



Badgers Host Temple

Wisconsin (1-0) hosts Temple (0-1) on today at 80,321-seat Camp Randall Stadium (Field Turf). Kickoff is set for 11:10 a.m. CDT.

The game will be televised live by ESPN Regional (Wayne Larivee, John Congemi and Quint Kessenich). The game also can be heard live on the 45-city Wisconsin Radio Network (Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas). WIBA (1310 AM, 101.5 FM) is the rightsholder in Madison.

Wisconsin Public Television (Mike Heller and Scott Nelson) will air its tape-delay telecast of the game statewide at 10:30 p.m. tonight.

The Badgers opened the 2005 season last Saturday with a 56-42 victory at home over Bowling Green. The teams played to a 35-35 tie before Wisconsin took over in the second half. RB Brian Calhoun made his Badger debut by rushing for 258 yards and five TDs.

Temple, a Mid-American Conference affiliate member under the direction of head coach Bobby Wallace, opened its 2005 campaign with a 63-16 loss at Arizona State last Thursday. The Owls were outgained 559-265 (total offense), including a 300-62 yardage deficit on the ground.

UW-Temple Series Info

Wisconsin dropped its only meeting with Temple, 24-18, on Sept. 22, 1990 (head coach Barry Alvarez's

third game at Wisconsin) at Camp Randall Stadium ... Temple is currently an affiliate member of the Mid-American Conference ... Wisconsin assistant coach Jim Hueber, a Philadelphia native, was an assistant coach at Temple from 1981-82 ... six current Badgers hail from the Philadelphia area (Jerry Butler/Philadelphia, Jarmal Ruffin/Philadelphia, Brian Savage/Clifton Hts., Pa., LaMarr Watkins/Mt. Laurel, N.J., Dave Peck/Media, Pa., and Chris Pressley/Woodbury, N.J.) ... UW is 24-2 all-time vs. the Mid-American Conference. The last MAC opponent to defeat the Badgers was Western Michigan in the 1988 season opener.

Glad to be Here

Brian Calhoun was named Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week after his 43-carry, 258-yard, five-touchdown performance in the Badgers' win over Bowling Green last Saturday. A Wisconsin running back has been named the conference's offensive player of the week at least once in seven of the past eight seasons.

Calhoun's performance was the best debut ever for a Wisconsin running back. The previous best was Alan Thompson's 220-yard performance against Oklahoma

in 1969. Calhoun's previous single-game career highs (while he was playing at Colorado) were 24 carries vs. Kansas in 2003 and 137 yards vs. Nebraska in 2002.

Calhoun became the 12th player in school history to rush for at least 200 yards in a game. His five rushing touchdowns tied a school record previously set by Billy Marek (1974 vs. Minnesota) and Anthony Davis (2002 vs. Minnesota). Calhoun also tied the school record for points in a game, joining Marek, Davis and WR Lee Evans (five TD receptions vs. Michigan State in 2003).


Points Aplenty

Wisconsin and Bowling Green combined to score 98 points last Saturday, the most combined points in a Badger football game since Wisconsin (106) and UW-Whitewater (0) combined to score 106 points in 1890.

The Badgers' 56-point outburst against Bowling Green was its highest offensive output

since a 56-21 win over Michigan State on Nov. 15, 2003. The 56 points are tied for the seventh-most in school history and tied for third-most for the Badgers in a season-opener.

The 70 combined points scored by Wisconsin and Bowling Green in the first half were the most in a half in the Alvarez era. The previous high was on Oct. 20, 1990 when Wisconsin (28) and Northwestern (38) combined to score 66 points in the first half in Evanston, Ill.

UW's 35 points scored in the second quarter against Bowling Green were the most in a quarter for the Badgers in the Alvarez era. The previous high was 28 points in the second quarter at San Jose State on Sept. 13, 1997.

Two Are Better Than One

RBs Brian Calhoun (258) and Booker Stanley (103) each rushed for more than 100 yards vs. Bowling Green. The last time two Badgers eclipsed the century mark was on Nov. 23, 2002 when Anthony Davis (301) and Brooks Bollinger (112) did it against Minnesota.

One For the Books

Senior Brandon Williams' 85-yard kickoff return in the second quarter against Bowling Green was the longest of his career and allowed him to move past Nick Davis into first place on the UW's career kickoff return yardage list. Williams now has 1,818 career kick return yards.

A Little Bit of D

Wisconsin and Bowling Green played to a 35-35 halftime tie last Saturday as the Falcons ran up a 357-286 edge in total offense. The Badger defense, however, limited Bowling Green to just seven points and 174 yards in total offense in the second half.

Dating back to the 2004 season-opener, Badger opponents have been limited to fewer than 100 yards rushing in nine of 13 games (UW is 8-1 in those games). Bowling Green gained just 73 yards on the ground last Saturday.

been accomplished seven times previously.

◆ Wisconsin held a time-of-possession advantage of 33:19-26:41 over Bowling Green last Saturday. That included a 20:54-9:06 edge in the pivotal second half.

◆ Wisconsin's victory over Bowling Green last Saturday marked the first time in school history that the Badgers won a game in which they allowed at least 40 points. The UW's record in those situations prior to the Bowling Green game was 0-60.

