Badgers And Aztecs Square Off

The Wisconsin football team (2-0) plays its last nonconference game before opening Big Ten conference play this afternoon, hosting San Diego State (0-1). Kickoff is scheduled for 2:40 p.m. and the game will be televised by ESPN+. Craig Coshun and Randy Wright will handle the commentary.

The game will also be televised on a tape-delay basis by Wisconsin Public Television. Mike Heller and former Badger Scott Nelson will handle the commentary. The game will be shown statewide beginning at 10:30 p.m.

Fans can listen to the game on the 53station Wisconsin Radio Network. Locally in Madison the game can be heard on WIBA (1310 am/101.5 fm). Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas are on the call.

The Badgers opened their home season last Saturday with a 34-10 win over Western Illinois.

Freshman P.J. Hill ran for 101 yards and three touchdowns in the victory while quarterback John Stocco completed 15-of-25 passes for 227 yards and touchdown. Wide receiver Paul Hubbard registered career highs in catches (four) and yards (87).

Defensively Wisconsin picked off three Leatherneck passes, with Mark Zalewski, Joe Stellmacher and Allen Langford registering picks. Kicker Taylor Mehlhaff also had a good day, tying a career-best with a 46-yard field goal.

San Diego State, coached by former Iowa All-American quarterback Chuck Long, is 0-1 after losing its season opener to UTEP, 34-27, on Aug. 31.

Sophomore quarterback Darren Mougey should get his first collegiate start for the Aztecs after starting quarterback Kevin O'Connell injured his right thumb in the season opener. On defense, SDSU returns eight starters from a year ago.



Today's Game at Camp Randall

Notable, Quotable and Promotable Our top 10 items for this week ...

Tight end Andy Crooks caught the first touchdown pass of his career vs. Western Illinois. His 34-yard TD reception in the fourth quarter was actually his second touchdown as a Badger. As a linebacker, he returned an interception 11 yards for a TD against Georgia in the 2005 Outback Bowl.

Taylor Mehlhaff connected on both of his field goal attempts vs. Western Illinois, including a career-high tying 46-yarder. Mehlhaff is now 11-of-12 on field goal attempts inside of 40 yards and 16-of-19 inside 50 yards.

UW head coach Bret Bielema will be squaring off against a former colleague for the second consecutive week. Bielema and San Diego State head coach Chuck Long (both in their first seasons as head coaches) were on the same coaching staff at Iowa from 1995-99.

Wisconsin, which has ranked 19th or higher in national attendance average in each of the past 13 seasons, has drawn a crowd of at least 70,000 fans to 82 consecutive home games. Among those 82 games, 72 have been sellouts, including the last 19 in a row. The Badgers averaged a school-record 82,551 fans during their six-game home slate in 2005.

Wisconsin has had a 1,000-yard rusher in 11 of the past 13 seasons, including a Big Ten-record 10 straight years from 1993-2002. The streak was broken in 2003 and 2004 when injuries hampered starting tailback Anthony Davis. RB Brian Calhoun got the Badgers back on track last season with a 1,636-yard effort.





UW first-year head coach Bret Bielema led the Badgers to victory in his first home game as Wisconsin's coach last week vs. Western Illinois.

Wisconsin's defense recorded three interceptions last week vs. Western Illinois. Senior linebacker Mark Zalewski notched the first INT of his career while defensive backs Allen Langford and Joe Stellmacher both recorded the third picks of their career. UW leads the Big Ten in both pass defense (124.0 yards per game) and pass defense efficiency (78.4).

Wisconsin head coach Bret Bielema will attempt to become just the second UW head coach to win his first three games since Jack Ryan did so in 1923. Dave McClain won his first four games in 1978.

UW has won its last 12 games in the month of September and is 19-1 over the past five years in games played before Oct. 1.

Wisconsin carries a 17-4 record in its last 21 games at Camp Randall Stadium into Saturday's game. That includes a 12-1 mark over the past three seasons.

Redshirt freshman running back P.J. Hill has gained at least 100 yards in each of his first two games, the first freshman at UW to do so since Anthony Davis in 2001. Hill ranks third in the Big Ten in rushing, averaging 115.5 yards per game. Against Western Illinois, Hill became the first freshman to run for three touchdowns since Davis scored three times against Minnesota on Nov. 24, 2001.

Andy Crooks scored on this 24-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter vs. Western Illinois, the first receiving TD of his career.

Wisconsin-San Diego State Series Notes:

This is SDSU's first trip to Madison since a 36-10 UW victory on Sept. 20, 1997 ... Wisconsin has won both previous meetings at Camp Randall Stadium ... the Aztecs' lone win in the series came in the first meeting, a 24-17 victory on Sept. 29, 1979 in San Diego ... Badger head coach Bret Bielema and San Diego State head coach Chuck Long were on the same coaching staff at Iowa from 1995-99 ... both are in their first seasons as head coaches.

Catching On

Entering this season, Wisconsin's running backs, tight ends and wide receivers had more career tackles (74 - Andy Crooks: 56; Josh Neal: 16; Travis Beckum: 2) than receptions (5). When junior Marcus Randle El went down with a season-ending knee injury in fall camp, the number of career receptions in UW's lineup dropped to two (one each for Paul Hubbard and Jarvis Minton).

Through the first two games this season, eight different Badgers have combined for 24 receptions. Seven of those players have recorded their first career receptions this season.

Of the eight players with a reception this season, three are former walk-ons (Rentmeester, Rowan and Swan), two are former defensive players (Beckum - DL/LB and Crooks - LB), two are freshmen (Anderson and Hill) and one is a former Big Ten champion in the long jump (Hubbard).

