



2001 Champions Record: 19-1

For the first time in program history, Wisconsin won back-to-back Big Ten Conference titles. The 19-1 record tied the 1997 team for best conference record in program history. Wisconsin joined Penn State and Illinois as the only schools to win outright (not shared with another school) back-to-back conference titles since 1985 when double round-robin play was initiated.

The Badgers opened the conference season with 11 straight wins including

3-0 wins over No. 10 Penn State, No. 11 Ohio State and No. 21 Minnesota. Wisconsin began the second-half of the Big Ten season with a 3-1 win at No. 10 Ohio State before falling at No. 13 Penn State in five games. The Badgers won the remaining eight league matches to clinch their fourth Big Ten title.

2000 Champions Record: 18-2

Wisconsin won its third Big Ten title in 2000 and its second outright championship. The Badgers battled Minnesota all season long for the league title with teams sharing the conference lead most of the year.

The Badgers opened the 2000 league season with a 3-0 win over defending NCAA and Big Ten champion Penn State in front of 3,549 fans in the UW Field House. Wisconsin won its next two matches by 3-0 scores before falling in five games to 19th-ranked Ohio State.

The UW won its next 11 matches including a 3-0 win at No. 5 Minnesota, a 3-1 win over No. 19 Michigan State at home, a 3-1 win over No. 7 Minnesota in the Field House and avenged its earlier

loss to Ohio State with a 3-1 win in Columbus. The winning streak came to an end as Wisconsin lost at 11th-ranked Penn State, 2-3.

The Badgers wrapped up the Big Ten season with four straight wins and clinched a share of the title with a win at Michigan State on Nov. 25. A loss by coleader Minnesota at Ohio State gave Wisconsin the title outright.

1997 Co-Champions Record: 19-1

Wisconsin shared the 1997 Big Ten title with Penn State as both teams finished with 19-1 records.

The Badgers opened the season with three straight wins, all over ranked teams, before travelling to State College, Pa., for their first match-up with the Nittany Lions. Penn State, which was ranked No. 1 at the time, came out on top 3-0 to take the league lead.



Wisconsin rebounded by winning its next six matches before facing Penn State at home on Halloween night. This time it was the Badgers who came out on top 3-1 in front of 6,118 fans in the UW Field House. The UW won its last nine matches of the season and clinched a share of the title with a 3-0 win over Iowa at home on Nov. 29.

1990 Champions Record: 16-2

Wisconsin won its first Big Ten title in 1990, when there were only 10 teams in the league.

The Badgers won their first four matches of the season before losing at Indiana, 0-3. Wisconsin rebounded with eight straight wins including a 3-1 victory over league-leading Purdue in the Field House. The Boilermakers returned the favor in November with a 3-1 win in West Lafayette, Ind.

The Badgers maintained a one-match lead over the Boilermakers throughout the last two weeks of the season. Wisconsin clinched the title on the road with 3-0 wins at Michigan and Michigan State in the last weekend of the conference season.

Wisconsin in the NCAA Tournament

The UW has appeared in the "Big Dance" the last nine years in a row. In the last 15 years, Wisconsin has made 13 appearances in the NCAA tournament and has a record of 23-12.

The Badgers' best finish came in 2000 when they advanced to the NCAA championship for the first time in program history. Wisconsin has also made four appearances in NCAA regional finals (elite eight).

In addition to NCAA post-season play, the Badgers also won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship twice during its seven-year history. Wisconsin won the inaugural NIVC in 1989 and the final championship in 1995.



Jill Odenthal


Third Team—2004 Geneva, III.

Odenthal earned third-team All-America honors in 2004, only the second UW right-side hitter to be honored.

A leftie, Odenthal was a four-year starter and ended her career ranked eighth on the UW all-time list with 1,246 kills and fourth in hitting percentage at .292. During her career, the Badgers advanced to the NCAA tournament all four years including an appearance in the Elite Eight her senior season.

Odenthal was a 2003 All-Big Ten and AVCA All-Mideast Region selection and earned honorable mention honors on both teams in 2004. She earned four alltournament honors during her tenure and was also named to the 2001 Big Ten All-Freshman team.

Academically, Odenthal was a threetime Academic All-Big Ten selection and four-time member of the Dean's List in genetics. She was a member of Chi Alpha Sigma, the National Student-Athlete Honor Society.



Erin Byrd

Second Team—2002 Glen Ellyn, Ill.


Byrd earned second-team honors in 2002 becoming only the second UW left-side hitter to earn the honor.

Byrd was a four-year starter for the Badgers and ranks among their best allaround players. She is among the top players in career kills (sixth with 1,270), attack attempts (6th/3,527), service aces (8th/120) and digs (2nd/1,397). Byrd became only the fourth player in UW history to record over 1,000 kills and 1,200 digs in a career.

During her four years, Byrd aided Wisconsin to two Big Ten Conference titles, four NCAA tournament bids including the 2000 NCAA runner-up finish.

Byrd was an unanimous All–Big Ten selection in 2002 and earned honorable mention honors in 2001. As a senior, she was named to the all-region team and picked up four all-tournament honors. She was also named to the Big Ten All-Freshman team. Byrd was a three-time Academic All–Big Ten honoree.

A member of the 2003 U.S. National Training Team during the spring, Byrd also trained with the U.S. National A-2 program in 2002.



Morgan Shields

Third Team—2002 Watertown, Wis.


Shields became the third UW setter to earn All-America honors when she was selected to the third team in 2002.

Shields ranked fourth in the nation and led the Big Ten Conference with 13.91 assists per game. She was also among the nation's top servers averaging 0.52 aces per game.

As a junior, she earned All–Big Ten and AVCA All-Region honors. Shields was twice named the Big Ten Player of the Week in 2002 and was also named the MVP of the InnTowner Invitational. She was a three-time Academic All–Big Ten honoree. Shields ended her career ranked third on the UW career list for assists with 4,076. She also ranked 10th in career service aces with 112.

Shields was a member of two Big Ten championship and four NCAA tournament teams. She was honored as a senior with the Big Ten Medal of Honor for athletic and academic excellence.

Shields played professionally in Sweden.



Sherisa Livingston

First Team—2000, 2001 Simi Valley, Calif.

Livingston became the first Wisconsin player to earn first-team All-America honors in 2000. In 2001, she became the Badgers' first two-time first-team All-American.