◆ Following fall training camp, Wisconsin named its team captains for the 2005 season. They are senior DB Brett Bell, junior LB Mark Zalewski, senior OL Donovan Raiola and senior FB Matt Bernstein. Zalewski joins recent Badger standouts Brooks Bollinger (2001), Lee Evans (2002) and Jim Leonhard (2003) as a junior team captain.

◆ Last Saturday's season-opening crowd of 82,138 at Camp Randall Stadium was the fifth-largest in the history of the facility.


HEAD COACH BARRY ALVAREZ

Barry Alvarez, the winningest football coach in Wisconsin history, has completed 15 seasons at the head of the program he transformed from a perennial second-division finisher to one that is nationally respected and is a fixture on the postseason bowl scene.

Alvarez, whose overall record with the Badgers is 108-70-4, became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April of 2004. He is one of just two people (UAB's Watson Brown) at the Division I level who serves as head football coach and athletic director.

Alvarez's list of accomplishments at Wisconsin is remarkable. Consider just a few of the most notable ...

- winningest coach in school history
- coached three Big Ten and Rose Bowl champions
- only Big Ten coach ever to win the Rose Bowl in consecutive seasons
- just the 10th coach in Big Ten history with 100 victories at one conference institution
- has coached five national award winners, including Ron Dayne (Heisman, Doak Walker, Maxwell), Jamar Fletcher (Jim Thorpe) and Kevin Stemke (Ray Guy)
- guided UW to back-to-back Big Ten titles in 1998 and 1999 (hadn't happened at Wisconsin since 1896-97)
- bowl record of 7-3 (.700)
- coached the three winningest teams in school history



When Alvarez arrived in Madison in 1990, Wisconsin had compiled a 9-36 record during the previous four seasons and attendance at Camp Randall Stadium had dipped to an average of 41,734 per game (54 percent of capacity). The program sorely needed a boost and got it when new Director of Athletics Pat Richter hired Alvarez from Notre Dame, where he had been an assistant coach under Lou Holtz.

Alvarez's coaching career began at the high school level. He served as an assistant at Lincoln (Neb.) Northeast High from 1971-73 before taking over as head coach at Lexington (Neb.) High from 1974-75. His last prep coaching stop was at Mason City (Iowa) High where he was head coach from 1976-78 and where his team won a 4A state title in his final year.

Iowa's Hayden Fry hired Alvarez as an assistant coach in 1979. The Hawkeyes played in six bowl games (two Rose Bowls) during Alvarez's eight years in Iowa City, compiling a 61-33-1 mark in the process. Alvarez's standout player with the Hawkeyes was LB Larry Station, a two-time All-American and two-time Academic All-American.

Alvarez left Iowa after the 1986 season to become linebackers coach at Notre Dame. He was promoted (linebackers to defensive coordinator to assistant head coach) by Holtz each of his three seasons as the Fighting Irish went 32-5 and won the 1988 national title. While in South Bend, Alvarez coached All-America linebackers Michael Stonebreaker, Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett.

Alvarez grew up in Lavello, Pa., a small town among the coal mines and steel mills in western Pennsylvania. He starred as a prep linebacker and went on to play at Nebraska (1965-67) for leg-

endary head coach Bob Devaney. Alvarez was the leading tackler for the 1967 Cornhuskers, who led the nation in total defense and created a school-record 40 turnovers. Alvarez played in both the Sugar and Orange Bowls at Nebraska (the Cornhuskers were 25-7 during his three varsity seasons). Alvarez earned his bachelor's degree in 1969 and added a master's degree in 1971, both from Nebraska.

Alvarez's family includes his wife, Cindy, daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), son Chad (wife Stephanie), grandsons Joe and Jake Ferguson and Jackson Delzer, and granddaughter Grace Delzer.

- Alvarez set a goal to become a collegiate head coach by his 42nd birthday and was named to the Wisconsin post three days after he turned 42.
- Alvarez added administrative duties to his job description in 2000 when he was named Associate Athletic Director. He became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April 2004, operating in a dual role as football coach as well.
- Alvarez grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW-Madison's nationally acclaimed

dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.

- Alvarez, a big baseball fan, helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999.
- Alvarez was a finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award in 1999. He was one of 18 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and is the only one still at the school that hired him.
- Barry Alvarez got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship. One of the staffs of which Alvarez was a member featured six men who went on to lead their own college programs: Alvarez; Kirk Ferentz, Iowa; Dan McCarney, Iowa State; Del Miller,

Chancellor John D. Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968 to 1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany, as a recipient of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Teaching.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials, and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982 to 1986, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

From 1986 to 1989, Wiley served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering, with oversight responsibility for all aspects of graduate study, grant submission, agency liaison, research infrastructure and centers, and technology transfer. From 1989 to 1994, he was dean of the UW-Madison Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

Prior to his appointment to the university's top position, Wiley served as provost and vice chancellor for academ-

ic affairs, which carries the responsibility of chief operating officer and deputy chancellor. As provost, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley was named UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on January 1, 2001. As chancellor, he has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning. He also has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea—the belief that the boundaries of the campus are the boundaries of the state and beyond—and to build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the university so rich in accomplishment and tradition.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of the campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers. He also has mapped an east-side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area, with an expanded Elvehjem Museum of Art, new classroom buildings and additional music-performance space. Wiley believes that the arts and humanities are an integral component of the research enterprise.

