
## THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

The University of Wisconsin, founded in 1848, has been recognized as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, with many departments ranked among the nation's top 10. *U.S. News*, in a 1993 issue, included UW-Madison in a list of the "Best College Buys".

From the initial class of 17, the student population has grown to a current enrollment of more than 40,000 students, the sixth-largest school in the U.S.

- Wisconsin is one of just 56 members of the Association of American Universities, the most prestigious organization of higher education in the U.S.
- University libraries house more than 5.4 million volumes, 13th-most in the nation according to the Association of Research Libraries.
- The UW had \$372 million in research and development funds in 1994, third-most in the nation according to a National Science Foundation survey.
- Wisconsin received \$164 million in voluntary support in 1994, ranking first nationally among public colleges and universities.
- According to a *Standard & Poor's* survey, Wisconsin is one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees.
- *U.S. News & World Report* rated the UW-Madison's sociology department as No. 1 in the nation. Additionally, the magazine ranked psychology 12th, history 9th, political science 10th, economics 11th and engineering 12th.
- The 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States reported that 15 departments on campus were rated in the top 10 in the nation.
- The University boasts the top-rated department of education in the nation according to 1990 and 1994 studies conducted at the University of Illinois.
- The Wisconsin Alumni Association is the second-largest independently financed group in the United States.
- Through its history, the UW-Madison has produced 12 Nobel Prize winners, 22 Pulitzer Prize winners, 44 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 14 members of the National Academy of Engineering and two members of the National Academy of Education.
- The University was a runner-up in the 1993 Rochester Institute of Technology/*USA Today* Quality Cup competition.

## MONEY MAGAZINE RANKS MADISON THE NATION'S NO. 2 CITY

Madison was listed second on *Money* magazine's 1993 list of the nation's most livable cities. Following are excerpts from *Money*'s seventh annual survey. "A popular t-shirt sold in Madison describes the state capital and the home of the University of Wisconsin as the 'alternative to reality'. That's about right. Madison which has ranked in our top 10 for the past three years, offers special attractions."

"Madison's awesome beauty and laid-back style appeal to most everyone. Walk along State Street's thriving pedestrian mall and you'll see the elderly on bicycles and yuppies and hippies moving around the street vendors, New Age stores and coffee shops."

"For a relatively small city, Madison offers a number of surprises. For example, you can find Caribbean, Ethiopian, Thai and more than 20 other reasonably priced types of ethnic restaurants.

Madison (population 196,053) is home to both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital. The city was designed so that the university and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of academics and politics.

Madison offers an endearing quality of life to both its residents and students.

The centerpiece of the city is the State Capitol. The campus is west of the Capitol and offers easy access to shopping malls, restaurants for every taste and popular night spots.

With a diverse population of nearly 200,000, Madison offers the unique combination of big-city excitement and small-town charm. Madison is an action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, sports, arts and recreation.

Besides the UW Athletic Department, the city offers a large quantity and high quality of sports activities. *Outside* magazine ranked Madison as one of the top 15 sports towns in the nation several years ago.

Madison is surprisingly cosmopolitan for a midwestern city and an educational capital for students from Wisconsin, every other state and over 125 countries.

The city boasts numerous ethnic restaurants among its many fine eateries. A diverse and thriving local arts community complements the cultural programs and opportunities offered by the University and the Wisconsin (student) Union.



# THE CAMPUS


Situated among gentle rolling hills and wooded areas between Lakes Mendota and Monona is the 900-acre University of Wisconsin campus. Located in the state's capital city, Madison, the UW campus is one of the nation's most picturesque.

Filmmakers have selected the campus as the location for films about college life; one was the 1986 summer hit *Back to School* with Rodney Dangerfield.

In the fall of 1993, MTV included UW-Madison as one of four campuses to feature during its "Guide to Higher Education" tour.


There are many famous landmarks on campus, including tree-lined Bascom Hill, North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise Hall (the tallest building on campus) and Picnic Point (a 129-acre peninsula used by joggers, walkers and bikers). Any student can participate in sports and fitness programs through the Division of Recreational Sports. Five facilities plus 63 acres of playing fields are located right on campus. Intramural sports provide structured opportunities in team, dual, and individual sports. Club sports are also available for more intense participation including practice, coaching and competition.

With 27 clubs to choose from, Recreational Sports draws together almost a thousand athletes on campus. Students interested in social, cultural and volunteer organizations can take great advantage of the Wisconsin Union, Memorial Union on Lake Mendota and Union South near the Engineering campus and Camp Randall provide activities and meeting rooms for students, faculty, staff and guests. Every student is automatically a member of the Wisconsin Union, which also provides restaurants, retail stores and other services.







# UW-MADISON

## SETTING THE PACE

- in discovering Vitamins A and B
- in finding in 1937 that niacin supplementation prevents pellagra, a deadly disease that killed 5,000 people a year.
- in the synthesizing of genes. Biochemistry professor Har Gobind Khorana synthesized the first gene, for which he later received the Nobel Prize in 1968.
- in finding which wavelength of ultraviolet light produces skin cancer.
- in discovering the anti-cancer drug, fluorouracil.
- as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer in 1933.
- as Elizabeth and James Miller, UW Medical School professor of oncology and professor emeritus of oncology, were the first to identify characteristics among chemicals that cause cancer.
- with the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space.
- in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the age-old compound area during brain surgery on a human.
- in developing tests for phenylketonuria (PKU), a congenital disease of children.
- as UW-Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of the common cold virus.
- in developing new techniques to measure bone tissue loss, known as osteoporosis.




- with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. Today more than 10,000 transplants are performed yearly, giving new hope to patients with leukemia and immune deficiency diseases.
- in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharine and cyclamates.
- in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously.
- as UW Hospitals and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories.
- with the first and only medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school.
- with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university.
- in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers.
- with the late Dr. Howard M. Temin of McArdle Laboratory and his coworker discovering reverse transcriptase (Independently discovered by Dr. David Baltimore). This enzyme explains how retro-viruses cause cancer and AIDS. Temin's work in this field led to his selection as a co-recipient of the 1975 Nobel Prize in Medicine.