Livingston wrapped up her career as the UW's all-time kill leader with 1,912 and set the career hitting percentage mark at .366. She also ranks among the top blockers, coming in third in total blocks with 580.

During her four years with the Badgers, she aided the team to four NCAA tournament appearances including the 2000 NCAA runner-up finish. Wisconsin also won two Big Ten Conference titles during her career.

Livingston was named the 2000 co-Big Ten Player of the Year and the 2000–01 Wisconsin Female Athlete of the Year. She is a three-time All–Big Ten selection and a four-time AVCA all-region selection. Livingston was also named the 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

A nine-time all-tournament selection, Livingston was a member of the U.S. Junior National Team in 1998 and 1999, and was named the best blocker at the 1999 World Junior Championships.

Livingston has played professionally in Puerto Rico, Indonesia, and the Netherlands.



Lizzy Fitzgerald

Second Team—2000, 2001 New Orleans, La.


Lizzy Fitzgerald earned second-team All-America honors in 2000 and 2001. She joins Sherisa Livingston and Kelly Kennedy as the only two-time All-Americans in program history.

During her four years with the Badgers, Fitzgerald was a member of four NCAA tournament teams including the 2000 NCAA runner-up squad. She was also a member of two Big Ten Conference championship teams.

As a junior and senior, Fitzgerald was one of the top setters in the country. She ranked fourth in assists per game in 2001 with 13.72. Fitzgerald set the UW fourgame match record for assists (78) and totalled 3,923 assists in her career.

Fitzgerald was a two-time AVCA National Player of the Week, earning the first-ever honor for a Badger in 2000. She was the 2001 Big Ten Player of the Year and also earned All–Big Ten honors in 2000. Fitzgerald was a two-time AVCA allregion honoree and a four-time all-tournament selection.

Fitzgerald played professionally in Puerto Rico and France, and was a member of the U.S. National team in 2002–04. She also trained with the U.S. National A-2 program during the summers of 1999 and 2001.



Jenny Maastricht

Second Team—1999 Silver Lake, Wis.


Jenny Maastricht earned second-team All-America honors in 1999 after leading the Badgers with 3.80 kills and 0.32 service aces per game. The right-side hitter also ranked second on the team with 1.11 blocks per game

Maastricht was one of the Badgers' most versatile players ever. She came to the UW as a middle blocker and switched to right-side hitter as a sophomore. After playing two years in that position, the 6-1 Maastricht was switched to left-side hitter as a senior.

Maastricht was a two-time All–Big Ten and all-region selection. She was named the AVCA National Player of the Week on Oct. 30, 2000, and was also a two-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Maastricht earned six all-tournament honors during her career.

She ended her career with 1,248 kills, which ranks seventh on UW career list.

Maastricht trained with the U.S. National Team during the winter and spring of 2001. She was also part of the A-2 program in 1999.



Kelly Kennedy


Second Team—1997, 1998 Barrington Hills, III.

Kelly Kennedy was a two-time All-American earning second-team honors in 1997 and 1998. She led the Badgers to back-to-back appearances in NCAA regional finals and a share of the 1997 Big Ten Conference title.

Kennedy ranks second on the UW's career list for hitting percentage at .339. She also ranks third in kills (1,406), fourth in block assists (454), fourth in block solos (101) and fourth in total blocks (555).

The 6-4 middle blocker was a threetime All–Big Ten selection and a two-time all-region honoree. She was a five-time all-tournament selection and a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week.

Kennedy trained with the U.S. National Team A-2 program in 1999 and played with the Chicago Thunder of the USPV.



Amy Lee

Second Team—1997 Milwaukee, Wis.


Amy Lee earned second-team All-America honors in 1997 after leading the Badgers to a share of the Big Ten Conference title and an appearance in the NCAA regional final.

Known for her powerful left-handed kill, the 6-0 opposite hitter led the Badgers with 3.74 kills per game as a senior. She also ranked third on the team with 1.05 blocks per game.

Lee ended her career as the UW's then-all-time kill leader with 1,661 and still ranks first in total attempts with 4,129. She also ranks fifth in block assists with 430 and seventh in total blocks with 454.

Lee was a unanimous pick for the 1997 All–Big Ten team and also earned all-region honors. She was an eight-time all-tournament selection and a three-time Academic All–Big Ten honoree.

Lee served as an assistant coach at Marquette University for three seasons.




Laura Abbinante

Second Team—1996 Itasca, III.

Laura Abbinante became Wisconsin's second All-American and its first setter to earn the honor in 1996. She guided the Badgers to the NCAA regional semifinals in 1996 and to the NIVC title in 1995. Abbinante averaged 13.32 assists per game as a senior, which ranked 19th in the nation.

The 5-9 setter is the UW career record holder for assists with 5,833. She also ranks in the top 10 in service aces (seventh with 133), digs (fourth with 1,246), block assists (10th with 304) and total blocks (10th with 339).

Abbinante is a two-time All–Big Ten and two-time all-region selection. She was an 11-time all-tournament selection and competed in two U.S. Olympic Festivals.



Lisa Boyd

Second Team—1990 Dalton, III.

Lisa Boyd was the pioneer for UW volleyball. She was the first All-American, earning second-team honors in 1990, and led the Badgers to their first NCAA tournament appearance. She was also the first UW Big Ten Player of the Year, leading Wisconsin to its first conference title in 1990.

The 6-0 middle blocker ended her career ranking among the top 10 in very category except assists. She still ranks third in block solos (113), fifth in total blocks (523), fifth in block assists (410) and tied for seventh in digs (1034).

Boyd was a unanimous All-Big Ten selection in 1990 and an AVCA All-Region honoree. She led the Big Ten in blocking in 1989 and 1990, and was a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Boyd was named the most valuable player of the inaugural NIVC in 1989 as the Badgers won the team title. She was also named the UW's Female Athlete of the Year for 1990-91.

In 2000, Boyd became the first volleyball player inducted into the UW Athletic Hall of Fame.

Beyond Wisconsin

Competing beyond college is the dream of many volleyball players and Wisconsin is rapidly becoming a pipeline for national teams and foreign professional leagues.

U.S. National Teams

Five Badgers have spent time training with the U.S. National team as a participant in the A-2 program or as part of the training team. The programs allow the players to travel and compete against some of the best teams in the world.

