# THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-MADISON

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the UW-Madison includes 13 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, more than 43,000 students and 14,000 employees, nearly 4,000,000 volumes in 22 libraries, a \$750,000,000 budget, and research and development expenditures totalling \$185,000,000 (third largest in the U.S.).

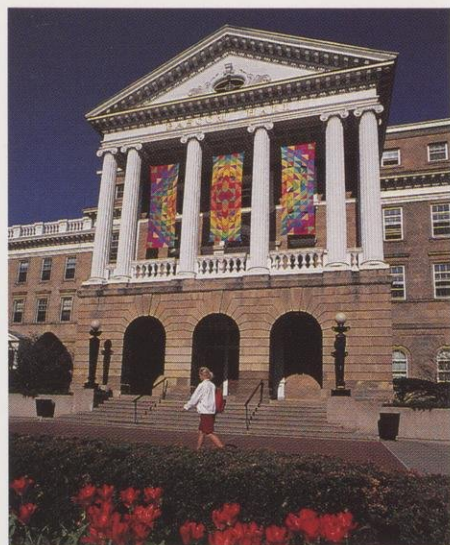
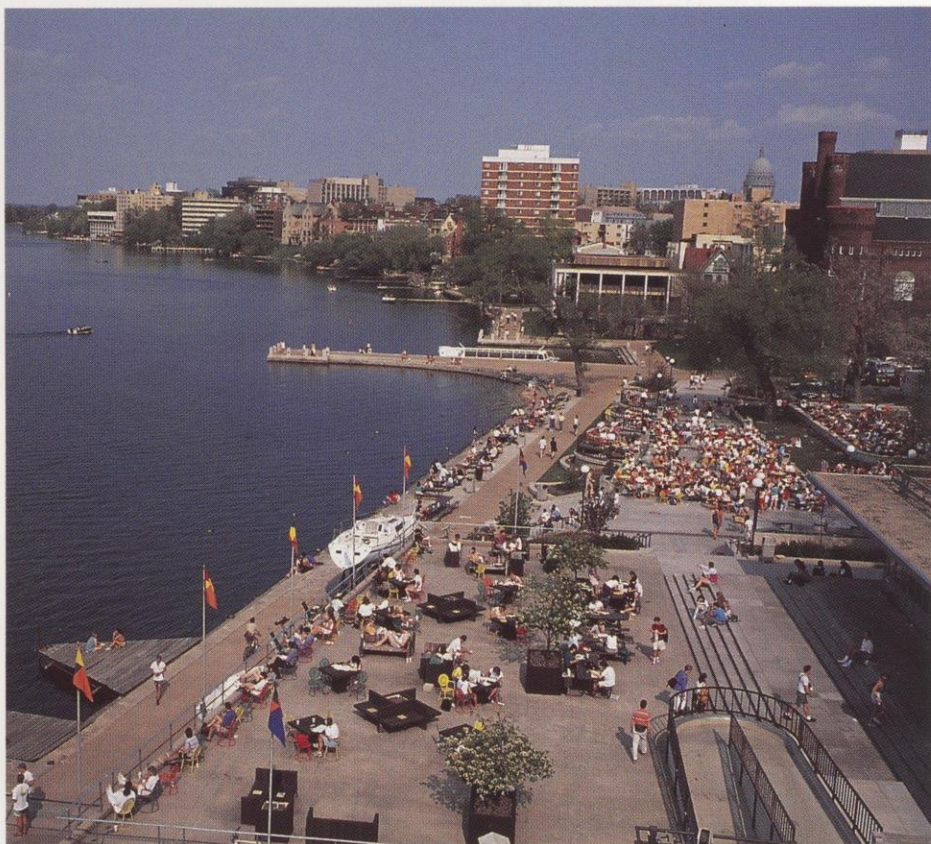
Wisconsin has ranked among the top ten universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections are offered. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's degree programs.

UW-Madison departments ranked among the top ten in the nation in the 1980s include Sociology (1st), German, Chemical Engineering and Geography (2nd), Statistics (4th), Plant Pathology, Molecular Biology and Biochemistry (5th), Spanish and Portuguese (6th), Zoology (7th), Political Science, Chemistry and Economics (8th), Mathematics (9th), and History (10th).

The UW's international activities extend the boundaries of the campus to all parts of the globe. The campus has about 3,600 foreign students from 125 countries, offers some 50 foreign languages for study, and has the largest overall number of international studies faculty and largest number of faculty of any university in East Asian, South and Southeast Asian, African and Latin American studies. Junior-year-abroad programs are offered for students going to Brazil, China, England, France, West Germany, Hungary, Israel, India, Italy, Spain, Sweden, Norway, Nepal, Thailand and Mexico and Quebec for summer study.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, education of physicians and other health professionals, research and public service. It includes the Medical,

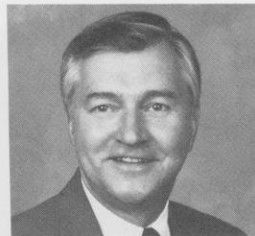

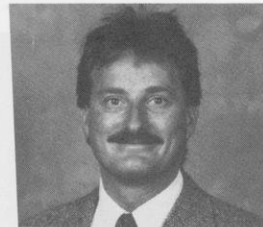

A 1976 graduate of Western Michigan University with a Bachelor of Arts in English and Journalism, Spencer spent his first year at the UW (1982-83) as an administrative assistant to Badger hockey coach Jeff Sauer and was with Wisconsin's 1983 NCAA Championship hockey team.

Prior to arriving at the UW, Spencer was the publicity and publications director for the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States in Colorado Springs from 1979-81, and was assistant sports information director at both his alma mater, Western Michigan University (1977-79), and Eastern Michigan University (1976-77).

## FOR MEDIA COVERING WISCONSIN HOCKEY

### Arriving at the Dane County Coliseum

The University of Wisconsin's working facilities for newspaper, radio and television are located in the upper level on the east side of the Coliseum. Media covering the Badgers should enter the Coliseum at the Press/Player's Entrance located at ground level on the north side of the building.

### Media Credentials

All requests for working press credentials for University of Wisconsin Hockey home games must be made in advance through the UW Sports News Service Office, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. PHONE: (608) 262-1811. Requests should be made on your company's official letterhead and at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press/Player's Entrance to the Coliseum. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations.

### Radio and Television

Visiting radio and television stations will be admitted for broadcast upon the recommendation of the visit-

ing school and its sports information director. Requests must be received at least one week prior to the game(s) you wish to broadcast. Broadcast locations are assigned by the UW Sports News Service based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. Tickets will be held at the UW Sports News Service office thru noon on Friday and then will be placed at the Press/Player's Entrance to the Coliseum for later pickup.

### Photographers

Photo passes are also limited because of space restrictions at the Coliseum. Requests should be submitted on your company's letterhead to the UW Sports News Service Office and will be granted on a priority first-come, first-serve basis. Photographers are asked to consider the paying customers when shooting in the Coliseum.

### Press Parking

There is no reserved parking for visiting press at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum. Visiting media should plan to arrive at the Coliseum at least one hour prior to game time to avoid parking problems.

### Interviewing Wisconsin Players

UW player interviews may be conducted in the media interview room outside the University of Wisconsin dressing room following each game. No press will be permitted inside the University of Wisconsin locker room.

