



n April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program. Entering its 10th season as a varsity sport, Wisconsin has built itself into a program that other schools measure themselves against, winning two NCAA championships. UW will celebrate its 10th anniversary on Oct. 3-4 at the Kohl Center when the Badgers host Syracuse.

While women's hockey was brand new to the athletic department when it was added in 1998, it already had a longstanding history at the UW. A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for more than 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women—Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz—the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice over the years.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998, when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media and public. A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years and mentored current Wisconsin assistant coach Tracey Cornell.


The Badgers officially opened their history on October 8, 1999, when

3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota Duluth at the Kohl Center. With Olympic gold medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Governor Tommy Thompson in attendance, the game was televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television.

Five years later, the team notched its 100th program win during the 2003–04 season. Continuing to exceed the previous year's standard, the Badgers started another chapter in Wisconsin history with the 2004–05 season. After winning a record 28 games during the season, Wisconsin earned its first NCAA tournament berth on March 13, 2005.

The last three years have seen the Badgers reach the pinnacle of college hockey, claiming the first WCHA regular season, playoff and NCAA championships in school history in 2005–06 and successfully defending all three titles in 2006–07. In 2007–08 the Badgers competed in their third national championship game but fell short of a three-peat.

Girls hockey in the Madison area has grown along with the UW women's hockey program. The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey. Attendance at Wisconsin women's hockey games grows every year, with UW leading the nation in attendance in 2006–07 and again surpassing their previous best in 2007–08.



2006 NCAA Champions!



The 2005–06 season was a dream year for the Wisconsin women's hockey team as it captured the program's first national championship with a 36-4-1 record. Along the way, the Badgers also won their first WCHA regular season and playoff championships. Postseason awards reflected UW's special season as Sara Bauer became the first Badger to receive the Patty Kazmaier Award as national player of the year and head coach Mark Johnson earned the 2006 American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year award.

Wisconsin became the first school to post a shutout in the Frozen Four with a 1-0 win over St. Lawrence on March 24. The Badgers then went back and repeated the feat two days later in a 3-0 victory against Minnesota to win the national championship. Freshman Jessie Vetter, who started all three NCAA tournament games and allowed one goal in over 200 minutes of NCAA tournament action, was named the Frozen Four Most Outstanding Player.

The Badgers faced a difficult challenge to reach the Frozen Four when Mercyhurst was assigned to play against UW in a quarterfinal at Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, Wis. The game marked the first time that Wisconsin earned the right to host an NCAA tournament contest. Although Mercyhurst struck first, the Badgers responded quickly to tie the game with six minutes left in the opening period. It took more than 75 minutes for the next goal to come, but Tia Hanson's goal 10:10 into the second overtime sent UW on to the Frozen Four.



2007 NCAA Champions!



fter posting the most successful season in program history in 2005–06, the Badgers set the bar even higher during the 2006–07 campaign, breaking or tying 18 NCAA records on their way to a second consecutive national championship. Playing in the Frozen Four at Herb Brooks Arena in Lake Placid, N.Y., site of the 1980 'Miracle on Ice' and head coach Mark Johnson's heroics 27 years earlier, UW players lived out their own dream by defeating Minnesota Duluth, the only team to beat the Badgers all season, 4-1 in the national championship game.

In order to reach the Frozen Four, Wisconsin outlasted Harvard in a four-overtime marathon at the Kohl Center. Junior Jinelle Zaugg finally broke the scoreless deadlock 127 minutes and 9 seconds into the contest, ending the second-longest game in women's college hockey history. An enthusiastic crowd of 5,125 was on hand for the game, just 42 fans shy of the NCAA women's hockey attendance record.

The Badgers also successfully defended their WCHA regular season and playoff championships en route to an overall record of 36-1-4. The team boasted arguably the greatest defense in college hockey history, allowing just 36 goals in 41 games while posting a team goals-against average of 0.85 and 18 shutouts, all NCAA records. Sophomore Jessie Vetter and senior Christine Dufour became the first goalies in NCAA men's or women's history to finish a season with a goals-against average below 1.00 while seeing significant time in the net. Vetter's goals-against average for the season was 0.83 while Dufour's was 0.88.

Beyond Wisconsin



ompeting beyond college is the dream of many women's hockey players and Wisconsin is rapidly becoming a pipeline for national teams. In the last year alone, nine current and former Badgers have earned spots on their country's senior national team for either the IIHF World Women's Championship or the Four Nations Cup.

Olympians

During the 2006 Winter Olympics in Torino, Italy, Molly Engstrom and Carla MacLeod became the first two former Badgers to represent their countries in the Olympics. MacLeod, who was named to the all-tournament team, helped lead Canada to the gold medal while Engstrom and Team USA claimed the bronze.

