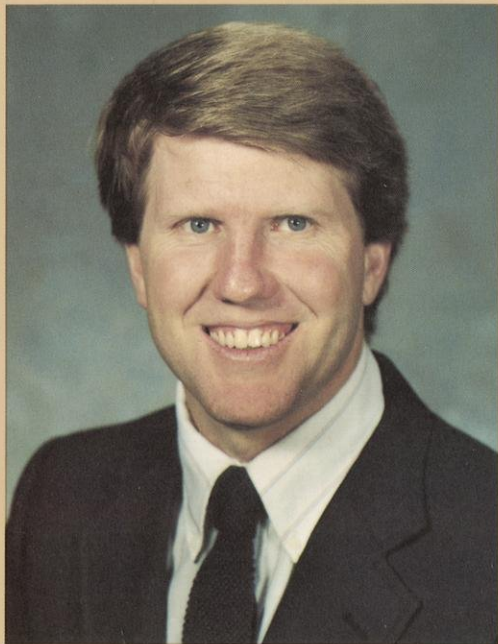

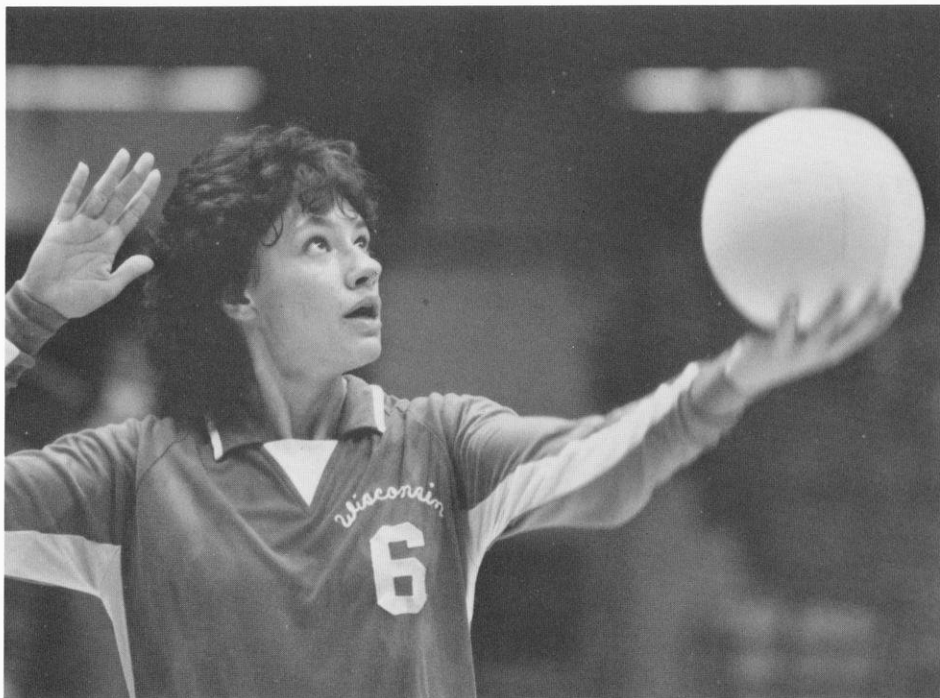

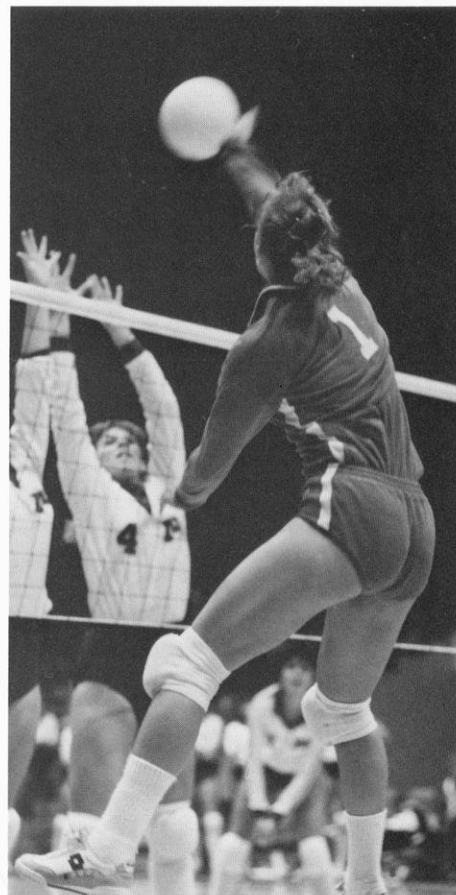

The Coaches



Head Coach Steve Lowe begins his second year with the Badger program

Head Coach—Steve Lowe

Steve Lowe enters his second year as head coach of the University of Wisconsin women's volleyball team after leading the Badgers to their most successful finish since 1980 last season.

