Approval of Minutes

Minutes of the regular meeting held on October 7, 1988, were unanimously approved, upon motion by Regent Nikolay, seconded by Regent Weinstein.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

ECB - Report on the Council for Public Broadcasting, P./

President Schilling referred to a written report on the Council for Public Broadcasting, provided by Regent Clusen, Chair of the Council.

VTAE - Report of the President of the VTAE Board, P. /

A written report was submitted by Regent DeLong, President of the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education.

Report by the Chairman of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics

Regent Flores, Chair of the Council of Trustees, reported first on the Council's October 21 special meeting, which was primarily devoted to the hospital's long-range strategic planning process. A report on capital budget requests for the 1989-91 bigmium also was discussed.

At its regular meeting on November 10, Superintendent Derzon had reported that, while patient admissions declined slightly in October, the hospital experienced overall gains in patient activity for the first quarter of this fiscal year. Admissions were up 1.7 percent and patient days up 4.1 percent. On approved the content of the patient of the pati

The Council approved a motion by Regent Weinstein that the Council of Trustees approve all major budgetary matters to be submitted to the Board of Regents for action. Subsequently, the Council discussed and approved budget items for the 1989-91 biennium, as included in the UW System budget to be acted upon by the Board of Regents at this meeting.

Dr. Carl J. Getto, Associate Dean/Director of Clinical Affairs, presented an update on the hospital quality assurance program. He also reported that the hospital again was found to be well within predicted mortality rates for all categories of patients in a report to be published the following month by the Health Care Financing Administration.

Continuing his presentation from the previous meeting on environmental trends affecting University Hospital, Associate Superintendent Peter Pruessing reiterated that overall hospital patient activity levels were declining, as was the geographic area from which most patients came. At the same time, other health care providers, most notably large practices, were actively expanding and strengthening their programs throughout the state. Mr. Pruessing noted that Wisconsin had become one of the most competitive health care environments in the United States and that the activities of providers, coupled with changing practice patterns and financial incentives, posed a growing threat to the hospital's patient volume and financial viability. This, in turn, threatened the hospital's fundamental historical education/research mission.

Dr. Getto described how changing patterns of medical practice were affecting medical education. Because patients were being hospitalized for much shorter periods than five years ago, less time was available for teaching students and residents in the hospital setting. Dr. Getto also noted that the direct cost of post-M.D. residency training alone constituted approximately 4.7 percent of the hospital's budget, or more than \$7 million annually. Vice Chancellor Noren added that the cost to UW Hospital for all educational programs was approximately \$16 million per year.

In conclusion, Chairman Flores stated that the issues and trends presented to the Council would continue to be examined and addressed, particularly as the hospital entered its long-range planning process. He planned to appoint a long-range planning committee within the next several weeks.

Board of Regents Meeting Minutes 11/11/88

SAction on Proposed Amendment to UNS 6.02, NIS. Admin. Code, R. 5084, 1.34

Regent President Schilling reported on the public hearing on this EX A amendment held the preceding day, with a quorum of the board present.

UW System Senior Counsel John Tallman reviewed the advisory comments of the Legislative Council Rules Clearinghouse and his recommendations as to changes which could be made on the basis of those comments.

Two persons spoke at the hearing: Gloria Toivola, President of The Association of University of Wisconsin Professionals (TAUWP), addressed the standards for review of personnel cases set forth in the proposed amendments to the bylaws of the Board of Regents. She suggested that the standards be written into the administrative code and also suggested some changes to the standards. Her proposals were referred to legal counsel for review and advice as to whether the standards would be appropriate for inclusion in the administrative code.

Sandra Eschmann, of the United Council of UW Student Governments, spoke in support of the proposed amendments to UWS 6.02.

After discussion, it was unanimously voted to advance the amendment as revised to incorporate several Legislative Council suggestions.

Noting that the amendment as revised was before the Board of Regents at this meeting, Regent Schilling added that, upon approval of Resolution 5084, the amendment would be forwarded to the Legislature for review. Any legislative comments would be returned to the board. If there were no comments, the rules would be returned to the board for promulgation.

Adoption of Resolution 5084 was moved by Regent Gundersen, seconded by Regent Jarvis, and unanimously carried.

Resolution 5084: That the Secretary of the Board of Regents, pursuant to s. 227.19, Wis. Stats., notify the presiding officer of each house of the Legislature that proposed amendments to Section UWS 6.02, Wis. Admin. Code, are in final draft form and cause a statement to appear in the Wisconsin Administrative Register that said proposed amendments have been submitted to the presiding officer of each house of the Legislature.

(The proposed amendments are attached as EXHIBIT A.)

Regent Nikolay pointed out that, as per agreement at the hearing, the sentence beginning in the fifth line should read: "The committee or faculty body shall have the power to," rather than "may" "conduct hearings and fact-finding . . . "

President Schilling asked unanimous consent to make that correction. There being no objection, it was so ordered.

Board of Regents Meeting Minutes 11/11/88

Creation on Standing Personnel Matters Review Committee, including Standards for Review R5085, p. 4 + 5x B

Regent President Schilling presented the proposed amendments which were introduced at the September meeting and were returned for further consideration and action at this time. The purpose of the proposed amendments was to establish a clearly defined process for handling requests to the Board of Regents for review of personnel matters. They would create a Personnel Matters Review Committee as a standing committee of the Board of Regents and would specify its duties in the mandatory and discretionary review of personnel matters. In cases of discretionary review, four standards would be established for determining whether requests for board consideration should be granted.

An additional change, made in response to a suggestion by Regent Fish AN + EX B at the September meeting, would make it clear that the committee would not be obliged to report recommended findings and a decision to the full Board of Regents if the request for review were withdrawn.

Upon motion by Regent Clusen, seconded by Regent Hanson, the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the board:

Resolution 5085: That the bylaws of the Board of Regents be amended as set forth in the attached document.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

Approval of Nonpersonnel Actions/Informational Items

Resolution 5086 was adopted unanimously by the board, upon motion by Regent Fish, seconded by Regent Jarvis.

Resolution 5086: That the report of nonpersonnel actions by administrative officers to the Board of Regents and informational items reported for the record (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified and confirmed.

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Presentation by Urban Corridor Consertium and Uni System Institute on
Race and Ethnicity on Minority Faculty Development and Faculty
Exchange pp 5

Introducing the presentation, President Shaw indicated that part of the strategy for implementing Design for Diversity was to set up faculty exchanges with historically black, Hispanic and native American universities. Faculty members participating in these exchanges would teach at one another's campuses and work together to develop courses and curricula to enhance ethnic awareness among both students and faculty.

Two new exchange programs had been started in the system this year, one of which was administered by the Undergraduate Teaching Improvement Council and the Office of the Special Assistant to the President for Minority Affairs. This program, funded through reallocated dollars for the next two years, was intended to foster the development of new exchange relationships between system institutions and historically minority institutions. The other exchange program, sponsored and funded by the Urban Corridor Consortium and the UW System Institute on Race and Ethnicity, involved a new exchange agreement between the Urban Corridor Consortium and North Carolina Central University—an historically black institution. Faculty from all UW System institutions could apply for participation.

President Shaw introduced Professor William Murin of UW-Parkside, director of the Urban Corridor Consortium, consisting of UW-Green Bay, UW-Oshkosh, UW-Milwaukee and UW-Parkside. Dr. Murin introduced Dr. Winston Van Horne, former chairperson with the Department of Afro-American Studies at UW-Milwaukee and current interim director of the UW System Institute on Race and Ethnicity.

With regard to the exchange program with North Carolina Central University, Dr. Murin noted that this was the second year of the exchange agreement involving both full-semester and full-year exchanges. This year, for the first time, there was also a mini-exchange program, developed by Dr. Van Horne, to take into account the difficulty experienced by many faculty and staff in leaving home and family for a semester or a year. This program, which would involve one-through four-week exchanges, had two faculty participants this semester, both from UW-Milwaukee. It was expected that an additional five or six such exchanges would be funded for the next semester. While the majority of applications had come from faculty within the consortium, there were also applications from UW-River Falls, UW-Eau Claire, and the State Historical Society.

Turning to a description of the minority faculty research awards program, Dr. Murin noted that a significant number of minority faculty were lost at the time for tenure consideration. This program had been devised to help in addressing that problem. Dr. Van Horne stated that, over the past three years, there had been 35 applications from tenure-track minority faculty. From that pool, 18 awards had been made, to free faculty for a semester or a summer from all teaching and service responsibilities, so that they could devote time exclusively to research

activities. This was consistent with Resolution SG 17 of Planning the Future. Of the 18 awards, seven had been given to faculty at UW-Milwaukee, five at UW-Madison, three at UW-Parkside and three at UW-Whitewater. During the three-year period, the awards had totaled \$120,000 of system funds.

