In compliance with the call issued a few weeks since, for a "Dairymen's Convention", a number of the most prominent dairymen of the state, met at the Lindon House in Watertown, on Thursday, February 15th. The attendance was good, and the importance of the movement will be rightly estimated, when it is understood that those present represented the manufacture of nearly 3,000,000 pounds of Cheese, the past season. The Convention was organized by the election of Chester Hazen of Fond du Lac County, President pro tem., W. D. Hoard, Editor Lake Mills Union, Secretary, Mr. S. Faville of Lake Mills and President of the Northwestern Dairymen's Association stated the objects of the Convention: The dairymen of this state have

CONSTITUTION.

Art. 1. The name of this organization shall be, the Wisconsin Dairymen's Association.

Art. 2. The officers of the Association shall consist of a President, two Vice Presidents and a Secretary and Treasurer.

Art. 3. The President, Vice Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer, shall constitute the Executive Board of the Association.

Art. 4. The officers of this Association shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, and shall retain their office until their successors are chosen.

Art. 5. The regular annual meeting of the Association shall occur on the second Tuesday of February in each year, at such place as the Executive board shall designate.

Art. 6. Any person may become a member of this Association, and be entitled to all its

Resolved - That the Secretary of this Association, be directed to notify as far as possible, all regular Cheese buyers and Commission men, throughout the Northwest, and also of the Cheese factory men in the State of Wisconsin, and all members of this Association, on what days the markets will be held.

After varied discussions upon subjects connected with the dairy interests and the signing of the Constitution by over 20 members, the Association adjourned, to meet at the Lindon House in Watertown, on Thursday, March 7th, at 2 o'clock p. m.
