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MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING of the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

Milwaukee, Wisconsin

Held in Room E245 West, Union Building, UW-Milwaukee Friday, December 5, 1975 9:07 A.M.

President McNamara presiding

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Erdman, Fish, Gerrard, Hales, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, Thompson, Walter, Williams, and Zancanaro.

ABSENT: None.

Upon motion by Regent Neshek, seconded by Regent Pelisek, it was VOTED, that the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on October 24, 1975, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President McNamara called upon Regent Hales to present the proposed change in the By-Laws. Regent Hales noted that the proposed amendment was considered necessary by the Business and Finance Committee to give it more flexibility in dealing with investment counsel and give an opportunity to pursue a more efficient investment procedure.

Regent Hales moved that Chapter III, Committees of the Board, Section 3., Duties of the Business and Finance Committee of the By-Laws of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System be amended to add the following sentence after the first sentence of the Section quoted above:

Authority is delegated to the Business and Finance Committee to hire investment counsel and to give discretionary authority to investment counsel in the purchase and sale of securities within guidelines determined by the Committee.

Regent Pelisek stated that he had no difficulty with the granting of authority to the investment counsel because he felt the exercise of the discretion of the investment counsel might well be better than the exercise of discretion by the Committee, because the Committee members are not professionals in the sale and purchase of securities and making investment determination, but that the issue of who hires the investment counsel ought to remain with the full Board, because the full Board remains liable and responsible for those positions. With the approval of the maker of the motion and the seconder of the motion, the resolution was amended to insert the phrase "subject to Board approval" after the word "counsel" in the second line of the proposed amendment.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he was in agreement with the amendment and agreeable with the suggestion that the Committee supervising the investment of trust funds is a responsibility which he felt any member of the Committee would like to share with as many members of the Board as possible, but noted that the amendment does not provide that the Business and Finance Committee is definitely committed to do anything, but is authorized to do it.

The question was put on the amendment to the By-Laws and it was voted unanimously.

President McNamara reported on the joint meeting between the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Minnesota Board held in Minneapolis on November 21-22, 1975. He reported among the items discussed was the development of close relationships between the University of Wisconsin-Superior and the University of Minnesota-Duluth; the matter of student reciprocity whereby a Wisconsin student can go to a Minnesota university, or a Minnesota student can go to the University of Wisconsin without paying out-of-state tuition; the problems as they relate to collective bargaining; and a very thorough discussion of the matter of veterinary medicine and the need for a great many more veterinarians in the United States. He noted that this is especially important to Wisconsin because in terms of cattle population we are the third largest in the Union, surpassed only by Texas and Florida. He continued that presently we are permitted to enroll seventeen students each year in Minnesota veterinary colleges. He continued that pressures are so great on their facilities, not only from their own residents, but from surrounding states, that it may be impossible to avail ourselves of this option in the future. He stated there is a nationwide need for veterinary medicine education, and the two boards adopted a sense of the meeting resolution relating thereto. He pointed out that it was not a binding resolution, but the subject matter was so important that it seemed worthy of formal action this morning.

Regent Solberg moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1109: That the Board of Regents of the University of Wiscons in System endorse the concept of the formation of a coalition of those states involved in animal agriculture for purposes of documenting:

- 1. the urgent need for expansion of facilities of Veterinary Colleges, and the development as needed of new facilities.
- 2. fiscal difficulties of the states to provide for such expansion and development.
- 3. the need for federal fiscal assistance;

and direct the administrative staff to take appropriate action.

Regent DeBardeleben stated this subject received very extensive consideration by the Board, the administration, and various faculty groups sometime ago. He recalled at that time the Board approved the concept of a school of veterinary medicine in Wisconsin for transmittal to the Legislature on the assumption that the University of Wisconsin System would be provided with adequate funding in relation to its other budgetary requests before this matter would be considered. He continued that all of a sudden this seems to have been transformed into a subject of much higher priority than that resolution indicated. He stated that he believed there are many areas in which public higher education ought to be seeking assistance from the federal government and that we ought to be getting federal assistance in general areas for institutional support. He questioned what staff input there has been into this proposed resolution and what faculty input there has been into the priority that our participation in such a coalition ought to have. He continued that if we are really serious about making representations to the federal government, there are a lot of things that ought to be considered before we give very much priority to this kind of request.

President McNamara noted that the shortage of veterinarians is so acute that it has a potential impact on our food supply and that the resolution does not take away any of our other priorities, it simply expresses an urgent need with respect to a very fundamental national priority.

Regent DeBardeleben stated it is debatable whether this is the proper thrust in meeting the world food problems. He stated there are a whole lot of questions here and we have no staff or faculty input, and while it can be said that we are not giving up any priorities, the fact is that this is the only recommendation going forward at this time.

The question was put on Resolution 1109, and it was voted, with Regents DeBardeleben and Walter voting "No".

President McNamara noted that Regent Lavine recently received an Honorary Doctorate Degree from Emerson College and offered the collective congratulations of the Board to Regent Lavine.

Regent Williams made the following statement:

"I wish to announce that I am resigning from the Board in January in order to take the position of Executive Secretary to Chancellor Lee Dreyfus. Since I may not be present at your January meeting, I wanted to say goodbye in person.

"As I look back on it, it seems that much of my life has been involved with eduation in one form or another--student, undergraduate student, advisor to students, member of two Boards of Regents, graduate student, teacher, and now, to complete the cycle, an administrator. Not bad for a girl who never went to kindergarten.

"In the future when I experience the heat of administrative implementation, I may miss this cool detachment of policy making. However, when one has been an observer for ten years, there is a certain itch to get right into it. The fact that this rather odd reverse is happening does indicate that there are people who are optimistic and positive about higher education in Wisconsin.

"I want to thank all of you for teaching me everything I know. It is people like you--students, faculty, administrators, fellow Board members, citizens of Wisconsin--and others who are not here today--some of them, John Thompson, James Albertson, Bill McIntyre, Bob Pierce, and Gene McPhee --who have given me the confidence to try something new.

"It will be an adjustment to start saying to Chancellor Dreyfus 'Yes, sir, you're right, Boss', but it will be a challenge, and I am looking forward to it."

President McNamara stated that we note Regent Williams' resignation with regret and with a sense of loss of a valuable colleague, but we are very happy that she will be a part of our University System and may be a chastening influence on the Chancellor at Stevens Point. He commented that he hoped she would not appear at future meetings in a red vest, and wished her well. President Weaver, in behalf of the University Administration, commented that she will be greatly missed in the capacity in which she had been serving because she had made many significant contributions toward putting merger together.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1110: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT A, on file)

Senior Vice President Percy stated that the next resolution calls for a hearing on what is the final step of the melding of the two administrative codes of the System.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1111: That the Secretary of the Board be directed to file a notice of hearing with the Revisor of Statutes for inclusion in the next Wisconsin Administrative Register to consider the repeal of Chapters WSC 1 through 4, Chapter SU 5 and Chapter UW 1, Wisconsin Administrative Code, and to consider the adoption of Chapter UWS 18, Wisconsin Administrative Code, relating to conduct on lands owned or under the control of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, said hearing to be held in Room 1820 Van Hise Hall, 1220 Linden Drive, in the City of Madison, Wisconsin, on the 5th day of February, 1976, at 11:00 A.M.; and that copies of the proposed rules be provided at this time to the Chairpersons of the Senate and Assembly Education Committees pursuant to s. 227.018(2), Wis. Stats.

At the request of President Weaver, Senior Vice President Percy gave status reports on 2+2 planning, 1976-77 Annual Budget Development and Mandated Study Reports. Vice President Percy stated that we received two items during December for consideration and discussion in January — a report on performance progress for the Center System growing out of the Scope study, and a perspective on 2+2 planning required to be completed by February, a progress report on the four year planning and budgeting. He noted he hoped to bring to the Board another of our series of Annual Budget Policy Papers, this one confirming the budget planning allocations objectives, and campus proposed and negotiated enrollment targets. In May he reported the Board will be receiving the Auxiliary Budget and in June the General Operating Budget for 1976-77. He noted there is also an activity going forward with an interim legislative study committee on program and salary differences.

President Weaver reported that about a year ago he had been invited by the Indian Government to come to that country for a two week period to consult with the Indian leadership of education and the leadership of a number of Indian universities about higher education results in that country, and that it had been decided the latter part of December would be the best opportunity for him to go.

The report of President Weaver on four years of merged operation for the public universities of the state and five years of his having been Chief Executive of the System is attached as $\underline{\text{EXHIBIT}}$ \underline{B} .

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been a forty-minute presentation by Professors Harris and Yarbrough of the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay of team teaching, giving a typical introductory lesson in the UW-Green Bay graduate course, Coastal Zone Management.

