MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in the Clarke Smith Room, 1820 Van Hise Hall  
Friday, October 24, 1975, 9:05 A.M.

President McNamara presiding

President McNamara introduced Peter Senn, Vice President of the Vocational Technical and Adult Education Board, attending in place of Regent John Zancanaro.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, DeBardleben, Erdman, Fish, Gerrard, Hales, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, and Williams.

ABSENT: Regents Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President McNamara recognized President Weaver for the purpose of making a presentation. President Weaver stated that it seemed fitting that the meeting should open with recognition of the fact that for the third time in the past two decades, a University of Wisconsin faculty member has received a Nobel Prize, namely Dr. Howard M. Temin, Professor of Oncology, and a member of the research team of the McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research. He noted his prize for medicine and physiology, which he shares with colleagues at MIT and at the Imperial Cancer Fund Laboratory in London was given for their dramatic discovery concerning interaction between tumor viruses and the genetic material of the cell. He continued that Dr. Temin, a dedicated scientist, has been a member of the Madison Faculty for fifteen years and in his relatively short career received many of the nation's highest honors for scientific research. President Weaver stated Dr. Temin's outstanding work brings not only high distinction to himself and his family, but reflected glory to his University, and certainly



invaluable service to mankind. He stated that he knew the Board would wish to meet and to recognize this unusual scholar who so brilliantly exemplifies the quality of the great University of which he is a part. He called upon Chancellor Young to present Dr. and Mrs. Temin.

Chancellor Young stated that it is a very great pleasure, representing the University at Madison, to present Dr. and Mrs. Howard Temin.

Dr. Temin made the following statement: "It has been a pleasure for me to meet you and thank you for your recognition, and thank you for having provided at the University of Wisconsin an environment in which unorthodox ideas could be tested and established. The way in which you can continue to do me honor is by your actions which will continue to support quality education in all the endeavors which are performed under your auspices. Thank you."

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by several Regents, and it was voted unanimously.

Resolution 1087:

Whereas, Dr. Howard M. Temin of the University of Wisconsin-Madison will be awarded the Nobel Prize for medicine and physiology, and

Whereas, the Nobel Prize is a dramatic and significant addition to the impressive list of awards and honors earned previously by Professor Temin for his work as scientist and teacher at the McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research in the Center for Health Sciences,

Be It Resolved, that this Board congratulates Dr. Temin for the honors he has earned, commends him for his devoted and brilliant service to humanity, and expresses appreciation to him for his major contributions to the worldwide reputation of the Madison campus for research, teaching and public service.

President McNamara stated that he would like to add the personal congratulations and commendations of the Board, and through us of all the citizens of the State of Wisconsin, because we all share and rejoice in the work Dr. Temin is doing, and expressed appreciation on behalf of all.

President McNamara introduced Dean Pound of the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences. Dean Pound noted that 1975 is the Centennial year of the agricultural experiment movement and that a presentation had been prepared relating to one hundred years of agriculture in Wisconsin. He introduced Professor Fritz Albert who had prepared the program, the narrator, Professor Maurice White, and the script writer Professor John Fett,-- all of the Agricultural Journalism Department. There followed a presentation on the history of agriculture during the past one hundred years.

The following resolution was properly moved, seconded and voted:

That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on September 12, 1975, be approved.

President McNamara called attention to the Joint Meeting between the University of Wisconsin Board and the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota scheduled for November 21 and 22, 1975, and requested the Regents attending to advise the Secretary so that necessary arrangements can be made.

President McNamara called upon Regent Pelisek to report on the meeting of the Council of Trustees of the University of Wisconsin Hospitals. Regent Pelisek reported the Council had their initial meeting recently and presentations were made by Vice Chancellor Cooke, Superintendent Gordon Derzon, and Dean Crowley of the Medical School, indicating the interface of University of Wisconsin Medical School and University of Wisconsin Hospitals. The action items considered by the Council were the appointment of the chiefs of the service divisions of the hospital and the formal approval of the hospital auxiliary that is being formed by interested Madison citizens.

At the request of President McNamara, Regent Lavine reported on the meeting of the Association of University Governing Boards. Regent Lavine reported that Regents Pelisek, Barkla, Erdman, and he had attended the meeting a couple of weeks ago, and that it appears that the Association has come alive in the last two or three years under new national leadership. He indicated the group is doing some of the pioneering work in a variety of major areas that affect higher education in this country, both on their own and by bringing forth things from within the systems colleges and universities throughout the country. He stated there was ample opportunity for members of this Board to talk with members of large system boards elsewhere in the country and that it was found that, in many ways, in the things we find difficult to grapple with in these times, we are really quite far ahead of most of the others on almost every front. Regent Pelisek stated that it is a very outstanding commendation of our administrative staff that consistently throughout the sessions at the Association of Governing Boards there is reference to the outstanding leadership that the University of Wisconsin was exhibiting in coping with a number of the problems that are facing higher education throughout the country.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1088: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (EXHIBIT A, attached) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

Dean David B. Johnson, Midwest Universities Consortium for International Activities Liaison Officer, reported the following developments since the Regents' September 12 meeting on the issue of non-discrimination in MUCIA contracts with foreign governments and institutions:

MUCIA Board members consulted with the Madison Campus University Committee, the MUCIA Advisory Committee, and with Madison Campus administration and Central Administration on the wording of the non-discrimination policy tentatively adopted by the MUCIA Board of Directors at its September 10 meeting. These paragraphs had been shown to the Board of Regents in their preliminary form at the Regents' September 12 meeting.

With some minor changes, the proposed paragraphs on non-discrimination in the nomination, selection, and functioning of MUCIA staff under such contracts has been adopted by the MUCIA Board of Directors for inclusion in its Staff and Benefit Manual and/or in international contracts.

A paragraph to be included in international contracts to effectuate the non-discrimination policy has been adopted by the MUCIA Board of Directors, subject to checking with legal counsel to obtain assurance that the clause would permit MUCIA to withdraw from a contractual relationship if the non-discrimination policy was not followed or in practice proved unacceptable to the other party.

A paragraph outlining a procedure of nominating only one individual at a time for foreign assignment under such contracts has been proposed to the MUCIA Board of Directors by the University of Wisconsin. Although it was not formally adopted at the Board's October 23 meeting, the MUCIA Executive Director had been instructed at the meeting to revise the Staff and Benefit Manual in order to embody the non-discrimination policy and to bring the revision to the November 20 meeting of the Board of Directors. It was understood that the paragraph proposed by Wisconsin would be included in the revision.

Regent DeBardleben asked Dean Johnson about the deletion of the words "nominations or applications" from the second paragraph of the policy statement. In response Dean Johnson said that the MUCIA Board of Directors intended that the change would broaden application of the non-discrimination policy, to include all operations under the contract, not just nomination and selection of staff.

Regent Lavine asked Dean Johnson why the word "normally" was included in the proposed policy for nominating individuals for service abroad. The phrase in question says: "...MUCIA will normally recommend for each such assignment the individual it considers best qualified..." Dean Johnson responded by saying that he did not know what circumstances would induce multiple nominees and that he would be willing to delete the word.

Dean Johnson was asked to report to the Regents at their December meeting (by letter) the disposition of these matters by the MUCIA Board of Directors at its November 20 meeting.

At the request of President Weaver, Senior Vice President Smith reported on the status of documenting goals and objectives. He recalled that at the last meeting of the Board, in discussion of Supplement A - Statements of Campus Goals and Objectives Relating to the Annual Budget, there was considerable concern expressed about the utility of the goals and the value of this kind of exercise. He stated the President had moved procedurally and that Vice President Percy and he will be meeting with Chancellors Young, Birnbaum, and Lindner to address broadly the statements and forms of goals and objectives in the System. He noted that in the charge from the President there are certain kinds of problems that will be addressed. One is the problem of redundancy. Given the administrative workload and the fact that this does not contribute directly to teaching research or public service, where we find that we have two reports, 80% of the content of which is overlapping, it would seem that it might be wise to find ways of consolidating and making a single report, which is satisfactory for two purposes. He noted there is also a question of timing and cycling. He noted that we are aware of serious difference between the appropriate time when objectives and goals are formed in relationship to certain research projects and when they are evaluated, and the annual budget process. He continued that for given types of reporting, and types of information, different time cycles would seem to be appropriate. He stated we are trying to get processes which are useful to the Board, but not oppressive or time-consuming in ways that do not contribute directly to the progress of the System and the institutions.

Regent Lavine inquired as to when the results of these deliberations will be made available and was advised that the Committee will be making recommendations to the President and at that time it would be appropriate that they be shared with the Board.

President Weaver noted that about a year ago, all the voluntary accreditation bodies of the academic process in the United States were joined into a single national council of professional accreditation. He continued that for many years we have been well served by voluntary accreditation, that is, voluntary among the educational institutions themselves, and among professional schools and programs themselves who have taken the responsibility for assuring high professional standards, both institutionally and programmatically. He stated the federal government has begun to move into this area and that he felt this could be a very dangerous threat to the University in uniqueness and the institutional autonomy that have been so important in academic affairs in this country. He stated the Office of Education has developed and is rapidly growing in size a bureaucracy that has all the apparent intent of taking on within Health, Education and Welfare the accrediting functions for themselves. He continued that he considered this to be a very, very serious threat on the part of the federal bureaucracy in the internal affairs of academic institutions.

Regent DeBardleben stated that he did not understand why we were concerned about this matter, as he assumed that the accreditation is to determine whether an institution that is to receive federal funds has those standards of quality that would entitle an institution to those funds, and questioned why we would not support such an attitude. President Weaver responded that the area of objection as he saw it is that if you are to have the Law School on the campus accredited, he would prefer to have it accredited by the American Bar Association rather than a bureau in Washington. He continued that it seemed to him that you want professionals and not bureaucrats in government making those determinations. Regent DeBardleben stated that he assumed that they would have qualified people do it, and that he was concerned about the problem of public money going to private institutions that do not meet any kind of standards of accountability or quality other than to say that they want the money.

Regent Lavine stated that he had concerns about some self-serving groups that might be accrediting their own schools, but that he was even more concerned about politics striving to get into the higher education sphere. He continued that in his experience in looking at Washington they level down to a lowest standard too many things and set single standards in a lot of professional areas.

President McNamara read portions of a letter to him from Professors Eugene C. Lee and Frank M. Bowen, dated November 21, 1975, authors of the publication Managing Multicampus Systems. The letter is attached as EXHIBIT B.

#### REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Provost Wilson Thiede discussed in some detail the Regents Statewide University (RSU), the UW Center System, and University Extension, including off-campus credit courses, continuing education, and public service programs.

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day in the review of the Residence Halls Visitation Policy there had been presentations by Senior Vice President Donald Smith, Paul Ginsberg, UW-Madison Dean of Students, Buff Wright, permanent representative of the United Council to the Education Committee, and Chancellor Robert Birnbaum, UW-Oshkosh. Regent Lavine reported that the resolution originally submitted by the Administration had been revised in the Committee as follows:

The definitions in paragraph 2. are removed and the mechanics removed because they vary from campus to campus.

Delete from sections 2b and 2c all but the initial sentences after the words "Limited" and "Open," respectively

In section 8 delete the word "with" and substitute "no later than" so that the section would read "This policy shall be placed in effect for a three-year period beginning no later than the first semester 1976-77.."

In section 3, third line, insert the words "and limited" between the words "closed" and "visitation."

In the fourth line of the Administration's proposal, substituting the words "not interfere with" for "serve to facilitate."

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

Resolution 1089: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW (Policy-Revised) System, the attached Residence Hall Visitation Policy, dated October 24, 1975, (EXHIBIT C) be approved.

Regent Fish stated that he supported the limited visitation program, which at that time was not all that popular to support in many areas, and that he believed a limited visitation policy is adequate. He stated he did not believe there is a necessity for a full 24 hour visitation policy on the campus. Regent Neshek stated that the one paragraph that would cause him to support the resolution states that every student, male or female, will have the option of either closed or limited visitation. He pointed out this is a mandatory provision and that because it does give those students and the parents who want their children to have limited or closed visitation that option, he felt that this is not a great change from the present visitation policy. Regent Fish stated that he felt the difference between 17 and 24 hour visitation is quite substantial and attention has not been brought to the availability of the various options.

Regent Barkla stated that she could not understand where all the pressure was coming from - - that it was not reaching her, possibly because she was more isolated than the rest of the Regents.

Regent Williams stated that she thought the reporting of the actions of the previous day was inaccurate in that it said the Committee had passed a policy which was either closed or open, that while one campus might do one thing, some other campus might do another. She stated that the housing office on the Madison Campus reported that during the current year they received only five requests for closed visitation from all the people who returned contracts, and that two of them were from parents of women students, and three were from parents of male students. She continued that it was her opinion we must try to communicate what the options are in a much more open way and at a time before the students move on to campus.

Regent Solberg stated that if he read the policy correctly, visitation is defined as relating to friends or relatives of the opposite sex and that he would assume that is the only kind of visitation that is permitted by this policy and would prohibit visitation by persons of the same sex. Senior Vice President Smith stated the whole history of the Regent visitation policy has been addressed to visitation by persons of the opposite sex, that there has never been and he believes there should not be an assumption that there needs to be a policy in other regards.

Mr. Senn inquired as to what educational benefits will accrue from the adoption of this particular policy and how it is going to work physically to account for the various requests in a limited number of halls. Regent Lavine pointed out that in the present situation students may choose to live in a dormitory with limited visitation, or closed, or open, but would not necessarily be able to reside in a dormitory of his choice. He reported that Dean Ginsberg stated that there were no particular problems with the move to 17 hours of visitation - security problems were about the same as previously. He pointed out that a great deal of education is what happens outside the classroom and it is not necessarily true that only male students can work on a project most beneficially with male students. Michael DeLonay, President United Council of Student Governments stated that the Council is generally in support of the recommendation and that both the United Residence Halls Association and the United Council unanimously endorsed making 24 hour visitation available. He reported a survey of dormitory students regarding this issue indicated that 87% of the students favored and 13% were against (Stevens Point and LaCrosse did not participate). Regent Pelisek stated that this policy does have some educational benefits because it allows a group of students who live in residence halls a choice and participation in self-determination, recognizing the consequences of that self-determination. He stated that it visibly squares Regent policy with actuality.

Regent Williams asked for comments by Chancellors. Chancellor Lee Dreyfus, UW-Stevens Point, stated he had not yet had demonstrated to him the educational values of 24 hour visitation. It will be up to the students to demonstrate this to him. He noted the residence halls on his campus do provide 24 hour visitation, but it is not in the dormitory room itself, but in specified areas of a facility. He continued that he did have some security concerns and also concerns related to unacceptable social behavior.

Chancellor Baum, UW-Milwaukee, stated the general assumption is made that dormitories are spread around the campus in relatively small units, and that is true in most places, but at Milwaukee he is faced with a physical situation which is completely different from that, having one mass of dormitory complexes in which security may be a solvable problem or may not be. He stated is what we are really creating is a situation in which we are not asking ourself what is a sound leadership position to take, but what is a correct responsive posture to the majority wishes, which are not necessarily identical. He stated he could not quite see the logic of the argument that people have to work together on educational endeavors and that he did not see how it follows that one has to have 24 hour visitation.

Chancellor Lindner, UW-LaCrosse, stated that he was more interested in the implementation of the policy than commenting on the policy itself. He continued that he was concerned that item 3. requires closed and limited



visitation on the campus, and that he had trouble envisioning less than at least one wing of a hall being marked for closed visitation. He noted that item 4. required the students to choose among the options. He continued that his authorization within this policy is to tell the students, even though they want open visitation, that the only rooms available are in closed visitation areas, and therefore if they want to move into the dorm, they must go into closed areas.

Chancellor Haas, UW-Eau Claire, stated he felt that there is no question but what there will be increased costs that will have to be passed on to the students in order to maintain the necessary security. He stated that he already had the experience under existing policy that students who live in more restricted areas, and having selected those areas, decided they wanted more freedom, and then there was no place open - they had to stay in restricted areas for the balance of the year, and they felt they were living under compulsion, resulting in complaints and grievances that the University was not being fair under those circumstances.

Senior Vice President Smith reminded the members of the Board that the Council of Chancellors unanimously endorsed the principle that delegation be made to the campuses. They did express concern that administration of a housing policy is not a simple matter and involves many problems. The essential propositions made in this policy is that the Regents are delegating to the campuses and there should be no illusion that that means that every campus will write its policy procedures in identical ways. Regent DeBardeleben noted that there has been a suggestive thread running through all this discussion that this has some relation to the educational process and noted that we have not heard anything from the faculty as to their viewpoint. Regent Lavine noted for the record that Dean Ginsberg said yesterday that the original proposal started out from the Madison Campus in 1969 brought by the Faculty Senate.

The question was put on Resolution 1089, and it was voted on a Roll Call vote, with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Erdman, Hales, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, and Williams voting "Aye" (11), with Regents Fish, Gerrard, and Senn (voting in the absence of Regent Zancanaro) voting "No" (3), and with Regents Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro absent.

Regent Lavine reported that in the discussion of the UW-Parkside Faculty Policy Procedures in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Senior Vice President Smith observed that the policies had been reviewed by Academic Affairs and were found to be in full compliance with all pertinent provisions of the Systems personnel rules. He stated the full text of the policies and procedures is lengthy and technical and that the summary brought to the Regents is a means of avoiding undue printing expenses. Regent Lavine reported that Professor Anatole Beck spoke to the possibility that the action taken by the Regents regarding standards for faculty outside activity at UW-Parkside might be regarded in the future by Regents as constituting what is appropriate for other universities. Regent Lavine stated that Dr. Smith responded that the faculty personnel rules require that the faculty shall establish policies in this area and that no other institution is bound by policies that may have been approved for another institution.



Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1090: That upon the recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-Parkside and the President of the UW System, the following sections of the UW-Parkside faculty policies and procedures are approved as required under UWS 2.02:

- Preamble
- Chapter 40
- Chapter 41
- Chapter 46
- Chapter 47

(Copy on file in the office of the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs)

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been informational reports on system activities relating to academic affairs as follows:

1. Workshop on Faculty Profiling
2. Community Education Programming in Wisconsin
3. System Personnel Workshop
4. Health Sciences Advisory Committee
5. Campus Seminars on Student Disciplinary Guidelines
6. Twin Ports Advisory Task Force Progress Report
7. Wisconsin Special Education Project Directors.

Regent Lavine stated that action on the following resolutions does not constitute enactment of policy, it merely complies with legal procedure for setting up a hearing preliminary to recommending a change in the Administrative Code.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and they were voted:

Resolution 1091: That the Secretary of the Board be directed to file a notice of hearing with the Revisor of Statutes for inclusion in the next Wisconsin Administrative Register to consider the adoption of sick leave rules relating to faculty, academic staff, and limited appointees at the University of Wisconsin System, said hearing to be held in Room 1820, Van Hise Hall, 1220 Linden Drive, in the City of Madison, Wisconsin, on the 8th day of January, 1976, at 11 A.M.; and that copies of the proposed rules be provided at this time to the Chairpersons of the Senate and Assembly Education Committees pursuant to s. 227.018(2), Wis. Stats. (EXHIBIT D attached)

Resolution 1092: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW (Policy-Revised) System, upon the effective date of ch. UWS 19, Board Resolution #506, the System Sick Leave Policy for Faculty and Academic Staff, dated June 8, 1973, shall constitute Board Guidelines on the implementation and administration of ch. UWS 19; and that Central Administration be directed to issue said Guidelines immediately upon the effective date of ch. UWS 19 to units in the UW System.

Regent Lavine noted that the presentations by Professors Hallett J. Harris and C. Jarrell Yarbrough, UW-Green Bay, originally scheduled for the previous day, had been deferred to the next meeting of the Education Committee in Milwaukee in December.

Regent Barkla reported that there was a conference the first week in October on advancing women in administration in our society, run by Ms. Marian Swoboda. She noted it was a very interesting and worthwhile venture and congratulated Ms. Swoboda for the organization of the conference.

#### REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

After reviewing several large grants and smaller ones of special interest, Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1093: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants, and contracts included on pages 1/75 presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

Resolution 1094: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the following contract be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed:

Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, Madison, WI. (P/C with DHEW OE) Student follow-up accountability and information services for the period 07-01-75 through 06-30-76 Award # 19-043-151-196 Msn Educ General Admin Voc&Tec Ed (144-G863) \$27,490.00

Regent Hales called upon Acting Vice Chancellor Robert Bock, UW-Madison, who explained the Administration's view on the above grant. Vice Chancellor Bock stated that the program appears to be within the mission of the Center that accepted the contract and that the manner in which personnel were employed to carry out the function appears to be within normal University employment practices and within the mission of the Center that accepts the contract.