World Champions

MacLeod earned another gold medal with the Canadian national team at the 2007 IIHF World Women's Championship. In the gold medal game, Canada defeated a United States team that included an astounding seven current and former Badgers on its roster and was led by UW head coach Mark Johnson. Included in those seven players was Engstrom, who earned the Directorate Award as the top defenseman of the tournament.

Engstrom also made history with the U.S. national team at the 2005 World Women's Championship in Sweden. She tallied a goal and an assist to help Team USA win its only world championship. In 2008 Team USA won its second World Championship with six current and former Badgers on the team. Meghan Duggan was credited with an assist in the championship game in a 4-3 win over Canada.



representation of the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. The remarkable success the hockey program has enjoyed has come with national recognition for a number of Badger players.

In just the second year of the program, Meghan Hunter and Kerry Weiland became the first Badgers to be named All-Americans in 2001. Since then, six more UW student-athletes have been added to the nation's list of top collegiate hockey players, including Sara Bauer, who became the first two-time, first-team All-American in UW history in 2007.

The 2007 season saw a school-record four Badgers earn All-American status as Meaghan Mikkelson and Jessie Vetter joined Bauer on the first team and Bobbi-Jo Slusar was named to the second team. Bauer and Mikkelson were both finalists for the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, which Bauer won in 2006. In 2008 Jessie Vetter was named the WCHA goaltending champion based on a league-best 1.38 goals-against average in her 1564:21 minutes of action.

In addition to the student-athletes, head coach Mark Johnson was named AHCA Division I Coach of the Year for the 2005–06 and 2006–07 seasons. He was also a finalist in 2007–08. Johnson is also a three-time WCHA Coach of the Year,

including 2006 and 2007.

Badgers in the Community



A s part of the overall experience at the University of Wisconsin, student-athletes are encouraged to give back to the community through volunteer activities. 

Prime Time Players

The last two seasons, all of Wisconsin's home games were shown live on television or through free internet webcasts. In 2006–07 six games were aired live on the WIBA family of radio stations in the Madison area. Beyond game coverage, the Badgers were also featured on CSTV, ESPNU and Fox Sports Net. The team was the subject of an hour-long documentary that aired on both the regional Fox Sports Net North and the national Fox College Sports.

Wisconsin's reputation as the major athletic program in the state also attracts a lot of media attention. Madison is home to four television stations, 18 radio stations, two daily newspapers and two student newspapers. In addition, media from around the state, including the Milwaukee area, also cover the Badgers on a regular basis.

Beginning in the 2006–07 season, all UW home games were seen live on *UWBadgers.com*. The free internet webcasts gave Badger fans a new way to follow their favorite team when they could not make it out to the Kohl Center themselves. *UWBadgers.com* is the official Web site of Wisconsin Athletics, maintained internally by a dedicated team of technical experts and an experienced editorial staff. Visitors from all over the United States and the world (an average of 119 different countries monthly) continue to log on to catch the latest Badger athletics news.





The WCHA

College hockey's top conference

ith a noteworthy past that now spans six decades, three overriding characteristics continue to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association over the league's 55 seasons: history, tradition and success.

A new chapter of that history began in 1999-2000 with the founding of the women's WCHA. Since that time, member teams have gone on to win nine consecutive national championships.

That excellence on the national stage extends to the men's side as well. Since 1951, teams representing the WCHA have earned an amazing 36 NCAA (national) championships, including five straight to open the new millennium, finished as the national runner-up another 27 times, and qualified for a berth in collegiate hockey's national championship—the NCAA Men's Frozen Four—in 53 of 56 seasons overall.

In addition to its successes in national championship tournament play over the years, the WCHA owns an enviable reputation for producing outstanding coaches and student-athletes, with hundreds of its alumni moving on to noteworthy professional and Olympic playing careers, including 20 Olympians on the women's side.




The Kohl Center

pened in 1998, the Kohl Center is one of the premiere facilities in all of college hockey. Since the 2004–05 season, the Kohl Center has been the permanent home for women's hockey games. In the last two years at the Kohl Center, the Badgers are 60-8-3 at home with a winning percentage of .866. The arena, which also hosts the men's hockey team as well as the men's and women's basketball teams, seats 15,237 when set up for hockey, making it the second-largest college-owned hockey arena in the country. The facility also holds 17,142 for basketball.

The Kohl Center is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW–Madison graduate who donated \$25 million towards the construction of the arena. Kohl's gift is the single-largest private donation in UW history.

Recent additions to the Kohl Center include a new video scoreboard and ring beam. The main Kohl Center scoreboard includes 9-by-14-foot video boards on all four sides that provide Wisconsin fans the chance to watch video replays. The ring beam, which runs the circumference of the arena at the first balcony level, makes Wisconsin one of a select few college venues with a ring beam, creating a unique and exciting game atmosphere.