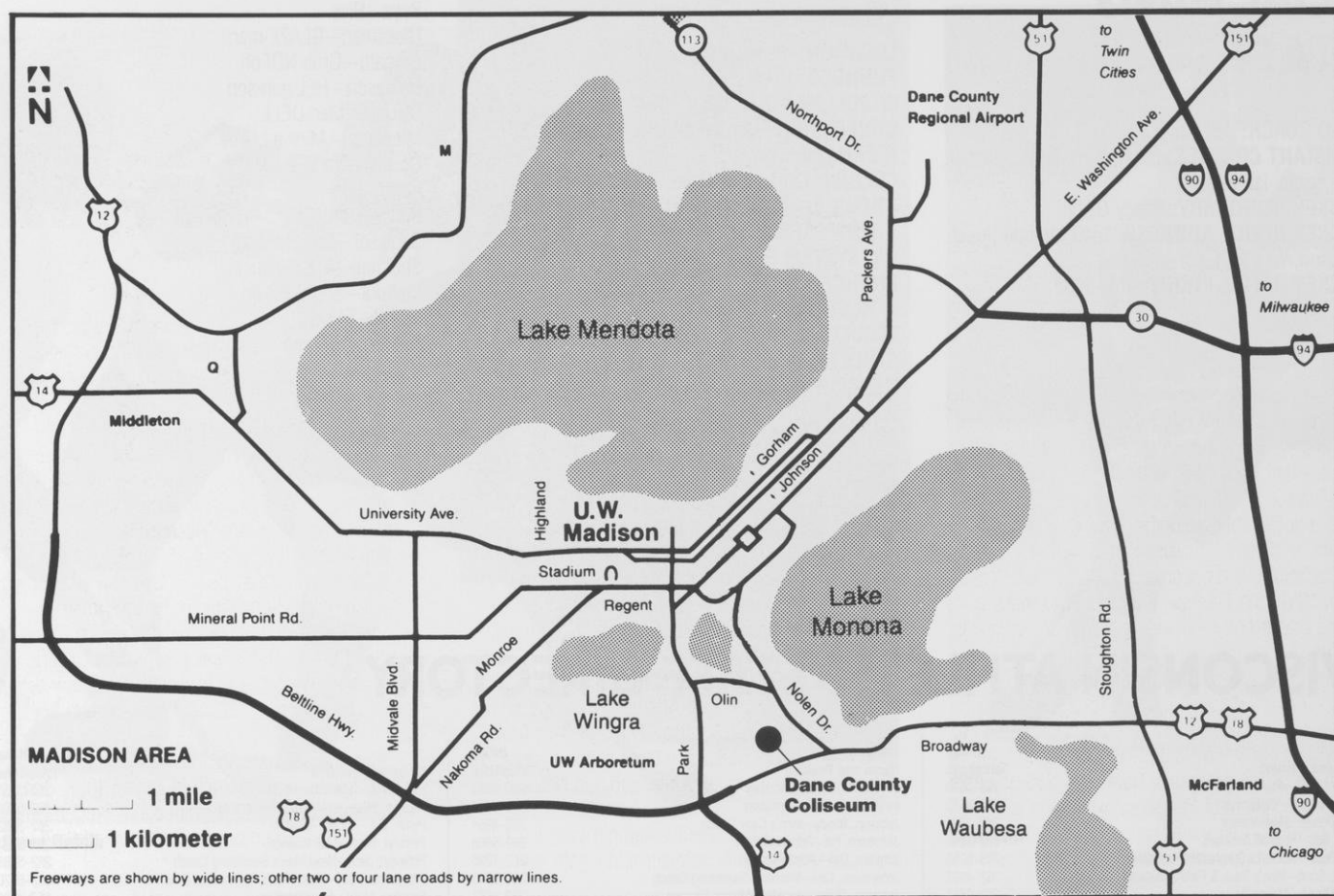
Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short post-game team meeting. Player interviews may also be conducted during the week following practice at the Coliseum or the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, usually 5:30-6:30 pm.

### Interviewing the Coach

Wisconsin Head Coach Jeff Sauer will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game session with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach Sauer will be conducted in the media interview room adjacent to the Wisconsin dressing room.

The best time to interview Coach Sauer during the week is between 10:00 am and 12:00 noon at the UW Hockey Office or following practice at approximately 5:30-6:00 pm. PHONE: (608) 262-3932.

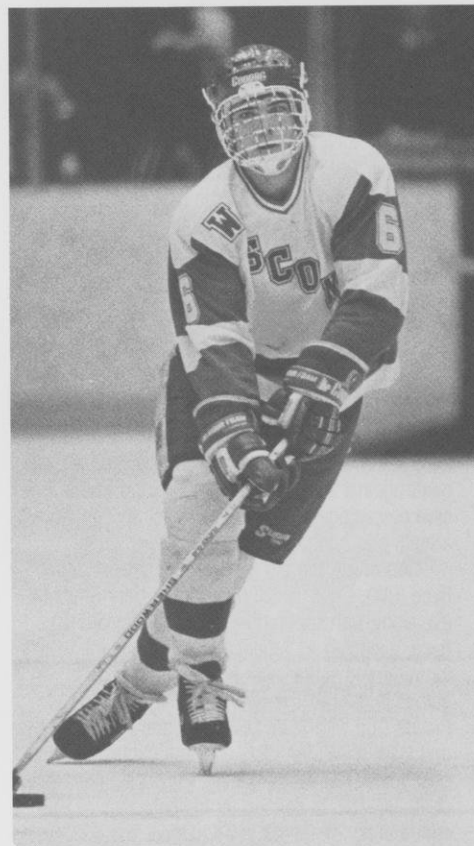

# 1989-90 WISCONSIN OUTLOOK

The University of Wisconsin expects to make a strong run for the WCHA Championship, as well as a berth in the NCAA tournament in 1989-90, as the Badgers field what shapes up as one of the school's best-balanced clubs in recent memory.

Although no one knows better than veteran coach Jeff Sauer that games aren't won on paper, his optimism for his eighth campaign as Badger hockey mentor is readily apparent.

"Yes, we feel real good about our prospects," Sauer said during training camp. "We have a strong, experienced senior class, a solid defensive unit, and a capable goaltender coming back. We expect our primary strength to be on the defensive side, and when it comes right down to it, it's usually defense that will ultimately provide the difference."

"But we also know we have a number of areas to improve on—notably shoring up our power-play and cutting down on our penalty minutes—and if we can make some significant strides in those areas we should definitely be a strong team throughout the '89-90 season."

Sauer, who led his first Wisconsin hockey team (1982-83) to the NCAA Championship, has also taken his Badgers to national tournaments in 1987-88 and 1988-89. He knows that the road to the promised land is an extremely tough one, and he indicated he would be putting the pressure on his club earlier than he has in past years.

"One of the real keys to our success this season will be our ability to get out of the box quickly. We need to stay close early in the season. We can't

afford to get ourselves behind in terms of lost games early on. I definitely feel we have an upper division team and if we can stay in the thick of things early we have a chance for an outstanding season. We're going to put a lot of pressure on a lot earlier this year than we did a year ago."

The Badgers return 21 lettermen, nine of the team's top ten scorers, and six veteran defensemen for '89-90. Also back in the fold is the team's No. 2 goaltender from a year ago, sophomore Duane Derksen. Team captains for the new season are senior forwards Steve Rohlik, John Byce and Gary Shuchuk along with senior defenseman Mark Osiecki. Yes, on paper the prospects look very bright indeed.

The Badgers lost three players to graduation and one to the National Hockey League. All-American defenseman Paul Stanton has moved on, as have center Kurt Semandel and winger Greg Poss. Also missing is WCHA Most Valuable Player and Freshman of the Year Curtis Joseph, who posted a 2.49 goals-against average, a 21-11-5 record and a .919 save percentage over 2,267 minutes. Joseph signed a multi-year contract with the St. Louis Blues.

Offensively, the big guns will be seniors John Byce (RW), Chris Tancill (RW-C) and Gary Shuchuk (C), along with sophomore Doug Macdonald (C). Byce, a leading All-America candidate, is the team's top returning scorer after posting 27-28-55 in 42 games in '88-89. The Badgers' #11 played in the Pravda Cup with Team USA last spring, was a second team All-WCHA pick, and was the league's top goal scorer last winter. Tancill, who has career totals of 42-60-102, is coming off his best season after contributing 20-23-43 in 44 games. The speedy Shuchuk, an honorable mention All-WCHA selection as a junior, also posted his best stats last season (18-19-37) and shows career scoring totals of 44-

52-96 heading into '89-90. Macdonald, meanwhile, was one of the league's top scoring freshmen with 23-25-48 in 44 games.

Also returning at forward positions are veterans Steve Rohlik (11-14-25), Don Granato (9-10-19), Tom Sagissor (7-11-18), Dennis Snedden (12-5-17), Brett Kurtz (4-9-13), John Parker (1-7-8), Jon Helgeson (7-1-8) and Joe Decker (2-5-7). Additional varsity candidates include Kurt Gonce and Jason Francisco.

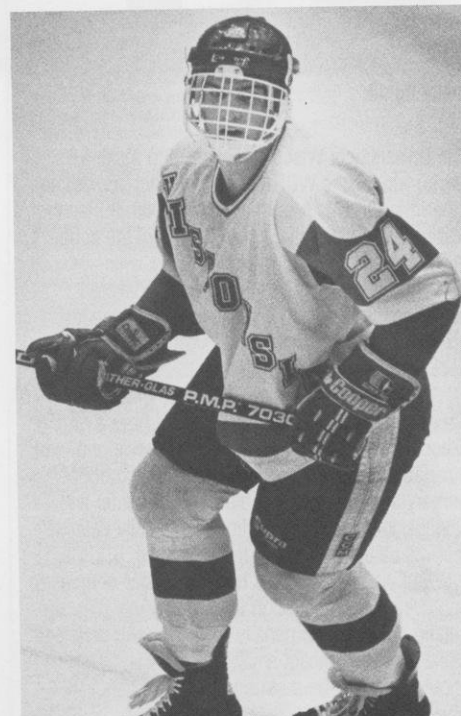
On the blueline, Coach Sauer expects to field one of his deepest contingents with senior All-WCHA candidates Rob Mendel (1-14-15) and Mark Osiecki (1-3-4), juniors Rob Andringa (2-19-21) and Rodger Sykes (0-1-1), sophomore All-WCHA candidate Sean Hill (2-23-25) and second-year member Chris Nelson (1-4-5). Also expected to challenge is senior Kurt Stahura. Mendel is a veteran of 126 collegiate games and played in the Pravda Cup with Team USA last spring. Osiecki, one of the college game's best shot blockers, is a rugged, stay-at-home defenseman who provides a physical presence in front of the net. Hill showed great promise in his first collegiate season.

