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# REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in the President's Office

Saturday, February 11, 1956, 10 A.M.

PRESENT: Regents Gelatt, Jensen, Jones, Laird, Renk, Rennebohm, Steiger, Wanvig, Watson, Werner.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on January 7, 1956, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

Vice President Baldwin presented the recommendations and report of the President, who was absent due to illness.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, recommendation No. 1 listed under Degrees was adopted.

#### - Special Gifts -

l. The Regents of The University of Wisconsin gratefully note the establishment of a trust, by Mr. Joseph S. Daniels of Rhinelander, Wisconsin, the income of which is to be given to The University of Wisconsin for the support of a professorship in the University of Wisconsin Medical School to be known as the Dr. Alfred D. Daniels Professor on Diseases of Children; and the Regents authorize the administrative officers of the University and the Medical School to plan for an appointment to be made to this professorship when the proceeds of this gift are made available to the University.

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Wanvig, recommendation No. 1 listed under Special Gifts was adopted.

2. That The Regents of The University of Wisconsin accept the gift by Thomas E. Brittingham, Jr., Wilmington, Delaware, of the easterly ten and one-half acres of his property, known as "Dunmuven", including the recreation building and other improvements, located in the  $SE\frac{1}{4}$  of the  $SE\frac{1}{4}$ , Section 13, Township 7 North, Range 8 East, Township of Middleton, Dane County, Wisconsin; and that the President of the University convey to Mr. Brittingham the sincere appreciation of the Regents for this generous gift.

Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Steiger, recommendation No. 2 listed under Special Gifts was adopted.

3. That The Regents of The University of Wisconsin gratefully accept the gift by the Homemakers and 4-H Club members of Wisconsin, made through the Upham Woods Committee, of approximately 8.7 acres of land, described as all that part of the  $E^{\frac{1}{2}}$ 

of the  $SE_{\frac{1}{4}}$  of Section 32, Town 14 North, Range 6 East, lying northeasterly of the centerline of the right-of-way of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul & Pacific Railroad, Juneau County, Wisconsin, together with three cabins located thereon, to be used as a part of the Upham Woods property in accordance with the terms and conditions, governing the use of Upham Woods, which were approved and accepted by the Regents on June 21, 1941.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Renk, recommendation No. 3 listed under Special Gifts was adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in EXHIBIT A, attached, be accepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the Actions by the President, since the January 7, 1956, meeting of the Board of Regents, covering resignations and terminations, appointments, leaves of absence, changes in status or salary of personnel, and resignations to accept other U.W. appointments (EXHIBIT B attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Vice President Peterson presented the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the Reports of Actions Taken numbered I, II and III, listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT C attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the report of budget transfers for January, 1956, for the information of the Regents. (See Exhibit D appended to EXHIBIT C attached)

Regent Laird presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

- 1. That the resignation of Vernam T. Davis, Assistant Director of the Psychiatric Institute (Associate Professor), be accepted; to take effect February 7, 1956.
- 2. That the retirement of Arthur O. Collentine, assistant professor of dairy husbandry, to take effect at the close of January 31, 1956, be approved; and that he be granted emeritus status.
- 3. That Assistant Professor Richard A. Siggelkow be appointed Assistant Dean of the School of Education, effective July 1, 1956; salary to be determined at the time the 1956-57 budget is made.
- 4. That Edwin R. Shorey, Professor Emeritus of Mining and Metallurgy, be employed on a special service contract, on part-time basis, for the second semester of 1955-56; salary \$2,175 for the semester; charge to the unused balance on salary of William J. Rundle, resigned, Department of Mining and Metallurgy.
- 5. That Fred A. Clarenbach, professor of political science, be granted leave of absence, without pay, for the second semester of 1955-56.
- 6. That the salary of Sergius A. Wilde, professor of soils, be increased, effective January 1, 1956, from the rate of \$8,660 to the rate of \$8,960, twelve months' basis, the increase to be charged to funds appropriated by the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Jensen, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

