Dear Ada: -

I am certainyl thankful that you are wiling to take on some of the dates in the counties near you. Reedsburg has so full a program this year that they will not take on a suffrage speaker.

I am leaving Wis, the middle of August or the last of September to live in Colorado with my father for some time at least. As you say, Harriet Grim is to be superintendant of the Darlington schools and hence is not available for our suffrage work. I feel that Mrs Haight is decid dly the best person to keep on the job here. As you know she has not been paid an adequate salary. She is conversant with the various lines of work here and cannot be spared. I do hope the board at its next meeting sees fit to grant her an amount sufficient to justifiy her in remaining. She will speak at many of the county fairs this fall but we are having so many acceptances that we are going to be dreadfully short of speakers. Can you suggest some good speakers who might take on fair dates? I have written to Arthur Bartelt. Would your father or your brotherinlaw take on any dates and if so what places would they prefer? What do you know about Mrs Nellie Kedzie Jones of Auburndale? I have written her asking her if she can take fair dates. I think Edna Wright is still in th east. Mrs McCreery goes to Minnesota for Septembe and October. Mrs Youmans will take edited dates. I wish I co ld see you before leaving the state. Won't you be down this way before the 15th of the month?

TO BE READ CAREFULLY and then given to each of your local papers with details of how you are going to celebrate.

Suffragists throughout the country are making extensive preparations for celebrating August 13 or Lucy Stone Day. This is a red letter day in the woman's movement, for it commemorates the anniversary of the birth of the founder of the pioneer suffrage weekly, the Woman's Journal, or the Suffrage Bible, as it is often called.

The celebration will vary from a balloon ascension to an all-day pilgrimage to the home of some noted suffragist.

The Michigan Suffrage Association will offer a competitive scholarship to one of the State institutions. The New Jersey Association will place a bronze tablet on the house in Orange where Lucy Stone lived and where her daughter, Alice Stone Blackwell, was born. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, International Suffrage President, Miss Blackwell and Rev. Anna Howard Shaw, the National Suffrage President, and many New Jersey people will speak. All New Jersey suffragists have been urged to make a pilgrimage to the little house in Orange on that day.

The Massachusetts Suffrage Association will conduct a pilgrimage to Lucy Stone's birthplace in West Brookfield on August 13. It will be a gala day and it is expected that cars will be chartered here for the day from different parts of the State.

Other associations will have a Round-up Meeting, at which everyone present will be asked to subscribe to the suffrage weekly founded by Lucy Stone; A Tag Day, on which all who subscribed are tagged by pretty girls in yellow sashes, whether they subscribed on the spot or thirty years ago (for the Lucy Stone paper is the oldest surviving suffrage paper in the world); a Telephone Day, on which every suffragist in town is called on the 'phone; a Letter Writing Day, when all suffragists will write to their friends, rounding them up for a boost to make it a "nothing-succeeds-like-success" day.

Others will call the day their Liberty Wedding Day, reviewing the times when the pioneer, Lucy Stone, with her prospective husband, hunted all over the land for a minister who would marry them according to their conscience and allow them to respect their own ideas of liberty.

In a number of the States the day will be devoted to Suffrage Calls, or short Pilgrimages from house to house. The day will be the occasion of many suffrage meetings and entertainments at the summer resorts.

Dear Miss James:-

The day toward which we have been working for the last three months will soon be here. Ever since May I you have seen why. And now throughout the country the call is for quick, direct action on August 13.

As a great climax to this campaign comes August 13, which is to be the National Woman's Journal Day. The plan is to reach every suffragist in the country on that day and get her to subscribe.

This may be done by having a Round-up Meeting where everyone present is asked to subscribe; or a Tag Day, on which everyone who subscribes is tagged; or a Telephone Day, when every suffragist in town is called on the telephone to subscribe; or it may be done simply by calling on every member of the league on that day, as though one were making a New Year's call.

One State Association is calling upon its members to make a big Pilgrimage to the birthplace of Lucy Stone; another to her home, the birthplace of her daughter, Miss Blackwell. Every woman who tries will be able to think of some ingenious method of celebrating the day and advancing the Cause. Can we count on you to see that something is done in your town? Will you talk it over at once with the other suffrage workers, but even if you have to do something alone on August 15, remember that Lucy Stone stood alone most of her life.



Dear Ada James:-

Can you pull any strings on Senator Platt Shitman? He is the limit. He promised several times to vote for us and then voted against us. Then he promised if his vote were necessary to save us he would not let us go down to defeat. He did let us go to defeat. We cannto do anything with him and I do not know if even his home people can. He seems such a weak brother. If you can undertake to stir up his people to stir up him, I shall be grateful.