In goal, the duties will be given to Duane Derksen, who was 4-5-0 with a 3.96 GAA and a .877 SV% over 561 minutes as a freshman. Among his top performances were a 3-0 shutout over New Hampshire and a 5-2 win over North Dakota. Number 29 will definitely hold one of the keys to the team's fortunes this year.

Newcomers for '89-90 include highly-touted Barry Richter, who can play at either forward or defense, and transfer forward Tray Tournie. Others to watch are defenseman Joe Harwell, forwards Matt Buss and Noel Rahn, and goaltenders Matt Glaesman and Jon Michelizzi.

# PRE-SEASON INTERVIEW WITH COACH JEFF SAUER

## **Please evaluate and give a general overview of the '88-89 season.**

"I think the biggest key to the '88-89 season was the fact that we did the unexpected in terms of what people thought we were going to do and what we ended up doing.

"Although the coaching staff at the beginning of the season, and we tried to relay this to the team, was the fact that we were a year away from having an outstanding team. But the team really developed very quickly with the addition of some fine freshmen. The point in case. . . of Curtis Joseph.

"It ended up being a very positive season for us. Going to the WCHA Playoff Championship again, going to the NCAA Tournament and reaching the final eight for the second straight year, and going back and beating St. Lawrence late in the season in the opening round of the NAAs certainly made it a very successful season.

"What was difficult, was having to return to Minnesota again to play a WCHA team in the NCAA Quarterfinals. In hindsight, you look back and ask 'why did the NCAA committee put us in that situation', but analyzing our season and so forth I have to agree with the selection process because when we went head-to-head with those other teams that were being considered, where we were seeded was probably the right spot. The problem was that they gave just one team from each league a chance to reach the final four."

## **What is your team's greatest strength heading into the new season?**

"At the end of last season, you would certainly

look at our goaltending and our defense. But heading into '89-90, you look at the loss of Curtis Joseph (WCHA MVP, WCHA Freshman of the Year, Badgers' MVP) and it's certainly not as encouraging as it would have been had he returned.

"But the bottom line is I think we're building our team from our defense out and I think that our defense is certainly our strength. Paul Stanton (All-WCHA defenseman) and Joseph are certainly tough to replace, but Duane Derksen and the defensemen returning from last year's team give us a great nucleus to be a defensive-oriented team again this year."

## **What most concerns you about the '89-90 season?**

"I have three concerns. Number one is the fact that we're a senior-dominated team. We have seven or eight seniors that are going to be our leaders this year and it's going to be the coaching staff's job to keep their focus on the correct things; not thinking about what's going to happen the following year.

"Number two. . . how quickly Duane Derksen comes along experience-wise. We have all the confidence in the world in him, but it's going to take him some time to get that experience.

"Number three, and most importantly, I think, is that this year we need to get out of the box quickly. We need to stay close early in the season. We can't afford to get ourselves behind in terms of lost games early on. I definitely feel we have an upper division team and if we can stay in the thick of things early we have a chance for an outstanding season. We're going to put a lot of pressure on a lot earlier this year than we did a year ago."

## **What players will you look for leadership and big performances?**

"Well, our senior class is certainly a key. At forward, Gary Shuchuk, John Byce, Steve Rohlik, Chris Tancill and Tom Sagissor are five guys we're going to look for to give us not only leadership but also a great deal of scoring. On defense, veterans Rob Mendel and Mark Osiecki will be anchors. And again, the quick progression—experience-wise—of Duane Derksen and what he can do for us in goal."

## **Defensively, you have to feel good about your prospects with the return of six lettermen, all of whom made strong contributions a year ago.**

"I certainly wouldn't disagree that we have a strong defense coming back. . . and I think it had a lot to do with the success that Curtis Joseph had because he had great strength defensively in front of him. But we still have to institute the system and we have to play with the right chemistry. That's the real key. Defense isn't just the defensemen, it's everybody playing together."

## **What areas of the game will you add emphasis to?**

"We're going to really work on having everybody play together. . . to be a strong defensive-minded

team. We also want to continue to capitalize on our penalty-killing situation.

"But two places we want to turn things around are one, we want to stay out of the penalty box and two, we want to develop a high-profile power-play."

## **What can you do to shore up the power-play? What makes a power-play successful?**

"One thing about the power-play is the fact that you have to have unselfish people out there. As the season progressed last year, I think that key individuals on our team found they couldn't do it all by themselves. We will emphasize that this season.

"Our penalty-killing, our defensive play, our overall production and standings were, for the most part, fine. But we need to have a power-play that can go out there and guarantee us consistent production."

## **In John Byce, you have one of the WCHA's best goal scorers. Who, along with him, will you look to for offensive production?**

"I think there are a number of guys who can, potentially, really be big scorers for us. Gary Shuchuk has shown that ability at times; Chris Tancill is certainly a proven scorer; Doug Macdonald proved last year he can score and he will surely improve; Dennis Snedden is on the doorstep of being a 20-goal scorer for us. And Brett Kurtz, Don Granato, Joe Decker, Jon Helgeson. . . that crew. . . if they can come through and maybe improve themselves

by five goals this year—each one of them—we'll be in good shape offensively."

#### What does the loss of Curtis Joseph after just one season really mean to the team?

"In Curtis Joseph's signing a pro contract. . . first of all, I don't think he really wanted to leave, but he was given such a great opportunity that he had to make that decision. In post-season meetings with the team, the majority of the players were aware that Curtis probably would not return. But they also displayed a great deal of confidence in Duane Derksen. The players all took a very mature attitude towards that development."

#### What will make Duane Derksen the kind of goaltender you need?

"First of all, now Duane knows he's our goaltender. Now he can prepare mentally with that in mind. Last year, there was a question mark in coming in to Wisconsin whether he was going to play right away or not."

"Duane has all the tools, and knowing that we are putting our faith in him will certainly give him that much more confidence right off the bat. He knows he's going to play. He can prepare from a technique standpoint, rather than wondering if he will get into games or not."

"A year ago, when he knew early on in a week that he would play in a specific game, he performed very well. That's certainly no weakness on his part."

"Duane will do an outstanding job for us, we have no doubt about that."

#### How do you perceive the WCHA in 1989-90?

"The league has, over the course of the years, proven to be very consistent in terms of balance. Especially the last five or six years. There's been a lot of pretty good teams in the league. It's been very competitive."

"I think Minnesota, even though they lost a lot of players, will again be the team to beat. Denver will be pretty good, as will Michigan Tech. North Dakota and Minnesota-Duluth will always challenge. The steps that Northern Michigan made last year. . . you certainly have to put them in the category of being an upper division club again. And you know Colorado College will continue to improve."

#### As the 'Dean' of WCHA coaches, and a veteran of more than 700 games involving WCHA teams, how has the league changed over the years in your eyes?

"A couple things have happened that have really opened the door for us. First of all, hockey in general—across the country—has become more competitive. Our relationship between the WCHA and Hockey East has played an important part in developing a higher level of hockey across the country because you have to be ready to play every night. That's the case now, whether you play west or east."

"The individual talent level is more balanced as

well. There are two or three very good players on each team more than seven, eight or nine skilled players—much like the National Hockey League."

"One thing that has hurt us, though, is the 18-year-old draft. That has changed some of the attitudes of players coming into college hockey and into pro hockey. And secondly, the pool of players that we're recruiting now isn't nearly as big as it was ten years ago. More players are opting to go to professional hockey right away because they're getting contacted earlier than they did ten years ago. That takes away some of the recruiting strengths that we had."

#### What concerns you about the state of college hockey? Is it healthy?

"Yes, it's a very healthy game. But in some instances, maybe especially in the areas of recruiting, we create the 'we make our own beds and have to lie in them' situations. When we recruit the Gary Suters, Curtis Josephs and Scott Mellanbys of the world, we realize they're going to wind up leaving school early in most cases. Those are difficult circumstances to overcome when you have to reload all the time."

"But I know, too, that it's very important that people in the Coliseum get a chance to see that caliber of talent, whether it be for one, two, three or four years. Those are players that can make that ultimate difference."

"Ultimately, this process has to be disturbing to all of us in college hockey. We spend a lot of time and money and make a major commitment to these young men, but when the money's put on the table . . . you can't criticize them for making that move but you know, too, that hockey isn't all there is to life. You just hope that they make good use of what they're doing and hopefully someday down the road they can get that college degree."

