Regent Eimon was present for the committee meetings on Tuesday and the meeting of the Medical Committee held on Monday.

Upon motion of Regent Schmidtmann, seconded by Regent Calla-han, the minutes of the last meeting of the board, held on March 5, 1930, were approved as sent out to the regents.

4 (copy on file) Architect Peabody appeared before the board with plans for the Orthopedic Hospital and distributed to the regents his letter of April 22, 1930, which included a schedule of costs. Upon motion of

Regent Schmidtmann, seconded by Regent Gundersen, it was VOTED That the plans be approved and that authority be granted to advertise for bids,

Regent Clausen, as chairman of the Finance Committee in the absence of Regent Butler, explained the budget for 1930-31 and presented the following recommendation:

That the budget for 1930-31, as amended by the Finance Committee, be adopted, with the following additional amendments:

- That the summer session budget in the future be submitted to the Finance Committee on a date to be fixed in advance of the meeting.
- That the business office establish a system of unit costs of instruction.
- That the purchase of athletic equipment and supplies be made through the regular channels of the purchasing department.

- 4. That the business office inaugurate a system of distribution of expenditures under teaching, extension and research.
- 5. That all drafts on Regents' Unassigned effecting a prior obligation on new budgets be so noted at time of recommendation.
- 6. That the University Extension Division prepare and forward to the business manager a monthly report of receipts, expenditures and balances, similar to the reports now received from the Hospital, Dormitories and Commons and Athletic Council.
- 7. That \$500 of the salary of J. R. Lane in the Department of Speech be transferred from Revolving Fund 5 E to Specific Fund 1 A.
- 8. That \$500 be added in connection with the consolidation of the Athletic Council Press Service and the University Press Bureau.
- 9. That the salary of Professor Ernst Voss be increased \$250.
- 10. That the salary of Professor Paul A. Knaplund, Professor of History, be increased to \$6500, the additional \$1500 required being taken from the \$2700 allotment in the history budget for Assistant Professor Sellers, who is to be on leave during 1930-31, without pay.
- 11. That the balance of \$1200 in the budget allotment for Assistant Professor Sellers (see preceding item) be distributed as follows: \$600 to fund for assistants in history and \$600 to fund for assistants in Spanish and Portugese.
- 12. That the appointments, reappointments, promotions, resignations and leaves of absence, as submitted in the budget for 1930-31, be approved as shown in Exhibit A attached.

Beginning with the 1932-33 academic year, industrial arts education will be on the graduate level only.

Summer session offerings and enrollment in summer session courses will not be affected by the changes outlined above.

This reorganization is being made to do away with duplication in the undergraduate offerings at the University of Wisconsin with those of certain Wisconsin normal schools and Stout Institute.

A consideration of the relative advantages and disadvantages of the two proposals show the following factors:

(1) Financial. It would cost from \$50,000 to \$100,000 to construct or equip a separate laboratory that would be suitable to take care of the existing needs of the Foundation. This would involve at present time a chemical, bacteriological, and a physiological laboratory, together with animal facilities for rat and small animal work; also poultry and some livestock work.

On the basis of Plan 2 remodelings can be made in our existing University equipment that will provide reasonable facilities for less than \$5,000.

(2) <u>Duration of the work</u>. As the Foundation Trustees see their problem of laboratory control, this work will be much heavier in the immediate future, say from the present time to three or four years hence than it will later. Hence there is not the apparent necessity of providing permanent quarters for long time operations.

Consequently it seems inadvisable to spend a relatively large sum of money for capital outlay, thereby depleting the research funds that otherwise would be allocated by the Foundation to support needed University research.

- (3) Convenience of Scientific Staff. It would be very much more convenient for a staff worker to have this Foundation work as closely associated with his other work as possible. This would not only save time and money, but would coordinate the investigation more closely than would be the case if the work was to be carried out in a building off the campus.
- (4) Practicable to Keep Operations Separate. Our past experience with the other control laboratories that belong to the several departments of state indicates that it is a perfectly feasible method to maintain these two organizations apart so far as supplies, staff, etc. are concerned.

In case Plan 2 was adopted it would be expected that the University would acquire possession of all improvements, equipment, etc. when the Foundation found its work brought to a close.

The Trustees of the Research Foundation have authorized me to present to the Regents the request that a memorandum agreement be drawn that will embrace the following principles:

- (1) Necessary remodelling in basement of Agricultural Chemistry Building to provide added rat room and laboratory facilities.
- (2) Selection of a competent chemist to take charge of laboratory (under general direction of Dr. Steenbock).

- (3) Provision of necessary laboratory assistance to operate laboratory.
- (4) Furnishing equipment of cages, animals, and maintaining necessary laboratory expenses.
- (5) Provision for an administrative office of the Foundation and its equipment in some of the University buildings.
 - (6) Pay a fair rental value of the space used.

For the above purposes the Foundation Trustees have set aside the necessary funds to accomplish the above objects, which will cost for the ensuing year from \$10,000 to \$12,000.

In considering this proposition it should be kept in mind that this Control Laboratory is not to be confused with the aid which the Foundation is now beginning to give to fundamental research in the University.

Already it has allocated \$10,000 a year for a period of several years to enable major investigations to be inaugurated on the physiological activity of the fungi. Certain constructional improvements will be required to enable this work to be most satisfactorily undertaken. These amounts aggregating from \$2,500 to \$3,000 the Foundation is willing to have taken from the initial grant of \$10,000 which has already been allocated for this mold work. The administration of this fund will be made through Dean Slichter's Committee in charge of University Research. This will coordinate the research resources whether they are derived from the state or come from the Alumni Research Foundation.