Among the other skill position players listed on Wisconsin's offensive depth chart this week are two true freshmen (RB Lance Smith and WR Xavier Harris), a former linebacker (FB Josh Neal) and a former quarterback (TE Sean Lewis).

400 Club

John Stocco had 15 completions against Western Illinois making him just the third Badger quarterback to complete at least 400 passes in his career. Here is a look at UW's all-time career pass completions list:



Chancellor John D. Wiley





hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin–Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer, Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he

chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Evjue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW–Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

A Letter From Chancellor Wiley:

Camp Randall Stadium has the look of a winner, with its updated fan-friendly atmosphere. The stadium is a source of Wisconsin pride, but it is our fans and their rich history of loyalty that makes any Badger sporting event a truly special occasion.

Our student-athletes are also winners—on and off the field. On the playing fields, we've had many victories and championships to celebrate. And in the classroom, 210 Badger athletes registered a grade-point average of better than 3.5; up from 186 student-athletes a year ago. Nearly one-quarter of our student-athletes were recognized as Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2005-06.

In addition, the men's golf and women's rowing teams received the Team Community Service award for the most hours spent volunteering.



Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez





arry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of head football coach.

For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

In 2004-05, Alvarez served as athletic director and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer) and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet Alvarez.

- Grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- Helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999
- A finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award in 1999. He was one of 18 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and was the only one still at the school that hired him when he retired in 2005.
- Got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship.
- Named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by Hispanic Business in October of 2001
- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, gave \$100,000 to support the opening of Gilda's Club of Madison, a free support center for families dealing with cancer.
- Numerous former Alvarez assistants at Wisconsin have gone on to success on the
 professional level, among them Bill Callahan (former Oakland Raiders head coach, now head
 coach of Nebraska), Brad Childress (Minnesota Vikings head coach), Jay Hayes (Cincinnati
 Bengals defensive line coach) and Jay Norvell (former Oakland Raiders tight ends coach,
 now with Nebraska)



Head Coach Bret Bielema

Pret Bielema is in his first year as head football coach at the University of Wisconsin. The second-youngest head football coach in the Division I-A ranks, he brings a remarkably strong background to the position.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the

high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were firstteam All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002–03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas
State, Bielema spent nine seasons
as an assistant coach at his alma mater,
Iowa, where he worked for head coaches
Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997
Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and
ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring
defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr
(first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 547 games and guide their teams to 41 bowl games, so the first-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the busi-

Bielema earned four letters (1989–92) after joining the Iowa football program as a walk-on. He was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.







Bob Bostad Tight Ends

Bob Bostad (pronounced BO-stad), a state of Wisconsin native who coached the offensive line at New Mexico from 1999-2005, is in his first season as an assistant football coach at Wisconsin.

Bostad coaches the Badgers' tight ends.
Bostad's 2005 offensive line featured a
pair of first-team all-conference selections,
including center Ryan Cook and guard
Robert Turner. New Mexico averaged 200
yards per game on the ground in 2005. Cook
was a second-round draft choice of the
Vikings, while tackle Terrance Pennington
was a seventh-round pick of the Bills.

During Bostad's tenure at New Mexico, 14 Lobo offensive linemen earned all-conference mention. Among the players Bostad coached at New Mexico were: tackle Claude Terrell, a third-team A.P. All-American and fourth-round draft choice of the St. Louis Rams (he started as a rookie for the Rams in 2005) and tackle Jason Lenzmeier, who became the first offensive lineman in conference and school history to earn MWC offensive player of the week honors in 2003.

Bostad was offensive line coach (1997-98) and offensive coordinator (1998) at San Jose State prior to his years at New Mexico.

Bostad coached the offensive line at Cal State Northridge in 1995-96 and spent three seasons (1992-94) as an offensive line graduate assistant at Minnesota under head coach Jim Wacker.

Bostad got his coaching start at his alma mater, UW-Stevens Point, where he coached the offensive line from 1990-91.

Bostad graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1989 with a degree in physical education. He was a four-year starter as a linebacker for the Pointers and earned all-conference mention each year. Bostad earned a master's degree in kinesiology from Minnesota in 1994.

Bostad, 39, is a native of Pardeeville, Wis. He and his wife, Cara, have three daughters: Rachel, Bryn and Annika, and a son, John Robert.

Paul Chryst Off. Coordinator / QBs

Paul Chryst is in his second consecutive season at Wisconsin and his third overall as an assistant coach for the Badgers.

Chryst, UW's co-offensive coordinator and tight ends coach last season, is now the program's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Chryst, the Badgers' tight ends coach in 2002, returned to Wisconsin in 2005 and his impact on the UW offense was immediately evident. The 2005 Badgers set school records for points scored in a season (446) and for season scoring average (34.3 ppg). The Badger passing game was much improved, with QB John Stocco setting school season records for passing yards, passing TDs and pass completions.

Chryst was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Oregon State in 2003-04. He helped the Beavers rank No. 6 nationally in passing yardage per game and 10th in total offense in 2003. The 2003 Beavers became the first team in Division I history with a 4,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers.

Chryst came to Wisconsin in 2002 after serving as an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers, where he developed Freddie Jones into one of the NFL's top tight ends.

Previously, Chryst was an assistant coach at Oregon State (1997-98), the Saskatchewan Roughriders (1996), Illinois State (1995), the Ottawa Rough Riders (1994), UW-Platteville (1993) and the World League's San Antonio Riders (1991-92). He was a graduate assistant at West Virginia (1989-90).