Senator Ackley is really acting very deantly. He never promised to vote for us and when he expects to vote against us he lets us know. A big petition from home against the bill and no intimation that his home people favor I woman suffrage was a legitimate enough excuse for any politician to change his vote.

Miss Curtis is in EauClaire and Chippewa trying to secure evidences that there are some people in Senstor Ackleys distruct who do for women suffrage. The gossip around the Capitol is that Everett is going to run for Governor and is trimming his sails. Some of our men are splendid. Tremenduous pressure has been brought to bear on both Jennings and Benneut but they have not deserted us.

Now as to the differences between Mrs Catt and Miss Paul, I shink we should remember the situation in which the N Y women are. After many years of effort, they finally have their chance. They are making a campaign which I firmly believe the world has never seen before. If they lose nownthey may not have another chance for decades to come. That any suffregist on any pretense whatsoever would do anything to lose them a single vote seems to them unbearable. You and I would feelthe same way under similar circumstances. To my mind it is x poor excuse to say that a man would grab at apparently slight reasons to change his waxe opinion on woman suffrage and would not vote for it any way. I think there are planety of men who are really moved one way or the other by very slight motives. This is a time when a straw may literally break the back of the camel.

The more I think about the anti-party policy of the Union the more I question if it is not essentially an immoral policy. We have been assuming that women would be less partisan and more individual than men. Do you think it is sound public policy to ty to band them together so their influence may be used as a club? Isn't this just the sort of thing we have been opposing in men's politics?Of course this is only one feature of the situation.

Dear Members of the Executive Committee and Advisory Council of the Congressional Union: -

We understand that you have received a letter from Mrs. Catt, criticising the methods of the Congressional Union, and claiming that its work is injurious to the New York referendum campaign.

As New York women, deeply interested in the success of our cause here, and working earnestly for its victory, we are glad to be able to inform you, that in our opinion Mrs. Catt is mistaken, and to assure you that we uphold the work that the Union is doing and feel that it helps, rather than hinders New York.

The accusations made by Mrs. Catt are as follows:

1 - That Miss Paul promised to keep the Congressional Union's "activities" out of New York until after Nov. 2nd, and has broken that prom-

Answer: If Mrs. Call will read more carefully Miss Paul's letter to her, she will see that Miss Paul promised not to organize the convention in New York, until after Nov. 2nd. She did this, because she did not think it wise to try to divert women from their own campaign. She did not promise not to interview Congressmen. It is necessary for all Congressmen to be visited before the winter begins. For two reasons, first, because it will make them realize the strong pressure for the Anthony Amendment.

2 - This can only be done successfully in summer, because the men are at home, where their home women can reach them fairly easily. It is

at home, where their home women can reach them fairly easily. It is very difficult, if not impossible for women to go to Washington. These visits do not divert suffragists in New York too much, as they are arranged by the Congressional Union's office, and only take a few

moments' time on the part of the New York women.

3 - Mrs. Catt gives the idea that the Congressional Union is waging an "anti-Democratic" campaign.

Answer: Nothing could be more untrue. There is absolutely no anti-Democratic work being done anywhere. There is no occasion for any. Democratic work being done anywhere. There is no occasion for any. The Suffragist of May 29th says: "This is certainly no time for attacking any man or any party. A new Congress has just been elected.

It has no record whatever on suffrage."
In the visits to Congressmen they are merely told that we hope they will vote for the amendment next winter, and give the reasons why.

No threats whatever are made.

The Congressional Union is absolutely non-partisan in its attitude The Congressional Union is absolutely non-partisan in its attitude in that it does not endorse any party. In its campaign in the suffrage states last summer, it asked women voters to vote against the Democrats, not because they were Democrats, but because of the party's record against suffrage. If the Republicans had been the party controlling Congress, it would have opposed the Republicans. It not only defeated Mr. Seldonridge of Colorado, Mr. Flegel of Oregon, Mr. Neeley, of Kansas, Mr. Moyle from Utah, Mr. Hawley of Idaho, but it accomplished its purpose, by making the record of the Democratic Party on Woman Suffrage, widely known and hotly discussed in the Suffrage States. It is not too much to say that it has made Woman Suffrage an ever-present political issue in those States, until all women are enfranchised. enfranchised.

It also laid the foundations of permanent and growing support by those States, of the work at Washington. To the women voters, for the first time, the appeal was made to put the enfranchisement of women <u>first</u> - all other issues secondary.