"Nurturing an environment of creativity—encompassing industry, the arts and individual expression—is important for attracting and keeping these very mobile, highly sought, knowledge-based workers within our borders," Wiley says.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and to help build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

"The Wisconsin Idea offers a shared medium through which we can help the state achieve its maximum potential as a participant in a world economy that embraces learning and the advancement of knowledge as much as it does material production," he says.

Camp Randall Stadium has the look of a winner, with its updated fan-friendly atmosphere. The stadium is a source of Wisconsin pride, but it is our fans and their rich history of loyalty that makes any Badger sporting event a truly special occasion.

Our student-athletes are also winners – on and off the field. On the playing fields, we've had many victories and championships to celebrate. And in the classroom, 186 Badger athletes registered a grade-point average of better than 3.5. Nearly one-quarter of our student athletes were Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2004-05.

I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.

In addition, athletics offers the university another opportunity to connect with alumni and friends.

GREAT MOMENTS IN CAMP RANDALL HISTORY

Each week this season, Wisconsin will be celebrating the Greatest Moments in Camp Randall Stadium history as voted on by you, the fans. The winning memories will be depicted on commemorative six-packs of Coca-Cola bottles in stores around the state this fall. One memory will be spotlighted during each home game. This week, we remember Oct. 10, 1998 when the 12th-ranked Badgers defeated Drew Brees and Purdue with the help of an interception by Jamar Fletcher.

To help us look back on this great moment, we have reprinted an excerpt from "Tales From the Wisconsin Badgers," a new book written by UW Director of Athletic Communications Justin Doherty detailing some of the best stories from UW football history.

Badgers Brees by Purdue

Purdue broke the records and gained the yards. All Wisconsin got out of its 1998 game with the Boilermakers was a victory.

The Badgers, ranked 10th nationally in the coaches poll, were 5-0 overall and 2-0 in the Big Ten heading into their October 10 Homecoming game with Purdue. It was just the third night game in Camp Randall Stadium history, and the Badgers had lost both of the previous two. Wisconsin also brought the nation's No. 3 scoring and No. 5 total defense into the contest against the pass-happy Purdue offense directed by sophomore quarterback Drew Brees.

The Boilermakers (3-2 overall and 1-0 in conference play) entered the game averaging 317.2 passing yards per game (seventh in the nation), but no one could have predicted the kind of aerial assault they would throw at the Badgers that night.

Coca-Cola

Wisconsin took a 14-3 lead after the first quarter, thanks to touchdown runs of nine and 16 yards by quarterback Mike Samuel.

The Badgers had controlled Brees, allowing him to complete eight of 14 passes with an interception. They had no idea, however, that he would average 23 passing attempts per quarter the rest of the game.


Purdue's Travis Dorsch sandwiched second-quarter field goals of 44 and 45 yards around a 25-yard field goal by Wisconsin's Matt Davenport and a six-yard touchdown pass from Brees to Chris Daniels, and the teams went to halftime tied 17-17. Brees had completed 24 of 36 passes for 206 yards by the midway point of the game.

The Boilermakers opened the second half by marching 70 yards to the Wisconsin 10-yard line where they faced third-down and four. Brees was a remarkable eight-for-10 passing on the drive up to that point, but his 11th attempt was intercepted by Badger freshman cornerback Mike Echols. It would not be the last pick of the night by a Wisconsin rookie defensive back.

Later in the third quarter a penalty and a quarterback sack forced Wisconsin's Kevin Stemke to punt from his own 20-yard line. Purdue's Da'Shawn Austin returned it to the Purdue 45-yard line. The Boilermakers rushed for two yards on their first play before Jamar Fletcher, another of the Badgers' freshman cornerbacks, stepped up, intercepted a Brees pass and returned it 52 yards for a touchdown.

After Wisconsin stopped Purdue on fourth down and one early in the fourth quarter, tailback Ron Dayne culminated a nearly six-minute drive with a one-yard touchdown run for a 31-17 lead.

Purdue's ensuing possession ended in a Bobby Myers interception in the end zone. The Boilermakers added a late touchdown, but Wisconsin's Chris Chambers recovered Purdue's onside kick with 21 seconds left to play to ensure the win.




Jamar Fletcher scored on a 52-yard interception return to give Wisconsin a 31-24 win over Purdue in 1998.

"I don't think I'll have to answer any more questions about whether our young secondary has been tested," Alvarez said after the game. "They had a lifetime of tests today."

Brees set an NCAA record with 83 passing attempts and tied an NCAA mark with 55 completions. He threw for 494 yards but also was intercepted four times. Purdue's Randall Lane set the Big Ten record with 18 receptions.

An interesting footnote is that during the game the toilets on the east side of the stadium failed and had to be shut down. That led, in part, to discussions that eventually resulted in the massive Camp Randall Stadium renovation of the early part of the 21st century.







WISCONSIN ASSISTANT COACHES

BRET BIELEMA Defensive Coordinator & Linebackers

At Wisconsin

- Enters his second season at Wisconsin. Was named in July 2005 as Barry Alvarez's successor beginning in January 2006.
- Through the first nine games in 2004, Wisconsin led the nation in scoring defense (9.1 ppg) and had allowed just nine touchdowns, fewest in the country. The Badgers ended up fifth in the nation in pass efficiency defense (100.1 pts), sixth in scoring defense (15.4 ppg), seventh in passing yards defense (167.2 avg) and ninth in total defense (291.2 ypg).