Another accomplishment of the institute was publication of six volumes, which had received favorable reviews in many scholarly journals and had been sold internationally. Volume VII, on ethnicity and health, was to be published this December.

An additional activity of the institute was a faculty/minority student mentor program. For the past two years, in initiating the program at UW-Milwaukee and UW-Oshkosh, five faculty members each mentored between three and five minority students. This year the program was expanded to include UW-River Falls and UW-Whitewater. There were now 20 faculty mentoring close to 80 minority students.

With help and encouragement from Associate Vice President Dallas Peterson, the American Ethnic Studies Coordinating Committee, which had been merged into the institute, developed a program concerning introduction of new courses pertaining to the study of race and ethnicity. Since the fall of 1980, 45 new courses on race and ethnicity had been introduced in system institutions, more than half of which became permanent parts of the curricula. These courses covered the spectrum of disciplines, including music, anthropology, sociology, Afro-American studies, political science and history. The various institutions had been very receptive to this activity, which was encouraged through a grants program.

Dr. Murin added that the institutions contributed to the minority faculty research awards program primarily through continuing that faculty member on salary, while the money provided by the institute was used primarily for adjunct faculty replacement. Another key element of the program was that the junior faculty members were provided with senior faculty mentors who worked with them on specific research projects and introduced them to the ethos of publication. These mentors, who were nationally and internationally known scholars, came both from within and from outside the UW System. In four rounds of funding, not once had there been a refusal by a mentor who was asked to work with junior faculty.

In conclusion, Dr. Murin described a proposal being developed by him and Dr. Van Horne based on an idea from Dr. John Schroeder, Vice Chancellor of UW-Milwaukee, to increase the supply of minority faculty. It was known that approximately 60 percent of the attrition rate in graduate students occurred after completion of course work and the preliminary examination, but before completion of the dissertation, when students had used up their allotment of teaching and research assistanceships. The proposal would permit intervention at that point, to provide funds and support, so that students could finish the dissertation and hopefully find tenure-track appointments within the system at the end of that one- or two-year period.

Dr. Van Horne added that, of the persons who received the minority faculty research awards, one had received tenure and two were being considered for tenure this year.

Noting that the concept of faculty exchanges was not a new one, Regent Weinstein expressed the hope that more progress would be made at this time than in the past. He requested that a report be made to the regents on the number of exchange professorships at each campus.

With regard to the mentoring program, he asked how many students should be mentored, in comparison to the 80 currently in the program.

Replying that the need was great, Dr. Van Horne explained that this type of mentoring involved a relationship in which faculty and students knew each other well and the student felt free to call or visit the faculty office at any time. He estimated that more than 60 percent of students might be in need of mentoring.

President Shaw added that there were many mentoring activities not under the institute's auspices. UW-Madison, for example, had developed a sophisticated program to provide a mentor for every beginning minority student. Other institutions also had instituted mentoring programs which would be set forth in the Design for Diversity reports due by January 1, 1989.

In reply to a question by Regent Weinstein, President Shaw indicated that there might be some program overlap at this point. It was not yet known whether all those who needed mentoring were receiving it. Regent Weinstein thought a further report on the mentoring program would help to clarify the situation.

Dr. Van Horne expressed appreciation to Associate Vice President Vernon Lattin, who had been instrumental in promoting programming of the Urban Corridor Consortium and the Institute on Race and Ethnicity; to Executive Vice President Lyall, who was one of his mentors and who was helpful in the evolution of the American Ethnic Studies Coordinating Committee into the institute; to Chancellor Smith and Vice Chancellor Schroeder of UW-Milwaukee for their support of the institute; to Dean Keulks and Associate Dean Hedlund, of the UW-Milwaukee Graduate School where the institute is housed; and to Vice President Trani, who provided a key sense of purpose in the commitment to make the institute a world-renowned entity.

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Interim Report on UW-Madison Athletic Budget Deficit, pp7-11

Beginning his comments, President Shaw noted that a more detailed report was scheduled for the December meeting, by which time there would be more information on short-term actions and long-term options. The matter was to undergo further deliberation this afternoon by the UW-Madison Athletic Board, regarding ways to reduce the deficit and balance the budget. That board, composed of eight faculty members, four members of the alumni association and three students, was taking its charge seriously and had been of great assistance to Chancellor Shalala in confronting the deficit issue.

Xnef Budget - (same)

An audit by the Legislative Audit Bureau of the Athletic Department's financial condition was to be completed by January 1989. The state auditor and his team met with Chancellor Shalala, her staff and Vice Presidents Poellnitz and Bornstein on October 24, to discuss their approach and timetable. The meeting was most constructive, with the LAB and the university believing that this audit would proceed in an expeditious and cooperative manner.

At the same time, President Shaw had asked Vice President Poellnitz and his staff to provide detailed background information on inter- and intra-state funding comparisons for athletics so that UW-Madison's situation could be viewed in a broader context. He expected that this data would be useful in understanding more fully the fiscal history and trends of athletic programs within and outside the system.

He considered it important to keep the Board of Regents informed about this matter, as well as to recognize the role of the Athletic Board and the Chancellor, whose perspective on the issue would be of special value in providing a comprehensive report in December. Considering the complexity of the situation, it would take time to provide an appropriate analysis and a full range of options for review and consideration by the Board of Regents.

Stating his belief that there was not a crisis in the Athletic Department, President Shaw thought, however, that the problem was unlikely to be resolved by a single solution, but rather by a combination of options that together would address responsibly both the current and long-term challenges of a balanced athletic budget.

One option already taken by the Athletic Board was the reduction of \$208,000 in areas such as part-time staff, vehicles, travel, marketing, and the junior varsity hockey program. It would be possible to further reduce the deficit by eliminating other nonrevenue-producing athletic programs. Such action would, however, dramatically change the historic benefits and overall thrust of UW-Madison's sports program.

Another option would be to partially fund the athletic program through segregated fees, which were used for that purpose at every other UW System institution.

A third option would be to consider general purpose operations (GPO) funds consisting of general purpose revenue and fees from existing internal resources. GPO support of athletics ranged widely at other UW System institutions where most of the programs did not produce large amounts of revenue. GPO funds represented three percent of the athletic budget at UW-Madison, principally to support women's sports. At other UW System institutions, GPO support for men's and women's sports ranged from 18 percent at UW-Milwaukee, to about a third at UW-Eau Claire, UW-Green Bay and UW-Stout, to about a half at other institutions. While significantly varying in percentages, there were both historic and logical reasons for different funding approaches at each institution. The GPO approach might not require new money. On the other campuses, GPO dollars were allocated for athletics out of existing budgets because of the belief that a well-rounded athletic program, particularly in the non-remunerative areas, had educational value and importance to the quality of life for the university community.

A fourth option would be to continue business as usual at UW-Madison, with football serving as a principal subsidy sport for the entire Athletic Department. Noting that institutions, such as Michigan, Illinois and Ohio State, also were experiencing funding problems, President Shaw did not consider this option to be reasonable, based on the current football attendance pattern, the prospect of level or decreased revenues from future television contracts and increased cost due to inflation. raised the more fundamental questions of whether it was institutionally healthy to rely on a winning football team for a sound and complete athletic program, and whether stadium security should be sacrificed to the point where unruly conduct by some fans could become the price that an institution would be willing to pay in order to balance its books. As stated by a colleague, the athletic program was in the position of a farmer who planned to pay the mortgage based on having a bumper crop each year. Like farming, competitive athletics also could be subject to an occasional drought.

In conclusion, President Shaw stated his agreement with Chancellor Shalala that UW-Madison had the principal responsibility for dealing with this problem on an internal basis and to the greatest degree possible. He expressed confidence that the Chancellor, her staff and the Athletic Board would proceed with determination in that spirit.

Pointing out that there had been warning signs of the problem for two years, Regent Weinstein stated his concern that the Board of Regents would not hear about solutions until the budget process was completed. He asked assurance that the Board of Regents would be involved in the solution.

Giving his assurance, President Shaw added that, if he had to make a recommendation at this meeting as to whether there should be a budget request for this purpose, he would recommend against doing so because it would be a lower priority than the others being presented and because the Athletic Department and the Chancellor had not completed their efforts in considering options.