Chryst was a three-time football letterwinner at Wisconsin, where he earned a degree in political science in 1988. He added a master's degree in educational administration from West Virginia in 1990. Paul's late father, George, was a longtime head coach at UW-Platteville and a former Badger player and assistant coach.

Chryst and his wife, Robin, have three children: Katy, JoJo and Danny.

Kerry Cooks Defensive Backs

Kerry Cooks, defensive backs coach at the University of Minnesota last season, is in first year as defensive backs coach at Wisconsin.


Cooks comes to Wisconsin after one year coaching the Golden Gophers' second ary. Minnesota qualified for the Music City Bowl last season, while Cooks' unit allow opponents to complete just 56.8 percent of their passes (fourth-best in the Big Ten). That figure dropped to 55.3 percent in conference games, tied for second in the league with Penn State.

Prior to his year at Minnesota, Cooks coached defensive backs and assisted on special teams for one season (2004) at Western Illinois. Under Cooks' direction, the Leathernecks limited opponents to a Gateway Conference-best 157.2 passing yards per game; held opponents to the low est completion percentage (45.4) in the conference; and finished second in the league with 17 interceptions.

Cooks began coaching at his high school alma mater, Nimitz High (Texas). in 2003 before joining the staff at Kansas Stas a graduate assistant for the 2003 campaign. While at Kansas State, Cooks work mostly with defensive game plan preparational assisted with the Wildcats' secondary. Kansas State registered an 11-4 record in 2003 and won a Big 12 title with a defense that was sixth nationally in total defense.

Cooks was a four-year letterwinner at two-year starter as a strong safety at lowa from 1994-97. He was a team captain as a senior and earned All-Big Ten honors and spot in the East-West Shrine Game. A fifth round draft choice of the Minnesota Viking in 1998, Cooks also played for Green Bay. Atlanta and Jacksonville before retiring for the NFL in 2001. He also played for the Chicago Enforcers of the XFL in 2001.

Cooks has played or coached in six bowl games. A 2000 graduate of Iowa with bachelor's degree in sociology, Cooks' wife name is Valencia.



The Jayhawks, who routed Houston, 13, in the 2005 Fort Worth Bowl, led the 12 Conference and ranked No. 3 nationin rushing defense (83.3 ypg) this past ison. Kansas also was No. 2 in the Big 12 llth nationally in total defense (303.3 J. KU linebacker Nick Reid was a twoie, first-team All-Big 12 selection, a thirdm A.P. All-American and was the Big 12 ensive Player of the Year in 2005.

Doeren went to Kansas after spending of seasons as the secondary coach at onlana. The Grizzlies won the NCAA dision I-AA title in 2001. Doeren coached wen all-conference defensive backs at onlana, including two who earned All-cerica honors.

Prior to his time at Montana, Doeren is a two-year (1998-99) graduate assistant Southern California and started his colecoaching career as an assistant at ake from 1995-97.

Doeren began coaching at Shawnee ission (Kan.) Northwest High School in 194. A graduate of Bishop Miege High shool in Shawnee Mission. Doeren was a uryear letterwinner at Drake and earned ademic All-America honors as a senior. The 34-year-old Doeren, who has ached in three bowl games and two should championship contests, is a native Shawnee Mission. Kan. He and his wife. In, have three sons: Jacob. Luke and more (born in April of 2006).

Mike Hankwitz Defensive Coordinator

Mike Hankwitz is in his first season as Wisconsin's defensive coordinator.

Hankwitz spent the past two seasons as defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Colorado. He served as the program's interim head coach for the Buffaloes' 2005 Champs Sports Bowl appearance against Clemson. Hankwitz went to Colorado after serving as Arizona's defensive coordinator (and later interim head coach) in 2003.

Prior to his stint at Arizona, Hankwitz was the defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Texas A&M (1997-2002) where he guided the Aggies' famed "Wrecking Crew" defense. Among Hankwitz's standout players at Texas A&M was Dat Nguyen, who won the Lombardi and Bednarik Awards, as well as being named Chevrolet Defensive Player of the Year.

Hankwitz spent two seasons (1995-96) as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Kansas after enjoying a highly successful 10-year run as defensive coordinator at Colorado from 1985-94. Colorado put together the nation's fifth-best record (58-11-4) from 1989-94, including a national title in 1990, three Big 8 titles, two appearances each in the Orange and Fiesta Bowls and six national top-20 rankings (including three top-five finishes).

Hankwitz was defensive coordinator at Western Michigan from 1982-84 and outside linebackers and punting coach at Purdue from 1977-81. Prior to his time at Purdue, Hankwitz was the outside linebackers and secondary coach at Arizona from 1973-76.

Hankwitz began his coaching career as a graduate assistant (1970-72) at his alma mater, Michigan, under head coach Bo Schembechler.

The 58-year-old Hankwitz is a native of Ludington, Mich. He was a three-year football letterwinner for the Wolverines and started on the 1969 Big Ten championship squad. Hankwitz earned a B.S. in education in 1970. He and his wife, Cathy, have a son, Jacob 12.

Henry Mason Wide Receivers / Assistant Recruiting Coordinator

Henry Mason is in his 12th season coaching wide receivers at Wisconsin.

Under Mason's guidance, Wisconsin has consistently produced some of the nation's best pass-catchers since the mid-1990s.

Mason's most recent standouts were Brandon Williams and Jonathan Orr, both of whom were selected in the 2006 NFL Draft. Williams, a 2005 second-team All-American, finished his career ranked first in receptions (202) and second in yards (2,924) at Wisconsin. Orr is third all-time at UW with 19 touchdown catches and eighth in school history with 1,824 receiving yards.