A native of Iowa City, Iowa, Steve was the assistant coach at the University of the Pacific from 1983 until his appointment at Wisconsin in 1986. As the first assistant and primary recruiter, Steve aided the Tigers in winning the 1985 NCAA Division I Championship title. UOP also claimed the 1986 NCAA championship title. The Tigers were also in the NCAA final four two other years, placing third in 1984 and fourth in 1983.

In addition to his coaching duties, Steve works as a technical consultant in sports psychology with the United States National Women's Volleyball team. Teaching techniques in goal setting, concentration and motivation, Steve develops individual mental preparation programs for each national team player. He has also worked as a mental preparation consultant with university and high school athletes.

Steve is a 1978 psychology graduate of the University of Iowa. He received his master's degree in applied behavior analysis with a specialization in athletics from the University of the Pacific in 1981. He served as a lecturer in psychology of coaching and volleyball at the UOP two years.

Active in the USVBA, Steve augmented his UOP coaching duties as head coach of the Stockton Volleyball Club, and assistant coach of the Cascade Steelers, two United States Volleyball Association teams.

He has also been active in writing performance enhancement curriculum, and is a frequent speaker at symposiums and clinics. He has produced several videotape training packages for use in university and high school volleyball programs.

Steve and his wife Lori have two children—Ian, five and Jeffrey, one.

Assistant Coach—Stephanie Hawbecker

Strong playing experience and extensive coaching experience are added to the Wisconsin staff this year as Stephanie Hawbecker begins her first year as assistant coach. A former volleyball standout at Illinois State, Hawbecker started three years for the Red Birds. She led State to the Gateway Conference Championship in 1982 and an appearance in the NCAA post-season tournament that same year. Hawbecker also competed for the Red Bird basketball team her senior year prior to receiving her degree in physical education in 1983.

Hawbecker spent the next two years gaining extensive clinic and camp coaching experience while she worked on her master's degree in physical education at Illinois State. She was named the assistant volleyball coach at Southwest Missouri State in 1985 where she also served as an instructor in physical education.

Lowe's Coaching Philosophy

"Central to my philosophy of coaching is the belief that coaches are primarily teachers, and that their main task is to provide a positive learning environment. In this environment, the players should be rewarded for developing and improving their skills. The players should be challenged to maximize their potential. They should be presented with new creative ideas that will challenge them to be the best they can be.

"As a coach, I must try and develop the total person—physical, mental, social and emotional. In collegiate athletics, a coach must never lose sight of the academic, social and athletic needs of the athletes. I truly believe in the concept of the student-athlete.

"I believe sports should be fun. I love my job because it is both challenging and fun. I want the players who play for me to feel the same way. I feel they will play to the best of their ability if they truly enjoy playing. There are numerous rewards from athletics, and it is my job as a coach to make sure my players receive these rewards. I will have succeeded as a coach if I can honestly say I provided as positive an experience as possible for each one of my athletes."



1987-88 Season Preview



"I look for us to be a team that blocks very well," says Lowe. "Our right side attack is going to be very strong and we're going to be a team that sides out very well. We've got a good group of hitters returning and we can hit the ball well. Our weakness, if you want to call it that, is that we need to be a better defensive and ball control team."

Lowe will challenge opponents with the use of two or three defenses as he looks to take away opponent's strength. The Badgers will also change to a 6-2 offense to improve ball control and the transition from defense to offense.

"The team is familiar with my offense and my defense, and that will be an advantage this season," Lowe said. "They know me, and they know the system, and they have a lot of confidence in each. I can instill confidence in them because I know the Big Ten. I know what it takes to win in the Big Ten and that's going to help us this year."

