MADISON--Four weekly newspaper executives will be headliners when the Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA) holds its 29th annual fall conference Oct. 31-Nov. 1 at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

The newsmen will join faculty members in a discussion of "Journalism Education, Its Purpose and Direction" at 9 A.M. Saturday, Nov. 1, at Wisconsin Union South.

WNA Pres. Jack Howe, Prairie du Chien, will preside, with Doug Lyke of Ripon, and Howard Sanstadt and Jim Kalkofen, both of Wautoma, taking part in the panel. Director William A. Hachten and Prof. James A. Fosdick will represent the School of Journalism and Mass Communication.

The American Bicentennial will be highlighted in two events Friday, Oct. 31, a tour of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin and an evening banquet address at the Sheraton Inn by a UW-Madison historian, Dean David Cronon of the College of Letters and Science.

Conferees also will attend an information session on WNA, which now includes both weekly and daily newspaper members, and attend the Wisconsin-Illinois football game at Camp Randall Stadium.

MADISON--A select faculty of 32 newspaper and allied field authorities will participate in a special University of Wisconsin press workshop in Madison June 18-July 7.

Twenty-one school teachers, from all sections of Wisconsin, will attend as guests of their local or area newspapers.

MADISON--Sponsored by their local or area newspapers, 21 school teachers will join in a special University of Wisconsin workshop June 19-July 7.

The three-week Summer Sessions graduate credit program was designed to familiarize the participants with newspapering as a business and profession, and to enable them to use the newspaper as a classroom resource.

The workshop is believed to be the first of its kind ever conducted on the state level with media support. Titled "The Press in the School Curriculum," the sessions will consist of lectures, demonstrations, discussions, and visits to key publishing plants and editorial and business offices. The group also will learn how newspapers work with social, educational, governmental, and other agencies to get news stories.

MADISON, Wis.--Problems in newspaper circulation management will be highlighted at a new University of Wisconsin institute March 28-30, Prof. Clarence A. Schoenfeld, chairman of the UW Extension Division department of journalism, announced today.

Jointly sponsored by the UW School of Journalism and the Extension Division, the three-day meeting is the first of its kind to be offered at Wisconsin. Circulation managers from throughout the state will gather to hear experts in the field.

MADISON--A general loss of faith in American newspapers was cited as the cause of circulation problems by William T. Evjue, publisher of

Mr. Evjue's talk led off the two-day meeting. About 40 circulation chiefs and staff members attended.

Also on the program were two panel discussions, a symposium, and speeches by UW faculty members.

After Evjue's speech
Prof. Frank Thayer, school of journalism, was the moderator of a panel which discussed "What Circulation can get from management." Other members were Ed Keefe, circulation manager, LaCrosse Tribune; Ed Mill, circulation director, Davenport, Iowa, Newspapers, Inc.; and Otto Stielow, circulation manager, Sheboygan Press. A fourth panelist, Floyd L. Hockenhull, of the ~~same~~ Circulation Development Service, Chicago, was detained by bad weather.

Evjue told the seminar that
"A circulation manager has the right to expect his publisher to produce a paper ~~which~~ which will hold the confidence of its readers."

Three reasons ~~were~~ ~~given~~ for the decline of confidence:

- (1) The autonomy of the American newspapers has shifted from the editorial offices ~~to~~ to the business offices.
- (2) ~~The trend toward one-newspaper cities~~ The elimination of competition by the trend toward one-newspaper cities makes many publishers grow lax ~~and~~ and ~~more~~ ultra-conservative.
- (3) The lack of coverage of local and national affairs must be blamed upon the willingness of publishers to suppress news about public figures rather than reportorial failure.

"Forty years ago," Evjue said, "great editors were crusading editors. They considered their papers a public trust ~~and~~ with the obligation to voice the grievances of the inarticulate masses. Today the press defends violations of the public trust which it would have attacked before."