Co-Defensive Coordinator at Kansas State from 2002-03

- 2003 Kansas State unit finished sixth nationally in total (283.1 ypg), seventh in pass (174.6 ypg), eighth in scoring (16.3 ppg), 12th in pass efficiency (104.4 rating) and 17th in run defense (108.5 ypg).
- Wildcats led Big 12 in run defense in 2003.
- In 2002 the Wildcats led the nation in scoring defense (11.8 ppg), were second nationally in total (249.0 ypg) and rushing (69.5 ypg) defense and third in the nation in pass efficiency defense (91.69 rating).
- KSU was 22-6 (11-2 in '02 and 11-4 in '03) during Bielema's two years there.
- Helped Kansas State to its first-ever Big 12 title in '03.

- Spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at Iowa, moving through the ranks with the Hawkeyes, starting as an undergraduate student assistant coach, then graduate assistant and, finally, full-time assistant (he coached Iowa's linebackers for six seasons).
- The 1997 Hawkeye defense posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring and pass efficiency defense, seventh in total defense and 11th in run defense.



At Wisconsin

- Enters his seventh season at Wisconsin.
- A Badger quarterback has been selected in the NFL Draft two of the past three years (Brooks Bollinger, sixth round to the N.Y. Jets in 2003, and Jim Sorgi, sixth round to the Indianapolis Colts in 2004).
- Bollinger was the 1999 Big Ten Freshman of the Year and is the winningest QB in school history (one of only seven QBs in Big Ten history with 30 wins as a starter).
- Bollinger also became one of only seven players in Big Ten history with at least 20 rushing TDs and 30 passing TDs.
- Sorgi finished as Wisconsin's leader in career pass efficiency and on UW career lists he finished third in pass completion percentage (.555), fourth in TD passes (33) and fifth in passing yards (4,498).
- The Badgers have set the school record for passing yards in a season twice (2001 and 2003) in the past four seasons.



- Seven of his players have been drafted in the past six years.

- The 1999 line helped Ron Dayne become college football's career rushing leader. Among Hueber's blockers was Chris McIntosh, the Big Ten's 1999 Offensive Lineman of the Year and a finalist for the Outland Trophy.
- One of his other former pupils was Aaron Gibson, a consensus All-American who also was a finalist for the Lombardi Award and the Outland Trophy.



RON LEE Defensive Backs

At Wisconsin

- Enters third season at Wisconsin.
- Coached safety Jim Leonhard, who tied Jamar Fletcher for most career interceptions (21) at UW, to first-team All-Big Ten and All-America honors in 2003 and 2004.
- Also coached cornerback Scott Starks, a 2004 first-team All-Big Ten selection and team MVP. Starks was a third-round pick of Jacksonville in the 2005 draft.

- Evans put together the greatest season ever by a Badger receiver in 2001 when he set the Big Ten record for receiving yards (1,545) in a season. He also set UW career records for receptions (175), receiving yards (3,468) and receiving touchdowns (27). He was a 2004 NFL first-round draft choice by Buffalo.
- Chambers, the school's MVP in 2000, is one of only three Badgers (Al Toon and Evans are the others) in history to record more than 2,000 yards receiving. He was picked by Miami in the second round of the 2001 Draft.
- In the mid-1990s, coached Tony Simmons and Donald Hayes who formed one of the best wide receiver tandems in college football. That duo ranks fourth (Simmons) and seventh (Hayes) in career yardage at Wisconsin.
- In 2002, with Evans injured, Mason developed freshmen Jonathan Orr and Brandon Williams into aerial threats. Orr's 842 receiving yards were a UW rookie record as were Williams' 52 catches.



BRIAN WHITE Co-Offensive Coordinator & Running Backs

At Wisconsin

- Enters 10th season at Wisconsin and sixth as the offensive coordinator.
- Was named NCAA Division 1-A Assistant Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association in 2004.
- In his rookie season at the controls of the offense (1999), the Badgers set a school scoring record and finished 10th nationally in that category.
- In 2000, first-year starter Michael Bennett was the NCAA's third-leading rusher, but the team also had a school-record six 200-yard passing games.
- In 2001 Anthony Davis was the nation's fifth-leading rusher and Big Ten Freshman of the Year, Lee Evans set the Big Ten record for receiving yards in a season (1,545) and quarterbacks Brooks Bollinger and Jim Sorgi each threw for more than 1,000 yards.
- Davis finished his career as the second-leading rusher in UW history and No. 5 all-time in the Big Ten.
- Evans set UW career records for receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns with White calling the plays.
- As backfield coach, White helped the Badgers produce a 1,000-yard rusher in each of his first eight seasons at the school. The UW has led the Big Ten in rushing three times (1996, 1998 and 1999) with White on staff.
- Served as Ron Dayne's position coach during his run to the 1999 Heisman Trophy and the NCAA Division I-A career rushing mark.

Jamie Pollard Deputy Athletic Director



Jamie Pollard was named Deputy Athletic Director for the UW-Madison in 2003 and in that role serves as the No. 2 administrator in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is responsible for the overall administration

of the Badgers' 23-sport, \$72 million athletic department. In addition, he represents Barry Alvarez at all national, conference and university meetings when necessary.