The Badgers return 10 letterwinners from last year's team, including seven seniors. Leading the team as captain is two-time All-Big Ten honorable mention selection **Margaret Kaminski**. Kaminski, a senior from South Bend, Ind., led the team last season in service aces with 37. The Badger's leading passer and percentage hitter, Kaminski led the team in digs with 325 and in hitting efficiency at .272 percent for 13th in the conference. A vital part of the Wisconsin offense, Kaminski finished third on the team in kills with 270 and third in blocks with nine block solos and 103 block assists.

Kristen Roman, a senior from Barrington, Ill., has been Wisconsin's leading hitter for the past three seasons. Last year, she scored 293 kills averaging 2.44 per game. Roman finished second on the team in digs with 297 and second in service aces with 32. The all-time kill leader at Wisconsin with 926 career spikes, she can hit a variety of shots and is one of the Badgers strongest hitters.

Returning as one of the conference's leading blockers is senior **Connie Venzke**. Venzke, from Athens, Wis., finished third in the Big Ten in blocking with 1.33 blocks per game. She led the team in blocks per game with 1.27, and finished second on the team in total blocks with 25 block solos and 105 block assists. Venzke finished fourth on the team in kills with 205 and fourth in digs with 204.

Also returning at middle blocker is **Tracy Tiffany**. Tiffany, a senior from Richland, Mich., had 10 block solos and 68 block assists last season. An excellent offensive attacker in the middle, she recorded 188 kills last year and is the best

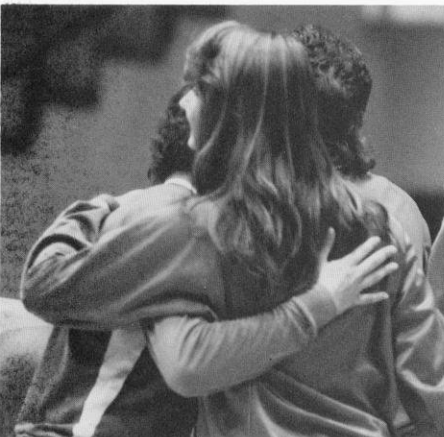
The first act was a success and now it's time for the curtain to rise on the second act as Steve Lowe enters his second year as head volleyball coach at the University of Wisconsin. In his first year of coaching, Lowe led the Badgers to a 16-18 record, more than doubling the number of wins from the previous season, and the best season since 1980. Now the curtain is ready to rise on his second year and Lowe is set for some outstanding performances.

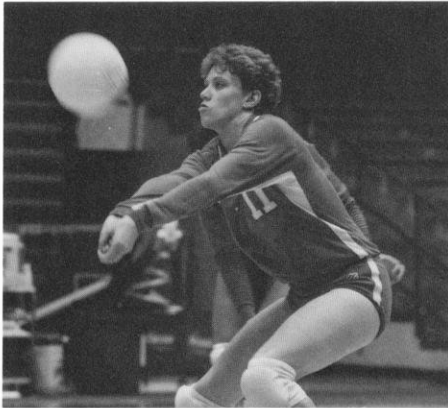
"I'm looking for us to be much more competitive in every match we're in," says Lowe of the 1987 season. "We'll battle every team we play."

Wisconsin finished in a tie for eighth in the Big Ten Conference with a 5-13 record, its best finish in three years. Upset victories over Indiana and Purdue as well as wins over Michigan and Michigan State (two) make the Badgers one of the most promising teams in the conference.

"I truly believe we are an up-and-coming program in the Big Ten," said Lowe. "I'm looking for improvement over last season. We need to improve upon 16-18. We're a veteran team and we're not afraid of competing in the Big Ten. We had to instill a belief that we could beat those teams and we did that."

Lowe, who works with the United States National team as a psychological consultant, has instilled in the Badgers a self-confidence that makes them a mentally tough team. His coaching experience with the 1985 NCAA Championship team from the University of the Pacific has also made the Badgers a more highly skilled team.





quick-set hitter on the team. Tiffany finished fourth on the team last year in service aces with 24, and fifth in digs with 201. She had an outstanding spring season according to Lowe, and will be even more of an offensive threat for the Badgers this fall.