Larry Allwardt, representing the Wisconsin Federation of Teachers Local 3271, appeared in opposition to the acceptance of the grant, stating that the activity is not a true research project, but is an ongoing activity of the State Vocational, Technical and Adult Education Board required under federal law in order to get federal money. He stated the program was done in past years and will be done in the future unless the federal law changes and that it is an operational activity, not a research function. He stated this and other programs are performed by Limited Term Employees in order to bypass administrative and legislative position control. He stated his union objected and as a result VTAE found themselves with eleven illegal LTEs and they were discharged. He stated that VTAE then solicited the University to perform the program, using some of the personnel that had been used by the VTAE previously. Mr. Allwardt stated that he did not feel that the University was a party to any kind of conspiracy to bypass state law and state regulations, but were not uninformed. He stated he believed this is a deliberate open attempt to violate the spirit and intent of civil service law and rule, and was asking the University not to participate in this activity.

President McNamara inquired if an attempt had been made to resolve this matter under terms of the Collective Bargaining Agreement with the VTAE.

Mr. Allwardt responded that this is not an item that can be addressed under the terms of the Collective Bargaining Agreement, that there would be a remedy within civil service procedures which normally take a year to two years, by which time the project will be completed for at least this year. President McNamara inquired if the matter had been taken up with the Voc Tech Board itself and was advised by Mr. Allwardt that they had, but their answer was essentially, "It's none of your damn business." Chancellor Young stated that the matter had been looked into by Assistant Chancellor David Hanson, and it was concluded that it was an appropriate project for us to do. He stated we are unhappy about the situation, but the quarrel is with the VTAE and not with us, and we do not believe it appropriate for us to second guess another State Board, and urged the Regents not to second guess them either.

Regent DeBardleben inquired if the University has already paid this salary for a couple of months and was answered in the affirmative. He also inquired if we did not accept this grant, would we have to give the money back. Chancellor Young responded that sometimes we can end contracts by negotiation with the parties and we might be able to get some kind of a settlement with the VTAE Board. Regent DeBardleben stated that he assumed Chancellor Young had no knowledge of this matter until it came up, and inquired if this were to come up again next year in the same sort of situation with the grant, would he again recommend acceptance. Chancellor Young responded he would have a talk with the Director of VTAE and ask that they settle the matter between them and not get us involved.

Regent Barkla requested that the record show that she did not participate in the discussion, nor vote on this issue, to avoid any appearance of possible conflict of interest, because her husband is employed by a public employees union. President McNamara abstained from voting because of his labor union affiliation.

The question was put on Resolution 1094, and it was voted, with Regents DeBardeleben, Erdman, Fish, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Williams, and Senn voting "Aye" (8); and with Regents Gerrard, Hales, Lavine, and Solberg voting "No" (4); and with Regents Barkla and McNamara abstaining; and with Regents Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro absent.

Regent Hales reported that the Committee had received a report on campus activities on soliciting unrestricted funds. He stated that Regent DeBardeleben commented that Chancellors Haas, Weidner, Field (and their staffs) should be commended for their success in securing funds of this type for their campuses.

Regent Hales reported the Committee next considered a bequest made by the late Setrak K. Boyajian of approximately \$7,000 to the University of Wisconsin-Madison for student loan purposes.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1095:** That the bequest of the late Setrak K. Boyajian, Hudson, Massachusetts, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Setrak K. Boyajian, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales reported the next bequest considered was made by the late Anita Koenders to the McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research, amounting to \$5,000.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1096:** That the bequest of the late Anita Koenders, Sheboygan, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last

(MORE)

Will and Testament of Anita Koenders, Deceased; and stipulation recommended by the Attorney General and approved by the Business and Finance Committee on December 5, 1974, and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales reported the Committee next considered a bequest made by the late Edward G. Nishan of \$5,000 for research into the causes, treatment, and possible cure of cancer.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardleben, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1097:** That the bequest of the late Edward G. Nishan, Reedsburg, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Edward G. Nishan, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales reported the Committee next considered the Annual Review Policy Paper AR-76.1. He reported that Senior Vice President Percy reviewed the document for the Committee, noting that on September 30 information was received from the Governor and the Secretary of the Department of Administration establishing October 15 as the deadline by which the System needed to submit proposed requests for consideration during the 1976 annual review session. Since this topic was scheduled for consideration with the Board at the December meeting, the October deadline would not allow any Regent review. Therefore, the 1976 Annual Review Policy Paper AR-76.1 was prepared by the Central Administration Staff with verbal agreement of DOA staff that this document was acceptable in meeting their October 15 deadline.

Regent Hales reported that several members of the Committee stated that they were not supportive of the paper as a final document and would approve it as the basis for guidance to Central Administration Staff in preparation of Annual Review Budget Proposals to be considered by the Board at the December meeting. Regent Hales reported that Mr. Gordon Wold, Executive Director of United Council, reviewed for the Committee several items of special interest to students, and Professor Robert Baruch of TAUWF also presented a brief statement concerning some of TAUWF's concerns.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1098: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the 1976 Annual Review Policy Paper AR-76.1 (EXHIBIT E attached) be approved as the basis for guidance to Central Administration staff in preparation of Annual Review Budget proposals to be considered by the Board at the December meeting.

Regent Lavine stated that he was concerned about the area of faculty development if we are going to avoid future layoffs, and if we are going to retrain personnel, and the matter of program development, if, within our limited resources, we are going to have the kind of flexibility to keep the University moving ahead in the areas that it should. Regent DeBardeleben stated that he agreed that the subjects suggested by Regent Lavine are appropriate matters for consideration and would hope that if the Administration concurs, they would bring in reviews at the December meeting. It was the consensus of the members present that this be done.

Regent Williams noted that these are top priorities, but are not listed in the order of their priority, and that as she understood it, the request of the DOA was to the effect that we were to give information and recommendation only about those things which were to be considered of the very highest priority. Senior Vice President Percy stated that point was made abundantly clear in the Committee meeting on the previous day and this list is a distillate of some forty-one decision items. He stated the final list to be considered in December will be in priority order, and the Board will have the option of adjusting those priorities.

The question was put on Resolution 1098, and it was voted.

Regent Hales reported that the next matter considered by the Committee was an informational report by William Hustedt, Director of Risk Management for the System, regarding statutory changes affecting liability coverage resulting from passing Assembly Bill 1032.

Regent Hales reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Associate Vice President Osterheld reviewed the System's Auxiliary Operations, noting that 1974-75 saw a great improvement in the fiscal health of Auxiliary Operations. Regent Hales noted that the resolution approved by the Committee would cover specific policy guidelines in establishing the 1976-77 budget. He noted that it was pointed out by Mr. Osterheld that consideration of intercollegiate athletics and intramural guidelines will be deferred until the December meeting. He stated that Regent DeBardeleben felt that consideration of changes in relation to segregated University fees was more appropriately an item for biennial budget or general operating budget consideration instead of auxiliary budget guidelines, and as a result the resolution was modified.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution and the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardleben:

Resolution 1099: That, in accordance with Regent approved Annual Budget Policy Paper 4.2, and other actions taken by appropriate agencies, the following policy items should be included in the 1976-77 Auxiliary Budget Guidelines.

That (1) Campuses are urged to review their Segregated University Fee Supported Budget using a zero base budgeting approach with a maximum increase for 1976-77 of the allocatable section of the Segregated University Fee not to exceed 8% over the 1975-76 budget level.

(2) Salary increases will be based on the following standards: 6.8% for classified; 5% for faculty; 5% for student labor. Fringe benefits will be shown at 24% of total base wage. Supplies and services will be escalated at an 8% rate, except for utilities which will be in accordance with the determination made for each campus (In most instances the range will be from 22% - 50% increase.)

(3) Guidelines with respect to Intercollegiate Athletics and Intramurals will be distributed as soon as possible following this meeting, for consideration at the December meeting.

Regent DeBardleben pointed out that supplies and services according to subsection (2) are to be escalated at an 8% rate, and this means, in effect, that auxiliary operations are getting an escalation of the allowance for supplies and services under this policy guideline, which is in excess of the escalation of the allotment for supplies and services contained in GPR fund for the general budget. He noted that it is needed, but it has not been recognized in the State budgeting, but is being provided for on these self-sustaining projects.

The question was put on Resolution 1099, and it was voted.

Regent Hales reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been extensive discussion of the concerns expressed by The Association of University of Wisconsin Faculty regarding the enactment by the Board of ACPS-4, which defines the academic year. Appearances were made by Mr. Muzik, Executive Secretary of TAUWF, Mr. Breusch, UW-Stout, Mr. Baruch, UW-Stevens Point, and Senior Vice President Smith. It was concluded that since adoption of this policy paper resulted from extensive discussion and consideration of this topic by the Education Committee, an opportunity should be provided for all Regents to participate in this renewed consideration.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardleben:



That the Business and Finance Committee recommends that discussion of TAUWF objection to ACPS-4 be deferred to the December meeting, at which time all Regents will be invited to attend.

Regent Lavine requested a ruling of the chair as to whether it is proper for the Board to consider the matter at this time, inasmuch as it had previously been considered by the Education Committee and the Board. He stated that if a matter is to be reconsidered it can be reconsidered only by the committee that initiated it and by someone on that committee that voted on the winning side. The Education Committee aired it thoroughly and he could see nothing presented in the material that had not already been considered in detail.

Regent DeBardleben stated that when the matter was considered on the previous day he and other members of the committee were concerned about whether this should not be a subject for the Education Committee. He continued that it needs to be said for the other side that the TAUWF people brought it before the Business and Finance Committee because it now appears that it is actually implemented, there are budgetary factors involved, and that as he understood it, that was the reason it was brought before the Business and Finance Committee. He stated he would be a bit hesitant now to rule with Regent Lavine since the tenor of his remarks is that this is not going to even be considered, and that he thought this is entitled to consideration. He stated that he had no feeling as to which committee should consider the matter, but did believe that the faculty is entitled to have it considered by someone, and that it should not be referred to a committee which is going to say it isn't even going to hear it.

Regent Neshek stated that he felt we are setting a bad precedent if we allow various constituencies in the University community to pick and choose committees. He continued apparently TAUWF felt they did not get the desired result when they brought it before the Education Committee and that he interpreted this to be an attempt on their part to have it reconsidered by a different committee, with the hope and expectation they may have a more favorable result. Regent Neshek stated we have operated on this Board with a strong committee system and have been able to get our work completed in an expeditious manner solely because of our good committee system, and that we are going to gut our committee system if we allow this type of procedure to take place. He stated that it is appropriate that if it is to be reconsidered, it should go through the regular channels of the Education Committee, which had the original jurisdiction.