Mason also coached Bedford, Ohio, products Lee Evans and Chris Chambers. Evans, a 2001 Biletnikoff Award finalist and first-team All-American, is UW's career leader in receiving yards (3,468) and touchdowns (27) and was a 2004 first-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills, Chambers, a second-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 2001, is fourth on the school's list for career receiving yards with 2,004.

Early in Mason's career at Wisconsin. Tony Simmons and Donald Hayes developed into standout receivers and eventual NFL draft picks.

Prior to coming to Wisconsin in 1995. Mason coached receivers at Western Michigan from 1991-94. Mason was head coach at Smith-Cotton (Mo.) High School from 1982-90. His 1988 team became the first in 13 years at the school to post a winning record. Mason also was an assistant coach at Baker University (1981) and was an assistant coach at Lexington (Mo.) High School (1979-80).

Mason, who has coached in nine bowl games with the Badgers, is a 1979 graduate of Central Missouri State, where he lettered in football and baseball. He was drafted by the Baltimore Colts and played one season with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Mason's wife's name is Debbie.







Randall McCray Defensive Line

andall McCray, who coached the defensive ne and linebackers during the past three asons at Toledo, is in his first season as fisconsin's defensive line coach.

The 36-year-old McCray coached oledo's defensive line last season, helping to Rockets to a 9-3 record and a 45-13 MAC Bowl win over UTEP. Toledo was 21st alionally in total defense last season and dthe MAC in scoring defense, total defense and pass defense efficiency.

It his first season at Toledo, McCray for ed with replacing two first-team All-nebackers, from the previous season. It is players who stepped in, Anthony and Brock Dodrill, finished the 2003 ranked fifth and sixth, respectively, at MAC in tackles.

McCray was assistant head coach and densive coordinator at Illinois State in 102 after serving as defensive coordinator at irside linebackers coach for the edbirds from 2000-02. In 2002, McCray added Gateway Defensive Player of the Year comer Grigsby to three All-America nods at third-place finish for the Buch achanan Award (top defensive player in vision I-AA football).

McCray coached inside linebackers at array State (1997-99) and became the acers' defensive coordinator in 1999; defende ends at Bethune-Cookman (1996); was charge of quality control at Clemson (1995); defensive line at Tennessee-mattanooga (1993-94) and was a graduate sistant at South Carolina from 1991-92

Bob PalcicOffensive Line

Bob Palcic, an assistant coach in the National Football League from 1994-2005, is in his first season as Wisconsin's offensive line coach.

Palcic coached tight ends for the New Orleans Saints from 2000–05. Prior to that post he was offensive line coach for the Cleveland Browns (1999), tight ends coach for the Detroit Lions (1997–98) and offensive line coach for the Atlanta Falcons (1994–96).

Palcic went to Atlanta after spending 19 of the previous 21 seasons coaching offensive linemen at seven different universities, including Wisconsin. He coached the 1993 UCLA offensive line that matched up against the Badgers in the 1994 Rose Bowl. Palcic tutored the Southern California offensive line in 1992 and helped the Trojans to a Freedom Bowl appearance. He was offensive line coach at Ohio State from 1986-91.

Arizona's offensive line was under Palcic's direction from 1984–85 (the Wildcats played in the Sun Bowl during that time). A two-year stint (1982–83) with the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts (1983 Grey Cup title) was preceded by a four-year (1978–81) stop as Wisconsin's offensive line coach under head coach Dave McClain.

Palcic was Ball State's offensive line coach in 1976–77 (he went to Wisconsin with McClain, who was Ball State's head coach) and Dayton's linebackers/offensive line coach in 1974–75. He got his college coaching start guiding Ball State's linebackers as a graduate assistant in 1973.

Palcic, 58, is a native of Gowanda, N.Y., and has a bachelor's degree in education (1971) and a master's degree in education (1974), both from Dayton. He was a line-backer for the Flyers from 1968–70. He and his wife, Theresa, have three children: Joe (currently the defensive coordinator at Indiana); Amy (an assistant in the Cleveland Browns media relations office) and Monica, who is married to Philadelphia Eagles LB Mark Simoneau.

John Settle Running Backs

John Settle is now in his first season as running backs coach at Wisconsin. Settle most recently served eight seasons as running backs coach at Fresno State, where he tutored six 1,000-yard rushers, including Wendell Mathis, who rushed for 1,313 yards and 15 touchdowns along with making 19 catches for 156 yards and a TD for the Bulldogs last season. Rodney Davis set the school rushing record with a 1.586-yard campaign in 2002. Settle also developed Derrick Ward, the 1999 team rushing leader, freshman All-American and current New York Giant. In addition, Settle coached 1998 WAC Pacific Division Offensive Player of the Year Jamie Kimbrough.

Settle went to Fresno State after a three-year stint (1995-98) as an offensive assistant with the Cleveland Browns/Baltimore Ravens franchise under head coaches Bill Belicheck and Ted Marchibroda. Settle began his coaching career at his alma mater, Appalachian State, where he assisted with running backs in 1994.

Settle was a four-year letterman (1983-86) as a running back at Appalachian State. Settle finished as the school's career rushing leader with 4,409 yards (then third-most in NCAA Division I-AA history) and 43 touchdowns. He was the Southern Conference Player of the Year as a senior after rushing for 1,661 yards and 20 TDs.

