Approval of the Minutes

Upon motion by Regent Weinstein, seconded by Regent Vos, the minutes of the March 9, 1990, meeting of the Board of Regents were approved as distributed.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Presentation of NCAA Championship Hockey Trophies, PP 1-2

Chancellor Shalala introduced a special presentation in honor of the NCAA Championship won the preceding weekend by the UW-Madison hockey team.

Athletic Director Pat Richter congratulated Hockey Coach Jeff Sauer, his coaches, and the team as great representatives of the University both in athletics and off the field.

Coach Sauer recognized Assistant Coach Mike Kemp for recruiting many of the athletes on the championship team. Coach Kemp noted that the players came from various parts of the country and Canada, as well as from Wisconsin.

The display of trophies won by the UW-Madison hockey team consisted of the Broadmoor Cup, which is the playoff championship trophy; the Pettit Cup, which was awarded for winning the tournament at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee; the NCAA Championship trophy; and the MacNaughton Cup, which is the traveling championship trophy.

Chancellor Shalala stated that Mr. Sauer is a first-quality coach who recruited an outstanding group of student athletes. The whole State of Wisconsin, she commented, should be proud of each one of them and of their extraordinary coach.

UW-Stevens Point, which had won the NCAA Division III National Hockey Championship, was recognized by Coach Sauer.

Regent President Schilling called on Chancellor Sanders, who commented that the Division III Championship meant a great deal to UW-Stevens Point and to all of central Wisconsin. The University was very proud of what the athletes and coaches had accomplished. Extending congratulations to UW-Madison on its great victory, Chancellor Sanders remarked that this may be the first time in the history of the NCAA that both division championships resided in the same state in the same year.

Report of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics on a committee to work at Supt, on rish management program, on lucinement of

Regent Flores, Chair of the Council of Trustees, reported on the analysis previous day's meeting, noting that the Council first welcomed back Regent with Weinstein, a member of the Council who recently underwent successful heart druft from surgery at the UW hospital. Regent Weinstein shared his impressions of the formed hospital as a complex, well-managed institution and praised the high degree of professionalism and concern displayed by all staff involved in his care.

Reporting on patient activity, Superintendent Derzon advised the Reput Weinsteins Council that March was a favorable month for inpatient volume, but that reput or her outpatient volume remained constant, which was a less encouraging trend. It happtal is expected that the hospital will end the year in a better-than-anticipated care, financial position, primarily due to favorable occupancy and also to the fact that projected cuts in Medicare reimbursement had been less than expected.

Sensiter Council decided to establish a three-member committee to evaluate
the performance of the hospital superintendent and to conduct a

self-evaluation of the Council.

Associate Superintendent Eileen Smith presented a report on the hospital's risk management program, which is responsible for liability issues as well as claims management and prevention. In accordance with new joint commission standards, risk management reports will be presented to the Council twice annually.

The Council approved the hospital's application for licensure as a home health agency, which is required in order for the hospital to provide skilled nursing care to patients in the home setting following discharge.

Vice Chancellor Noren reported to the Council on the UW System draft policy on "Funding Sources for University Facilities," which was being reviewed at this meeting by the Regents. Council members shared Dr. Noren's concern that funding splits prescribed in the proposed policy would present a serious problem for building projects within the health sciences. It was suggested that the policy allow use of all appropriate funds for the Center's construction, including GPR sources, since essentially all parts of the facility, including patient care areas, support teaching, research, and patient care functions. The Council agreed that segregated fee funding is not appropriate for the Clinical Science Center.

The Council also reviewed a quality assurance report and a preliminary draft of the hospital's long-range plan, which Council members agreed should be studied in greater depth at a special meeting convened for that purpose. Vice Chancellor Noren stated that the long-range plan will become a component of the overall report of the Policy, Management and Planning Compittee appointed by Chancellor Shalala last April.

Report on the Wisconsin Educational Communications Board

Regent Clusen, Chair of the Educational Communications Board, reported on the Board's March 15 and 16 meetings.

In the area of public radio, a number of UW System stations are cooperating with the ECB to provide statewide public radio services under the title of Wisconsin Public Radio. WHA in Madison, which is operated by UW-Extension, provides programming for three different kinds of network services -- music, talk, and a mixed service. At present, UW System stations at Green Bay, Stevens Point, Eau Claire, Milwaukee and River Falls participate. The ECB was particularly pleased that later this year KUWS in Superior will join this group.

Beginning this fall, the radio services will be realigned and the mixed service system will be dropped. The reasoning behind this move is that, with UW System stations added to those already licensed to the ECB, it will be possible to provide both the music and talk programming in each of the areas of the state reached by public radio service.

In the area of television, additional cooperative activities between the UW System and the ECB provide statewide public television service under the concept of Wisconsin Public Television. Program production and scheduling, promotion and fundraising are now accomplished jointly, resulting in considerable economy of resources and personnel with no loss of service to viewers.

The Legislative Audit Bureau had informed the ECB and UW System that it plans to conduct a program audit of the working relationship between the ECB and UW System, to assist the Legislature in understanding the long-term implications of various organizational changes that have occurred over the past several years.

Reporting on the development of Instructional Television Fixed Service facilities, Regent Clusen advised that when the second phase is completed, there will be more than 20 of these installations around the state. They are used by K-12 schools, VTAE institutions, and UW System institutions to provide instruction and training.

The UW System was applying for matching federal grants to improve broadcasting facilities and to replace aging capital equipment. One application was for funding to install new equipment at WGBW in Green Bay to double its coverage area. Another was for WHA-TV studio equipment to replace items which were at least ten years past their normal life expectancy. The ECB had submitted a request for funds to construct ITFS facilities in northwest Wisconsin to serve K-12 school districts, UW Center-Rice Lake and local business and industry.

the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, reported that plegislation had been passed to eliminate interdistrict tuition. After the VTAE System's establishment, he noted, this important step finally had been taken toward having a statewide system rather than a district system.

Reporting on the VTAE Board's annual tuition-setting determination, Regent DeLong noted the statutory requirement that tuition cover a percentage of the cost-per-credit. As costs rose, tuition also had risen rapidly. While tuition at the UW Centers had stayed constant for the last two years, VTAE tuition had increased dramatically. Tuition for the next year was set at the lowest rate increase in more than ten years.

While financial aid programs are available to VTAE students, many are unable to qualify because they have jobs and are attending school part-time. The high cost of tuition, plus providing for their families, makes it increasingly difficult for students to attend VTAE institutions. The VTAE Board hoped to address that problem in the next year.

Regent President Schilling noted that a written report had been provided by Vice President Bornstein.

Regent Weinstein congratulated President Shaw, Vice President Bornstein and staff for successfully promoting legislation to grant the Board of Regents additional flexibility in setting executive salaries. The hope was that the Governor would not veto the provision.

Regent President Schilling expressed appreciation to the Regents who had visited with the Governor and legislators to urge support for the proposal -- Regents Davis, Gelatt and Nicholas had made a special effort by meeting with the Governor and speaking at length on the issue. All who had X an opportunity stressed that it is an important Regent initiative.

Report of the Special Regent Committee on the UW-Eau Claire Student Governance Appeal, R 5451, PP 5-7

Regent Flores, Chair of the Special Regent Committee, presented the

X Committee's report.

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Ms. Anne Welch, President of the UW-Eau Claire student body, sought to appeal the decision of President Shaw sustaining Chancellor Schnack's decision to remove cigarette vending machines from UW-Eau Claire's residence halls and student center. The appeal, which was brought under Regent Policy Document 86-4, Guidelines for Student Governance, contended that the decision was made in violation of s. 36.09(5), Wis. Stats, Judent Sovernme appeal

At the March 1990 meeting of the Board of Regents, President Schilling referred the appeal to a Special Regent Committee consisting of Regents Flores (Chair), Clusen and Gelatt, with Regent President Schilling and Regent Vice President Lyon as ex-officio members.