## DEPARTMENT RANKINGS


- The School of Education is ranked No. 1 in the nation according to a study conducted at the University of Illinois in 1990. In departmental rankings, Wisconsin placed second in educational administration and policy studies.
- *U.S. News & World Report's* annual graduate school rankings, published in 1993, ranked UW-Madison in the top 12 of six science programs. The rankings were: computer science (tied for eighth), biology (tied for ninth), chemistry (10th), nursing (tied for 11th), health services administration (tied for 12th) and engineering (12th). Additionally, the magazine rated the UW's sociology department No. 1 in the nation.
- The School of Business' MBA program ranks in the top five percent among all schools in a 1993 *U.S. News & World Report* survey. The school's real estate program ranks third and the risk management program ranks fourth, the publication added.
- Scholarly output by the marketing faculty ranks first in the nation according to a 1988 study in *Review of Business and Economic Research*. Faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication were ranked No. 1 in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by *Journalism Quarterly*.
- UW Hospitals and Clinics is among the leading transplant centers in the nation. In 1993, *U.S. News and World Report* ranked the hospital among the top three percent in the U.S.
- The plant pathology department tied for first with the University of Cal-Davis in a 1986 study by the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences.
- The forestry department was the top research department in the country in 1986, according to the *Department of Agriculture*.

# ACADEMICS & ATHLETICS



Achieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities today. The University of Wisconsin is one of the few institutions that has earned praise for its work in the classroom and on the playing fields.

With its admittance to the Association of American Universities (AAU), the UW-Madison has been recognized for its solid reputation in the academic world. Indeed, only 56 schools nationally are in the AAU.

Balancing the academic requirements of an outstanding institution with the demands of collegiate athletic competition is difficult. However the University of Wisconsin has attacked the challenge and succeeded.

Inclusion in the Association of American Universities, a Rose Bowl championship in 1994 and eight consecutive appearances in the NCAA hockey tournament proves that academics and athletics do indeed mix at the UW-Madison.

# ACADEMIC SUPPORT



The primary objective of the Department of Academic Affairs office is to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the student-athletes. Counseling and advising services, plus a number of academic help programs, are offered to all student-athletes at the University.

Four full-time staff conduct the Wisconsin Student Affairs program offered to the nearly 800 UW student-athletes. The advising staff has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments. They are available to assist student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitor progress toward degrees, offer career guidance and serve as valuable resource people.

For those athletes who request assistance, counseling sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. More than 100 tutors are available for student-athlete utilization.

In addition, the department arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and coordinates the grant-in-aid program. Also, support groups are offered to students who become medically or academically ineligible for competition.

Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, whether needs be personal or academic.

# SPORTS MEDICINE

THE WISCONSIN SPORTS MEDICINE program features state-of-the-art facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

Headquartered in the McClain Center, the department also maintains facilities at Camp Randall Stadium, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium and the Dane County Coliseum.

Combined, the athletic training staff brings over 50 years of experience in providing health care to intercollegiate athletes. Olympic Games, World Championships, Olympic Festivals and extensive foreign travel highlight the varied and unique backgrounds and experiences the staff brings to the University and its student-athletes.

## STATE-OF-THE-ART EQUIPMENT

The Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provide dietary analyses, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve an athlete's flexibility.

The UW is one of a handful of schools with an on-site X-ray machine, enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries and prescribe treatment and rehabilitation.

Athletic trainers and physicians work together to design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A wide variety of facilities and equipment, including a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters, and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of general fitness during recuperative time.

## PROFESSIONAL STAFF

Dennis Helwig, a 1974 UW graduate, coordinates the Sports Medicine Program. Now in his 21st year as a staff certified athletic trainer, Helwig is assisted by five athletic trainers, one physical therapist, three graduate assistant trainers and 30 student trainers. Team physician coverage is provided by Dr. Ben Graf, medical director of the UW Sports Medicine Center. Dr. Greg Landry, a staff physician for the UW Hospital Sports Medicine and Fitness Center, serves as head of primary care of UW athletic teams. Team physicians Dr. John Orwin and Dr. David Bernhardt round out the medical staff.



# STRENGTH & CONDITIONING



The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game. John Dettmann heads the Strength and Conditioning program at the UW.

During the off-season, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshman players arrive, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measures of body composition, weight and frame-size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Individual computerized programs are established for each player by hockey strength and conditioning coach Stieg Theander.

Scott Hettenbach coordinates the UW's sports nutrition program. The program assists athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals.

Badger athletes also benefit from speed conditioning workouts designed by former track all-American Robert Hackett.

# THE COLISEUM



Badger Hockey begins its 28th year at the Dane County Coliseum in 1995-96.

Known as one of college hockey's finest facilities, the Coliseum is furnished with theatre-style seating for 8,500. It is the third largest collegiate ice facility in the nation behind Minnesota and Illinois-Chicago.

Beginning with the 1994-95 season, the ice surface was widened to an impressive 200' by 97', making for wide-open, exciting, fast-paced hockey.

Recognized as the home of the nation's best collegiate hockey fans, the Dane County Coliseum hosted the nation's largest crowds for 24 years straight from 1970-93.

Since 1969, the UW has drawn 4,496,892 fans for 532 home dates (not including exhibitions), an average of 8,453 per game! In addition, Wisconsin has averaged over 170,000 fans per year at the Dane County Coliseum (28 years).

Over the past 24 years, Wisconsin has averaged 98% capacity at the Dane County Coliseum. Since the 1987-88 season, Badger fans have filled the

Coliseum to capacity on 96 occasions.

Last season, Wisconsin sold out 15 of 16 regular season home games. Those 16 regular-season contests drew 135,729 fans for an average of 8,483 or 99.8% capacity.

In 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set the all-time NCAA season record. The 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 set an NCAA and UW record.

Along with some of the country's best fans, the Badgers have one of the college game's best home ice records. UW hockey teams have a home record of 471-173-25 since 1963, a winning percentage of .723!

In March of 1995, the Dane County Coliseum hosted the NCAA West Regional Hockey Championships. It was the first time ever the Coliseum played host to an NCAA event.





In one of the most thrilling games at the Coliseum, Wisconsin defeated North Dakota (5-4, ot) to clinch the school's second MacNaughton Cup in Feb. of 1990.



# THE BRADLEY CENTER



The Bradley Center is located on the corner of Fourth and State Streets in Milwaukee. It covers more than a city block and is within walking distance of such luxury hotels as the new Hilton Hotel (formerly the Marc Plaza), the Wyndam and the Hyatt Regency, tournament headquarters for the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown.

With state-of-the-art engineering and technology, the Bradley Center features the integration of classic architectural elements. There are four dramatic entryways leading into the facility, one on each corner of the building. Each entryway is reached through a progression of visually exciting spaces: a tree-lined plaza, leading through an exterior portico into a 28-foot high, glass-enclosed vestibule, which opens onto a stunning 60-foot high, 17,500 square-foot lobby, also totally glass enclosed.

Inside each lobby, double rows of concrete columns with granite bases rise almost 70 feet to support a spectacular skylight system.