Further the Foundation has authorized the following grants in aid to various University research workers.

Altogether this shows about \$20,000 this year being devoted by the Foundation to University Research purposes.

If the Board of Regents approve this Plan 2 for the organization of this control work, the enclosed memorandum agreements will suffice to complete this program.

The Faculty of the College of Letters and Science, with the concurrence of the Faculty of the College of Agriculture, recommends to the University Faculty:

- 1. That a School of Education of coordinate college rank, as authorized by chapter 33 of the Laws of Wisconsin, 1919,* be established, with jurisdiction over the undergraduate preparation of teachers, by merging the various agencies and undergraduate courses of teacher-preparation now in operation in the University, including the Wisconsin High School, in accordance with the following provisions.
- 2. The Faculty of the School of Education shall consist of: (a) the members of the department of education, of the department of industrial education and applied arts, and of the (scholastic) department of physical education, and (b) of those faculty members whose college teaching is confined to the so-called Teachers' Courses in the different subjects, who (woth "a" and "b") are hereby transferred to the School of Education and to its budget; and (c), on the analogy of the Graduate School, of those members of departments of the other undergraduate colleges and schools who offer courses of junior or senior grade for teaching majors or other courses of content type required in the School of Education; but these ("c") members of the Faculty shall remain on the budgets to which they are now attached. The chairman of the department of education and the members of the department of education offering junior or senior courses of a non-technical nature (courses in the history, principles, philosophy and psychology of education) shall continue to be members of the Faculty of the College of Letters and Science also, although remaining on the budget of the School of Education, and these courses shall continue to constitute a part of the Letters and Science offering in liberal studies.

^{*}This statute amends section 36.13 of the revised statutes by striking out the provision for a Training School for Public Service and adding one for a School of Education. The section as amended reads as follows: "56.13. University; courses; departments. The object of the University of Wisconsin shall be to provide the means of acquiring a thorough knowledge of the various branches of learning connected with literary, scientific, industrial and professional pursuits, and to this end it shall consist of the following colleges or departments, to wit:

The instructors mentioned in "b" shall be members of their respective departments in the School of Education.

- (Broadly speaking, juniors and seniors who are candidates for the University Teachers' Cortificate will be students in the School of Education. Exceptions are noted below.) The students in the School of Education shall consist of (a) candidates for the bachelor's degree and the University Teachers' Certificate who have completed the requirements of the first two years in one of the general courses of the College of Letters and Science or of the College of Agriculture with credits and grade points which would entitle them to registration as juniors in such College or who have completed equivalent studies elsewhere, and (b) students registered in the Industrial Education, Applied Arts, and Physical Education courses. *(c) Studentsin-the-School-of-Education specializing-in Agriculture er-Heme Economics shall register-alse in-the Gollege of-Agriculture. Students specializing in Agriculture and Home Economics shall register in the College of Agriculture and in the School of Education, and shall receive the degree of BACHELOR OF SCIENCE (Agriculture and Education) or the degree of BACHELOR OF SCHENCE (Home Economics and Education). (d) Other students in special courses having a complete two-year or four-year curriculum, as Chemistry, Commerce, Journalism, and Music, shall retain their present classification; but if they desire to receive the University Teachers' Certificate, they must also register in the School of Education and meet such requirements as may be agreed upon by the College of Letters and Science and the School of Education.
- Until other requirements are set up by the Faculty of the School of Education (with the concurrence of University Faculty and Regents), the major and other requirements for graduation from the School of Education with the University Teachers' Certificate shall be those at present in force for a bachelor's degree and the University Teachers' Certificate.
- 5. Students completing the graduation requirements of the School of Education shall receive the degree of Bachelor of Science (Education) and the University Teachers' Certificate.
- 6. The Committee on the Training of Teachers shall become a committee of the Faculty of the School of Education.
- 7. The Faculty of the School of Education shall possess the usual jurisdiction and powers of a coordinate college or school of the University, with the customary right (University Faculty and Regents concurring) to prescribe and modify requirements for entrance thereto and graduation therefrom. The Faculties or Departments of the other undergraduate colleges and schools may not establish courses of a pedagogical or professional-educational type. The School of Education may not establish on its own budget content courses in subjects normally entrusted, in the first instance, to departments of the other colleges or schools of the University.

- 8. (a) Students regularly enrolled in the other colleges and schools of the University will be permitted, subject to the consent of their deans, or other agencies constituted for the purpose, to elect such courses in the School of Education as are open to general registration, provided they have the scholastic prerequisites therefor; but with the exceptions noted under sub-section "d" of section 3, above, only students taking their degree in the School of Education may receive the University Teachers' Certificate and the recommendation of the School of Education. (b) The School of Education will protect the right and opportunity of any student in the University to obtain from the State Superintendent a license to teach, by offering - in addition to the integrated courses which are open only to students in the School of Education as defined in section 3 - the courses required by the State Superintendent for a license. But the departmental Teachers Courses open to their election will be offered only in the Summer Session; and the Faculty of the School of Education shall have the right to modify this regulation as experience may warrant.
- 9. The School of Education shall go into operation at the opening of the academic year 1930-31. Candidates for the University Teachers' Certificate who meet the present requirements by August, 1931, may, however, obtain their degrees and certificates under the old regulations at present in force.
