



COVERING THE BADGERS

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER:

Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium and can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6.

WORKING TICKETS:

All Requests for Communications Center tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at the ground level entrance at Gate 6, Section E. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

RADIO:

Each station admitted for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets. Booths are assigned and tickets mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS:

Field passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV level, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

PARKING:

A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working media only. They will be issued as requested.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS:

Player interviews will be held in the "W" Club Annex following practice as prearranged with the Sports Information Office. There will be no

player interviews allowed on Thursdays and Fridays.

Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short postgame meeting of the squad and coaches. All post-game interviews will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

COACHES INTERVIEWS:

Dave McClain will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach McClain will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

The Media Interview Room on game days is the Wisconsin Weight Training Room directly below the Wisconsin Dressing Room.

Best time to interview Coach Mc-Clain is on Mondays at 12 noon during his weekly teleconference call, from 2:30-3:15 Thursdays, or 2:00 to 3:00 Fridays before home games, or after practice each day.

Your hosts in Camp Randall Stadium and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are Jim Mott, Sports Information Director, Bob Leu, Radio-TV Director, and Doug Spencer, Sports Information Assistant.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team man-

ager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

THE 1984 WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK


Seventh-year Head Coach Dave McClain has put together three consecutive seven-win seasons with the University of Wisconsin, and with just four starters lost off his record-setting 1983 team, prospects indeed look promising for what will mark the 96th season of college football for the Badgers.

Eighteen starters return for 1984, led by first team All-Big Ten line-backer Jim Melka and first team All-Big Ten wide receiver Al Toon. Also back are second team All-Big Ten offensive tackle Jeff Dellenbach and honorable mention All-Big Ten selections Kevin Belcher, tackle; Michael Jones, flanker; Bret Pearson, tight end; and Dan Turk, center. And working to regain his eligibility for '84 is 1982 first team All-Big Ten defensive tackle Darryl Sims.


Wisconsin's record-setting 1983 offensive unit has lost only one regular, but that loss is a key one in quarterback Randy Wright. The Cardinal and White set new team

season standards for most points, 359; most points average per game, 32.6; most touchdowns, 49; most first downs, 255; most yards total offense, 4,545; most yards total offense average per game, 413.2; most passes attempted, 336; most passes completed, 180; most yards passing, 2,381; most yards passing average per game, 216.5; and most touch-downs passing, 19. On four occasions, the 1983 UW squad scored 42 or more points, and on six different Saturday afternoons, the Badgers topped 32 points. Certainly, a major factor in much of that success was Randy Wright.

But McClain and his staff have high hopes in sophomore Mike Howard, redshirt freshman Brant Kennedy and senior Bob Kobza. And with the return of each starting member of the interior offensive line, a top-notch corps of receivers, and several explosive runners to fuel the rushing attack, Wisconsin's 1984 quarterbacks should have plenty of help generating offense.





AL TOON

Al Toon, a top candidate for All-American honors in 1984, ended the '83 season with a team-leading 45 receptions for 881 yards and nine touchdowns, topping the Big Ten in yards gained receiving (788), average yards per catch (20.7), and touchdowns (seven). The Newport News, Virginia senior also established new Wisconsin season records for most yardage gained receiving, most touchdown passes caught, and most consecutive games catching a scoring pass (five). The final three games of 1983 (Iowa, Purdue and Michigan State), Toon had 24 receptions for 537 yards and three touchdowns, including a single game national high of 252 yards against Purdue. He is now tied for the UW career mark of touchdown passes caught with 14 and he ranks third all-time in yards gained receiving with 1,353. His 45 catches last year were the most by a Badger since 1966.

Also back for '84 are Menominee, MI senior Bret Pearson, who finished 1983 with 34 receptions for 373 yards; Chicago, IL senior Michael Jones had 24 catches for 281 yards; and Flint, MI senior Thad McFadden had 15 receptions for another 250 yards. Others to

watch are sophomore Tim Fullington, sophomore Danny Johnson, sophomore Jeff Sanford and sophomore Reginald Tompkins, who has switched over from defensive back.