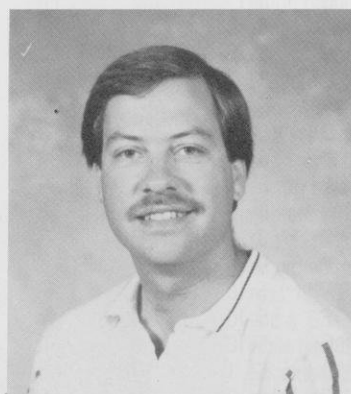


**Team Strength Advisor**

# HEAD COACH

## JEFF SAUER

One of the most respected and influential coaches in the collegiate game today, 1989-90 marks the eighth year for Jeff Sauer as the guiding force of the University of Wisconsin ice hockey program.

In seven seasons at the helm of the Badgers, Sauer's teams have averaged nearly 27 victories per year and have compiled an impressive 184-106-13 record and a .629 winning percentage. His 1988-89 team posted a 25-16-5 record, finished third in the WCHA race and advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals. In 1987-88, his Cardinal and White put together a 30-13-2 overall mark, advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals, and fashioned a 22-12-1 record and second place WCHA finish.

The Badgers' 25 victories in '88-89 marked the 12th time since 1971 that Wisconsin teams have won at least 23 games, and was the 19th time in the past 22 seasons that the UW has won 20 or more games. Under Sauer's leadership, the Badgers have won 30 or more games twice and at least 21 games all seven seasons.

Some of the outstanding players that Sauer has coached at Wisconsin include Gary Suter (Calgary Flames), Chris Chelios (Montreal Canadiens), Bruce Driver (New Jersey Devils), Patrick Flatley (New York Islanders), Scott Mellanby (Philadelphia Flyers), Tony Granato (New York Rangers), Steve Tuttle (St. Louis Blues), Paul Ranheim (Calgary Flames), Mike Richter (New York Rangers), Curtis Joseph (St. Louis Blues),

and Paul Stanton (Pittsburgh Penguins).

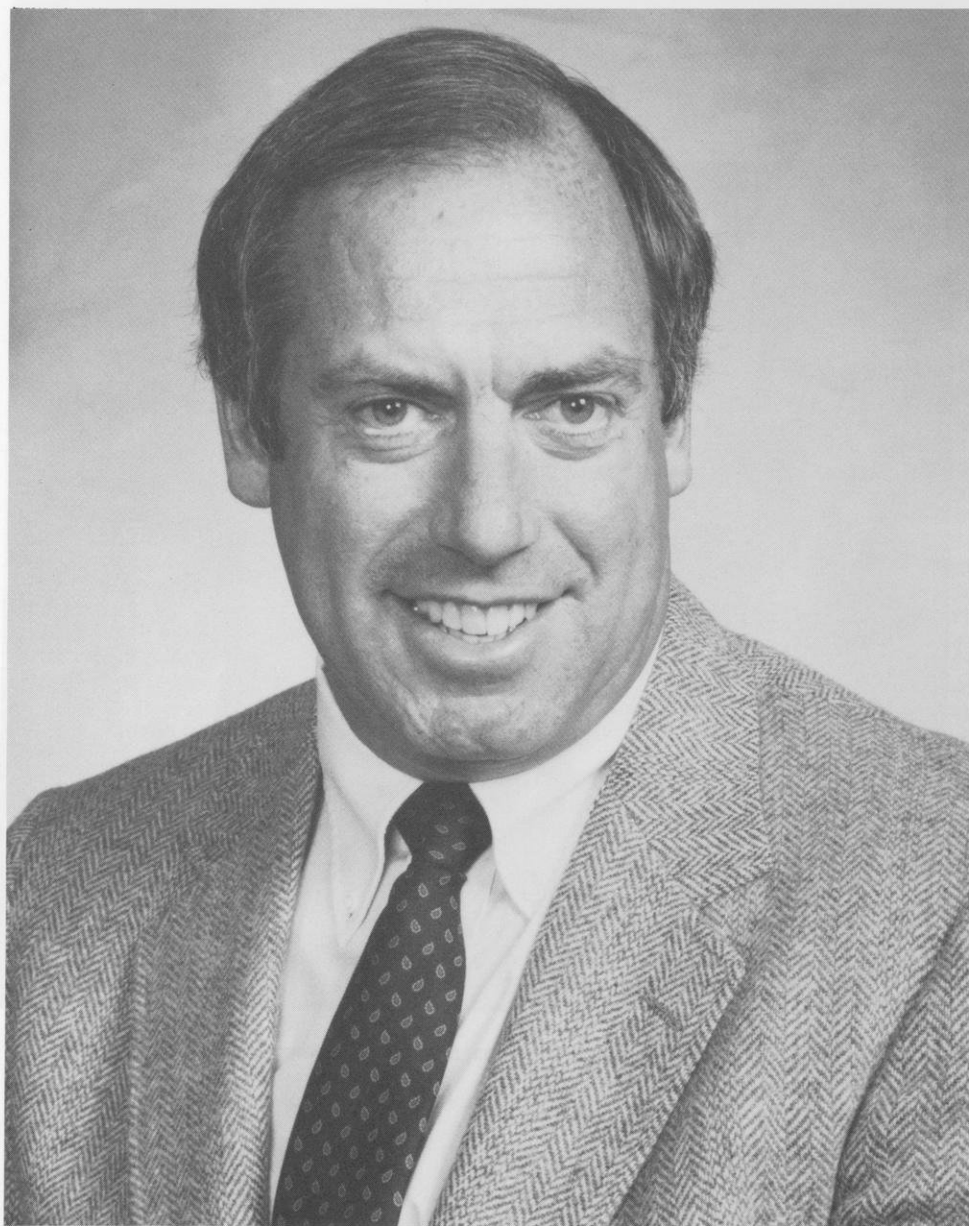
In addition to being one of college hockey's top coaches, Sauer has a wealth of international hockey experience as well. Last April, for instance, he coached the 1989 USA Selects Hockey Team (composed primarily of top collegiate players) at the Pravda Cup tournament in Leningrad, USSR. He is a regular consultant to USA Hockey Teams and served as one of four head coaches at the Olympic Festival in North Carolina in the summer of 1988. In the spring of 1985, he served as an assistant coach to Dave Peterson for the 1985 USA Hockey Team that participated in the annual IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia. That team put together a fine fourth place finish—just out of the medal picture and behind World Champion Czechoslovakia, runner-up Canada, and third place Russia.

Sauer reached a personal milestone during the 1987-88 campaign, posting his 300th career coaching victory. It was a victory that put him into select company in college hockey circles. Only 46 years old, Sauer will also mark his 19th season as a Western Collegiate Hockey Association head coach this winter, qualifying him as the "Dean" of league coaches.

In his first year at Wisconsin in 1982-83, Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach had ever done before. His Badgers captured the 1983 NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the best marks in school history at 33-10-4. It marked the fourth national championship for Wisconsin since 1973. Four members of that team—Pat Flatley, Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver and Marc Behrend—also played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia before moving on to careers in the National Hockey League.

Known for their second-half peaks, Sauer's Wisconsin hockey teams have put together some impressive numbers during the January-March stretch runs. His 1982-83 team compiled a 23-4-2 record and an .828 winning percentage after Christmas; his youthful '84-85 club ran up a 19-9 mark and a .679 winning percentage after November 30th; while his '85-86 club went 14-5-0 (.737) from December 30th to March 2nd. In 1986-87, Wisconsin fashioned an 8-1-0 tear from late December to late January, and in '87-88, Sauer's Badgers skated to an impressive 14-4-2 (.750) second-half record (Jan. 15-Mar. 27). Last winter, the UW went on a 17-7-1 (.700) run from December 13th to March 24th.

Among Sauer's list of "notables" in the coaching profession are: head coach of the South team at the 1983 National Sports Festival; member of the 1984 US Olympic Hockey Committee; 1983 and 1989 Chairman of the WCHA Coach's Committee; coach of the 1989 USA Selects Hockey Team at the Pravda Cup; and a stint on the NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee. Jeff also directs his own hockey school in Madison each summer and has worked with the Stan Mikita Hockey School for the Hearing-Impaired





in Chicago.

Sauer knew he had giant shoes to fill when he left a comfortable position as head hockey coach and athletic director at Colorado College to replace the highly successful "Badger" Bob Johnson in 1982. But his character, determination to succeed and his positive rapport with student-athletes, fans, and media have proved he was the ideal choice.