Junior National Teams

Junior National Teams offer student-athletes many of the same benefits as national team members with travel and competition against the best players in the world. Current Badgers Maria Carlini and Katherine Dykstra were both part Junior National training programs.

Professional Leagues

Five former Badgers have travelled overseas to continue their playing careers in Europe and Puerto Rico. Sherisa Livingston recently won the league championship with her team in Jakarta, Indonesia.

Wisconsin Field House

The first time you walk into the UW Field House during a volleyball match, you feel the excitement that is Wisconsin Volleyball. The band is playing, thousands of fans are yelling "Point Wisconsin," Bucky Badger is dancing, and the UW team is on the court winning!

Badger fans make the UW Field House one of the loudest and most intimidating venues for opposing teams in the nation. Wisconsin consistently ranks among the top three teams in the nation in attendance and Badger fans are known for being very knowledgeable about the sport of volleyball.

Badgers' Home

Dedicated in 1930, the Field House was the home of the UW basketball team as well as the boxing and track teams for many years.

The first volleyball match played in the Field House was on Oct. 23, 1977, when the U.S. Men's National Team played Cuba. The first women's match followed soon after when Wisconsin hosted the 1977 Big Ten Conference Championship on Oct. 29.

It wasn't until 1980 that the Badgers again competed in the Field House playing host to two tournaments. Wisconsin's play in the Field House was sporadic until 1986 it became the permanent home of the volleyball team. With the construction of the Kohl Center in 1998, the volleyball team took over sole possession of the Field House in the fall, adding a Sport



Wisconsin ranks among the top three teams in the country in attendance and has led the Big Ten Conference in attendance eight times including the last five years in a row.

A Tough Place to Play


Since 1990, when the Badgers won their first Big Ten Conference title and competed in their first NCAA tournament, the Field House has become one of the toughest places to play in the country.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance for the last 15

years including a second-place ranking in 2003. The Badgers also ranked third nationally in 1997, 2000, 2001, 2002 and 2004. In 2003, Wisconsin set the Big Ten record for attendance for all matches and for conference-only matches. The Badgers averaged an impressive 4,294 spectators for all matches while that figure went up to 4,649 fans per match for Big Ten matches. Wisconsin has led the Big Ten in attendance eight years—1990, 1991, 1997, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003 and 2004.

Volleyball Specific

Since 1998, the volleyball team has been the sole occupant of the Field House in the fall. One significant improvement is a permanent Sport Court for all home matches and practices. The Badgers have two full courts for practices and an eyecatching black

and red court for home matches.


The Badgers also moved into new locker room facilities with a team lounge and study area separate from the team's home locker room. A complete renovation of the locker room area, including a photo display of Big Ten championship teams, was completed in the summer of 2003.

The renovation of Camp Randall Stadium also included improvements to the north end of the Field House including updated restrooms on the first floor as well as a new media room and locker rooms on the lower level. An All-American wall on the west side of the building features life-size photos of the Badger greats.

1993 NCAA Championship

The Field House was the site of the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship which drew then-record crowds. A total of 21,085 watched the twoday event including 11,155 for the championship match. That figure set the NCAA single-match attendance record and still ranks as the No. 5 volleyball attendance figure of all time.

The Field House was also the site of the No. 7 attendance of all time when 10,935 fans watched the Badgers defeat Illinois in the first round of the 1990 NCAA tournament.



Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship

hen Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first post-season appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title, its first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball All-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors.

Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors.

Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten home opener is designated "Steve Lowe Night" in honor of the former coach. This year's match is Friday, Sept. 23 vs. Minnesota.

In addition, a Badger volleyball player who exemplifies Steve's love of the game is named the recipient of the Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship. This year's recipient is junior Maria Carlini.



Wisconsin Sets Attendance Records

The University of Wisconsin has served as the host to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship twice in the span of six years. Wisconsin was only the third university to play host to the championship more than once.

In 1998, the UW set the NCAA single-match attendance record when 13,194 spectators watched the finals of the championship. Wisconsin also set the NCAA semifinal attendance record of 12,327 bringing the two-day total to 25,521, which

broke the championship record of 21,086 set in 1997 at the Spokane Arena.

Wisconsin first played host to the championship in 1993, drawing record crowds to the UW Field House. A then-record attendance of 21,085 watched the two-day event including 11,155 who watched Long Beach State defeat Penn State in the championship match. That figure still stands as the No. 5 volleyball attendance figure of all time.


Head Coach Pete Waite

native of the Madison area, Pete Waite is happy to be home and the Badgers are happy he returned. Ever since he became the UW's head coach, Wisconsin has reached a new level of success.

In his six years at the UW, the Badgers are an impressive 152-46 (.768) with six 20-plus win seasons. Waite, 45, won his 400th collegiate match in 2004 and upped his career record to 418-148 in 17 years, ranking 14th among active Division I head coaches with a .739 winning percentage.

With six straight NCAA tournament appearances, Waite has done what no other UW coach could accomplish. The Badgers advanced to the 2000 NCAA championship match, ending the year ranked second nationally. In 2004, Wisconsin advanced to the regional final, finishing among the top eight teams in the country. The UW advanced to the regional semifinals in 2001 and to second-round action in 1999, 2002 and 2003.

On the Big Ten Conference level, Wisconsin won league titles in 2000 and 2001 with identical 19-1 records. In 1999



and 2002, the Badgers finished second in the conference. The UW has never placed lower than fourth in the league during Waite's tenure.

Waite has also been honored by his colleagues by being named the Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Regional Coach of the Year in 2000 and 2001.

At Wisconsin, Waite has coached six All-Americans, 11 AVCA All-Region first-team selections, two Big Ten players of the year, and 12 firstteam All-Big Ten honorees. He has also coached one Big Ten Freshman of the Year and six members of the Big Ten All-Freshman team.

Waite came to Wisconsin from Northern Illinois University where he was the winningest volleyball coach in program history. He had an 11-year record of 266-102 (.723 winning percentage) including nine 20-plus win seasons. The Huskies were 81-19 (.810) in his last three years including three consecutive NCAA tournament bids.

Waite, shown here with junior Maria Carlini, has led the Badgers to six NCAA tournament appearances and two Big Ten Conference titles in his six years at Wisconsin.