Wisconsin's offensive line in 1984 will be built around a fine contingent of seniors in Jeff Dellenbach (6-6½, 285), Kevin Belcher (6-7, 285), Dan Turk (6-4½, 260), Chris Osswald (6-4½, 255), and Dave Mielke (6-4, 255) — all starters a year ago. Dellenbach, Belcher, Turk and Osswald started every game in 1983. Bob Landsee (6-5, 260) started the

first five games before suffering a knee injury, while Mielke started the final six contests. Brian Jansen (6-4½, 252), coming off a knee injury which sidelined him in '83, was projected as a probable starter for 1983 prior to the injury.

At the running back spots, Mc-Clain returns three top ball carriers in sophomore tailback Larry Emery, second-year fullback Joe Armentrout, and senior fullback Marck Harrison. 1983 first-year players Emery and Armentrout were second and third respectively with totals of 336 and 325 yards, and both owned yards-per-carry averages of 6.0 or better. Emery also had 12 catches for 120 yards with Armentrout hauling in nine for 113. Harrison, meanwhile, gained 260 yards on 46 carries with four touchdowns and had nine catches for 49 yards. Flanker Michael Jones had 14 carries for another 135 yards. Waiting in the wings for more playing time in '84 are sophomore Brian Bonner, senior Kemal Carr, sophomore Keith Browning and junior Louis Holland. All gained valuable experience in '83 and will be ready when the call comes.

On defense, the Badgers shutout two opponents in '83 — Northwestern and Michigan State. It was the second straight season the UW has registered two blanks. Wisconsin also held their opponents to a .483 pass completion percentage.

Perhaps the biggest problem facing the Badgers defensively last year was how to stop the run. But much of that could be attributed to youth and inexperience; i.e. in last year's 32-0 win over MSU in the season finale, Wisconsin started four freshmen, one sophomore and four juniors on defense. And in that game,





the Badgers held the Spartans to 72 yards rushing and 47 yards passing. Three players — stack outside line-backer Mike Herrington, closed side corner Brian Marrow, and safety Richard Baxter — won't be back, but McClain does have eight starters returning for 1984.

A group of exceptional linebackers — led by All-American candidate and senior Jim Melka - will form the nucleus of the Badger defense. From West Allis, Melka has led the UW in tackles the past two seasons. He had 130 in 1982 and then followed up with 111 in 1983, despite missing the final two and one-half games with a broken arm suffered against Iowa. The 6-2, 230pounder had 18 tackles in games against both Illinois and Michigan and also had three interceptions. Along with Melka, there is senior Russ Fields, who finished second in tackles with 83, sophomore Rick

Graf, who had 58, and sophomore Michael Reid, who had 57 stops. Then there is talented Art Price, who could challenge for a starting spot, Brad Grabow, Tim Jordan and Craig Raddatz. Jordan, who figured to see a lot of playing time in 1983, was red-shirted last year while Raddatz tied for the team leadership in interceptions as a first-year player with four and came on strong in the second half of the season. McClain and his staff can feel secure with the knowledge that any of these athletes could get the job done. Expect to see all of them in action in '84.

On the defensive line, the final game starters for the Badgers were junior Scott Bergold (6-7, 255) at read tackle, freshman Lance Branaman (6-3½, 260) at noseguard, and freshman Jim Kmet (6-3, 255) at stack tackle. All return for '84, and should Darryl Sims also return, the Badgers' improvement on the defensive line will be marked indeed. Sims was a first team All-Big Ten pick at defensive tackle in 1982, as he led the league with 20 tackles for loss for a minus 98 yards. He is 6-5, 260. Bergold had 64 tackles on the year, including a team-leading nine tackles for losses totaling 42 yards. Included in that were four sacks for a minus 35 yards and he also had two passes broken up and one fumble recovery. Bergold started every game in '83. Branaman started seven


times at the noseguard spot, missing two to injury, and wound up with 43 tackles, including 27 solos. Kmet had 48 stops, with three going for opposition losses. Also back is 6-6, 246-pound sophomore Kurt Schlicht at stack tackle, who chipped in 12 tackles, junior John Taulien, and sophomores Brian Hoffman, Mark Helt, Dick Teets and Dave Sparger.

In the defensive backfield, the Badgers have lost starting closed side corner Brian Marrow and safety Richard Baxter, but McClain does have seniors Russ Bellford, Richard Johnson, Ken Stills and Averick Walker — all of whom started at one time or another a year ago. All were varsity letterwinners as well.

Bellford, who had 51 tackles, shared the team leadership in interceptions with four for 106 yards while Johnson, Walker and Stills all had two apiece. Of the 21 opponent passes picked off by the UW in 1983, players responsible for 18 of those are back for '84.