The most recent round of additions, completed prior to the 2006–07 season, included a new and expanded weight room as well as an on-site satellite office for the Fetzer Academic Center. Student-athletes also make use of the Kellner Club as a dining hall. Located on the second floor of the Kohl Center, the Kellner Club is an exclusive dining club available on event days.




National Attendance Leaders

Wisconsin is annually among the nation's leaders in attendance average. Since averaging 808 fans per contest to rank third in the nation in the program's innaugural season of 1999–2000, the Badgers have steadily added to their fan base.

In 2007–08, the Badgers led the nation in average attendance with more than 1,800 fans per game and a total of 33,502 fans throughout the entire season. The 2007–08 season surpassed their previous best from 2006–07 where the Badgers drew over 26,000 fans.

The Shell and The McClain Athletic Facility





The Wisconsin women's hockey team utilizes a number of top-class facilities in and around Camp Randall Stadium. The primary home for the Badgers is the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, more commonly referred to as the Shell. The Shell is located on the east side of Camp Randall Stadium and houses the main women's hockey locker room as well as an NHL-sized practice rink. The locker room was built before the 2002–03 season as an addition to the south end of the practice facility. The complex includes a skate sharpening room, coaches' room, classroom complete with practice goals and boards, as well as dress down and locker rooms.

The Dave McClain Athletic Facility is another important complex to Wisconsin women's hockey. Located adjacent to the northeast side of Camp Randall Stadium, the McClain Facility features a 90-yard indoor practice field with artificial turf. The lower level of the complex houses a fully-equipped weight room, the Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the Sports Medicine headquarters. The second level includes a 150-seat theater-style auditorium, classrooms and a players' lounge. The 166,264-square-foot facility was completed in 1988 and is named in honor of former UW football coach Dave McClain.



Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

he Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the satellite Kohl Fetzer Center provide for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The state-of-the-art centers, named after Wade and Beverly Fetzer. are home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

The original Fetzer Center is a 15,000-square-foot facility. The center is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their email. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

The Kohl Fetzer Center was opened in October of 2006 to serve the needs of the student-athletes who practice and compete on the southeast end of the campus. The KFC, as it is fondly called,

Fetzer but still serves all of the needs of the student-athletes. It features five classrooms, an open study area and a computer lab. An academic advisor and a learning specialist are available full time for the teams that use the KFC.

The two academic centers feature a staff of six advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.


Under the direction of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Chris Butler, Jill Hadfield, David Sedor, Kelli Richards, assistant director Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutor coordinator David Mattison work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe. Denise Kalscheur and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. Bridget Warren. the director of inclusion and life skills programming, overseas events in diversity and inclusion, community development and community outreach.

The staff, including program assis-

son, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes studentathletes off the field of play by honoring more than 200 student-athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average. Additionally, the annual CHAMPS Cup competition recognizes the teams that succeed academically and are involved in community and campus events.






Opposite left: The reception area of the Fetzer Center welcomes student-athletes.

Strength & Conditioning



The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger success on the playing field. The goal of the program is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.


Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann and his six assistant coaches, including hockey's Mike Potenza, work with members of the Wisconsin coaching staff to develop training programs to enhance each athletes's performance.

Badger hockey players work on their strength programs in the McClain Center, the Kohl Center, and the departments' other weight training facilities.

The McClain Center weightroom is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The new Kohl Center weight room, outfitted by Magnum Fitness Systems, contains more than 10,000 pounds of free weights to go along with eight power racks. The roomy 5,500-square foot work out area also houses exercise bikes and other equipment to build better Badgers.

The Badger Den (top left) has five power stations with each consisting of a platform for Olympic-style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a compete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.



Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 13 full-time and three graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.


Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Tricia DeSouza, Bill Gierach, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jesse Donnenwerth, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Ashley Parr, Jen Pepoy, Holli Schaible and Kristy Walker as well as graduate assistant trainers Lindsey Otte, Ryan Dean and Lauren DeYoe utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Patrick Welscher, RD, provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lanerehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physicians Dr. John Orwin, Dr. Lee Kaplan and Dr. Geoffrey Baer. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Bernhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.



ith strong ties to Wisconsin as a coach's son, player and assistant coach, Mark Johnson stepped into the role of head women's hockey coach beginning with the 2002–03 season. In six seasons, Johnson and the UW women's hockey team have continued to shatter both school and national records. Johnson has led UW to the NCAA title game in each of the past three seasons, winning twice.

Last season the Badgers became the only school on the nation to have reached 29 victories in each of the past three campaigns. Since the 2005–06 season, Wisconsin has recorded 101 wins, more than any other team in the nation.

Johnson, the 2006 and 2007 American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year, led the Badgers to back-to-back WCHA regular season, playoff and NCAA championships while winning more games (72) in a two-year

period (2005–07) than any other team in women's college hockey history.

