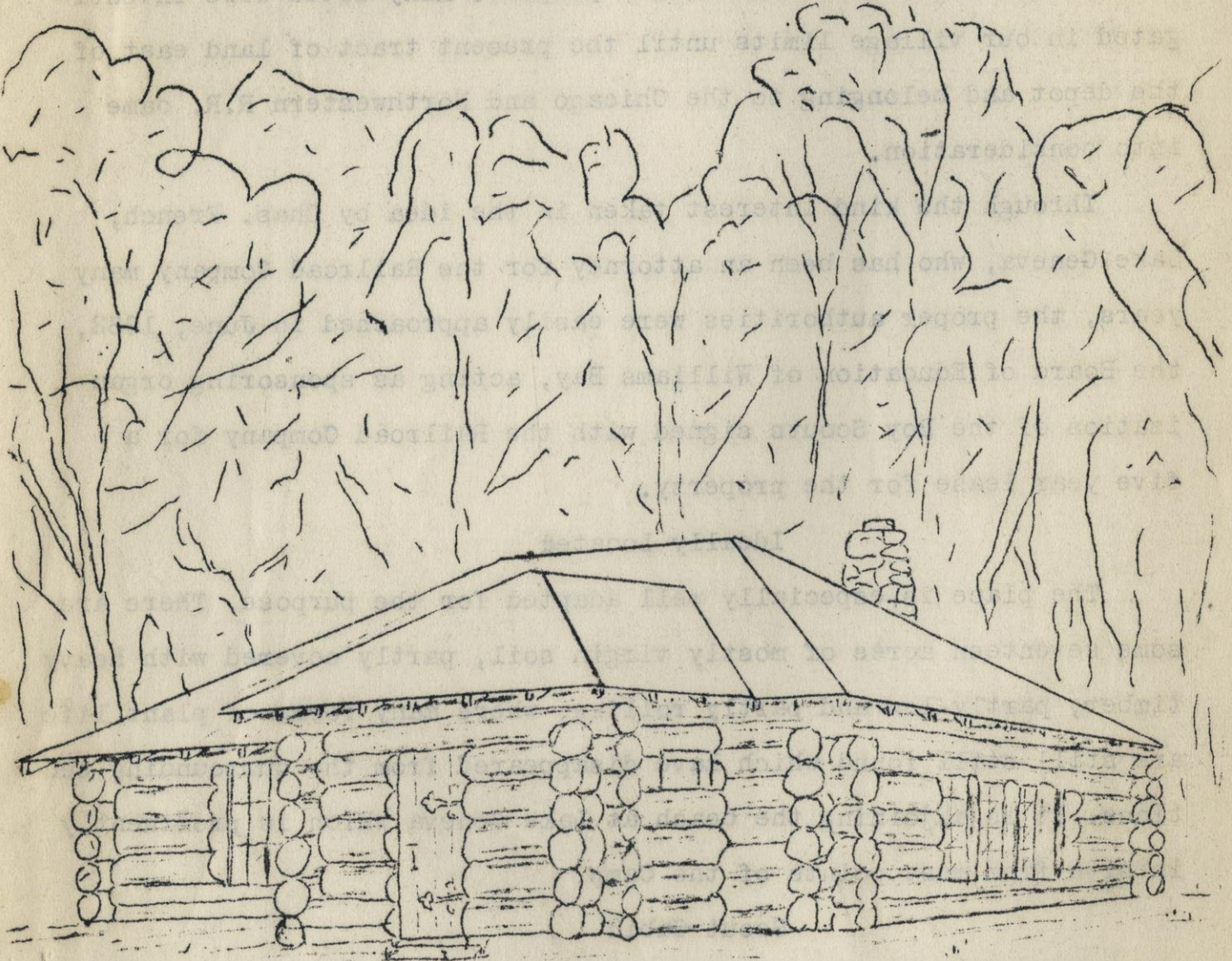

THE WILLIAMS BAY SCOUT CAMP

The idea of having a place set aside for Scoutwork in this Community came up in the Spring of 1932. Our boys at that time performed their out of door activities in various wooded plots belonging to private people or organizations. However it was felt right along that a much more effective arrangement would be to have some section specially reserved for the purpose. Many sites were investigated in our village limits until the present tract of land east of the depot and belonging to the Chicago and Northwestern R.R. came into consideration.

Through the kind interest taken in the idea by Chas. French, Lake Geneva, who has been an attorney for the Railroad Company many years, the proper authorities were easily approached in June, 1932, the Board of Education of Williams Bay, acting as sponsoring organization of the Boy Scouts signed with the Railroad Company for a five year lease for the property.