Others who should figure into team plans in the defensive backfield include junior Anthony Humphries and sophomores Robb Johnston, Duane Marrow, Nathaniel Odomes, Eric Sydnor and Bobby Taylor, who has switched from running back.

The other area of concern for 1984 appears to be the kicking game. Gone are field goal and extra point specialist Kevin Rohde, kick-



off regular Wendell Gladem and punter George Winslow. Rohde was 45 of 48 on extra point attempts and six of nine on field goal tries. Gladem was one of the best kickoff men in the Big Ten, while Winslow averaged nearly 37 yards per punt.

Among the players competing for the kicking jobs are redshirt freshman David Blackmer, and freshman recruits Scott Cepicky and Todd Gregoire.

McClain signed 21 new players for 1984, 13 of whom are from Wisconsin. (Note: Gary Ellerson dropped from school in late June.)

DAVE McCLAIN

Dave McClain enters his seventh season as head coach at Wisconsin after being named Wisconsin's 24th head coach on December 16, 1977.

The 46 year-old McClain, a native of Upper Sandusky, Ohio, and a 1960 graduate of Bowling Green University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, came to Wisconsin from a highly successful coaching stint at Ball State, where he posted an overall 46-25-3 record in seven seasons.

His overall 80-57-3 record for thirteen seasons as a head coach ranks him among the nation's Top Twenty coaches entering 1984. That's a winning percentage of .581.

McClain played football at Upper Sandusky High School and Bowling Green University, where his team went 45-5-4. He played both quarterback and safety at Bowling Green.

He started his coaching career at Crestline, Ohio High School with an 8-1 record and then returned to Bowling Green as a graduate assistant in 1961, where he served as freshmen offensive coach and earned his Master's Degree in Education.

He then served as an assistant coach at Cornell University under Tom Harp in 1962; at Miami (Ohio) University under Glenn E. "Bo" Schembechler, 1963-66; at Kansas under Pepper Rodgers, 1967-68; and at Ohio State under W.W. "Woody" Hayes in 1969 and 1970 before accepting the head coaching job at Ball State.

He coached seven seasons at Ball State, with only his first a loser at 4-5-1. He was named Mid-American Conference "Coach of the Year" in 1975 after a 9-2 season. His three year MAC record of 13-4 included the 1976 conference title.

In his first season with the Badgers, he became the first coach since Ivan Williamson in 1949 to post a winning mark as a first year coach. Those 1978 Badgers opened with four straight wins and finished at 5-4-2; the first winning season since

1974. The next two seasons proved to be a little tougher as his 1979 and 1980 squads posted identical 4-7-0 marks

The next season started the turnaround. In 1981 the Badgers went 7-5-0 including the first Bowl appearance for a Wisconsin team since the 1962 season. Their 6-3-0 Big Ten record was good for a third place tie, and included wins over national powers Michigan and Ohio State. The Badgers lost to Tennessee 28-21 in the Garden State Bowl.

In 1982, Dave became the first coach in Wisconsin history to guide the Badgers to back-to-back Bowl games and accomplished what no other Wisconsin coach was able to do — win a post season Bowl game. The Badgers won a 14-3 decision from Kansas State in the 1982 Independence Bowl to cap a second consecutive 7-5 season, which included the first victory over Ohio State in Columbus since 1918.

And in 1983, the Badgers posted their third consecutive seven-win season under McClain with a final mark of 7-4. Wisconsin also turned in its third straight winning Big Ten campaign at 5-4.

Dave has also served as an assistant coach in the Hula (1982) and Japan (1983) Bowl games, and was an assistant coach in the Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, AL in 1983.

Dave and his wife, the former Judy Perry, have three children—son Tom 18, and daughters Mindy 16 and Marcy 13.

Quarterbacks, Running Backs, Offensive Coordinator

Bill Dudley, 39, came to Wisconsin with Dave McClain and coaches the quarterbacks and receivers. He had joined McClain's staff at Ball State after serving as an assistant at the University of Dayton from 1973-76.

He served as defensive secondary coach for the Flyers in 1973, and added defensive coordinator duties to that in his final three seasons at Dayton.

Prior to his arrival at Dayton, Bill was a graduate assistant at Northwestern University for two years, assistant coach at Glenbard West High School in Glen Ellyn, Illinois, for one season, and assistant coach at his alma mater, Riverside-Brookfield High School in Riverside, Illinois, for two years.