Regent Lavine reported in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been informational reports on System activities relating to academic affairs as follows:

- (1) System Personnel Workshop: Senior Vice President Donald Smith commented briefly about the workshop held October 30-31, 1975, stating that it had been an unusually well-received in-service session. He gave particular credit for the workshop's success to Dave Stewart of the Central Administration Academic Affairs staff. A summary of the topics discussed has been prepared for use by System and campus groups.
- (2) Twin Ports Advisory Task Force: Vice President Smith reported on the recent Open Hearing held in Duluth. Regents have previously received the three basic documents which were the subjects of the open hearing. Dr. Smith stated that most of the testimony at the hearing came from UM-Duluth faculty; UW-Superior faculty also appeared. He said no members of the general public spoke. The possibilities of merger or confederation were not supported at the hearing. There was considerable enthusiasm for voluntary cooperation within the Lake Superior Association of Colleges and Universities. He observed that the hearing accentuated the need for more discussion within faculties pointed toward models of activities that reduce barriers to cooperation rather than activities that increase barriers. Regent Sandin serves on that Task Force, and there will be a presentation shortly after the first of the year.

- (3) <u>Telecommunications and Media Study Group</u>: Vice President Donald Smith reported that the Task Force has been organized and has begun its work. Senior Academic Planner Richard Greiner, in the Academic Affairs office, is liaison to the Task Force.
- (4) Social Work Undergraduate Program Accreditation: Associate Vice President Robert Polk reported that the UW-Eau Claire baccalaureate program in Social Work has been accredited by the national accrediting association for social work programs. On behalf of the Committee, the Chairman and the Central Staff complimented Chancellor Haas on his accreditation and asked that he extend that compliment to his staff and faculty.
- (5) Announcement of Undergraduate Teaching Awards: Karen Merritt, Central Administration Academic Planner, and chairperson of the undergradute teaching improvement grants committee, announced the 14 grants approved for funding in 1976-77. They were selected from 79 proposals submitted by faculty throughout the System. The 79, in turn, had survived reviews from well over 110 proposals submitted to and evaluated by institution review committees. Dr. Merritt stressed the large number of proposals that were multi-institution, multi-faculty, and multi-discipline in nature.
- (6) General Administrative Policy Paper on Designation/Administration of Interinstitutional Facilities and Service Centers: Vice President Donald Smith spoke briefly regarding the increase in proposals for instructional development representing work between and among institutions and the development of products for interinstitutional sharing. He stated that principles are being developed under which the management of such activities is to be delegated to particular institutions or consortia of institutions. Such institutions and consortia would thus assume Systemwide responsibilities and the Systemwide responsibilities would be appropriately reflected in institutional budgets. In other words, they would come from Systemwide funds, not institutional funds. Dr. Smith further stated the expectation that by the end of the year ideas for the reconceptualization of open education in Wisconsin through the use of Systemwide facilities could be brought to the Board of Regents.
- (7) Committee on Cooperation with Developing Universities: Assistant Vice President Allen Slagle presented an update of the extensive report of CCDU activities brought to the Board in October 1974. The principal change during the last year has been the replacement of annual Office of Education grants to the developing universities by 3-5 year terminal grants. Three of the developing universities being assisted by the UW System (Texas Southern University, North Carolina A & T State University, and North Carolina Central University) have received the terminal grants in amounts ranging from \$2,000,000 to \$2,900,000 to be used over a period extending through 1977-78. Dr. Slagle noted that, because of the terminal nature of the grants, the UW System CCDU committee is studying possible redefinition of its role since the present relationships with the developing universities presumably will terminate with the expiration of the present terminal grants. In October 1974 representatives of developing universities held a meeting in Madison and met with the Board and were introduced at that time.

Regent Lavine reported that the Report on Ethnic/Racial Minority Students in the University of Wisconsin System (Analysis Paper #7.2) had been deferred to the January meeting in order to include the 1975 data on the enrollment of minority students and to make some editorial changes. He also announced the creation of a joint sub-committee consisting of members of the Business and Finance and Education Committee, which will hold a public hearing on the subject of how things have been going with respect to ethnic/racial minority students during the last four years and what the future direction should be. Regent Lavine stated that he would serve as chairman at the hearings with Regent Hales as Co-Chairman. It is hoped that the work of the hearings can be concluded by early Spring, with an appropriate report being made to the Board with decisions being made for inclusion in the 1977-79 biennial budget.

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Associate Vice President Adolph Wilburn reviewed the memorandum from Vice President Smith transmitting to the Education Committee the report of the Task Force on American Ethnic Studies. Dr. Wilburn then introduced Professor Nason Hall, Associate Dean of the College of Letters and Science, UW-Milwaukee, and Chairman of the System Task Force on American Ethnic Studies. Professor Hall discussed the criteria for determining when proposals for establishing academic programs for American Ethnic Studies are both feasible and desirable. The Task Force recommended that a minimum module of at least twelve courses dealing with the cultures of history and social experience in the United States of American Ethnic groups should exist in every degree granting unit and that the minimum module should be available to each student.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin and it was voted:

Resolution 1112: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the Board of Regents receives the Report of the Task Force on American Ethnic Studies, and expresses its commendation and thanks for the Task Force for providing an important service to the UW System.

The Board further notes and endorses the Task Force recommendation J to Central Administration "that a UW Standing Committee on American Ethnic Studies be established."

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day during the discussion of the status report on campus implementation of 36.09(5) Wisconsin Stats. (student participation) Vice President Smith noted that the Center System have adopted and forwarded to Central Administration its report on student-faculty committee structure and the Regents will be furnished a report on the Center System action. He reported Dr. Smith stated his belief that the development of campus plans to implement the student

section of the merger law had gone exceptionally well. He stated Michael DeLonay, United Council of Student Governments, stated that while students on most campuses feel that progress has been made, he felt there was less than overwhelming enthusiasm on all campuses.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of Resolution 1113, relating to the implementation of 36.09(5), (attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>C</u>), the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted.

Regent Lavine reported that in the committee meeting on the previous day there had been an informational report on suggestion for amendments and comments on student disciplinary guidelines. He pointed out these suggestions are now being analyzed and that prior to the January meeting the Regents will receive an amended document incorporating the amendments that have been accepted and showing the disposition of all rejected recommendations. Regent Lavine noted that there would be a meeting of the Education Committee at 10:00 A.M., January 8, 1976, in the Clarke Smith Room, to discuss student disciplinary guidelines, and expressed the hope that all Regents who have an interest will be present at that meeting.

That, upon recommendation of the President of the

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Thompson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1114:

UW System, the Board of Regents approves the report of the Multiple Model Pre-School Program prepared by the faculty of UW-Milwaukee in response to s. 36.25(16) and direct that the report be forwarded to the Joint Committee on Finance in compliance with s. 36.25(16) by February 1, 1976, including the names of the school districts or non-profit, non-sectarian agencies designated as sites for the project yet to be determined and which will be reported to the

Board at its January meeting.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1115: (Policy-Revised)

That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the attached document entitled, "Regents' Policy Concerning Retirement/Maximum Age for Employment: Faculty, Academic Staff, and Limited Appointments," dated November 19, 1975, be approved. (EXHIBIT D)

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

- Resolution 1116: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, a Systemwide study of the following two policy questions be undertaken:
 - 1. Should a policy change be made to extend the provision concerning retirement now applicable in former Chapter 36 institutions to all institutions of the System, or to extend the provisions now applicable in former Chapter 37 institutions to all institutions of the System? The former Chapter 36 provision is as follows:

"The Regents, however, reserve the right to terminate or modify the appointment of any such individual between the ages of 65 and 70 when such actions seem to them desirable, following consultation by the administration with the University Committee or similar faculty governing body."

2. Should consideration be given to moving the age for mandatory retirement from age 70 to age 65 or alternative approaches to the retirement system?

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolutions relating to appointments to the University of Wisconsin-Madison Named Professorships, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and they were voted:

- Resolution 1117: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Dr. Howard E. Thompson, Professor, School of Business, UW-Madison, be changed to the Mary Rennebohm Professor of Business, School of Business, UW-Madison, effective immediately, without change in salary.
- Resolution 1118: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Dr. Sung-Feng Wen, Associate Professor, Department of Medicine, Medical School, UW-Madison, be changed to the Oscar Rennebohm Professor of Medicine, Medical School, UW-Madison, effective immediately, without change in salary.
- Resolution 1119: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Dr. Jon Udell, Professor, School of Business, UW-Madison be changed to the Irwin Maier Chair of Business, School of Business, UW-Madison, effective immediately, without change in salary.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

Regent Hales noted that all Regents were invited to attend the Committee meeting on the previous day to consider the first two items on the agenda, the 1976 Legislative Annual Review Proposal and the 1976-77 Annual Budget Policy Paper AB #1.0, Discretionary portion of Faculty/academic staff salary increases. He noted that there had been some technical changes in DINs 2 and 3.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1120: That Decision Items 1, 2 and 3 (as amended) set forth in the 1976 Legislative Annual Review Proposal, (Copy on file) be submitted to the Governor and the Department of Administration as the UW System's top priority needs for Legislative Annual Review consideration.