Settle signed with the Atlanta Falcons as a free agent and played a total of six seasons in the NFL, four with Atlanta (1987-90) and two with the Washington Redskins. He accumulated 1,594 yards of total offense in 1988, becoming the first free agent in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. He was named to the Pro Bowl and the All-Madden Team in 1988. He also played for the Redskins' Super Bowl championship team in 1991.

A 1989 graduate of Appalachian State with a degree in criminal justice, Settle and his wife, Karen, have three children: Jonathan, Leighton and Devynn.







The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

Since 1992, Wisconsin has compiled a 62-23-3 (.722) record at Camp Randall Stadium. In 2004 and 2005, the Badgers put together an 11-game home winning streak, the school's longest in the modern era.

Since the expansion of Camp Randall Stadium prior to the 2004 season, UW has averaged 82,460 fans at its home games. The Badgers have ranked 13th nationally in attendance in each of the past two seasons.


bers (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 for 81 consecutive home games and 71 of them have been sellouts. The stadium record was set at the 2005 Iowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game. A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Roooonnn Daaaynnne!", from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.





Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a

cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.



The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

Camp Randall Stadium

35 AMECHE 33 DAYNE

ne of college football's finest facilities – Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.

Senior Associate Doug Beard



Senior Associate Shawn M. Eichorst




Associate Director Terry Gawlik







Not Your Average Joe

Joe Stellmacher is the latest walk-on turned secondary star

The comparisons have been made, it seems, ever since Joe Stellmacher arrived to the University of Wisconsin. In truth, it took a redshirt year and a few fall practices for former coach Barry Alvarez to first put Stellmacher's name in the same sentence with Badger greats Jason Doering and Jim Leonhard.

Like Doering and Leonhard, Stellmacher grew up in a small town in Wisconsin. All three chose to walk-on at the University. All three became full-time starters in the Badger defensive backfield. Perhaps most impressive, all three have been named team captains during their careers.

Stellmacher, named a top-10 strong safety by *The Sporting News* heading into this season, started attending UW games with his parents when he was eight. In high school, poering became one of his heroes. As a redshirt freshman in 2002, Stellmacher watched as Leonhard led the nation with 11 interceptions.

"Seeing what those two guys accomplished was definitely an inspiration," said Stellmacher. "Jimmy, Doering, they were walk-ons just like me. All of us worked our way up." $\$

Like his predecessors, Stellmacher began his collegiate career on special teams. But a month after Alvarez first made mention of the three players together, Stellmacher was promoted to defensive starter in the team's third game of the season. One week prior, he recorded a season-high six tackles against Akron. He had five in his first collegiate start against UNLV.

That's when UW fans and local papers started making their own comparisons of the tio. But that's also when Stellmacher's story became drastically different.

Two weeks later, the Badgers were enjoying a fourth-quarter lead against Illinois in that paign en route to an 18-point victory. Following a score, Badger kicker Mike Allen kicke | off to current Illini EB Halsey. Trying to make a tackle, UW linebacker Alex Lewis dived missed Halsey and struck Stellmacher's leg, which was planted on the ground. Stellmacher was carted off the field moments later and diagnosed with a broken right leg and a dislocated ankle.

My entire leg went numb," said Stellmacher. "It was the first time I had ever broken a



he injury put an abrupt end to Stellmacher's freshman campaign but not an end to his aspirations with the Badgers. He worked hard to rehab the leg and to get his body in a better shape than when he first started. Stellmacher thinks he's finally accomplished that now heading into his final season.

'(The injury) made me a lot stronger," said Stellmacher looking back. "It showed me how much I love the game. It makes you appreciate what you have."

Stellmacher was given an athletic scholarship his sophomore season. A step slower, he played mostly on special teams and recorded 10 tackles in five games.

l ast season, however, was a different story. Stellmacher earned the starting nod in Wisconsin's third game, against North Carolina, and recorded a gamehigh 11 tackles in a 14-5 Badger victory. He missed two of the next three games with a stinger but returned for Minnesota, a game which he will tell you is one
of his most memorable. Stellmacher recorded a career-high 14 tackles against the Gophers - nine were solo - in Wisconsin's memorable comeback in
Minneapolis. He recorded double-digit tackles in the next four games on his way to 90 for the season. Only Dontez Sanders finished with more.

"It's great to have that experience from last year when I started playing games," said Stellmacher. "I've gained more confidence and hope to take my game to another level this year."

It appears Stellmacher has picked up right where he left off. Following his 12-tackle performance against Bowling Green two weeks ago, Stellmacher was named Wisconsin's Defensive Player of the Game, an award he picked up four times last year as a junior. He also forced a fumble that he recovered, but the ruling was later overturned.

"Stellmacher shows what he's been able to do through his entire career here," said head coach Bret Bielema the Monday following the game. "(He) was consistent, steady, I thought probably made one of the better plays of the ballgame when he came over."

Bielema made Stellmacher his fourth captain for last week's game against Western Illinois and continued to praise his senior leader.

"Joe's an exceptional football player," said Bielema. "What sets him apart from the rest is he's able to understand the game before it happens, and he's able to anticipate the plays as they come, which allows him to react faster."

That experience could be attributed to his father, Steve, who served as Joe's football coach at Berlin High School. Joe was surrounded by the game growing up and served as his dad's water boy. Steve coached the team for 27 years before taking time off to follow his son's career at Wisconsin.

"(My parents) have had season tickets since '92, I believe," said Stellmacher. "It's great knowing they're behind you. They're going to make all the road games this year. It makes me play even harder."