- 2. That the bequest by the late Merle M. Baldwin of Madison, Wisconsin, to be used as a loan fund for needy and worthy students attending the University of Wisconsin, who have graduated from Central High School in Madison, Wisconsin, be accepted by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Merle M. Baldwin, Deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to sign receipts on behalf of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, covering this bequest, and do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University.
- 3. That the establishment by Mrs. Elaine L. Love of Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, of the ELAINE LOVE 1956 EDUCATIONAL FUND, to be used to provide financial aid to certain male students attending the University of Wisconsin in accordance with the Trust Agreement, dated January 18, 1956, (copy on file), be approved by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin. (The intent of Mrs. Love is to accelerate the establishment of the scholarship program initiated in the will of her late husband, Dr. George R. Love, and the terms of the trust she has established are in substantial agreement with the terms of the said will.)
- 4. That approval be given to the changes in the program of the School of Nursing leading to the degree of B.S. (Nursing), as approved by the University faculty on January 9, 1956, as shown in Document 1205, copy attached.

With reference to the above changes in the program of the School of Nursing, Vice President Baldwin reported these changes merely provide for giving credit for practice work for which credit was not previously given. No change is involved in the actual amount of work required.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Administrative Committee, the stipends for graduate teaching assistants, research assistants, fellows and scholars be increased beginning in 1956-57 on the basis of the equivalent full time rates as listed below:

(Most graduate teaching assistants are appointed for half-time or less, and consequently will receive one-half or less of the above noted equivalent, full-time rates.)

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That The Regents of The University of Wisconsin accept the Office and Service Building erected by Wood County at the Marshfield Branch Experimental Station, and the office, kitchen and conference room equipment which was furnished by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce; and that there be placed in the building a bronze plaque containing the following statement:

"This building and the facilities herein were made possible by the generous gifts of the people of Wood County through their County Board of Supervisors and the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce. The Regents of The University of Wisconsin gratefully accept these gifts and dedicate this building to the advancement of agriculture and rural living. January 12, 1956."

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That \$300 be allotted from the Anonymous Trust Fund to the Graduate School for payment to the Institute of International Education for 1956.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That authority be granted for the razing of the house at 923 West/Johnson Street and for the development of a University parking lot on that site.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That authority be granted for filing of final applications by Wisconsin University Building Corporation on behalf of The University of Wisconsin with the Housing and Home Finance Agency, Office of the Administrator, College Housing Program, for loan assistance under Title IV of The Housing Act of 1950 for the construction at the University of Wisconsin of a dormitory for 600 women students, Application No. Wis. 47-CH-15(DS), and of student family apartments consisting of 100 units, Application No. Wis. 47-CH-17(D).

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Wanvig, it was VOTED, That the accumulated balance of 1954-55 16-D Overhead Funds be allotted to the following Colleges for non-recurring expenditures as approved by the President:

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Renk:

That authority be granted to remove the following temporary buildings: T-1, T-2, T-3, and T-6, located at the corner of Park Street and University Avenue; T-16 located at the corner of Babcock Drive and Linden Drive.

Regent Gelatt inquired whether T-16 was a World War I or a World War II building. He was advised that it was a World War II building. Vice President Peterson reported that the University was committed to the State Building Commission to

tear down certain temporary buildings at the University upon completion of the Commerce Building and the Pharmacy Addition to the Chemistry Building. This commitment was part of the agreement at the time the State Building Commission provided the funds for these two new buildings, and T-16 was one of the buildings on that list of temporary buildings to be torn down. Regent Watson inquired whether the administration would recommend razing T-16 if it did not have a commitment to do so; and Vice President Peterson reported that that would probably be the recommendation because the building is an auditorium type for which there is not now a real need since the auditorium in the Commerce Building has been completed. Regent Rennebohm suggested that no action be taken on the previous commitment to remove T-16 without asking the State Building Commission whether it wants the University to honor the commitment even though we have use for the building. Vice President Peterson explained that T-16, being an auditorium-type building, has a sloping, concrete floor, and that it would be very expensive to remodel the building to make it usable for other purposes. It was also explained that temporary buildings T-1, T-2 and T-3 were World War I buildings, and that T-6 would have to be removed because of the construction of the new Chadbourne Hall.