Chancellor Shalala also stated her assurance that the Board of Regents would be involved in the decision. Noting that cuts of \$600,000 had been made, she considered the university to be on top of the short-run problem. While the hope was to avoid bringing a funding request to the board, she did not know whether or not that could be realized. The goal was a new financial base that would be stable for a long period of time. Stating the commitment to maintain nonrevenue sports, she emphasized that UW-Madison would make every effort to manage the problem internally to the extent possible.

Regent Weinstein asked if decisions would be made before the next biennial budget, and Chancellor Shalala replied in the affirmative.

Regent Weinstein emphasized that he was uncomfortable about the timing because it would leave resolution of the problem to the Legislature.

It was noted by President Shaw that the biennial budget proposal did not include segregated fees, which would be determined in the annual budget process. With regard to evolution of the problem, he thought UW-Madison did as well as could be expected in estimating the shortfall and making reductions accordingly. Not unlike what was occurring across the country, the shortfall had been underestimated. While the problem had existed for two years, it had worsened faster than anticipated. He had advised the chancellor that he would not be comfortable if she were to bring forward a request for GPR money, if every effort had not been made to solve the problem in other ways—through reallocation, through cost cutting, and through fee considerations.

Regent Gerrard urged that the problem be faced forthrightly. He considered it unrealistic to hope that GPR would not be needed to solve the problem.

President Schilling noted that assurance had been given by the president and the chancellor that the Board of Regents would be involved when the time came to make a decision. Regents were concerned that legislators would put funds in the budget that the board had not requested and which did not reflect regent priorities. If that occurred, he stated, it would be a very serious problem.

Stating that would not happen, Chancellor Shalala added that in December the Board of Regents would receive a full presentation on the nature of the deficit, what already had been done about it and the proposed solutions. The goal was not to make a GPR request unless absolutely necessary to balance the budget.

Regent Weinstein asked if that meant the biennial budget request should not be adopted until December when all the variables were set forth.

Since there was no proposal before the Board of Regents at this time, Regent Schilling said the board should proceed with action on the biennial budget at this meeting.

Regent Fish agreed, observing that it would have been difficult for Chancellor Shalala to make any recommendations while various options were still being explored. When the report was made in December, members of the board could pass an amendment to the budget if they wished, although he personally would find it difficult to reopen the budget request at that point. Until the facts were presented, however, there was nothing the board could do about the matter.

Regent Flores stated that, in his view, the cut-off date for this budget was today's meeting. As had been pointed out, the problem was known, but at this time it still was considered a campus matter. He felt any request would have to await the next budget cycle.

Noting that the matter was not before the Board of Regents at this time, Regent Nikolay commented that the regents should not deal with an individual campus issue until it was brought before them.

Regent Gundersen observed that the message he heard was that the UW System had a far higher priority--catch-up pay for faculty and staff.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Chairman Nikolay presented the report of the committee.

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Cisenfery Larry H. - Introduction as Reserve) of Capital Budget and Architectural/Engineering Services, p. []

Regent Nikolay introduced Larry H. Bisenberg, the newly-appointed Associate Vice President who would head the Division of Capital Budget and Architectural/Engineering Services, replacing Bert Anderson who retired last fall. Mr. Eisenberg came to the UW-System from the Department of Administration where his most recent duties were to direct the state's purchasing program.

Legislation to Authorize Wisconsin Higher Education Savings Bond
Program, R 5087, P. II

At a portion of the committee meeting in which all regents were invited to participate, Resolution 5087 was unanimously approved.

Adoption by the Board of Regents of the following resolution was moved by Regent Nikolay, seconded by Regent Gundersen and carried unanimously:

That, upon the recommendation of the President of Resolution 5087: the University of Wisconsin System, legislation will be sought to authorize "Wisconsin Higher Education Savings Bonds" to provide Wisconsin citizens with an investment program to save for the expenses of higher education.

"Budget - Defend of capital todget consideration to December, p. 11

Capital Budget Deferred

Because of concerns regarding time limitations which might preclude adequate discussion, it was voted in committee, with Regents Clusen and Nikolay voting "No," to table the balance of the 1989-91 capital budget until the December meeting.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Vice Chairman Flores reported for the committee.

Remedial Education - Odoptin greenmendations)
R 5088, pp 12-15

President Shaw presented the report on remedial education to the committee. Mr. Don Parker, representing United Council, appeared in support of the report. Professor Phillip Nystrand, representing the UW-Madison Committee on Composition Programs, appeared in opposition to the report.

In committee, two amendments to the draft resolution were made by consensus, both setting specific timetables. As reflected in Resolution 5088, the amendments were to add the phrase "Beginning in fall 1990," to the sentence on line 8, paragraph 4; and "By October 1989," to the first sentence of paragraph 6. The committee approved the revised resolution, with one dissenting vote.

It was moved by Regent Flores and seconded by Regent Weinstein that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5088:

That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents adopts the following recommendations of the President of the University of Wisconsin System regarding remedial education:

- 1. Students who are admitted to institutions of the University of Wisconsin System in accord with criteria approved by the Board of Regents and whose scores on English or mathematics placement or proficiency tests indicate a low probability for success in college-level courses in either or both of those subjects should be placed into appropriate remedial courses.
- 2. Remedial courses in English and mathematics shall not generate credit toward a degree from institutions in the University of Wisconsin System.
- 3. Remedial courses in English and mathematics offered by institutions of the University of Wisconsin System may be taught by faculty and staff they employ, through University of Wisconsin-Extension, or through contractual arrangements with local VTAE units. An institution's remedial courses should be available for students on its campus. The faculty of the University of Wisconsin System institution shall control the content, standards, and methods of instruction in its remedial courses.

- 4. Students enrolled in remedial English or mathematics courses shall not be permitted to enroll for more than 12 credits during the term(s) in which they are taking remedial course work. Under special circumstances, University of Wisconsin System institutions may grant exceptions to this requirement at no additional cost to the student. Beginning in fall 1990, each institution will provide an annual report to System Administration on the number of and basis for such exceptions. The president will use this information to compile an annual report for the Board of Regents.
- 5. No later than fall, 1991, all remedial courses in the University of Wisconsin System shall be offered on a fee recovery basis.
- 6. By October 1989, the University of Wisconsin System shall develop a detailed statement of the minimum college-level skills and competencies students are expected to have in English and mathematics upon entrance to the University. This statement shall be widely circulated and periodically up-dated. It should form the basis for college-preparatory courses in English and mathematics offered by secondary schools and for remedial courses offered by the University.

An initial screening for these competencies shall include admitted freshmen's scores on the "ACT" and any other additional performance criteria that each UW System institution may choose. Students who score above the UW System-established level* on the "ACT" mathematics and English subtests are expected to have a high probability of success in college-level courses and may be exempted from further testing. For students who score below the UW System-established level, each institution shall determine the specific instruments and performance criteria used for placement in college-level or remedial courses.

Information about the UW System-established level on "ACT" mathematics and English subtests and each institution's instruments and performance criteria shall be made available to the secondary schools and to potential University of Wisconsin students.

- 7. The University of Wisconsin System will cooperate with the Department of Public Instruction in developing a plan for assessing English and mathematics skills of high school students throughout the state. Examination results shall be made available to students, their parents, and their schools. Students whose scores suggest they are unlikely to place into college-level English and mathematics courses upon entering college shall be encouraged to take courses in high school that are designed to improve their English and mathematics competencies and lessen the possibility of their placing into remedial courses
- * Determined by the UW System Working Group made up of faculty from UW institutions.

In discussion at the board meeting, Regent Flores asked President Shaw if it was the intent that only money recovered through fees would be used to pay for teaching personnel. President Shaw replied in the affirmative.

Regent Flores indicated that the concern set forth by Professor Nystrand at the committee meeting was that, on one hand, the effort was to keep fees at a minimum in order to avoid financial harm to students; but on the other hand, it was important to have high quality instructors teaching these courses. If earmarked dollars were the only funds that could be used to hire instructional personnel, funding might not be sufficient to hire well-qualified instructors. That outcome, Regent Flores stated, would not be consonant with the intent of the Education Committee or the task force.

President Shaw agreed that the program should be monitored with this concern in mind. If such a problem materialized, he would report to the Board of Regents on modifications which might be made.

Regent Weinstein apologized for having misunderstood the professor's position. He, too, would be very concerned if it were true that fee revenue constraints meant that the least competent instructors would be the ones to teach remedial courses.

President Shaw said that had not been the case at UW-Milwaukee, which already was operating its program on a fee recovery basis. However, he would not assume that it would be as easy at a less urban institution to find highly competent part-time and other adjunct staff who could be very good at teaching these kinds of courses. At this point, he had no reason to be seriously concerned, but he thought that the professor's point was well taken and that the situation should be watched carefully.