Ideally Located

The place is especially well adapted for the purpose. There are some seventeen acres of mostly virgin soil, partly covered with heavy timber, partly low and partly rolling, where many forms of plant life are still still found which have disappeared from the surrounding sections. It is adjoining the beach at Lake Geneva which is prominently in site from most points of the Camp.

Scout Cabin

One thing that has called attention to the place more than anything else is the log cabin erected in the southern oak grove. The rustic structure was planned in 1932 to provide a meeting place and shelter for the boys as well as for a responsible person to watch the grounds. The outer structure is complete but the floor has yet to be put in. Several scout groups have used it this season.

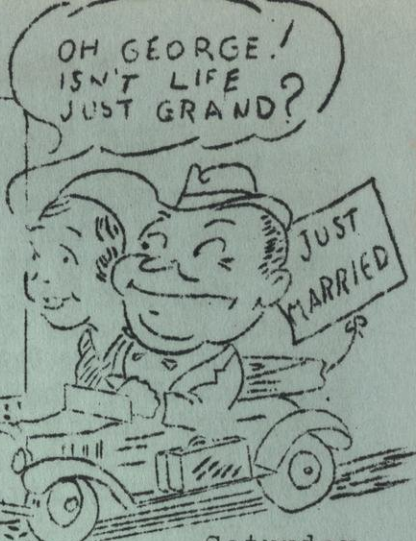

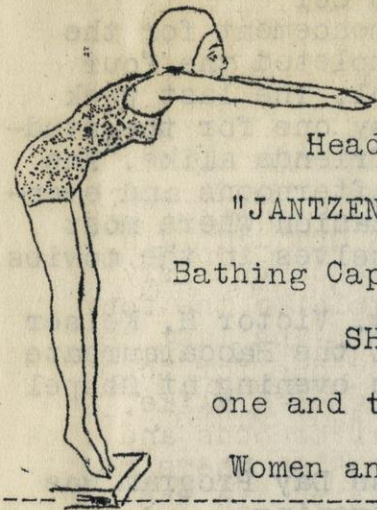

SCOUT CABIN (Con't)

It was a fortunate circumstance that the interest of Mr. and Mrs. H. Clarke could be enlisted in the project to the point of donating a fine supply of logs left from their handsome log residence was completed on the south shore of Lake Geneva. It was no small undertaking to handle these logs. It took many months, beginning in the fall of 1932 and lasting into the summer of 1933. The whole community has shown a remarkable spirit of cooperation in this work which was done entirely by voluntary contributions. Business men and contractors donated trucks, tools etc. A dozen of unemployed men worked hard at the risky job of loading and unloading the heavy logs. The two men who bore the brunt of the job were Eric Werner and Al Johnson; without counting efforts, risks or cost, they stood by during the whole undertaking, until in the summer of 1933 when over a hundred logs of various sizes had been piled up in the camp without a single mishap.

For the erection of the building the scout troop Com. worked hard gathering funds for material. Local workers volunteered equipment and labor for putting in the cement foundation. The work progressed slowly when at this point Mr. Otto Stoffregen of Cedar Point Park came forward with a liberal donation of two hundred dollars, Mrs. Hubbard Carpenter of Chicago and Lake Geneva also gave a liberal subscription. The Waukesha Lumber Co. donated the windows, local contractors made the frames and doors and erected the handsome stone fire-place. Mr. Louis Wassnussen donated liberally of labor and material, making the ornamental wrought iron hinges, which are a fine sample of his artistic skill.

SOME FIRSTS IN WALWORTH COUNTY

When the first settlers came to this region it was a part of Milwaukee County, Wisconsin Territory.

In 1838, one of the new counties made by subdividing Milwaukee was given the name Walworth at the suggestion of Col. Samuel Phoenix in honor of Judge Reuben Hyde Walworth, then President of the New York State Temperance Society.

At first the County had only five towns: Spring Prairie (Spring Prairie, LaFayette); Geneva (Geneva, Lyons, Bloomfield, Linn); Troy (Troy, East Troy); Delavan (Delavan, Darien, Walworth, Sharon); Elkhorn (Lagrange, Richmond, Sugar Creek, Whitewater).

The first apples picked in the county were from grafted trees planted in 1837 by Samuel C. Vaughn who brought them from Michigan to Spring Prairie.

Additional "firsts" will appear from week to week. They are gleaned in a study in preparation of the "Tales of Walworth County" by F.M. Van Epps. Suggestions are welcomed.