Dudley is a 1967 graduate of Western Illinois University where he lettered in football twice as a quarterback, safety, and place kicker. He also gained a pair of letters while playing the same positions in high school.

Bill received his master's degree from Northwestern University in 1972. He and his wife Diane have no children.

FRED JACKSON

Receivers

In his second season with Wisconsin's football staff is Fred Jackson, who came to Dave McClain's staff in 1983 after three years as an assistant coach at the University of Toledo.

Jackson, who coached Toledo's quarterbacks and wide receivers, entered the collegiate ranks in 1980 from the head coaching position at Southwestern High School in Flint, MI.

While at Southwestern High School he produced such outstanding college stars as Michigan's Rick Leach and Rodney Feaster; Purdue's Jerome Oliver and Ron Moore; Michigan State's Darryl Turner; Penn State's Booker Moore; and Toledo's Emmanual Cole and Capus Robinson.

The 35-year-old Jackson is a native of Baton Rouge, LA. He was an all-state quarterback at Scotlandville High School in 1965 and 1966 and after his 1967 graduation from high school, went on to star at Jackson State University from 1968-70. He was a 12th round NFL draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1971.

Fred received his bachelor's degree from Jackson State in 1971 and earned his master's degree in Educational Administration from Eastern Michigan University in 1976.

He started his coaching career in Flint, Michigan as offensive back-

field coach at Southwestern High School in 1971 and became the school's head football and track coach in 1972.

Fred has also coached the semipro Flint Sabres and has worked on the summer football camp staffs at the University of Michigan and Michigan State University. He played quarterback for the Detroit Wheels in the World Football League in 1974.

He is married to the former Teresa Al-Khouri.

RON McBRIDE

Interior Offensive Line

Ron McBride, 44, came to the Wisconsin football staff in 1983 after serving six years as the offensive line coordinator at the University of Utah (Utah ranked 12th offensively nationally among Division I schools in 1982.).

He coaches the tight side of the Badgers offensive line.

A native Californian, Ron joined the Utah football staff in 1977 following collegiate coaching stints at Long Beach State, California-Riverside, and at Gavilan Junior College in Gilroy, CA. He started his coaching career at Piedmont High School in San Jose, California.

Ron graduated from South Gate,
California High School in 1958
where he lettered in football and
baseball. He was a three-year starting linebacker at San Jose State

from 1961-63, receiving his degree in physical education in 1964.

SCOTT SEELIGER Offensive Line, Tight Ends, Special Teams

Scott Seeliger, who for the past five seasons has served as an assistant coach at Bowling Green State University, has joined Coach Dave McClain and his University of Wis-

consin football staff for 1984.
Seeliger, a 1972 graduate of Iowa
State University, will serve as the
tight end and special teams coach as

well as working with the offensive line at the UW. At Bowling Green State in 1983, Scott was the offensive coordinator for a Falcon team that owned a 8-3 record and ranked No. 2 in the nation in passing. He also coached the offensive line at BGSU and had served as an administrative assistant as well.

"I am tickled to have Scott back," said McClain. "He did a great job here as a part-time coach in 1977 and 1978, and he will be a great addition to our staff. Scott has coached high school football here in Wisconsin and knows the state pretty well. He will be a big plus for the program."





Defensive Backs

Chuck Heater, 31, begins his third year with Dave McClain's football staff as defensive backfield coach.

He came to Wisconsin from a three-year stint at the University of Toledo as defensive backfield coach. In 1981, Toledo won the Mid-American Conference title and won the first California Bowl game 27-25 over San Jose State.

A native of Weston, West Virginia, Chuck prepped at Columbian High School in Tiffin, Ohio before enrolling at the University of Michigan. He was a three-year starter at Michigan as a running back, and earned all-Big Ten honors, and was the school's fifth leading rusher when he graduated in 1975.

Chuck started his coaching career under Joe Salem at Northern Arizona University and moved to Toledo in 1977, where he coached the backs and receivers for two seasons and as defensive backfield coach for three years.

ARNOLD JETER

Defensive Line

Arnold joined Wisconsin's football staff from Marshall University in June, 1977, and coached the Badger defensive ends in 1977. He has served as defensive line coach since McClain came to Wisconsin.