Regent Flores noted that his remarks were not intended to indicate opposition to the resolution, which he considered a great improvement over the existing situation. The intent clearly was to obtain the best instructional personnel possible for these programs, and he agreed that careful monitoring would be necessary to make sure this occurred.

While he had voted against the resolution in committee, Regent DeLong stated that he favored what was to be instituted. His opposition was based on concern that the report did not address the basic issue of offering remedial programs at the the university level. He thought that issue should be revisited in the future.

Regent Flores added that the Education Committee was assured that the question would be addressed.

Noting that the resolution required a number of reports, Regent Clusen suggested that, when those reports were made, information be provided as to the qualifications and competence of the instructors teaching remedial courses.

Regent Weinstein noted that the preliminary Education Committee minutes indicated that a request was made that System Administration track the relationship between the freshmen cohort and the graduating cohort. He pointed out that the request included comparison with peer institutions and not national averages. That information would help in evaluating the program.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5088 was unanimously adopted by the Board of Regents.

Regent Flores reported that the Education Committee commended the task force and especially Ms. Maggie Burke, of the Department of Public Instruction, for her role in drafting the document.

Five-Year Review: B.S. in Computer Science, UW-Platteville, R 5089, p.15

Resolution 5089, which was unanimously approved by the Education Committee, was moved by Regent Flores, seconded by Regent Hanson and adopted unanimously by the Board of Regents.

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1987-88 Report on Minority/Disadvantaged Programs, R 5090, P. 16

At the Education Committee meeting, Executive Vice President Lyall introduced the 1987-88 report on minority/disadvantaged programs and summarized its major points. Special Assistant to the President James Sulton was present to comment and respond to questions. The committee unanimously approved Resolution 5090.

The following resolution was adopted unanimously by the Board of Regents, upon motion by Regent Flores, seconded by Regent Hanson:

Reporting on this program, which was in its fourth year, Regent Flores noted that projects were supported by a two-thirds system/one-third institution funding match. The names of the recipients of awards from the second round of proposals to be funded during the 1988-89 fiscal year were included in the agenda materials. Together with the first group of this year's recipients, which was reported in April, this group brought to 116 the number of academic staff projects approved for support this year, for a total of more than \$135,000 of system matching funds.

Faculty - Retention discussed, p. 20

Regent Gunderson 2011 Regent Gundersen called attention to news reports that one of the UW System's most outstanding biochemists might leave Wisconsin because his spouse could not find a position in Madison.

Chancellor Shalala said that she personally had spoken with Professor DeLuca, and that everything possible was being done to retain him. His spouse had been offered a position for which she had previously applied at UW-Madison in the School of Pharmacy.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Regent President Schilling reported for the committee and noted that all regents were invited to participate in discussion of and action on the first four agenda items.

Budget - Budget including Sudget including Competitive Faculty and Academic Staff Catch-Up Salary Adjustments and Statutory Language Proposals, R 5099, pp 20-29

President Shaw outlined the major issues of the 1989-91 biennial operating budget, the top priority being faculty and academic staff catch-up pay and a competitive pay plan. During the current biennium, faculty and staff received only 2 percent pay adjustments in each year. Competitive increases would have been in the 5-6 percent range for each year, resulting again in a need for catch-up. The budget requested fewer GPR positions than any budget since 1975 and was the second lowest GPR program request in constant dollars since merger. Although the programmatic increase over the current biennium was less than 2 percent, the budget contained a number of important initiatives:

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* Improving minority/disadvantaged programs;

- * Meeting inflationary costs and effects of dollar devaluation in library materials, and supply and equipment budgets;
- * Improving computer availability and access for students;
- * Providing drug and alcohol counseling;
- * Strengthening graduate business programs;
- * Moving forward with centers of excellence;
- * Initiating development of statewide networks to interconnect the campuses; and
- * Increasing the ability to contribute to the state's economic development.

The budget request could be divided into thirds: one third for the compensation package, one third for program requests, and the remaining third for technical adjustments.

It was pointed out that, while program revenue expenditure estimates for federal and other contracts, for auxiliaries, hospitals, and UW-Extension were included, approval of these requests would not constitute approval of rate increases. Actual fees and rates would be approved as part of the annual budget process in July.

A number of chancellors and a representative from the State
Department of Agriculture spoke on various components of the biennial
budget. Representatives from three groups gave testimony on compensation
issues, and representatives from student groups spoke about the effects on
students of certain aspects of the biennial budget.

Five amendments to the original resolution were proposed by Regent Lyon and approved in committee. The amended resolution was not acted upon by the committee but, by unanimous consent, was moved forward for action by the Board of Regents at this meeting.

The following resolution was moved by Regent Jarvis and seconded by Regent Weinstein:

That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System:

Regent Weinstein noted that the intent of amendments in committee regarding academic staff catch-up pay had been for academic staff to receive the same percentage increase as faculty, but that the amendment affecting category A staff had reduced the amount by about a million dollars below the faculty increase percentage. To restore that equity, he moved that the \$1,309,500 in catch-up pay for deans be removed from the budget and that a million dollars of that be used for category A academic staff.

The motion was seconded by Regent Jarvis.

At the request of Regent DeLong, the question was divided.

It was <u>moved</u> by Regent Weinstein and seconded by Regent Jarvis that the funding for catch-up increases earmarked for deans be removed from the budget. This was to be followed by a motion to add one million dollars of that amount to catch-up pay for category A academic staff.

At the request of Regent Fish, President Shaw stated his view of the motions. His reaction to restoring the dollars for academic staff was favorable, on the basis of equity and in view of the fact that they had a market-based need higher than other groups. Rather than taking the needed funds from catch-up pay for deans, his preference was to take it from the computer access request, because he felt the catch-up funds for deans were needed to make their salaries competitive.

In response to a question by Regent Weinstein, President Shaw indicated that, although deans occupied administrative positions, they were tenured members of the faculty and historically had been treated as faculty in terms of pay raises.

Regent Weinstein commented that he had not seen a study that showed deans as being underpaid.

President Shaw indicated that studies last spring showed the most underpaid personnel to be chancellors, vice chancellors and vice presidents. Deans also were not paid competitively, although the differential was not as great as for the other groups.

Regent Fish offered a <u>substitute amendment</u> to restore catch-up funds for category A academic staff to 3.6 percent, as proposed by Regent Weinstein, and to take the necessary funds from the computer access request, as proposed by President Shaw.

The substitute amendment was seconded by Regent Hanson.

Regent Clusen pointed out that the computer access request already had been reduced by \$1.6 million in action at the committee meeting.

While it was difficult for him to suggest cuts in any programmatic area, since the budget proposal was modest, President Shaw said he would prefer to take the needed funds from the computer line than from other areas. The only other line that had sufficient dollars was supplies and equipment, which he considered to be a higher priority.

- Vice President Lyon presiding -

Speaking in opposition to the motion, Regent Schilling explained that an important rationale for the amendment that reduced funding for category A academic staff was not a belief that they did not require catch-up increases, but rather the belief that not all category A staff were in the same competitive situations as faculty and category B staff. It was based on the assumption that about 30 percent of category A staff did not compete in a national market.

Regent Fish commented that, in addition to competitiveness, consideration should be given to the element of fairness. If decisions were based on competitiveness only, one would have to take into account the fact that there was little competitive demand for professors in certain disciplines. The absence of national competition in a specific area did not indicate to him that the area should be overlooked.

Regent Schilling remarked that the premise was not that everyone would be entitled to a 3.6 percent increase. His rationale in supporting the funding reduction for category A staff was that there still would be a significant pool of money available, and the institutions would decide which staff needed catch-up funds.

Regent Weinstein commented that if market competitiveness were not considered the basis of equity, faculty catch-up increases would never be granted. The problem, he felt, occurred with those categories of staff who were in a state or local market rather than a national market. In those cases, the university was competing with state government and the private sector for people with the same skills; and he did not think they should be paid more by the university than they would receive in those other sectors.

- President Schilling presiding -

Regent Lyon observed that what was being debated was a very small part of a \$52 million request and that the figures were not definite, since any number of personnel changes could be expected before next July when the money would be distributed. His reason for proposing the budget amendments to reduce the amount of catch-up pay for academic staff was that he did not think academic staff should receive a greater increase than faculty. While his intent had been to provide a level of equity, the actual figures now indicated that the amount for Category A staff had been reduced somewhat below the faculty level.