Two elevators, 16 escalators and various stairways take spectators to the seating area. Seating is comfortably arranged in an oblong octagon that provides spectators with an unrestricted view of the playing surface and the

centrally located, four-sided video scoreboard.

The first level accommodates approximately 8,000 spectators. The second level features private suites that encircle the arena and provide seating for nine to 12 people per suite. The third level seats approximately 10,000 spectators in 21 rows of seats.

The Bradley Center has a total of 12 concession stands; eight of which sell traditional concession food and refreshments. The other four sell hamburgers, french fries, shakes, tacos, pizza pasta and other foods. Each stand is equipped with two to six closed circuit TV monitors.

The Bradley Center is the site of the nation's premier collegiate hockey holiday tournament in the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown. In the five


year history of the tournament, over 200,000 fans have witnessed Badger hockey at the Bradley Center. Over 15 teams representing all four collegiate hockey conferences have taken part in the two-day event. Teams from Canada have also been part of the field.

In 1993 the Bradley Center was the site of the NCAA Ice Hockey Championships. It was the most successful Final Four in NCAA history, drawing nearly 53,000 fans (an NCAA record for three sessions). The crowd of 17,704 for the NCAA championship game, set an NCAA hockey single-session record. Because of the remarkable success in 1993, the Bradley Center was awarded the 1997 NCAA Championships, which marks the 50th anniversary of the ice hockey championships.

# DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Pat Richter, the former Wisconsin all-America gridiron star and the last nine-time letterwinner in school history, is the man in charge of one of the NCAA's most successful athletic programs.

Named to his position in December of 1989, Richter is in charge of 20 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes, more than 160 employees and a large physical plant.

During a time of budget tightening, presidential reform and gender equity concerns, Richter has built one of the most respected intercollegiate athletic programs in the nation.

Richter inherited a division that was \$2.1 million in debt in 1990 and eliminated the red ink on the financial ledgers in less than four years. That recovery came during a time when three-quarters of the Division I programs in the United States were losing money.

He has watched the football, basketball and hockey squads set season attendance marks during his administration. Badger football, basketball and hockey filled their venues to 98 percent of capacity in '94-95.

Perhaps one of Richter's most satisfying seasons was the 1993-94 campaign when his alma mater won the Rose Bowl and qualified for its first NCAA men's basketball tournament in 47 seasons.

In 1994, Wisconsin finished among the national leaders for the prestigious Directors' Cup, presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) for all-around athletic success.

All 20 of the division's sports have competed in NCAA post-season play during

his tenure, and the UW has placed in the Top 15 for totals sports success in all three seasons of the Directors Cup.

## AS AN ATHLETE


Richter's affiliation with Badger athletics started as an undergraduate, when he earned three letters in football, basketball and baseball.

Pat earned All-America (1961-62), academic all-America (1962) and all-Big Ten (1961-62) honors as a football end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl, setting a game record with 11 receptions in one of the best Rose Bowls ever.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior, Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor (given for proficiency in scholarship and athletics).

Richter earned all-league honors in baseball and led UW in hits, homers and RBI three times. Pat earned his scholarship for basketball, where he played three years.

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture in 1964, Pat was a first-round draft choice of the NFL's Washington Redskins. He played from 1963-71.




## PROFESSIONAL LIFE

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After working at a Madison law firm, he worked his way up to Vice President of Personnel at the Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association. Pat was included in the inaugural class of the Athletic Department Hall of Fame in 1991. Last spring he became the second Badger to gain induction into the GTE Academic All-American Hall of Fame.

## PERSONAL LIFE

Richter and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim. Barry was a member of the 1994 U.S. Olympic hockey team and currently plays in the New York Rangers' organization. He was an all-American (defense) at Wisconsin.



# Preview & Review

# '95-96 OUTLOOK



Captain Max Williams was the WCHA's fourth leading scorer last season.

**T**eamwork. That concept earned the 1994-95 Badger hockey team a lot of satisfaction and fulfillment in a year when many of the experts thought a second division finish was the best Wisconsin was going to achieve. All last year's team did was finish second in the league's regular season, win the WCHA Playoff Championship (for the first time since 1990) and earn an eighth consecutive berth in the NCAA tournament.


The 1995-96 Wisconsin hockey team, with a lot of familiar faces, looks to build on that same work ethic and positive attitude that helped the UW record a 24-15-4 mark in '94-95 and the school's 15th straight 20-win season.

Coming off a year in which he won his 500th career game (only the seventh coach in NCAA history to do so), Head Coach Jeff Sauer is anxious for this campaign to begin and optimistic about the makeup of his team in '95-96.

"I'm really excited about the freshmen and sophomore classes. They are a very talented and exciting group of players," said Sauer. "Mixed with the core of veterans we have, I think this team has great potential. It's a very dynamic group

of players that I look forward to coaching," said Sauer.

### AT FORWARD

"Last year our forwards could be a little lax defensively. This year they have to buy into the defensive system right away," said Sauer.

Two of the team's top three scorers return in seniors Max Williams and Mike Strobel. Both came through in the clutch last season, shattering personal-bests. Williams led the Badgers in scoring all season, finishing with 26-26-52. Strobel turned in his best season as a Badger with 22-16-38 and paced the UW in power-play (10) and game-winning goals (6).

Other top returnees include Shawn Carter (15-13-28), who earned the team's most improved player award and sophomore transfer (from Kent State) Erik Raygor (18-9-27). A pleasant surprise for the Badgers, Raygor finished third in team goal-scoring and second in power-play goals (8).

The UW balances a solid group of scoring forwards with a well-rounded core of defensive-oriented forwards in seniors Troy Howard and Scott Sanderson and junior Darren Haley.

Sanderson chipped in 10-10-20, his best offensive year at the UW.

Last season, Joe Bianchi (11-16-27) led the WCHA's rookies in goals and was named to the WCHA all-rookie team. Bianchi is part of a sophomore class of forwards that needs to be a big key on this year's squad. E.J. Bradley, Brad Englehart and Rick Enrico didn't get a lot of quality playing time in their rookie seasons, but that will change. Offensively they will be expected to make an impact.

"This is a great opportunity for the younger guys to step in and prove themselves," said Sauer. "We need them to help pick up the slack lost in scoring from the defensemen a year ago."

The only newcomer on the forward front is Latvian Yuri Gusak. He joins the Badgers after a year with the Vail Avalanche (AFHL).