President McNamara stated that it was his understanding of Robert's Rules of Order that when a matter has been acted upon by an organization, it can only be brought up again by someone who has been recorded as voting in the affirmative on that action. He also noted that the topic is one of determination of the academic year and that obviously the parties concerned originally felt it was under the jurisdiction of the Education Committee, because that is where they went for relief. Regent DeBardleben pointed out that is where Central Administration went with its recommendation. President McNamara stated that the organization concerned appeared before that committee and raised no objection to its being heard by that committee. He stated the committee acted and the Board acted, and it would therefore be the decision of the chair that this matter is not properly before the Board of Regents at this time.

Regent DeBardleben appealed the ruling of the chair.



The ruling of the chair was upheld on a roll call vote with Regents Erdman, Fish, Lavine, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, Williams, and Senn voting "Aye" (9), and with Regents Barkla, DeBardleben, Gerrard, and Hales voting "No" (4), with Regent McNamara abstaining; and with Regents Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro absent.

#### REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

**Resolution 1100:** That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the \$718,000 budget for the UW-Madison Fieldhouse Update project be approved and authority be granted to prepare a concept and budget report. The project, as authorized for the 1975-77 fiscal biennium, is to be funded by self-amortizing supported borrowing authority.

Regent DeBardleben stated that it was his understanding that self-amortizing supported borrowing authority means that it will be amortized by Intercollegiate Athletics. Regent Erdman requested that an explanation be given as to why this discrimination against the Madison Campus on the building of facilities of this sort. Regent Fish stated that we have labored long and hard to try to overcome that - the Physical Planning and Development Committee did pass a resolution on a divided vote to use GPR revenues for those purposes. He continued the Legislature did not see fit to approve the recommendation that was made by the Regents. Regent DeBardleben pointed out that it has been traditional for Intercollegiate Athletics to support projects at the Fieldhouse and at the Stadium, and assumed that there is a feeling in the Legislature that this ought to be paid for out of Intercollegiate Athletics. He noted the other institutions in the System do not have the kind of revenues which the Madison Campus derives from Intercollegiate Athletics. Regent Erdman stated that she understood that Intercollegiate Athletics at Madison also has to support, as part of its programs, womens athletics, and this means quite enormous expenditures. She stated that she did not feel that this is enough money to ask for to do a really good job on the Fieldhouse.

Regent Fish pointed out that we did adopt utilization of GPR revenues as a recommendation of the Regents to do precisely what Regent Erdman suggested, and used many of her arguments. He continued that after we did that, we got support on a divided vote for using GPR revenues for these purposes and a budget well in excess of \$700,000 was submitted for a variety of specific projects, but the Legislature declined to act on that program. He noted the University then was faced with the necessity of taking this step and therefore a request has been made for the utilization of self-amortized funds, and the Building Commission has agreed to advance this \$7200 that is necessary for the planning report. He stated that this does not mean in anyway that this precludes the Legislature from giving GPR funds to the Uw-Madison or other campuses.

Regent Barkla stated that while Intercollegiate Athletics may be asked to support Womens Intercollegiate Athletics, part of the updating of the Fieldhouse was brought to the Committee with the rationale that we also had to provide facilities for the State High School Male Basketball Tournament and the State High School Wrestling Tournament because our facilities are not adequate to take care of those programs.

The question was put on Resolution 1100, and it was voted, with Regents DeBardelben and Lavine voting "No".

Regent Fish reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day in the consideration of the Deed Restriction relating to property in the Hill Farms, the Committee agreed that the Regents are not in a position to determine use of a property, which is a zoning matter, and it was noted that the concerned parties would still have the right to state their position before the City Planning Commission.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1101: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the restriction contained in the Warranty Deed conveying to the Evangelical Lutheran Joint Synod of Wisconsin and Other States, a Wisconsin religious corporation, an area containing 1.84 acres, more or less, located at the northwest corner of the University Hill Farms, limiting use of the property "to church purposes only" be removed. The removal of this restriction is subject to the stipulation that final site design plans for this property by any new owner must be reviewed and approved by the Hill Farm Architectural Committee.

Regent DeBardelben inquired if there is not substantial reason to conclude that people who bought other lots in the area did so in reliance on the assurance of the University that it would not release that restriction. Regent Fish responded that was the position of the attorney representing those individuals. He pointed out that any final site design changes would have to be approved by the Hill Farms Architectural Committee and that there would have to be a municipal zoning change. If we do not withdraw the deed restriction, the church has no purpose for the property and it becomes idle. Regent DeBardelben stated that it seemed to him that this represents a breach of faith with the other property owners. They bought their property in reliance upon the fact that the University would not release this restriction except for another church, and that he considered this to be the church's problem and not ours.

Regent Gerrard stated that he agreed with Regent DeBardleben and suggested that the church go ahead and get rezoned, and then they can come back to us for the elimination of the restriction. Regent Fish stated that they had tried that and the City suggested that they come to us first. He stated it is on record that the City's Planning Director and the Alderman for the Ward involved both support the removal of the deed restrictions. Regent Solberg stated that in the Committee meeting on the previous day the statement was made that the people in the area thought there would be certain sites set aside for churches and people bought property in the area on the assumption that there would be some type of church facility. University Counsel Charles Stathas pointed out that the abutting property was not sold by the Board of Regents to the neighboring people. Regent Fish agreed with Attorney Stathas' statement but pointed out the people who did buy property there knew of the deed restriction and this may have induced them to purchase the lots that they bought.

The question was put on Resolution 1101, and it was voted, with Regents Gerrard and Solberg voting "No".

Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1102, relating to Easement for Construction and Maintenance of Boat Channel and Vehicle Access, UW-La Crosse (attached as EXHIBIT F), the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted.

Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1103, relating to the Easement to Construct Gasline, UW-Oshkosh (attached as EXHIBIT G), the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted.

Regent Fish reported that the following resolution was adopted by the Board on December 17, 1971.

That the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point Laboratory School be redesignated the Gesell Institute for the Study of Early Childhood.

He stated the Gesell Institute for the Study of Early Childhood is being moved from the former Lab School building to a part of another building on the campus which houses the College of Professional Studies. The former Lab School building will then be known simply as the Communications Building until such time as the campus and Regents see fit to formally name this facility.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1104: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Stevens Point and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Resolution 51 (12/17/71) be rescinded.

Regent Fish reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been discussion of a proposal by the City of Menomonie to construct an overpass across Broadway for the purposes of protecting pedestrians and relieving traffic congestions. He stated the Committee indicated that contingent upon a review of specific plans, they would look favorably upon granting an easement for this purpose.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1105:

Whereas, Adolph I. Winther served the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater for more than 27 years before his retirement as Professor of Education and Dean of the College of Education in 1972; and

Whereas, during this period of time he was a dedicated teacher and educational administrator who demonstrated outstanding leadership in guiding the teacher training program at the University for more than a quarter of a century; and

Whereas, he was recognized as a leader in teacher education in the State of Wisconsin through service on and election to many state associations; and

Whereas, he was instrumental in the planning and construction of the Roseman Campus School as well as the Education-Psychology Building; and

Whereas, his former colleagues in the College of Education and the Faculty Senate at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater have initiated action to honor Dr. Winther by renaming the Education-Psychology Building in his memory;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Education-Psychology Building at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater be named Winther Hall.

Regent Fish reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Assistant Vice President Exo summarized the policy that was proposed by the State Building Commission that would require the establishment of an endowment fund to provide maintenance and operating costs for the facilities initially financed by gift funds. A survey has shown that Wisconsin would be the only major public university in the country to have such a policy, and it was believed that this requirement would discourage prospective donors. He reported Acting Vice Chancellor Robert M. Bock, of UW-Madison, -- the campus that would obviously be most affected by such a policy -- stated that a search of the records concerning all gift financed facilities has shown that every one of them is fully utilized and that the availability of the gift facilities has relieved the pressure for state funds for construction.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1106: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents opposes the policy proposal developed by the Department of Administration which provides that when the University is offered private gift funds for construction of buildings or other facilities, the University would be required to generate from gift sources an endowment fund to cover for a period of at least 30 years the cost of operating and maintaining the portion of the facility financed from gift sources and requests Central Administration staff to convey this opposition to the Building Commission.

Regent Fish reported that the Committee next considered the status report on Sublease of Clam Lake Field Station to the Wisconsin Indian Task Force (EXHIBIT H, attached).

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg;

Resolution 1107: That the President of the Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education and the President of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System meet with the Governor and the Department of Administration to resolve the policy issue concerning location of an Indian-head VTAE District facility in Superior and, following that determination, that the Executive Committee of the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents be authorized to act on behalf of the Board.

Regent Lavine inquired as to the necessity for the provision that the Executive Committee of the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents be authorized to act on behalf of the Board and was advised that there is a time factor pressure from the Vocational, Technical and Adult Education Board, and if the matter is not resolved earlier, it will be brought to the full Board for consideration in December.

The question was put on Resolution 1107, and it was voted.

Regent Fish reported the Committee then considered the matter of the concept and budget reports for the three maintenance/stores building projects at UW-Oshkosh, UW-Green Bay, and UW-River Falls. He recalled that the buildings have been on our priority list in the order of Oshkosh, Green Bay and River Falls, with an original estimated cost of approximately \$2,000,000 for the three facilities. He stated the original resolution that went out with the agenda called for

the construction of the buildings at Green Bay and River Falls because they were the two least expensive ones and would cost approximately \$2,000,000. He stated that he took exception to that because Oshkosh was first on the priority list and if our priority list meant anything, they ought to take them in the order of priority, and therefore the resolution was reworded. Regent Fish stated that when he came on the Board a number of years ago he constantly made reference to the fact that while he could understand the necessity for a high square foot price for construction of academic buildings, it escaped him then, and still escapes him, as to why the costs are running so high on maintenance and storage buildings. He continued that with the pressure for increased faculty salaries, and need for academic buildings it is difficult to justify the expenditure of 3.1 million dollars for maintenance facilities buildings. On the other hand if one goes to the locations and sees where they are storing the material now, it is obvious that there is necessity for maintenance and storage buildings at those three campuses.