NIU appeared in four NCAA tournaments under Waite, advancing to the second round three times including in 1997 when it lost to national runner-up Penn State. The Huskies also appeared in the National Invitational Volleyball Championship in 1991, '92, and '94, and declined an invitation to the NIVC in 1995.

Northern Illinois won eight regularseason conference titles and six conference tournaments under Waite. Three times he was named the conference coach of the year. Individually, Waite coached four AVCA all-region players, four conference players of the year, 14 first-team all-conference honorees, one conference newcomer of the year and four members of the conference all-newcomer team.

Prior to being named the head coach at Northern Illinois, Waite spent two years as an assistant coach at Illinois State. In 1984 and 1985, he was the head coach at Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills, Ill., leading the Cyclones to the 1985 North Central Community College Conference championship. Waite was named the conference coach of the year in 1985.

Waite spent one year as the director and coach of the Chicago Power Volleyball Club in Orland Park, Ill., and two years as a coach with the 2nd City Volleyball Club in Chicago. He started his coaching career in 1981 at Muncie (Ind.) Northside High School and spent the next year as a junior varsity coach at his alma mater, Monona Grove (Wis.) High School. Waite also coached one year at Bremen High School in Midlothian, Ill.

Waite played volleyball and graduated from Monona Grove High School. He played volleyball at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., from 1977-81 with a team that consistently ranked in the top 10 nationally. The 1979 Cardinal squad finished fourth in the NCAA tournament after winning the Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Association title with a perfect 14-0 record. Waite received All-MIVA honors his junior and senior years, and was named team co-captain and co-MVP in 1980. He received his bachelor's degree in education from Ball State in 1981.

Waite and his wife, Carrie, have two sons, Ryan, 21, who is a senior at the UW, and Eric, 18, who is a senior at James Madison Memorial High School.

We are going after players who are high achievers both on the court and in the classroom. We want players who are driven to succeed and who know that hard works pays off. People who want to be well-rounded academically, athletically and socially.

How would you describe your coaching style?

I'm a teacher; it's always been a part of me even before I became a coach. I'm firm and fair, not a yeller. I expect a lot of my players while at the same time, I work hard to help them enjoy their time at the UW. It's a game; it should be fun. I offer them a lot of variety in practices so that time flies by. I want players to love the game, play from their hearts, and dare to dream. When they do that, the wins come.

You have almost 20 years of coaching experience. What have you learned in your years of coaching that you bring to the UW program?

I've been a college coach for over 18 years, and was a full-time club coach for three years before that. I've learned that patience pays off. I enjoy seeing a player learn a new skill just as much as I enjoy the championships. I bring the philosophy that building a quality program means taking care of the players, not taking short cuts and leaving players in your wake.

I know that developing winners is not just about me. There has to be a great staff and we have that. The players need to believe, trust, and try. I'm here to guide them and give them the freedom to blossom when they're ready to grow.

What strengths does your coaching staff bring to the UW program and its athletes?

Rod brings a wealth of experience from the national team having been a player and a coach. He has a great talent for analyzing skills and improving technique. On top of that, I've never seen a person with more energy and love for the game.

Colleen brings the knowledge of having been a Badger volleyball player. She has walked this campus, played in front of these fans, and set for a team that went from fifth to first in the Big Ten. She has won a Big Ten championship and she wants to help this program win it again.

Dave is a real bonus for us. He is a great trainer in the gym and he's coached teams at the highest level.

I think we have some great variety and experience on our staff. Everyone's goal is for our players to make phenomenal improvements in their game and win championships.

What goals have you set for the Wisconsin program and each individual player?

Some goals we set are private, between the players and the staff. That's important in order to keep everyone focused on the task. In general, we ask each player to leave her comfort zone and grow as a person and as a member of the team. We will always aim to be the top team in the Big Ten along with being one of the top teams in the country. Our ultimate goal is to win a national championship and annually be considered one of the premier programs in the country.

The Big Ten Conference is one of the toughest leagues in the nation for women's volleyball. What does it take for student-athletes to compete on the Big Ten level?

Players have to battle and fight to stay on top. That's what makes it great. You have no choice but to play your best because there are so many good players and teams. Those are the players we want to become Badgers; those who love a challenge and are ready to fight. To be the best, you have to play the best. Wisconsin has appeared in the NCAA tournament six straight years. How does the UW continue to be among the top teams in the nation?

It's the combination of bringing in the right players and teaching them to play great as a team. Great players don't guarantee great results. Coaching and creating team chemistry give players the chance to reach their true potential. Badger players and coaches work hard to improve every day and that hard work has paid off over the years.

Wisconsin continually rates among the top teams in the nation for attendance. To what do you attribute this?

We have a great venue to play in and the perfect city to live in. Madison has three televisions stations, two newspapers and several radio stations that do a great job covering our team. Fans in Madison know our players and they consistently come out in big numbers to support them. The Field House is one of the most electric places to play in the nation and once someone comes to watch, they keep coming back and bringing friends!

What does the city of Madison offer student-athletes that can't be found anywhere else?

I would have to say the lakes and State Street. I don't know of any other campus that has their student union, dorms and library right on a beautiful lake. Only one block away from the lake is State Street where students can find a wide variety of shops and restaurants.

Our players work hard in the classroom and on the court. Madison lets them enjoy their free time and it really helps them re-energize. Madison is an exciting city next to a great campus.

What do you enjoy most about coaching at the University of Wisconsin?

The players, the staff, the support, the Field House, the Band, Bucky, the huge fan turnout, all the other great sports and coaches, the lakes, State Street, the Capital, the zoo, the Big Ten, my family nearby . . . You name it, I love this place!

Assistant Coaches

Colleen Bayer

Colleen (Neels) Bayer, a former two-time All-Big Ten Conference setter for the Badgers, is in her first year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Bayer, 28, was a fouryear letterwinner with the Badgers from 1995-98. She played her first two seasons as a defensive specialist and back-up setter. Bayer took over the starting setter job as a junior and senior, earning All-Big Ten honors in 1997 and 1998. She was also a two-time AVCA All-District 2



selection and was named to the 1997 and 1998 NCAA Regional All-Tournament teams, leading the Badgers to top-eight finishes. Bayer was the Badgers' team captain in 1998 and also earned two Academic All-Big Ten honors. With Bayer setting, Wisconsin won the 1997 Big Ten Championship and finished second in 1998.