Prior to being named Deputy Athletic Director, Pollard served as the division's Chief Financial Officer and Senior Associate Athletic Director. He developed a comprehensive strategic financial plan ("Keeping Big Red in the Black") that increased the division's operating reserve to \$7 million and allowed the university to move forward on the \$109 million renovation of Camp Randall Stadium. He also assisted with the development of the school's inaugural preferential seating program

that is generating more than \$9 million annually for the athletic program and he helped negotiate a multi-year, multi-million dollar contract for media and marketing rights that is one of the largest collegiate contracts in the country.

Pollard has also been the sports administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs since 2001-02. During that time the men's basketball program won back-to-back Big Ten championships, the 2004 Big Ten Tournament and advanced to the 2005 Elite Eight. He also served as the Tournament Manager when the university hosted the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional.

In the fall of 2003, Pollard was selected by *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal* as a recipient of its "Top Forty Under 40" Award. It is given annually to the 40 most influential and creative individuals in sports under the age of 40. Pollard is the first intercollegiate sports administrator ever honored by the magazine.

Pollard has served as the President for the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association (CABMA) and was chosen by his peers as the 2002 Business Manager of the Year.


He was appointed by UW-Madison Chancellor John D. Wiley to serve as the cam-

pus chair of the Partners in Giving campaign that benefits more than 300 non-profit organizations. Pollard led the 2004 campaign for the University, which resulted in 4,500 employees donating \$1.46 million. Both the number of donors and donation levels were records for the institution.

His other intercollegiate administration experience came as Associate AD for Administration at Maryland (1994-98) and Associate AD for Internal Operations at St. Louis (1989-94). In both roles, he assisted with balancing budgets and creating reserves while helping implement gender equity plans.

In addition to his role at Wisconsin, Pollard founded Collegiate Financial Services, LLC, a private data research company that provided strategic financial planning and research services to athletic administrators, university presidents and conference commissioners.

Pollard, who was the 1987 NCAA Division III national champion in the 5,000-meter run and a two time Division III All-American, has a B.S. degree in business administration from UW-Oshkosh (1987). He is in that school's athletic hall of fame. Pollard and his wife, Ellen, have four children, (Thomas, Annie, Maggie and James).



Terry Gawlik was promoted to associate AD for sports administration and Senior Woman Administrator in 2005 after serving seven years as assistant AD for sports administration.


Gawlik oversees men's and women's cross



Donna Shalala, former Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin and current President of the University of Miami:


"He was a miracle worker. No one believed that Wisconsin's program could be restored to great eminence and Barry did it with class and energy and skill."



25 Badgers Make Opening Day Rosters

A total of 25 former Badger football players made NFL rosters for opening day. Among those players were eight rookies: Matt Katula (Baltimore Ravens), Jim Leonhard (Buffalo Bills), Jason Jefferson (Chicago Bears), Jonathan Welsh (Indianapolis Colts), Scott Starks (Jacksonville Jaguars), Erasmus James (Minnesota Vikings), Anttaj Hawthorne (Oakland Raiders) and Dan Buening (Tampa Bay Buccaneers).

Longshots Make The Cut

Matt Katula and Jim Leonhard were signed as free agents by the Ravens and Bills, respectively, after going undrafted last spring. Both used consistent training camps and performances in exhibition games to earn a spot on their team's opening day roster.

Katula takes over for Joe Maese, who had been Baltimore's long snapper since 2001. Leonhard is listed as the third-string free safety for

Buffalo, behind the starter, another former Badger, Troy Vincent. Leonhard ended the preseason with five tackles. He also returned punts for the Bills, averaging 17.3 yards on four chances.

Climbing Up the Depth Charts

A number of former UW players will be starting this Sunday for their respective teams. In what is turning into Madison east, wide receiver Lee Evans will join Vincent as a starter for the Buffalo Bills. Fellow Bedford, Ohio, native Chris Chambers will also start at wideout for the Miami Dolphins. During the preseason, Evans totaled five catches for 39 yards and a touchdown while Chambers had six catches for 133 yards. Running back Michael Bennett, in his fifth season in Minnesota, is penciled in as the starter in the Vikings' backfield.

Three former Badger offensive linemen, now residing in the NFC, will be starting tomorrow. Center Al Johnson will begin his second season as the anchor to Bill Parcells' offensive line in Dallas. Mark Tauscher, who has started every game in the



Each week this season, the Badger Football Gameday Program will take fans inside the UW coaching staff and find out what it's like to try and prepare the Badgers for a game. A different assistant coach will be profiled each game. Hopefully fans can get a glimpse inside the life of the coaches. This week, we sat down with defensive backs coach Ron Lee, who is in his third season at UW.

What is your day like before practice?

I usually get in by about 6:30 a.m. Mornings we do our individual work, whatever I need to work on in the back end. Prepping for the scout team, getting the play cards ready and getting any individual details ready before we meet as a group.

Is any day during the week more important than the others?

Monday is the biggest teaching day because it's going to be the new opponent so we have to switch our

thinking from the last opponent. And then most important, obviously, is Saturday, and how the guys come out and play.

What do you look for when you watch film as a group?

We always tell them that you watch TV, you study film. You want to know the guy you're going against. You want to know his mom's name. You want to know his girlfriend's name. You want to know every little thing about him, what split he takes on certain routes, what type of receiver is he. Is he a guy that likes to give a bunch of moves before he breaks or is he going to go right into his route? So you really have to study your opponent and know what he's going to do before he does it.