During the 2006–07 campaign, Johnson's team broke or tied 18 NCAA team and individual records including wins in a season (36), fewest losses (one), best winning percentage (.927) and most shutouts (18). Johnson leads all active women's college hockey coaches with a winning percentage of .802 after compiling an impressive record of 176-37-17 in his six years at Wisconsin.

Johnson's impact on women's hockey has extended well beyond Madison in large part due to his involvement with USA Hockey. During the 2006–07 season alone, Johnson led the U.S. women's national team at the 2007 IIHF World Women's Championship in Winnipeg, Manitoba as well as the 2006 Four Nations Cup in Kitchener, Ontario.

As an accomplished athlete, coach and humanitarian, Johnson continues to be honored with awards year after year. He received the NCAA Silver Anniversary award, one the most prestigious honors given by the NCAA, in 2005 for his accomplishments in the 25 years following his days as a studentathlete. In 2004 he was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame for his individual accomplishments as a player and coach. He was previously inducted as a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic

hockey team in 2003. Vince Lombardi Charitable Funds honored Johnson's volunteer work by presenting him with the 2004 Award of Excellence.

Named the 2003 WCHA Co-Coach of the Year and one of eight finalists for the AHCA Division I Coach of the Year award, Johnson guided Wisconsin to a 22-8-5 overall and 14-6-4 WCHA record in his first season with the team.

After going 25-6-3 in 2003–04, the Badgers made history in Johnson's third season, winning a program-record 28 games (28-9-1) and earning the program's first-ever NCAA tournament berth. The team climbed as high as second in the national rankings by defeating then–No. 2 Minnesota Duluth in the WCHA tournament semifinals and dramatically forcing overtime by scoring two goals in the final minute of regulation vs. No. 1 Minnesota in the championship game.

Johnson carried the momentum into the 2005–06 campaign as Wisconsin debuted at No. 1 in the USCHO. com preseason poll and then went on to validate that distinction with a 36-4-1 record and a national championship. As an encore in 2006–07, the team successfully defended all three championships while posting a record of 36-1-4 and solidified its status as one of the elite women's college hockey programs in the nation.

Leadership

The third head coach in the program's history, Johnson joined the staff after serving as an assistant coach with the men's program from 1996-2002.

During that time, he helped the men's team to a WCHA regular season title during the 1999-2000 season, as well as a WCHA Final Five championship in the 1997-98 campaign.

Prior to his time with the Badgers, Johnson coached professionally, directing the expansion Madison Monsters to a 37-30-7 mark in the 1995–96 season and earning Colonial Hockey League coach of the year honors. He also led a pair of area high schools, serving as the head coach of Verona from 1994–95 and as the assistant coach for Madison Memorial from 1993–94.

Beyond collegiate and professional experience, Johnson has often worked at the international level. In September 2001, Johnson served as an on-ice assistant coach at the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Orientation Camp in Colorado Springs, Colo., featuring 38 of the top American players in the National Hockey League.

Johnson served as an assistant coach with the 2002 U.S. Men's National Team that competed in the International Ice Hockey Federation World Championship in Gothenberg, Jonkoping, and Karlstad, Sweden. He had previously served in a similar capacity for the 2000 World Championship in St. Petersburg, Russia. In 2007, Johnson led the U.S. Women's National Team to a silver medal at the World Women's Championship in Canada. He was once again behind the bench for the U.S. during the Under-22 select series between the U.S. and Canada this past August.

On the Ice

In his playing career, Johnson helped Wisconsin to the 1977 national championship during his freshman campaign. The first Badger ever to win WCHA Rookie of the Year honors, he went on to become the school's second all-time leading scorer with 256 points on a school-record 125 goals and 131 assists in just three seasons.

The 1978–79 WCHA MVP, Johnson was a two-time, first team All-WCHA pick and a two-time All-American. In

2002, he was also selected as one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years."

Johnson has represented USA Hockey as a player in 13 international tournaments, with his most recent appearance as part of the U.S. national team at the 1998 IIHF (A-Pool) World Championship Qualification Tournament in Austria. Most notably, he led the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team's gold medal-winning effort with 11 points, including two goals in the "Miracle-On-Ice" against the Soviet Union and an assist on the game-winning goal against Finland in the final contest.

The team attended opening ceremonies of the 2002 Olympic Winter Games to light the flame and was honored by Sports Illustrated as giving us the 'Greatest Sports Moment of the Century.' In 2004, Disney produced the blockbuster movie, "Miracle," chronicling the 1980 USA hockey team's unlikely climb to the top.

The Next Level

Following his Olympic experience, Johnson embarked on a successful 11-year NHL career. He began his pro tenure with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1980–82), before moving onto the Minnesota North Stars (1982).