Under the Guidelines, review of this appeal is discretionary with the Board; therefore, the Committee was asked first to make a recommendation to the Board as to whether the merits of the dispute should be considered.

At the March meeting of the Board, President Schilling also proposed an amendment to the Regent Bylaws, which would create a standing committee of the Board to review student discipline and governance appeals. In the case of discretionary appeals, the amendment established criteria for deciding when a review should be granted.

Although the amendment had not yet been adopted by the Board, the Committee felt that the criteria proposed for discretionary reviews provided a useful framework for consideration of the UW-Eau Claire petition. the Special Regent Committee considered two factors in determining whether to recommend to the Board that this matter be reviewed on its merits: (1) whether there is a serious concern that the Chancellor or the President has abused his discretion or exceeded his authority; or (2) whether the decision of the Chancellor or the President could have systemwide implications.

Ms. Welch, President Shaw, and Chancellor Schnack each were given an opportunity to submit written materials concerning whether either or both of these criteria were satisfied in the context of this case.

The Committee met by telephone conference on April 2 with the parties or their representatives in attendance. Ms. Welch and President Shaw both urged that the Board consider the merits of this case on the grounds that the decision of the President sustaining the action of the Chancellor could have systemwide implications. Ms. Welch also argued that there was a serious concern that the Chancellor or the President had abused his discretion or exceeded his authority.

Having reviewed the written materials of the parties and considered oral statements offered during the telephone conference on April 2, it was the unanimous recommendation of the Special Regent Committee that the Board exercise its discretion to hear the merits of this case, on the basis that the decision could have systemwide implications.

Because only one of the two criteria needs to be satisfied to justify a review, the Committee did not reach the question of whether there was a concern that the Chancellor or the President abused his discretion or exceeded his authority.

The crux of this case involved an interpretation of s. 39.06(5) of the statutes, which provides that "students shall have the primary responsibility for the formulation and review of policies concerning student life, services, and interests."

In essence, the students argued that the Chancellor's action of removing cigarette vending machines, sustained by President Shaw, deprived them of their primary responsibility as they defined it under s.36.09(5). It was their contention that "primary responsibility" gave the students authority, in effect, either to legislate or veto institutional policies. President Shaw disagreed with that interpretation. He held that "primary responsibility" means that students be given the opportunity for meaningful participation in a decision-making process, not that they be allowed to dictate the outcome.

The parties argued, and the Committee agreed, that the President's interpretation of the students' primary responsibility could have systemwide implications, in that the statute is applicable to all institutions in the System. How primary responsibility is interpreted here would provide useful guidance in other cases involving the role of students under s. 36.09(5) and could help assure consistent application of the statute throughout the System. For those reasons, the Committee recommended that the Board grant review of the matter on its merits.

If the Board agreed, the students had asked for an expedited review, because the current student government administration was soon to leave office; and if the matter were deferred, the timing might interfere with student preparation for final exams.

To accommodate the students' request, the Committee was prepared to provide a hearing immediately following this Board meeting.

Adoption by the Board of Regents of the following resolution was moved by Regent Flores and seconded by Regent Weinstein:

Resolution 5451: That the Board of Regents adopt the recommendation of the Special Regent Committee on the UW-Eau Claire Student Governance Appeal to grant the request of Anne Welch, as President of the UW-Eau Claire Student Body, for review of the decision by President Shaw, which sustained Chancellor Schnack's decision to remove cigarette vending machines from UW-Eau Claire's residence halls and student center.

In response to a question by Regent Davis, Regent President Schilling explained that failure to pass the resolution would mean denial of the appeal.

Regent Weinstein stated that he seconded the motion because he considered it important to give appealants full due process without unduly encumbering the Board and also because he agreed that the case had systemwide implications.

Put to the vote, the resolution was adopted unanimously.

Regent President Schilling presented proposed amendments to the Board Bylaws, which would create a standing Regent Committee on Student Discipline and Student Governance Appeals. The amendments were presented initially at the March meeting and were returned to the agenda for further consideration and action at this meeting.

The proposed amendments would specify the duties of the new Committee in mandatory and discretionary reviews of student discipline and student governance appeals. In cases of discretionary review, criteria would be established for determining whether requests for review should be granted.

These were the criteria used by the Special Regent Committee in making its recommendation that a review be granted in the case of the UW-Eau Claire student governance appeal.

The new Committee would consider appeals submitted pursuant to the Regent-adopted Student Governance Guidelines and would make recommendations to the Board as to the disposition of such appeals.

The Committee also would have responsibility for student discipline appeals submitted under Chapters UWS 14 and 17 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code—student academic, and nonacademic disciplinary procedures.

For the past year, the Personnel Matters Review Committee, chaired by Regent Nikolay, also had functioned as the Committee on Student Discipline. The revised Committee structure would consolidate appeals on both student discipline and governance cases within one Committee. The Personnel Matters Review Committee would continue to have responsibility for faculty and staff appeals.

The draft amendments included wording to make clear the distinction between the duties of the two Committees, as had been suggested by Regent Weinstein.

It was moved by Regent Weinstein and seconded by Regent Vos that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5452: That the Bylaws of the Board of Regents be amended as set forth in the attached document.

(The amended Bylaws are attached as EXHIBIT A.)

Regent Weinstein commended Regent President Schilling on the clarity and precision of the revised draft.

Noting that another section of the Bylaws calls for a reading of the minutes, Regent Davis suggested amending that section to provide for a review of the minutes.

Regent President Schilling agreed that this and other corrections should be brought for action at a future meeting.

Speaking on behalf of United Council, Robb McGinnis stated that students supported creation of the new Committee. However, United Council was concerned that the criteria for determining whether a review should be granted were too limiting, and there might be a tendency to attempt artificially to match cases to one or the other of the criteria. In addition, there was concern that students would be reluctant to accuse a Chancellor of abusing discretion or exceeding authority. Instead, Mr. McGinnis suggested that the Committee use its expertise to determine whether a complaint is frivolous or whether the students deserve to be heard, on a case-by-case basis.

Anne Welch, President of the UW-Eau Claire student body, stated her belief that the criteria would not cover the entire spectrum of possible appeals. For example, they did not state that an appeal could be made for violation of an institutional governance structure. Such a violation, she noted, might be done by some official other than the Chancellor. She also was concerned about legal requirements as to what may be included in the record, particularly since students are prohibited from hiring lawyers with student fees. Finally, she agreed with Mr. McGinnis that there would be a tendency to "mix and match" criteria to appeals, whether or not they were specific to the case.

Regent Weinstein commented that the criteria specifying systemwide implications provides the widest possible entre to the appeal process.

Mr. McGinnis felt there would be some institution-specific decisions which would not meet the criteria but which the students would want reviewed because of their belief that the wrong decision was made.

- Vice President Lyon presiding -

Regent Schilling commented that the criteria are intended to screen out not only frivolous appeals but also to screen out simple disagreements. If

the student governance process has worked with students having a significant and primary role in policy formation and review, he would not consider it the function of the Board to arbitrate a disagreement as to the conclusion. Rather, it is the function of the Board to review cases where student input was not sufficient under the student governance guidelines, where authority was exceeded or where the case involves systemwide implications. He felt the criteria would afford ready access for issues that should be decided at the Board level.

- President Schilling presiding -

Regent Davis asked if the language of the amendment meant that these are the only criteria which shall be considered in order to determine whether or not to grant a review.

Regent Flores explained that the Special Regent Committee used those two criteria because they were suggested in the proposed Bylaw change and because they provided a useful framework for the problem. He did not believe it would be in the students' interest to have no stated criteria, because the Committee then could use any criteria it wished on an ad hoc basis. Commenting that good policy requires consistent standards, he added his agreement that the Board should not hear every dispute between students and administration. Reviews should be granted only for cases having serious implications.

Regent Schilling noted that the proposed criteria are two of the four criteria that had been used for some time by the Personnel Matters Committee.

Regent Gelatt asked if the Personnel Matters Review Committee had used the listed criteria exclusively in making its determinations.