Long known as the vocal leader in the Badgers' secondary, Stellmacher was the 2005 recipient of the Tom Wiesner award. Started in 2004, the award is presented annually to a Wisconsinborn student-athlete whose loyalty, hard work, spirit and dedication are unselfishly directed to the success of the team.

Doering and Leonard surely would be proud.

the snap from Matt Katula. I signaled for him to snap it and it was a great snap; however, I took my eyes off the ball at the last second and it went through my hands, hit me in the chest, and bounced a few yards in front of me.





Badgers in the NFL Update



After missing most of last season with an injury, Alex Lewis returned to the Detroit Lions lineup in Week One, making seven tackles and forcing a fumble.

Defensive Duos

After a NFL season where numerous former Badgers shined on the offensive side of the ball, most notably wide receivers Lee Evans and Chris Chambers, former Badger defenders took center stage in Week 1 of the 2006 NFL regular season.

Alex Lewis and Jamar Fletcher – Detroit Lions

Last year Lewis started the season opener against Green Bay before an ankle injury early in the game prematurely ended his season. However, if the linebacker's sixtackle performance against Seattle Sunday in Detroit was any indication, Lewis has finally recovered from his injury and could be in for a breakout year.

Despite losing the game, Lewis and the Lions defense were dominant, limiting last season's NFL rushing leader, Shaun Alexander, to 51 yards and holding the Seahawks prolific offense nearly 20 points below their average from a season ago. Making the start in place of the injured Boss Bailey, the 2004 fifth-round draft pick was active all day, no more so than when he flew in and helped jar the ball loose from Alexander for a fumble in the first quarter.

Cornerback Jamar Fletcher, playing his first game as a member of the Lions, also

turned in a solid performance, helping keep the Seahawks strong receiving corps in check while registering two tackles. The former first-round pick of the Miami Dolphins was signed as an unrestricted free agent by the Lions after spending two seasons as a member of the San Diego Chargers.

Nick Greisen and Scott Starks -Jacksonville Jaguars

Another former Badger making his debut with a new team was line-backer Nick Greisen. After spending his first four seasons as a member of the New York Giants, the 2002 fifth-round pick quickly made his presence felt as a member of the Jacksonville Jaguars, notching a tackle and making a critical interception late to help the Jaguars lock up the game.

With the Jaguars leading 17-10 in the fourth quarter, Greisen picked off Cowboys quarterback Drew

Bledsoe and returned the ball six yards to the Cowboys 40 yard line, setting up what would become the game-winning touchdown for the Jaguars. Originally signed in the offseason to provide depth at line-backer, Greisen earned a starting role on the heels of a strong preseason and training camp.

Second-year cornerback Scott Starks made one tackle and had the unenviable task of matching up with the Cowboys talented wide receiver tandem of Terrell Owens and Terry Glenn all day. The 2005 third-round pick was a standout player on special teams for the Jaguars last season, receiving only limited playing time in the secondary, but this season is expected to play a much larger role on the defense and is in a heated battle to capture Jacksonville's "nickel" cornerback role.

Catching On

Chris Chambers - Miami Dolphins, Lee Evans - Buffalo Bills

Picked by many to rank among the elite receivers in the AFC this season, neither Chambers nor Evans had a big first week. Chambers, going up against a stout Pittsburgh defense, tallied five receptions for 59 yards. He also started slowly last season before exploding for 32 catches for 444 yards and six touchdowns in the last month of the season.

Evans, still trying to develop chemistry with Bills quarterback J.P. Losman, hauled in two catches for 25 yards against New England. He also had a very productive December last year, catching 16 passes for 312 yards and four touchdowns in the last four games.


Rookie Debuts

Daniels and Calhoun were the lone members of the UW Class of 2005 to see action on opening day. Daniels started at tight end for the Texans but did not catch any passes. Calhoun carried the ball twice for a total of minus-one yard.

Brandon Williams, now with the San Francisco 49ers, was on the inactive list as was fellow wide receiver Jonathan Orr, now on the Tennessee Titans roster. Jason Pociask is on injured reserve for the New York Jets.

very great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

The most well-known of those players is former running back Ron Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.


In recent years, Badger players have been fixtures on national award lists. UW players have been finalists for the

Rimington Trophy (best center), Outland Trophy (interior lineman), Lombardi Award (lineman), Chuck Bednarick Award (defensive player), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player), Ted Hendricks Award (defensive end), Fred Biletnikoff Award (receiver), Lou Groza Award (placekicker), Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams) and Ronnie Lott Trophy (defensive player).

In addition, Badger players walked away with two major awards in 2000. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher earned the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's best defensive back while Kevin Stemke won the inaugural Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's best collegiate punter.

This year a number of UW players are in contention for major awards. Offensive tackle Joe Thomas, a preseason *Playboy* All-American, can be found on both the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy watch lists. Punter Ken DeBauche was a second-team All-American last year and is one of the top candidates for the Ray Guy Award. QB John Stocco is on the Maxwell Award watch list and

DE Matt Shaughnessy is on the Ted Hendricks Award watch list.




Joe Thomas enters the 2006 season as a leading candidate for the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award.

Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Can b Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located with a the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. I am may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Alcohol

No a cohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center localed under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

Sept. 5, 1998 - Wisconsin 26, San Diego State 14

In the most recent meeting between Wisconsin and San Diego State, the Badgers rallied for 13 points in the final quarter to defeat the Aztecs 26-14 in San Diego. Playing without running back Ron Dayne, Wisconsin still rushed for 186 yards, including 122 from Carlos Daniels. In the air, quarterback Mike Samuel also threw for more than 100 yards.