He also enjoyed stints with the Hartford Whalers (1982–85), St. Louis Blues (1985) and New Jersey Devils (1985–90). Over his 669 career NHL contests, the forward collected 203 goals, 305 assists and 508 points, highlighted by his 87-point season as captain of Hartford in 1983–84. He also tied an NHL All-Star Game record with three assists that season.

A Hockey Family

A 1999 inductee into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame, Johnson is the son of legendary Wisconsin men's head coach Bob Johnson (1966–82) and brother of former men's assistant coach Peter Johnson (1987–91).

One of Wisconsin's most decorated athletes in any sport, Johnson was inducted into the State of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003 and is also a charter member of Wisconsin's National W Club Hall of Fame.

Johnson, 49, earned his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from Wisconsin in 1994. He resides in Verona, Wis., with his wife Leslie and has five children: Douglas, Christopher, Patrick, Mikayla and Megan.




Johnson Through The Years


Mark Johnson's hockey career has taken him from the University of Wisconsin to USA Hockey, the National Hockey League and back again to the UW, where he now leads the most successful women's hockey program in the nation. Below is just a sampling of Johnson's path from standout UW forward to award-winning head coach.




Under Johnson's guidance, the Wisconsin women's hockey team wins its first NCAA Championship in school history, shutting out Minnesota 3-0.


The energetic Cornell came to Madison after spending the previous year as girls hockey head coach at Cushing Academy in Ashburnham, Mass. Cornell led Cushing Academy to a 24-4-2 mark, the most successful season in the history of the program. Her team captured second during the regular season and advanced to the NEPSAC Championship. Most recently, Cornell volunteered as a Team Leader at Canada's Under-22 Selection Camp in August 2005.

Cornell's playing experiences include four years at Cornell University, as well as one year as a professional in Switzerland for the SC Reinach Lions. While at Cornell, she co-captained the hockey program her senior season and earned Academic All-Ivy honors both her junior and senior years. Cornell helped the Big Red to the Ivy League hockey title during the 1995–96 season and served as assistant captain during the title run. 
Paul Hickman begins his 10th season with the women's hockey program. Hickman, who graduated in 2002 from the UW with a degree in zoology, serves as director of operations and equipment manager for the Badgers.

Hickman, a native of Oakton, Va., spent three seasons as a student equipment manager with the program prior to his full-time position. A former Reston Raiders goaltender in Reston, Va., he is in charge of the business operations of the program. The Danville, Calif., native graduated in 2008 from Fresno State with a bachelor's degree in mass communication and journalism and currently lives in Madison.




Strength and Conditioning Coach Jim Snider


Associate Athletic Director Sean Frazier



2008-09 Season Outlook

- ▶ The Wisconsin women's hockey team enters its 10th season as a program with a .750 all-time winning percentage. In addition the Badgers have reached the national championship game in each of the past three seasons, taking home two championships in 2006 and 2007.
- ▶ Wisconsin has established a tradition of success and even more, a tradition of winning in the past three seasons. Since the start of the 2005-06 season, Wisconsin has recorded 101 wins, which is more than any other team in the nation.
- ▶ Losing only three seniors, the Badgers welcome back 18 letter-winners to compete for their third national championship. With so many returners, Wisconsin will rely on its depth to stay a national title contender.
- ▶ Wisconsin will have to make do without Jinelle Zaugg who shared the team lead in points and broke multiple school records in her career including career goals (89), NCAA tournament points (12) and games played (160). Zaugg, an All-WCHA third-team selection was an offensive threat for the Badgers and provided leadership as an assistant captain.
- Also leaving a gap on the roster is Emily Morris, who ranked second in

- career games played (159). As a defender Morris still managed eight goals and 33 assists. Morris was also a team captain for the 2007-08 season.
- Filling the holes for the Badgers will be four freshmen, Brooke Ammerman, Brittany Haverstock, Nikki Kaasa and Carolyne Prevost. Competing for playing time at the forward position will be Ammerman and Prevost. along with Haverstock as a defender and Kaasa will try to get time in the net. Ammerman and Prevost have both played on national teams and are rated among the top forward prospects from the United States and Canada, respectively.
- The freshmen look to make a big impact on the team as they have so many times in the past for the Badgers. The rookies of the 2007-08 season saw a lot of action that was rightfully earned. Hilary Knight, Kelly Nash, Malee Windmeier and Olivia Jakiel played in all 41 games while Mallory Deluce only missed two. Knight and Deluce

were both named to the WCHA All-Rookie Team and were fourth and fifth in scoring for UW and in the WCHA, respectively.