At the request of Regent Doughty Luckhardt, the question was divided.

On a voice vote, catch-up funding for Category A academic staff was restored to a 3.6 percent increase.

- Vice President Lyon presiding -

Regent Schilling stated concern that further reduction in the computing request would have a disproportionate impact on the comprehensive universities, while the research request, most of which would go to the doctoral campuses, remained untouched. He asked for President Shaw's reaction to taking part of the needed \$1 million from research funding.

President Shaw concurred that half of the \$1 million might be taken from the computing request and half from the research request. He would be reluctant to take more than that from research because of the potential benefit of these activities to economic development.

As a <u>substitute amendment</u>, Regent Schilling <u>moved</u> that half of the \$1 million be taken from the computing request and half from the research request. The motion was seconded by Regent Jarvis.

Regent Weinstein stated his continuing preference for taking the \$1 million from the catch-up pay allowance for deans, which would have an equitable impact on all institutions.

As a <u>substitute amendment</u>, Regent Fish <u>moved</u> that the President of the UW System be instructed to derive the needed million dollars from the requests for catch-up pay for deans, computer access and research, with the amount taken from each area to be determined at his discretion.

The motion was seconded by Regent Hanson for the purpose of discussion.

- President Schilling presiding -

Regent Nikolay stated that he would not vote for any of the amendments offered and did not favor reducing the budget. He thought

sufficient monies should be provided to support the programs which were set forth in the request.

Regent Hanson favored restoring the \$1 million in catch-up pay without taking monies for that purpose from another source.

On a voice vote, the <u>substitute amendment</u> offered by Regent Fish was <u>approved</u>.

Discussion turned to the main motion as amended.

Regent Fish <u>moved</u> that faculty and academic staff catch-up pay for 1989-91 (exclusive of that portion funded from other program revenue) be funded entirely from GPR, as follows:

That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System:

The motion was seconded by Regent DeLong for the purpose of discussion.

Regent Fish explained that the effect of the amendment would be to reduce tuition about \$4.7 million in the first year, and \$5 million in the second year, and to replace those amounts with general purpose revenues. Resident undergraduate tuition would be reduced approximately \$30 per student. His amendment was not being made to suggest that the \$4.7 and \$5 million would be removed from catch-up pay funding. If the Legislature did not choose to use GPR, it could take funding from other areas of the budget. His primary concern was that tuition was increasing too rapidly—outpacing both inflation and the consumer price index.

While he agreed that tuition was too high, Regent Weinstein feared that the proposed amendment would jeopardize the prospects for catch-up pay. Recalling the difficulty in obtaining catch-up pay in the 1985-87 biennium, he thought it was too much to expect that the Governor and Legislature would not only provide it this time, but also would agree to 100 percent GPR funding. The way to address the tuition problem, in his view, was to discuss the issue with the leadership of state government.

Regent Fish did not agree that the proposal was not pragmatic. He thought the Governor and Legislature were fully prepared to address the issue in whatever way they considered best. Recalling that since he came to the Board of Regents, the share of instructional cost borne by tuition had increased from 23 percent to 32 percent, he observed that, while the regents always stated dedication to maintaining an affordable tuition level, rates continued upward nonetheless. He could not support the increasing share of cost being paid by students.

While he agreed with Regent Fish's philosophy, Regent Flores felt the amendment forced the regents to choose between the students and the faculty. Although he thought the share of GPR funds should be increased, he could not agree that it was practical to request that the entire catch-up package be funded by GPR. Therefore, he intended to vote against the amendment.

President Shaw expressed concern that the amendment would undermine the position that compensation was the highest budget priority. If students were not asked to share in funding that priority, he felt the ability to demonstrate that this was the highest priority would be jeopardized. His willingness to increase tuition for this purpose was based on the judgment that it was in the students' best interest to retain highly qualified faculty and staff.

Regent Clusen commented that the proposal appeared to solve one problem, but created another. She was glad Regent Fish had raised the issue because, although the regents often deplored the student financial burden, the issue was now being brought to the reality of a vote. However, she thought reality had to be faced in another way. If the amendment passed, the Board of Regents might appear heroic to students and their families, but she feared that, to the Legislature, it would appear that the board simply did not understand financial reality. Noting that the regents had not disagreed with President Shaw's identification of compensation as the highest priority, she did not think at this point the

board should take an action which was contrary to that position. Therefore, she stated, with regret, that she could not support the amendment.

Regent Fish stated that it was not his intent to embarrass any member of the board or to have the amendment viewed as a contest between faculty and students. While he recognized that it would not be approved, he had offered it to make a point. Although lip service constantly was given to holding tuition down, there always seemed to be a higher priority when the time came to take action. His amendment only would have reduced the student share of undergraduate costs from 32.2 percent to 31.7 percent. While he agreed that catch-up pay was important, he felt the Board of Regents could not constantly say that every other constituency in the UW System was more important than the body of people for whom it existed.

With concurrence of the seconder of the motion, Regent Fish withdrew his amendment.

Regent Weinstein commented that, in *Planning the Future*, the Board of Regents decided that doctoral campus tuition should be brought to the mid-range of the Big Ten and that this budget request would not bring tuition to that level.

Regent Fish remarked that the *Planning the Future* resolution stated that tuition should be not be higher than the mid-point of the Big Ten. That action, he said, did not imply that tuition should reach the mid-point of the Big Ten. Rather, it was a prohibition against moving beyond the mid-point.

Regent Doughty Luckhardt inquired about the additional GPR positions being requested in the budget.

President Shaw explained that about 20 percent of the 142 positions were in the research and public service area, primarily to promote economic development. Another 20 percent was for alcoholism counseling, consistent with recommendations of the Governor's task force. There were also positions for centers of excellence and computer access, but these numbers would be reduced as a result of the budget amendments which had been adopted. Overall, a 20 percent reduction in GPR positions was expected.

In response to a further question by Regent Doughty Luckhardt, President Shaw indicated that the 300+ positions provided in the last biennial budget had been used for the instructional program, with 20 positions used for financial aid counseling.

Regent Lyon inquired about the number of program-revenue funded positions included in the budget, to which President Shaw replied that there were an additional 89 positions to be funded by program revenues.

Regent Nikolay stated that he was gratified to know others shared his long-expressed opposition to tuition increases. In his view, the solution was for education be considered a statewide obligation of all of the

citizens and for the Legislature to raise enough money to pay for this bare-bones budget without increasing tuition. Therefore, he intended to vote against the budget request.

Regent Weinstein pointed out that United Council's platform set forth 33 percent as an acceptable student share of instructional cost, and that this budget provided for a resident undergraduate student share of 32.2 percent.

At the request of Regent President Schilling, Associate Vice President Sell stated that, with the amendments that had been adopted, the total biennial increase would be \$325,625,500, which would provide for a total 1989-91 level of \$3,865,759,900.

Regent Weinstein noted that, although the total budget was \$3.9 billion, it was important to note that half of that was in program revenues. Because media reports tended to focus on the total number, he considered it inadvisable to consolidate the hospital budget and other program revenues with the GPR/fee request.

Regent President Schilling agreed that it was important to emphasize the point that, of this nearly \$4 billion budget, a relatively small percentage was from tax revenue.

A breakdown of the funding by sources was stated by Associate Vice President Sell as follows: \$1,418,020,700 from GPR, and \$570,652,200 from fees, for a total GPR/fee budget of \$1,988,672,900. The other \$1,877,087,000 was from program revenue funds. These numbers, she added, did not take into account the \$1 million funding shift made at this meeting.

On a roll call vote, the following revised <u>resolution was adopted</u> by the Board of Regents, with Regents Clusen, Flores, Gerrard, Gundersen, Hanson, Jarvis, Lyon, Schilling and Weinstein voting "Aye" (9) and Regents DeLong, Doughty Luckhardt, Fish and Nikolay voting "No" (4):

Regent Schilling reported that Matthew Zeidenberg, co-president of PP 29-30 the UW-Madison Teaching Assistants' Association asked the regents to include graduate assistants in the pay plan request. In order to avoid any possibility of an unfair labor practice, no discussion was held. Resolution 5100 was unanimously approved in committee.

Adoption by the Board of Regents of the following resolution was moved by Regent Schilling, seconded by Regent Nikolay and carried, with Regent DeLong voting "No."

Regent Schilling moved adoption of Resolution 5102, which was unanimously approved in committee. The motion was seconded by Regent Nikolay and adopted unanimously by the Board of Regents.

That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents approves the allocation of the remaining 25 instructional FTE released by the Joint Committee on Finance, in accordance with the decision rules outlined in the 1988-89 Operating Budget and Fee Schedules, July 1988.