The Badgers got on the board first when Chris Chambers reeled in a 60-yard toss from Samuel late in the first quarter. San Diego State was able to score in the second quarter, however, and the teams were locked at the half. The Aztecs took a 14-7 lead after a UW fumble that resulted in a touchdown. Two Matt Davenport field goals put the Badgers within one, 14-13, heading into the final quarter.

With 11:56 to play, Samuel dashed 47 yards over the endline to give Wisconsin a 20-14 edge. Another Davenport field goal and a safety late in the game secured the win for the Badgers.

Sept. 20, 1997 - Wisconsin 36, San Diego State 10



Wisconsin jumped out to a 17-0 lead after the first quarter after a field goal from Matt Davenport and back-to-back one-yard scores from Dayne. Another field goal and a safety put the Badgers up 22-0 at halftime. Dayne rushed for two more scores in the second half, including a 31-yard run early in the fourth quar-

Sept. 29, 1979 - San Diego State 24, Wisconsin 17

San Diego State claimed its only win of the series at home in 1979, a 27-14 win over the Badgers in the first-ever meeting. The Aztecs rallied to outscore Wisconsin 14-0 in the fourth quarter to claim the sevenpoint victory. UW put up 340 offensive yards and recorded 23 first downs to SDSU's 15.

San Diego State tied the game with 8:11 to play in the fourth. With the game knotted at 17, Mark Halda completed an 83-yard touchdown pass to Steve Stapler with 4:40 left in the game. On the ensuing drive, UW quarterback Kevin Motl was intercepted on the San Diego State 45-yard line with five ticks left on the clock, and the Aztecs came away with the victory.

Motl started his first career game as a Badger in place of injured quarterbacks Mike Kalasmiki, John Josten and Steve Parish.

Oct. 4, 1980 - Wisconsin 35, San Diego State 12


Wisconsin earned its first of three victories over San Diego State in 1980, a 35-12 win over the Aztecs at Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers scored three touchdowns in the third quarter en route to the victory. Offensively, Wisconsin collected 25 first downs to SDSU's 13 and compiled 340 yards rushing. The Badger defense also had a stellar performance, limiting the Aztecs to minus-five yards on the ground while forcing four turnovers.

Wisconsin took the opening kickoff 68 yards in 10 plays for the game's first score when Gerald Green rand the final four yards for the touchdown. Early in the second quarter, Dave Mehapp capped another scoring drive for the second score of the game. Later in the period, an Ed Senn interception led to a 21-0 lead for the Badgers. Wisconsin would score once more in the second quarter and again in the third to put the game out of reach.

Bowling with the Badgers

ver the last 13 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' eight bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College, Nebraska and Ohio State. UW has participated in 11 bowl games over the past 13 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made seven appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its second consecutive January bowl game, trouncing seventh-ranked Auburn 24-10 to capture the Capital One Bowl. That contest marked the final game in the head coaching career of Barry Alvarez.

It was fitting that Alvarez's last game was a bowl victory since he led UW to an 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games. That is the best bowl winning percentage in NCAA history among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.



Badgers Give Back






Two former Badger gridiron stars (Alan Ameche and Pat Richter) have been inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.






Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



The Big Ten Conference

This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$89 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2005-06, the Big Ten distributed over \$117 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

 Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.

- Big Ten Universities have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- Big Ten Universities house on their campuses nine of the nation's 30 largest academic libraries. Conference libraries hold more than 66 million book volumes and institutions freely share their materials with other league members.
- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- Based on the federal graduation rate average for the 1995-98 freshman classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 70 percent compared to 62 percent for all Division I student-athletes. As a conference, student-athletes tend to graduate at rates consistent with the general student body (71 percent). In 2006, the NCAA also introduced a new calculation- the Graduation Success Rate (GSR) – that accounts for transfer student-athletes. The Big Ten's GSR was 81 percent compared to the Division I average of 76 percent.

- The Big Ten recognized 1,992
 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2005-06 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged nearly 1,700 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- The Big Ten has claimed at least four team national championships in seven of the last nine full seasons, including six national titles during 1999-2000 alone, the most for the conference in more than a decade. Big Ten national champions in 2005-06 included Northwestern women's lacrosse and three national crowns for Wisconsin in men's cross country and men's and women's ice hockey.
- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised nationally, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.
- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2005-06, more than 8.2 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

BIG TEN INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

Beginning with this season, all Division-I conferences and independent institutions will have the option of using a version of instant replay standardized by the NCAA – a system based upon an instant replay model created by the Big Ten Conference three years ago.

The objective of football instant replay is to allow for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during games. Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of indisputable video evidence is met can a play be overturned. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

Head coaches may now utilize a timeout to request a review of a play no more than once per game. A coach initiates this challenge by taking a timeout before the ball is in play and informing the official that the ruling on the previous play is being challenged. If the ruling is overturned, the timeout will be returned to the team. If the ruling is not overturned, the team will lose that timeout. A team must have a timeout in order for the coach to challenge a play and a coach can only challenge one play per game. Head coaches may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped by the Technical Advisor and a decision has already been made on that specific ruling. If a head coach requests a timeout to challenge a ruling and the play is not reviewable, the team will lose that timeout. The Technical Advisor will continue to examine all reviewable plays during a game.

The Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game can initiate reviews throughout the game. The head coach can initiate one review per game by calling a timeout. Game officials may not ask for a review.

