





BUILDING A "MOUSE TRAP" TO  
CATCH STARS

Is the headline of an  
article in the August 11th Lit-  
erary Digest describing the pro-  
gram in the construction of  
McDonald Observatory for the  
University of Texas at the summit  
of Mount Locke in the Davis Moun-  
tains in Southwestern Texas.

It is of special interest  
to our readers as the construction  
is under the direction of Dr. Otto  
Struve and his associates at the  
Yerkes Observatory in Williams  
Bay.

The frame for the dome  
was made in Cleveland, Ohio, 1500  
miles distant from the Observa-  
tory and looks like a huge mouse-  
trap after being assembled. It  
will have double walls providing  
for the circulation of air to  
control the temperature in the  
Observatory, an important aid in  
making accurate observations.  
The outside covering will be of  
sheet iron. The entire structure  
will be shock-proof from earth-  
quakes.


The 200 inch mirror for

is now cooling at Corning, N.Y.  
and until it is ready the 85 inch  
mirror will be used.

## OVER AND UNDER

The Stratosphere Balloon which made its recent flight into the air to over 60,000 feet, did not break previous record for height, and it did not accomplish what the scientists had hoped to attain.

Now the Bathashpere, invented by Capt. John H.G. Butler, British technician, makes the second descent into the ocean, going to a depth of 2510 feet or one-half of a mile, which breaks the previous record made in 1930.

Capt. Beebe, who made the descent in the big ball took motion pictures and radioed up to earth at a depth pf 900 feet that the water was of a beautiful turquoise color and that the fish had eyes like headlights, but at 1200 ft. down the water was black and very cold. Many beautiful different colored beams of light were seen at the depth of 900 feet. Great things are happening these days.




Both these artists displayed much talent in their expression and interpretation of the best in music.