- ▶ Goaltender Jessie Vetter returns for her senior campaign in hopes of reaching her fourth-straight national championship game. Vetter is 8-1-0 in NCAA tournament contests, owns two national championships and holds school records for most career shutouts (25) and shutouts in a season (10). Vetter also claimed the 2007-08 WCHA goaltending champion while also becoming the WCHA leader in career shutouts.
- ▶ Backing up Vetter is junior Alannah McCready who posted shutouts in each of the three games she played in.
- ▶ Returning on a defense that had 13 shutouts are seniors Rachel Bible, who was a team-leading plus-30 in plus-minus last season, and Alycia Matthews. Sophomores Olivia Jakiel, Anne Dronen and Malee Windmeier gained valuable experience and look to step up in 2008-09.
- ► The Badgers return five WCHA award winners, including Meghan Duggan and Jessie Vetter who were All-WCHA first team honorees. Senior Erika Lawler was named to the second-team while Mallory Deluce

 Meghan Duggan returns as one of the leading scorers from last season after tying Jinelle Zaugg with the team-high 43 points. Entering her third season, Duggan is on track to a record-breaking career. Duggan ranks sixth in career goals with 46, only seven goals from making the top five also cracking the top ten for points with 95.
- ▶ Erika Lawler has had a successful run, and ranks eighth in career points at Wisconsin with 110. One of her most memorable games came in the semi-final game in the 2008 NCAA Frozen Four against Harvard. Lawler was seen all over the ice while tallying a goal and an assist, becoming the only Badger to be named to the Frozen Four All-Tournament Team.
- The offense will remain a threat with all of the top scorers returning with the exception of Jinelle Zaugg. Seniors Erika Lawler and Angie Keseley will lead the offense with Meghan Duggan, Hilary Knight and Mallory Deluce by their side. Knight was second on the team in power play goals with six, totaling 20 goals and 18 assists on the season. Deluce has etched her name in the top of the statistics chart for the 2008 season with 12 goals and 19 assists making her a vital playmaker for the Badgers.
- ▶ Depth is working in Wisconsin's favor with seven Badgers recording at least 10 goals last season,

- and the top three lines all scoring in double digits. The second and third lines were both major contributors while Kyla Sanders and Jasmine Giles had 20 and 23-point seasons, respectively.
- ▶ Four Badgers were chosen to play on the Under-22 Select Team. Three Badgers represented the USA which faced Canada in a three-game series. Meghan Duggan, Hilary Knight and Erika Lawler played for Team USA and freshman Brittany Haverstock played for Canada.
- ▶ Wisconsin will face New Hampshire, Quinnipiac and Syracuse in its non-conference schedule. UW fell to the then-No. 2 New Hampshire 2-1 in both games last season. New Hampshire completed the 2008 season with an impressive 33-3-1 record.
- ▶ Unusual to the women's hockey schedule will be the home series against New Hampshire which will be played in Fort Myers, Fla. at the Fort Myers Skatium on Nov. 21 and 22.

2007-08 Season Review

- ▶ The No. 2 Wisconsin Badgers reached their third straight NCAA championship game but were unable to claim their third-consecutive national championship, falling to Minnesota Duluth 4-0 on March 22 at the DECC in Duluth, Minn.
- ▶ The Badgers, who finished the season with a record of 29-9-3, advanced to the championship game by defeating Harvard 4-1 in the semifinal round. Senior Jinelle Zaugg, junior Erika Lawler and sophomore Meghan Duggan led the way for the Badgers in that win over the Crimson by each recording two points in the contest.
- ▶ Since the start of the 2005-06 season, Wisconsin has recorded 101 wins, more than any other team in the nation. New Hampshire ranks second with 94 wins while St. Lawrence (88 wins), Mercyhurst (81) and Minnesota Duluth (80) round out the top five in that category.
- ▶ UW is the only program in the country with at least 29 victories in each of the last three seasons.
- ▶ Wisconsin finished the season by going 19-3-1 in its last 23 games, including 8-2-1 in its final 11 games.
- ▶ The Badgers were 29-1-0 last season when scoring at least three goals, compared to 0-8-3 when scoring two goals or fewer.
- ▶ The loss in the national championship game was the first NCAA tournament loss of Jessie Vetter's career. She is now 8-1-0 in nine career NCAA contests. In those nine games, Vetter has posted a goals-against average of 0.75 with a .968 save percentage and four shutouts.
- ▶ With her two goals in the NCAA semifinal win over Harvard, Zaugg became the school's all-time NCAA tourna-