A native of Steubenville, Ohio, Arnold is a 1962 graduate of Kent State University where he was a running back, and received a bachelor of science in Secondary Education.

He started his coaching career as an assistant football coach at Warren G. Harding High School in Warren, Ohio, in 1962. Two years later he became the head football and track coach and athletic director at Warren's West Junior High School.

He was a graduate assistant football coach at Iowa, 1966-67, and did work towards his master's degree in Physical Education.

Arnold became the head football coach at Delaware State in 1967 and

served the school for eight years. His 1970 and 1971 teams ranked No. 1 among NCAA College Division teams in rushing and total defense.

Following the 1974 season, he left Delaware State to become an assistant coach at Marshall University where he coached the outside linebackers.

He and his wife Lillie are the parents of three children: Jay, 25, Carl, 23, and Zina, 19.

DAVE ANDERSON

Outside Linebackers

Dave Anderson, 30, returned to Wisconsin in 1983 after serving as defensive coordinator for Montana State's Big Sky Conference champions in 1982.

He coaches the outside linebackers.

Dave is a 1976 graduate of Wisconsin and lettered on the school's 1973-74-75 football teams as a defensive tackle. He was honored with the Ivan B. Williamson and Russ Winnie Awards for athletic and academic excellence following his senior year of competition.

Following graduation from Wisconsin, Dave was an assistant football coach at D.C. Everest High School in Schofield, WI, for three seasons before joining Dave McClain's staff as a graduate assistant in 1979.

He completed his master's degree in Physical Education before leaving to serve as an assistant coach at UW-Eau Claire during the school's 1981 Wisconsin State University Conference (WSUC) championship season.

Dave prepped at Kaukauna High School where he was a two-way allconference, all-State and all-American football player.

JERRY FISHBAIN Assistant Coach - Recruiting

Jerry Fishbain is the recruiting coordinator for the University of Wisconsin football program.

He came to Wisconsin from Minnesota in 1980, where he performed the same duties for one year. Prior to that he was defensive head coach and Assistant Admissions Director at UW-River Falls.

The 50-year-old Fishbain is a native of Racine and a 1955 graduate of LaCrosse with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He received his master's degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1960 and was enrolled in the Educational Administration doctoral program for four years.

Following US Army service, Fishbain started his coaching career in 1957 at Colby High School, where he coached all sports. He moved to Racine Horlick High School in 1959 and became head football coach in 1961. He also served as Athletic Director for two years 1966-68.

In 1970 he became assistant football coach at UW-Milwaukee and took over the head job a year later. During the 1972-73 school year he served as athletic business manager and from 1973-75 served as assistant Athletic Director in addition to his football and business manager duties.

Jerry and his wife Janet are the parents of three children — Jason 15, Sarah, 13 and Rachel, 10.

Graduate assistants for 1984 are Dave Mohapp, John Ramage, Rich Barrent, Bob Canny, Al Seamonson, Barry Fagen and John Josten.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR ELROY HIRSCH



ELROY HIRSCH

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is in his 16th year—longest tenure in the school's history—as Wisconsin's Director of Athletics and he's the guiding force behind one of the finest athletic programs for men and women in the United States today.

Wisconsin's men's and women's athletic programs have consistently ranked in the Big Ten's first division during his tenure over the past 15 years.

The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969.

His original appointment as athletic director—slated to end in 1979—was first extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984, and again in April, 1979 through June 30, 1988 by Chancellor Irving Shain upon recommendation of the Athletic Board.

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as a triple threat halfback on **Harry Stuhldreher's** 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus nine touchdowns, five by rushing and four by passing.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but also basketball, track and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at

Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as a halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-American Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

It was at Los Angeles that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.

Hirsch was one of the athletes—like Otto Graham and Sam Huff and Gino Marchetti—who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists

under free substitution.


In 1951, Hirsch displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by Bobby Mitchell of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and Hirsch had only twelve games to set the record, not 14 like Mitchell!

That same season **Hirsch** caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by **Don Hutson** of the Packers in 1942. He also caught

at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Elroy compiled a total of 343 passes caught for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdown catches during his career with the Rams before retiring from NFL play following the 1957 season.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the alltime NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker during his nine year career with the Los Angeles



FRANK J. REMINGTON Faculty Representative

DAVID W. TARR Chairman, Athletic Board

Professor **David W. Tarr** was named to the Wisconsin Athletic Board in 1978 and has served as chairman the past 5 years.