Regent Nikolay, Chair of the Committee, replied in the affirmative, explaining that a review would be granted if any one of the criteria were met.

While he understood the students' wish to have the opportunity to appeal any decision with which they disagreed, Regent Weinstein commented that this argument would require the Regents to step into the Chancellor's role. On the other hand, he considered it logical for the Board to take jurisdiction if there were serious concern that the Chancellor had exceeded the authority of the office, or if the matter has systemwide implications. Those two criteria, he felt, should be the only criteria to be employed. He asked those who disagreed with these proposed criteria to give an example of the kind of appeal they thought should be heard but would not meet either one of the criteria.

In response, Regent Vos offered the example of a campus with two student government systems—one for the residence halls and one for the campus as a whole. If the two governments disagreed and the Chancellor decided an issue in accordance with the position taken by one group, Regent Vos asked if, in the absence of systemwide implications, the other group would have the right to appeal to the Board.

In such a case, Regent President Schilling thought the institution first would have to determine the responsibilities of the student groups. The students could appeal that determination if they felt it abused discretion or exceeded authority. While these words might sound harsh, he added, they simply meant that the Chancellor might have interpreted his or her responsibilities incorrectly.

Regent Clusen thought the students had a valid point in expressing concern about the criterion that the Chancellor might have abused discretion or exceeded authority. Another campus official, she noted, might actually have been the one who took the actions being appealed.

If that were the case, Regent Schilling replied, the students should appeal to the Chancellor. Once the Chancellor made a decision, the students then would have access to the Board under these criteria.

In the case of the UW-Eau Claire appeal, Ms. Welch noted that it was the Assistant Chancellor for Student Affairs, not the Chancellor, who made the decision to remove the cigarette vending machines. The Chancellor simply denied the students' appeal. In her view, the criteria contained serious loopholes and should be revised if they could not be deleted altogether.

Regent Flores pointed out that "abuse of discretion," is a term of art in the law and does not constitute a personal attack on the Chancellor. While some other official might have made the decision, the ultimate administrative responsibility lies with the Chancellor, and the wording, therefore, is appropriate. It does not mean a decision cannot be appealed if it is made by someone other than the Chancellor.

Gloria Toivola, President of The Association of UW Professionals, expressed concern about further institutionalization of the criteria on page 13, which are the same criteria as those applied to faculty and staff appeals. She had distributed to Board members an alternative set of criteria which TAUWP felt would address those concerns. For example, TAUWP's proposal would provide for granting a review on the basis of violation of the federal or state constitution, of a statute, of the rules of the Board or the policies of the President, carried out pursuant to Board's directives.

In response to a question by Regent Weinstein, Regent Schilling indicated that those criteria were included by implication in the terms "exceeded authority" or "abused discretion." While he thought the TAUWP proposals were well drafted, he did not believe they differed greatly in substance from the criteria set forth in the Bylaw amendment.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5452 was adopted unanimously.

Resolution of Appreciation to Regent Nikolay
R 5 453, PP 10-12

Presenting Resolution 5453, Regent Grover observed that the Nikolays are one of Wisconsin's truly progressive and outstanding families. Noting that they came from circumstances that were not affluent, Regent Grover

stated that "they achieved much, and the family is reflected in the attitude of Frank Nikolay about sharing, caring, fairness, opportunity and the great progressive tradition that comes out of the Wisconsin experience."

The following resolution was moved by Regent Grover, and adopted unanimously with a standing ovation for Regent Nikolay:

Resolution 5453: Whereas, on May 1, 1990, Frank L. Nikolay will complete a seven-year term of distinguished service as a member of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System; and

Whereas, Regent Nikolay has brought to Regent deliberations valuable knowledge and insights gained during a career of accomplishment in the practice of law and years of leadership in the State Legislature; and

Whereas, as Chair and Vice Chair of the Physical Planning and Development Committee for six years, Regent Nikolay made a particularly significant contribution through his expertise in capital budget issues and his extensive knowledge of campus facilities and lands; and

Whereas, Regent Nikolay also served as Chair of the Personnel Matters Review Committee, as Chair and member of Special Regent Committees on selection UW System Chancellors, as a member of the Executive Committee for three years, and as a member of the Higher Educational Aids Board for four years; and

Whereas, he consistently and firmly advocated the importance of affordable tuition and fees in providing full access to educational opportunity; and

Whereas, he approached issues before the Board with an admirable independence of spirit, not hesitating to cast the sole dissenting vote on matters with which he disagreed;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Regents hereby recognizes and commends Regent Nikolay for all he has done to benefit the University of Wisconsin System and the people of Wisconsin; and

Be it further resolved that, with deep gratitude for his faithful service and commitment to higher education, the Board of Regents grants to Frank L. Nikolay, upon his retirement from the Board, the status and title of Regent Emeritus.

Stating that he had appreciated the opportunity to serve on the Board, Regent Nikolay said that he had never met a finer group of people than those he had been associated with as Regents.

Regent President Schilling presented a plaque to Regent Nikolay in appreciation for his distinguished service as a Regent from 1983-1990.

Resolution of Appreciation for Regent Hanson, R5454, PP12-13

Regent Clusen presented the following resolution and moved its adoption by the Board of Regents. The motion was adopted unanimously, with a standing ovation for Regent Hanson.

Resolution 5454: Whereas, on May 1, 1990, Camilla R. Hanson will retire from the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin system upon completion of her seven-year term; and

Whereas, Regent Hanson served with distinction on the Education Committee for four years, the Business and Finance Committee for three years, the Executive Committee for two years, and for the past year on the Personnel Matters Review Committee; and

Whereas, she chaired and served as a member of Special Regent Committees for selection of UW System Chancellors and other officers, as Co-Chair of the Ben R. and Ruth M. Lawton Scholarship Fund-raising Committee, and as Vice Chair of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics; and

Whereas, through diligent exercise of this broad range of responsibilities, Regent Hanson has contributed significantly to decisions benefiting the UW System in a wide array of areas; and

Whereas, Regent deliberations have been enriched by her thoughtful perceptions based on her commitment to shared governance and the process of institutional decision-making;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Regents hereby commends Camilla R. Hanson for the substantial contributions she has made to the University of Wisconsin System and the people of Wisconsin; and

Be it further resolved that, with deep appreciation for the countless hours of meritorious service she has rendered, the hand-made holiday ornaments she has given us each year, the thousands of miles she has traveled for meetings, and the great generosity the Hanson family has bestowed upon the university, the Board of Regents grants to Camilla R. Hanson, upon her retirement from the Board, the status and title of Regent Emeritus.

Regent Hanson recalled being told that serving on the Board of Regents is one of the most exciting things one can ever do. Stating that she found this to be true, she cited the treasured friendships made with Board members, System administrators, chancellors, vice chancellors, faculty and academic staff; the insight gained into how universities should be run; and the opportunity to visit all of the UW System campuses.

Referring to changes made during her tenure on the Board, she recalled being dismayed seven years ago to learn that credit toward graduation was given for remedial courses, and she was pleased to see that trend reversed. In addition, academic staff issues had been thoroughly examined, although she had mixed feelings as to whether academic staff had been justly served by the result.

Looking toward the future, she stated that she has high hopes that the UW System will remain among foremost university systems in the country. Noting that achievement of Design for Diversity remains a great challenge, she wished the Board and the System well in continuing efforts to meet those important goals. She urged the Board to decrease as much as possible the burden of paperwork on the chancellors, other administrators and faculty.

In closing, she expressed appreciation to the Board staff for all the work done in preparation for meetings, for the Regents individually, and for making Van Hise Hall seem like a second home.

Regent President Schilling presented a plaque to Regent Hanson in appreciation for her distinguished service as a Regent from 1983-1990.

As a special tribute, Regent President Schilling recognized the great enrichment Louis Hanson and Mary Nikolay had brought to the lives of Board members and others. "We enjoy Mary immensely and hope to see her often; and all of us greatly appreciate and cherish the memory of Louie."