Stepping in to fill the holes left by the departing seniors will be an extremely young group of players. Led by senior assistant captain Mickey Elick (5-23-28), the Badgers will rely on returning lettermen Tim Krug (27 games in 1994-95), Matt Peterson (20 games) and Steve Sabo (3 games). Joining that group will be 1994-95 redshirt Craig Anderson, a 6-2, 200-pound defenseman from Brooklyn Park, Minn. Anderson's return to the lineup will be delayed due to a shoulder separation over the summer. That's a setback to a core of defenders that needs his size.


"Craig's injury is a setback because after redshirting him last year, we were counting on him to step in right off the bat this year. He'll bounce back and

Consider that Maco Balkovec, Brian Rafalski, Mark Strobel and Chris Tok left with nearly 600 games of experience and 67-211-278 between them. Rafalski, who finished the season as the league's top scoring blueliner with 11-34-45, was a first-team

all-American.

"We will need time to gain experience at this position," said Sauer. "We have depth, but it is inexperienced depth on the blueline. We will have to be patient while the rookies develop." We have bodies that will gain that experience as we go along but that will take time," said Sauer.

Three rookie defensemen — Luke Gruden, Mike LaPlante and Tim Rothering — will get plenty of playing time. All come to Wisconsin from junior teams. Gruden played under former Badger Don Granato for the Green Bay

Gamblers of the USHL last season. LaPlante played the 1993-94 and 1994-95 seasons with the Calgary Royals of the AJHL. Rothering is a Madison native who spent the last two years in British Columbia. He played a year each with the Kimberley Dynamiters (1993-94) and the Kelowna Spartans (1994-95).

## IN GOAL

Junior Kirk Daubenspeck is back to lead the Badgers in the nets. The Madison native inherited the top spot when former UW goalie Jim Carey left school early to join the Washington Capitals. Daubenspeck took full advantage of his opportunity, leading his teammates to a second-place finish in the WCHA regular season and the 1995 WCHA playoff championship.

He paced league goaltenders (all games) in wins (23), minutes (2533:47) and saves (1,224). He was third in save percentage (.893). In WCHA games, Daubenspeck was first in wins (16), saves (926) and second in save percentage (.897).

Daubenspeck was named the WCHA tournament MVP and selected to both the WCHA's all-tournament team and the NCAA West Regional all-tournament squad. He was also honorable mention all-WCHA.

"Kirk proved that he could do the job last year, when a lot of people were questioning his abilities," said Sauer. He certainly made huge strides, and I feel very comfortable at goal with him back there."

Sophomore Jake Soper and rookie Chris Addesa are the backups to Daubenspeck. Soper proved himself very dependable when called upon last season. He saw action versus four WCHA teams — Minnesota-Duluth, Denver, St. Cloud State and Michigan Tech — and the Sweden Select Team in an exhibition game.

In his first start for Wisconsin, he recorded a 5-4 win over St. Cloud State, making 21 saves. In regular season action, Soper gave up just five goals in

# HEAD COACH JEFF SAUER



*Coach Jeff Sauer recorded career victory No. 500 last year, becoming only the seventh coach in NCAA history to accomplish that feat.*

**H**ead Coach Jeff Sauer begins his 25th year of collegiate coaching and his 14th at Wisconsin in 1995-96, following one of his most fulfilling years in the game. He guided his 1994-95 Badger squad to a second-place finish in the WCHA, achieved career win No. 500, was a finalist for National Coach of the Year and was named head coach of the 1995 U.S. National Team which competed at the World Championships in May. It was quite a year for the "Dean" of coaches in the WCHA.

After being picked to finish as low as sixth in some preseason polls, Bucky finished the season with an overall mark of 24-15-4 while placing second in the WCHA with a 17-11-4 record. It was the 15th straight season of 20 or more wins. The Badgers went on to win the WCHA Playoff Championship (the first for the UW since 1990) and receive an automatic berth into the NCAA tournament. The berth was the eighth consecutive for the Cardinal and White and the ninth under Sauer at Wisconsin.

On Jan. 6, 1995 with a 3-1 victory over Alaska Anchorage, Sauer achieved what only six other coaches have done. He won his 500th career game at the collegiate level. His current win total ranks him seventh on the all-time victory list. He is

one of only two active Division I coaches to win that many games. Only Ron Mason of Michigan State (724) has won more games.

## AT WISCONSIN

In 13 seasons at Wisconsin, Sauer's teams have averaged 27 victories per year and posted at least 24 wins 11 times. Compiling an impressive 347-189-27 record (.640), his Badger teams have earned NCAA tournament bids the last eight years running while finishing third or higher in the WCHA standings all but one year (1984-85).

A look back at the "Sauer Era" at Wisconsin shows nothing but success, tradition and winning seasons. Just a few of the many highlights from Sauer's 13 seasons follow.

## 1994-95

Wisconsin clinched Sauer's fourth WCHA Playoff title with wins over Denver (5-4) and regular season champion Colorado College (4-3, ot) at the St. Paul Civic Center. The Badgers fell one game shy of earning a trip to the NCAA finals. In the NCAA West Regional at the Dane County Coliseum, Wisconsin beat CCHA rival Michigan State (5-3) before losing to Michigan (3-4).

**1992-93**

The Badgers advanced to the NCAA tournament after a second-place finish in the WCHA. The Badgers came within seconds of advancing to their third Final Four appearance in four years but fell to Michigan 4-3 in overtime at Joe Louis Arena.

**1991-92**

Sauer's Badgers surprised the college hockey world, finishing as the NCAA runners-up. Receiving the sixth seed in the West, Wisconsin was an underdog to advance to the Final Four. The UW proceeded to upset the No. 3 seed New Hampshire (4-2) and No. 2 seed St. Lawrence (5-2) to qualify for the NCAA Championship.

In the NCAA semifinals, Wisconsin knocked off Michigan (3-2) before losing to Lake Superior State (5-3). It marked the second time in three years Wisconsin played for the NCAA title.

**1989-90**

In one of Wisconsin's finest seasons, Sauer's team posted a 36-9-1 record, en route to capturing the school's fifth NCAA Championship and the second in his tenure. The Badgers won both the WCHA regular season and playoff championships. The WCHA regular-season title was only the second in UW history. The Badgers' 36 victories in '89-90 marked the third time under Sauer that a Wisconsin team won 30 or more games. No other Wisconsin coach can boast such a distinction.

**1987-88**

The Badgers won their first-ever WCHA playoff championship, defeating North Dakota (2-1) and Minnesota (3-1) to claim the Broadmoor Trophy. Earlier in the year, Bucky won the Great Lakes Invitational Tournament with wins over Michigan (6-0) and Michigan State (4-3). The Badgers finished the season with a 30-13-1 mark and Coach Sauer's second 30-win season at Wisconsin.