Following her collegiate career, Bayer played with the United States Professional Volleyball league. She was a member of the USPV Dream Team in 1999–2000. Bayer played professionally with USC-Muenster in Muenster, Germany, in 2000 before returning to play one year with the Minnesota Chill of the USPV. She served as the captain of the Chill, which won the 2002 USPV league title.

Bayer served as an assistant coach with the Milwaukee Sting Volleyball Club in 1996 and with the Wisconsin Select Volleyball Club in 1997. In 2000, Bayer worked as an assistant coach with the 16-1 team of the Sports Performance Volleyball Club. Her team finished ninth in the country and won the AAU National Championship.

Bayer served as the head freshman coach and varsity assistant coach at St. Charles (III.) East High School in 2001, aiding the varsity squad to the Illinois state championship. Since 2002, she worked at the Great Lakes Center in Aurora, Ill., as a sales assistant and office manager.

A native of Pewaukee, Wis., and a graduate of Catholic Memorial High School in Waukesha, Wis., Bayer graduated from Wisconsin in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in human development and family studies. She and her husband, Dave, the Badgers' volunteer assistant coach, are the parents of Maxwell, born in June, 2005.

Rod Wilde

Rod Wilde, an NCAA champion as both a player and coach, is in his fifth season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Wilde, 48, was an alternate for the United States volleyball team that won a gold medal at the 1984 Olympics. He broke his leg in match against Russia just six weeks before the games. A member of the U.S. National Team from 1982–84 and again from 1989–91, Wilde also served as an assistant coach with the U.S.



men's national team from 1993–2000. He was selected as an assistant coach to both the 1996 and 2000 Olympic teams. He also aided the U.S. to a bronze medal at the 1994 World Championships. In 1999, Wilde was the head coach of the U.S. Pan-American team.

The former manager of the High Performance Programs with U.S.A. Volleyball (USAV), Wilde oversaw all aspects of the USAV programs for high school athletes including the Junior and Youth National teams. In 2004, Wilde was recognized by USA Volleyball with a George J. Fisher Leader in Volleyball Award.

Wilde was a three-time All-American at Pepperdine University, setting the Waves to the 1978 NCAA Championship. He returned to Pepperdine as the men's head coach from 1985–87 leading the Waves to the 1986 NCAA Championship. Wilde also served as the head men's coach at UC San Diego from 1991–93 and as the head women's coach at Drake University from 1984–85.

An active player, Wilde was named the most valuable player of the Men's Masters 45-and-Over Division of the 2005 USA Open Championships.

Wilde is a 1980 graduate of Pepperdine University with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and a minor in physical education. He is a native of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and his wife, Kris (Hey), is a native of Milwaukee. She was an all-state volleyball and basketball player at Wauwatosa East High School and led the Red Raiders to the Wisconsin state high school titles in both volleyball and basketball in 1980.

Karen Milborn

Karen Milborn is in her second season the director of volleyball operations. She is responsible for arranging team travel, overseeing the budget, supervising public service activities, coordinating summer camps, training tables and scheduling of dayto-day activities of the program. Milborn serves as a liaison with the athletic department support units, including facilities and events, athletic communications, marketing, compliance, academics, the ticket



office, alumni and the National W Club. She also serves as an advisor to the Wisconsin Power Volleyball Club and coaches the 16-1 girls team.

Milborn came to Wisconsin after serving as the club director and facility manager at Club Fusion-Crystal Lake in northeastern Illinois for one year. As facility manager, she served as the site coordinator for a number of junior volleyball tournaments including entries and registration. Milborn was also the club's director responsible for hiring coaches. In addition, she started a six-team volleyball club to compete on the regional level.

Milborn was the head volleyball coach at Chassell Township High School in Michigan, earning 2002 conference co-coach of the year honors.

A four-year letterwinner in volleyball at Michigan Tech University from 1998-2001, Milborn set career and season records for digs for the Huskies. She was a three-time secondteam all-conference selection and earned academic all-conference honors three seasons. Milborn was named a team co-captain as a junior and was the team most valuable player as a sophomore. Following the completion of her eligibility, Milborn served as a student assistant coach with the Huskies in 2002.

Milborn earned a bachelor's degree in biomedical engineering from Michigan Tech in 2002. During her academic career, she spent a semester studying abroad in Perth, Australia.

Dave Bayer

Dave Bayer is in his first season as a volunteer assistant coach at Wisconsin. He joins his wife, Colleen, on the Badger staff.

Since 1995, Bayer, 34, served as the 16-1 head coach and 18-1 assistant coach with the Sports Performance Volleyball Club in northeastern Illinois. He also served as the club director and head coach of the boys' club program for the past three years. His boys' teams won either gold or silver medals at the USA Junior Championships



all three years while his 16-1 girls team placed as high as fifth at the junior championships.

In addition to his coaching duties, Bayer also served as the store manager of The Volleyshop at the Great Lakes Center in Aurora, Ill.

Prior to joining Sports Performance, where he coached current Badger Taylor Reineke and former Badger Erin Byrd, Bayer served as a head coach with the Milwaukee Sting Volleyball Club from 1995-97. His teams, which featured former Badgers Jamie Gardner, Jenny Maastricht and Sara Urbanek, placed third and fifth at the USA Junior Championships. Bayer was also the camp and facility director at The Epicenter, a volleyball complex in Waukesha, Wis.

A native of Racine, Wis., Bayer was a four-year volleyball letterwinner at Ball State University, serving as a team co-captain during his senior season. During his college career, Bayer also coached former Badgers Marisa Mackey and Keylee Wright with the Munciana Volleyball Club in Muncie, Ind.

The Bayers welcomed their first child, Maxwell, in June, 2005.



The best is yet to come for Badgers

which the way the Wisconsin volleyball team ended the 2004 season, the best may be yet to come for the Badgers.

Wisconsin shocked the volleyball community last season as it tied for fifth in the NCAA tournament. The Badgers upset second-ranked and undefeated Hawai'i in the regional semifinals before losing to eventual national champion Stanford in the regional final. All this from a team that had not been ranked in the coaches' top 25 poll for most of the season.