The 52 year-old political scientist succeeded emeritus Professor Frederick W. Haberman as board chairman in 1979.

He has served as a member of the UW-Madison faculty since 1963 and is a former chairman of the political science department. He was a sophomore halfback on Wisconsin's 1942 football team when World War II interrupted his schooling until 1946. He served as






He received a Master's degree in Educational Administration in 1962 from Wisconsin-Madison.

WOLVERINE OUTLOOK:

Michigan has lost its "strength up the middle" with the loss of All-American linemen Stephan Humphries and Tom Dixon along with threeyear starter at quarterback Steve Smith, but Wolverine Head Coach Bo Schembechler has plenty of talent to work with for 1984. The defense will be a key factor for Michigan in 1984, and middle guard Al Sincich and tackle Kevin Brooks anchor the line with linebackers Mike Mallory and Rodney Lyles along with defensive back Brad Cochran expected to play major roles. While the quarterback position is wide open with youngsters, the tailback and fullback positions are stocked with veterans. The fullback battle will be interesting with four lettermen returning. Michigan will once again be one of the top teams in the Big Ten as the Wolverines have enough talent coming back to make a strong bid for the conference crown.

WISCONSIN ALL-TIME FOOTBALL TEAM

Six All-American football players were picked on Wisconsin all-time football team by fans during the 1969 centennial season of collegiate football.

Fullback Alan "The Horse" Ameche, 1953 and 1954 All-American and 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was voted Wisconsin's all-time greatest football player in the poll. In the backfield with Ameche are quarterback Ron Vander Kelen (1962); and Marlin "Pat" Harder and Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch, members of the famed 1942 Wisconsin team that posted an 8-1-1 record and a No. 3 national ranking.

The ends named are All-American **Dave Schreiner** (1941 and 1942) and **Pat Richter** (1961 and 1962.)

Linemen honored included Robert "Red" Wilson (1946-49); Howard "Cub" Buck (1915); Arlie Mucks, Sr. (1914); Dan Lanphear (1959); and Ken Bowman (1961-63).

TEN BADGERS PICKED IN FIRST ROUND

A total of ten University of Wisconsin football players have been first round choices by National Football League teams since the first draft of collegiate talent following the 1935 college season.

The Green Bay Packers picked three Badgers as their first round choice — fullback Eddie Jankowski in 1937; fullback George Paskvan in 1941, and quarterback Earl "Jug" Girard in 1948.

The old Chicago Cardinals (St. Louis today) drafted fullback Pat Harder in the first round in 1944; the Los Angeles Rams (nee Cleveland) took halfback Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch as a first round choice in 1945; fullback Alan "The Horse" Ameche was a first round pick of the Baltimore Colts in 1955; the Oakland Raiders (then in the AFL) took quarterback Dale Hackbart first in 1960; end Pat Richter was the first choice of the Washington Redskins in 1963; Dennis Lick was drafted sixth by the Chicago Bears in 1976; and tackle Ray Snell went in the first round to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1980.

CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 91 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural Society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U.S. Grant visited it 15 years later, he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd


watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the 1966 addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

There have been three enlargements to Camp Randall Stadium since the end of World War II. The first, in 1950 and 1951, saw the completion of the horseshoe at the north end of the stadium.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at the time.

The addition of the second deck on the west side of the stadium in 1966 added almost 13,000 prime

viewing seats, including the modern Communications Center.

The current capacity of 77,280 makes Camp Randall Stadium the seventh largest college owned stadium in the United States-exceeded only by those at Michigan, Stanford, Ohio State, Tennessee, Penn State, and Georgia.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 12,204 following renovation in 1976.



TWO BADGER NUMBERS RETIRED

Two football jersey numbers have been retired in Wisconsin's football history. They are No. 80, worn by All-American end Dave Schreiner when he was an All-American end in 1941 and 1942; and No. 83, worn by quarterback Allan J. Shafer in 1944.

Schreiner was killed in action with the U.S. Marine Corps during the battle of Okinawa, June, 1945. Shafer was fatally injured in the second half of the 1944 Wisconsin-lowa football game and died shortly after Wisconsin had defeated the Hawkeyes 26-7 in Camp Randall stadium, November 11, 1944.