Upon motion by Regent Schilling, seconded by Regent Fish, Resolution 5103, which was unanimously approved by the Business and Finance Committee, was adopted unanimously by the Board of Regents.

Resolution 5103: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Report on Foundation Accounts as namely of LAB recommendation,

R 5104, pp 31-32

Regent Schilling summarized committee review of the report which resulted from the Legislative Audit Bureau's recommendation that the UW System study financial relationships between system institutions and their foundations. The purpose was to determine whether any state funds had been deposited inappropriately to a foundation.

System Administration was in the process of reviewing with the institutions the reports submitted, to ensure that all situations had been identified and appropriate action had been taken. A letter had been sent to the institutions, summarizing the activity reported and requesting the chancellor to submit a positive confirmation that all funds appropriately belonging to the state had been identified. The results were to be compiled for submission to the Joint Committee on Audit by November 30 and were to be distributed to the regents prior to submission. The committee unanimously approved Resolution 5104.

It was moved by Regent Schilling moved and seconded by Regent Hanson that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents.

Resolution 5104: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the report on University/Foundation Relationships be accepted and, that upon completion of the System Administration review, the report, along with information on funds transferred from foundation accounts to the State Treasury, be forwarded to the Legislative Joint Committee on Audit by November 30, 1988.

In response to a question by Regent Nikolay, Regent Schilling noted that there had been a situation in Stevens Point in which a routine practice involved some funds that might have been construed as state dollars going to the UW-Stevens Point Foundation. As a result, the Legislative Audit Committee asked if there might be similar practices at other institutions.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5104 was adopted unanimously by the board.

Beauty of Enrollment Management - 1988-89 report, pp 32-35

The Business and Finance Committee had unanimously voted to move this report to today's meeting of the Board of Regents.

President Shaw noted that enrollment management was designed to reduce FTE enrollment in the system by 7,000 students over a four-year period, with reductions occurring in units of 1,500 per year for the first two years and 2,000 per year for the second two years. The original plan included growth at UW-Green Bay, UW-Parkside, UW-Superior and the UW Centers. By 1991, those institutions were to increase FTE enrollment by 1,755. The remaining 10 institutions were targeted to reduce enrollments by a total FTE number of 8,755, with larger proportionate reductions occurring at UW-Madison and at UW-Milwaukee.

Summarizing the report on results after the second year of enrollment management, President Shaw said that of those institutions targeted to grow, UW-Green Bay, UW-Parkside and the UW Centers had grown beyond enrollment management expectations. UW-Superior came within one percent of its targeted enrollment—22 FTE below the goal. Increases of 322 at UW-Green Bay and 405 at the UW Centers were far beyond expectations.

For those institutions scheduled to decrease enrollment, both UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee were on target, with UW-Milwaukee being 103 students below their goal. The other institutions ranged from being almost on target--UW-Whitewater, UW-Oshkosh and perhaps UW-La Crosse (for which information was still being obtained), to being within one percent of the goal--UW-Platteville and UW-River Falls, to being beyond one percent of the target--UW-Eau Claire, UW-Stevens Point and UW-Stout.

By this time, the UW System was to have reduced enrollment by 3,000, but had fallen 1,292 short of that goal.

Of these 1,292, over 700 resulted from institutions targeted to increase enrollment doing so faster than anticipated. The remaining 550 were mainly attributable to a change in retention rates that had made predicting enrollment more difficult.

In attempting to manage enrollment, an estimate first was made of how many existing students would return, using figures from previous years to calculate percentages of return and attempting from those to project the expected percentage of return in a given year. Once a continuing student enrollment had been estimated, it could be determined how many new students—new freshmen, transfer students and special students—could be admitted to attain the expected enrollment.

The three campuses that were more than one percent over their targets had done very well in obtaining the expected number of new students. However, continuing student enrollment had exceeded estimates. While this increased retention was good news, it made enrollment management more difficult. The reasons for this phenomenon might include the following: First, higher admission standards could be expected to have resulted in a stronger student body; second, students appeared to be continuing because of concern that they might not be readmitted due to tighter policies; and third, there seemed to be a tendency for students to take their studies more seriously. Each year, enrollment management was expected to become a greater challenge because new factors would continue to be introduced.

As to whether the 1991 target would be met, President Shaw said every effort would be made to reach the goal, learning from the experience of this year and next year.

Regent President Schilling asked the chancellors of institutions with enrollments above their targets to comment on what had happened last year and how the problem would be addressed next year.

Chancellor Sorensen said UW-Stout had taken two immediate steps, the first being to reduce the number of students to be admitted for the spring semester. For next fall, the number of new students would be reduced quite dramatically to accommodate the new retention rates. With these changes, he was confident that UW-Stout would meet its target.

In response to a question by Regent Weinstein, Chancellor Sorensen indicated that the problem in estimating continuing students occurred because those students did not reapply, but simply returned in the fall. While pre-registration helped in making estimates, there was no process by which students were required to state whether or not they would return.

Vice Chancellor Fleming explained that UW-Eau Claire's complete overage had been caused by retention of 270 more students than expected. For next year, admission standards had again been raised, so that only students from the top 40 percent of the graduating class would be accepted automatically, rather than those in the top 50 percent. Others would be placed in a discretionary pool. Acceptance of new freshmen for second semester already had been cut off, which would reduce the survival rate for next fall. Next year, a freshman class of only 2,000 would be accepted, which was about 12.7 percent below the freshman class of this year—a difference of 277 students.

Chancellor Marshall explained that UW-Stevens Point experienced a great increase in retention—342 over the anticipated number of continuing students. Unlike the system as a whole, there was not only an increase in retention from the freshmen to sophomore year, but also from the sophomore to junior and junior to senior years. To address the problem, the university put stricter requirements on transfers, on return of former students, and on new freshmen admissions. New freshmen enrollments were

closed except for those in the top ten percent of their high school class. By taking those actions, the actual number of students was reduced to within 40 of the target. What was not controlled was the mix of part-time and full-time students, and the FTE number increased by 207. Higher requirements were being instituted for students admitted in the second semester, for transfers and for new freshmen. It was anticipated that the university would come much closer to its target next year.

Regent Weinstein asked if it was true that, as admission standards were raised, retention rates also could be expected to increase.

In reply, Chancellor Marshall indicated that was true and was anticipated, but the retention rate increased more than expected.

Regent Schilling commented that effective enrollment management was essential to the UW System's future. To the extent that those efforts failed, tuition would continue to be driven higher.

Regent Hanson thought the basic reason for capping enrollment was lack of faculty to teach beginning students. Therefore, what was occuring was what had been intended. With enrollment control in the freshman and sophomore years, better use would be made of faculty in teaching upper level students.

Regent Weinstein recalled that the faculty/student ratio had been considered unacceptable, and that the solution had been to increase the number of faculty and decrease the number of students. While more instructional positions were obtained, that gain was to be accompanied by a 7,000 overall reduction in enrollment.

In response to a question by Regent Weinstein, President Shaw indicated that in the first year of enrollment management, the goal had been a reduction of 1,500, and the actual reduction was 2,200. By this year, the total reduction should have been 3,000 but instead was 1,800. His expectation was that next fall's figures would be closer to target, but there would remain some element of uncertainty due to the difficulty in predicting behavior.

While he recognized the complexity of the matter, Regent Weinstein observed that the image of having failed created a credibility problem with the Legislature. In response to the expressions of need in the budget request, it would be noted that self-help measures had not been fully implemented. He agreed, therefore, with President Schilling's comment that failure to reach the goal would be a very serious problem.

While he agreed that achieving the goal was important, Regent Fish felt it should be recognized that there always would be variations among campuses because of the difficulties which had been stated. He noted that there had been significant progress in many areas of enrollment management, although the numbers on all campuses were not exactly what had been planned. At this point, he considered it too early to judge the effort to be either a success or a failure.

Regent Schilling did not think there was an expectation that all numbers would be reached precisely as planned. The concern was that, with two years of the plan elapsed, approaches would have to be much more drastic to accomplish the goal in the final two years.

Report on Legal Services in the UN System, p.35

Regent Schilling reported that the Business and Finance Committee was advised by Executive Vice President Lyall that the purpose of this interim report was to indicate the number and placement of lawyers in the UW System. She stated that there currently was an informal policy that when an institution sought to hire house counsel, it must consult with the General Counsel for the UW System before making an appointment. Because of the necessity for the System General Counsel to coordinate the activities of attorneys throughout the system and to bring important legal issues and pending litigation to the Beard of Regents for review, the "Guidelines and Reporting Procedures for Legal Affairs" were being prepared. The main purpose for the guidelines was to formalize existing practices and procedures. In addition to policies and procedures, committee discussion indicated the wish to look at hew legal services were being delivered throughout the system, so that the Beard of Regents could consider how legal services might be delivered more effectively and in a more unified manner.