Thanks to its late-season run, Wisconsin ended the year ranked 14th in the USA Today/CSTV Top 25 Coaches Poll. With five starters plus their libero returning, the Badgers are ready for even more success in 2005.

Shaw, Meierotto Lead Team

Leading the Badgers will be 2004 honorable mention All-American Sheila Shaw. In 2004, the 6-1 middle blocker led the Big Ten Conference with 1.36 blocks per game. She also led the UW with 3.81 kills per game, which ranked eighth in the league. Shaw was a unanimous All-Big Ten selection and earned AVCA All-Mideast Region honors.

Shaw and senior Aubrey Meierotto will serve as Badger co-captains in 2004. Meierotto is a two-year starter as a leftside hitter and ranked third on the team last season with 2.83 kills per game. The 6-1 Meierotto is also one of the best servers on the team, leading the Badgers with 0.28 aces per game last season, and one of the best blockers, averaging 0.77 blocks per game including 13 block solos.

Six Starters Return

Along with Shaw and Meierotto, other returning starters including junior Maria Carlini and sophomores Taylor Reineke, Jackie Simpson and Jocelyn Wack.

As a sophomore, Carlini started 17 matches on the left-side after playing much of her freshman season at middle blocker. The 6-2 Carlini led the team with eight double-doubles and averaged 2.75 kills and 2.42 digs per game. She was named the Big Ten Player of the Week on Nov. 22 after leading Wisconsin to wins over Michigan and Michigan State.

Simpson was named to the 2004 Big Ten All-Freshman team, ranking fifth in the league with 13.01 assists per game. The 6-0 setter started 26 matches, becoming the first UW freshman since 1993 to earn a consistent starting role.

Reineke, a 6-3 middle blocker, started 28 matches, ranking second on the team with 1.25 blocks per game. She added 1.63 kills per game while hitting a team best .317.

As a freshman libero, Wack set the UW season record for digs and ranked fourth in the Big Ten with 4.93 digs per game. She played in all 32 matches as libero and earned NCAA Region All-Tournament honors after recording a career-high 35 digs against Hawai'i.

With the return of most of its starting lineup, Wisconsin also returns most of its statistical offense and defense. The Badgers return 81 percent of their blocking (304 of 375.5 blocks), 78 percent of their defense (1,434 of 1,843 digs), 73.5 percent of their serving (86 of 117 aces) and 70 percent of their offense (1,317 of 1,890 kills) as well as both of their setters.

Reserves Play Key Roles

In addition to its starters, the UW also returns several key players off the bench.

Amy Bladow played in 22 matches at middle blocker, averaging 1.17 kills and 1.00 blocks per game. Bladow could see playing time on the right side as well this season.

As freshmen, Megan Mills and Amanda Berkley both saw action as defensive specialists. Mills played in 23 matches, averaging 1.12 digs per game while Berkley played in 16 matches and averaged 0.88 digs per game.

Katie Lorenzen earned a starting role at setter for four matches in the middle of the 2004 season. She averaged 11.44 assists per game, including a careerhigh 61 assists in a win over Illinois.

In 2004, four of the Badgers' underclassmen started at least 60 percent of the matches played while eight saw playing time.


Freshmen Add Depth, Height

Wisconsin also adds three talented newcomers to the team in 2005—middle blockers Katherine Dykstra and Morgan Salow, as well as defensive specialist Faye McCormack.

Dykstra was a member of the 2004 USA Volleyball Junior National A2 team. A relative newcomer to the game of volleyball, the 6-3 Dykstra has one of the most impressive leaps in the game with the ability to touch 10-7.

Salow, who is 6-4, will be one of the tallest players ever at the UW. She is a three-time all-state selection from Manchester, Iowa. Salow was ranked No. 24 in PrepVolleyball.com's Senior Aces.

McCormack was a 2003 AAU All-American, playing with Sports Performance Volleyball Club. A quick and agile player, the 5-6 McCormack could see immediate playing time in the back row.

2005 Notes

• Coach **Pete Waite** is on track to win his 100th Big Ten Conference match in 2005. The UW head coach is 93-27 in league play over his six years at Wisconsin. Waite earned his 400th career win in 2004 when the Badgers swept Virginia, 3-0, on Sept. 17.

• In 2005, Wisconsin will play nine teams that competed in the 2004 NCAA Tournament including six teams that were ranked in the final *USA Today*/CSTV Top 25 poll. Among Big Ten Conference teams, seven competed in post-season play while five were ranked or received votes in the final poll.

◆ Senior Sheila Shaw returns to lead the Badgers after earning honorable mention All-America honors in 2004. The 6-1 middle blocker was a unanimous pick to the 2004 All-Big Ten team and also earned AVCA All-Mideast Regional honors. Other returning award winners include sophomore Jackie Simpson, who was named to the 2004 Big Ten All-Freshman team, and sophomore Jocelyn Wack, who was named to the NCAA Region All-Tournament team. Senior Aubrey Meierotto returns with four all-tournament honors on her list of awards while junior Maria Carlini earned Big Ten Player of the Week honors in 2004.

• Wisconsin will put its tallest team ever on the court in 2005 with an average height of 6-0. The Badgers feature 11 of 15 players at six feet or over including freshman Morgan Salow, who at 6-4 ties former Badger Kelly Kennedy as the tallest player ever at the UW. Without the four defensive players, who only play in the back row, the UW's front-row height goes up to nearly 6-2.

• Wisconsin was the talk of the volleyball community in 2004 as it tied for fifth in the NCAA tournament. The Badgers, who had not been ranked in the coaches poll for most of the season, ended the season ranked 14th in the USA Today/CSTV Top 25 Coaches poll and 14th in the NCAA RPI.

• Wisconsin played some of its best defense at the end of the season. In its four NCAA matches, the Badgers averaged 17.71 digs and 4.36 blocks per game compared to 16.03 digs and 3.27 blocks per game overall. Individually, **Jocelyn Wack** led the team with 5.57 digs per game and **Sheila Shaw** averaged 1.93 blocks per game in tournament play.

• Freshmen and sophomores played a key role in Wisconsin's NCAA run last season with five underclassmen seeing significant playing time. Three rookies earned starting roles in 2004—Jocelyn Wack at libero, Jackie Simpson at setter, and Taylor Reineke at middle blocker. In addition, sophomore Maria Carlini ended last season in a starting role at outside hitter. Defensive specialist Megan Mills also earned playing time as a freshman in 2004.