That the supplemental list of special program priorities outlined in Section IV be attached to the UW System submission for consideration should funding beyond that necessary for Decision Items 1-3 (as amended) be available.

Regent Hales noted that the second topic considered with all Regents present at the Committee meeting related to faculty and academic staff discretionary salary funds. He noted that the 1976-77 Annual Budget Policy Paper AB #1.0 was developed to examine the recent University System policies and practices in the distribution of discretionary salary funds to individual faculty and academic staff members, within the constraints established by State policy and salary authorizations. He stated the key issue was to determine to what extent, if any, the discretionary portion of state appropriations for unclassified salary adjustments can be distributed, at the institution's option, on an across the board basis rather than in recognition of individual performance and service. He stated action by this Board now will allow sufficient time for appropriate institutional governance processes in the preparation of the 1976-77 operating budget.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

(Policy)

Resolution 1121: That 1976-77 Annual Budger Policy Paper AB #1.0 dated November 21, 1975 (copy on file with papers of the meeting) be approved as policy guidance to Central Administration and the Institutions for preparation of the 1976-77 Annual Operating Budget.

Regent Hales reported that the late Dr. William S. Middleton, Emeritus Professor of Medicine at the University of Wisconsin, had bequeathed his medical library and grandfather clock to the Middleton Medical Library, and upon the death of his wife, the campus is to receive \$10,000 for use in the Middleton Medical Library.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1122:

That the bequests of the late Dr. William S. Middleton, Madison, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Dr. William S. Middleton, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for these bequests, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of these bequests to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales reported that the late Henry A. Raemisch, of Middleton, Wisconsin, bequeathed \$1,000 to be added to the Vic Burgalow Scholarship Fund, which was approved by the Regents on May 21, 1971, for an annual scholarship for a senior in the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Thompson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1123:

That the bequest of the late Henry A. Raemisch, of Middleton, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Henry A. Raemisch, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales reported that the late Katharine G. Watson, of Rossville, Illinois, bequeathed \$5,000 to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, to be used for the University's general purposes.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1124:

That the bequest of the late Katharine G. Watson, of Rossville, Illinois to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Katharine G. Watson, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Thompson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1125: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants, and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Regent Hales reported the next item discussed in the Committee meeting was the 1976-77 Annual Budget Policy Paper #3.0 - Special Course Fees. He noted the purpose of this paper is to examine current practices in the assessment of special course fees for degree credit instruction within the System, to identify the major issues and concerns raised by these practices, to discuss several alternatives to the current practice and to recommend for adoption by the Board of one of the alternative policies. He pointed out several issues require further consideration, including whether there should be special course fees within the System, the rationale or basis upon which special course fees might be authorized, and how equitable treatment of students vis-a-vis special course fees can be established within the System. He stated, for essentially the same instructional offerings, some campuses charge special course fees, while others do not and, in fairness to students, this practice should be discontinued.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1126: That 1976-77 Annual Budget Policy Paper AB #3.0 dated December 4, 1975 be approved as policy guidance to Central Administration and the Institutions for preparation of the 1976-77 Annual Operating Budget.

Chancellor Lindner, UW-LaCrosse, stated that unless there is new money to support what is presently done with these fees, there will be a serious problem in implementing it in the 1976-77 budget. Vice President Percy noted that money to replace the general course fees will be made a part of the budget. He also noted that the task force working on the matter had discussed the subject for six months and that all Chancellors have had an opportunity to have input in the matter.

Regent Lavine stated that it was his understanding that all students in their tuition will be paying an additional amount that will cover the amount that would have come from the special course fees, and that it will not have to come out of the institutional budget.

Vice President Percy stated that was correct, that the institutions will receive a budget supplement for 1976-77 through this policy in place of the special course fees. Regent DeBardeleben noted that it had been announced yesterday that the increased fee would amount to approximately \$1.25 per student.

The question was put on Resolution 1126, and it was voted.

Regent Hales stated that Mandated Study Report #4 on Extension Continuing Education Fees is in conformance with the legislative enactment that the University of Wisconsin System shall provide to the Governor and Legislature a study done in both the equity of present continuing education fees and the feasibility of further standardization of the continuing education fee schedule.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1127: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Mandated Study Report #4--Continuing Education Fees--be approved for forwarding to the Governor and the Joint Committee on Finance and that a copy of the study be placed on file with the records of the December 5, 1975, meeting.

Regent Hales reported the Committee received a report concerning the investment of excess balances in the System accounts. The Administration reported they will bring forth a proposal for procedural changes in this area at a future meeting, and indicated there may be a possibility that some legislative authorization may be necessary to carry this out.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1128 relative to easement for street purposes (EXHIBIT E, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 1129: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Physics-Pharmacy-Astronomy Building on the UW-Madison campus be named Thomas C. Chamberlin Hall.

Regent Fish reported consideration of the Family Practice Clinic, Waukesha, UW-Madison had been postponed by the Committee.

Regent Fish reported the Committee reviewed the planning and design of Maintenance - Stores Buildings - at UW-Oshkosh, Green Bay and River Falls. He reported that upon invitation, Paul Brown, Director of the Bureau of Facilities Management, came before the Committee to discuss a variety of procedures, specifically the use of contingency fees, general obligation bonding, residual bonding authority, building trust funds, program surplus, architectural fees, project management and supervision fees. There was also discussion of the "turnkey" approach to building construction. Regent Fish noted that legislation in Wisconsin now makes that possible, but it has not yet been used. He reported Mr. Brown and his Department have entered into discussion with some contractors for a better evaluation of the specific buildings at Oshkosh, Green Bay, and River Falls, in order to answer some of the questions raised by the Board.

Regent Fish reviewed the history of the sale of land to the Indianhead VTAE District, noting that the land they wanted would have resulted in some additional funding. The Governor's Office had indicated the desire to work out some kind of a compromise to utilize some of the University of Wisconsin land by the VTAE and the community for parking lots, libraries, and student center facilities. He pointed out it is obvious that the loser in this could be the University of Wisconsin-Superior, because it is developed land that we have. On the other hand the VTAE District is not all that enthusiastic about the project either, but in an effort to be responsive to what is obviously a gubernatorial wish and legislative desire, at the last meeting he recommended, and this Board approved formation of a committee consisting of the President of this Board and the President of the VTAE Board. Regent Fish stated he recommended to the Governor's Office and the Department of Administration that all parties involved try to work out some kind of a reasonable compromise that would keep all the parties sullen, but not rebellious. He stated we are surrendering a four acre parking lot for which we are

being compensated. The area where the VTAE desires to build is on a twelve acre plot immediately south of the Physical Education Building of the UW-Superior. He reported the Committee came to the conclusion to sell them the south six acres, but the local VTAE Indianhead District came back with the counterproposal that they would take the south nine acres. The Committee came up with another compromise to sell them the south six acres with an option on three additional acres. He noted the resolution provided for the "need for expansion to be determined by the joint UW-Superior/Indianhead VTAE Committee", which means that the joint committee is going to have to determine that indeed the necessity for those three acres exists for the VTAE District. He stated this was reluctantly agreed to by the Superior Campus. Regent Fish commended Chancellor Meyer for his willingness to deal in this particular area because obviously this is not a plus for his campus, but an effort to resolve a difficult situation.

Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1130 relating to land sale to Indianhead VTAE District, UW-Superior (attached as EXHIBIT F), the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted.

Regent Fish reported the Committee next considered the Report on Capital Budget Requests for the 1976-77 Annual Budget Review Session. Items discussed included additional funding for Maintenance-Stores Building at UW-Green Bay, Oshkosh, and River Falls. He recalled that earlier discussion was to cut back to get two of the structures constructed, which the Committee found to be distasteful because the three items were all considered as equally important and all relatively in the same level on the priority list. He stated we are attempting to get all three of them built. He stated the Committee next considered funding for the Downer Complex at UW-Milwaukee, and that it is being held up because the entire Downer Complex needs evaluation. Regent Fish reported the Committee next discussed funds for the Vocational Rehabilitation facilities at UW-Stout, and construction projects to maximize our buildings to conserve energy. He stated that after discussion it was recommended that consideration of these requests be delayed until the 1977-79 biennial capital budget request is developed, but that the resolution of the planning and designing of the maintenance - storage buildings may generate a request at an earlier date, as soon as responsive answers are obtained to bring before the Board.

Regent Fish stated that the next resolution relating to Fieldhouse Update - UW-Madison, will enable the project to maintain the timetable needed to plan, bid and complete construction by November 1976. He recalled that previously the Board of Regents on a majority, but not unanimous vote agreed to use GPR funding for the Fieldhouse modernization and that the request was turned down by the Legislature. Subsequently the Board, by a majority, but not unanimous vote, approved the utilization of program moneys from the Athletic Department for the project.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro:

Resolution 1131: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the preparation of working drawings for the UW-Madison Fielahouse Update Project be authorized with funding to be provided from program revenues.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that we are saying we want to go ahead with the project, and under the present restraints we may have to do it with money from athletic receipts, but there are certain forces that are trying to turn this around to get GPR money.