**1982-83**

In his first year at Wisconsin, Sauer ac-

complished what no other first-year college hockey coach had ever done. His Badgers captured the 1983 NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the best marks in school history at 33-10-4.

Four members of that team—Pat Flatley, Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver and Marc Behrend—also played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia.

**ON INTERNATIONAL ICE**

From the United States to the Soviet Union, from Stockholm, Sweden to Turku Finland, Coach Jeff Sauer has left his mark around the world. In addition to being one of college hockey's top coaches, Sauer has been a noticeable presence on the international scene as well. He is very active in USA Hockey and its commitment to the continued development and promotion of hockey at all levels in the U.S. Sauer is a frequent selection by USA Hockey to coach U.S. teams in international competition.

This past spring, Sauer was chosen head coach of the 1995 U.S. National Team for the World Championships in Stockholm and Gavle, Sweden. The U.S. team finished first in Group B emerging from first round action with a 3-0-2 record. With wins over Austria (5-2), Norway (2-1) and Czech Republic (4-2) and ties against Sweden (2-2) and Finland (4-4), the United States advanced to the medal round, before losing the first game to Canada (4-1).

In addition, Sauer was a finalist for both the 1992 and 1994 U.S. Olympic coaching jobs. In April of 1992, Sauer was an assistant coach for the U.S. at the World Tournament in Prague.

He was head coach of Team USA in the 1990 Goodwill Games. Prior to the Games, Team USA beat the Soviet Union's National Team in an exhibition contest at the Oakland Coliseum. It was the first time since 1980 that a U.S. squad had beaten a team from Russia. Under Sauer's guidance, Team USA advanced to the gold medal game against the Soviet Union, but lost a 4-3 decision decided by a shootout at the end of sudden death.

In 1989, Sauer coached the USA Select Team (composed primarily of top collegiate players) at the Pravda Cup in Leningrad. In the spring of 1985, he served as an assistant coach to Dave Peterson for the USA Hockey Team that participated in the annual IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

Sauer has also coached at the Olympic Festival (1987), served on the U.S. Olympic Hockey Committee (1984) and been a member of the Rules Committee.

He has been an ambassador of the game both on and off the ice, both nationally and internationally.



## AS AN ASSISTANT

Sauer began his coaching career as an assistant to the legendary Bob Johnson at Colorado College in '66. In addition to coaching hockey, he was an assistant baseball coach.

In 1968, he became Johnson's first full-time assistant at the UW. He was an assistant coach at Wisconsin in 1970, when the Badgers made their first ever appearance in the NCAA tournament. He served in that capacity until 1971, when he accepted the head coaching job at Colorado College.

At Colorado College, where he served as head coach from 1971-82, Jeff won more than 166 games and was twice named WCHA Coach of the Year. His first award came following his rookie season, and the second was following the 1974-75 campaign when Colorado College posted a 23-16-0 record and finished third in the WCHA.

## PERSONAL

Sauer is a 1965 graduate of Colorado College, where he earned a bachelor's degree in sociology. During his undergraduate years, he competed in both varsity hockey (winger) and baseball (pitcher/outfielder) for the Tigers, earning four letters in baseball and three in hockey. He was an assistant captain in hockey his senior year.

He attended Washington High School in St. Paul, lettering nine times in hockey (3), baseball and football (3). He earned all-city honors (hockey and baseball) and was named all-state in hockey.


His father, Ted, coached high school hockey at St. Paul (Minn.) Central and was inducted into the UW-Platteville Hall of Fame in 1993.



# ASSISTANT COACH MIKE KEMP



**Mike Kemp**

**C**oordinator of all recruiting efforts for the Badgers is assistant coach Mike Kemp in his 14th year in 1995-96. On the ice, Kemp coaches the defensemen and works extensively with the Badgers' penalty-killing units, which have consistently ranked among the league's best. Under Kemp, Wisconsin penalty-killers have averaged an 82 percent kill percentage.

Respected by his peers, Kemp was voted college hockey's best strategist (assistant coach) at the American Hockey Coaches Association (AHCA) convention this past spring.

The 42-year-old native of Duluth, Minn., came to the UW hockey program in 1981. That year he served as administrative assistant under the late Badger coach Bob Johnson. He returned to the UW in 1983 after serving one season as an assistant coach at Illinois-Chicago (1982-83). Mike served as administrative assistant coach to Jeff Sauer as well as executive director of the Blue Line Club from 1983-85.

## IN THE OFFSEASON

In the past, Mike has served as head coach of several regional 17 and under camps in Marquette (Mich.), Lake Placid (N.Y.) and St. Cloud (Minn.). They are part of USA Hockey's Player Development Program.

In addition to his USA Hockey involvement, in the summer of '94 Mike was selected as an assistant coach for Team West at the Olympic Festival in San Antonio. He has spoken at USA Hockey seminars in Colorado, the USA Hockey Masters Symposium and instructed in schools in Milwaukee, Chicago, Indianapolis and St. Louis.



A veteran of all five UW NCAA titles, Bill Howard has been a key to the Badgers' continued success in goal.



Stieg was an honorable-mention all-American in wrestling at Ripon. The team captain placed at the 1985 NCAA Division III wrestling tournament.


In addition to hockey, he directs all seasonal strength and conditioning programs for wrestling, men's and women's golf and assists with football.

He is single and lives in Madison.



### **Tim Ebner**



The native of La Crosse, Wis., played football for the 1985 NAIA Division II national championship football team at UW-La Crosse.



# 1973 NCAA CHAMPIONS

**T**he Wisconsin Badgers are the National Champions of collegiate hockey. Wisconsin won the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship last weekend by beating Cornell 6-5, in overtime and then disposing of Denver 4-2 in the title game. It was the first Wisconsin team to win an NCAA title since the Badger boxing team did in 1956.

The Badgers came within five seconds of never having a shot at the title at all. That's how much time was left on the Boston Garden clock when Wisconsin tied Cornell 5-5 to send the game into sudden-death overtime. Wisconsin, after making an incredible comeback, scored the game-winner with 33 seconds left in the overtime period. Dave Olmstead centered the puck to freshman Steve Alley. Alley's shot was blocked, but the rebound came to Dean Talafoius who scored the winner.

Wisconsin then moved into the championship game with Denver, who had ousted Boston College 10-4 in the tournament's first game on Thursday night. Wisconsin freshman Dave Pay opened the scoring in the first period but Denver tied it at 1-1. The Pioneers took a 2-1 lead early in the second period but from that point on it was all Wisconsin. The Badgers showed no after-effects of the exhausting game against Cornell the night before, and completely outplayed Denver. The Pioneers were the Western Collegiate Hockey Association champion and had been ranked the No. 1 team in the nation coming into the NCAA tourney.


