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# REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

March 2, 1921, 10:00 a.m.

PRESENT:

ABSENT:

Regents Butler and Cary.

A communication was presented from Regent Butler explaining that he would be absent on vacation for three or four weeks, and expressing regret at being unable to attend the meeting.

On motion of Regent Horlick, seconded by Regent Hammond, it was

VOTED, That the reading of the minutes of the last meeting of the board be dispensed with and that they be approved as sent out to the regents.

President Birge made verbal report on pending legislation affecting the university.

President Birge also discussed scholastic standings of university students, stating that he would make further report at a later date.