Regent Barkla stated that she was not present at the Committee meeting but she did not like to see matters coming back to the Committee with re-worked plans and requests for increase in the budget,

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1108: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the concerned Chancellors, the concept and budget reports for the three maintenance/stores building projects at UW-Oshkosh, UW-Green Bay, and UW-River Falls are approved, except that the previously expressed preference that the buildings be designed for masonry construction is reaffirmed; that completion of final plans for all three projects is approved and that bidding and construction be authorized in the order of Regent priority within the amounts authorized for construction in the 1973-75 capital budget; and that Central Administration be authorized to submit to the Building Commission for inclusion in the annual review budget for 1976-77 a request for authority to increase the project budget for these three buildings by \$1.1 million in order to proceed with construction of all three maintenance/stores buildings.

Regent Fish stated that there is no question that design, supervision, and contingencies are necessary when you are building a one time only academic building, but under state regulations these factors get built into any kind of a building, which seems ludicrous to him. He noted that at Green Bay where total construction costs of a building were \$687,000, built in on top of that were design and supervision costs of \$68,000 plus a \$48,000 contingency, for a total of \$116,000 contingency on top of a \$687,000 project. He stated that it was difficult for him to accept this and it seems difficult for the Bureau of Facilities Management to justify it.

Regent DeBardleben inquired what would happen if we did not approve this resolution, and Regent Fish responded that there would be no construction work. Regent Barkla stated there is a definite need for the buildings, noting that at the River Falls Campus there is virtually no storage for their vehicles or any of their surplus materials.

Regent Fish stated that the differentials between the metal skin and masonry buildings were projected at \$70,000 to \$100,000, which many found to be difficult, in fact, impossible to believe, but the Bureau of Facilities Management stuck with those figures. Vice President Winter stated that we bid a building of this nature at Stevens Point and actually masonry came in cheaper than metal. Regent Fish stated that this was because the Bureau of Facilities Management does not use the advantage that metal skin buildings have of modular form.

Chancellor Weidner, UW-Green Bay, stated that we have been fooling around for two years on this project and that is why the price has gone up and that it is about time that it got built. He stated these were low priorities, and we have been building academic buildings first. He also noted that we hear a lot of talk about universities interfacing effectively with communities. One of the best way of avoiding that interface or hurting that interface, is putting up a nice tin building across from somebody's house. If you do that, it shows that the University does not really care about the community. He noted that the storage used at present is in expensive academic space and that the proposed buildings would be cheaper than the space we are using at the present time.

Regent Lavine stated that he agreed that we need the building and we needed it two years ago when we started this conversation. He continued there is no sense in having expensive vehicles sitting outside getting wear and tear because of snow and ice when they should be and could be covered. He inquired what would happen if we specified a modular sized, attractively faced metal building, of which there are 400 on the market. Regent Fish stated that he took exception to the statement that the reason for the increased cost is that we have poked around so long. He noted that the initial bids that came in were most unusual and submitted that not only in this case, but in dozens of others where we have delayed action for a year or so, we have come out substantially ahead because of redesign. Regent Lavine inquired what would happen if we told the Bureau we wanted to build a modular type standard size building, where we don't have all the expensive architecture behind it. Vice President Winter responded that this would be fine for the storage part, but it would not fit into the shops and vehicle use that we have for it.

Chancellor Birnbaum, UW-Oshkosh, stated that there is only one site possible on his campus, and noted that it faces on one side academic buildings, and on the other side a major city thoroughfare, which is going to be widened from a two lane to a four lane within the foreseeable future. He noted these are not primarily storage buildings, but buildings with workshops and offices in them, and in that respect not much different from classroom and laboratory buildings. Regent DeBardleben stated that he was satisfied from all the discussion that has taken place that the facilities committee has done their best to resolve this problem and that it is not going to get any easier to resolve, and if we wait any longer prices will go up some more.

The question was put on Resolution 1108 and it was voted, with Regent Pelisek voting "No".

Regent Fish reviewed the report on space utilization in the Education Science Building. He noted there was much correspondence and coverage by the media of the matter of certain organizations using space in the Education Science Building. He stated the three educational associations did not ask to come, they were sought out by the Department of Educational Administration, which believed that benefits would accrue to the University by it. He stated that this is not an uncommon practice on many campuses. He stated that two of the three organizations have reimbursed the Department for costs and the third will reimburse the Department when it receives the billing for the four weeks that it occupied one room. Regent Fish stated the organizations had no knowledge that they were anything but helpful to the University, and that it is clear that as soon as Chancellor Young was asked for his evaluation of it, his response was that it was not good policy -- that there were many plusses and some minuses, and that on balance it was not good policy to have independent organizations represented in University facilities. Regent Fish indicated that he would undertake to respond to individuals who wrote concerning the matter.

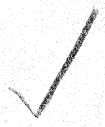

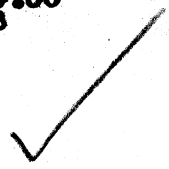

Dear Regent McNamara:

Following up on our all-too-brief visit in Milwaukee in September at the humanities conference, I am pleased to send you a copy of Managing Multi-campus Systems. My remarks in Milwaukee were drawn largely from the last chapter of the study. A copy of this letter and of the book is also being sent to Regent Pelisek, whom my co-author Frank Bowen met briefly earlier this month in Minneapolis. Frank is joining me in sending this letter to you.

In addition to the book itself, we would like to take the liberty of expanding on the comments which it makes about the University of Wisconsin System. In our book, we did not--could not--undertake to rank or compare the effectiveness of the nine multicampus systems--nor can we do so in this letter. Each multicampus university faces individual challenges and opportunities in its own state and those inherent in its unique history and structure.

Nevertheless, the University of Wisconsin System can be distinguished in one very important way: It has been faced with an almost unprecedented series of difficulties but has surmounted them in such a way that the institution appears even stronger in effectively implementing the educational goals of the state.

You are more aware than we, of course, of the nature of the difficulties: erratic enrollments, shifting student demands, merger, collective bargaining, and stringent state funding--all of these and more. Singly or in pairs, these problems have beset other systems, but only Wisconsin has had to deal with them all within such a short span of time. Moreover, your board and the central administration did not minimize these difficulties by putting out a fire here and hiding dust under the carpet elsewhere. The problems were met and resolved through coherent, sophisticated and still developing planning processes that may well be a model for other institutions in the coming years of uncertainty. Among the many accomplishments, we think the following are outstanding:


1. The fiscal emergency procedures related to faculty retrenchment assure not merely constitutionally required due process but also real and effective concern for each individual.
2. Program review techniques combine hard, quantitative data with the sound judgment of your faculty, without subordinating the latter to mechanical formulas.
3. Procedures for developing the system and campus budgets squarely relate academic issues to dollars for decision by your board and by state fiscal authorities.
4. The system is willing to make the hard decisions that are required when "equity" means more than "equality" in the distribution of funds among campuses and programs.
5. The system is willing--as evidenced by the regional consortia--to tolerate reasonable differences in administrative structures rather than to take the easy route of uniformity.
6. There is strong central support of innovation--as evidenced by the system grants for the improvement of undergraduate teaching and for the regional consortia.
7. The "2+2" budgeting and planning proposal, if it continues to gain acceptance by the state, will be a major contribution towards more rational state budgeting.
8. The system has avoided over-centralization of authority but instead has emphasized more-informed campus decisions. In the words of our book, the central administration has been "unusually sensitive to the values of the individual campuses."

Few institutions of higher education in the United States will be able to avoid the problems which the University of Wisconsin System has been facing over the past four or five years. Not all of your own problems are behind you, of course, nor can all of your solutions be transferred elsewhere. But, in our judgment, the University now has a working structure which integrates campus objectives, academic program review, evaluation, and sophisticated and informed central policy direction with an ongoing budgetary process. We know of no other state system of higher education which has progressed as far along this difficult road nor any which has had to do this under more demanding circumstances.


Over the past six or seven years, we have spent considerable time investigating and writing about multicampus systems. We believe that such systems have great potential for maintaining the many dimensions of quality that make up higher education. The University of Wisconsin System is a major example in support of this belief. We have the utmost respect for the professional leadership and educational statesmanship exhibited by President John Weaver, the two Senior Vice Presidents Percy and Smith, and their fine staffs.

Although our pride in your University is vicarious, it is very real. We are confident that the Regents have even greater pride, and hope that the people of Wisconsin and their elected officials are aware of what their University has accomplished in these most difficult times.

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

REGENTS' POLICY ON RESIDENCE HALL VISITATION

Residence hall visitation policy is a matter for individual campus action within the guidelines below. Within this policy, each institution shall insure that the visitation option or options selected fall consistently within the educational mission of the institution and not interfere with the institution's educational program.

1. Visitation is defined as those time periods when residents may invite friends or relatives of the opposite sex to visit them in their residence hall rooms. The visitation policies developed under these guidelines shall permit only visitation; cohabitation and sexual behaviors illegal under Wisconsin statute are prohibited.
2. Campus visitation options are defined by this resolution as:
  - a. Closed: A policy in which no visitation is permitted.
  - b. Limited: A policy in which in no case shall room visitation exceed a maximum of 17 hours per day, with residence halls closed not later than 2:00 a.m. on any day.
  - c. Open: A policy in which a maximum of 24 hours of visitation is permitted.
3. Campuses may elect to have closed and limited visitation or closed, limited, and open visitation, but whatever options are chosen, the opportunity to reside in areas having closed and limited visitation shall be provided to both men and women on every campus.
4. When applying for a room in a residence hall, students shall choose among the visitation options offered by the campus.
5. All students under the age of 18 at the beginning of the academic year in which they enroll shall live in non-coeducational, non-visitational areas unless special parental or guardian permission to live in limited or open visitational areas accompanies their application for residence.
6. Students who live in University of Wisconsin System residence halls shall participate in the development of visitation policies for the halls in which they reside through local campus housing governments.
7. Campus visitation policies must be approved by the Chancellor.
8. This policy shall be placed in effect for a three-year period beginning no later than the first semester 1976-77; reports on individual campus policies are to be filed annually by June 1, with the Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs.

## Chapter UWS 19

### Sick Leave

UWS 19.01 Definition. Sick leave refers to absences of faculty, academic staff and limited appointees of the University of Wisconsin System due to personal illness, injury, disability or pregnancy as well as attendance on a member of the immediate family of the employe whose condition or death requires the employe's direct care, if such absences are being charged against the employe's accumulated sick leave credits.

UWS 19.02(1) Persons Who Earn Sick Leave. All faculty, academic staff, and limited appointees as defined in sec. UWS 15.01(2), Wisconsin Administrative Code, shall earn sick leave.

