendent of Upham Woods at a salary of \$3,000 for the period; charge to Upham Woods Development Fund. (Fund 15-690)
- 3. That L. H. Adolfson, Director of the University Extension Division, be appointed University representative on the State Radio Television Council for the 1953-55 biennium.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, the above three recommendations of the Educational Committee were adopted.

Regent Rennebohm suggested that some of the items referred to the Business and Finance Committee could probably properly be referred to the Educational Committee for consideration in order to more properly distribute the work between the two committees. President Werner stated that he had previously made such a suggestion to the administrative officers. President Fred stated that the administration would follow this suggestion in setting up the agenda for the Regent committees.

Regent Steiger presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the following schedule of costs for constructing and equipping the Bacteriology Building be approved:

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the Campus Planning Commission, the plans and specifications for the Pharmacy Addition to the Chemistry Building be approved and authority granted to advertise for bids.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to make arrangements for the removal of the quonset huts located on the lower campus, and that the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board on any matters relating to contracts and financial considerations relating to such removals.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation property in the area between North Charter Street and North Mills Street and between Regent Street and Spring Street, assigned by the Regents on May 9, 1953, as an ROTC drill field be leased, subject to the approval of the Governor, from the Wisconsin University Building Corporation for a period of ten years at an annual rental of \$1,071.00 to cover the cost of interest on the mortgage and with an option to purchase the property during the period of the lease for a consideration of \$35,858.42, with the privilege of paying additional rental payments to be applied upon the purchase price, such additional rental payments to be made from excess earnings on the operation of the parking lot, and with the provision that the Regents may develop the property for ROTC drill field and parking purposes; and that if the foregoing arrangement is approved by the Governor \$7,000 be allotted from 1-B Unassigned to provide funds for surfacing the said area for ROTC drill field and parking lot use.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That, subject to the approval of the Governor, the following additional contracts be awarded to low bidders for the erection of silos in connection with the construction of the Dairy Cattle Instruction and Research Center (chargeable to the contingency allowance in the schedule of costs approved by the Regents on May 9, 1953), and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contracts:

The motion was seconded by Regent Renk.

Regent Rennebohm requested additional information regarding the maintenance of other elevators in Madison, such as at other hospitals and at the State Capitol and State Office Building. Consideration of this item was deferred pending receipt of the requested information. (See page 23 of these minutes.)

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That authority be granted to lease, for a period of ten years at an annual rental of \$600, payable annually in advance, a triangular parcel of land containing approximately 1.02 acres located between the South Belt Line Highway and the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad right-of-way (Arboretum property not presently useable for Arboretum purposes) to Steel-Bilt Structures, Inc., Madison, Wisconsin, with the provision that the lessee may erect a warehouse on the leased premises.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the President and Secretary be authorized to execute on behalf of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin an exclusive right of way and easement to the Wisconsin Telephone Company to place and maintain buried cable and other appliances beneath the surface of land within the south 10 feet of the southeast quarter of the northeast quarter of Section 25, Township 7 North, Range 8 East; within the south 10 feet of the west half of the southeast quarter of the northeast quarter of Section 30, Township 7 North, Range 9 East; within the south 10 feet of the east 1170 feet and within the south 40 feet of the west 150 feet of the southwest quarter of the northeast quarter of Section 30, Township 7 North, Range 9 East; all in Dane County, Wisconsin.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That permission be granted to the Wisconsin Power and Light Company to construct a power line for a distance of approximately 230 feet across University property between County Trunk A and the Milwaukee Railroad right of way at Upham Woods, Juneau County.

The Secretary read a communication addressed to the President of the University and the Regents of the University by the Faculty Committee of the College of Engineering, which was appointed to advise with the administration and the Regents concerning the selection of a Dean for the College of Engineering, expressing the appreciation of the Committee for the manner in which the administration and the Regents had solicited and received the advice and counsel of the Committee. The communication was accepted and ordered placed on file.

The Secretary read a communication addressed to the Regents of the University from Mr. Leonard J. Kleczka expressing his appreciation for the resolution adopted by the Regents on June 18, 1953, commending him for his long and devoted service as a member of the Board of Regents. The communication was accepted and ordered placed on file.

Regent Renk presented and moved the adoption of the following recommendation for the approval of the University 1953-54 operating budget:

That the University operating budget of \$22,525,369 for educational and general purposes (including \$500,000 overbudgeting of fees and receipts, to be recovered from savings, net budget of \$22,025,369); \$4,671,296 for hospitals; \$4,344,056 for auxiliary enterprises; \$1,929,867 for gift accounts; and \$1,507,351 for federal contracts; or a grand total of \$34,477,939 for all services for the fiscal year July 1, 1953 to June 30, 1954, including the salaries, fund allocations, appointments, reappointments, promotions, and faculty status designations listed in the budget schedules and the schedule of room and board rates appended as EXHIBIT B, be approved.

The motion was seconded by Regent Steiger and a called vote was taken, all Regents present voting "Aye" - eight "Ayes"; no "Noes". The motion was declared carried.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That to continue the policy established by the Regents on June 14, 1951, \$34,916.67 be allotted from 1-B Unassigned to provide funds for the employment of the following Carnegie Annuitants and emeritus members of the faculty in the 1953-54 fiscal year, that the President of the University be authorized to fix the terms of service and the services to be performed for the University, and that authority be granted for the execution of the appropriate special service contracts:

There was discussion as to whether this item should be referred to the Executive Committee with power to act.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee relating to service agreements for maintenance of hospital elevators and air conditioning equipment be referred to the Executive Committee with power to act. Regents Watson and Werner voted "No".

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.