The question was put on Resolution 1131, and it was voted, with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, and Lavine voting "No".

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MEDICAL AFFAIRS

The report of the Special Committee on Medical Affairs was presented by Regent Pelisek.

Regent Pelisek reported the Committee announced the acceptance of the University of Wisconsin-Madison Center for Health Sciences as an affiliate member in the Medical Center of Southeastern Wisconsin. He noted the UW-Milwaukee is already a community member and that both will be active participating members within their respective categories. He stated that all matters had been worked out to the mutual satisfaction of the Medical College of Wisconsin, the University of Wisconsin Center for Health Sciences, and the Medical Center of Southeastern Wisconsin.

Regent Pelisek reported in the Committee meeting on the previous day there was consideration of Mandated Study Report #2: Medical Student Financial Aids. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

He reported the recommendations in the report had been modified to some extent from those initially distributed, particularly recommendation number two, relative to the repayment of loans, which has been substantially modified to eliminate any specificity as to the extension period for repayment. This was done after presentation of an initial draft of this mandated study report to the HEAB staff and the receipt of their comments and recommendations on the subject. He also noted that recommendation number four has been modified to conform to the actual text of the recommendation itself.

Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman:

Resolution 1132: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Mandated Study Report #2--Medical Student Financial Aid--with recommendations as amended (EXHIBIT G, attached) be approved for forwarding to the Joint Committee on Finance and that a copy of the study be placed on file with the records of the December 5, 1975, meeting.

Regent Lavine inquired if, when this comes before HEAB, there are any problems with disagreements between the HEAB staff and the University. Regent Pelisek responded in the negative.

The question was put on Resolution 1132, and it was voted.

The meeting adjourned at 11:02 A.M.

(Agreement signed by the Chancellor.)

- C. A Memorandum of Understanding between Northeast Wisconsin In-School Telecommunications (NEWIST) and UW Green Bay has been signed. In consideration of one annual payment of \$6,800, UW Green Bay will furnish NEWIST office and storage space in the Instructional Services Building suitable to conduct in-school television functions.
- D. A Wildlife Inventory Agreement has been signed between the State Department of Natural Resources and the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for support of wildlife inventory projects in the Department of Wildlife Ecology, UW Madison, during the period October 15, 1975 to December 1, 1975 to evaluate wildlife harvests. RETROSPECT AND PROSPECT REVISITED PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-MILWAUKEE DECEMBER 5, 1975

MR. PRESIDENT, THIS MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS
BRINGS TO A CONCLUSION FOUR YEARS OF MERGED OPERATION FOR
THE PUBLIC UNIVERSITIES OF THIS STATE. IF YOU WOULD PERMIT
ME SIMULTANEOUSLY A PERSONAL WORD, IT ALSO COMPLETES FIVE
YEARS FOR ME AS THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER, FIRST OF THE
UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN AND THEN OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN
SYSTEM. WHILE I WILL NOT TRY YOUR PATIENCE WITH PRETENTIOUS
OR ELABORATE REMARKS IN CONNECTION WITH THESE ANNIVERSARIES,
PERHAPS YOU WOULD INDULGE ME IN A FEW MOMENTS OF REFLECTION,
ASSESSMENT AND FORECAST.

MANY OF YOU WILL REMEMBER THE MORNING OF MAY 11, 1973, IN PLATTEVILLE. ON THAT OCCASION, I AND THE TWO SENIOR VICE PRESIDENTS SUBJECTED YOU TO A LENGTHY DISQUISITION WHICH WE ENTITLED, "RETROSPECT AND PROSPECT; A SENSE OF DIRECTION."

THOSE WERE STILL EARLY AND TENTATIVE DAYS FOR MERGER. WE WERE LESS THAN A YEAR PAST THE DEVELOPMENT OF OUR FIRST MERGED BIENNIAL BUDGET. WE WERE EMBARKED UPON A GENERALLY UNCHARTED SEA; WE FACED MANY HAZARDOUS UNKNOWNS.

I VENTURED AN OPENING OBSERVATION ON THAT OCCASION THAT BEFORE WE COULD TALK MEANINGFULLY ABOUT WHERE WE WERE OR WERE NOT GOING, WE HAD FIRST TO DETERMINE WHERE WE WERE AND WHAT WE THOUGHT SHOULD BE OUR DESTINATION. THE VICE PRESIDENTS AND I WENT ON TO DETAIL OUR COMPASS READINGS AND OUR SENSE OF THE COURSES TO FOLLOW AS WE AT THAT MOMENT SAW THEM. I WOULD VENTURE THE ASSERTION THAT WE HAD LAUNCHED A GOOD FLEET; I WOULD ALSO CONCEDE THAT IT HAS BEEN A LONG SEA ROAD FROM PLATTEVILLE TO TODAY.

FROM OUR PRESENT POSITION WE CAN NOW SEE MANY THINGS THAT LAY BEYOND THE HORIZON OF TWO AND A HALF YEARS AGO, AND WHILE AN INFINITE NUMBER OF REALITIES STILL LIE BEYOND THAT EVER RECEEDING HORIZON, SURELY WE NOW DO HAVE A BETTER SENSE OF OUR DIRECTION AND THE CAPABILITY OF OUR SHIPS. ON MANY OCCASIONS ALONG OUR WAY WE HAVE BEEN STORM TOSSED AND WEARY, BUT I AM CONVINCED THAT MANY OF THE ADVERSITIES WE HAVE ENCOUNTERED HAVE IN FACT, SERVED TO FORGE AN IMPRESSIVE ARRAY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENT.

IT HAS BEEN REASSURING IN RECENT MONTHS TO HAVE SCHOLAR OBSERVERS OF MODERN AMERICAN HIGHER EDUCATION AND ITS ORGANIZATIONAL ARRANGEMENTS SPEAK WITH GENEROSITY ABOUT US. PERHAPS IN BEING SO CLOSELY INVOLVED FOR SO LONG IN OUR PERPLEXITIES, WE HAVE TENDED AMONG OURSELVES TO OVEREMPHASIZE THE NEGATIVE AND UNDERPLAY THE POSITIVE. IF I MAY, FOR THE PERSPECTIVE IT CAN GIVE US, LET ME SUGGEST, QUITE SIMPLY, SOME OF THE CLEAR ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN WHICH I THINK THIS BOARD CAN TAKE JUSTIFIABLE SATISFACTION.

- 1. First, and generally taken for granted, if not completely overlooked, we have, as a team, made merger work. We have done so in the face of often unprecedented sensitivities, obstacles and constraints. This success is based on uncommon levels of cooperation and sacrifice on the part of many individuals among our faculties, our staff, our student bodies and of this Board itself.
- 2. SECONDLY, WE HAVE COMPLETED THE NOT INCONSIDERABLE TASK OF MISSION DEFINITION AND REDEFINITION FOR ALL OF THE COMPONENT PARTS OF OUR COMPLEX SYSTEM.
- 3. Third, we have now concluded the massive task of comprehensive academic audit for no less than 319 masters degree programs; we have set in motion campus based reviews of 137 doctoral programs and 643 undergraduate majors. I know of no other state or higher educational system that has undertaken anything like so comprehensive or basic a review of its academic offerings.
- 4. FOURTH, WE HAVE COMPLETED SYSTEMWIDE TASK FORCE STUDIES COVERING SUCH A MASSIVE RANGE OF ENDEAVORS AS AGRICULTURE, HEALTH SCIENCES, ENGINEERING AND TECHNOLOGY, VETERINARY MEDICINE, BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION, LEGAL EDUCATION, CRIMINAL JUSTICE, COMPUTING SERVICES AND WOMEN'S AND ETHNIC STUDIES. BASED UPON THESE EFFORTS, WE ARE, AS A STATE FOR THE FIRST TIME, IN A POSITION TO BRING RATIONAL ACADEMIC PLANNING TO BEAR ON ALL OF THESE

PROFESSIONAL AREAS.