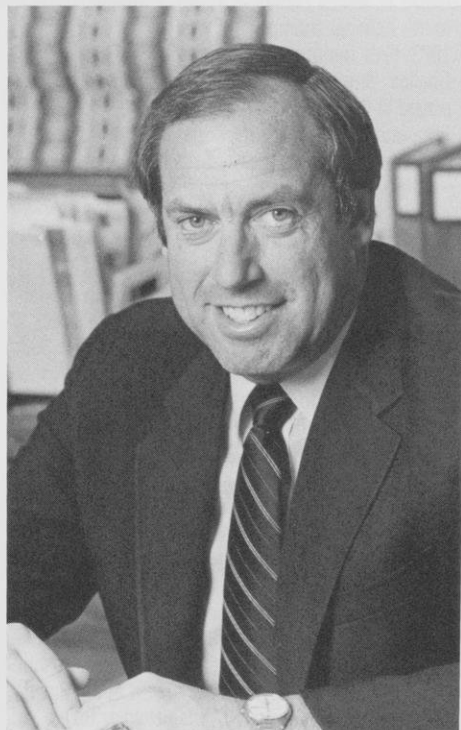
At Colorado College, where he had served as the Tigers' Head Coach since 1971, Jeff won more than 180 games and was twice named WCHA "Coach of the Year." His first award came following his rookie season of 1971 and the second following the 1975-76 campaign when Colorado College posted a fine 23-14-0 record and finished third in the final WCHA standings. Sauer also guided his '80-81 Tigers to third place in the WCHA.

Wisconsin hockey fans will probably never forget the almost legendary "Black Sunday" in March of 1981 when Sauer's CC Tigers came back with a miraculous 11-4 upset over the Badgers in the Dane County Coliseum to claim the two-game, total-goals playoff victory. (Wisconsin had won the opening game 8-2.)

A 1965 graduate of Colorado College, Jeff earned a Bachelor's degree in Sociology. During his undergraduate years in Colorado Springs, he competed in both varsity hockey and baseball for the Tigers.

In 1966, Sauer began his coaching career as an assistant to Bob Johnson at Colorado College. Then when Johnson took over the head coaching duties at Wisconsin, Sauer again served as his assistant coach.

Jeff and wife, Jamie, are the parents of two children—son Chip, 14, and daughter Beth, nine.

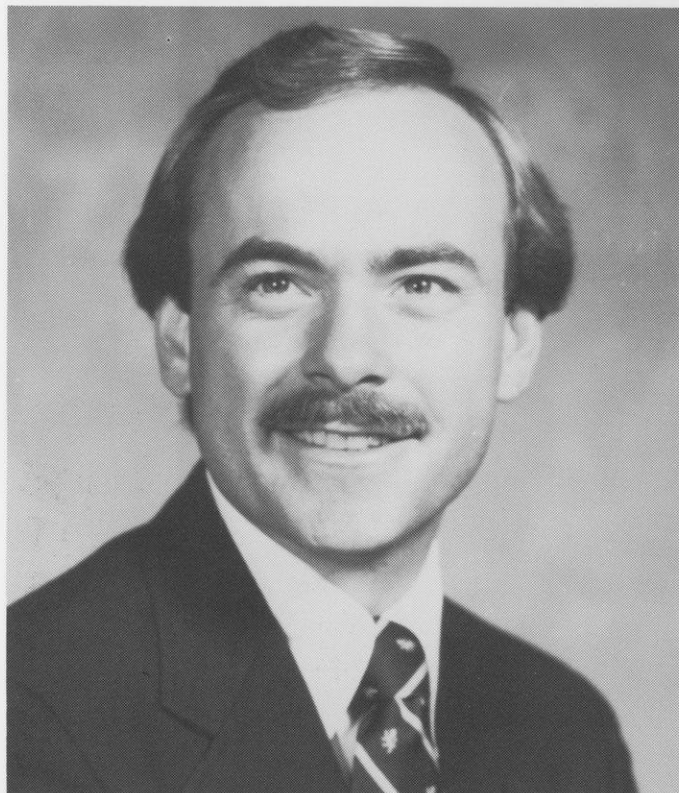

## Assistant Coach **MIKE KEMP**

Marking his eighth year overall as an assistant coach with the Wisconsin Hockey program in 1989-90 is Mike Kemp.

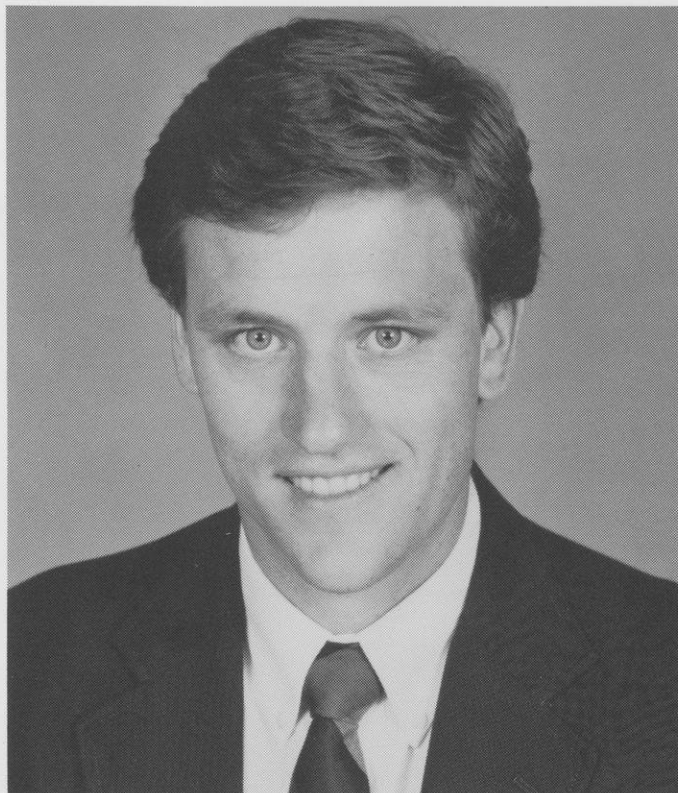
In addition to his numerous on (he works extensively with the Badgers' penalty-killing units) and off-ice duties with the Badger Hockey team, Kemp also coordinates recruiting efforts for head coach Jeff Sauer. Last year, the Badgers were the top-rated penalty-killing team in the WCHA. In the summer months, Mike is involved with several hockey schools in the midwest.

From 1983-85, Mike served as administrative assistant coach to Jeff Sauer as well as executive director of the Blue Line Club. One of his chief duties in that role was producing the official game program at all Badger home games.

## Assistant Coach **PETER JOHNSON**

Peter Johnson enters his third season as a full-time assistant hockey coach at the University of Wisconsin in 1989-90. He was originally named to head coach Jeff Sauer's coaching staff in August, 1987.

A 1983 University of Wisconsin graduate with a B.S. degree in Physical Education, Peter comes from one of America's great hockey families. He is the son of legendary UW hockey coach, Calgary Flames' mentor and 'USA Hockey' director "Badger" Bob Johnson, and is the brother of former Badger All-American, 1980 US Olympic Gold Medal-winner, and current New Jersey Devil player Mark Johnson.

Prior to returning to the Madison campus, Peter spent two seasons (1985-86 and 1986-87) as an assistant hockey coach at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. There, his duties included recruiting, assisting in practice planning, on-ice coaching, off-ice training and scheduling for junior varsity games.

Johnson has also served as an assistant coach at Bowling Green State University (1984-85) and as a graduate assistant coach (1983-84) at BGSU while earning his Master of Education degree in Athletic Administration.

Peter played four years of collegiate hockey at Wisconsin under his father, Bob, and was a forward on the Badgers' 1981 NCAA Championship team. The 1981-82 Wisconsin team, which he captained, placed second in the national tournament.

During his four years at the UW, Johnson played in 153 games and scored 159 points on 82 goals and 77 assists. His point total is the 17th best all-time mark at the UW. He also earned four varsity letters, was named the team's most improved player for 1979-80, and earned the team's Ivan B. Williamson Award for scholastic achievement for 1981-82.

Peter was a member of United States National Hockey Teams in 1982 and 1983, was a participant in National Sports Festivals in 1981, 1982 and 1983, and took part in the World Ice Hockey Tournament in 1982 at Helsinki, Finland.

He and his wife, Sally, have a four-year-old son, Craig, and a one-year-old son, Keith.





## Assistant Coach **BILL HOWARD**

A key to the Badgers' continued success at the goaltending position over the years has been coach Bill Howard, who marks his 18th year overall with the University of Wisconsin hockey program in 1989-90.

