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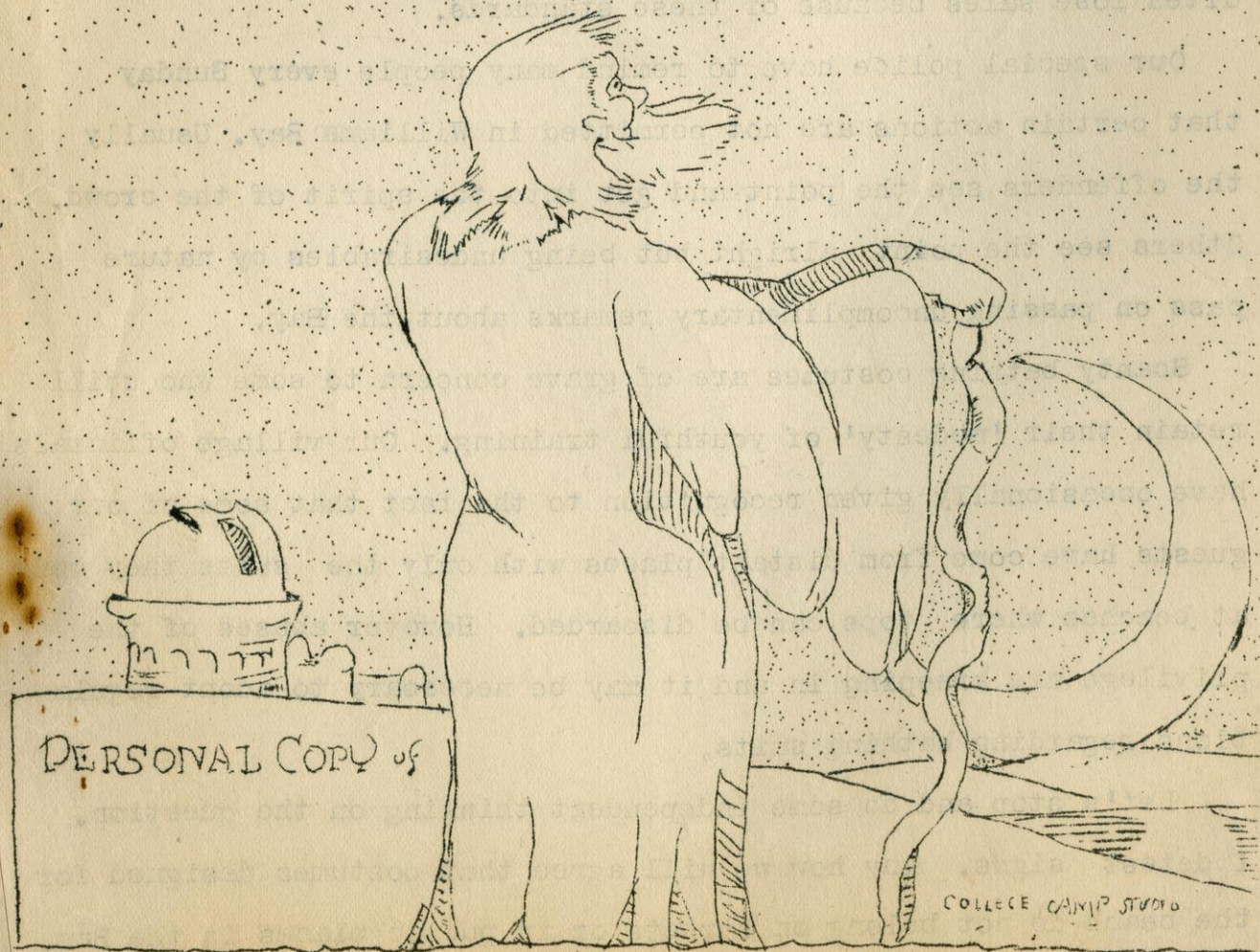

Our neighboring city has started a campaign against so called "undesirables", specifying a certain group of people and in the OPEN FORUM of the Regional News, Vincent Allen uses these words, " We can get rid of them if we want to. Ask Williams Bay how they keep them out".