Do you also concentrate on the quarterback?


Of course, you always want to know what kind of quarterback you're going against. First of all, is he right-handed or left-handed? Is he a pocket quarterback or a scrambler? We want to know if he's better throwing the ball in the pocket or throwing on the run.

Do you have any favorite drills?


Every drill we do has to do with our coverages. If it's a tackle drill, it's related to a coverage we're running. If it's a pass drill, it's related to the coverage we're playing. It's never going to be a drill just to be a drill.

What are the most important characteristics of a good defensive back?

You have to be physically tough, mentally tough and have a short memory.

How do you communicate with your guys and the other coaches on game day when you are up in the press box?

(Defensive coordinator) Bret (Bielema) and I are constantly communicating, before the play, after the play. After the series we go back and see where we have to adjust, if we made good calls or if there's a situation that needs to be changed. We always talk as a coaching staff first and then we'll talk to the players. Let them get off their feet, let them relax a little bit, clear their heads and then we'll give them the adjustments we need to make. After that, I talk to the d-backs and let them know what's going on. I have to rely on the sounds of their voice and have someone else look into their eyes and tell me exactly what's going on because a voice can lie to you.

Fifty years ago the music they call rock 'n' roll was almost totally dominated by solo artists and performers such as Little Richard, Elvis, Jerry Lee Lewis and Bo Diddley. Each possessed a unique talent and exceptional charisma; however as rock music evolved a new concept emerged, the rock 'n' roll band. These were groups of musicians who produced a cooperative style and projected a single personality. These early rock bands established the instrumentation, the showmanship, and the musical direction that is still an important part of today's popular music scene. Most historians feel rock bands began with The Crickets (before Buddy Holly emerged as a solo act) and progressed through the "surfing style" of The Beach Boys or the jazz-rock tendencies of Blood Sweat and Tears. Some times there were even "manufactured bands" like The Monkees or The Archies. The early doo-wop groups, although totally vocal ensembles, were organized much like "bands" and gave rise to the sounds of Motown. Without a doubt the rock band concept reached its highest peak with the coming of The Beatles, who not only changed the direction of popular music but also opened the door in America for such British groups as the Rolling Stones, The Dave Clark Five, and The Byrds. The Wisconsin Band makes a quick survey of the evolution of "ensemble rock" when we observe how the ROCK BANDS ROCK ON!





WISCONSIN TRADITIONS

Badger nickname

The athletic teams' nickname (Badgers) was borrowed from the state. The territory was initially dubbed the "Badger" state. The reason for the moniker was not because of badgers in this region, but instead because of an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides according to folklore.

Bucky Badger

Badgers in various forms have been recognized as the school mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white striped sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by artist Art Evans. At that time, the badger went by names like Benny, Buddy, Bernie, Bobby and Bouncey. Art Lentz, the department's publicity director, had the idea to bring the mascot to life.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped his handlers. It was decided in the interest

of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the Madison Zoo. The Badger Yearbook replaced the live badger with a small raccoon named Regdab (badger spelled backwards) and passed it off as a "badger in a raccoon coat."

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was hired to mold a paper-mache badger head. Cheerleader Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A contest was staged to name the mascot. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or Bucky. The name came from the lyrics in a song which encouraged the football team to "buck right through that line."

Bucky Badger has persevered through the years, even surviving a threat by then assistant attorney general, Howard Koop, in 1973. He suggested that Bucky be replaced by Henrietta Holstein, a loveable cow. Koop argued that "kids love cows. A generation could grow up supporting the university and Henrietta Holstein." Koop's effort to overthrow Bucky failed.

Bucky even survived a cameo appearance by former Sports Illustrated writer Rick Telander. In preparation for a book about the department, Telander wore the Badger costume at a 1991 volleyball game. Telander overcame "terminal claustrophobia" in his first and only act as Bucky.

Bud song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've Said It All," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karmen for Budweiser beer commercials.

The song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. We had, just by accident, added this beer commercial to the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a TD. I played it again, and we scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud,'" said Leckrone.



Motion W

When Coach Barry Alvarez came to Madison, he decided that the helmet logo needed to be updated to signal a new era. He entertained 15-20 designs in 1990 before Rayovac artist Rick Suchanek developed the "Motion W," which originally included a tail at the back of the logo. Alvarez thought the tail was a bit much, but when it was removed, decided to go with it. The University bought the rights to the design, and the logo has been adopted by all other UW sports.



Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer with the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give the fans something to listen to on their way out, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience-participation activities.

"On, Wisconsin"

The school's fight song was originally composed in 1909 by Chicago's William Purdy, and the words were written by Carl Beck. Purdy and Beck had been fraternity brothers at Hamilton College (Clinton, N.Y.) and were roommates in Chicago. Purdy was going to submit the song for consideration to win a \$100 prize that the University of Minnesota was offering for a new football song. When Beck heard the music, he offered to write words and suggested that Purdy offer it to Wisconsin, where Beck had once studied. The song was an instant hit on campus and spread throughout the world.



Some 2,500 schools have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. "On, Wisconsin" was sung for the first time at the 1909 homecoming game vs. Minnesota.