There was further discussion of the commitment to the State Building Commission with reference to T-16, and whether the motion could be separated in order to take a separate action regarding T-16. Regent Watson moved that the motion be amended by deleting T-16 from the motion. The motion to amend was seconded by Regent Jensen.

Regent Renk stated that the University might just as well build temporary buildings all over the campus, and not build permanent buildings, if it does not intend to abide by its commitments. He noted that a large amount of money was invested in the Bacteriology Building, and that the temporary building T-16 in front of it spoils its appearance.

A called vote was taken on the motion to amend the recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee by deleting temporary building T-16 from the motion - Regents Gelatt, Jensen, Laird, Rennebohm, Steiger, Wanvig, Watson and Werner voting "Aye"; Regents Jones and Renk voting "No". The motion on the amendment was declared carried.

The question was then put on the motion as amended, which reads as follows, and it was voted:

That authority be granted to remove the following temporary buildings; T-1, T-2, T-3, and T-6, located at the corner of Park Street and University Avenue.

Regent Jensen moved the adoption of the following motion, which was seconded by Regent Renk:

That authority be granted to remove temporary building T-16 located at the corner of Babcock Drive and Linden Drive.

There was discussion of whether this motion was in order; and it was suggested that the administration study the question of removing T-16 and report to the Regents at the next meeting.

Regent Renk withdrew his second to the motion and Regent Jensen agreed to withdraw the motion.

Upon motion of Regent Jensen, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the question of the removal of temporary building T-16 be referred back to the appropriate committee for consideration at the next meeting.

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee, which was seconded by Regent Steiger:

That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, the approval by the Regents on December 10, 1955, of the preliminary sketches for a new Chadbourne Hall, to house 600 students, be rescinded; and that the revised preliminary sketches for a new Chadbourne Hall, to house 600 students, consisting of a one-story dining unit and a "Y" shaped dormitory unit, be approved.

Vice President Peterson presented exterior sketches and floor plans of the revised preliminary proposal for a new Chadbourne Hall. He explained that the new plan would provide for better utilization of the site, including additional parking space, and would result in a reduction in the cubic feet of space and the cost of the building. He noted that the previously approved plan contained excessive space in the central core of the two dormitory units which could not be effectively utilized.

The question was put on the motion and it was voted unanimously.

Regent Rennebohm presented the Report of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands.

Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the State Building Commission be requested to make a temporary advance of \$140,000 to cover payments due on approved farm purchases.

There was discussion of the quantity and cost of agricultural lands purchased to date, and copies of a statement of the status of farm purchases was distributed to the Regents (copy on file).

Regent Renk stated that there were no further purchases of farm lands in the Arlington area contemplated at the present time; that 1170 acres had been acquired to date; and that eventually it would probably be necessary to make additional purchases to bring the total to about 2500 acres. He noted that this latter total acreage was considerably less than the acreage of farm lands at several of the other midwestern universities.

Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign an agreement with John C. Haley and Sons, Madison, Wisconsin, extending for a period of six months from February 23, 1956, the present agreement covering their services as contract broker in the sale of lots in the University Hill Farms Subdivision, on the same terms and conditions as the existing agreement.

Regent Renk presented the Report of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Research.

Regent Renk moved the approval of the following recommendation of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Research, and the motion was seconded by Regent Jones:

That the Executive Committee be authorized to approve plans, financing, and advertising for bids for the building of facilities to be attached to Babcock Hall for housing special milk drying equipment.

Regent Renk reported that up to \$30,000 would be required for the building costs for this project. In answer to a question as to whether the University was late in getting into research in the production of dry milk, Vice President Baldwin reported that this research project was an attempt to develop a better product which will have better consumer acceptance. The laboratory studies indicate favorable results which now require testing on a pilot plant basis.

The question was put on the above motion and it was voted unanimously.

Regent Jensen moved the adoption of the following resolution:

That we ask Mr. Baldwin to convey to our beloved and respected President our gratification at the news of his improving health and our heartfelt wishes for a complete and speedy recovery.

The above motion was seconded by Regent Jones and it was voted unanimous-

Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 10:55 A.M.