(2) Accrual of Sick Leave. (a) As of the effective date of this chapter, each employe's account shall reflect the accrued balance of unused sick leave earned under the Board of Regents' sick leave policy adopted on June 8, 1973.

(b) Employes whose initial appointments are for nine months or more shall be credited with 22 working days of sick leave which they may draw upon as required consistent with UWS 19.01.

(c) After 18 months of service, each employe shall earn additional non-lapsing sick leave at the rate of 1 day per month for persons holding annual basis appointments and at the rate of 6 days per semester or 4 days per quarter for persons who hold academic year basis appointments, with a maximum annual accumulation limited to not more than 12 days.

(d) Unused sick leave shall accumulate from year to year in the employe's sick leave account pursuant to section 36.30(1), Wis. Stats.

(e) An employe utilizing paid sick leave shall continue to accumulate sick leave credits during the period of the sick leave absence.

(f) An employe does not accumulate sick leave credits while on an unpaid leave of absence including while receiving State Income Continuation Insurance payments.

(g) Part-time employes have an initial entitlement, earn and are charged sick leave in the same proportion as their appointment bears to a full-time appointment.

UWS 19.03 Cancellation and Reinstatement. If the employe leaves employment with the University of Wisconsin System other than through retirement or death, unused sick leave will be terminated but will be reinstated if the employe is reappointed to any position within the System within three years.

UWS 19.04 Income Continuation Insurance. When an employe becomes eligible to receive compensation under income continuation insurance, sick leave benefits are no longer applicable to that illness.

UWS 19.05 Recording and Use of Sick Leave. Each department or equivalent unit shall maintain records of each employe's sick leave entitlement and use.

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

1976 ANNUAL REVIEW POLICY PAPER # AR-76.1

A. Background

The Wisconsin Statutes provide that following passage of a biennial budget, in January of the first year of the biennium the Governor and Legislature may undertake consideration of budgetary adjustments in an *ANNUAL REVIEW* process. The Governor's initiation of that process and the DOA instructions governing it were circulated to Regents and the Institutions on October 7. The DOA instructions provide that:

1. Additional funds should be requested only for items which are "absolutely essential."
2. We must first exhaust the possibility of internal reallocation as a source of funds.
3. Requests should not include any "New and Changed Service" decision items denied in the 1975-77 biennial budget.
4. Requests should include re-estimates of costs of services funded from sum sufficient appropriations.
5. Requests may include workload changes (such as enrollment increases).
6. Items specifically deferred in the biennial budget for Annual Review consideration must be included.

The Central Administration was required, under the DOA timetable, to submit a "preliminary list" of proposals by October 15 and a final request by October 31. DOA was advised that the Regent timetable for Annual Review consideration had already provided for "policy considerations" at the Board's October 24th meeting and action on Central Administration's resultant proposal at the December 5th meeting of the Board. To comply with the October 15 deadline, Central Administration has shared a draft copy of this policy paper with DOA in lieu of the "preliminary list" of proposals, and will share its more specific recommendations with DOA on a provisional, information-only basis when they are ready in mid-November. However, the System's official submission will be that approved by the Regents in December.

B. Key Annual Review Program and Budget Considerations

This policy paper sets forth those program and budget considerations which Central Administration, following a necessarily hurried consultation with the Institutions, recommend be addressed in the UW System's Annual Review budget proposal. Only the most essential items have been selected for inclusion and there are no "new and changed service" requests. In addition, as requested by the Governor, we will also prepare an evaluation of our capability to fund these needs from within our present budget, including a description of past and ongoing reallocations of resources from lower to higher priority programs or to cover unavoidable fixed cost increases.

EXHIBIT E

As Central Administration, the Institutions and the Regents review these areas of budget need, it may become necessary to define priorities further, modify dollar amounts requested, and add or delete items. Suggestions from Regents, students, faculty, and Chancellors will influence the actual development of our request.

Items listed below represent our present judgment of top priority budget needs--but are not listed in particular priority order. Further analysis and documentation of need will be prepared for each item, with alternatives and recommendations for specific requests for Annual Review budget adjustments, and presented for Regent consideration at the December 5 Board meeting.

1. Unclassified Staff Compensation: Faculty, Academic Staff, and Limited Staff members in the U.W. System received salary adjustments for 1975-76 averaging 6.5%. The Regents had requested an average increase of 17% (12% for cost of living, plus 5% for merit). The biennial budget provides 5% for these employees in 1976-77; the Regents had requested 13%.

*Recommendation: That the Central Administration prepare for Regent consideration an Annual Review Decision Item reflecting additional salary increments for 1976-77 in a range beginning with 1% and extending at least to a level which would recoup current year losses in real income for unclassified UWS employees, in addition to the 5% level already authorized for 1975-76.*

2. Workload Funding: At the time citizens are still enrolling in its public universities in increasing numbers---an estimated 4,000+ FTE students more than last year, the state government has chosen to suspend the statutory formula that has traditionally provided state support for each of these additional students. (There were token amounts provided for 1976-76 workload increases, but even these funds are returned to "escrow status" in the second year, pending continuation by the Joint Finance Committee.)

The 4,000 FTE student increase this fall is equivalent to adding an entire campus of medium size to the System without providing any state support. This additional unfunded workload, coupled with the effects of another round of base budget cuts for purposes of productivity savings and general retrenchment and increasing inflationary erosion of budgets for teaching supplies and library books, has resulted in the consequences predicted during budget deliberations. Students are often unable to get into required courses or when they do they find larger classes and reduced personal attention. Library hours are reduced. Building maintenance is cut back.

Workload increases associated with additional student enrollments affect programs differently. For example, laboratory and clinical experience programs cannot accept additional students without a directly proportional increase in costs. Lecture-only courses can accommodate additional students until such time as physical and advising capacities of the sections are saturated, but then a new section must be added involving a major front-end investment. In any given college, department or semester, the workload cost increase depends upon the kinds of courses students select and relative capacities of those courses.



It can be noted that students are increasingly choosing to enroll in high cost disciplines, such as the health sciences. Particular funding needs may be evident in some of these programs, such as allied health professions. Need for workload funding to maintain the quality of high priority state programs may also result from special circumstances, such as the noncontinuation of outside funds formerly available or legislative intent that specific programs be mounted or strengthened (for example, the physician's assistant program).

*Recommendation:* That the Central Administration prepare for Regent consideration a proposal for support to be provided to a selected number of programs facing particular workload or cost to continue budget needs, and taking special note of unanticipated enrollment growth.

3. Selected Inflationary Relief: Critical instructional supplies and library materials must be maintained at an adequate level to protect the quality of our instructional programs. The absence of any adjustment for inflationary erosion in the biennial budget represents a serious drain on the quality and extent of the University's programs.

As our biennial budget request indicated, the amount required to restore the UW System's supplies, expense, and capital purchasing power for 1975-77 to its 1972-73 level would be \$25.2 million. Actual experience with inflation during 1974-75 tends to verify that predicted figure.

The compounded and cumulative effect of this erosion means that fixed dollar supply budgets are increasingly deficient in real resources. To maintain an adequate level of resources, funding must be provided to match price increases. Where is that level to be set? Buying power of these non-salary budgets had diminished by 1975 to less than 75% of the 1972-73 levels. It will continue to decline unless some increase in funds is provided. By 1976-77, our inability to offer certain lab courses dependent on supplies will be jeopardized to an even greater extent than at present. Each year without relief we face a serious reduction in the number of books and periodicals which can be purchased for library collections. These are critical factors in the quality of education.

*Recommendation:* That the Central Administration prepare for Regent consideration an Annual Review Decision Item which will reflect alternate levels of supplies and expense inflationary adjustments, at a minimum restoring purchasing power eroded during 1974-75 in supplies and expense accounts in critical instructional and academic support areas.

4. Student Workstudy Matching Funds: Federal workstudy awards to the UWS exceeded earlier government estimates and in order to qualify for 80% Federal student employment funding we must provide the remaining 20% support. Without State 1 for 4 match the Federal funding and the much-needed support for student employment will be lost.

*Recommendation:* That the Central Administration prepare for Regent consideration an Annual Review Decision Item which will provide the necessary state matching funds for the current year and projected workstudy program levels.

5. Extension Funding: The biennial budget reduced state (GPR) support for Extension programs in each year of the 1975-77 biennium by \$750,000, while directing the University to emphasize new thrusts in urban extension programs representing not less than \$100,000 annually. At the time the Legislature was considering the Governor's biennial budget recommendations which called for an even greater reduction in Extension funds, restoration of funds to UW-Extension was listed among the top priorities of the System. It remains a top priority. It is the subject of separate legislation still pending.

*Recommendation: That the Central Administration prepare for Regent consideration a statement of continued support for restoration of Extension funds deleted from the biennial budget. Further, that Central Administration evaluate the special program needs of Extension and submit further information to the Board so it may determine whether a modified budget request for Extension funding is appropriate and desirable as part of the System Annual Review proposal.*

6. Technical Adjustments: The DOA instructions require agencies to submit updated estimates for sum sufficient items such as utilities, fringe benefit costs, and so on. These items are presently funded from sum sufficient appropriations because the agencies' ability to predict and control these costs is relatively limited. Large utility price increases and concerns about unavailability of less expensive fuel sources to some campuses aggravate the usual problems in the utilities account.

*Recommendation: That Central Administration forward estimates of increases in these costs to DOA as soon as completed with copies furnished Regents and others for information. Other technical or minor policy items may be identified as appropriate for Regent review and brought to the December 5 meeting.*

Status Report on Sublease of Clam Lake Field Station  
to the Wisconsin Indian Task Force

At its April 11, 1975 meeting the Board of Regents authorized the execution of a sublease of the Clam Lake Field Station to the Wisconsin Indian Task Force, subject to receiving written approval from the U. S. Forest Service for this sublease arrangement (Resolution 993). The field station was intended to be used as the headquarters for a program for rehabilitation of alcoholics and was to be available to all tribes for an alcoholic treatment center, vocational training, training for juvenile delinquency problems, with plans underway to move into the mental health care and care of the aged fields. Application had been made by the Wisconsin Indian Task Force for a supporting grant from the National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Special Projects Branch.

On October 9, 1975 the U. S. Forest Service granted permission to the Board of Regents to sublease a part of the Clam Lake Field Station grounds for the purpose of administering an Indian Comprehensive Care Center.