Ranking second on the team in kills last season was **Liz Potempa**. Potempa, a senior from Palatine, Ill., recorded 284 kills in addition to her solid all-around play. She finished third on the team in digs with 215 and fifth in blocks with 11 block solos and 55 block assists. Potempa ended the season as the Badgers' most consistent hitter, scoring a career high 20 kills against Ohio State.

One of the top two passers and defensive players on the team is **Beth Sweeney**. Sweeney, a senior from Columbia, Mo., was voted the Badgers' Most Inspirational Player last season after coming back from knee surgery. She strengthened the Wisconsin defense with 61 digs and had a career high three service aces against Michigan State. A team player, Lowe expects Sweeney to be a major contributor to the team this fall.

Rounding out the Badger seniors is **Amy Lienhard** from Lawrence, Kan. Lienhard is a very versatile athlete who can play a variety of positions. She scored 50 kills last year as well as 26 total blocks and 105 digs. An excellent server, Lowe expects Lienhard to have her best season as a senior.

Sharing the setting duties last season were **Lori Lang** and **Susan Temple**. Lang, a sophomore from Libertyville, Ill., totaled 712 assists for a 7.57 assists per game average. A very athletic setter, Lang made a quick transition from outside hitter to setter prior to last season. She recorded 53 kills and 196 digs last season, as well as blocking 49 shots.

Temple, a sophomore from San Clemente, Calif., had an outstanding freshman year despite missing the last part of the season due to an ankle injury. She recorded 179 digs and 526 assists averaging 7.41

assists per game. The team's best server, Temple scored 28 service aces, including a career high of four service aces in three matches. A very intelligent player, Lowe believes Temple is one of the most promising setters in the Big Ten.

Hoping to contribute more her sophomore season is **Mary Johnson**. Johnson, from Lafayette, Calif., is a versatile player who will help the Badgers in a number of positions. Playing only a limited time as a freshman, she scored 12 kills and 12 digs. Johnson had a very good spring, improving her passing and hitting.

Three outstanding freshmen, **Mary Penosky**, **Lisa Boyd** and **Jackie Johnson** join the team in 1987.

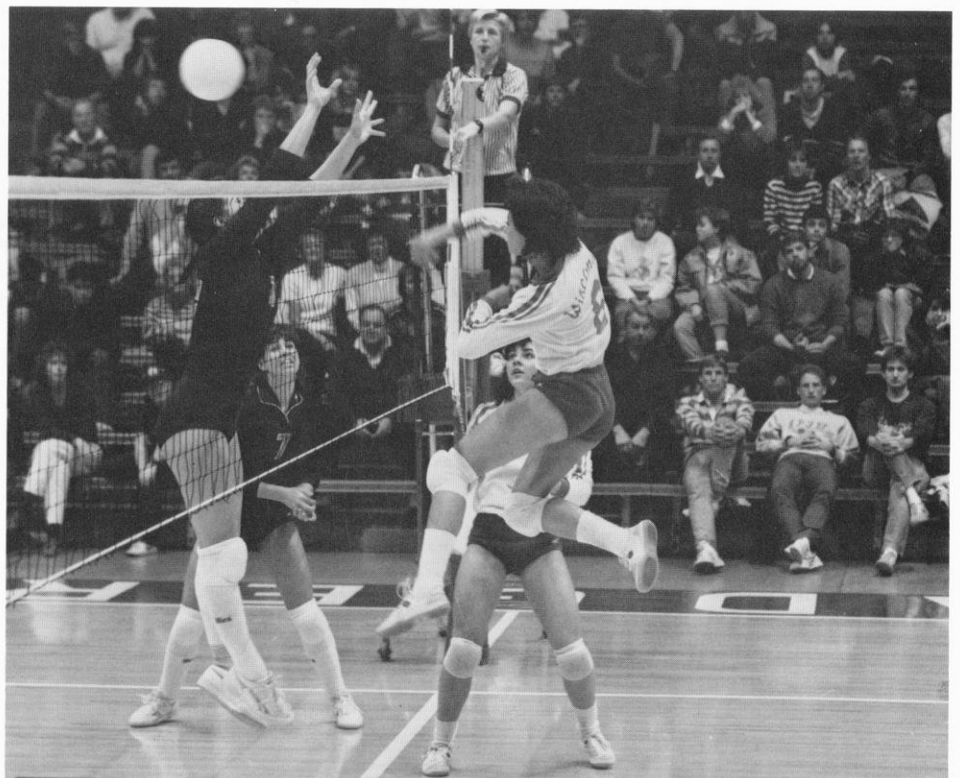
"We have three kids that I think are going to come in and contribute right away," said Lowe of his freshmen. "They're going to really push the people ahead of them."

