Business Education

includes typing, shorthand, book-keeping, and office practice. The tide in typing turned when students became more conscious of accurate copies and the adoption of the international typing rules.

Industrial Arts

provides a combination of activity and achievement—activity in the way of basic and advanced woodworking, fabrication of plastics, metal work, and mechanical drawing; achievement by creating a desirable project from the drawing-board stage to a useful product.



Classes

A general mechanical drawing course is offered to the seniors as an elective. Woodworking is a three-year course offered as an elective in all four years.



Home Economics

Reference work is a vital part of Home Economics as it aids in guiding the student to an understanding of that which is good and beautiful in home decorating.



The serving of food in a pleasing, attractive environment is as much a part of Home Economics training as the actual preparation of the food.





English

English—with its traditional emphasis upon reading, writing, and speaking—occasionally makes use of another skill as well—listening. Here, students are listening for faults in their recorded speeches and have a real incentive for eliminating these faults. The device used is the tape-recorder.



Chemistry

In the chemistry laboratory, the students become familiar with many of the techniques which are commonplace in industry, medicine, and agriculture, and thus prepare places for themselves in the scientific world of the future.



Mathematics

Mathematics courses range from general mathematics, a subject that everyone can use in daily life, to advanced mathematics, preliminary to college work. Students shown in the picture are concluding a unit on geometrical construction.







Social Science

Driver Education

Driver Education is a required course for graduation. Mr. Daugherty taught the boys and Mr. Carlson, the girls. Mental and physical aptitude tests are given, and students who complete the course receive a certificate from the Motor Vehicle Department. It is a six-weeks course offered in the sophomore year.



Projector Club

Mr. Jekel is now acting as their adviser. He is forming another group of freshmen cheerleaders for next year.



Football Season

The 1951 football season saw a Waterford fighting eleven winning three games and losing four games.

In the first game of the season, Mukwonago, a hard driving eleven, defeated the Wolverines in a game which was played much closer than the score indicated, the score being 25-0. Costly fumbles kept Waterford from crossing pay dirt.

Coming from behind in the last half, the Wolverines upset the East Troy Trojans 13-12, "Golden Toe" Alby kicking the deciding point.

Waterford's football hopes were severely jolted when an underrated St. Mary's eleven came through with a touchdown in the third quarter to defeat the Wolverines, 6-0.

A strong determined Waterford team rolled over the Rochester Aggies, 24-12. An 85 yard run by Captain "Buzzy" Klokner was an important highlight in the game.

Injuries proved to be the big factor as the Wolverines lost to Wilmot, 19-7. The Wolverines scored in the first two minutes. The extra point by Alby was good. Wilmot scored twice in the second quarter and once

in the third. The fourth quarter went scoreless for both teams.

A good passing attack and a number of breaks proved to be the downfall for the Wolverines as they lost 24-14 to Union Grove. Waterford's touchdowns were made by Hart in the second and fourth quarters. Both of Alby's extra points were good.

Even if we had lost all our games except this one with Walworth, the season would have been a success, since it was the first Homecoming Waterford has won in six years. The Wolverines weren't to be denied of their victory after many smashing attacks to pay dirt. The final score was 25-6.

Basketball Season

These four, along with a talented corps of former "B" squadders, constituted one of the finest teams seen in Waterford in a long time. The Wolverines were very interesting to watch and were wonderfully supported by the student body.

If it hadn't been for a bad start in which they lost their first two conference games, before they realized their potential, they might have copped the championship. But after the opening games, the Wolverines were the terror of the league, losing only two games for the rest of the season.

The starting "five" throughout most of the season consisted of Captain Dick Hart and Dick Huening at the guards, Bob Cahill at center, and Chuck Paulson and Ronny Roepke at the forwards. The reserves were Lee Hegemann, Harry Ranke, John Michls, Joe Kuzmic, and Chuck Shanks.

The team reached its peak about the middle of the season when they handed Mukwonago its first defeat of the season. When the season closed, Waterford was firmly entrenched in second with an 8-4

record. Other honors bestowed on the Wolverines were Chuck Paulson being selected all-conference forward. He also finished second in the scoring race. Bob Cahill was selected second-string, all-conference center and finished eighth in the scoring. Ronnie Roepke finished tenth.

In the tournaments, the Wolverines won the Consolation Championship at Walworth, thus completing one of the finest seasons for a Waterford basketball team in several years.

The next game was played at Wilmot on their home field where the Wolverines suf-


fered their worst defeat of the season. The score at the end of the game was Wilmot 15, Waterford 5.

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

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