• Libero Jocelyn Wack looks to continue her streak of 31 straight matches in which she has recorded double-figure digs. As a freshman, Wack set the UW season record for digs, totalling 567 digs (4.93/game).

◆ Jackie Simpson recorded over 1,000 assists in 2004, becoming the first UW freshman since Laura Abbinante in 1993 to accomplish that feat. She ranked fifth in the Big Ten and 29th nationally with 13.01 assists per game.

• For the past five years, Wisconsin has ranked among the top three teams in the nation for attendance. The UW's goal for 2005 is to move up to second nationally.


In 2004, the Badgers averaged 4,079 spectators per match, only 265 fans per match behind second-place Nebraska (4,344 per match). Wisconsin ranked second nationally in 2003 when it averaged 4,294 spectators per match.

• Seniors Aubrey Meierotto and Sheila Shaw have been selected as the Badgers' team co-captains for 2005. Meierotto also served as a co-captain in 2004 while Shaw will serve in that capacity for the first time this season. Shaw is a three-year starter at middle blocker while Meierotto, a fifth-year senior, is a two-year starter at outside hitter.

Coach Waite on the 2005 Season

How would you describe the 2005 Wisconsin volleyball team?

Exciting. We have the type of players who have the athletic ability, personalities, and attitudes that are exciting to watch. They enjoy being with each other, which makes for good team chemistry. They love playing volleyball and that makes it exciting for the fans.

The 2005 Badger team is the tallest in program history. How will this change your style of play?

It will make us more versatile in the front row. We have a number of players who are comfortable on the right, left, and middle spots. I think that will cause problems for teams defending us and it will give us a chance to use different blocking schemes. We're known for being a good blocking team, so being taller should help even more.

Despite the fact that you lost only two seniors to graduation, your team is still pretty young with two seniors and three juniors on your 15-player roster. How will this change your approach to the season?

Being young doesn't change our approach at all. The whole team has had a chance to mature and they'll be a lot more confident when they walk in the gym this year. They did well last season for being such a young team, but I know that they are eager to get on the court to show people how much they've improved.

Your team advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA tournament last year including a win over second-ranked and undefeated Hawai'i. Can your team reach that level or further this season? We started slow last season because we had so many new players in the lineup. Once we got rolling we had a good second half of Big Ten play and a good run in the NCAA tournament.

As a group they gained a lot of great experience last year and we'll be starting this season at a higher level. I think we can reach that level again and we'll be working hard to go even farther. We'll have to get more road wins in Big Ten play and that will help us out when we get to the NCAA tournament.

Will the team's style of play be different this season? What should fans look for when watching the team this fall? Our style of play will be much the same, but we've emphasized defense, passing . . .



Faye McCormack brings that defense we've be talking about. She has great speed and she's coming from a excellent club program. She'll vie for that defensive specialist spot where we'll be looking for the most consistent and dynamic defender to play that role.

Morgan Salow stands 6-4 with good foot speed and versatility. She has played all of the front row positions and is mobile enough to play in the back row, too. Morgan could come off the bench and help us out in a variety of spots.

Katherine Dykstra is 6-3 and brings the biggest jump to our program since Sherisa Livingston. She has touched 10-7 with an approach and she has a huge block. It will be interesting to see her as she starts training with the team because we think she has incredible potential.

All three freshmen have great attitudes and I know they'll fit in well with our current group.

Your 2005 schedule features nine teams that competed in the 2004 NCAA Tournament including six teams ranked in the final AVCA Top 25 poll. How tough will this schedule be? It will definitely be a tough schedule, even if you don't include the Big Ten portion. Our non-conference schedule has a good variety of teams and there should be some great matches. Missouri and UCLA will be the highest level teams, but a number of the others were NCAA tournament teams or had over 20 wins last season. Our first three weekends will be good to get us ready for Big Ten play.

The Big Ten Conference had seven teams compete in the 2004 NCAA Tournament. What does this say about the strength of the league? That says a lot about the respect this league has earned. We know that we have tough matches every night in the Big Ten, and it really prepares us to do well in the NCAA Tournament. There are a lot of great coaches and players in our conference and that makes it exciting for the fans to come out and watch.

Badgers Tie for Fifth in NCAA Tournament

◆ Wisconsin was the talk of the volleyball community as it advanced to the Elite Eight level of the NCAA tournament. The Badgers, who had not been ranked in the coaches poll for most of the season, ended the year ranked 14th in the USA Today/CSTV Top 25 Coaches poll and 14th in the NCAA RPI with a 22-10 record. It was the ninth straight year that the Badgers ended the season ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation.

◆ For the second year in a row, Wisconsin placed fourth in the Big Ten Conference standings at 13-7. In coach Pete Waite's six years at Wisconsin, the Badgers have never finished lower than fourth in the league standings and have also appeared in six NCAA tournaments.

◆ For the 11th consecutive year, the Badgers won 20-or-more matches in a season. It was the 12th consecutive winning season for the UW and the 23rd winning season in the 31-year history of the program.

◆ Wisconsin played some of its best defense at the end of the season. In its four NCAA matches, the Badgers averaged 17.71 digs and 4.36 blocks per game compared to 16.03 digs and 3.27 blocks per game overall. Individually, freshman Jocelyn Wack led the team with 5.57 digs per game while junior Sheila Shaw averaged 1.93 blocks per game in tournament play.

◆ Freshman Jocelyn Wack set the UW season record in digs, overall and in Big Ten matches this year. The 5-11 libero totalled 567 digs (4.93/game) on the season which broke Sue Wohlford's mark of 560 digs (4.52/game) set in 1990 (prior to the libero). Wack also had 374 digs (5.19/game) in conference matches, which bested the previous season best of 336 (4.94/game) set by Wohlford in 1990.

◆ Opponents had a hard time stopping the Badgers' offensive attack due to their balance. Wisconsin had four starters who averaged over 2.7 kills per game. Junior Sheila Shaw led the team and ranked eighth in the Big Ten with 3.81 kills per game. Senior Jill Odenthal added 3.06 kills per game. A duo of left-side hitters— Aubrey Meierotto and Maria Carlini—also put up some big numbers adding 2.83 and 2.75 kills per game, respectively.