Regent Davis, Chair of the Special Regent Committee, reported that at its meeting the previous day the Committee had reviewed the process by which a new chancellor will be selected for UW-Milwaukee. The Committee also reviewed the position description and made a number of changes to bring it into conformance with many of the priorities that had been articulated by the Regents, such as the importance of undergraduate education as well as commitments to Design for Diversity. Given the urban character of this university, the Committee felt strongly that advance community input should

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

Approval of Nonpersonnel Actions/Informational Items

Upon motion by Regent Hanson, seconded by Regent Nicholas, the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5455: That the report of nonpersonnel actions by administrative officers to the Board of Regents and informational items reported for the record (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Authorization to Recruit Vice President for Academic Affairs, UW System, R 5456, P, 14

Resolution 5456 was adopted unanimously by the Board of Regents, upon motion by Regent Davis, seconded by Regent Hanson.

Presentation on WiscNet/CentersNet, PP 14-18

Introducing the presentation on WiscNet/CentersNet, President Shaw briefly reviewed UW System's involvement in telecommunications and management information strategies, beginning with a report to the Regents in 1988. Indicating that a state-level study of Wisconsin's long-range data processing and telecommunication needs was currently underway, he pointed out that the state's study had drawn much of its information and guidance from the UW System studies and reports.

President Shaw described WiscNet, a high-speed data communication network, and CentersNet, a computer-based instruction and conferencing network, as two new UW System initiatives that are "separate but related and independent but compatible"--key relationships in current technology. He then introduced Professor Tad Pinkerton, Director of UW-Madison's Office of Information Technology.

Dr. Pinkerton explained that WiscNet, due to be operational in October 1990, is capable of sending electronic mail messages, transferring large

administrative and academic data files as well as permitting remote connections to computers within the state and nationwide. WiscNet will replace current ad hoc connections with faster lines and provide connections to institutions that currently do not have networking capabilities.

Explaining the network structure, Dr. Pinkerton described WiscNet as part of a vast multi-layered organization with the National Science Foundation Network (NSFNet), a large national network, serving as the "backbone" of the system. NSFNet is connected to a number of regional networks including CICNet, a network which includes the Big Ten schools as well as the University of Chicago.

Each campus has various layers of the national network. For example, UW-Madison has a campuswide network with each building having network capabilities to meet departmental needs. Finally, individual research projects have networks that are a layer below the building network.

Regent Weinstein asked if WiscNet will use satellites. Dr. Pinkerton replied in the negative, adding that data lines would be provided by telephone companies.

The WiscNet project was launched in August 1989 by a grant proposal submitted to the National Science Foundation by a group of 24 institutions which included UW System Administration, the thirteen UW System four-year campuses, UW-Extension, UW Centers and eight private Wisconsin higher education institutions. Dr. Pinkerton informed the Regents that WiscNet expects to receive 98 percent of the budget request submitted in the proposal to NSF.

The VTAE System, Department of Public Instruction, Cooperative Educational Service Agencies, and high schools, as well as industry, have expressed great interest in becoming eventual WiscNet members.

In response to a question by Regent Nikolay, Dr. Pinkerton pointed out that the annual fee for the 1993-94 school year followed the expiration of the NSF grant.

Dr. Pinkerton estimated that UW-Superior's 1993-94 fee will be approximately \$10,000. He added that UW-Milwaukee's WiscNet fee will be approximately \$28,000 in 1993-94, but that UW-Milwaukee currently leases a dedicated line to provide direct access to the Supercomputer Center at the University of Illinois. The cost of that line alone is \$28,000. WiscNet will provide that same line, through the national network, at a speed 30 times greater than the existing line.

Each institution will provide a campus infrastructure—a local campus network giving faculty and students access to WiscNet.

Regent Flores asked if WiscNet would compete with private companies that provide high-speed data and voice transmission.

Dr. Pinkerton replied that, at the management level, very few companies offer the services needed to run a network like WiscNet but that communications companies—both telephone companies and unregulated carriers—could provide the communication services and the band width that WiscNet will need. Such companies will be invited to bid on the project.

Regent Weinstein inquired as to the relationship of WiscNet to the satellite uplink/downlink that UW-Extension had been planning.

Dr. Pinkerton stated that television-level service requires considerably more band width and hence, higher cost than just data transmission. Potential satellite use was part of the telecommunications plan included by the UW System in the last biennial budget request, but since no funds were budgeted for the video-level service, WiscNet members had studied alternative data-only transmission possibilities.

When asked by Regent Weinstein if UW-Extension was involved in WiscNet, Dr. Pinkerton replied that UW-Extension was involved but that WiscNet would not be able to satisfy UW-Extension's video needs.

The benefits expected from participation in WiscNet include improved communication, research collaboration and System administrative coordination; easier access to library services; facilitated faculty recruitment; reduced need for travel to meetings; and increased public/private cooperation.

President Shaw assured Regent Weinstein that any System activity in telecommunications will be compatible with the MIS plan.

In the next segment of the presentation, UW Centers Chancellor Portch introduced Professor Richard Cleek who has played a key role in the development of CentersNet.

Dr. Cleek stated that CentersNet would strongly affect teaching, research and governance at UW Centers.

Describing computer programs used in his classes, Dr. Cleek first illustrated a classroom simulation of urban government processes and a computer program used in teaching his Wisconsin geography course. Recognizing that students often have difficulty interpreting maps, he uses the computer programs to allow students to quickly create maps emphasizing any named Wisconsin features they wish, adding a concrete dimension to materials covered in lecture. While there are many exciting but expensive educational programs available, CentersNet would allow him to buy a program and share it with 12 other UW Centers campuses.

Dr. Cleek remarked that through CentersNet he will be able to access UW-Madison research libraries from his desk, as well as the libraries at UW-Milwaukee, UW-Stevens Point, and other UW Center campuses. CentersNet

will allow him to perform complex search requests, call immediately for a copy of the needed material, and the articles can be faxed. The same process without the use of CentersNet would take him three weeks. UW Center students also will have access to those libraries.

Because the 13 UW Centers are all part of one institution, meetings play a major administrative role, requiring travel and lodging expense as well as scheduling problems. Dr. Cleek explained that CentersNet will allow him and his colleagues to put a document on the network and solicit input from colleagues across the state. Document changes can be made and reviewed quickly, reducing the need for face-to-face meetings and teleconferences.

In response to a question by Regent Flores on whether transmission/fax costs would replace travel and meeting costs, Chancellor Portch explained that costs would be offset by more efficient use of time.

Next, Chancellor Portch recalled that in *Planning the Future*, the Regents had charged him with the evaluation of alternative educational technologies and formulation of a plan for use of alternative technologies. Lacking the resource base for CentersNet, UW Centers submitted a proposal to AT&T for an equipment donation. While waiting to hear the outcome of their request, the CentersNet design of data communication among and within campuses was planned. Also, rewiring on each UW Center campus was required; every office, laboratory, classroom, student center was equipped with new data and voice outlets.

Meanwhile, AT&T granted UW Centers a donation of equipment and networking capabilities approaching \$3 million—the largest single donation in their program last year. UW Centers existing computers were modified for compatibility with CentersNet so all UW Centers computers would be functional on the local and statewide network.

Describing the impact of CentersNet on teaching low-enrollment classes on distant campuses, Chancellor Portch stated that UW Centers had entered into a partnership with UW-Extension and UW-Madison to purchase jointly an audio/graphics system: a computer-based system with high resolution screens; audio capabilities that provide two-way communication between an instructor and students at remote locations; a two-way writing tablet that allows the instructor or the student to draw graphs; and a scanner, similar to a fax machine, that allows transmission of solved problems.

As a valuable research tool, Chancellor Portch stated, CentersNet already was serving as a powerful faculty recruitment tool. "A faculty member joining us at Marinette just asked, 'How will I be able to continue my research that far away from a research library?' We were able to point to WiscNet and CentersNet."