Affairs, Wi Medican R Spans, Pp 35-36

Chancellor Shalala assured the Business and Finance Committee that the person selected for this position would review the existing UW-Madison Administrative Legal Services Office to determine if current staffing levels were necessary. It was also understood that the new position would have to fit into the UW System legal services structure resulting from the study now in progress, and that this vice chancellor, like other campus attorneys, would report to and coordinate with the System General Counsel. The committee unanimously approved Resolution 5105.

Resolution 5105: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the request of the Chancellor to recruit for a Vice Chancellor for Legal and Executive Affairs,

University of Wisconsin-Hadison, be approved.

Regent Weinstein asked if this position would set a precedent for creating vice chancellor for legal affairs positions on other campuses.

Replying that he did not view it as a precedent, President Shaw added that the UW-Madison situation was unique in the complexity of legal issues, resulting in large part from the institution's extensive research mission.

Regent Flores questioned the appropriateness of having the vice chancellor for legal affairs report to the System General Counsel.

Regent Schilling explained that the reference to reporting related to communication and coordination on issues that might arise, rather than a supervisory relationship. In addition, the General Counsel would consult with a chancellor as to whether a lawyer should be employed and who should be selected. While it was not a relationship of direct control, it was an important authority of the General Counsel to make campus lawyers responsible for keeping him informed and coordinating with him.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5104 was adopted unanimously by the board.

Report of the Vice President for Business and Finance Report of the Vice President for Business and Finance Shargeback of Centralized Services to Auxiliaries, p. 36

Vice President Poellnitz noted that the Business and Finance Committee had been advised at the February meeting of the difficulty in arriving at a consensus policy on the chargeback of centralized services to auxiliaries. A revised policy had been reviewed by the chancellors, students and United Council, but more time was needed to arrive at a policy that all affected parties could accept. System Administration was to report to the committee in March 1989 on progress made toward resolving the outstanding issues and the timetable for completing the policy.

Budget - - > Lapse of Funds to the State, p. 36

Mr. Poellnitz advised the committee that the UW System lapsed \$4.3 million of GPR funding at the end of 1987-88. The major components of the lapsed balances included \$3 million for utilities and heating and \$1 million for fringe benefits. Unused funding for these two items must lapse in accordance with state regulations.

In discussion at the Board of Regents meeting, Regent Nikolay asked if there were likely to be extra dollars in the 1989-91 budget for fringe benefits.

President Shaw replied that there probably would be such extra funds. Fringe benefits were formula-driven, and it was not uncommon to lapse unused portions.

Regent Fish added that he would be reluctant to reduce those amounts in the budget because it would be difficult to obtain special funding for any shortage.

Current Reserves

The committee was informed that the UW System carried forward \$15.6 million in the program revenue portion of the GPO pool. Of this amount, \$13.6 million would be used to support 1988-89 institutional budgets, while \$.7 million would be used for future fiscal years. The systemwide reserve for revenue shortfall and other contingencies was \$1,356,000.

Rogert Meeting of December Meeting, p. 37

President Schilling noted that at the October meeting, the board voted to schedule a hearing on a dismissal recommendation from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 Noon on Thursday, December 8. In order to give the regents adequate time for consideration of the capital budget, he suggested that the hearing could be advanced to an earlier time. In October, it was decided to allow each party 30 minutes for oral argument, with time after that for the board to deliberate. If the hearing were to begin at 9:00 a.m., it could be concluded in time for the capital budget session to begin at 11:00 a.m. or earlier, depending on the amount of time needed for deliberation.

Regent Fish noted that the time set for the Physical Planning and Development Committee meeting was important since, under the open meeting law, the meeting could not start earlier than that time, but could start later. He suggested that an hour and 15 minutes be allowed for the hearing and deliberation, with the understanding that the session might take longer.

Regent Weinstein suggested that any agenda items not considered urgent should be deferred, so that there would be ample time for the capital budget and other matters which had to be considered in addition to the hearing.

Regent Schilling asked unanimous consent to schedule the hearing from 9:00 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. and to so advise the parties, with the understanding that the hearing would last as long as necessary. Unanimous consent was granted.

At 12:15 p.m., the following resolution, moved by Regent Lyon, and seconded by Regent Weinstein, was unanimously adopted on a roll call vote, with Regents Clusen, DeLong, Doughty Luckhardt, Fish, Flores, Gundersen, Hanson, Jarvis, Nikolay, Schilling and Weinstein voting "Aye" (11), and no regents voting "No."

BYLAWS

of the

BOARD OF REGENTS

of the

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

CHAPTER I

MEETINGS AND BUSINESS OF THE REGENTS

Annual Meetings

Section 1. The annual meetings of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System shall be held, unless otherwise specially ordered, on the Friday following the first Monday in June, at nine o'clock in the morning.

Regular Meetings

Section 2. Regular meetings of the Regents shall be held on the Friday following the first Monday in each month, at nine o'clock in the morning, unless otherwise specially ordered.

Special Meetings

Section 3. A special meeting of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin System may be called at any time, upon request of at least five members of the Board or by the President of the Board. The notice calling any special meeting of the Board shall normally be served by the Secretary on each member of the Board in writing, by depositing same in the post office or telegraph

office at Madison, or by personal service at least five days before the time of the meeting. Where, in the judgment of the President of the Board, following consultation with available members of the Executive Committee, it is determined that a special Board meeting is required with notification of less than five days, but not less than two days, such a meeting may be called provided the subject is limited, all available members of the Board are queried by phone or personal contact and two-thirds of those contacted agree. Unless the call of a special meeting is limited, it shall be valid to act on any subject within the power of the Board.

Place of Meetings

Section 4. All meetings of the Board shall be held in Madison, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

Quorum

Section 5. A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Parliamentary Rules and Order of Business

Section 6. General parliamentary rules as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, current edition, and as modified by rules and regulations of the Board shall be observed in conducting the business of the Board in session.

The order of business at all meetings shall be as follows:

- 1. Calling of the roll
- Reading of the minutes of the proceedings of the last meeting;amendment or approval of the same
- 3. Report of the President of the Board
- 4. Report of the President of the University System
- 5. Report of the Secretary
- 6. Reports of standing committees
- 7. Reports of special committees
- 8. Miscellaneous resolutions
- 9. Communications, petitions, and memorials
- 10. Unfinished and miscellaneous business

CHAPTER II

Officers of the Board and Their Duties

Section 1. The officers of the Board shall consist of a president, a vice president, a secretary, and such assistant secretaries as the Board from time to time shall determine, and a trust officer and such assistant trust officers as the Board from time to time shall determine.

Mode of Election

Section 2. The officers of the Board shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, and shall hold their respective offices for one year, beginning immediately upon election, and until their successors shall be elected and have qualified.

Duties of the President of the Board

Section 3. The President of the Board shall preside at all meetings, shall appoint the members of all standing and special committees of the Board, shall be an ex officio voting member of all committees, and shall discharge the ordinary duties of such officer in the pursuance of parliamentary law. The President of the Board shall, with the President of the University System, sign all diplomas and, with the Secretary countersigning, shall sign all contracts and instruments authorized or issued by authority of the Board, except such contracts and instruments as the Board or its Executive Committee may authorize any officer or employee of the University to sign. The President of the Board shall, with the President of the University of Wisconsin System, present budget requests to the Governor and the Legislature and shall act as spokesman for the Board before the Governor and before all legislative groups in matters of educational program planning, the use of existing facilities and personnel, budgetary problems, and building priorities.

Duties of the Vice President of the Board

Section 4. The Vice President of the Board shall be an ex officio voting member of all committees, and shall, in the absence of the President, perform all the duties of the President.

Duties of the President Pro Tem

Section 5. In the absence of the President and the Vice President the Board may appoint a president pro tem, who shall perform the duties of presiding officer of the Board.

Duties of the Secretary

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to give at least ten days' notice of the regular meetings of the Board, to keep a record of the proceedings of the Board at their several meetings, to keep a separate record of the proceedings of the Executive Committee, and a record of the proceedings of each of the standing committees, whensoever requested thereto by the Chairman; to keep the corporate seal and by countersigning execute with the President of the Board instruments and contracts ordered by the Board; and to preserve all documents pertaining to his or her office. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as are imposed on him or her by law and the rules and orders of the Board.

