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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, December 4, 1943, 9 A.M.

President Hodgkins presiding

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on November 6, 1943, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

President Dykstra presented the following request of Librarian Gilbert H. Doane:

That Mrs. Ethel Lynaugh be left in the classified service instead of promoted to Assistant Librarian (rank of instructor). (This rescinds the action taken by the Board at the meeting held on November 6, 1943.)

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra, and upon motion of Regent Grady. seconded by Regent Callahan, the request was approved.

President Dykstra presented a request of Dr. H. M. Coon, Superintendent of the Wisconsin General Hospital, for salary increases for sixteen employees, as follows:

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, the increases were approved.

President Dykstra discussed the basis of salaries for the 1944 summer session. Upon motion of Regent Sensonbrenner, seconded by Regent Kloczka, it was VOTED, That the compensation for teaching or other service in the eight

weeks summer session be at the rate of 20% of the previous academic years salary. (This is $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ per week which is the same rate previously paid for the six weeks summer session).

President Dykstra reported that plans for the budget for 1944-45 would be started in January or February.

President Dykstra presented the request of Dean Ingraham for an addition of \$75,000 to the Letters and Science budget for 1943-44 for military programs assigned to the college. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, the request was approved. (Increase Letters and Science salary budget \$75,000. Increase budgeted income from Federal-Arry and Navy programs \$75,000).

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That the summer session fees be as follows:

Over-all fee of \$45 for the eight-week session \$48 for the fifteen-week session.

President Dylstra reported that action on the following recommendation of the faculty of the Law School with reference to the waiver of the apprenticeship requirement was postponed at the last meeting of the Board:

- (a) That the office apprenticeship requirement be waived as to students who entered the armed services of the United States subsequent to their registration in the Law School;
- (b) That it is the sense of the faculty that a similar waiver should not be applied in the case of those who have entered the armed forces of the United States before registration in the Law School.

President Dykstra read a communication from Professor Oliver S. Rundell and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Grady, the recommendation was adopted.

President Dykstra presented the following addendum to the gift from "Two Friends of the University" setting up the Ananymous Trust Fund:

We desire that the Regents enjoy complete discretion at any time and from time to time:

- (1) To invest any part of the fund in stocks, other securities, real estate, or any other form of property;
- (2) To retain or to sell any property held in the fund, or to exchange such property for any other property;
- (3) To vote any stock belonging to the fund, and to exercise all the other rights and powers of stockholders with reference thereto, and all the rights and powers of owners of any property belonging to the fund;
- (4) To accumulate income and add it to principal, or to expend any or all of the principal at any time, and to commingle this fund with other University funds;
- (5) In general to manage and dispose of the fund or any part of it as freely as an absolute owner, for the benefit always of the work of the University in whatever way the Regents may deem wise.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Callahan, adopted.

The Secretary reported upon the stocks held in the Anonymous Trust Fund and presented a list of heldings to be increased or rounded out to consume the \$25,000 cash in the fund. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, it was

VOTED. That the purchases be approved.

The matter of assistance and advice to the Comptroller and the Secretary in the investment of trust funds was discussed. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was

VOTED, That this duty be assigned to the Finance Committee.

President Dykstra filed a report of the staff members on ledve for the year 1943-44. This was in response to the request of President Hodgkins at the November 6 meeting of the Board.

President Dykstra reported upon the cancellation by the War Department of the agreement of August 8, 1935 (extended by amendment on May 28, 1940) for the establishment and maintenance of a Civilian Conservation Corps Camp at the Arbertup

It was also reported that the Government has transferred the buildings on the Arboretum to the University.

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the reciprocal plan for non-resident tuition fees which was abolished by the Regents at their meeting on May 28, 1943, be reinstated with the following changes in procedure:

That the student be required to make application for the reduction in fees, and that the legislation outlining eligibility be amended to read as follows:

A. Undergraduate Students

Who have had one semester of academic work on a full program at the University of Wisconsin and have earned a minimum scholastic average of B (2 grade points per credit) on a full program during their last semester of attendance at the University of Wisconsin may make application for the reduction according to the regulations prescribed by the University. Reductions shall not be effective until the semester following the one in which application is made.

B. Law, Medical, and Graduate School Students

- 1. Who transfer to the University of Wisconsin from accredited institutions with a minimum scholastic average of two grade points per credit (B average) on all of their academic work at the other institutions and who make applications for reduction according to regulations prescribed by the University, or
- 2. Who have carned a minimum scholastic average of two grade points per credit (B average), or an equivalent average for Law School, on a full program during their last semester of attendance at the University of Wisconsin, and who make applications for reduction according to regulations prescribed by the University.