4 - Mrs. Catt hints that the Congressional Union does not want New York to win this fall, and is trying to divert workers by telling them it is no use to work for the State method. It hardly seems necessary to answer such a preposterous suggestion. The Congressional Union is, of course, keenly, prayerfully desirous of having all the campaign States win - and it certainly is not trying to discourage New York workers.

5 - Mrs. Catt claims that the Congressional Union's attempts to make appointments with President Wilson, to see groups of suffragists in Philadelphia and New lork, is "injuring the cause". She draws her proof from the newspapers, who disapproved of suffragists disturbing the President with the rights of suffrage when he was considering "serious and pressing" problems, such as welcoming aliens to citizenship and welcoming the Navy in New York. The papers called these visits "attacks" and "militant" and "heckling", and said the time was not "opportune". They also lied about them as usual, representing the women as "rude and screaming", etc., whereas nothing in the least discourteous was even suggested.

We regret that Mrs. Catt and other suffragists, instead of replying to reporters that, the they were not concerned in these visits, they regretted that President Wilson could not spare five minutes for suffragists, but took their tone from the papers and fell into the trap prepared for them and echoed the sentiments of our enemies.

Mrs. Catt claims that one paper that was for us, was so incensed that it now says it will turn against us, and honestly thinks that Senator O'Gorman was on the verge of coming out in favor of suffrage, when the Congressional Union visited him, and said they hoped he would vote for the Federal Amendment, whereupon he decided not to vote for us.

We reply that papers and individuals that talk in such a puerile manner, do not deserve to be taken seriously. Supporters as childish as that, are not really converted in the least. They will always find an excuse.

Newspapers and certain suffragists at first disapproved of parades; and said they would turn men against us and injure the cause.

The Empire State Campaign Committee has just carried out a "silent" demonstration in the naturalization court in New York, which the New York Times condemns, and which the papers say lost us some votes. It was, in fact, managed in a more "militant" way than the Congressional Union's visits to the President's Secretary. Yet we know that it was a good piece of work and in the end will do good.

We believe that both the occasions of the attempts to see President Wilson, were peculiarly "opportune". We do not acknowledge that any question, even that of war and peace, is as serious and pressing as that of the enfranchisement of women.

The Congressional Union believes that President Wilson, in every State that he visits, should be asked to give an appointment to suffragists, that he may constantly feel the urgency of the question, and that we may have an opportunity to enlighten him. We always have something new to tell him.

To those who say that we should accept as final what the President has already said on suffrage, we reply that we accept from politicians no answer but the right one. Experience has taught us that men can be made to change their minds. As proof that it has not injured the cause here, we state that Senator Brackett of Saratoga, so long our enemy, has announced himself converted. This has occurred since the calls on the President.

The Congressional Union is spoken of by the National Association as a "small group" of unknown young women. This is far from the case. The Advisory Council members about 60 women, nearly all of them influential and important women from all over the United States. The membership grows by leaps and bounds until now it numbers many thousands. In spite of criticism, the suffragists of the country, recognize the brilliant national work done, the clever, honest leadership and generous and untiring devotion of the Congressional Union, and believe that its work will pass the Anthony

Amendment next winter.

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

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

I hate to insist but we need you in Chicago. The situation is so desperately difficult that we must have our delegation made up of those who know the conditions. Our ranks are badly depleted and we have few available people to draw from.

Mrs Catt's letter is certainly a scorcher and from my point of view it is entirely deserved. While I think the Union is right in its attitude toward he amendments it seems to its tactics are nothing less than suicidal. There can be no question that Miss Paul is at heart a militant, ispired by the methods and aims of the English militants. Miss Bain's letter indicates that Miss Paul will be satisfied with nothing less than a separate organization in Wisconsin. I do wish every lotal "isconsin suffragist would refuse to help her in this organization. It can only breed trouble. It seems to me that a reasonable person ought to be satisfied with a congressional committee in the state organization which would be friendly with the Union even though friendly also with the National.

In relation to the leaflet. It is capital except there are too many socialist names. I am afraid it wo ld not have much effect without the names of some Germans who are not socialists. Can you not find some of these? I should not object to leaving Pete Schmitt on the list although L believe Mrs Gudden thought it would be best without.

I expect to go down to Chicago Sunday p.m. Mrs Gudden, Trs ordan and I make up the other three members. Mrs Haight is also going and Tiss Wells may go from Kenosha.



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



They are all taken and unless we can dislodge someone it probably cannot be ar anged. There are constant rumors which doubtless you hear too which make me feel sad but then I am sure they are not true. No one in Ne. York is yet reconciled to Crystal's marriage. She was, I find. consideredone of New York's finest and most big and lovely women at the time she was married and is still, and few people think Tallace a big enough man for her. 'I think' people have to know him to find the best in him. He seems to wilfully give a poor impression.