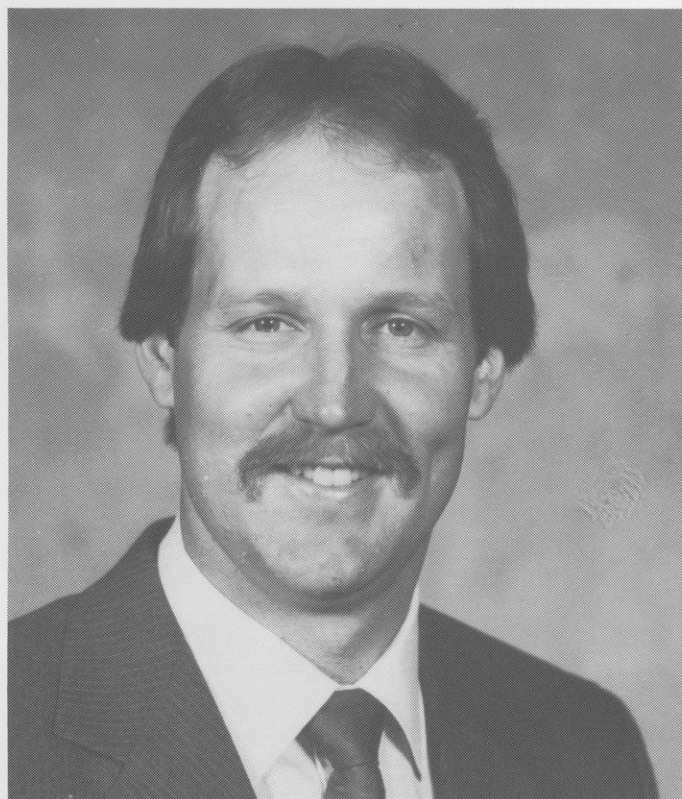

Ian Perrin, who has been affiliated with the University of Wisconsin Hockey program for all but two years since his playing days as a Badger began back in 1974, serves as an assistant coach as well as executive director of the Blue Line Club.

In addition to assisting with the varsity team, Perrin's duties with the hockey program also include coaching the UW junior varsity team, coordinating academics, and training and conditioning. He also edits and produces Wisconsin's home game programs and serves as a color commentator on local radio broadcasts of Badger Hockey games—both home and away.

Originally from Spy Hill, Saskatchewan, Ian was a four-year letterwinner on defense for Badger hockey teams from 1974-79.

Following graduation from Wisconsin, Ian spent two seasons playing professional hockey in the minor leagues, but an eye injury abruptly ended his playing career in the spring of 1981.

Perrin originally joined the Wisconsin hockey staff as a graduate assistant in the fall of 1981. Since returning to the UW, he has completed a Master's program in Agricultural Economics and is currently working on a Masters of Science in Physical Education.

# THE WESTERN COLLEGIATE HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

The University of Wisconsin-Madison is proud to be a member of America's premier collegiate hockey league—the Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

No conference can match the WCHA's outstanding reputation for producing national championship teams, All-Americans, Olympians, and subsequent stars in the National Hockey League. The quality of institutions, student-athletes, coaching, on-ice play, and level of administrative and fan support throughout the eight-team WCHA is second to none. The 1989-90 season sees the Western Collegiate Hockey Association mark its 31st year and fifth decade of top flight competition.

WCHA-member teams have claimed an unprecedented 28 NCAA Ice Hockey Championships, have claimed 66% of the national titles contested over the past 30 years, and have won 11 of the last 17 tournaments, with the University of North Dakota skating to a most recent national title in 1987. Along with its 28 NCAA titles, the WCHA can also boast of 23 second place finishes and since the NCAA Tournament began in 1948, the WCHA has had at least two teams in college hockey's 'final four' 34 times and has claimed 43% of the 168 total national tournament berths available. Three member institutions, Wisconsin, North Dakota and Minnesota, have

accounted for ten national championships since 1973. The Badgers earned the NCAA Championship in 1973, 1977, 1981 and 1983, North Dakota took the crown in 1980, 1982 and 1987, and Minnesota captured the national title in 1974, 1976 and 1979.

Perhaps the most recent example of the WCHA's ability to draw on its great tradition was the institution of an annual WCHA Playoff Championship (i.e. 'final four') in the spring of 1988. Contested at the St. Paul (MN) Civic Center in March with the four first-round playoff winners, the WCHA Playoff Championship has quickly established itself as one of college hockey's premier showcase events. The first two tournaments (1988 and 1989) have drawn a total of 102,039 fans, an average of 12,755 per game (eight games!).

The names and faces of ex-WCHA players are legendary, and although the list is too numerous to mention them all, you can start with John Mayasich, Bill Hay, Bill Masterton, Gordon "Red" Berenson, Lou Nanne, Tony Esposito, Keith Magnuson, Wayne Thomas, Dennis Hextall, Ron Grahame, 'Chico' Resch and Ed Mio. And more recently, the WCHA boasts of such alumni as current National Hockey League standouts Glenn Anderson (Denver), Ed Belfour (North Dakota), Perry Berezan (North Dakota), Mike

Blaisdell (Wisconsin), Aaron and Neal Broten (Minnesota), Chris Chelios (Wisconsin), Dave Christian (North Dakota), Kevin Dineen (Denver), Bruce Driver (Wisconsin), Patrick Flatley (Wisconsin), Curt Giles (Minnesota-Duluth), Tony Granato (Wisconsin), Tony Hrkac (North Dakota), Brett Hull (Minnesota-Duluth), Jim Johnson (Minnesota-Duluth), Mark Johnson (Wisconsin), Bob Joyce (North Dakota), Tom Kurvers (Minnesota-Duluth), Reed Larson (Minnesota), Doug Lidster (Colorado College), Craig Ludwig (North Dakota), Norm Maciver (Minnesota-Duluth), David Maley (Wisconsin), Bob Mason (Minnesota-Duluth), Scott Mellanby (Wisconsin), Brian Mullen (Wisconsin), Troy Murray (North Dakota), James Patrick (North Dakota), Mike Ramsey (Minnesota), Craig Redmond (Denver), Greg Smith (Colorado College), Gary Suter (Wisconsin), Dave Tippet (North Dakota), Steve Tuttle (Wisconsin), Bill Watson (Minnesota-Duluth), Tim Watters (Michigan Tech) and Rick Zombo (North Dakota). Since 1950, the WCHA has had more than 135 of its players earn All-American honors, while nearly a hundred (total does not include 1988) have played on USA Olympic Hockey Teams. Fourteen of the 21 players on the United States' 1980 gold medal team were from the WCHA.

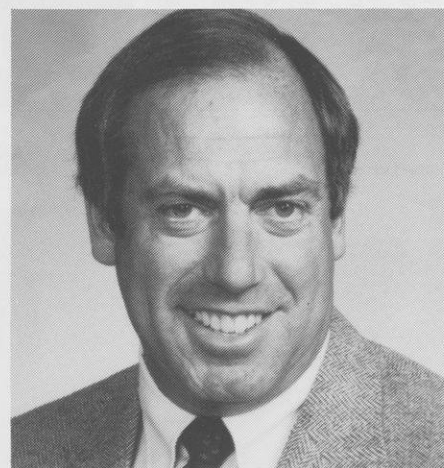

**MARCH, 1962:** Wisconsin Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced the return of ice hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28-year absence.

**DECEMBER 6, 1963:** A rebound goal by Chan Young 5:10 into the sudden death period gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate victory, a 3-2 decision over Macalester.

**FEBRUARY 22, 1964:** Wisconsin concluded its first season of hockey in the modern era with an 8-5-3 record.

**DECEMBER 11, 1964:** In an effort to upgrade the program, the Badgers schedule eight games against WCHA teams, but unfortunately, the Badgers go on to lose all eight of those games.

**FEBRUARY 22, 1966:** After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers finally post a victory, a 5-4 overtime win over Minnesota. Jim Petruzates scored on a break-away just two minutes into the overtime period.

**APRIL 1, 1966:** Following the retirement of John Riley, Bob Johnson was named head coach of the Wisconsin hockey program.

**MARCH, 1968:** Wisconsin hockey hit the national spotlight as Bert DeHate, a sophomore center, wins the national scoring title with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists. DeHate hits for seven hat tricks, a Badger record, as the team goes 21-10-0.

**MARCH 30, 1969:** After another successful season, including an 11-9-2 mark against WCHA

teams, the Badgers are admitted to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

**MARCH, 1970:** Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA and qualifies for the NCAA Championships, where they post a third place finish. Defenseman John Jagger of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario becomes the first Badger player to earn All-American honors.

**MARCH, 1972:** The Badgers make their second appearance at the NCAA Championships in three seasons, again coming away with a third place finish.

**MARCH 16, 1973:** Wisconsin stuns Cornell, 6-5, in overtime to advance to the finals of the NCAA Championships. A goal with five seconds left in regulation time by sophomore Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous then tallies the game-winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

**MARCH 17, 1973:** With a 4-2 victory over WCHA rival Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship for the first time in the school's history.

**MARCH 25, 1977:** After missing the NCAA playoffs for three years, the Badgers make it to the final four again. Les Grauer scored the tying goal against New Hampshire and Mike Eaves won it in overtime, 4-3, to move the Badgers into the finals.