The Kangaroo Kicker

PAT O'DEA OF WISCONSIN



THE FIRST TIME Pat O'Dea kicked a football on the University of Wisconsin campus, the reaction of spectators was so violent that he thought he had committed some

sort of public offense.

Now, 85 years later, any Badger unable to identify the Kangaroo Kicker's famed deeds with a football would attract some eyebrow lifting, so indelibly have Pat O'Dea's exploits been written into Wisconsin and American gridiron annals.

Pat O'Dea was a football star shining 50 years too soon. He had everything which goes to make up a modern athletic idol—personal charm, magnificent appearance, supreme skill in a spectacular specialty. Playing football as he did for Wisconsin from 1896 to 1899, his name would be on the lips of every sports enthusiast.

Just imagine a college player today drop-kicking four field goals in one game, or being credited with 14 field goals in a single season, or sending punts booming down field 80 to 100 yards, or booting field goals 65 yards away from the goal posts!

The records kept at the turn of the century fail to do Pat O'Dea justice and a reference to just one of his kicking feats in 1899 proves it. Wisconsin was playing at Minnesota in mid-November and the Badgers, though favored to win, were held to a scoreless tie in the first half and the stalemate continued into the third period.

Knowlton of Minnesota got off a punt of only 30 yards and O'Dea, playing safety, called for a fair catch but his 50-yard field goal attempt was wide by a narrow margin. The events which immediately followed were thus described in the Minneap-

olis Journal:

"Minnesota brought the ball in 25 yards and again Knowlton punted. The ball flew straight to O'Dea 10 yards beyond center and with Gil Dobie right under it. Great was the surprise of the Minnesota men to see O'Dea dodge an attack from Dobie and then deliberately kick a drop from the center of the field. A nicer kick could not have been made and Wisconsin had a score, 5-0".

The play broke the heart of the Minnesota team and Wisconsin went on to win 19-0. Yet this almost unbelievable play was only briefly noted in "The Field Goal Record, 1873-1931," in the Official Intercollegiate Football Guide in this casual

manner.

"40 yards, by P.J. O'Dea (Wisconsin) vs Minnesota, Nov. 18,

1899".

The field, at that time, was 110 yards long, goal line to goal line. As stated by the Minnesota paper, O'Dea caught the ball 10 yards beyond center, which means 65 yards from the Wisconsin goal. Dobie, the Gopher end, who later became a famous coach, always maintained afterwards that O'Dea's kick was the greatest individual play he ever saw in any football game.

Describing it, Dobie said that, after eluding him, O'Dea ran toward the sideline, not kicking until several Minnesota players converged upon him. The kick, therefore, was at a difficult angle, made harder by the fact that O'Dea, a right footed kicker, was running toward his own left.

Some newspaper accounts of the play gave the distance of the kick as 60 yards and none which reported the game placed it less than 55 yards.

Patrick John O'Dea was born in Melbourne, Australia, and was an athletic luminary at Victoria high school and Krew college in his native city. His father owned a stock ranch and Pat lived the typical young rancher's life when not in school. He soon became one of the fastest backs and greatest kickers in the Antipodes and, at the age of 16, was chosen as an All-Australian halfback.

Pat's older brother, Andy, came to the United States early in the '90's in the retinue of Frank "Paddy" Slavin, champion heavyweight fighter of the Antipodes. Andy, a famous amateur oarsman, football player, and boxer in his youth, turned to coaching rowing soon after he reached the States and had considerable success with the Lurlines, an amateur Minneapolis club. He came to Wisconsin as varsity crew coach in 1895 and he probably was the most surprised man in the world one sunny afternoon in the spring of 1896 when a tall youth in a blue flannel lounging suit and tiny cap affected by English varsity oarsmen, strolled up to him on the float of the Wisconsin boat house and said, "Hello, Andy." It was characteristic of both O'Deas that the elder returned the salutation with an equally laconic "Hello, Pat. When did you get in?"

Pat took such work as he could in their remaining weeks of the spring term and in September was regularly enrolled in the pre-legal course at Wisconsin. One day when football practice was going on in front of the Old Red Armory, the ball bounded over to Pat who was watching the drill along the sidelines. To return the ball, Pat simply reverted to form and booted the pigskin the length of the

field.

Coaches, players, and sideliners erupted with a concerted shout and converged on Pat who feared he had committed some offense in touching the ball. But the rush on Pat was to recruit him, so, after some talk, he agreed to put on a suit next day and, in his words. "try and learn something about the crazy American version of the game".