- 5. FIFTH, THERE HAS BEEN DEVELOPED, YOU HAVE APPROVED AND WE ARE NOW IMPLEMENTING, THE FIRST TRULY COORDINATED PLAN FOR University outreach in Wisconsin. Given reasonable financial resources in the years ahead, I believe we have assured a continuation of our traditional leadership in this rapidly expanding field of need in the state where the "Wisconsin Idea" was born.
- 6. SIXTH, WE HAVE BEEN SUCCESSFUL IN ESTABLISHING MUTUALLY PRODUCTIVE ACCOMMODATIONS IN PROGRAMING AND PLANNING WITH THE VOCATIONAL, TECHNICAL AND ADULT EDUCATION SYSTEM. I BELIEVE WE HAVE ACCOMPLISHED MORE IN THIS ARENA OF VOLUNTARY COOPERATION THAN IN ALL OF THE YEARS THAT PRECEEDED MERGER.
- 7. SEVENTH, WE HAVE WEATHERED THE PAINFUL BUT NECESSARY DECLARATION OF STATES OF "FISCAL EMERGENCY" ON FIVE CAMPUSES, AND HAVE COPED AS COMPASSIONATELY AS CIRCUMSTANCES MADE POSSIBLE WITH THE COMPLEX AND AGONIZING PROBLEMS OF FACULTY LAYOFF, RETRENCHMENT AND REASSIGNMENT. ALL OF THIS HAS BEEN DONE WITH FAR FEWER LEGAL DIFFICULTIES AND PERSONAL HARDSHIPS THAN HAVE BEEN EXPERIENCED IN OTHER STATES.
- 8. EIGHTH, WE HAVE SUCCESSFULLY DEVELOPED SYSTEMWIDE BUDGET PLANNING AND INFORMATION CAPABILITIES, WHICH ARE NOW BEING WIDELY COPIED IN WHOLE OR IN PART BY OTHER UNIVERSITIES AND SYSTEMS, BOTH IN THE UNITED STATES AND ABROAD.

- 9. NINTH, WE HAVE FINE TUNED OUR RESOURCE ALLOCATION TECHNIQUES AND UNDERTAKEN BASE REALLOCATIONS THAT HAVE NOT ALWAYS BEEN LACKING IN TRAUMA OR UNIFORMLY APPLAUDED, BUT HAVE, I THINK TIME BEGINS TO TELL US, OPERATED TO SUSTAIN QUALITY AND VITALITY DURING A PERIOD WHEN OUR RESOURCES HAVE BEEN AT BEST IN A STEADY, AND OFTEN IN A DECLINING STATE.
- 10. Tenth, our individual institutions have been given both latitude and encouragement in their ongoing planning processes in order that they might as effectively as possible cope simultaneously with fiscal realities and the achievement of diversification in program emphasis.
- 11. ELEVENTH, THERE HAVE BEEN BROUGHT INTO BEING A GROWING NUMBER OF INTERINSTITUTIONAL AND REGIONAL CONSORTIA AIMED AT IMPROVED SERVICE TO REGIONAL NEEDS. AT THE SAME TIME THESE ORGANIZATIONAL ARRANGEMENTS HAVE BROUGHT REDUCTIONS IN UNNECESSARY DUPLICATION OF EFFORT AND UNDERUTILIZED SERVICES.
- 12. Twelfth, we have initiated a major program of academic support services and financial aids for minority and disadvantaged students at all academic and professional levels.

- 13. THIRTEENTH, BEYOND ALL OF THIS, CONSIDER THE FACT THAT WE HAVE ESTABLISHED SYSTEMWIDE PERSONNEL POLICIES FOR FACULTY AND ACADEMIC STAFF; HAVE INSTITUTED A SYSTEMWIDE AFFIRMATIVE ACTION AND EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES PROGRAM; AND ACHIEVED MAJOR ENERGY CONSERVATION GAINS.
- `14. FOURTEENTH, EVEN THOUGH HEAVILY BELEAGURED BY

 RETRENCHMENT PERHAPS PARTIALLY IN RESPONSE TO RETRENCHMENT -
 A NUMBER OF INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS HAVE BEEN INSTITUTED, INCLUDING:
 - (A) AN EXPERIMENTAL MODULAR CALENDAR SYSTEM REPLACING
 THE TRADITIONAL SEMESTER OR QUARTER LOCK STEP AT
 THE OSHKOSH CAMPUS;
 - (B) A REFINEMENT AND REFOCUSING OF THE DISTINCTIVE SPECIAL MISSIONS AT STOUT AND GREEN BAY;
 - (c) The establishment of an undergraduate teaching improvement grant program, funded, I take some pride in reminding you, by the elimination of administrative positions in System Administration.
 - (D) THE LAUNCHING OF EXPERIMENTAL AND PILOT PROGRAMS
 FOR EXTERNAL DEGREES;
 - (E) THE CREATION OF PILOT INTEGRATED CAMPUS PROGRAMS WITH VTAE AT RICE LAKE AND FOND DU LAC:
 - (F) THE FOUNDING OF AFFIRMATIVE ACTION INTERNSHIP

 AND CONFERENCE PROGRAMS FOR WOMEN AND FOR MINORITY

 GROUPS;

- (G) THE INNOVATIVE DEVELOPMENT, AND HOPED FOR

 ACCEPTANCE BY THE STATE, OF A FOUR-YEAR ACADEMIC

 PLANNING AND BUDGETING CONCEPT;
- (H) THE INSTIGATION OF A COMPLETELY NEW APPROACH -A COMPOSITE SUPPORT INDEX -- TO ASSESSING THE
 RELATIVE SUPPORT CAPACITY OF EACH UNIVERSITY -THE TARGETED CAPACITY FUNDING CONCEPT -- WHICH HAS
 NOW BEEN ADOPTED IN A VARIETY OF OTHER STATES.

IN SUCH MAINNER, MR. PRESIDENT, THE TALLY COULD EASILY BE EXTENDED. IN AN EFFORT TO EMPHASIZE THE POSITIVE, WHICH I THINK ON OCCASION WE DO NEED TO DO, I DO NOT WANT TO GIVE THE APPEARANCE OF PRIDEFUL BOASTING NOR OF INAPPROPRIATE SELF-SATISFACTION. I WOULD ONLY WISH TO STRENGTHEN OUR SPIRITS WITH THE REALIZATION THAT FOR ALL OF OUR TRAVAIL, WE CAN, BY GLANCING BACK OVER THE LONG REACHES OF RECENT EXPERIENCE, DISCERN THAT WE HAVE BEEN MARCHING FORWARD. INDEED, AS I OBSERVE AMERICAN HIGHER EDUCATION MOVING INTO THE FINAL QUARTER OF THE TWENTIETH CENTURY, I THINK WE CAN WITH JUSTICE SAY THAT MUCH OF WHAT THE NEAR FUTURE HOLDS FOR PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION IN OTHER STATES HAS ALREADY BEEN OUR PAST AND OUR PRESENT. OBVIOUSLY, WE HAVE OUR OWN TANGLED ARRAY OF APPARENT OBSTACLES TO SURMOUNT, BUT WE DO UNDENIABLY HOLD A NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED LEADERSHIP ROLE IN HAVING TAKEN EARLY HOLD ON THE PROBLEMS THAT WILL BE WIDELY CHARACTERISTIC OF THE YEARS AHEAD.

As I scan the horizon beyond us, I do see two major ranges looming ahead which we will have to climb. Unmistakably, one of these is the design and process of collective bargaining. The crossing of this range will bring many potentials for basic change – extremely fundamental change – in the traditional life of our academic family. Our long-standing ways have been ones in which faculty has been active in governance and administrators have been active faculty members. Speaking both as a teaching faculty member and as an administrative officer, I express the cherished hope that the collegiality which I believe has made us great will not be lost in newly formulated and, perhaps, more rigid — possibly even adversary — relationships. Much of this concern has been sensitively addressed in the Regent proposed collective bargaining model.

ALSO ON THAT NEAR HORIZON LOOMS A MAJOR CLUSTER OF PEAKS THAT REPRESENT FOR HIGHER EDUCATION HERE AND ELSEWHERE, THE LONG SIGNIFICANT, BUT NEWLY ACCUTE, PROBLEMS OF MATCHING THE MAINTENANCE OF TEACHING QUALITY WITH THE SUSTAINING OF FULL ACCESS TO LEARNING. IF PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION IS TO ACHIEVE ITS FINAL DESTINY, WE MUST NOT LOSE OUR WAY AMONG THESE MOUNTAINS.

MR. PRESIDENT, I HAD A MOST GRACIOUS LETTER THE OTHER DAY FROM DR. LYMAN GLENNY, FORMERLY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE ILLINOIS BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND NOW PROFESSOR AND HEAD OF THE CENTER FOR RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT IN HIGHER EDUCATION AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA. IN SPEAKING OF OUR UNIVERSITY PROBLEMS IN WISCONSIN, THIS WIDELY-KNOWN NATIONAL AUTHORITY ON HIGHER EDUCATIONAL AFFAIRS SAID TO ME: "YOU ARE SO MUCH BETTER OFF THAN...OTHER INSTITUTIONAL PRESIDENTS IN THE QUALITY OF YOUR (...) STAFF, ... I DON'T KNOW OF A SINGLE NATIONAL INSTITUTION IN THE COUNTRY THAT HAS BETTER. WITH THE KIND OF INTERNAL PLANNING YOU HAVE ALREADY DONE, I AM SURE THAT YOU WILL BE ABLE TO (COPE WITH YOUR PROBLEMS)". I TAKE THE LIBERTY, IN CONCLUDING, OF QUOTING THIS LETTER BECAUSE THE STATEMENT IS SO VERY TRUE. I SAY TO YOU, AS REGENTS, THAT THERE HAS BEEN GREAT PROGRESS MADE AND THAT WE HAVE REASON TO GIVE BOTH COMPLIMENT AND SUPPORT TO MY SYSTEM STAFF, TO THE CHANCELLORS AND TO OUR FACULTIES FOR UNCOMMONLY SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENT IN THE ONGOING DEVELOPMENT, EVEN IN TIMES OF RETRENCHMENT, OF A QUALITY STATEWIDE SYSTEM OF PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Resolution 1113: (Policy-Revised)

That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the Board of Regents receives the progress report of the steps taken on the campuses to implement Section 36.09(5) under the Interim Guidelines for implementation established by the Regents.