I am sorry to have to dash off letters but it seems perfectly natural to have no time to personal letter, but only those connected with suffrage. But of course it doesn't matter to you, I know. If you can come to New York for the parade or any time this winter, we should love to have you come to us.

My dear Miss James;

I must explain to you why your article did not appear in the August Herald and why it may not be printed for some time. It just suits me, as it tells the truth and in good strong English . For thirty years I have stood for probition and woman suffrage and shall continue to do so y until the end of the story. But I am living and working in a County which is nearly all German and they of course are strong for personal liberty! Most of the actual subscribers to the Herald are the members of our County Humane Society. We have over one hundred members. Now our officers for strict regulation of the "book"," but against prohibtion. One of the best workers in our Society in fact one whose help is most important is a German Evangelical minister. I showed him your article and while he admitted it was the truth, and the forciple way in which it was expressed he objected strongly to it being published in the Herald. At least just at present aswe are making a special effort for new subscribers and members. As our County board is so strongly "personal liberty" men, he feared they would resent it, and we might fail in getting the contribution from the County for our work.

I realize the truth of his statements and as I am anxious for the success

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of our Society and as we prevent many drinks; and help the victims of the traffic, we are lessening the evils of the saloon in our County more than by any other force. We can't have prohibition at least for some time to come. I feel that perhaps (considering the greastest good at least for the present) it is best not to make the Herald distinctly anti-saloon. You see we have twelve saloenkeepers in our City who are members of the Humane Society and they come our way. None of our officers and udding myself are patrons of the saloon. We insist that they obey their license contract. If they sell to or drunkards miners we get after them and saloon conditions have much improved here.

I am sure you will understand my position. I am for prohibition if I fan have it, but I am glad to reduce the evils until the whole business can be wiped out.

I also agree with you about the present power which dominates at Madison, but you the Governor is Presedent of the Wisconsin Humane Society, (such as it is) and I do not think it best (if the Herald is to live) to antaganize him. You see I am going broke trying to keep the Herald alive and I struggle on with it because I knew it helps to bring relief to many un-fortunante creatures who must other wise suffer. So although it may seem cowardly not to strike the salcons with all my might and directly, still under the circumstances I feel that I can do the best work by striking it indirectly through my efforts to make my readers a little kind er. I was informed by a member of the legislature that if some other man had in---troduced the bill for an appropiation it would have passed. So you see what a difficult situation it is. This work will evidently not receive the needed

I have not heard from any of them and thus far I fear nothing farther has been done. I had a letter from Mrs. Underwood urging the importance of perfecting the organization and suggesting meeting with the Milwaukee Society at its annual meeting. 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

Dear Miss Gale -

If we have a great big speaker at a big price I certainly think the convention should be held in Milwaukee. I do not know that there is any chance of its being held elsewhere. Mrs rown wrote that there was little chance of its being held in Racine. Mrs Hooper suggested that we ask the Green Bay people about having it there. I will leave the matter largely in your hands to be worked out as seems best to you. Miss Bain will represent headquarters during our absence and as you know, she is Level headed and devoted. You may write her at Kenosha. She has decided that it is not practicable to come to Waukesha for a limited part of the time and all mail will be forwarded to her from here also we are sending her such data from the office as she may need.

I admire Mrs Snowdon tremenduously and of course she would be a great drawing card but I think the price prohibitive unless we could secure it from some source outside the treasury. Milwaukee wpen have done splendidly this year. Pledged \$1,000 and nearly all of it paid. Miss Baer told me on Monday that she expected to have every cent collected before the convention. I don't think we can ask the "ilwaukee women to raise the money for "rs Snowdon. Perhaps individuals would do it. Mrs "orris is always cordial in responding to special appeals of this kind. Madame Schwimmer is certainly a brilliant and effective speaker and I agree with you that we should have people who are more than suffragists to make a broad appeal.

Returning again to the "ilwakkee group. I have not had a word from Mrs Thanhauser in answer to, my communication telling her that the convention was likely to be held in Milwakee. I am afraid she will need considerable inspiration from the outside to do much for the convention.

Is it not possible that some of the noatbles who are in the east will be in this part of the country after the election? I might be able to get hold of somebody who would be an attraction. Mrs David McCann, who was formerly Mrs Yenowine of ilwaukee is now in New York and might be coming through Wiscomain on her return. She may not be a speaker, I do not know about that but she occupies an important position and would be a drawing card.

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