The young Australian rugby player soon picked up the American style and was allowed to play a few minutes in the opening game against Lake Forest. He was in long enough to boot one punt 85 yards and three more, each more than 50 yards. In

the next week of practice, Pat broke his arm and was sidelined until the post-season game with the Carlisle Indians in the original Chicago Coliseum on the south side of the Windy City. The game probably was the first to be played under artificial lights indoors.

The following year, O'Dea became Wisconsin's regular fullback and played throughout the 1897, 1898, ad 1899 seasons, twice being chosen on the All-American squads

selected by Walter Camp.

Pat's tremendous kicking ability was utilized to utmost by the Badger coach, Phil King, who developed the punting game as Wisconsin's strongest offense, reserving the powerful rushing attack until within scoring distance. O'Dea many times would punt on first down and the exchange on kicks invariably was in Wisconsin's favor by a huge margin.

Until Pat's senior year, Coach King seldom permitted him to carry the ball, although the traditional fullback of that time was a line backer, headed all interference over and outside tackle, and backed up the line on defense. King so devised the plays that O'Dea swung in behind to push the runner, which the rules then permitted. On defense, he played in the safety division and few have played in better.

Often Pat would open the scoring with a drop kick which then counted five points and Wisconsin would follow up with touchdowns against a demoralized opponent still dazed over seeing the ball soar through the goal posts from a starting point near

the middle of the field.

In the 1897 season, Pat kicked eight field goals, one a 55-yarder against Minnesota and another for 57 yards against the arch-rival Chicago team. The next season, 1898, Pat clicked for 10 field goals, one of them a record 65-yarder against Northwestern, and in his senior year, he drop-kicked 13 field goals and place-kicked a 57-yarder for added measure. In that span of four years, Wisconsin won 33 games, lost just five, and tied one.

The 65-yard drop kick against Northwestern was made on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 24, 1898 at Evanston, Ill., and Pat wasted no time in performing the deed at the outset of the game.

Pat, residing in San Francisco in 1954 where he actively led Badger alumni functions, tells of the kick in a letter to Art Lentz, then Wisconsin's Sports Information Director:

"Northwestern took the kickoff but immediately punted from the 25 yard line. We then used one play to get to the center of the 110 yard field where the ball was placed in a marked circle. I called the kick signal and dropped back about 12 yards, took one step and booted the ball between the posts for a field goal. Wisconsin went on to win 47-0."

Proof of this record kick was given in newspapers and added confirmation came later from George Haight, a prominent Wisconsin alumnus, who presented a letter of certification from two Northwestern players.

O'Dea's great place kick does not appear in the official records although it is well authenticated. It was made against Illinois on Nov. 11, 1899 in a game played at Milwaukee. O'Dea's long punt soared into the end zone and the rules required Illinois to immediately punt back from the 25. O'Dea called to Bill Juneau to make a fair catch and the ball was taken just a few feet inside the sideline 57 yards away from the goal. O'Dea originally intended to use a drop kick but the referee ruled that Juneau would have to hold the ball. O'Dea then calmly place-kicked the ball through the uprights, clear over the bleachers and into the street. Old-timers recall that the ball must have sailed at least 80 yards through the air!

O'Dea was the greyhound type of athlete, standing 6-1½ in height and weighing around 165 in playing condition. His legs were abonormally long and highly developed. He had real speed for he could run the 100 in 10 seconds and the quarter in 50 seconds. He was used as a high hurdler in track at Wisconsin and once ran a dead heat for first place in the Big Ten finals within a fifth of a second of the then world's record.

O'Dea's punting style was peculiarly his own. As he swung his right foot into the ball, he lifted himself completely into the air, his left foot leaving the ground six or eight inches. On his follow through, his right foot was well above his head.

Although the spiral kick was new to him when he started in American football, he quickly mastered it but always reverted to his Australian style of "end-over-end" kicking during the regular games.

He got off his punts very fast and often electrified the crowds by dodging tacklers and, on the run, kick the ball 60 or more yards. In drop kicking, his style was more like that of American players but there was a freedom and confidence in his swing that was unique. Rarely was he called upon to try short kicks and that's why so few of them appear in the records.

For drops of 40 to 60 yards, he needed a full swing, so he dropped the ball farther ahead of him than most kickers and from the height of his waist.