Penosky, from Joliet, Ill., led St. Francis Academy to a second-place finish in the state large school division and was named to the all-tournament first team. An all-state first team selection by the *Champaign News Gazette* and a second team all-state selection by the *Chicago Tribune*, she was also named to *Midwest Volleyball* magazine's Mighty '86 team. Penosky plays both the outside hitter position and sets in a 6-2 offense. Lowe predicts Penosky will be one of the top freshmen in the Big Ten in 1987.

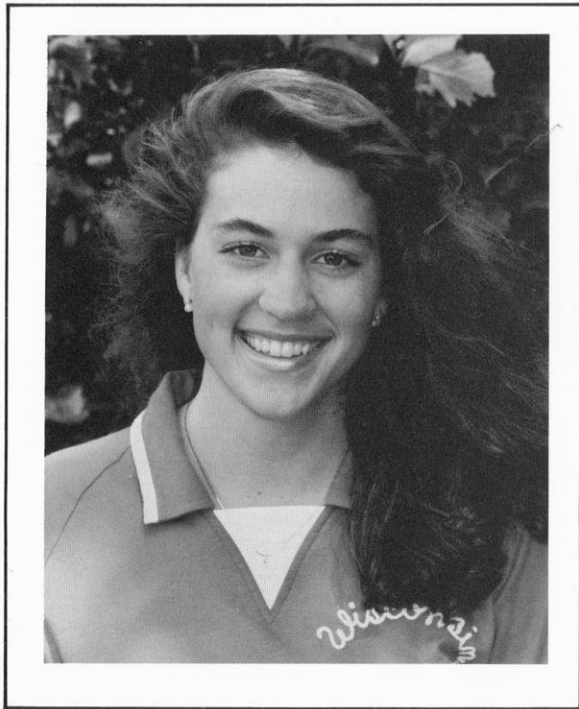
Boyd, from Dolton, Ill., was an all-divisional and all-regional selection from Marion Catholic High School. Ranked by Pat Zartran's Rating Service as one of the top 25 players in the country, Boyd was also named to the Mighty '86 team by *Midwest Volleyball* magazine. An outstanding blocker and defensive player, Boyd is also a good offensive player.

Johnson, from nearby Madison West High School, was a first team all-state selection and two-time all-conference selection. She led her team to a 1986 Class A second-place finish, and was a four-year volleyball and track letterwinner. She was a member of the West track team that won the 1985 state Class A team title. A four-year state track competitor, she also was a member of the 1986 state Class A mile relay championship team. She placed sixth in both the triple and long jump in the 1987 State meet. Two other freshmen should help complement the Badger squad: **Amy Thoss** of Palos Heights, Ill., and **Alison Abraham** of Menomonee Falls, Wisconsin.

The actors are ready for outstanding performances and the director is ready for the second act to begin. You'll want to come out and watch, for according to Lowe, "We're a team that's dedicated to being the very best that they can be and they have a lot of fun doing it."

Wisconsin Sports Facilities

Athletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from some of the finest sports facilities found anywhere in the country. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its women athletes.

The basketball and volleyball teams practice and compete in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse, which seats 12,204. The Fieldhouse features four remodeled locker rooms and a modern athletic training area. Other recent additions include a new lighting system and new sound system.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have a competitive advantage in their ability to play year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States. Ranked by the USTA as the number one tennis facility in the country, the \$2 million Nielsen Tennis Stadium seats 1500 spectators. It features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, and one squash doubles court.

The stadium, located close to the lakeshore dormitories, is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

Wisconsin's track teams benefit from practicing and competing during the indoor season in the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. Located next to Camp Randall Football Stadium, the "Shell" contains a 220-yard Mondo rubber track, throwing and jumping areas in the infield, and a seating capacity of 2500.