The Secretary shall, as soon as practicable after the record of proceedings of meetings has been perfected, transmit, by mail, to each regent a copy of the record of the meetings of the Board, and of the committees thereof. The Secretary shall maintain an up-to-date codification of all policy actions of the Board as referred to in Section 1. of Chapter V of the Bylaws.

Assistant Secretaries

Section 7. The Board shall, at the same time and in the same manner as it elects its Secretary, also elect such number of Assistant Secretaries as it shall deem necessary. The duties of the Assistant Secretaries shall be to assist the Secretary in the performance of his or her duties, and they shall perform such duties as may be assigned to them by the Secretary or the Board of Regents. In the absence of the Secretary, an Assistant Secretary shall act as and perform all the duties of the Secretary.

Trust Officer and Assistant Trust Officers

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the Trust Officer to receive, manage, and maintain records of all trust funds of the University of Wisconsin System and to perform such other duties relating to trust funds as are imposed upon him or her by law and the rules and orders of the Board or the Business and Finance Committee of the Board. The Assistant Trust Officers shall assist the Trust Officer in the performance of his or her duties and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Trust Officer, the Board or the Business and Finance Committee of the Board.

CHAPTER III

Committees of the Board

- Section 1. There shall be $\underline{\text{five}}$ four standing committees of the Board of Regents as follows:
 - (1) Education Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Committee.
 - (2) Business and Finance Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Committee.
 - (3) Physical Planning and Development Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Committee.
 - (4) Executive Committee consisting of the President of the Board, who shall serve as Chairman, the Vice President of the Board, the Chairman of the Education Committee, the Chairman of the Business and Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Physical Planning and Development

Committee, the member of the Board who shall have most recently been the President of the Board and one other member of the Board appointed by the President of the Board. In the event that there shall be no member of the Board who shall have previously been President of the Board, such position on the Executive Committee shall be filled by a member of the Board appointed by the President of the Board.

(5) Personnel Matters Review Committee consisting of at least three members appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members. The President shall designate the Chairman of the Committee.

Special Regent committees may be created from time to time as necessity demands by an affirmative majority vote of the Board, and the President shall appoint the members thereto and the Chairman thereof. A Special Regent Committee shall not be created for any matter which is properly before any of the standing committees.

Meetings of the committees may be called by the Chairman, or by the Secretary of the Board upon the request of two members, or upon the request of the President of the University System.

Duties of the Education Committee

Section 2. The Education Committee shall have charge of consideration of all matters of an educational nature related to the instruction, research, and public service functions of the University, the academic personnel, and to student services and welfare. The Chairman of the Education Committee may create one or more subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Education Committee and shall appoint the subcommittee members and the chairman from among those members of the Board serving on the Education Committee.

Duties of the Business and Finance Committee

Section 3. The Business and Finance Committee shall have charge of

consideration of all matters related to operating budget, finances, trust

funds, business operations, and to non-academic personnel.

Authority is delegated to the Business and Finance Committee to hire investment counsel, subject to Board approval, and to give discretionary authority to investment counsel in the purchase and sale of securities within guidelines determined by the Committee. The Chairman of the Business and Finance Committee may create one or more subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Business and Finance Committee and shall appoint the subcommittee members and the Chairman from among those members of the Board serving on the Business and Finance Committee.

Duties of the Physical Planning and Development Committee

Section 4. The Physical Planning and Development Committee shall have charge
of consideration of all matters related to the capital building program. This

includes approval of budgets, advance planning, concept and budget reports, funding and capital budget development policies, and authorization to bid and construct in connection with projects for new construction and improvements of \$30,000 or more; location of new buildings and improvements; facilities namings; gifts-in-kind of facilities; campus development and transportation plans; real estate transactions, including sale, purchase, exchange, lease, zoning, relocation costs, and condemnation; easements and land use permits; telecommunication system acquisitions; steam sale agreements; assessable improvements; and Wisconsin Environmental Policy Act implementation. The Chairman of the Physical Planning and Development Committee may create one or more subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Physical Planning and Development Committee and shall appoint the subcommittee members and the Chairman from among those members of the Board serving on the Physical Planning and Development Committee.

Duties of the Personnel Matters Review Committee

Section 6. The President of the Board may refer personnel matters involving requests for hearing, petitions for review, and appeals to the Board to the Personnel Matters Review Committee.

(1) Mandatory review. Where an opportunity to be heard, a review or an appeal to the Board is required by the Board's administrative rules, such as UWS 4.08, 5.14(3) or 11.10, Wisconsin Administrative Code, or under Board policies, the Committee may conduct the hearing, review or appeal. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. The Committee shall prepare recommended findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the full Board for final action.

- (2) Discretionary review. Where consideration of a matter by the Board is discretionary either under the Board's administrative rules, such as

 UWS 5.14(2), 6.01(5), 6.02, 11.07, or 12.05(8), Wisconsin Administrative Code, or under Board policies, or on any other basis, it shall first be determined whether the request for Board consideration should be granted. In making the determination, the following factors shall be considered:
 - (a) The case involves substantial constitutional claims;
 - (b) There is a serious concern that the chancellor has abused his/her discretion or exceeded his/her authority;
 - (c) The decision made at the institutional level could have systemwide implications; or
 - (d) The final institutional decision is based upon facts not supported by the record, resulting in material prejudice to the individual seeking review.
- (3) If the Board determines that a request for Board consideration should be granted, the Committee may conduct the review or hearing. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. Unless the request for review is withdrawn, the Committee shall prepare recommended findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the full Board for final action.

Duties of the Executive Committee

Section 5. The Executive Committee shall have the powers of the Board, when the Board is not in session, and shall provide for the execution of orders and resolutions not otherwise specially committed or provided for. A separate record of the proceedings of this Committee shall be kept by the Secretary, and the same shall be submitted to the Board for inclusion in the record at the next regular or special meeting.

CHAPTER IV

Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be added to or amended at any meeting of the Board by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the Board provided, however, that proposed amendments shall be specifically set forth in the notice of such meeting.

Suspension of Bylaws

Section 2. The Bylaws or any of them may be suspended at any meeting by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the total members of the Board and not otherwise.

CHAPTER V

SYSTEM ADMINISTRATION

President of the University of Wisconsin System Section 1. The President of the University of Wisconsin System has full executive responsibility for the operation and management of the System. He or she shall carry out the duties prescribed in Wisconsin Statutes for this office, and such other duties as may be assigned by the Board or be implicit in policy actions of the Board. The President of the System shall see to the appropriate staffing of System administrative offices, and direct and coordinate the activities of these offices as needed to fulfill his or her responsibilities. All items to be brought before the Board of Regents for action, except matters which come to the Board pursuant to its administrative rules or existing policies and those initiating in the Board itself, should reach the Board through the President of the University of Wisconsin System and carry his or her recommendation. If an item arises at or is related to an institution, the President shall ensure that it has first been through the established institution governance process and carries the Chancellor's recommendation; if it has not been through the institution governance process, the President shall request that it be so considered by the institution. On appeals of matters which have been through the institution governance process, the President shall verify that all institution procedures have been exhausted and will then determine whether, in the President's judgment, the Board of Regents should consider the matter. A decision by the President that the matter should not be considered by the Board can be appealed directly to the President of the Board. If the President of the Board determines that the matter should not be considered by the Board, any member of the Board may request that the matter be considered by the Board. A request that an item be considered by the Board which comes from other than the President or any

member of the Board must be in writing. Persons making such requests shall be advised in writing of determinations by the President of the System and President of the Board regarding their requests. Failure by the President of the System or the President of the Board to act on a written request that an item be considered by the Board within sixty days of its receipt shall be deemed a denial of the request.

Vice Presidents

Section 2. The President shall, with the approval of the Board, establish such vice presidential offices as may be necessary to provide administrative direction and coordination for the several major functions of System administration as these are defined by the President and the Board. The President shall assign such responsibilities to each of the vice presidents as may best promote effective administration of the responsibilities of his or her office, and shall, with the approval of the Board, title each vice presidential office in the way best suited to designate its major area of concern.

Staff Services to the Board of Regents

Section 3. The President shall, with the approval of the Board, designate a vice president as principal staff officer for each of the standing committees of the Board, or in the event of the unavailability of an appropriate vice president, an associate vice president or other major administrative officer to perform this function. The persons so designated shall provide to the committee such materials and papers as may be required for the agenda of the committee, and be prepared to respond to such other requests for information or interpretation as the committee or its members may require.