- ment points leader. In 10 career NCAA tourney games, Zaugg recorded nine goals and three assists for 12 points, one more than Sara Bauer's 11 career NCAA tournament points. No other Badger has more than two career goals in NCAA tournament play.
- ▶ Zaugg also improved her school record career goals total to 89, five more than former Badger Meghan Hunter. Zaugg finished her career with seven goals in her last five games, including two game-winning goals, with all five games taking place against teams ranked in the top four in the nation.
- ▶ Zaugg was one of three Badgers who averaged more than one point per game during the second half of the season. Duggan led the way with 1.47 PPG (28 points, 19 games) followed by Zaugg with 1.29 PPG (27 points, 21 games) and Lawler at 1.05 PPG (22 points, 21 games). Two other Badgers were above 0.85 PPG game during the second half of the season; freshmen Mallory Deluce (0.89 PPG) and Hilary Knight (0.86 PPG).
- ▶ The team benefitted from thatimpressive output, improving its goals-pergame average from 3.30 GPG before Jan. 1 to 3.62 GPG from Jan. 1 to the end of the season.
- ▶ Under head coach Mark Johnson, Wisconsin is 98-16-6 during the second half of seasons (after Jan. 1) for a winning percentage of .842.
- ▶ In the last three seasons, UW is 58-5-2 during the second half of the season for a winning percentage of .908. In those 65 games, the Badgers have allowed just 64 goals (0.98 per game) while scoring 235 goals (3.62 per game).

- ▶ After missing three games due to a concussion around the holiday break, Duggan recorded 15 goals and 13 assists for 28 points in her last 19 games of the season.
- ▶ Duggan shared the team lead in points (43) and was second on the team in goals (20) and assists (23).
- ▶ Seven Badgers recorded at least 10 goals last season, including all six forwards from the team's top two lines. In all, 13 Badgers reached double digits in points this season while nine of those had at least 20 points. Five Badgers reached the 30-point mark this season while Zaugg, Duggan and Lawler each eclipsed 40 points.



The Western Collegiate Hockey Association



ith a noteworthy past that spans six decades and marks its 57th season overall in 2008–09, three characteristics that continue to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association are history, tradition and success.

From the founding days as the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League (MCHL) from 1951–53, to the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) from 1953–58, and ultimately on to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association in 1959, this prestigious athletic conference has developed and maintained a tradition of excellence that truly is second to none.

In fact, no collegiate conference—in any sport—can top the impressive list of national scale accomplishments of the WCHA and its member teams. Since its founding in 1999-2000, teams representing the women's WCHA have now captured eight consecutive national championships in 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2008. And since 1951, teams representing the men's WCHA have earned a record 36 NCAA (national) championships, finished as the national runner-up another 27 times, and qualified for a berth in collegiate hockey's national championship round—the NCAA Men's Frozen Four—in 52 of 55 seasons overall.

In addition to its successes in national championship tournament play over the years, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association owns an enviable reputation for producing outstanding coaches and student-athletes, with hundreds upon hundreds of its alumni moving on to successful professional and Olympic playing careers. On top of the more than 100 league alumni who have Olympic experience playing for the likes of the United States, Canada, Italy, Norway, Austria and France, conference-member teams and players have also received additional international exposure on a regular basis

since 1951. The women's WCHA has regularly put together all-star teams. In 2005–06 the WCHA All-Star Team played games against the U.S. National Team at both Xcel Energy Center and the Duluth Entertainment & Convention Center. In 2004–05, a total of 16 conference players participated in the annual women's IIHF World Championship in Sweden, including five on the gold medal-winning U.S. Team. The conference will again be represented at the 2007 IIHF Women's World Championships with Wisconsin women's head coach Mark Johnson set to lead the U.S. National Team.

The WCHA also continues to lead the way in college hockey attendance—for both men and women—as member teams, who regularly play in some of the sport's finest facilities, regularly top the Division I ranks in average home attendance. In 2007–08, the women's WCHA marked its ninth straight season at the top of the national rankings while the men's conference drew more than one million fans for the 14th consecutive season.

Over the last decade, the WCHA has been able to showcase its exciting brand of hockey to an ever-increasing number of fans, thanks to such impressive facilities as Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, Colorado Springs World Arena, the Kohl Center in Madison, Magness Arena in Denver, Mariucci Arena and Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, the National Hockey Center in St. Cloud, and Midwest Wireless Civic Center in Mankato.

Under the leadership and guidance of Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod and Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association will proudly celebrate its 57th season of men's competition and 10th in women's competition in 2008–09.




Student Life








Chancellor Carolyn "Biddy" Martin

Incoming Chancellor Carolyn "Biddy" Martin will begin serving as the University of Wisconsin's chief of staff in September 2008.

As provost of Cornell University from 2000-08, Martin acted as the president's first deputy officer and reported to the president as the chief educational officer and chief operating officer of the university. She was responsible for overseeing all academic programs, with the exception of those programs reporting to the provost for medical affairs in New York City.

Martin received her Ph.D. in German Literature in 1985 from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. That same year, she joined the Cornell University's faculty full-time as an assistant professor of German studies and women's studies. In 1991, she was promoted to associate professor in the Department of German Studies with a joint appointment in the Women's Studies Program. She served as chair of the Department of German Studies from 1994-97, and in 1997 was promoted to full professor in the department. In 1996, she was appointed senior associate dean in the College of Arts and Sciences. Martin was appointed Cornell University's Provost effective July 1, 2000.