Regent DeLong asked the reasoning for a state study of telecommunications technology and compatibility if various institutions were independently pursuing their own projects.

Dr. Pinkerton replied that the UW System Information Technology Coordinating Council was working very closely with the state's technology

study. He felt that WiscNet and CentersNet could be developed on an aggressive schedule, in parallel with the development of the state's study, because the study's scope is very long range and covers data processing as well as communications.

Regent DeLong stated that many state agencies were prohibited from pursuing their communications plans until the study was completed to assure that any new programs would not be incompatible with future state communications and data processing plans. Dr. Pinkerton said that great care was being taken to ensure that WiscNet and CentersNet would fit successfully into the state's future technological developments. He described these two networks as modest, in comparison with the scope of the state study.

In response to Regent DeLong's question on technological compatibility, President Shaw said that the designs could fit almost any initiative that the state undertakes.

In response to Regent Nikolay's question about the cost of adding the VTAE schools to the network, Dr. Pinkerton replied that the additional cost to connect another location is a \$10,000-\$15,000 one-time cost and approximately \$10,000 annually.

Regent Nicholas commented that the networking projects were substantially motivated by the opportunities reflected in AT&T's donation of nearly \$3 million for a project that is highly likely to be compatible with any state system later on. Chancellor Portch agreed that was the reasoning involved. Dr. Pinkerton concurred that the \$500,000 from NSF for WiscNet had been a similar trigger for action.

President Shaw concluded by pointing out that the two networks demonstrated three important points: (1) cooperation among System Administration, UW System campuses, private schools and state government; (2) leveraging of private funding; and (3) growth by substitution-campuses setting priorities and reallocating their resources to reach their goals. 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REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Regent Nicholas, Chair, presented the Committee's report.

The Audit Subcommittee of the Business and Finance Committee met the preceding day to discuss the scope of the subcommittee's role. The subcommittee decided to meet on a quarterly basis and asked to be provided with one-page summaries for all audits, in addition to audit opinion and management letters.

A charter was to be drafted outlining suggested activities for the subcommittee.

In May, the subcommittee planned to review the proposed internal audit schedule for 1990-91 and also would be recommending additional audits.

The subcommittee's purpose is to provide more meaningful Regent involvement in the audit function and to improve the effectiveness of the program.

Consent Agenda Items

Reporting unanimous approval by the Business and Finance Committee of Resolutions 5457 and 5458, Regent Nicholas presented them as consent agenda items for action as a single unit.

There being no request to withdraw either item from the consent agenda, Resolution 5457: That the following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Board of Regents upon motion by Regent Nicholas, seconded by Regent Gelatt:

Resolution 5457: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the bequest of the late Nora Agnes Hanna of Durham, North Carolina be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Will; and that the Trust Officer or Assistant Trust Officers be authorized to sign receipts and do all things University of Wisconsin System and the Chancellor of necessary to effect the transfer for the benefit of UW-Madison.

> (Nora Agnes Hanna's Will incorporated by reference certain provisions contained in the Will of her late husband Frank Allen Hanna, including the following:

"The remainder of my estate I give to the Library of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin."

Frank Allen Hanna received a master's degree in 1934 and a Ph.D. degree in 1941 from UW-Madison. The remainder of the Estate will amount to approximately \$350,000.)

Wisconsin Higher Education Bonds Program

Resolution 5459, which was approved unanimously by the Business and Finance Committee, was moved by Regent Nicholas, seconded by Regent Gelatt and adopted by the Board of Regents, with Regent Davis abstaining.

Resolution 5459: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Quarterly Internal Audit Update , p, 20

Regent Nicholas reported that the Business and Finance Committee was advised by Internal Audit Director Brunkow that systemwide audits of data processing programmer utilization and library acquisition/automation are in their final stages, with draft reports expected soon. Capital inventory audits were completed. A committee is to review the financial policy paper on inventories, and systemwide recommendations will be made.

The Legislative Audit Bureau has completed the field work for the federal financial aid audits at a number of institutions. The LAB also has begun an audit of the Educational Communications Board, Wisconsin Public Broadcasting Foundation, and UW-Extension WHA radio and TV.

MIS Strategic Plan Implementation, Pp 20-21

Presenting this second management information systems strategic planning report, Vice President Poellnitz advised the Committee that progress had been made despite problems with funding, staffing, pace of technological change and demand for information.

Factors affecting the strategic plan this year include the following: The Department of Administration and the Ernst and Young consultants are leading a statewide review of computing and telecommunications; WiscNet will link all UW System institutions and eight independent institutions; and CentersNet will link the centers together with an equipment grant from AT&T.

Examples of sharing and cooperation, achievements made toward the seven strategies, and recent activities of the institutions were outlined in the report. The Committee expressed approval of the progress being made in the

W-Madison Participation in WIYN Observatory

Summarizing Committee consideration of this matter, Regent Nicholas reported that Graduate School Dean Wiley and Astronomy Professor Code provided background information on the proposed consortium to construct a state-of-the-art telescope. UW-Madison would participate in the observatory with Indiana University, Yale, and the National Optical Astronomical Observatory (NOAO). The observatory would be located in Arizona and would allow for remote observing.

NOAO will provide the site for the observatory and provide the primary mirror as well as the ongoing maintenance. The three universities would provide funds for further development and operation of the observatory. UW-Madison would receive about 26 percent of the available viewing time, which would cost about \$4.3 million, to be funded by private contributions. If adequate funds were not raised, the monies would be provided by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation's annual contribution to UW-Madison.

Annual operating costs for the observatory would be around \$69,000, \$25,000 of which is for nonpersonnel items. The Astronomy Department had committed to provide \$69,000 from its operating base.

The Committee expressed concern over the potential lack of private funds sufficient to cover UW-Madison's \$4.3 million commitment. Dean Wiley assured the Committee that funding could be acquired by allocating a portion of the annual gift from WARF--currently about \$14 million. Because the project is a high-priority item, he and the Chancellor are committed to allocating first dollars from these funds to cover any fund-raising shortfall.

The Committee was very impressed with the project, but was concerned about the funding, particularly since no private funds have been raised to date. However, with the backup commitment of WARF funding, the Committee felt assured that the financial obligation will be covered. With an amendment to that effect, the Committee unanimously approved Resolution 5460.

Adoption by the Board of Regents of the following resolution was moved by Regent Nicholas and seconded by Regent Weinstein:

Resolution 5460:

That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the University of Wisconsin-Madison be authorized to take such steps as are necessary and appropriate, including becoming a member of a consortium or other nonprofit organization, to allow its Department of Astronomy to fully participate in the development and operation of an observatory, currently known as the WIYN Observatory; further, that the Chancellor or her designee is authorized to enter into such agreements on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System as are necessary and appropriate to allow the participation. In the absence of sufficient funding, the Chancellor will allocate Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation (WARF) funds for the construction of the telescope.

Regent Hanson asked if there is a definite commitment from WARF to provide the needed monies.

Replying in the affirmative, Regent Nicholas called on Dean Wiley to describe the arrangement which was being made. Because of the way in which the WARF annual gift is calculated. Dean Wiley explained, the gift could not drop below \$13 million over the period of construction of the observatory. Therefore, UW-Madison felt comfortable in providing monies from the gift as a backup funding—independent of any further action on the part of the WARF trustees.

Nevertheless, the intention was to ask the trustees in May to provide a line of credit in case the private fund-raising does not proceed rapidly enough, so that the projected payment schedule can be met over the next four years. The university was hopeful and confident that the line of credit would be granted and it would not be necessary to use funds directly from the annual gift. If subsequent fund raising still did not proceed fast enough, some funds from the annual gift would be used to repay the loan.

Pointing out that the cost itself could be reduced, Dean Wiley explained that, at the time the telescope is completed, viewing time will be determined by how much each party contributed. If UW-Madison contributed less than the estimate, the result would simply be less than 26 percent viewing time. UW-Madison would be comfortable, if necessary, in dropping back to about 17 percent viewing time, which is the current commitment of the other universities.