The Wisconsin Indian Task Force has basically failed in receiving grant funds which were originally sought to assist with the proposed program. As an alternative approach, and to maintain interest in the program, it was decided to proceed with a locally sponsored program. A state grant was received which provided for conducting a counseling program to establish a minimum type of training for the counselors used with the program. Due to the inability to secure the full level of funding, the Alcoholic Rehabilitation Program is the only program currently being operated. Clients receive grants from various agencies to allow them to continue their program of alcoholic rehabilitation. This money is transferred to the Wisconsin Indian Task Force which uses this source of income to fund its program.

It is anticipated that approximately seven clients and six counselors will participate initially in the program. While all counselors do not reside at the field station, a condition of the contractual agreement is that one counselor is to be present on the grounds at all times.

Payment for use of the facilities and for all actual utility costs in the leased facilities are to be made as specified in the agreement.

President McNamara presiding

President McNamara introduced Peter Senn, Vice President of the Vocational Technical and Adult Education Board, attending in place of Regent John Zancanaro.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Erdman, Fish, Gerrard, Hales, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, and Williams.

ABSENT: Regents Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro.

A. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

1. President McNamara recognized President Weaver for the purpose of making a presentation. President Weaver stated that it seemed fitting that the meeting should open with recognition of the fact that for the third time in the past two decades, a University of Wisconsin faculty member has received a Nobel Prize, namely Dr. Howard M. Temin, Professor of Oncology, and a member of the research team of the McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research. He noted his prize for medicine and physiology, which he shares with colleagues at MIT and at the Imperial Cancer Fund Laboratory in London was given for their dramatic discovery concerning interaction between tumor viruses and the genetic material of the cell. He continued that Dr. Temin, a dedicated scientist, has been a member of the Madison Faculty for fifteen years and in his relatively short career received many of the nation's highest honors for scientific research. President Weaver stated Dr. Temin's outstanding work brings not only high distinction to himself and his family, but reflected glory to his University, and certainly



invaluable service to mankind. He stated that he knew the Board would wish to meet and to recognize this unusual scholar who so brilliantly exemplifies the quality of the great University of which he is a part. He called upon Chancellor Young to present Dr. and Mrs. Temin.

Chancellor Young stated that it is a very great pleasure, representing the University at Madison, to present Dr. and Mrs. Howard Temin.

Dr. Temin made the following statement: "It has been a pleasure for me to meet you and thank you for your recognition, and thank you for having provided at the University of Wisconsin an environment in which unorthodox ideas could be tested and established. The way in which you can continue to do me honor is by your actions, which will continue to support quality education in all the endeavors which are performed under your auspices. Thank you."

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by several Regents, and it was voted unanimously.

Resolution 1087:

Whereas, Dr. Howard M. Temin of the University of Wisconsin-Madison will be awarded the Nobel Prize for medicine and physiology, and

Whereas, the Nobel Prize is a dramatic and significant addition to the impressive list of awards and honors earned previously by Professor Temin for his work as scientist and teacher at the McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research in the Center for Health Sciences,

Be It Resolved, that this Board congratulates Dr. Temin for the honors he has earned, commends him for his devoted and brilliant service to humanity, and expresses appreciation to him for his major contributions to the worldwide reputation of the Madison campus for research, teaching and public service.

President McNamara stated that he would like to add the personal congratulations and commendations of the Board, and through us of all the citizens of the State of Wisconsin, because we all share and rejoice in the work Dr. Temin is doing, and expressed appreciation on behalf of all.

2. President McNamara introduced Dean Pound of the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences. Dean Pound noted that 1975 is the Centennial year of the agricultural experiment movement and that a presentation had been prepared relating to one hundred years of agriculture in Wisconsin. He introduced Professor Fritz Albert who had prepared the program, the narrator, Professor Maurice White, and the script writer Professor John Fett,-- all of the Agricultural Journalism Department. There followed a presentation on the history of agriculture during the past one hundred years.

3. The following resolution was properly moved, seconded and voted:

That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on September 12, 1975, be approved.

4. President McNamara called attention to the Joint Meeting between the University of Wisconsin Board and the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota scheduled for November 21 and 22, 1975, and requested the Regents attending to advise the Secretary so that necessary arrangements can be made.

5. President McNamara called upon Regent Pelisek to report on the meeting of the Council of Trustees of the University of Wisconsin Hospitals.

6. At the request of President McNamara, Regent Lavine reported on the meeting of the Association of University Governing Boards.

B. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

1. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1088: The the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record (EXHIBIT A on file), be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

2. At the request of President Weaver, Dean Johnson, International Studies and Programs, UW-Madison, reported on the status of the policy of the Midwestern University Consortium for International Activities with respect to discrimination by foreign governments on the basis of race or religion.

3. At the request of President Weaver, Senior Vice President Smith gave an informational report on documenting goals and objectives.

4. President Weaver noted that about a year ago, all the voluntary accreditation bodies of the academic process in the United States were joined into a single national council of professional accreditation. He continued that for many years we have been well served by voluntary accreditation, that is, voluntary among the educational institutions themselves, and among professional schools and programs themselves who have taken the responsibility for assuring high professional standards, both institutionally and programmatically. He stated the federal government has begun to move into this area and that he felt this could be a very dangerous threat to the University in uniqueness and the institutional autonomy that have been so important in academic affairs in this country. He stated the Office of Education has developed and is rapidly growing in size a bureaucracy that has all the apparent intent of taking on within Health, Education and Welfare the accrediting functions for themselves. He continued that he considered this to be a very, very serious threat on the part of the federal bureaucracy in the internal affairs of academic institutions.

5. President McNamara read portions of a letter to him from Professors Lee and Bowen, who had made a major research study of the multicampus universities. The letter is attached as EXHIBIT B.

C. REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD

1. The Secretary reminded the members of the Board that the next meeting will be held in Milwaukee on December 4-5, 1975.

D. REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

1. Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Provost Wilson Thiede discussed in some detail the Regents Statewide University (RSU), the UW Center System, and University Extension, including off campus credit courses, continuing education, and public service programs.

2. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

Resolution 1089: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW  
(Policy-Revised) System, the attached Residence Hall Visitation Policy,  
dated October 24, 1975, (EXHIBIT C) be approved.

After considerable discussion, the details of which will be found in the full minutes on file in each library, the question was put on Resolution No.1089, and it was voted on a roll call vote, with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Erdman, Hales, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, and Williams voting "Aye" (11), with Regents Fish, Gerrard, and Senn (voting in the absence of Regent Zancanaro) voting "No" (3), and with Regents Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro absent.

3. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1090: That upon the recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-  
(Policy-New and Parkside and the President of the UW System, the  
Revised) following sections of the UW-Parkside faculty  
policies and procedures are approved as required  
under UWS 2.02:

- Chapter 46
- Chapter 47

4. Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been informational reports on system activities relating to academic affairs as follows:

2. Community Education Programming in Wisconsin
3. System Personnel Workshop
4. Health Sciences Advisory Committee
5. Campus Seminars on Student Disciplinary Guidelines
6. Twin Ports Advisory Task Force Progress Report
7. Wisconsin Special Education Project Directors.

5. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and they were voted:

**Resolution 1091:** That the Secretary of the Board be directed to file a notice of hearing with the Revisor of Statutes for inclusion in the next Wisconsin Administrative Register to consider the adoption of sick leave rules relating to faculty, academic staff, and limited appointees at the University of Wisconsin System, said hearing to be held in Room 1820, Van Hise Hall, 1220 Linden Drive, in the City of Madison, Wisconsin, on the 8th day of January, 1976, at 11 A.M.; and that copies of the proposed rules be provided at this time to the Chairpersons of the Senate and Assembly Education Committees pursuant to s. 227.018(2), Wis. Stats. (EXHIBIT D attached)

**Resolution 1092:** That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, upon the effective date of ch. UWS 19, Board Resolution #506, the System Sick Leave Policy for Faculty and Academic Staff, dated June 8, 1973, shall constitute Board Guidelines on the implementation and administration of ch. UWS 19; and that Central Administration be directed to issue said Guidelines immediately upon the effective date of ch. UWS 19 to units in the UW System.

6. Regent Lavine noted that the presentations by Professors Hallett J. Harris and C. Jarrell Yarbrough, UW-Green Bay, originally scheduled for the previous day, had been deferred to the next meeting of the Education Committee in Milwaukee in December.

7. Regent Barkla reported that there was a conference the first week in October on advancing women in administration in our society, run by Ms. Marian Swoboda. She noted it was a very interesting and worthwhile venture and congratulated Ms. Swoboda for the organization of the conference.

E. REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

1. After reviewing several large grants and smaller ones of special interest, Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1093: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants, and contracts included on pages 1/75 presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

2. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

Resolution 1094: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the following contract be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed:

Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, Madison, WI. (P/C with DHEW OE) Student follow-up accountability and information services for the period 07-01-75 through 06-30-76 Award # 19-043-151-196 Msn Educ General Admin Voc&Tec Ed (144-G863) \$27,490.00

Acting Vice Chancellor Dean Robert Bock, UW-Madison, appeared in favor of acceptance of the grant and Mr. Larry Allwardt, representing the Wisconsin Federation of Teachers Local 3271, appeared in opposition to the acceptance of the grant. Considerable discussion ensued, the details of which will be found in the full minutes on file in each library. Regent Barkla requested that the record show that she did not participate in the discussion nor vote on this issue to avoid any appearance of a possible conflict of interest because her husband is employed by a public employees union. President McNamara abstained from voting because of his labor union affiliation.

The question was put on Resolution No. 1094, and it was voted, with Regents DeBardleben, Erdman, Fish, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Williams, and Senn voting "Aye" (8); and with Regents Gerrard, Hales, Lavine, and Solberg voting "No" (4); and with Regents Barkla and McNamara abstaining; and with Regents Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro absent.

3. Regent Hales reported that the Committee had received a report on campus activities on soliciting unrestricted funds. He stated that Regent DeBardleben commented that Chancellors Haas, Weidner, Field (and their staff) should be commended for their success in securing funds of this type for their campuses.