Captain Tim Dool tied the game at 2-2 and then Talafoius put Wisconsin ahead 3-2. Senior Jim Johnston added an insurance goal in the third period and junior Jim Makey was superb in the nets kicking out 32 Denver shots. But somehow, even the national championship game paled in comparison with the Badger team heroics against Cornell.

No NCAA tournament team was named, but Talafoius was named Most Valuable Player. Wisconsin became the first team since 1965 to win both Friday and Saturday night games in the national tournament.

The Badgers finished the season with a school record for wins in a 29-9-2 season. Coach Bob Johnson finished his seventh year at Wisconsin with a record of 158-73-6.

## "Badger Hockey Party Relocates in Detroit"

**S**teve Alley slammed in a rebound off Tom Ulseth's shot 23 seconds into overtime to give the weary Badgers a 6-5 victory over Michigan and the 1977 NCAA Hockey Championship.

If Wisconsin was off balance in Friday's overtime victory over New Hampshire, the Badgers came out clicking against the Wolverines. Wisconsin passed crisply and confidently and played strong defense, with the forwards backchecking consistently. Julian Baretta played confidently and positively in the net.

Alley scored on a power play 2:29 into the game when he fought off a man in the slot and deflected a Craig Norwich slapshot from the center blueline past goalie Rick Palmer. Dave Herbst scored on a breakout off a beautiful pass from Craig Norwich at 9:27. The two Badgers steamed down the slot, Norwich on the left side and Herbst slightly ahead of him on the right. Norwich slid a pass through traffic to Herbst at the goal mouth and Herbst flicked the pass in.

Mark Johnson scored on a rebound off an Alley shot on a power play at 15:12. Norwich, at the blueline, passed to Eaves in the left circle and Eaves got it to Alley, who got off a shot in the slot. The rebound hopped out to Palmer's left and lay there until Johnson could roar in from the right circle to flip it over Palmer.

In the second period, Mike Meeker carried the puck down the right wing boards, stopped and deked around a defender at the top of the circle then skated a stride and floated a backhander which hit the bottom of Palmer's glove and skittered down into the net.

Baretta, a sophomore, was named the Most Valuable Player in the tournament. Baretta, and defensemen Norwich and John Taft were members of the all-tournament team. Wisconsin became the first team to win the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season.

# 1981 NCAA CHAMPIONS

**T**he Wisconsin hockey team took full advantage of its at-large berth and captured the NCAA title for the third time under Head Coach Bob Johnson.

The Badgers downed CCHA champion Northern Michigan in the semi-final game (5-1) and then took on the top-ranked team in the country in WCHA title winner, Minnesota. Wisconsin beat the Gophers by a 6-3 count behind the steady goaltending of sophomore Marc Behrend and a total team effort that the Gophers could not match. Behrend, who was also in the nets against Northern Michigan, was selected tournament Most Valuable Player and along with freshman center John Newberry made the all-tournament team.

Behrend had 55 saves in the tournament, 25 against NMU and 30 against the Gophers. Newberry led the Badgers in scoring with two goals and four assists and tied Aaron Broten of Minnesota for the scoring leadership in the final rounds.

Wisconsin, playing on an emotional high, never let the Gophers get into their style of play and first period goals by senior Dan Gorowsky, Newberry and Lebler gave the Badgers confidence.

Wisconsin jumped out to a 4-0 lead midway through the second period on a goal by freshman Ted Pearson. Minnesota cut the advantage to 4-1, but Newberry gave the Badgers its four-goal lead back with a power-play goal at 16:09. Minnesota pulled its goaltender with 1:25 remaining in the game, and Lebler hit the open net from just outside his own blueline to ice the victory.

On its way to the 1981 NCAA crown, Wisconsin defeated the conference champs of all three Division I leagues. In the NCAA quarterfinals, Wisconsin beat Clarkson 9-8, in a total goals series. Clarkson was the ECAC title holder. Northern Michigan had captured the CCHA title, and Minnesota finished first in the WCHA.

The Badgers finished their season with an overall record of 27-14-1, second in the WCHA and winners of the 34th NCAA Championship.

# 1983 NCAA CHAMPIONS



In what was to be a transition year, first-year Coach Jeff Sauer guided the Badger hockey team to its fourth NCAA Championship, and second in the last three years. Sauer molded the squad slowly but suffered only one loss in the last 15 games. By downing the powers of the East, Wisconsin proved to the hockey world that without a doubt they were No. 1.

Wisconsin met Providence in the semifinals of the NCAA match, and with Marc Behrend in the nets, shut out the Friars 2-0. There was no scoring in the opening period, but a carry over power play helped Wisconsin get the winning goal 0:37 into the second period. Bruce Driver and John Johannson combined passes to set up Paul Houck for his seventh power-play goal of the year and his 14th winning goal.

Behrend was tested only 17 times while recording his first shutout, and Wisconsin's second in NCAA tournament history. Jim Johannson tallied an open net goal with 0:47 remaining for the final tally.

Wisconsin faced Harvard in the championship game. The Badgers jumped out to a 3-0 lead with a goal in each of the first two periods and another goal early in the final stanza.

Pat Flatley, who along with Paul Houck, was named to the all-tournament team, scored Wisconsin's first goal on a power play midway into the first period. Flatley picked up his second goal of the game late in the second period. Paul Houston made it 3-0 early in the third. Harvard then scored two goals with Driver getting one in between.

The Badgers pulled away late in the game with Houston scoring his second at the 18:39 mark and John Johannson tallying a short-handed, empty net goal at 19:21 to make it 6-2.

Behrend was honored as the tournament's Most Valuable Player. It was the second time he received the award having captured it in the 1981 tourney. Badger defenseman Chris Chelios was also named to the all-tournament team.

It was UW's fourth title in eight appearances in the Final Four and their third straight appearance in the championship game.

**C**olgate's game plan was wrecked in the first 3:23 by UW forward John Byce. His two early goals put the Red Raiders behind the eight ball, and left them in a precarious position, which they were not able to escape. The Badgers held off Colgate 7-3, and claimed the NCAA title.

Wisconsin capitalized on its first opportunity as Red Raider Steve Poapst was whistled for high sticking just 37 seconds into the game. When Byce tipped in Sean Hill's blast from the left point, it put the Badgers ahead to stay. The telling play occurred less than two minutes later. With Colgate on the power play, Rob Mendel stole the puck and banked it off the boards up to Byce who was breaking ahead of the pack. He deked Dave Gagnon and neatly deposited the puck through the netminder's pads.