The Board notes that implementation of Section 36.09(5) in accordance with the Interim Guidelines has proceeded effectively and commends the faculty, administration, and students of the several Institutions for the development of student participation in governance. The Board further notes that plans at all Institutions are in operation in the ways envisioned with particularity in the Regents' Interim Guidelines; that plans in nine Institutions have been fully established through approved campus policies and procedures; that plans in the remaining Institutions await only final approval actions and the resolution of isolated issues of representation and authority.

Given these circumstances, the Board at this time, and in accordance with the principles set forth in the Interim Guidelines, delegates continuing responsibility for the implementation of Section 36.09(5), Wis. Stats., to the Chancellors in consultation with the faculty and students of their Institutions. This delegation is subject to the following stipulations:

- 1. That those Institutions whose final implementation plans have not been fully established in campus policies and procedures shall forward such plans to the Office of Academic Affairs when final action has been taken, and that the Office of Academic Affairs shall review the plans for conformity to the principles established in the Interim Guidelines.
- 2. That in the event an irreconcilable difference of opinion develops at any Institution, between or among student organizations, the faculty, and the chancellor, over the question of whether or not a particular campus policy or procedure meets the letter and spirit of Section 36.09(5), then any of the contending parties may request through the President's Office that the Regents review the dispute and take such action as may be appropriate to its resolution. The request for review should be made in writing, and should include the evidence and reasoning upon which the request for review is made. Upon receiving such a request through the President, the Board shall determine whether or not to provide a review.

Regents' Policy Concerning Retirement/Maximum Age for Employment: Faculty, Academic Staff, and Limited Appointments

I. Former Chapter 36 Campuses

For a member of the faculty, as defined in s. 10A.02, Laws and Regulations of the University of Wisconsin; or for a member of the academic staff, as defined in s. UWS 1.01, Wis. Adm. Code, holding an indefinite appointment, who is employed at a former University of Wisconsin campus on or after November 1, 1975, retirement shall be automatic at the end of the fiscal year during which the faculty member or academic staff member holding an indefinite appointment reaches his/her 70th birthday. The Regents, however, reserve the right to terminate or modify the appointment of any such individual between the ages of 65 and 70 when such actions seem to them desirable, following consultation by the administration with the University Committee or similar faculty governing body.

II. Former Chapter 37 Campuses

For a person who started employment at a former Wisconsin State Universities campus or the Board office as a "teacher," as defined in s. 37.31(1)(c), Wis. Stats. (1971), on or before July 8, 1974, and has been so employed continuously since; or at a former Wisconsin State Universities campus as a member of the "faculty," as defined in s. UWS 1.04, Wis. Adm. Code, on or after July 9, 1974; or at a former Wisconsin State Universities campus as a member of the academic staff, as defined in s. UWS 1.01, Wis. Adm. Code, under an indefinite appointment on or after November 1, 1975, retirement shall be automatic on June 30, immediately following such person's 70th birthday.

III. Employment Eligibility of Fixed Term Academic Staff

A member of the academic staff, as defined in s. UWS 1.01, Wis. Adm. Code, employed at an institution in the University of Wisconsin System under a fixed term appointment shall be eligible to be employed under fixed term appointments until June 30 following the academic staff member's 70th birthday.

IV. Major Administrative Positions

For faculty and academic staff members serving in major administrative posts at the position of dean or director, or higher, the administrative responsibilities shall be terminated on June 30 following the 65th birthday. The chancellors and president may recommend exceptions for continuation of administrative responsibilities on a year-to-year basis. The termination of the administrative responsibilities of an individual does not preclude the possibility of that person serving in some other capacity until mandatory retirement.

V. Early Retirement Agreements

A. Faculty

Each chancellor or his/her designee may enter into agreements with faculty members who elect to retire early and wish to continue on the faculty at less than half time as adjunct or collateral faculty at the pre-retirement rank. Such agreements shall specify the position to be held, the length of the agreement (not to exceed the mandatory retirement date), the percentage of time, fringe benefit coverages, procedures governing performance evaluation, discipline and dismissal, and a guarantee of academic freedom.

B. Academic Staff

Each chancellor or his/her designee may enter into agreements with academic staff members holding indefinite appointments who elect to retire early and wish to continue on the academic staff at less than half time at the pre-retirement rank. Such agreements shall specify the position to be held, the length of the agreement (not to exceed the mandatory retirement date), the percentage of time, fringe benefit coverages, procedures governing performance evaluation, discipline and dismissal, and, where appropriate, shall affirm the person's right to perform duties in accordance with appropriate professional codes of ethics.

PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE:

Resolution 1128:

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to execute a limited highway easement to the City of Madison for the right-of-way needed for street improvements to be undertaken along Old Sauk Road, City of Madison, Wisconsin. The UW-Madison campus will receive \$3,700 from the City of Madison for this property.

The legal description of the easement is as follows:

Part of the Southeast 1/4 of the Southeast 1/4 of Section 13, Town 7 North, Range 8 East, City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, more fully described as follows:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the North line of Old Sauk Road, as presently located and the East line of said Section 13; thence North along the East line of said Section 13 to the point of intersection with a line that is parallel to and 43.00 feet North of, measured at right angles to, the South line of said Section 13; thence West, 358.00 feet, along a line that is parallel to and 43.00 North of, measured at right angles to, the South line of said Section 13; thence Southwesterly to a point on the North line of Old Sauk Road; thence Easterly 408.00 feet along the said North line of Old Sauk Road to the point of beginning.

EXHIBIT E

PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE:

Resolution:

That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the President of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, in accordance with Resolution 1107 (10/24/75), transfer of title to two parcels of land from the UW-Superior campus to the Wisconsin Indianhead Vocational, Technical and Adult Education District be authorized. This land is to be used as sites for construction and operation of an area VTAE educational facility. The two parcels are generally described as follow:

Parcel 1

Six (6) acres of the physical education fields at UW-Superior, bounded by 21st Street, East Boundary Avenue and Catlin Avenue.

Parcel 2

The parking lot located north of the Gates gymnasium fronting on East Boundary Avenue and encompassing approximately four (4) acres of land.

A legal description of the two parcels, based on an engineering survey, is to be included in the executed deed.

The transfer of title is subject to the following conditions:

- (1) That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System provide a five-year option, renewable for five years, for three additional acres when needed for building expansion, with the need for expansion to be determined by the joint UW-Superior/Indianhead VTAE committee. This land is located immediately north of Parcel 1 and is bounded by East Boundary Avenue and Catlin Avenue.
 - (2) That upon transfer of the title of the six (6) acres to the Indianhead VTAE District, the District would provide \$37,000 for replacement facilities. The cost of the three additional acres included in the option to be established at a reasonable replacement cost for the land only.
 - (3) A joint UW-Superior/Indianhead VTAE committee to be established at the time of sale in order to allow both parties to be appropriately informed of the planning and development of facility and site, to carry on the negotiations contained herein, and to carry out implementation of joint program and facilities sharing.

EXHIBIT F

- (4) That upon transfer of title to the parking lot, the District would provide \$101,800 for replacement parking facilities. This transfer is based upon entering into an agreement between the Regents and the Indianhead VTAE District allowing the UW-Superior students and staff with parking permits to use the lot on a first come, first served basis. In addition, the parking lot will be available to patrons of public events at UW-Superior (such as football and basketball games), on weekends and after 4:30 p.m. on weekdays. The agreement should further provide that the UW-Superior will provide services as may be agreed upon by the joint committee.
- (5) That either the District or the daytime students would be required to pay UW-Superior the same student union fee required for UW-Superior full-time or part-time students. In addition to this basic fee, each VTAE student desiring food service would have meal service plans available. In return, the student and program activities would be served on the same basis as UW-Superior students and programs are served by the Rothwell Student Center, subject to negotiations alluded to in #3 above and #10 below.
- (6) That any excess dirt available from the site would be distributed at the University's option on a campus area designated by UW-Superior or at other areas agreed upon by the Indianhead VTAE Board.
- (7) That the UW-Superior would allow the VTAE System to connect to the Superior campus steam and electrical distribution systems. The Indianhead VTAE District billings for heat and electrical service would be based on actual operating costs. Method of determining operating cost shall be submitted to the Joint Committee for review and approval.
- (8) That UW-Superior would provide four reasonably contiguous classrooms located as close as possible to the Indianhead VTAE building site on a leased, annual operating cost basis. Method of determining operating cost shall be submitted to the Joint Committee for review and approval.
- (9) That UW-Superior would provide access to library, educational and service facilities and the Indianhead VTAE District would provide comparable access to its facilities based on an agreement to be negotiated by the Joint Committee provided herein.
- (10) That other services offered to students by UW-Superior such as student health services, children's center, and student activity programs be subject to negotiation and agreement between UW-Superior and the local VTAE District.