If the payment schedule becomes too burdensome, the university also had the alternative of dropping out with six months notice, thereby freezing in a percentage of viewing time, calculated on the basis of what had been contributed until that time. There are also possibilities for gifts-in-kind, under which part of the telescope would be constructed at UW-Madison and contributed to the consortium on a pre-agreed price.

If it were necessary to take funding from the WARF gift, Regent Weinstein asked if there is a plan as to which of the current WARF beneficiaries would suffer reductions.

Replying that the monies would come largely from the portion of the funds used for equiqment, Dean Wiley noted that part of the WARF gift is used to meet the need for frontline research equipment. If necessary, a large portion of the equipment money could be allocated to the Astronomy Department.

In response to a further question by Regent Weinstein, Dean Wiley affirmed that no funding problem would be brought to the Board for solution.

Regent Nicholas asked if the level of funding from WARF had been rising steadily over the years, and Dean Wiley replied that it had.

Regent Nicholas added that the payment schedule is six-years in length, providing considerable time to raise private money. He considered the risk a reasonable one, given the strong commitment of the chancellor to keeping a first-rate Astronomy program.

Chancellor Shalala added that raising private funds for the observatory is one of the highest priorities of the College of Letters and Sciences in the capital campaign that is to be launched in the fall.

Put to the vote, the resolution was adopted unanimously.

Regent Nikolay, Vice Chair, presented the Committee's report.



Appointed to study this issue was a 12-member committee, comprised of System Administration staff, campus administrators, student representatives and Department of Administration staff. The committee reviewed existing policies as well as traditional funding sources for the various types of facilities that the System typically constructs, including academic facilities, support space, multi-purpose space, and auxiliary operations.

In many cases, the funding source is clearly identified in existing Regent policies. However, there are many cases where the funding of facilities is not clearly specified in the context of existing policies, and funding sources have been identified on an ad hoc basis. Where no clear policy currently existed, the committee's charge was to develop a recommendation for Regent consideration. The outcome of the committee's deliberations was reflected in the draft resolution.

The planned approach was to have this item discussed by the Regents at this meeting, incorporate any revisions, and include the policy for final consideration at the May meeting. An opportunity was provided the chancellors to discuss this proposed resolution at their March Administrative Staff meeting, and several university representatives also were present at the Physical Planning and Development Committee meeting. There was general support for the proposal in that it essentially restated, but with more clarity, the existing policies of the Board.

Vice President Brown suggested adding "Land Acquisition" to the list. The UW System has been successful in its efforts to secure Building Commission approval of GPR funding to purchase land, on the basis that the state holds title to the property even though the land may be used to support a program revenue enterprise.

Chancellor Thibodeau expressed concern that the Building Commission could use this policy to require gift or grant contributions in support of academic facilities which are appropriately funded with full GPR support.

Vice Chancellor Noren shared with the Physical Planning and Development Committee the recommendations resulting from discussion by the Council of Trustees relating to this subject. While the proposed policy showed that GPR funds would not be allowed as a funding source for the Clinical Science Center, the vice chancellor and the Council were concerned that this represented an undesirable restriction on funding for a mixed-use facility such as the hospital. Even though the Regents would understand the basis for a project request involving multiple funding sources, there was concern that the Building Commission would use the policy as the basis for requiring total program revenue funding.

The Council and Vice Chancellor Noren also thought it appropriate to list program revenues as an allowable funding source in conjunction with gifts and grants. The Committee agreed to recommend these changes to the Board.

Vice President Lyon expressed his preference for a policy which would require the use of GPR funds for academic buildings, with any external monies being used for programmatic enhancements. He also thought that a stronger policy is needed to discourage external agencies from modifying the funding decisions made by the Regents in the development of its capital budget recommendations.

Ms. Anne Welch, President of the UW-Eau Claire student body, said that the students she represented endorsed the proposed policy. However, it was suggested that some other title be used instead of "typical" to describe the funding source that would normally be used for the listed projects. Staff suggested that the word "prescribed" be substituted.

The consensus, after discussion, was that the proposed policy, as reflected in the resolution and with the suggested modifications, would be helpful in approaching the 1991-93 capital budget deliberations.

The Committee recommended that the Board endorse the policy and that it be placed on the May agenda for action.

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Weinstein asked that the Council of Trustees' recommendations be reflected in the minutes and that the proposed resolution be amended accordingly.

Regent Flores agreed that the original proposal was too restrictive and would prevent receipt of more GPR funds for the hospital, which he, Regent Weinstein and others had been advocating for the last several years.

Regent President Schilling asked unanimous consent for the draft resolution to be revised as requested by Regent Weinstein. There being no objection, it was directed that the draft be revised accordingly.

W System: Approval of Report on Land Information Integration Plan, R5465

Continuing the report of the Physical Planning and Development

Committee, Regent Nikolay stated that approval was requested for President

Shaw to forward to the newly created Land Information Board the System's

plan for integrating University of Wisconsin System land information into
the Wisconsin Land Information Program. This program was created by the
1989 Budget Bill. After discussion, the resolution was adopted on a vote of
3 Ayes and 1 No.

It was moved by Regent Nicholas and seconded by Regent Vos that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5465: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents accepts the report entitled "A Plan for Integrating University of Wisconsin System Land Information Into the Wisconsin Land Information Program" for transmittal to the Land Information Board, and authorizes the President or Vice President to transmit additional data as may be required by the Land Information Board under Section 16.967, Wisconsin Statutes.

Explaining his vote against the resolution, Regent Nikolay stated his concern that the Legislature had created another government agency which would grow over the years. Because it was mandated by the Legislature, the university will have to cooperate in the study of every acre of land in the

state that belongs to any governmental unit -- state, township, village, city or county. He did not understand why the Legislature thought it necessary to do that, and he voted against the resolution in order to express his disagreement.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5465 was adopted, with Regents Doughty Luckhardt, Grover, Hanson, Nikolay, Vos and Weinstein voting "No."

1990 Report on City and County Operating Budget Support for the

The 1990 Report on City and County Operating Budget Support for the UW most new construction was nearing completion and that most municipalities would find their financial obligation turning toward remodeling, renovation and maintenance of existing facilities.

In view of the excellent facilities provided in support of the UW System educational mission by the cities and counties where the UW Centers are located. Regent Davis noted that it is appropriate to express appreciation on a regular basis for their high level of support.

Regent President Schilling agreed that it is important to express the Board's gratitude. He asked Chancellor Portch to work with Regent Davis in suggesting the appropriate occasion for doing so.

Regent Nikolay reported that the Committee was advised by Vice President Brown that the Legislative Audit Bureau held an entrance conference with System Administration representatives to discuss the audit they will be undertaking on the state's building construction supervision process and the adequacy of building maintenance programs at all state agencies.

Due to the sizeable investment in infrastructure that the UW System campuses represent as a percent of the total state investment, it was expected that the audit team will spend a significant amount of time focusing on issues that concern the UW System.

The Committee considered this audit very timely in view of activities relating to recent issuance of the paper on roles and responsibilities in the capital budget, current development of the issues paper relating to the infrastructure, and continuing efforts to achieve additional delegation of authority from the Division of State Facilities Management.

During the entrance conference, the Audit Bureau staff said they had discussed such an audit at various times over the last several years and that, among other factors, the recent series of articles in The Capital Times relating to UW-Madison remotivated them to initiate the study. The audit staff indicated that it was a staff decision to do this audit, not a legislative directive.

The draft audit report is expected to be available in September, and Regents will be provided periodic updates regarding its progress. Associate Vice President Larry Eisenberg will be the System Administration liaison to the audit team.

BYLAWS

of the

BOARD OF REGENTS

of the

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

CHAPTER I

MEETINGS AND BUSINESS OF THE REGENTS

Annual Meetings

Section 1. The annual meetings of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System shall be held, unless otherwise specially ordered, on the Friday following the first Monday in June, at nine o'clock in the morning.