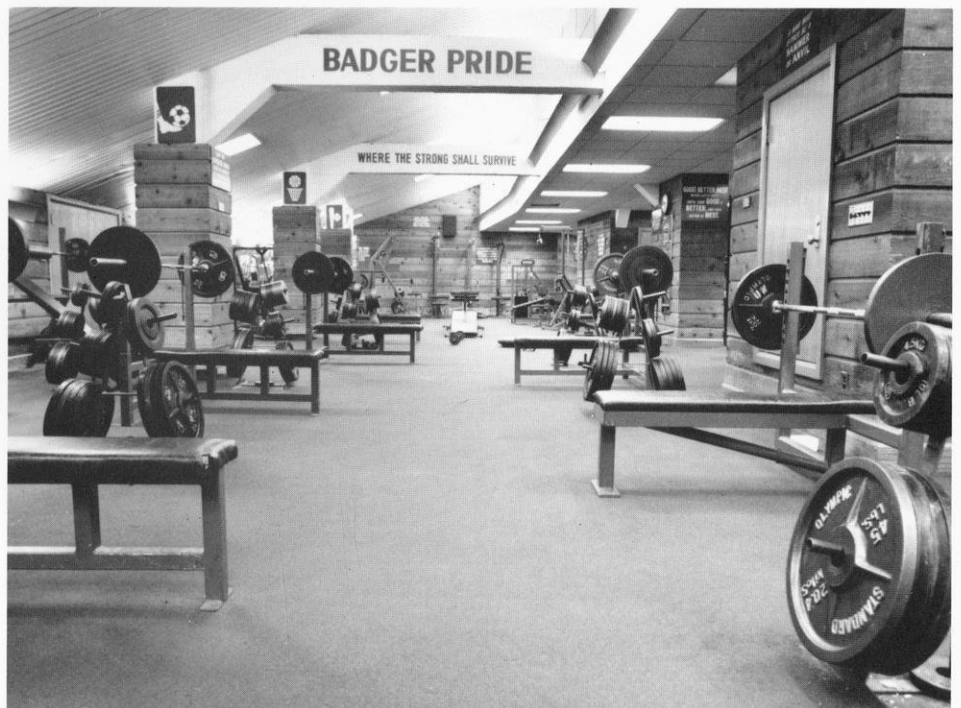
Nielsen Tennis Stadium was ranked the number one tennis facility in the country by the United States Tennis Association.

During the outdoor season, Wisconsin track and cross country athletes have the opportunity to use one of the finest tracks in the Midwest. The newly renovated 400-meter, Mondo rubber outdoor track is located on the west side of campus. The Dan McClimon Memorial Track, dedicated in honor of the former Wisconsin head men's track and cross country coach, was

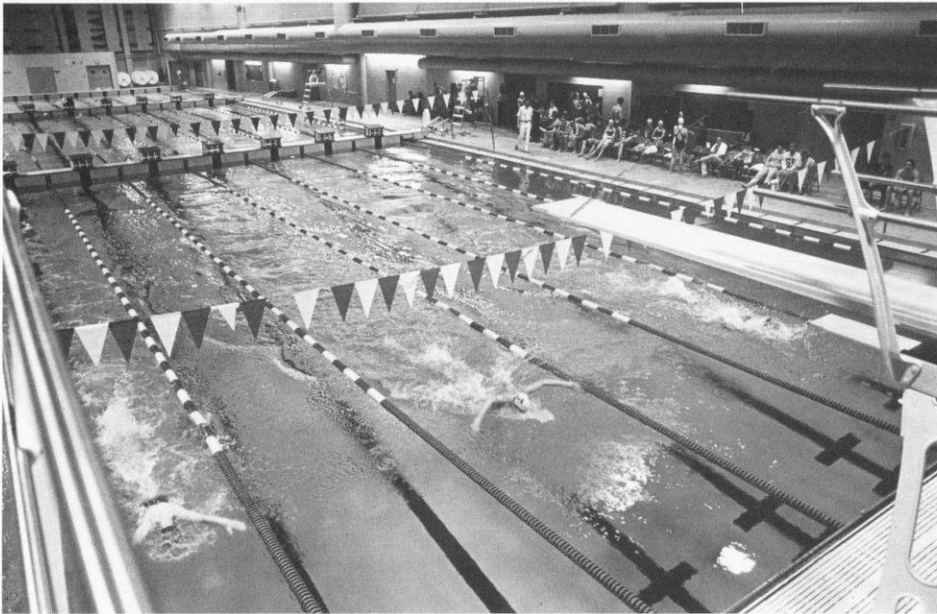
the site of the 1986 Men's and Women's Big Ten Outdoor Track Championships. Planning and fund-raising are underway for the next phase of construction: the addition of permanent spectator seating with press box and locker room facilities.