Two goals by Byce and single tallies by tournament MVP Chris Tancill and Rob Andringa gave Wisconsin a 4-1 first-period lead. However, with 40 minutes to play there was still plenty of time for Colgate to put together a comeback. But Dennis Snedden took a pass from Brett Kurtz, skated around a Colgate defender and blasted the puck past netminder Gagnon to make it 5-1.

Though Colgate pulled to within 6-3 midway through the third, Coach Jeff Sauer knew that victory was there. All facets of the game were clicking, as the Badgers scored on tip-ins, perfect passing, and booming slapshots while receiving Stanley Cup-style goaltending from Duane Derksen. The UW once again stood at the top of the college hockey world.

Along with MVP Tancill, center Byce, goaltender Derksen, and defensemen Mark Osiecki and Rob Andringa were selected to the all-tournament team.

# BANK ONE BADGER HOCKEY SHOWDOWN

This season marks the seventh anniversary of the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown. The University of Wisconsin, the Bradley Center and Banc One Wisconsin Corporation once again invite you to take part in one of college hockey's most exciting events.


Touted as one of the best showcases of college hockey talent in the nation, the Showdown has become the most successful college hockey tournament in the country.

The brainchild of Head Coach Jeff Sauer, the first Badger Hockey Showdown was held in 1989. Since then, nearly 200,000 fans have witnessed the December spectacle in Milwaukee.

During the Christmas holiday period each year, the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown is contested at the state-of-the-art, 18,000-seat Bradley Center sports facility. Considered by many to be among the premier college hockey facilities in the nation, the Bradley Center is located in the heart of downtown Milwaukee.

Wisconsin has won five of the six Showdown championships. The Badgers defeated hockey powers Boston College (1989), North Dakota (1990), Maine (1991), Northern Michigan (1993) and Bowling Green State (1994) to win those titles. Boston University is the only team other than Wisconsin to win the Pettit Cup (1992).

The '95 field includes Boston University (the 1995 NCAA Champions), Princeton and Notre Dame. BU, representing Hockey East, is the only team to take the Pettit Cup from the Badgers in the history of the tournament (1992). Notre Dame, from the CCHA, is making its second appearance in



the Showdown after participating the inaugural field in 1989. Princeton is a member of the ECAC and is making its first trip to Milwaukee.

Participants in the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown have come from every Division I conference and from Canada. Hockey East has been represented by Boston College, Boston University, Maine and Providence. From the CCHA, Alaska-Fairbanks, Bowling Green State, Lake Superior State and Miami (Ohio) have participated. The ECAC has been represented by St. Lawrence and this year Princeton. WCHA rivals Minnesota-Duluth, North Dakota and Northern Michigan have also taken part. The University of Toronto became the first Canadian team to participate in 1991.

## DID YOU KNOW ...

That the Showdown has featured the defending NCAA champion three times in its history, including two years straight (1994 and 1995).

Lake Superior State was part of the field in 1994 after winning the NCAA title earlier that year. This season, Boston University comes into Milwaukee as the defending national champions. The year of the first Show-down, the Badgers went on to win the 1990 NCAA crown.

Of the 24 teams that have been a part of Showdown fields, 11 have gone on to qualify for NCAA post-season competition in the same year of their appearance in Milwaukee. Four of those teams have gone on to make Final Four appearances.

The Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown has also given fans the opportunity to witness great individual talent. Nine athletes have been Hobey Baker finalists the same year they competed in the event. Two of those players, David Emma (Boston College, 1989) and Brian Holzinger (Bowling Green St., 1994) went on to win the Hobey Baker Award, given to college hockey's best player.

Thirteen individuals who have participated in the Showdown over the years, have been chosen as Hobey Baker finalists at some point in their college hockey careers.



A rebound goal by Chan Young gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate victory, a 3-2 ot decision over Macalaster.

### December 11, 1964

To upgrade the program, the Badgers schedule eight games against WCHA teams, but unfortunately lose all eight.

### February 22, 1966


After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers post a 5-4 overtime victory over Minnesota. Jim Petruzzates scores on a breakaway two minutes into overtime.

### April 1, 1966

Following John Riley's retirement, Bob Johnson is named head coach.

### March, 1968

Bert DeHate, a sophomore center, wins the national scoring title with 77 points (47 goals and 30 assists). DeHate has seven hat tricks.



Steve Alley scores 23 seconds into overtime to give Wisconsin the national title.

### March 30, 1969

The Badgers join the WCHA.

## THE 1970S

### March, 1970

Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA, and third in the NCAA Championships. Defenseman John Jagger becomes the first Badger to earn all-America honors.

### March, 1972

The Badgers make their second appearance at the NCAA Championships in three seasons.

### March 16, 1973

Wisconsin stuns Cornell, 6-5 in overtime, to advance to the finals of the NCAA Championships. A goal with five seconds left in regulation by Dean Talafoos ties the game. Talafoos then tallies the winner with 33 seconds left in ot.

### March 17, 1973

With a 4-2 victory over Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA Championship for the first time.

### February 19, 1977

Wisconsin captures the MacNaughton Cup. With a 6-4 win over Minnesota-Duluth, the Badgers clinch their first WCHA regular-

season championship.

### March 25, 1977

The Badgers make it to the final four. Les Grauer scores the tying goal and Mike Eaves gets the game-winner over New Hampshire (4-3, ot) in the NCAA semi-finals.

### March 26, 1977

Steve Alley culminates the Badgers' finest season with a goal 0:23 into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for the school's second NCAA Championship. Wisconsin becomes the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in one season. Bob Johnson is named national coach of the year, while his son Mark is named freshman of the year.

### March 25, 1978

Wisconsin fans take Providence, R.I., by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championship, and are proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans" by the city. Mike Eaves concludes his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader.

### March, 1979

The Badgers play before 21 sellout crowds. The average crowd of 8,654 at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum is eight short of a sellout. Mark Johnson closes out his Badger career as the top goal scorer (125) in UW history.

## THE 1980S

### March 28, 1981

The Badgers win the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 decision over Minnesota. The Badgers defeat the No. 1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota).

### March 27, 1982

Wisconsin makes its seventh NCAA Championship appearance, finishing second to North Dakota.

### June 1, 1982

Bob Johnson resigns after 15 years at Wisconsin. He guided the Badgers to three NCAA titles, seven NCAA tourney appearances and the best attendance of any program in the country.

### July 8, 1982

Jeff Sauer is named the school's fourth coach.



