

RATHSKELLER PROJECT UNDER WAY

Work was begun May 21 on an extensive remodeling project in the Rathskeller servery and food preparation area. Construction is expected to last through the summer, with completion sometime in early fall.

In the meantime, Lakefront Cafeteria will be open longer hours, and the Terrace Bratstand will operate as usual. There will be a salad bar set up in the Rathskeller dining room, and the Stiftskeller Bar will continue to slake summer thirsts as always. (See accompanying story for hours.)

The remodeling incorporates a number of changes in the existing Rathskeller food line. Here's the nickel tour: The entry way from the hall will be in the same place, but wider. The trays, which will be smaller, will be dispensed from a rack between the two turnstiles. The line, from south to north, will consist of an eight-foot cold table with shelves above for such foods as salads and desserts; a self-serve sandwich case; a soup station featuring the soup of the day, chili, a new beer cheese soup in winter, and cold soups in summer; an open grill area with an expanded menu; an

ethnic food station which will begin by offering Mexican items; and finally, the main beverage station. Perpendicular to the line at the north end of the room there will be a delicase and build-your-own sandwich operation, featuring a variety of vegetarian foods and take-out items.

The check-outs will be located in the same place as at present, and the third register, currently mounted on a cart, will be given a rolling cash island like the existing one. Condiment tables will be located in the dining room at either side of the check out. The southwest corner of the servery will house an auxiliary beverage station. A re-entry passage from the dining area will open at that point.

That's about it, except the access from the dining room to the servery will still close with a folding partition.

Oh . . . if you've been worried through this whole article about the Rathskeller's entertainment line-up for the summer, have no fear. Directorate will be programming the usual excellent films and music on the Terrace and in the Rath.

OTHER FOOD UNITS MAKE UP FOR CLOSED RATHSKELLER SERVICE

With the Rathskeller food service line closed for the summer for remodeling, other food service units will be open to make up for the closed Rath.

The Lakefront Cafeteria will serve many of the displaced Rathskeller patrons. It will be open not only weekdays but also Saturdays and Sundays this summer. Hours are: Breakfast, 7 a.m. - 10:30 a.m., Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. - 10:30 a.m., Saturday; Sunday Brunch, 9 a.m. - 1:30 p.m.; Lunch, 11 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Monday - Saturday; Dinner, 5 - 6:30 p.m., Monday - Friday. On Monday through Saturday from 1:30 - 4:30 p.m. and on Saturday and Sunday from 4:30 - 6:30 p.m. the Cafeteria will serve hot and cold sandwiches, salads and desserts.

The Terrace Bratstand will be open on Monday - Friday from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and on Friday from 4 to 6 p.m. during TGIF.

A special build-your-own salad bar will be available in the Rathskeller dining room during the 8-week summer session from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

For sandwiches, snacks and beverages the Deli/Sweetshop will be serving from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday - Friday and Saturday, and Sunday from noon to 9 p.m. The Stiftskeller Bar will be open from 11 a.m. - 9:45 p.m. Monday - Thursday, 11 a.m. - 10:45 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and noon - 9:45 p.m. on Sunday.

REMODELING ETC...

Several other remodeling projects will take place this summer in the Memorial Union. Additional phases of the continuing effort to upgrade the building in terms of fire codes are planned.

These include a handicapped lift to Great Hall, a crossover passage to the Craftshop from the Great Hall floor, and fire door requirements. The crossover will also make the Craftshop handicapped accessible since a lift from the Great Hall floor to the passageway is included.

The other changes involve mostly fire-doors, which will be installed at the entrance to the main lounge, and at the Great Hall entrances. Glass stairway enclosures will be put up between the first and second floors in the central part of the building. These projects are the final phase of the fire-code updating program which began in the early 1970s.

DON'T BE DISCOURAGED... YOU CAN STILL GET TO US

It isn't as hard as it appears to get to the Memorial Union this summer. Although both Langdon Street and University Avenue are under construction, Gorham, Gilman, Johnson and University Avenue west of Park Street are open.

The Langdon Street project which has closed the four blocks from Wisconsin Avenue to Lake Street does **not** include the block from Lake to Park streets, keeping the Memorial Union accessible. The University Avenue project has not closed the street to traffic.

Tickets for the 1984-85 Concert Series are going very quickly and it is suggested that you get your order in now if you haven't already sent it in. The Travel Adventure Film Series is virtually sold out as of this writing.

OASIS PROGRAMS ARE OPEN TO MEMBERS

Non-student members of the Wisconsin Union have been inquiring about their eligibility to attend the OASIS (Older Than Average Students Interested in Socializing) programs at the Unions. Kathy Teggatz, chair of the group, says "yes" and points out that many former students who found the OASIS oasis while they were "older than average students" have bought Union life memberships in order to continue attending the programs. SEVENTEEN ARE AWARDED HONORS FOR UNION WORK

It was award time this spring at the Wisconsin Union and sixteen students and one former staff member were honored.

Mollie Buckley, former Membership director and Theater publicist, shared the Porter Butts Creative Arts Award with Katie Ripple, student chair during the past year of the Theater Arts area on the Union Directorate. The award was set up in 1968 upon the retirement of former Union Director Porter Butts and is given for artistic contributions to the Union.

The Henry B. Herman award, which recognizes community service and innovative programming, was shared by Michael Fasulo, 1983 summer programmer and 1983-84 chair of the Union South Social committee, and Lisa Ferin, a member of the Theater Arts committee.

The ACU-I College Bowl awards, which recognize ability to balance academic and volunteer work were given to two students.