**MARCH 26, 1977:** Senior Steve Alley culminated the Badgers' finest season with a goal 23 seconds into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Mich-

igan for the school's second NCAA Championship. Wisconsin finished the season at 37-7-1, and was the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Three players were named to the All-American squad - defenseman Craig Norwich, goaltender Julian Baretta and center Mike Eaves. Coach Bob Johnson was named national coach of the year, while his son, Mark, was named freshman of the year.

**MARCH 25, 1978:** Wisconsin fans took Providence, Rhode Island by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championships, and were resultingly proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans" by the city of Providence. Mike Eaves concluded his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson earned All-American acclaim. The Badgers finished fourth in the tournament.

**MARCH, 1979:** Record crowds saw the Badgers (25-13-3) play as 21 of the 23 home games were sellouts and the average crowd of 8,654 at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum was just eight short of a sellout. Mark Johnson closed out his Badger career as the top goal scorer (125) in Wisconsin history. He was named to the All-American team for the second time and was collegiate player of the year.

**MARCH 27, 1981:** Wisconsin returned to the NCAA Championships for the sixth time since 1970 after defeating the best team in the east, Clarkson, 9-8, in a total goal series at Potsdam, NY. After a 5-1 win

over Northern Michigan in the semi-finals, the Badgers advanced to the finals for the third time.

**MARCH 28, 1981:** The Badgers gained the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 win over Minnesota. The "back door" Badgers proved they were the champions after defeating the No. 1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota). The season also marked the end of the ten-team WCHA, as the three Michigan schools and Notre Dame dropped out and joined the CCHA to cut expenses.

**MARCH 27, 1982:** Wisconsin makes its seventh NCAA Championship appearance but finishes second to North Dakota. The Badgers compiled the second best record in school history at 35-11-1. Center John Newberry and defenseman Bruce Driver receive All-American honors while goaltender Marc Behrend is named NCAA tourney "MVP."

**JUNE 1, 1982:** Coach Bob Johnson resigns after 15 great years at Wisconsin. He had guided the Badgers to three NCAA Championships, seven national tournament appearances, a record of 367-175-23, and the best attendance of any college hockey program in the country.

**JULY 8, 1982:** Jeff Sauer, previously head coach at

Colorado College and former assistant to Bob Johnson at Wisconsin, is named the school's fourth coach.

**MARCH 5, 1983:** Sophomore defenseman Chris Chelios and sophomore winger Paul Houck score the tying and winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota, 6-5, in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA Playoff Championships in Minneapolis. It is the longest game in school history.

**MARCH 24-26, 1983:** After sweeping past Minnesota in Williams Arena to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship and the No. 1 seed in the West, first-year coach Jeff Sauer's Badgers swept St. Lawrence, 6-2 and 7-1, in the NCAA Quarterfinals in Madison to move to the NCAA Championships for the third straight year and eighth time overall since 1970. In Grand Forks, North Dakota, the Badgers claimed their fourth national championship since 1973 with a 2-0 win over Providence in the semi-finals and a 6-2 victory over Harvard in the finals. Senior goaltender Marc Behrend was named the NCAA tournament most valuable player for the second time in his career.

**JANUARY 7, 1984:** Wisconsin becomes the first and only American college team to defeat the 1984

US Olympic Hockey Team when the Badgers stun USA, 4-2, before 8,732 at the Dane County Coliseum.

**NOVEMBER 23, 1985:** The University of Wisconsin records its 500th victory since reviving hockey in 1963 with a 6-2 victory over WCHA-rival North Dakota in the Coliseum.

**DECEMBER 30, 1987:** Wisconsin beats CCHA-members Michigan, 6-0, and Michigan State, 4-3, to win the 23rd Annual Great Lakes Invitational Tournament before 19,482 at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit, MI. Goaltender Dean Anderson, defenseman Paul Stanton and forwards Paul Ranheim and Steve Tuttle are named to the all-tournament team, and Anderson also receives the tourney "MVP" award.

**MARCH 6-7, 1988:** Wisconsin defeats North Dakota, 2-1, and Minnesota, 3-2, to claim the first WCHA Final Four Playoff Championship before nearly 14,000 at the St. Paul Civic Center. Anderson, Stanton, Ranheim and Tuttle are voted to the all-tournament team while Anderson is tourney "MVP." Later that month, Ranheim and Stanton are named first team All-Americans, while Anderson and Tuttle are second team All-Americans. The Badgers finish at 30-13-2—the school's fourth 30-victory campaign.

Home ice for the University of Wisconsin Hockey Team is the impressive Dane County Memorial Coliseum, one of college hockey's finest all-around facilities and home to the NCAA Division I attendance leader for 20 consecutive seasons.

With theater-style seating for 8,644, the Dane County Coliseum is the second largest collegiate ice facility in the nation. The ice surface is an impressive 200' by 85', making for fast-paced, free-wheeling action.

Inside the Coliseum, the hockey Badgers make use of dressing room facilities as fine as any in the country. Each player is assigned a comfortable, spacious dressing stall (3 1/2x6) for practice and game equipment as well as personal belongings. Located just adjacent to the University of Wisconsin dressing room is a modern training room which includes a whirlpool and all the various modalities and exercise equipment for treatment of rehabilitation of injuries.

The Badgers also have at their disposal a newly-renovated and fully-equipped weight room located inside the Coliseum.

Recognized as the home of some of the nation's best collegiate hockey fans, the Dane County Coliseum and the University of Wisconsin hockey team have

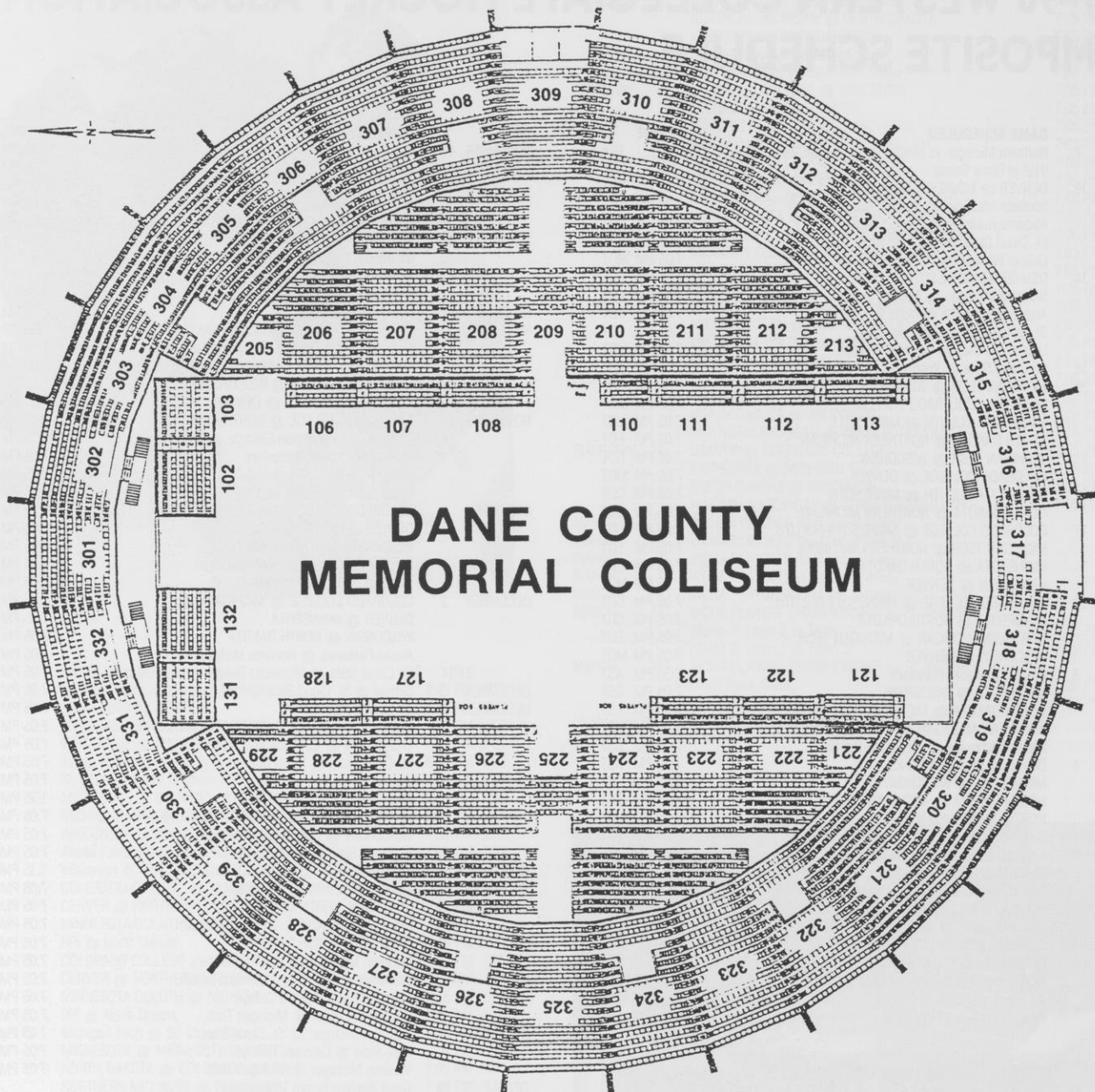
attracted the nation's largest crowds every year since the Badgers initially joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Association for the 1969-70 season.