Students who have taken work at other accredited institutions subsequent to their attendance at the University of Visconsin must have earned the minimum scholastic average both for the last semester at the University of Visconsin and for the entire work at the other accredited institutions.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following memorandum and recommendation re University civil service employees who have reached the age of seventy years:

1. Repeal of present rule of the Regents:

At the meeting of the Regents hold on April 26-27, 1938, the following action was taken:

The Business Committee reported on the matter of retrement of civil service employees who had reached the age of 70 and upon motion of Regent Glover, seconded by Regent Brown, it was

VOTED, That such employees be placed on half time and half pay, but with the understanding that the minimum would not be less than \$50 per month and the maximum not more than \$100 per month. Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

Inasmuch as the 1945 legislature adopted a rethrement plan for state employees which becomes effective as to retirement on February 1, 1944, it is recommended that the above action of the Regents dated April 26-27, 1938, be repealed as of February 1, 1944.

2. Request to continue employment of certain persons after they have reached the age of 70 years:

Chapter 176, Laws of 1943, (Employees Resirement Act), provides for the continuation of employment after the age of 70 years, as follows:

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In the event that the continuance of an employe's service would promote the best interests of the state, an employe upon reaching the age of compulsory retirement or who, on the effective date of sections 42.60 to 42.70, has reached the age of 70 or over, may with the employe's consent, be continued in employment by his department with the approval of the bureau of personnel, for periods of not more than 2 years each, but not exceeding a total of 4 years. This subsection shall be inoperative after January 1, 1948.

At the request of the heads of departments concerned it is recommended that, subject to the approval of the Bureau of Personnel, the employment of the following persons be continued until July 1, 1944:

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Cleary, adopted.

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Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That the administrative officers of the University be directed to request the Secretary of War, or other Government official or agency, to increase the allowance to be paid by the Government for the use of the University Club property so as to avoid financial loss to either the University or the University Club during occupancy of the property by the Army.

Upon recommendation of the Comptroller and upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That employees completing their probationary period with satisfactory service records be granted the step-rate increases provided by law on the recommendation of the head of their department.

The Secretary presented a letter from J. Henry Bennett of Viroqua, Wisconsin, special counsel in the action, Democrat Printing Company vs. Zimmerman, Secretary of State and Board of Regents, requesting that Regents Grady and Kleczka appear with him in the litigation. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, the request was approved.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SECRETARY

1. That a renewal of a lease with the State Department of Public Welfare of Wisconsin for the two hundred acre farm in Chippewa County, known as the Henneman

Farm, for a period of five years from March 16, 1944, at an annual rental of \$1300, payable semi-annually, be approved. (This lease carries an option to purchase for the sum of \$25,000.)

Adopted.

2. That the segregated trust accounts known as Tripp Estate and Tripp Estate Income be closed and that new accounts be set up in the University Trust Funds to be known as Arboretum Trust Fund and Arboretum Trust Fund Income; that any balances remaining in the old accounts be transferred to the new Arboretum accounts. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, adopted.

The Secretary presented a communication from Jean Durgin of the Student Board of the Wisconsin Student Association inviting the Regents to luncheon on Friday, January 14, 1944. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Grady, it was

VOTED, That the invitation be accepted and that the Secretary express the thanks of the Regents to Miss Durgin.

The Secretary presented a communication from Helen Holden, Chairman of the Union Music Committee, Mary Valis and Helen G. Hall expressing their approciation to the Regents and the President of the University for making the President Quartet a permanent part of the School of Music.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Regents held on November 6, 1943, the following recommendation of the President under Agriculture was presented:

1. That Walter W. Wilcox be appointed professor of agricultural economics at the beginning of the second semester of 1943-44, salary at the rate of \$4500 per annum; charge to vice Johnson, \$2000 to fund 1 EI, and \$250 to fund 15 AR, p. 82, agr. econ.

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbronner, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1 under Agriculture was referred to the Executive Committee with power to act.

Regent Callahan, as Chairman of the Executive Committee, reported that the Executive Committee had met and approved the appointment of Professor Wilcox. Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the report of the Executive Committee as to the appointment of Professor Wilcox be approved, ratified and confirmed.

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Regent Jones; as a member of the Regent-Faculty Committee, reported for the committee on the School of Commerce matter in the absence of Chairman Holmes and Regent Campbell, as follows:

That pursuant to arrangements made by Chairman Holmes, a conference was held on December 3, 1943, which included eleven faculty members and five Regents. He said it was decided, with the unanimous approval of the five Regents present, that a committee of the faculty be appointed to report to the Board on or before the January 15 meeting. The report is to cover the following two items:

- (1) Appropriate type of program which the School of Commerce should undertake to best serve the interests of the state
- (2) Whether the fundamental purpose of the School of Commerce would be best served by continuing the School of Commerce as a part of the College of Letters and Science or whether it would be best served by setting the School up on an independent basis.

Dean M. H. Ingraham, Prof. F. H. Elwell, two members to be named by Dean Ingraham, two members to be named by Prof. Elwell, and the President of the University to name the seventh member.

Comptroller Peterson made a verbal report of progress on the matter of establishing a school for women radio repairmen (civilians) at the Milwaukee Center at the request of the Signal Section of the Fairfield Air Service Command.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Grady, the meeting adjourned at 11:05 A.M.
