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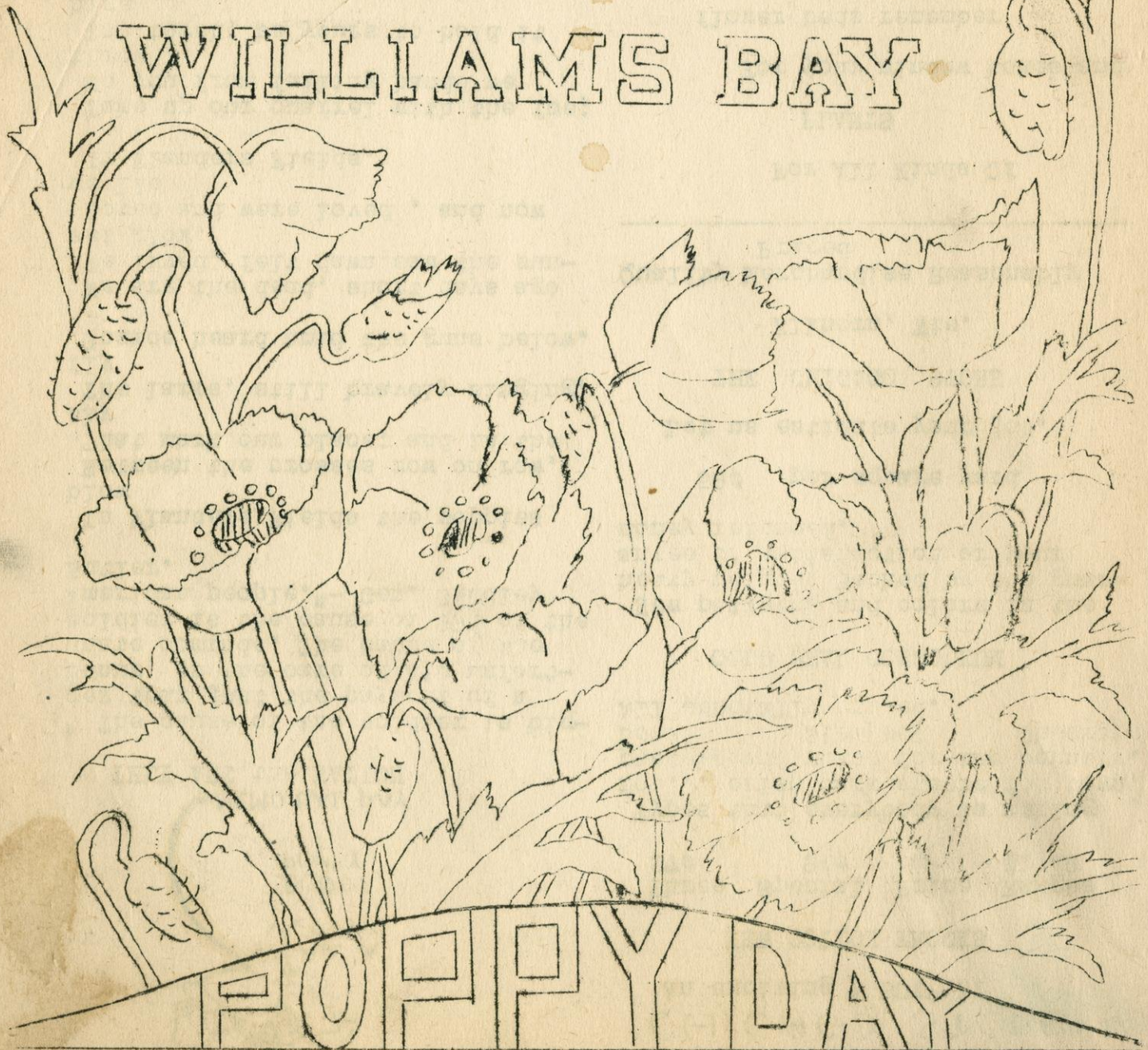