The University of Wisconsin has led the nation in college hockey attendance for 20 consecutive seasons dating back to 1970! Some 3,831,315 Badger fans have watched UW hockey teams in the Coliseum since 1967. And since 1969, the UW has drawn 3,449,320 for 415 home dates (not counting exhibitions)—an average of 8,312 per game!

In the 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set the all-time NCAA season record, while the 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 is still an NCAA and UW record.

Along with some of the country's best fans, the Badgers can lay claim to one of the college game's best home ice records. University of Wisconsin hockey teams have a won-loss-tie record of 368-138-19 over 525 games since 1963 (through '88-89) for a winning percentage of .719!

As you might guess, witnessing a University of Wisconsin game in the jam-packed Dane County Coliseum is truly one of the great thrills in collegiate sports.

# 1989 BANK ONE BADGER HOCKEY SHOWDOWN

The University of Wisconsin, the Bradley Center and Banc One Wisconsin Corporation proudly announce the first 'Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown,' an annual Christmas holiday college hockey tournament to be held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The Badgers will serve as the host team each year.

The Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown will be contested each year during the Christmas holiday period at 18,000-seat Bradley Center, a state-of-the-art sports facility located in the heart of downtown Milwaukee. (The Bradley Center has also been awarded the 1993 NCAA Ice Hockey Championships.)

"This is a great opportunity for us to sell our product in the Milwaukee area, where we haven't had the chance before," said Wisconsin hockey coach Jeff Sauer.

"The Bradley Center is a tremendous facility, probably the finest hockey arena in the United States. We look forward to introducing top college hockey to the Milwaukee area. I think people will be very impressed with the caliber of competition and the spirit of play.

"The future looks very bright," added Sauer. "I have teams calling me already to become a part of future Bank One Badger Hockey Showdowns. This will assure that the tournament field will remain highly competitive."

The 1989 tournament, set for Thursday, December 28 and Friday, December 29, will feature four teams rich in tradition and success. In addition to host Wisconsin, the first Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown will feature Western Collegiate Hockey Association member University of Minnesota-Duluth, Hockey East Association member Boston College, and the University of Notre Dame.

The schedule for this year's tournament will match Minnesota-Duluth against Boston College at 5:00 pm CST and Wisconsin against Notre Dame at 8:00 pm CST on Thursday, December 28. Friday's schedule will feature a third place game (loser of game one vs loser of game two) at 5:00 pm CST with the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown championship game set for 8:00 pm CST.

Tickets for the first Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown are available at the Bradley Center box office, corner of Fourth and State Streets in Milwaukee, or from the University of Wisconsin Athletic Ticket Office, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison.

The Bradley Center, located on the corner of Fourth and State Streets, covers more than a city block and is within walking distance of such luxury hotels as the Hyatt Regency, Marc Plaza and the new Wyndham Hotel. Tournament headquarters will be at the Hyatt Regency.

The Bradley Center features the integration of classical architectural elements with state-of-the-art engineering and technology. There are four dramatic entryways leading into the facility, one on each corner of the building. Each entryway is reached through a progression of visually exciting spaces: a tree-lined plaza, leading through an exterior portico into a 28-foot high, glass-enclosed vestibule, which opens onto a stunning 60-foot high, 17,500 square-foot lobby, also totally glass enclosed. Inside each lobby, double rows of concrete columns with flame-

treated granite bases rise almost 70 feet to support a spectacular skylight system. Each atrium is further enhanced by special lighting.

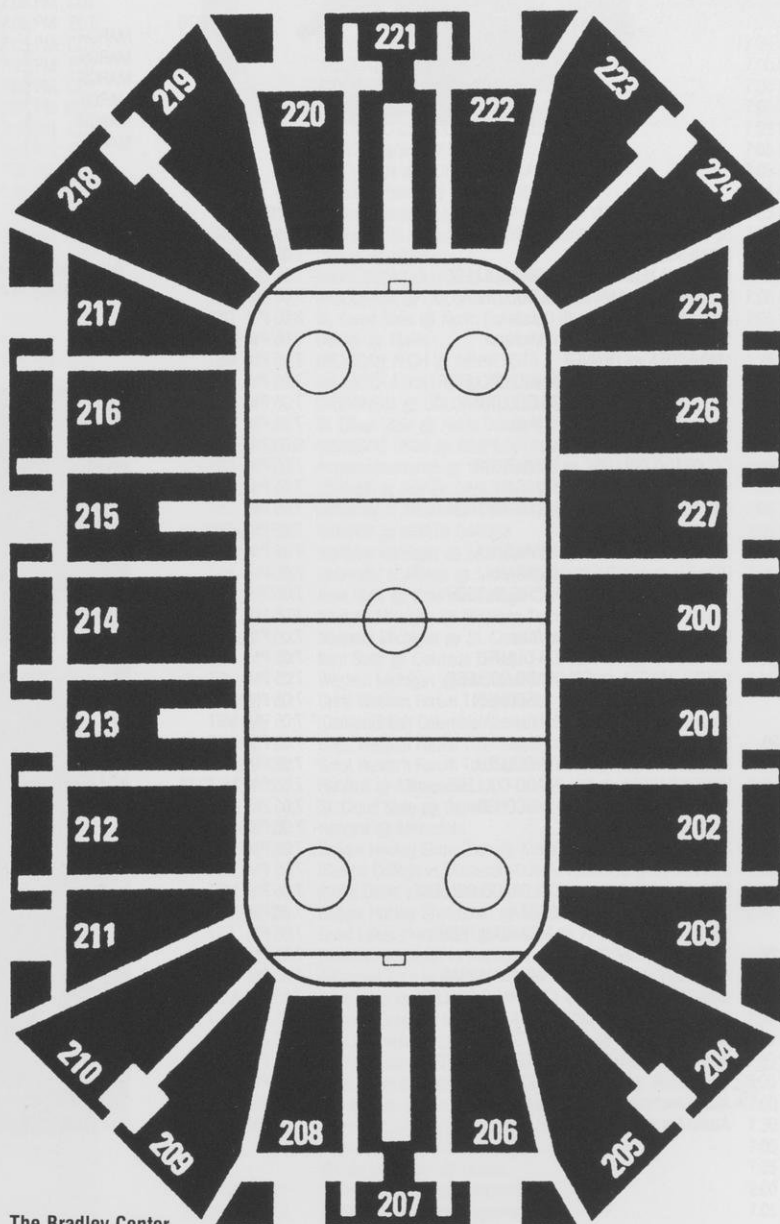
Two elevators, 16 escalators and various stairways take spectators to the seating area. Seating is comfortably arranged in an oblong octagon that provides spectators with an unrestricted view of the playing surface and the centrally located, four-sided video scoreboard.

The first level accommodates approximately 8,000 spectators. The second level features private suites that encircle the arena and provide seating for nine to 12 people per suite. The third level seats approximately 10,000 spectators in 21 rows of seats.

The Bradley Center has a total of 12 concession stands; eight of which sell traditional concession

food and refreshments. The other four sell special deli-style sandwiches, pizza, pasta, chili, soups and other foods. Each stand is equipped with two to six closed circuit TV monitors.

Bradley Center patrons won't miss a moment of action with the center's use of state-of-the-art video technology. The centerpiece of this system is a four-sided Fair-Play video scoreboard, each face consists of a 9x12-foot video screen. Four GE Talaria Multiple Light Valve color video projectors are mounted inside the scoreboard. By using two light valves and two lamps in one projector, the system can project images of maximum brightness, depth and clarity. There are over 200 video monitors located throughout the center.

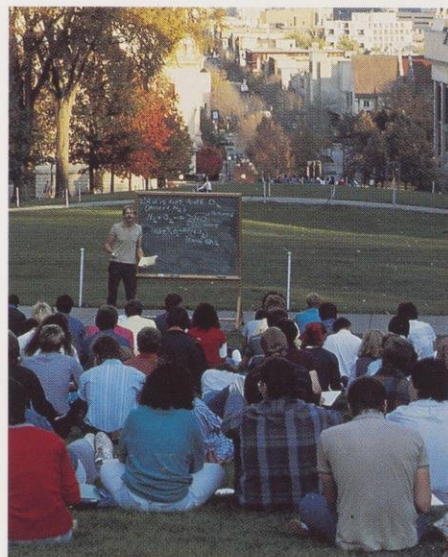