### March 24-26, 1983

After sweeping Minnesota to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship, the Badgers advance past St. Lawrence in the NCAA Quarterfinals and claim their fourth NCAA title beating Providence (2-0) and Harvard (6-2), both of Hockey East.

### January 1, 1984

Wisconsin becomes the only American college team to defeat the 1984 U. S. Olympic team (4-2) on its preparation tour.

### November 23, 1985

Wisconsin records its 500th victory since reviving hockey in 1963 with a 6-2 victory over North Dakota in the Coliseum.

### December 30, 1987

Wisconsin beats CCHA members Michigan and Michigan State to win the 23rd annual Great Lakes Invitational Tournament before 19,482 at Joe Louis Arena.

### March 6-7, 1988

Wisconsin defeats UND (2-1) and Minnesota (3-2) to claim the first WCHA playoff championship.



### December 28-29, 1989

Wisconsin hosts the inaugural Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown. The Badgers defeat Notre Dame (9-3) and Boston College (6-5) to capture the Pettit Cup.

## THE 1990S

### February 16, 1990

Wisconsin plays its 1,000th game, a 6-3 victory at Minnesota.

### February 24, 1990

Wisconsin defeats North Dakota (5-4 in overtime) on Chris Tancill's goal to clinch the school's second MacNaughton Cup.

### March 12, 1990

Wisconsin defeats Minnesota, 7-1, to claim the 1990 WCHA playoff championship. It is the UW's ninth WCHA playoff title and second in three years.

### March 24, 1990

Wisconsin completes an NCAA quarterfinal sweep of Maine with a 4-3 overtime win. The win sends the Badgers to Detroit for the 1990 NCAA Championships.

### April 1, 1990

Sauer's Badgers down Colgate (7-3) to claim the school's fifth NCAA hockey title before 15,034 fans at Joe Louis Arena. John Byce



records a hat trick.

### December 29, 1990

The Badgers claim their second Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown title, defeating North Dakota (3-2). The contest drew 17,671 fans, setting a WCHA record for attendance.

### December 28-29, 1991

Wisconsin wins its third straight Bank One Badger Showdown title. The Badgers defeat No. 1-ranked Maine (3-2) for the title.

### April 2-4, 1992

Wisconsin defeats Michigan (4-2) to move into the NCAA championship game against Lake Superior St. The Badgers lose (5-3) but become the lowest seeded team to advance to the title game. It is the UW's second Final Four appearance in three years.

### March 26-27, 1993

Wisconsin receives its sixth straight NCAA bid, traveling to Detroit for the NCAA Regionals. The UW defeats Miami Univ. (3-1) before dropping a 4-3 overtime decision to Michigan.

### March 25-26, 1994

With their seventh consecutive bid to the NCAA tournament, Wisconsin traveled to Albany, N. Y. for the East Regional. The Badgers handled Western Michigan 6-3, but lost to top-ranked Boston University, 4-1.

### March 17-18, 1995

With victories over Denver and regular-season champion Colorado College, the Badgers claim the 1995 Broadmoor Trophy and the WCHA Playoff title. The championship earned Wisconsin its eighth straight NCAA appearance and 12th league playoff title.

## The Fastest...

### Two Goals

The fastest two goals in UW history were scored six seconds apart by Bob Suter and Rod Romanchuk vs Denver on Feb. 3, 1979. The feat was matched six years later by Tony Granato and Jim Johannson at Lowell on Oct. 27, 1985.

### Two Goals by One Player

Steve Alley set the UW mark for quickest two goals by one player. On Jan. 29, 1977 vs Michigan State he scored goals ten seconds apart. Prior to Alley, Murray Heatley set the record with two goals in 12 seconds vs Minnesota on Feb. 6, 1970. Bob Lundein matched it at Michigan State on Jan. 4, 1974.

### Three Goals

Pat Flatley, Peter Johnson and Brian Mullen combined for the fastest three goals in UW history tallying in 31 seconds. They set the record at North Dakota on Mar. 13, 1982, breaking a record which had stood for 20 years. Frank Young, John Russo and Tom French scored goals 32 seconds apart vs St. Mary's on Nov. 29, 1963.


Justin Doherty







## Arriving at the Dane County Coliseum

The University of Wisconsin's working facilities for newspaper and radio are located in the upper level on the east side of the Coliseum. Media covering the Badgers should enter the Coliseum on the north side or where the opponent entrance is located.

## Media Credentials

All requests for working media credentials for Wisconsin home games must be made in advance through the Sports Information Office, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. *PHONE: (608) 262-1811. Requests should be made on your company's official letterhead at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover.* Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the north entrance to the Coliseum by the opponent lockerroom (the old Badger lockerroom).

## Media Parking

There is no reserved parking for visiting media at the Dane County Coliseum. Visiting media should plan to arrive at the Coliseum at least one hour prior to game time to avoid parking problems.

## Photographers

Photo passes are limited because of space restrictions at the Coliseum. Requests should be submitted on your company's letterhead to the UW Sports Information Office and are granted on a priority first-come, first-served basis. There are designated locations assigned for use by photographers. When you arrive at the Coliseum on game night, please see a representative of the UW Sports Information Office for clarification of those areas. Photographers are asked to consider the fans when shooting in the Coliseum.

## Radio and Television

Visiting radio and television stations will be admitted for broadcast upon recommendation of the visiting school and its sports information director. Requests must be received at least one week prior to the game(s) you wish to broadcast. Broadcast locations are assigned by the UW Sports Information Department based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. Tickets will be held at the UW Sports Information Office through noon on Friday and then will be placed at the north end of the Coliseum by the entrance to the opponent lockerroom (the old Badger lockerroom).

## Interviewing Coach Sauer

UW head coach Jeff Sauer will meet with the media following each game after a short post-game session with the team. The post-game interviews will be conducted in the players' lounge area of the Badger lockerroom. The best time to interview Sauer during the week is between 10 a.m. and noon at the UW hockey office or before (approx. 2:45-3) or after (6-6:30) practices.

## Interviewing Wisconsin Players

### *During the week*

Media wishing to interview specific players should call the Sports Information Office on their availability. Practices are held at the Coliseum from 3-6. Occasionally, practice will be at the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center (the Shell) on campus or at the Arena on the grounds of the Dane County Expo. For exact practice times and locations, contact the SID Office. Players will be available up to 15 minutes before practice and at the conclusion of practice, depending on class schedules.

### *Post-Game*

Player interviews will be conducted in the players' lounge. Wisconsin has a closed locker room policy. No media are permitted inside the Wisconsin lockerroom.

The UW hockey weight room is adjacent to the locker room.