Martin is a distinguished scholar of German Studies and author of numerous articles and two books—one on a literary and cultural figure in the Freud circle, Lou Andreas-Salome, and the other on gender theory.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez is in his sixth year as Director of Athletics.

Under Alvarez's leadership, Wisconsin has won 10 national titles, including five NCAA championships, and 19 conference regular-season or tournament crowns. The Badgers have also had record-setting season academically, with UW student-athletes recording a record-high grade point average in the fall of 2006. The UW has prospered in its facilities with the renovation of Camp Randall Stadium, additions to the Kohl Center and a new facilities master paln.

Alvarez was appointed in the spring of 2008 as one of the chairs of the NCAA's Football Academic Enhancement Group.

From 1990-2005, Alvarez guided the UW football team to a 118-73-4 record, making him the winningest football coach in school history. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles. Alvarez was the 1993 national coach of the year and a two-time Big Ten coach of the year.

He received his undergraduate and master's degrees from Nebraska, where he played linebacker. Alvarez received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.

A Winning Athletic Program

The winning never stops at the University of Wisconsin. In 2007-08 the Badgers kept the winning tradition alive with two national championships, six conference titles and record-breaking seasons.

The Wisconsin rowing teams closed out the 2007-08 athletic season with a bang by winning two national championships. The men's rowing team capped off an undefeated season by winning the 2008 Intercollegiate Rowing Association National Championships, which was its first championship since 1990. The women's lightweight rowing team gave Wisconsin yet another national championship by winning its fourth national title in the last five years.

The Badgers also found success within in the Big Ten Conference this season. The men's track and field team hosted the 2008 Big Ten Indoor Championships and used the home track to its advantage to win its eighth-straight indoor title. The men's cross country team also took home the conference crown by winning it's Big Ten record ninth-straight conference title.

The Wisconsin men's basketball team also had a historical season, winning a school-record 31 games and capturing both the Big Ten regular season title as well as the Big Ten Tournament title. This was the first time in school history the men's basketball team won both conference honors.

The Wisconsin football team went 7-0 at Camp Randall Stadium during the 2007 season. The Badgers are nearly unbeatable at home, compiling a 25-1 home record since the start of the 2004 season.



Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter


The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 13 full-time and three graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Fulltime athletic trainers Tricia DeSouza, Bill Gierach, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jesse Donnenwerth, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Ashley Parr, Jen Pepoy, Holli Schaible and Kristy Walker as well as graduate assistant athletic trainers Ryan Dean, Lindsey Otte and Gretchen Wagnitz utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.


Full-time nutritionist Katie DiPiazza, RD, provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine

Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physicians Dr. John Orwin, Dr. Lee Kaplan and Dr. Geoffrey Baer. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

UW CHAMPS: A Program of Excellence

HAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Bridget Warren, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence


➤ The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence

- ▶ Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all studentathletes.
- ▶ A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues of transitioning to college such as career interests, diversity on campus, as well as identity development.
- ➤ Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for student-athletes continuing their education.
- ➤ The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our studentathletes.

Personal Development

- ▶ The UW CHAMPS program requires all student-athletes to attend three personal development activities each year.
- ▶ Workshops are offered for teams and larger groups on topics such as safe sex, fiscal responsibility, alcohol, peak performance, multiculturalism and many others.
- ▶ Opportunities for team and individual leadership development are also available through both the UW and the NCAA.

- ▶ Workshops on various career topics are offered to student-athletes throughout the year. Topics include writing resumes and cover letters, interviewing tips, networking strategies, dining etiquette and job search strategies.
- ▶ A one-credit class is available to juniors and seniors on career development. The course explores career interests and goals, as well as the world of work and life after athletics.
- ► Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare a major and gain experience within their career field.
- ▶ UW Athletics partners with the National W Club and the Wisconsin Alumni Association as well as local corporations to assist student-athletes in finding jobs and internships as well as assisting in networking and career opportunities.
- ▶ UW Athletics hosts Career Night every January. This event is a networking dinner and career fair for all junior and senior student-athletes.
- Corporations also host information sessions and screening interviews within the Fetzer Center for student-athletes.

2007-08 CHAMPS Cup

The CHAMPS Cup is an all-sport competition, rewarding teams who exemplify all aspects of the student-athlete.

Student-athletes earn points for their teams in six categories: academic achievement, athletic achievement, personal enhancement, community outreach, Badger pride and SAAC participation. One men's and one women's team is recognized as the overall winners. The men's and women's teams with the highest GPA as well as the team with the most community service points are also recognized.