4. Regent Hales reported the Committee next considered a bequest made by the late Setrak K. Boyajian of approximately \$7,000 to the University of Wisconsin-Madison for student loan purposes.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1095:** That the bequest of the late Setrak K. Boyajian, Hudson, Massachusetts, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Setrak K. Boyajian, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

5. Regent Hales reported the next bequest considered was made by the late Anita Koenders to the McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research, amounting to \$5,000.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1096:** That the bequest of the late Anita Koenders, Sheboygan, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Anita Koenders, Deceased; and stipulation recommended by the Attorney General and approved by the Business and Finance Committee on December 5, 1974, and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

6. Regent Hales reported the Committee next considered a bequest made by the late Edward G. Nishan of \$5,000 for research into the causes, treatment, and possible cure of cancer.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1097:** That the bequest of the late Edward G. Nishan, Reedsburg, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Edward G. Nishan, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

7. Regent Hales reported the Committee next considered the Annual Review Policy Paper AR-76.1. He reported that Senior Vice President Percy reviewed the document for the Committee, noting that on September 30 information was received from the Governor and the Secretary of the Department of Administration establishing October 15 as the deadline by which the System needed to submit proposed requests for consideration during the 1976 annual review session. Since this topic was scheduled for consideration with the Board at the December meeting, the October deadline would not allow any Regent review. Therefore, the 1976 Annual Review Policy Paper AR-76.1 was prepared by the Central Administration Staff with verbal agreement of DOA staff that this document was acceptable in meeting their October 15 deadline.

Regent Hales reported that several members of the Committee stated that they were not supportive of the paper as a final document and would approve it as the basis for guidance to Central Administration Staff in preparation of Annual Review Budget Proposals to be considered by the Board at the December meeting. Regent Hales reported that Mr. Gordon Wold, Executive Director of United Council, reviewed for the Committee several items of special interest to students, and Professor Robert Baruch of TAUWF also presented a brief statement concerning some of TAUWF's concerns.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

**Resolution 1098:** That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the 1976 Annual Review Policy Paper AR-76.1 (EXHIBIT E attached) be approved as the basis for guidance to Central Administration staff in preparation of Annual Review Budget proposals to be considered by the Board at the December meeting.

Regent Lavine stated that he was concerned about the area of faculty development if we are going to avoid future layoffs, and if we are going to retrain personnel, and the matter of program development, if, within our limited resources, we are going to have the kind of flexibility to keep the University moving ahead in the areas that it should. Regent DeBardleben stated that he agreed that the subjects suggested by Regent Lavine are appropriate matters for consideration and would hope that if the Administration concurs, they would bring in reviews at the December meeting. It was the consensus of the members present that this be done.

Regent Williams noted that these are top priorities, but are not listed in the order of their priority, and that as she understood it, the request of the DOA was to the effect that we were to give information and recommendation only about those things which were to be considered of the very highest priority. Senior Vice President Percy stated that point was made abundantly clear in the Committee meeting on the previous day and this list is a distillate of some forty-one decision items. He stated the final list to be considered in December will be in priority order, and the Board will have the option of adjusting those priorities.

The question was put on Resolution 1098, and it was voted.



8. Regent Hales reported that the next matter considered by the Committee was an informational report by William Hustedt, Director of Risk Management for the System, regarding statutory changes affecting liability coverage resulting from passing Assembly Bill 103.2.

9. Regent Hales reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Associate Vice President Osterheld reviewed the System's Auxiliary Operations, noting that 1974-75 saw a great improvement in the fiscal health of Auxiliary Operations. Regent Hales noted that the resolution approved by the Committee would cover specific policy guidelines in establishing the 1976-77 budget. He noted that it was pointed out by Mr. Osterheld that consideration of intercollegiate athletics and intramural guidelines will be deferred until the December meeting. He stated that Regent DeBardeleben felt that consideration of changes in relation to segregated University fees was more appropriately an item for biennial budget or general operating budget consideration instead of auxiliary budget guidelines, and as a result the resolution was modified.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution and the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben:

Resolution 1099: That, in accordance with Regent approved Annual Budget Policy Paper 4.2, and other actions taken by appropriate agencies, the following policy items should be included in the 1976-77 Auxiliary Budget Guidelines.

That (1) Campuses are urged to review their Segregated University Fee Supported Budget using a zero base budgeting approach with a maximum increase for 1976-77 of the allocatable section of the Segregated University Fee not to exceed 8% over the 1975-76 budget level.

(2) Salary increases will be based on the following standards: 6.8% for classified; 5% for faculty; 5% for student labor. Fringe benefits will be shown at 24% of total base wage. Supplies and services will be escalated at an 8% rate, except for utilities which will be in accordance with the determination made for each campus (In most instances the range will be from 22% - 50% increase.)

(3) Guidelines with respect to Intercollegiate Athletics and Intramurals will be distributed as soon as possible following this meeting, for consideration at the December meeting.

Regent DeBardeleben pointed out that supplies and services according to subsection (2) are to be escalated at an 8% rate, and this means, in effect, that auxiliary operations are getting an escalation of the allowance for supplies and services under this policy guideline, which is in excess of the escalation of the allotment for supplies and services contained in GPR fund for the general budget. He noted that it is needed, but it has not been recognized in the State budgeting, but is being provided for on these self-sustaining projects.

The question was put on Resolution 1099, and it was voted.

10. Regent Hales reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been extensive discussion of the concerns expressed by The Association of University of Wisconsin Faculty regarding the enactment by the Board of ACPS-4, which defines the academic year. Appearances were made by Mr. Muzik, Executive Secretary of TAUWF, Mr. Breusch, UW-Stout, Mr. Baruch, UW-Stevens Point, and Senior Vice President Smith. It was concluded that since adoption of this policy paper resulted from extensive discussion and consideration of this topic by the Education Committee, an opportunity should be provided for all Regents to participate in this renewed consideration.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben:

That the Business and Finance Committee recommends that discussion of TAUWF objection to ACPS-4 be deferred to the December meeting, at which time all Regents will be invited to attend.

Regent Lavine requested a ruling of the chair as to whether it is proper for the Board to consider the matter at this time, inasmuch as it had previously been considered by the Education Committee and the Board. After considerable discussion the President ruled that the matter was not properly before the Board of Regents at this time. Regent DeBardeleben appealed the ruling of the chair.

The ruling of the chair was upheld on a roll call vote with Regents Erdman, Fish, Lavine, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, Williams, and Senn voting "Aye" (9), and with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Gerrard, and Hales voting "No" (4), with Regent McNamara abstaining; and with Regents Thompson, Walter, and Zancanaro absent.

F. REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

1. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1100: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the \$718,000 budget for the UW-Madison Fieldhouse Update project be approved and authority be granted to prepare a concept and budget report. The project, as authorized for the 1975-77 fiscal biennium, is to be funded by self-amortizing supported borrowing authority.

After some discussion, the question was put on Resolution 1100, and it was voted, with Regents DeBardeleben and Lavine voting "No".

2. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1101: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the restriction contained in the Warranty Deed conveying to the Evangelical Lutheran Joint Synod of Wisconsin and Other States, a Wisconsin religious corporation, an area containing 1.84 acres, more or less, located at the northwest corner of the University Hill Farms, limiting use of the property "to church purposes only" be removed. The removal of this restriction is subject to the stipulation that final site design plans for this property by any new owner must be reviewed and approved by the Hill Farm Architectural Committee.

After considerable discussion, the question was put on Resolution 1101, and it was voted, with Regents Gerrard and Solberg voting "No".

3. Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1102, relating to Easement for Construction and Maintenance of Boat Channel and Vehicle Access, UW-La Crosse (attached as EXHIBIT F), the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted.

4. Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1103, relating to the Easement to Construct Gasline, UW-Oshkosh (attached as EXHIBIT G), the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted.

5. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1104: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Stevens Point and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Resolution 51 (12/17/71) be rescinded.

6. Regent Fish reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been discussion of a proposal by the City of Menomonie to construct an overpass across Broadway for the purposes of protecting pedestrians and relieving traffic congestions. He stated the Committee indicated that contingent upon a review of specific plans, they would look favorably upon granting an easement for this purpose.

7. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1105:

Whereas, Adolph I. Winther, served the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater for more than 27 years before his retirement as Professor of Education and Dean of the College of Education in 1972; and

Whereas, during this period of time he was a dedicated teacher and educational administrator who demonstrated outstanding leadership in guiding the teacher training program at the University for more than a quarter of a century; and

Whereas, he was recognized as a leader in teacher education in the State of Wisconsin through service on and election to many state associations; and

Whereas, he was instrumental in the planning and construction of the Roseman Campus School as well as the Education-Psychology Building; and

Whereas, his former colleagues in the College of Education and the Faculty Senate at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater have initiated action to honor Dr. Winther by renaming the Education-Psychology Building in his memory;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Education-Psychology Building at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater be named Winther Hall.

8. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1106: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents opposes the policy proposal developed by the Department of Administration which provides that when the University is offered private gift funds for construction of buildings or other facilities, the University would be required to generate from gift sources an endowment fund to cover for a period of at least 30 years the cost of operating and maintaining the portion of the facility financed from gift sources and requests Central Administration staff to convey this opposition to the Building Commission.

9. Regent Fish reported that the Committee next considered the status report on Sublease of Clam Lake Field Station to the Wisconsin Indian Task Force (EXHIBIT H, attached).

10. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg;

**Resolution 1107:** That the President of the Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education and the President of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System meet with the Governor and the Department of Administration to resolve the policy issue concerning location of an Indian-head VTAE District facility in Superior and, following that determination, that the Executive Committee of the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents be authorized to act on behalf of the Board.

Regent Lavine inquired as to the necessity for the provision that the Executive Committee of the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents be authorized to act on behalf of the Board and was advised that there is a time factor pressure from the Vocational, Technical and Adult Education Board, and if the matter is not resolved earlier, it will be brought to the full Board for consideration in December.

The question was put on Resolution 1107, and it was voted.

11. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

**Resolution 1108:** That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the concerned Chancellors, the concept and budget reports for the three maintenance/stores building projects at UW-Oshkosh, UW-Green Bay, and UW-River Falls are approved, except that the previously expressed preference that the buildings be designed for masonry construction is reaffirmed; that completion of final plans for all three projects is approved and that bidding and construction be authorized in the order of Regent priority within the amounts authorized for construction in the 1975-77 capital budget; and that Central Administration be authorized to submit to the Building Commission for inclusion in the annual review budget for 1976-77 a request for authority to increase the project budget for these three buildings by \$1.1 million in order to proceed with construction of all three maintenance/stores buildings.

Considerable discussion ensued relating to the relative merits of masonry and metal facilities, the amount of the contingency and supervision and design costs, and the locations of the buildings.

The question was put on Resolution 1108, and it was voted, with Regent Pelisek voting "No".

12. Regent Fish reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been a report on space utilization in the Education Science Building. He indicated that he would undertake to respond to individuals who wrote concerning the matter.