MANDATED STUDY REPORT #2 - MEDICAL STUDENT FINANCIAL AID

RECOMMENDATIONS AS AMENDED

1. The State of Wisconsin increase the amount that medical students may borrow under the Wisconsin State Loan Program from the current maximum of \$2,500 per year to \$3,000 per year in 1975-76 and to \$5,000 per year by 1977-78.

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2. The repayment term for the Wisconsin State Loan for medical students be extended beyond ten years and that repayment schedules be adopted that would better match repayments with the physician's future earnings.

The guidelines for determining the repayment schedule should recognize the period of residency (post M.D.) education when earnings would be severely taxed by principal repayments followed by a rapid growth in earning power. A number of options may be indicated because of differences in debt load and earning power.

It is suggested that under one option the repayments in the postgraduate years be limited to interest only followed by a period of several years when interest repayments and small reductions in principal would occur followed by a final repayment period of years when repayment levels were sufficient to retire principal and interest. The number of necessary options would be expected to be small.

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3. Grants of up to \$3,000 for the first year of medical school and up to \$2,500 for the second year of medical school, based on demonstration of need, be made available for students from disadvantaged backgrounds. (The student would borrow to meet needs during years III and IV.)

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4. The State study the feasibility of establishing a loan forgiveness program for physicians who will practice in under-served areas in Wisconsin.

Upon motion by Regent Neshek, seconded by Regent Pelisek, it was VOTED, that the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on October 24, 1975, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

A. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

1. President McNamara called upon Regent Hales to present the proposed change in the By-Laws. Regent Hales noted that the proposed amendment was considered necessary by the Business and Finance Committee to give it more flexibility in dealing with investment counsel and give an opportunity to pursue a more efficient investment procedure.

Regent Hales moved that Chapter III, Committees of the Board, Section 3., Duties of the Business and Finance Committee of the By-Laws of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System be amended to add the following sentence after the first sentence of the Section guoted above:

Authority is delegated to the Business and Finance Committee to hire investment counsel and to give discretionary authority to investment counsel in the purchase and sale of securities within guidelines determined by the Committee.

Regent Pelisek stated that he had no difficulty with the granting of authority to the investment counsel because he felt the exercise of the discretion of the investment counsel might well be better than the exercise of discretion by the Committee, because the Committee members are not professionals in the sale and purchase of securities and making investment determination, but that the issue of who hires the investment counsel ought to remain with the full Board, because the full Board remains liable and responsible for those positions. With the approval of the maker of the motion and the seconder of the motion, the resolution was amended to insert the phrase "subject to Board approval" after the word "counsel" in the second line of the proposed amendment.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he was in agreement with the amendment and agreeable with the suggestion that the Committee supervising the investment of trust funds is a responsibility which he felt any member of the Committee would like to share with as many members of the Board as possible, but noted that the amendment does not provide that the Business and Finance Committee is definitely committed to do anything, but is authorized to do it.

The question was put on the amendment to the By-Laws and it was voted unanimously.

2. President McNamara reported on the Joint Meeting between the Boards of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Minnesota Board held in Minneapolis on November 21-22, 1975. President McNamara noted that among the items considered was the nationwide need for Veterinary Medicine education, and the members of the Boards present voted a sense of the meeting resolution relating thereto.

Regent Solberg moved adoption of the following resolution and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek:

Resolution 1109: That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System endorse the concept of the formation of a coalition of those states involved in animal agriculture for purposes of documenting:

- the urgent need for expansion of facilities of Veterinary Colleges, and the development as needed of new facilities.
- fiscal difficulties of the states to provide for such expansion and development.
- the need for federal fiscal assistance;

and direct the administrative staff to take appropriate action.

After a short discussion, the question was put on Resolution 1109 and it was voted, with Regents DeBardeleben and Walter voting "No".

- 3. Regent McNamara noted that Regent Lavine recently received an Honorary Doctorate Degree from Emerson College, and offered the collective congratulations of the Board to Regent Lavine.
- 4. Regent Williams announced that she was resigning from the Board in January in order to take the post of Executive Secretary to Chancellor Lee Dreyfus, UW-Stevens Point. Regent Williams' remarks will be found in the full minutes on file in each library.
- B. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM
- 1. Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:
- Resolution 1110: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT A, on file)
- 2. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:
- Resolution 1111: That the Secretary of the Board be directed to file a notice of hearing with the Revisor of Statutes for inclusion in the next Wisconsin Administrative Register to consider the repeal of Chapters WSC 1 through 4, Chapter SU 5 and Chapter UW 1, Wisconsin Administrative Code, and to consider the adoption of Chapter UWS 18, Wisconsin Administrative Code, relating to conduct on lands owned or under the control of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, said hearing to be held in Room 1820 Van Hise Hall, 1220 Linden Drive, in the City of Madison, Wisconsin, on the 5th day of February, 1976, at 11:00 A.M.; and that copies of the proposed rules be provided at this time to the Chairpersons of the Senate and Assembly Education Committees pursuant to s. 227.018(2), Wis. Stats.

- 3. At the request of President Weaver, Senior Vice President Percy gave status reports on 2+2 planning, 1976-77 Annual Budget Development and Mandated Study Reports. Vice President Percy stated that during December, for consideration and discussion in January, we received two items -- a report on performance progress for the Center System growing out of the scope study, and a perspective on 2+2 planning required to be completed by February, a progress report on the four year planning and budgeting. He noted he hoped to bring to the Board another of our series of Annual Budget Policy Papers, this one confirming the budget planning allocations objectives, and campus proposed and negotiated enrollment targets. In May he reported the Board will be receiving the Auxiliary Budget and in June the General Operating Budget for 1976-77. He noted there is also an activity going forward with an interim legislative study committee on program and salary differences.
- 4. President Weaver reported that about a year ago he had been invited by the Indian Government to come to that country for a two week period to consult with the Indian leadership of education and the leadership of a number of Indian universities about higher education results in that country, and that it had been decided the latter part of December would be the best opportunity for him to go.

The report of President Weaver on four years of merged operation for the public universities of the state and five years of his having been Chief Executive of the System will be found in the full minutes on file in each library.

C. REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

- 1. Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been a forty-minute presentation by Professors Harris and Yarbrough of the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay of team teaching, giving a typical introductory lesson in the UW-Green Bay graduate course, Coastal Zone Management.
- 2. Regent Lavine reported in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been informational reports on System activities relating to academic affairs as follows:

- (1) System Personnel Workshop, October 30-31, 1975.
- (2) Twin Ports Advisory Task Force Progress Report.
- (3) Telecommunications and Media Study Group.
- (4) Social Work Undergraduate Program Accreditation.
- (5) Announcement of Undergraduate Teaching Awards.
- (6) General Administrative Policy Paper on Designation/Administration of Interinstitutional Facilities and Service Centers.
- (7) Committee on Cooperation with Developing Universities.
- Regent Lavine reported that the Report on Ethnic/Racial Minority Students in the University of Wisconsin System (Analysis Paper #7.2) had been deferred to the January meeting in order to include the 1975 data on the enrollment of minority students and to make some editorial changes. He also announced the creation of a joint sub-committee consisting of members of the Business and Finance and Education Committee, which will hold a public hearing on the subject of how things have been going with respect to ethnic/racial minority students during the last four years and what the future direction should be.
- 4. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:
- Resolution 1112: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the Board of Regents receives the Report of the Task Force on American Ethnic Studies, and expresses its commendation and thanks for the Task Force for providing an important service to the UW System.

The Board further notes and endorses the Task Force recommendation J to Central Administration "that a UW Standing Committee on American Ethnic Studies be established."

- Regent Lavine moved adoption of Resolution 1113 relating to the implementation of 36.09(5), (attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> C), the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek and it was voted.
- Regent Lavine reported that in the committee meeting on the previous day there had been an informational report on suggestion for amendments and comments on student disciplinary guidelines. He pointed out these suggestions are now being analyzed and that prior to the January meeting the Regents will receive an amended document incorporating the amendments that have been accepted and showing the disposition of all rejected recommendations. Regent Lavine

noted that there would be a meeting of the Education Committee at 10:00 A.M., January 8, 1976, in the Clarke Smith Room, to discuss student disciplinary guidelines, and expressed the hope that all Regents who have an interest will be present at that meeting.

7. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Thompson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1114: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, the Board of Regents approves the report of the Multiple Model Pre-School Program prepared by the faculty of UW-Milwaukee in response to s. 36.25(16) and direct that the report be forwarded to the Joint Committee on Finance in compliance with s. 36.25(16) by February 1, 1976, including the names of the school districts or non-profit, non-sectarian agencies designated as sites for the project yet to be determined and which will be reported to the Board at its January meeting.

8. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1115: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW (Policy-Revised)

System, the attached document entitled, "Regents' Policy Concerning Retirement/Maximum Age for Employment: Faculty, Academic Staff, and Limited Appointments," dated November 19, 1975, be approved.

(EXHIBIT D)

9. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1116: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, a Systemwide study of the following two policy questions be undertaken:

1. Should a policy change be made to extend the provision concerning retirement now applicable in former Chapter 36 institutions to all institutions of the System, or to extend the provisions now applicable in former Chapter 37 institutions to all institutions of the System? The former Chapter 36 provision is as follows:

"The Regents, however, reserve the right to terminate or modify the appointment of any such individual between the ages of 65 and 70 when such actions seem to them desirable, following consultation by the administration with the University Committee or similar faculty governing body."

- 2. Should consideration be given to moving the age for mandatory retirement from age 70 to age 65 or alternative approaches to the retirement system?
- 10. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolutions relating to appointments to the University of Wisconsin-Madison Named Professorships, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and they were voted:
- Resolution 1117: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Dr. Howard E. Thompson, Professor, School of Business, UW-Madison, be changed to the Mary Rennebohm Professor of Business, School of Business, UW-Madison, effective immediately, without change in salary.
- Resolution 1118: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Dr. Sung-Feng Wen, Associate Professor, Department of Medicine, Medical School, UW-Madison, be changed to the Oscar Rennebohm Professor of Medicine, Medical School, UW-Madison, effective immediately, without change in salary.
- Resolution 1119: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the status of Dr. Jon Udell, Professor, School of Business, UW-Madison be changed to the Irwin Maier Chair of Business, School of Business, UW-Madison, effective immediately, without change in salary.

D. REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

1. Regent Hales noted that all Regents were invited to attend the Committee meeting on the previous day to consider the first two items on the agenda, the 1976 Legislative Annual Review Proposal and the 1976-77 Annual Budget Policy Paper AB #1.0, Discretionary portion of Faculty/academic staff salary increases. He noted that there had been some technical changes in DINs 2 and 3.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1120: That Decision Items 1, 2 and 3 (as amended) set forth in the 1976 Legislative Annual Review Proposal, (Copy on file) be submitted to the Governor and the Department of Administration as the UW System's top priority needs for Legislative Annual Review consideration.

That the supplemental list of special program priorities outlined in Section IV be attached to the UW System submission for consideration should funding beyond that necessary for Decision Items 1-3 (as amended) be available.

2. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1121: That 1976-77 Annual Budget Policy Paper AB #1.0 dated November 21, 1975 (copy on file with papers of the meeting) be approved as policy guidance to Central Administration and the Institutions for preparation of the 1976-77 Annual Operating Budget.

3. Regent Hales reported that the late Dr. William S. Middleton, Emeritus Professor of Medicine at the University of Wisconsin, had bequeathed his medical library and grandfather clock to the Middleton Medical Library, and upon the death of his wife, the campus is to receive \$10,000 for use in the Middleton Medical Library.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1122:

That the bequests of the late Dr. William S. Middleton, Madison, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Dr. William S. Middleton, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for these bequests, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of these bequests to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

4. Regent Hales reported that the late Henry A. Raemisch, of Middleton, Wisconsin, bequeathed \$1,000 to be added to the Vic Burcalow Scholarship Fund, which was approved by the Regents on May 21, 1971, for an annual scholarship for a senior in the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Thompson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1123:

That the bequest of the late Henry A. Raemisch, of Middleton, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Henry A. Raemisch, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

5. Regent Hales reported that the late Katharine G. Watson, of Rossville, Illinois, bequeathed \$5,000 to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, to be used for the University's general purposes.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1124:

That the bequest of the late Katharine G. Watson, of Rossville, Illinois to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Katharine G. Watson, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

- 6. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Thompson, and it was voted:
- Resolution 1125: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants, and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

7. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1126: That 1976-77 Annual Budget Policy Paper AB #3.0 dated December 4, 1975 be approved as policy guidance to Central Administration and the Institutions for preparation of the 1976-77 Annual Operating Budget.

Chancellor Lindner, UW-LaCrosse, stated that unless there is new money to support what is presently done with these fees, there will be a serious problem in implementing it in the 1976-77 budget. Vice President Percy noted that money to replace the general course fees will be made a part of the budget. He also noted that the task force working on the matter had discussed the subject for six months and that all Chancellors have had an opportunity to have input in the matter.

The question was put on Resolution 1126, and it was voted.

8. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1127: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Mandated Study Report #4--Continuing Education Fees--be approved for forwarding to the Governor and the Joint Committee on Finance and that a copy of the study be placed on file with the records of the December 5, 1975, meeting.

- 9. Regent Hales reported the Committee received a report concerning the investment of excess balances in the System accounts. The Administration reported they will bring forth a proposal for procedural changes in this area at a future meeting, and indicated there may be a possibility that some legislative authorization may be necessary to carry this out.
- E. REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

1. Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1128 relative to easement for street purposes ($\underline{\text{EXHIBIT}}$ $\underline{\text{E}}$, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted.

- 2. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:
- Resolution 1129: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Physics-Pharmacy-Astronomy Building on the UW-Madison campus be named Thomas C. Chamberlin Hall.
- 3. Regent Fish reported consideration of the Family Practice Clinic, Waukesha, UW-Madison had been postponed by the Committee.
- 4. Regent Fish reported the Committee reviewed the planning and design of Maintenance Stores Buildings at UW-Oshkosh, Green Bay and River Falls. He reported that upon invitation, Paul Brown, Director of the Bureau of Facilities Management, came before the Committee to discuss a variety of procedures, specifically the use of contingency fees, general obligation bonding, residual bonding authority, building trust funds, program surplus, architectural fees, project management and supervision fees. There was also discussion of the "turnkey" approach to building construction. Regent Fish noted that legislation in Wisconsin now makes that possible, but it has not yet been used. He reported Mr. Brown and his Department have entered into discussion with some contractors for a better evaluation of the specific buildings at Oshkosh, Green Bay, and River Falls, in order to answer some of the questions raised by the Board.
- 5. Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1130 relating to land sale to Indianhead VTAE District, UW-Superior (attached as EXHIBIT F), the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted.
- Regent Fish reported the Committee next considered the Report on Capital Budget Requests for the 1976-77 Annual Budget Review Session. Items discussed included additional funding for Maintenance-Stores Building at UW-Green Bay, Oshkosh, and River Falls. He recalled that earlier discussion was to cut back to get two of the structures constructed, which the Committee found to be distasteful because the three items were all considered as equally important and all relatively in the same level on the priority list. He stated we are attempting to get all three of them built. He stated the Committee next considered funding for the Downer Complex at UW-Milwaukee, and that it is being held up because the entire Downer Complex needs evaluation. Regent Fish reported the Committee next discussed funds for the Vocational Rehabilitation facilities at UW-Stout, and construction projects to maximize our buildings to conserve energy. He stated that after discussion it was recommended that consideration of these requests be delayed until the 1977-79 biennial capital budget request is developed, but that the resolution of the planning and designing of the maintenance - storage buildings may generate a request at an earlier date, as soon as responsive answers are obtained to bring before the Board.

Regent Fish stated that the next resolution relating to Fieldhouse Update - UW-Madison, will enable the project to maintain the timetable needed to plan, bid and complete construction by November 1976. He recalled that previously the Board of Regents on a majority, but not unanimous vote agreed to use GPR funding for the Fieldhouse modernization and that the request was turned down by the Legislature. Subsequently the Board, by a majority, but not unanimous vote, approved the utilization of program moneys from the Athletic Department for the project.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro:

Resolution 1131: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the preparation of working drawings for the UW-Madison Fieldhouse Update Project be authorized with funding to be provided from program revenues.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that we are saying we want to go ahead with the project, and under the present restraints we may have to do it with money from athletic receipts, but there are certain forces that are trying to turn this around to get GPR money.

The question was put on Resolution 1131, and it was voted, with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, and Lavine voting "No".

F. REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MEDICAL AFFAIRS

The report of the Special Committee on Medical Affairs was presented by Regent Pelisek.

- 1. Regent Pelisek reported the Committee announced the acceptance by the University of Wisconsin-Madison Center for Health Sciences of affiliate membership in the Medical Center of Southeastern Wisconsin. He noted the UW-Milwaukee is already a community member and that both will be active participating members within their respective categories. He stated that all matters had been worked out to the mutual satisfaction of the Medical College of Wisconsin, the University of Wisconsin Center for Health Sciences, and the Medical Center of Southeastern Wisconsin.
- 2. Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1132: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, Mandated Study Report #2--Medical Student Financial Aid--with recommendations as amended (EXHIBIT G, attached) be approved for forwarding to the Joint Committee on Finance and that a copy of the study be placed on file with the records of the December 5, 1975, meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 11:02 A.M.