What Every Badger Fan Spould Know

Wh increasing numbers of NCAA rules of erning outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any exa "help" in recruiting elite studentablets to the University of Wisconsin.
The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

 d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications

with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost services:

 b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect; d) providing use of an automobile;
 e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) promising to provide any of the above;

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:


 Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;

Compensation for only work actually performed; and

 Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. Sponsored by the Campus Information and Visitor Center, the UW-Madison Arts Institute, and several campus arts departments and organizations, Arts Night Out! features demonstrations, gallery collections, dance concerts, film showings and receptions — all selected to offer a rich sample of UW-Madison's diverse arts programs.

Cheese Whizzes

Wisconsin is living up to its title as the dairy state with a boost from the UW-Madison's College of Agricultural and Life Sciences. Researchers in CALS, along with Cedar Grove Cheese in Plain, Wis., grabbed top honors in its class at the annual American Cheese Society competition in July for its invention of Dante cheese.

Dante, an aged 100-percent sheepmilk cheese that took the team five years to develop, was recognized for its technical and aesthetic merit in the 941-cheese field of competition.

"[Dante] has shown Wisconsin cheesemakers can use sheep milk to produce wonderful creations locally, instead of having the milk leave the state," Cedar Grove Cheese research chef and cheesemaker Dane Huebner says.

The effort to develop sheep-milk cheese goes hand in hand with work by animal scientists to improve the milk com-



position and yield of dairy sheep. UW-Madison has the only dairy sheep research program in North America.

Dante's name was inspired by fine art. Rodin's "The Thinker" graces its label, with Dante's head replaced by that of a sheep.

Social Science Building Renamed

In a special dedication ceremony on September 15, the Social Sciences Building was renamed to commemorate the late William H. Sewell, a sociology scholar and former UW-Madison chancellor.

Sewell played many roles in the social sciences field at the UW. He served as chair of the Department of Rural Sociology, the Department of Sociology and the University Committee. His position as chancellor, from October 1967 to June 1968, came during the height of campus unrest over the war in Vietnam.

Sewell made waves nationally when he founded and sustained the Wisconsin Longitudinal Study, the long-term and ongoing study of the Wisconsin high school class of 1957. His high-quality survey measurements and analytic methods paved the way for other longitudinal studies nationwide.



uring my recruiting visit to Nebraska, I got the sense that I was entering the world of big-time or lege athletics. People made a fuss over the players wherever they went in Lincoln. T ere was a commotion when you walked ir o a restaurant.

Football was important. Nebraska was the perfect place for me.

The football program was like a melting pot, and you learned how to get along with different people, much like where I grew in western Pennsylvania.

I still remember my first trip to Madison as a player. It was during my junior year, 1966. I didn't know much about the program.

The Badgers were just another team to us, a Big Ten team. We were the defending Big Eight champions and I don't think anybody thought Wisconsin was special - at least not compared to the opponents that we were accustomed to playing on our schedule.

That Friday afternoon, we had a team walk-through at Camp Randall Stadium, and I remember looking out of the old dressing room windows at all the grass practice fields surrounding the stadium areas which are now the site of the McClain Indoor Facility and the parking ramp behind the north end zone.

My uncle John and one of his friends came to visit me that weekend. As a team, we were staying at The Edgewater hotel, and uncle John had never seen anything

as beautiful as the view from my room overlooking Lake Mendota.

He was right. The view was absolutely gorgeous.

It wasn't much of game...we ended up winning, 31-3.

The Badgers lost the ball three times on fumbles, and their quarterbacks -John Ryan and John Boyajian — threw four interceptions.

I had one of the picks, which I returned 25 yards. I got caught from behind and brought down along the sidelines by an offensive lineman. Over the years, my runback has become a punch line at banquets. I wasn't tackled - rigor mortis set in.

And they ribbed me about the way the radio announcer handled the play-byplay of the interception, "Alvarez is at the 41, the 42, the 43...'

I ran about a 5.2 in the 40-yard dash - 5.2 seconds, not minutes.

Before the start of my senior year, I got engaged to Cindy.

We had met a couple of summers earlier.

Cindy grew up in Omaha. When she was 10, the family moved to Lincoln. Her dad was an adjutant general in the Nebraska national guard, and trained offi-

After Cindy got out of high school, he went to work at the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. And that's where we got married in a chapel overlooking John F. Kennedy's gravesite at Arlington National Cemetery.

Cindy hasn't let me forget that we spent our honeymoon at a Pittsburgh Pirates game. She says she should have



known what she was getting herself into and bolted right then.

I had a very good senior year, despite tearing my Achilles tendon. I never could play at full speed and I wasn't very fast to start with. But I compensated in other

I had a couple of good performances in postseason all-star games and thought I would be drafted into the NFL. But when I wasn't, I made up mind to get started on a career as a coach. A lot of NFL teams wanted to sign me as a free agent, but I really wasn't that interested. My coach, Bob Devaney, changed my thinking.

The Minnesota Vikings had contacted

"They would like you to go up there," Devaney said.

"I don't want to do it," I insisted.

"Go ahead, give it a shot," he encouraged me. "If it doesn't work out, I'll hold open a spot on my staff and you can come back and be a grad assistant.'

I agreed to give it a chance, and I might have had a fair shot of making the Vikings, but I had the wrong attitude. I was miserable. I wasn't happy.

I admitted to Minnesota coach Bud Grant, "I'm here for all the wrong reasons. I know what I want to do. I want to go out and coach."


Grant said simply, "That's what you need to do."

I called Cindy with the news, and she hung up on me.

She was heartbroken.

She thought we were going to have money and glamour and all of those things that go along with being the wife of an NFL player.

Instead, she was marrying a coach.