◆ In all 32 matches that Wisconsin played last season, eight underclassmen saw playing time and four started 60 percent of the matches.

Freshman Jocelyn Wack started all 32 matches at libero. Freshmen Jackie Simpson and Taylor Reineke both started 28 matches at setter and middle blocker, respectively. Other freshmen who saw playing time were defensive specialists Megan Mills in 24 matches and Amanda Berkley in 16 matches.

Sophomore starters were outside hitter Maria Carlini in 19 matches, middle blocker Amy Bladow in four matches and setter Katie Lorenzen in four matches.


Academic All-Big Ten Amy Bladow Katie Lorenzen Jill Odenthal Sheila Shaw ◆ Junior Sheila Shaw ended the 2004 season as the Big Ten's best blocker. The 6-1 middle blocker led the league with a career-best 1.36 blocks per game.

◆ Freshman Jocelyn Wack recorded double-figure digs in 31 straight matches last season. The 5-11 libero led the Badgers in digs in 26 matches including a string of 18 straight matches. She had a careerhigh 35 digs in the NCAA regional semifinal match vs. Hawai'i and recorded 20plus digs in nine matches.

Wack led the Badgers and ranked fourth in the Big Ten with 4.93 digs per game, the highest ranking freshman in the conference.

◆ Freshman Jackie Simpson recorded 1,340 assists last season, becoming the first UW freshman since 1993 to record over 1,000 assists as a freshman. The 6-0 setter ranked fifth in the Big Ten with 13.01 assists per game. Simpson put up a career-high 75 assists in leading the Badgers over then-second-ranked Minnesota on Oct. 30.

◆ Sophomore Maria Carlini led the Badgers with eight double-doubles on the season. The 6-2 outside hitter recorded double-figure statistics in two different categories eight times since earning a starting role against Illinois on Oct. 3. Carlini had a career-high 21 digs vs. Minnesota on Oct. 30 and a career-best 19 kills at Penn State on Nov. 12. She recorded double-figure kills in 12 matches last season and double-figure digs in nine matches.



In 2004, Wisconsin led the Big Ten and ranked 10th nationally with 3.27 blocks per game.

◆ The 2004 Badgers put together one of the best all-around statistical seasons in UW history. The year ranked among the top 10 in several season categories—seventh in kills per game (16.43), sixth in attacks per game (41.27), fifth in assists per game (15.27), ninth in digs per game (16.03) and third in blocks per game (3.27).

◆ The one area that the Badgers struggled with all season was at the service line. Wisconsin ranked 11th in the Big Ten with 1.02 service aces per game while also averaging 2.46 service errors per game. The Badgers had more service errors than aces in 28 of 32 matches including double-figure service errors in 11 matches. Opponents had more service aces than the Badgers in 18 matches.

◆ The Badgers made five television appearances last season including their sixth consecutive annual appearance on ESPN2. The Badgers also appeared on FoxSports Net three times and CSTV once.

◆ Wisconsin ended the season ranked third in the national attendance with 4,079 spectators per match. It was the 15th straight year that the UW ranked among the top 10 teams in the nation in attendance and the fifth straight year in the top three. Wisconsin also led the Big Ten in attendance for the fifth straight year and the eighth year overall.

The Badgers' season average of 4,079 fans per match ranked second on the UW's season record list. Wisconsin had a record 4,294 spectators per match in 2003.

◆ Wisconsin ranked among the top 40 teams in the nation in four statistical categories in 2004. The Badgers ranked 10th in blocks per game (3.27), 22nd in assists per game (15.27), 27th in kills per game (16.43) and 38th in hitting percentage (.255).

Individually, Jackie Simpson ranked 29th in assists per game (13.01) and Jocelyn Wack was 50th in digs per game (4.93).

◆ Coach Pete Waite earned his 400th career win as the Badgers swept Virginia (30-20, 30-20, 30-21) on Sept. 17 in the first round the InnTowner Invitational.

Waite also celebrated his 45th birthday on Oct. 3 as his Badgers downed 19th-ranked Illinois 30-28, 25-30, 30-24, 30-22. It was also assistant coach Christy Johnson's 31st birthday.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$82 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,500 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2004-05, the Big Ten distributed over \$116 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.






Since being named as the UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on Jan. 1, 2001, Wiley has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers.

He also has mapped an east side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and help to build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez is in his second year as the only person among Bowl Championship Series schools serving in the dual role of Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach. The Badger football coach since 1990, he is in his second campaign as athletic director.

Alvarez has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He has guided Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-toback in 1998–99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (108-70-4 record).

His 7-3 (.700) record in bowl games with the Badgers is among the best in college football history. The 1993 national coach of the year, he is a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and was a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three grown children: daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); and son Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, and Grace and Jackson Delzer.



NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS















Since 1993, the UW has hosted five NCAA championships and an NCAA men's basketball regional. Wisconsin will add another national championship when hockey returns to the Badger state in 2006. Madison will also be the site of a hockey regional in 2008.

The Badgers played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sellout in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

Badgers in the Community

The Madison community is extremely supportive of the University of Wisconsin athletic teams and its many student-athletes. In return for that support, many student-athletes and staff members take time out of their busy schedules to show their appreciation and involvement in the city of Madison and Dane County through their community service efforts.

Volunteering allows student-athletes to have a positive and meaningful impact on the Madison community. Whether it is building home with Habitat for Humanity, visiting sick children at local hospitals, being a mentor as part of Big Brothers, Big Sisters or reading to grade school children with the Bookin' it with Bucky, UW student-athletes make a difference.

Student-athletes are encouraged to assist with community service projects all year long. The student-athlete in each sport who donates the most hours to community service during the year is recognized with the community service award.

The athletic department also donates a number of tickets and memorabilia to local charities for fund-raising purposes.



Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center


The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-theart facility serves the needs of all studentathletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are eight study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, is networked to allow access to email, the library system's electronic catalog and the web while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Associate Athletic Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutorial coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt (assistant director), Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. Study groups, tutors and a variety of academic and career planning are available throughout the year.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists whose offices are located in the center. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the studentathlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play.



The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Services Center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes eight study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Laura King, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Kristen Walker, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Holli Schaible and Nicole Gehrich utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.


Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Bryan Miller, Mike Potenza and Greg Young work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-toincline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.