We are flattered to find that Lake Geneva thinks it possible to learn something from the Bay, but what will our answer be if some one does put the question to us.

The Bay does want to keep undesirables out. We use the word in it's real meaning. Cedar Point Park, Loch Vista and other subdivisions have very high standards to which purchasers must measure up before they can join the communities. The owners often lose sales because of these standards.

Our special police have to remind many people every Sunday that certain actions are not permitted in Williams Bay. Usually the offenders see the point and get into the spirit of the crowd. Others see the point alright but being undesirables by nature pass on passing uncomplimentary remarks about the Bay.

Our village officials have occasionally given recognition to the fact that some of our guests have come from distant places with only the suits they wear at beaches where tops can be discarded. However abuses of the privilege are creeping in and it may be necessary to adopt regulations regarding bathing suits.

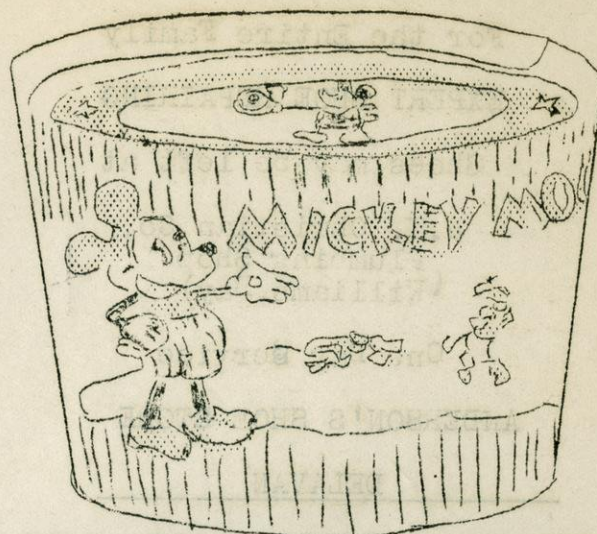

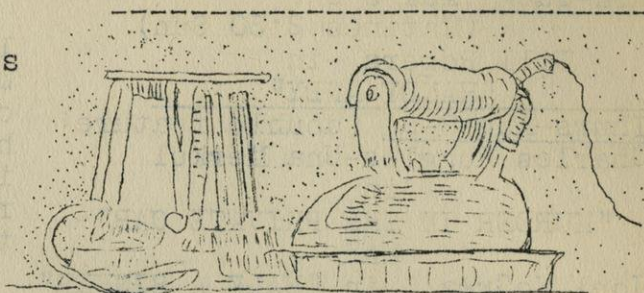

ANOTHER ACHIEVEMENT FOR SCIENCE

Fog, the deadliest menace to the aviator and the mariner, has been successfully overcome.

Chemical dissipation of fog over limited areas was tested for the first time on Friday July 20th by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at South Dartmouth research station.

Three minutes after nozzles fitted into a 100 foot pipe began pouring a secret liquid chemical into a rolling fog which had enveloped the airport, buildings 2000 feet away stood clearly revealed against a background of turbulent walls of white vapor.

The experiments were directed by Henry G. Houghton, Jr., who has spent quite some time in developing a plan to combat fog. The fog was awaited, which was driven in from Buzzard's Bay by a strong southwesterly wind. The pipes had been suspended 30 feet above the ground and the pumps were in readiness to drive the mixture through the pipe. As soon as the fog had enveloped the airport, the nozzles began to spray the atmosphere with the chemical and within a few seconds the fog drifting through the falling chemical curtain turned to a precipitation, and with almost dramatic suddenness a path of visibility approximately 100 feet wide and 30 feet high began to open.

The use of this liquid chemical will make it possible for aviators to clear their own way to a landing field and for vessels at sea to seek a safe path in hazardous waters.

On account of the extreme drouth in the Southwest, 400,000 head of cattle must be shot in Texas, and in Oklahoma, well drillers have gone down 300 feet and find no water. The suffering of live stock in these communities has become serious.
