Mr. Trumpetpuffer Goes to the Play



THE FAIRY APE, a romance in six episodes and the Colodion Theater, with the following cast: Tank, Looney Bullheim; The Girl, Laura Bullheim, etc. Produced by Zo Fliegfield and Jal Olson.

The critic was surprised—nay, delighted!—at this inconsequential drama of the frozen north. It is verily a dream-play, and he dreamed throughout the last five episodes of it. Never in the history of the theater have so few lines (including life-lines, line plunges and telephone lines) carried so much mean-

The humor is of the most delicate sort. Take this scene:

Tank: "Leggo my shovel."
The Girl: "Won't!"
Tank: "Gr-r-r-r-"
The Girl: "Here you are, dear."

(He fells her with a blow.)

The audience shrieked with merriment in that scene, and only subsided after about a hundred peo-

ple had left the floor (taking their coats with them) to laugh themselves out somewhere else. In another scene the Girl falls through the 'atch in the deck. With unconquerable English humor the sailors comment that she is "droppin' hin hon Tank hunexpectedlike" and the audience goes wild.

But the "Fairy Ape" is not all humor. Nope, not by a long shot! It was written to be satrical, and it is, by Jove! Here is an example of the pungent witticisms running through it.

Tank: "Hist!"

(Audience shouts: "You're darned right you are.")

Tanh: "He's got whiskers like a billy-goat."

One would be surprised at the amount of expression which that line can carry. Mr. Bullheim, led by the orchestra-leader, put more meaning into it than Ben Hecht has achieved in all his novels to date. There is no doubt but that the audience felt it keenly -many of them could not bear up under it, and left the theater.

Tank was a touching lover. One could see that he felt for The Girl, -in fact, he reached her several times, and one scene, in which he choked her, was

pathetic beyond all words.

The Girl: "That's right, cut me!"

Tank: "Ha! He-he! I halve you at last! (Tank cuts her in two with one stroke of his knife.) The Girl, naturally, falls into a tantrum, and is wheeled from the stage.

'What wreckage wouldn't wun work, wreacking weangance! shouts Tank, thus winning applause and a hundred-dollar prize for Tongue-Twisters. About this time the hero realizes that he is no better than a chimpanzee. "I am an Ape!" he shouts, and the audience answers "You're right!" It was thrilling.

His final scene can force tears from the eyes of the most hardened theater-goer. The audience wept tears as one man, which it was by this time, the critic not yet having awakened. Tank, sure now that he is a gorilla or guerilla, goes to the zoo and begs the animals there to change places with him. They turn away in disgust, and he can find no one to love him. He cries like a child, and is only placated by being given a lollypop and a Hershey bar.

The play is not one for children. It is not one for honey-mooners. In fact, it is not a play for anybody. But the gripping strength shown in it (by the ape) can never be forgotten. It is a play that will never desert the memories of those people who came to see, and left to drown their memories.









While melting up your chemicals and experimenting with high temperatures, you begin to wonder how hot the earth must have been millions of years ago, and what were the forces at play that made this planet what it is. Your investigation leads you far from rubies and causes you to formulate theories to explain how the earth, how the whole solar system was created. That would be research of a still different type.

Research of all three types is conducted in the laboratories of the General Electric Company. But it is the third type—pioneering into the unknown—that means most in the long run, even though undertaken with no practical benefit in view.

For example, the Research Laboratories of the General Electric Company are exploring matter with X-rays in order to discover not only how the atoms in different substances are arranged but how the atoms themselves are built up. The more you know about a substance, the more you can do with it. This work may enable scientists to answer more definitely the question: Why is iron magnetic? Then the electrical industry will take a greater step forward than can be made in a century of experimenting with existing electrical apparatus.