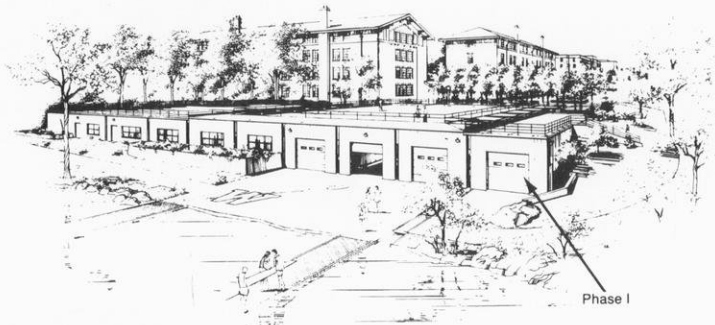
UW Women's Athletics is located on the third floor of Camp Randall Football Stadium.



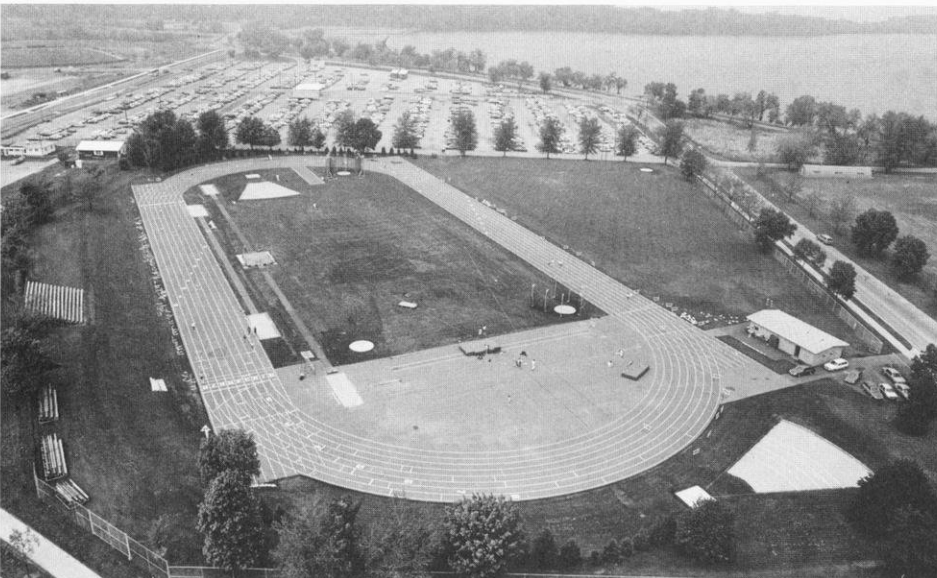

Artist's rendering of plans for remodeled UW boat house. Phase I (additional shell storage) has already been completed.

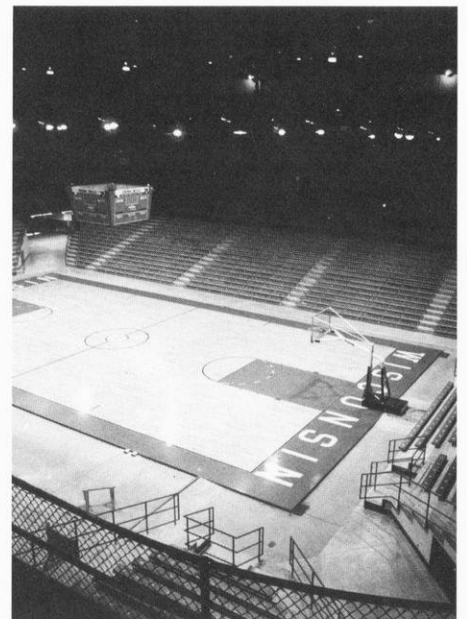


The newly resurfaced UW Outdoor Track was the site of the 1986 Big Ten Men's and Women's Outdoor Track and Field Championship. Fund-raising is underway for the construction of permanent spectator seating, a press box, and locker rooms.