Regular Meetings

Section 2. Regular meetings of the Regents shall be held on the Friday following the first Monday in each month, at nine o'clock in the morning, unless otherwise specially ordered.

Special Meetings

Section 3. A special meeting of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin System may be called at any time, upon request of at least five members of the Board or by the President of the Board. The notice calling any special meeting of the Board shall normally be served by the Secretary on each member of the Board in writing, by depositing same in the post office or telegraph office at Madison, or by personal service at least five days before the time of the meeting. Where, in the judgment of the President of the Board, following consultation with available members of the Executive

Committee, it is determined that a special Board meeting is required with notification of less than five days, but not less than two days, such a meeting may be called provided the subject is limited, all available members of the Board are queried by phone or personal contact and two-thirds of those contacted agree. Unless the call of a special meeting is limited, it shall be valid to act on any subject within the power of the Board.

Place of Meetings

Section 4. All meetings of the Board shall be held in Madison, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

Quorum

Section 5. A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Parliamentary Rules and Order of Business

Section 6. General parliamentary rules as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, current edition, and as modified by rules and regulations of the Board shall be observed in conducting the business of the Board in session.

The order of business at all meetings shall be as follows:

- 1. Calling of the roll
- 2. Reading of the minutes of the proceedings of the last meeting; amendment or approval of the same
- 3. Report of the President of the Board
- 4. Report of the President of the University System
- 5. Report of the Secretary
- 6. Reports of standing committees
- 7. Reports of special committees
- 8. Miscellaneous resolutions
- 9. Communications, petitions, and memorials
- 10. Unfinished and miscellaneous business

CHAPTER II

Officers of the Board and Their Duties

Section 1. The officers of the Board shall consist of a president, a vice president, a secretary, and such assistant secretaries as the Board from time to time shall determine, and a trust officer and such assistant trust officers as the Board from time to time shall determine.

Mode of Election

Section 2. The officers of the Board shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, and shall hold their respective offices for one year, beginning immediately upon election, and until their successors shall be elected and have qualified.

Duties of the President of the Board

Section 3. The President of the Board shall preside at all meetings, shall appoint the members of all standing and special committees of the Board, shall be an ex officio voting member of all committees, and shall discharge the ordinary duties of such officer in the pursuance of parliamentary law. The President of the Board shall, with the President of the University System, sign all diplomas and, with the Secretary countersigning, shall sign all contracts and instruments authorized or issued by authority of the Board, except such contracts and instruments as the Board or its Executive Committee may authorize any officer or employee of the University to sign. The President of the Board shall, with the President of the University of Wisconsin System, present budget requests to the Governor and the Legislature and shall act as spokesman for the Board before the Governor and before all legislative groups in matters of educational program planning, the use of existing facilities and personnel, budgetary problems, and building priorities.

Duties of the Vice President of the Board

Section 4. The Vice President of the Board shall be an ex officio voting

member of all committees, and shall, in the absence of the President,

perform all the duties of the President.

Duties of the President Pro Tem

Section 5. In the absence of the President and the Vice President the Board may appoint a president pro tem, who shall perform the duties of presiding officer of the Board.

Duties of the Secretary

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to give at least ten days' notice of the regular meetings of the Board, to keep a record of the proceedings of the Board at their several meetings, to keep a separate record of the proceedings of the Executive Committee, and a record of the proceedings of each of the standing committees, whensoever requested thereto by the Chairman; to keep the corporate seal and by countersigning execute with the President of the Board instruments and contracts ordered by the Board; and to preserve all documents pertaining to his or her office. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as are imposed on him or her by law and the rules and orders of the Board.

The Secretary shall, as soon as practicable after the record of proceedings of meetings has been perfected, transmit, by mail, to each regent a copy of the record of the meetings of the Board, and of the committees thereof. The Secretary shall maintain an up-to-date codification of all policy actions of the Board as referred to in Section 1. of Chapter V of the Bylaws.

Assistant Secretaries

Section 7. The Board shall, at the same time and in the same manner as it elects its Secretary, also elect such number of Assistant Secretaries as it shall deem necessary. The duties of the Assistant Secretaries shall be to assist the Secretary in the performance of his or her duties, and they shall perform such duties as may be assigned to them by the Secretary or the Board of Regents. In the absence of the Secretary, an Assistant Secretary shall act as and perform all the duties of the Secretary.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the Trust Officer to receive, manage, and maintain records of all trust funds of the University of Wisconsin System and to perform such other duties relating to trust funds as are imposed upon him or her by law and the rules and orders of the Board or the Business and Finance Committee of the Board. The Assistant Trust Officers shall assist the Trust Officer in the performance of his or her duties and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Trust

Officer, the Board or the Business and Finance Committee of the Board.

Trust Officer and Assistant Trust Officers

CHAPTER III

Committees of the Board

- Section 1. There shall be six standing committees of the Board of Regents as follows:
 - (1) Education Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Committee.
 - (2) Business and Finance Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Committee.
 - (3) Physical Planning and Development Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Committee.
 - (4) Executive Committee consisting of the President of the Board, who shall serve as Chairman, the Vice President of the Board, the Chairman of the Education Committee, the Chairman of the Business and Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Physical Planning and Development Committee, the member of the Board who shall have most recently been the President of the Board and one other member of the Board appointed by the President of the Board. In the event that there shall be no member of the Board who shall have previously been President of the

Board, such position on the Executive Committee shall be filled by a member of the Board appointed by the President of the Board.

- (5) Personnel Matters Review Committee consisting of at least three members appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members. The President shall designate the Chairman of the Committee.
- (6) Committee on Student Discipline and Student Governance Appeals consisting of at least three members appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members. The President shall designate the Chairman of the Committee.

Special Regent committees may be created from time to time as necessity demands by an affirmative majority vote of the Board, and the President shall appoint the members thereto and the Chairman thereof. A Special Regent Committee shall not be created for any matter which is properly before any of the standing committees.

Meetings of the committees may be called by the Chairman, or by the Secretary of the Board upon the request of two members, or upon the request of the President of the University System.

Duties of the Education Committee

Section 2. The Education Committee shall have charge of consideration of all matters of an educational nature related to the instruction, research, and public service functions of the University, the academic personnel, and to student services and welfare. The Chairman of the Education Committee may create one or more subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Education Committee and shall appoint the subcommittee members and the chairman from among those members of the Board serving on the Education Committee.

Duties of the Business and Finance Committee

Section 3. The Business and Finance Committee shall have charge of

consideration of all matters related to operating budget, finances, trust

funds, business operations, audit oversight and reviews, and to non-academic

personnel.

Authority is delegated to the Business and Finance Committee to hire investment counsel, subject to Board approval, and to give discretionary authority to investment counsel in the purchase and sale of securities within guidelines determined by the Committee. The Chairman of the Business and Finance Committee may create one or more subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Business and Finance Committee and shall appoint the subcommittee members and the Chairman from among those members of the Board serving on the Business and Finance Committee.

Duties of the Physical Planning and Development Committee

Section 4. The Physical Planning and Development Committee shall have

charge of consideration of all matters related to the capital building

program. This includes approval of budgets, advance planning, concept and

budget reports, funding and capital budget development policies, and authorization to bid and construct in connection with projects for new construction and improvements of \$30,000 or more; location of new buildings and improvements; facilities namings; gifts-in-kind of facilities; campus development and transportation plans; real estate transactions, including sale, purchase, exchange, lease, zoning, relocation costs, and condemnation; easements and land use permits; telecommunication system acquisitions; steam sale agreements; assessable improvements; and Wisconsin Environmental Policy Act implementation. The Chairman of the Physical Planning and Development Committee may create one or more subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Physical Planning and Development Committee and shall appoint the subcommittee members and the Chairman from among those members of the Board serving on the Physical Planning and Development Committee.