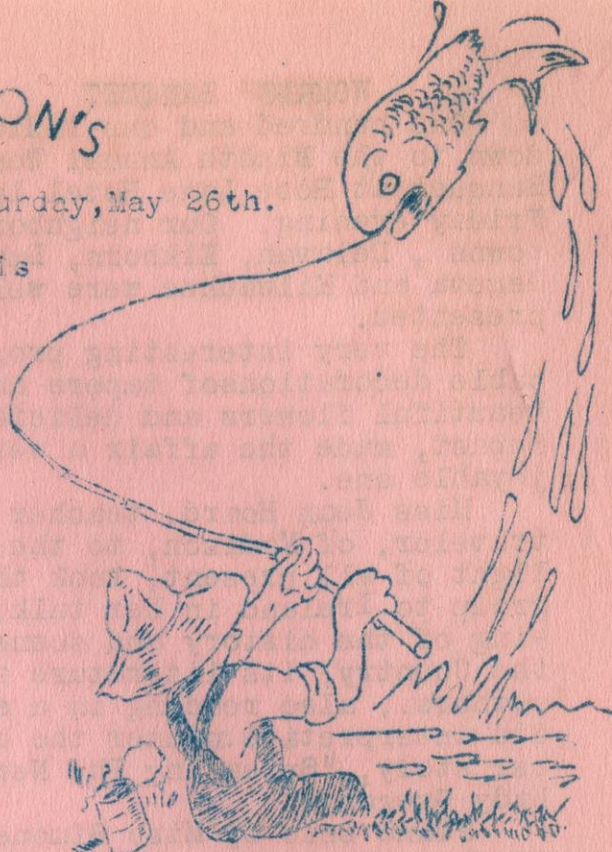

Dr. Hans Rosenberg Comes to Yerkes Observatory

Prof. Hans Rosenberg, Director of the University Observatory, Kiel, Germany, has been appointed by the Board of Trustees of the University of Chicago, as visiting Professor of Astronomy at the Yerkes Observatory, for a tenure of one and one-half years, it was announced last week.

Prof. Rosenberg has obtained a leave of absence from the German government and arrived at Williams Bay on May 7th. He is one of the three leading authorities in the world in the use of the photoelectric cell to astronomical observations. The other two specialists are: Prof. Joel Stebbins, University of Wis. and Prof. G. Guthnick, University of Berlin.

Prof. Rosenberg has brought with him a number of exceedingly valuable instruments and photoelectric photometers, which he expects to use at the Yerkes Observatory. His appointment has been made possible through grants received by the University of Chicago from the Rockefeller Foundation and from the Emergency Committee in aid of displaced German scholars.

A later word regarding Mr. Franklin Roach is that he will come to Yerkes Observatory on June 1st and go to McDonald Observatory the latter part of August to supervise the erection of telescope and other astronomical equipment. In this work, which will take two and a half years, he will be working under the direction of Dr. Otto Struve.

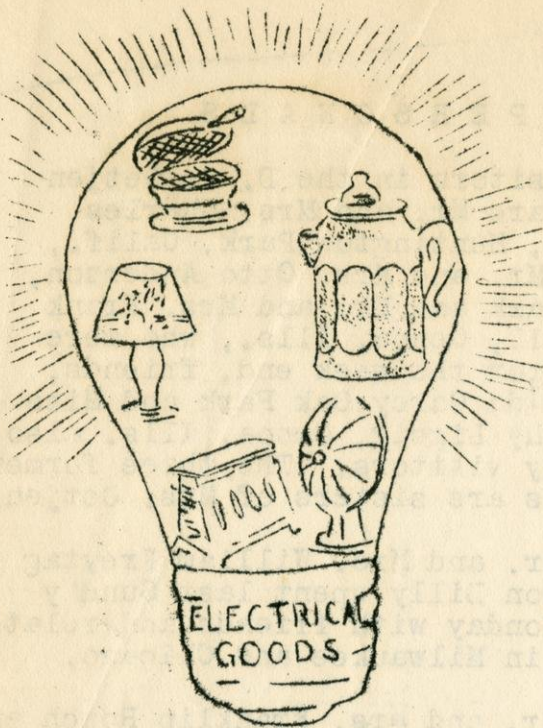

Who was First in Walworth County ?

The distinction of being the first white woman settler in the county goes to Mrs. Robert Warren at Geneva early in 1836.

To Palmer Gardner , the first settler in Spring Prairie Township, goes the honor of building the first log cabin in the county to be occupied. It was begun on Apr. 17, 1836. Christopher Payne at Geneva started his cabin a week or so earlier but occupied it later.

Palmer Gardner also brought the first grindstone , having carried it from Milwaukee tied up in a cotton cloth, partly riding and partly walking the distance.

Dr. Ansel A. Hemenway who came to Spring Prairie in June, 1836. was the first doctor, first hotel keeper and the first postmaster. Spring Prairie post office was called Franklin.

They are gleaned from a study preparatory to the compilation of " The Tales of Walworth County", a history of the first hundred years of the county, by F.M. Van Epps, Williams Bay.