The swimming and diving team has the luxury of having two pools where they practice and compete—the Natatorium adjacent to Unit II, and the new Unit III facility, or SERF. The “Nat” contains an eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with a fully automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50'x40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The recently completed Unit III facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

The Wisconsin men's and women's gymnastics teams train and compete in the renovated Armory located on central campus along Lake Mendota. Better known on campus as the Red Gym, the facility provides over 15,000 square feet of training space and spectator seating. Gymnasts are provided plenty of working space and equipment, including a large foam training pit, 10 balance beams, four sets of uneven parallel bars, and ample floor exercise practice space.

Outdoor facilities at Wisconsin include soccer fields adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium. The crew boat house, situated on Lake Mendota, provides the Badger crews with a modern facility, including an indoor rowing tank for year-round practice. Construction was just completed on an additional shell storage area, and other construction plans include a second indoor rowing tank and additional locker room space.



The UW Fieldhouse is the home of the men's and women's basketball, and the women's volleyball teams. Located adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium, the Fieldhouse seats over 12,000 people for athletic events.

Our teams also have access to several other facilities on campus. The Natatorium and SERF feature numerous multi-purpose gyms, weight rooms, running tracks, and other athletic facilities for practice and competition.

Other facilities that are an integral part of the athletic program are the coeducational weight training and sports medicine rooms in Camp Randall Stadium. The modern weight training area features Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in a spacious, fully carpeted room in Camp Randall. Two full-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.

The care, prevention and treatment of injuries to all Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a six-person staff of N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. They are supported by a staff of 25 student trainers and two certified graduate assistants as they care for the nearly 900 men and women athletes at Wisconsin.

The staff utilizes training rooms in the Stadium, Armory, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Fieldhouse. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists assigned to intercollegiate athletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.

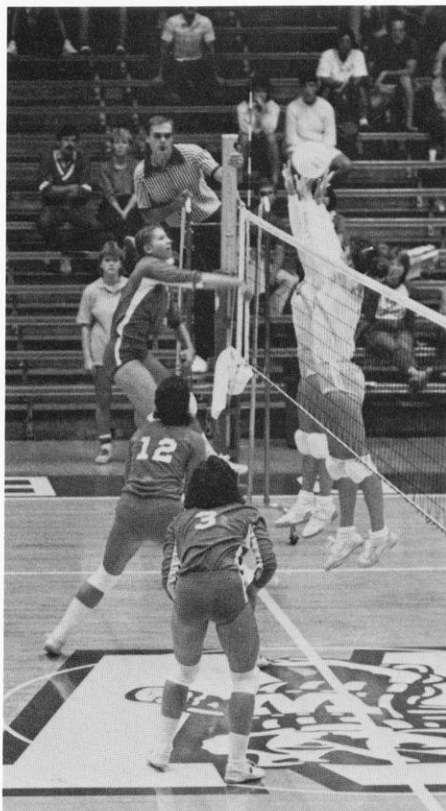


Indoor track facilities are located in the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center adjacent to Camp Randall Football Stadium.

Madison is a clean, vibrant city whose chief businesses are education and government. Located just three driving hours from Chicago, one-and-one-half hours from Milwaukee, and five hours from Minneapolis, Madison is consistently rated as one of the most attractive places to live in the country. In 1978, Madison proudly accepted the designation of All-American City given by the national Municipal League.

The Madison campus is located just one mile from the state capitol on a series of hills overlooking scenic Lake Mendota, the largest of the chain of lakes.

The campus covers over 900 acres—most within two blocks of Lake Mendota. Many of the residence halls have the lake in their backyard, and there are numerous bathing beaches along the Mendota shoreline. In addition, the UW Arboretum, a nature study and hiking area, offers another 1,224 acres to the campus community. Also located near the campus is Picnic Point, a 129-acre, park-like peninsula which extends into Lake Mendota and is used for nature study and recreation. Jogging paths and bike trails extend along the entire campus shoreline of Lake Mendota.