Duties of the Executive Committee

Section 5. The Executive Committee shall have the powers of the Board, when the Board is not in session, and shall provide for the execution of orders and resolutions not otherwise specially committed or provided for. A separate record of the proceedings of this Committee shall be kept by the Secretary, and the same shall be submitted to the Board for inclusion in the record at the next regular or special meeting.

Duties of the Personnel Matters Review Committee

Section 6. The President of the Board may refer faculty and staff personnel matters involving requests for hearing, petitions for review, and appeals to the Board to the Personnel Matters Review Committee.

- (1) Mandatory review. Where an opportunity to be heard, a review or an appeal to the Board is required by the Board's administrative rules, such as UWS 4.08, 5.14(3) or 11.10, Wisconsin Administrative Code, or under Board policies, the Committee may conduct the hearing, review or appeal. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. The Committee shall prepare recommended findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the full Board for final action.
- (2) Discretionary review. Where consideration of a matter by the Board is discretionary either under the Board's administrative rules, such as UWS 5.14(2), 6.01(5), 6.02, 11.07, or 12.05(8), Wisconsin Administrative Code, or under Board policies, or on any other basis, it shall first be determined whether the request for Board consideration should be granted. In making the determination, the following factors shall be considered:
 - (a) The case involves substantial constitutional claims;
 - (b) There is a serious concern that the chancellor has abused his/her discretion or exceeded his/her authority;
 - (c) The decision made at the institutional level could have systemwide implications; or
 - (d) The final institutional decision is based upon facts not supported by the record, resulting in material prejudice to the individual seeking review.
- (3) If the Board determines that a request for Board consideration should be granted, the Committee may conduct the review or hearing. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. The Committee shall prepare recommended findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the full Board for final action.

Duties of the Committee on Student Discipline and Student Governance Appeals

Section 7. The President of the Board may refer requests for hearing, petitions for review, and appeals involving student discipline or student governance matters to the Committee on Student Discipline and Student Governance Appeals.

(1) Student discipline matters.

- (a) Mandatory review. Where an opportunity to be heard, a review or an appeal to the Committee on Student Discipline is required by the Board's administrative rules, such as under ss. UWS 17.09 or 17.10(1) (5), Wisconsin Administrative Code, the Committee shall conduct the hearing, review or appeal. All such proceedings shall be conducted on the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. The Committee shall prepare findings and a decision, which shall be final.
- (b) Discretionary review. Where consideration of a student discipline matter is discretionary under the Board's administrative rules, such as under ss. UWS 14.10 and UWS 17.10(6), Wisconsin Administrative Code, the Committee shall first determine whether the request for consideration should be granted. In making the determination, the following factors shall be considered:

- (i) The case involves substantial constitutional claims;
- (ii) There is a serious concern that the chancellor has abused his/her discretion or exceeded his/her authority;
- (iii) The decision made at the institutional level could have systemwide implications; or
- (iv) The final institutional decision is based upon facts not supported by the record, resulting in material prejudice to the individual seeking review.
- (c) Where the review of a student discipline matter is discretionary, the Committee shall prepare a recommendation as to whether the request for review should be granted, and shall transmit it to the Board for action. If the Board determines that a request for consideration should be granted, the Committee may conduct the review. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. Unless the request for review is withdrawn, the Committee shall prepare findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the Full Board for final action.

(2) Student governance appeals.

(a) Mandatory review. Where review of a student governance matter is required by the Board's policies, such as by Regent Policy Document 86-4, Guidelines for Implementation of 36.09(5), Wisconsin Statutes, the Committee may conduct the review. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative

levels. The Committee shall prepare recommended findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the full Board for final action.

- (b) Discretionary review. Where review of a student governance matter is discretionary under the Board's policies, such as Regent Policy Document 86-4. Guidelines for Implementation of s. 36.09(5), Wisconsin Statutes, the Committee shall first consider whether the request for Board review should be granted. In making that determination, the following factors shall be considered:
 - (i) Whether there is a serious concern that the chancellor or the president has abused his/her discretion or exceeded his/her authority; or
 - (ii) Whether the decision of the chancellor or the president could have systemwide implications.
- (c) Where the review of a student governance matter is discretionary, the Committee shall prepare a recommendation as to whether the request for review should be granted, and shall transmit it to the full Board for action. If the Board determines that a request for review should be granted, the Committee may conduct the review. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. Unless the request for review is withdrawn, the Committee shall prepare a recommended decision, and shall transmit it to the full Board for final action.

CHAPTER IV

Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be added to or amended at any meeting of the Board by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the Board provided, however, that proposed amendments shall be specifically set forth in the notice of such meeting.

Suspension of Bylaws

Section 2. The Bylaws or any of them may be suspended at any meeting by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the total members of the Board and not otherwise.

CHAPTER V

SYSTEM ADMINISTRATION

President of the University of Wisconsin System

Section 1. The President of the University of Wisconsin System has full executive responsibility for the operation and management of the System. He or she shall carry out the duties prescribed in Wisconsin Statutes for this office, and such other duties as may be assigned by the Board or be implicit in policy actions of the Board. The President of the System shall see to the appropriate staffing of System administrative offices, and direct and coordinate the activities of these offices as needed to fulfill his or her responsibilities. All items to be brought before the Board of Regents for action, except matters which come to the Board pursuant to its administrative rules or existing policies and those initiating in the Board itself, should reach the Board through the President of the University of Wisconsin System and carry his or her recommendation. If an item arises at

or is related to an institution, the President shall ensure that it has first been through the established institution governance process and carries the Chancellor's recommendation; if it has not been through the institution governance process, the President shall request that it be so considered by the institution. On appeals of matters which have been through the institution governance process, the President shall verify that all institution procedures have been exhausted and will then determine whether, in the President's judgment, the Board of Regents should consider the matter. A decision by the President that the matter should not be considered by the Board can be appealed directly to the President of the Board. If the President of the Board determines that the matter should not be considered by the Board, any member of the Board may request that the matter be considered by the Board. A request that an item be considered by the Board which comes from other than the President or any member of the Board must be in writing. Persons making such requests shall be advised in writing of determinations by the President of the System and President of the Board regarding their requests. Failure by the President of the System or the President of the Board to act on a written request that an item be considered by the Board within sixty days of its receipt shall be deemed a denial of the request.

Vice Presidents

Section 2. The President shall, with the approval of the Board, establish such vice presidential offices as may be necessary to provide administrative direction and coordination for the several major functions of System administration as these are defined by the President and the Board. The President shall assign such responsibilities to each of the vice presidents as may best promote effective administration of the responsibilities of his

or her office, and shall, with the approval of the Board, title each vice presidential office in the way best suited to designate its major area of concern.

Staff Services to the Board of Regents

Section 3. The President shall, with the approval of the Board, designate a vice president as principal staff officer for each of the standing committees of the Board, or in the event of the unavailability of an appropriate vice president, an associate vice president or other major administrative officer to perform this function. The persons so designated shall provide to the committee such materials and papers as may be required for the agenda of the committee, and be prepared to respond to such other requests for information or interpretation as the committee or its members may require.

TIII. REPORT OF ACTIONS TAKEN (MEMOS OF AGREEMENT)

The UW-Madison Vice Chancellor for Administration has signed two applications for additional identification numbers from the Environmental Protection Agency for Madison campus generation and transportation of hazardous wastes, The Madison campus received its first such identification number shortly after the passage of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) in 1980. As a result of a routine inspection on January 2, 1989, the Environmenta Tompus, Day Protection Agency (EPA) issued a notice of violation which alleged that the University had failed to obtain separate EPA identification numbers for essentially each geographic block of the main campus. Following meetings and discussions with the EPA, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the University, the EPA agreed to accept the University's position that the best interpretation of RCRA regulations would require one additional number for its activity as a generator of hazardous waste. After review of the applicable regulations, the University has concluded that a separate number is required for transportation of hazardous waste to its storage facilities; therefore, application has already been made for a transporter identification number. The EPA dismissed the notice of violation after the new applications were filed.