The music was adapted by Band Director Michael Leckrone in 1969. The original version had been played virtually unchanged since its inception. "I got a lot of flak for the change," Leckrone said. "The old version was one you had to wait on. I wanted to generate immediate crowd reaction, so I stepped it up a bit."

Paul Bunyan Axe

The most-played rivalry in Division I-A football continues this fall when Wisconsin and Minnesota meet. The UW-UM series is the nation's oldest and has been played continuously since 1907. The game has alternated sites between the university campuses since 1946. Much prestige was always associated with the game, and the significance was emphasized with its place on the schedule. Between 1933 and 1982, the Wisconsin-Minnesota game was always the final regular-season contest for each school.


The series took an added twist in 1948 when more than state bragging rights were on the line. After a 16-0 setback that season, the Wisconsin letter-winners group, the National "W" Club, presented Minnesota with an axe wielded by Paul Bunyan. He was the mythical giant of midwestern lumber camps. Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song, "Varsity," was the 1934 brain-storm of then-band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to salute UW-Madison President Glenn Frank after each game.

Slab of Bacon

The Slab of Bacon trophy was the precursor to Paul Bunyan's Axe as the prize in the Wisconsin-Minnesota football series. Apparently, the trophy was presented to the winning school by a sorority from the losing institution. The trophy was discontinued in the 1940s and was discovered by UW Sports Information intern Will Roleson in a storage room at the UW Department of Athletics in 1994. It is currently housed in the football office at Wisconsin. "We took home the bacon," Coach Barry Alvarez said, "and kept it."

Thoughts on the Season Opener


Well, the first game of the 2005 season is in the record books. It was a great day for Badger fans of all ages. There were mixed emotions from the start of the game to the end but when it was all said and

VOLLEYBALL LOOKING FOR MORE

With the way the Wisconsin volleyball team ended the 2004 season, the best may be yet to come for the Badgers.

Wisconsin shocked the volleyball community last season as it tied for fifth in the NCAA tournament. The Badgers upset second-ranked and undefeated Hawai'i in the regional semifinals before losing to eventual national champion Stanford in the regional final. All this from a team that had not been ranked in the coaches' poll for most of the season.

"We started slow last season because we had so many new players in the lineup," says coach Pete Waite, who is in his seventh year at the Badger helm. "Once we got rolling, we had a good second half of Big Ten play and a good run in the NCAA tournament."

With five starters plus their libero returning, the Badgers are ready for even more success in 2005. "As a group they gained a lot of great experience last year and we'll be starting this season at a higher level," says Waite. "I think we can reach that level again and we'll be working

hard to go even farther. We'll have to get more road wins in Big Ten play and that will help us out when we get to the NCAA tournament."

Shaw, Meierotto Lead Team

Leading the Badgers will be 2004 honorable mention All-American Sheila Shaw. Last season, the 6-1 middle blocker led the Big Ten Conference with 1.36 blocks per game. She also led the UW with 3.81 kills per game, which ranked eighth in the league. Shaw was a unanimous All-Big Ten selection and earned AVCA All-Mideast Region honors.

Shaw and senior Aubrey Meierotto will serve as Badger co-captains in 2005. Meierotto is a two-year starter as a left-side hitter and ranked third on the team last season with 2.83 kills per game. The 6-1 Meierotto is also one of the best servers on the team, leading the Badgers with 0.28 aces per game last season, and one of the best blockers, averaging 0.77 blocks per game.

Six Starters Return

Other returning starters include junior Maria Carlini and sophomores Taylor Reineke, Jackie Simpson and Jocelyn Wack.

As a sophomore, Carlini started 17 matches on the left-side after playing much of her freshman season at middle blocker. The 6-2 Carlini led the team with eight double-doubles and averaged 2.75 kills and 2.42 digs per game. She was named the Big Ten Player of the Week on Nov. 22 after leading Wisconsin to wins over Michigan and Michigan State.

Simpson was named to the 2004 Big Ten All-Freshman team, ranking fifth in the league with 13.01 assists per game. The 6-0 setter started 26 matches, becoming the first UW freshman since 1993 to earn a consistent starting role.

Reineke, a 6-3 middle blocker, started 28 matches, ranking second on the team with 1.25 blocks per game. She added 1.63 kills per game while hitting a team best .317.

As a freshman libero, Wack set the UW season record for digs and

ranked fourth in the Big Ten with 4.93 digs per game. She played in all 32 matches as libero and earned NCAA Region All-Tournament honors after recording a career-high 35 digs against Hawai'i.

"We have the type of players who have the athletic ability, personalities, and attitudes that are exciting to watch," says Waite. "They enjoy being with each other, which makes for good team chemistry. They love playing volleyball and that makes it exciting for the fans."

With the return of most of its starting lineup, Wisconsin also returns most of its statistical strength. The Badgers return 81 percent of their blocking (304 of 375.5 blocks), 78 percent of their defense (1,434 of 1,843 digs), 73.5 percent of their serving (86 of 117 aces) and 70 percent of their offense (1,317 of 1,890 kills) as well as both of their setters.







UW'S RETIRED NUMBERS



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.

CAMP RANDALL STADIUM POLICIES

Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kickoff. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.



Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Kohl Center Gate B reception desk (608-263-5645).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.




CAMP RANDALL STADIUM RENOVATION


NEW LOOK, SAME OLD CHARM FOR CAMP RANDALL

One of college football's legendary facilities—Wisconsin's Camp Randall Stadium—has just undergone a four-year, \$109 million renovation. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements, however, have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm; rather, the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch their beloved Badgers play on Saturdays in the fall.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds.

Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3, 1917.







UW CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

The goal was to raise money through both "athon" style pledging and direct donations during a 48 Hour Practice. Student-athletes held 'practices' in one-hour sessions continuously for forty-eight hours on the Library Mall. With over 150 athletes from every UW Athletics team participating, over \$3,600 was raised to place clean water wells in areas of AIDS ravaged Africa.





THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$82 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,500 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2004-05, the Big Ten distributed over \$116 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference

institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

- Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- Big Ten Universities host more than 70 Nobel laureates as faculty, students or researchers.
- Big Ten Universities enroll students of whom more than 41 percent have graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class, while 74 percent graduated in the top quarter of their class.
- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised nationally.



ly, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.

• Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.

• Throughout the conference, the Big Ten had more than 8,400 student-athletes playing on over 270 teams in 2003-04. Those student-athletes received in excess of \$82 million in direct financial aid.

• Big Ten student-athletes graduate at a rate of 10 percent higher than all Division I student-athletes.

• The Big Ten recognized 1,952 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2004-05 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,700 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

• In the past 10 years (1995-96 through 2004-05), the Big Ten claimed 40 NCAA team championships and 155 individual titles.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

The Big Ten Conference will begin year two of its college football instant replay program in 2005. In addition, other leagues will also implement their own instant replay system after the NCAA approved the Big Ten's proposal to allow all NCAA conferences and independent institutions to experiment with the use of video replay for the 2005 season.

The goal of the Big Ten's football television replay plan is to: See, Review, Change (if warranted). Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of indisputable video evidence is met can a play be overturned.

Only the Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game. Neither the game officials nor the coaches may ask for a review. The Technical Advisor will have the sole authority to change a call, or no call, on the field. Unlike the NFL model, officials working Big Ten games will not have the ability or capacity to view the replay(s).

The Big Ten Conference replay system allows for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected once the standard of indisputable video evidence is met. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

During the 2004 campaign, play was stopped in only 28 of 57 contests (49 percent) for a total of 43 stoppages and 21 overturned calls (49 percent of stoppages). The length of the 57 games utilizing instant replay in 2004 was only three hours and 16 minutes, compared to three hours and 13 minutes in all 2003 contests. Less than one stoppage occurred per game in 2004, as the Big Ten's average length of review was only two minutes and 39 seconds, compared to the National Football League average of three minutes and 20 seconds for its instant replay system.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

These seven former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.



Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962), nicknamed "The Kangaroo Kicker," was a two-time All-America fullback and punter between 1896-99. He also was a two-time team captain.



Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.



Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference MVP in 1942.



Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.



Marty Below (elected in 1988), a rugged right tackle, earned All-America praise as a senior.



Alan Ameche (elected in 1975) was the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner and a multi-year All-American in the classroom and on the field.

LEGACY OF CAMP RANDALL

Today's Camp Randall experience is one of boisterous cheering, fan camaraderie and first-class football among a sea of red. This, however, was not always the case. On the same ground that today's young student-athletes do battle on the gridiron, young soldiers-to-be prepared for battle in the Civil War. From 1861 to 1865 the area where Camp Randall Stadium stands served as Civil War training grounds. In this season's game programs this page will be dedicated to the legacy of Camp Randall and its history in its pre-football days.

Letters written by soldiers training at Camp Randall help shed light and bring to life the experience of those men and boys and conditions they endured. Early correspondences were optimistic and light-hearted. However, when the Wisconsin winters took hold and the novelty of the camp wore off for the soldiers and the people of Madison, morale suffered.

One of the first men to arrive in Madison, George Beck of the 37th infantry wrote:

"Since our arrival the people of Madison have taken a great interest in our activities. Many days they arrive to watch us drill. The women are especially generous with their homemade foods, pies and teas. It surely is a fine alternative to the food we get at camp..."

Written in 1861, Beck's outlook and experiences were upbeat. But just one year later, the letters reflected a much different experience.

John Cronk of the 30th infantry wrote in 1862:

"These barracks are shantys that was used for stabling horses and cattle at the time of the fare. They have been white washed inside and cleaned out and fixed up for men. When we came down here we had our victuals cooked for but now we draw our rations and

cook them ourselves ... We have built an eating house by ourselves. We have plenty of food here some times and not much at others. There is considerable sickness here at present with measles, sore throat and bad colds."

A 16-year-old soldier, Chauncy, wrote to his mother on Christmas Day, 1862:

"... The mercury was down near 40 below zero and the guard house where we sat down between reliefs or lay down was little better than out doors. The health of our Regiment is none too good. One man dies on an average every day. As I write this letter the drum is beating. The food we get is to blame for our bad health. The boys threaten a riot every day for the bad beef and spoilt bread issued to us and all this in our home state of Wisconsin."

Conditions were waning and only going to get worse with the arrival of Confederate prisoners.






AROUND UW ATHLETICS

Volleyball

Wisconsin faces its first big challenge of the 2005 season this weekend when it takes on 21st-ranked Missouri (2-0) at the Holiday Inn Classic. The Tigers are coming off a 3-0 upset win over No. 9 Tennessee last weekend at their own invitation ... Sophomore Taylor Reineke and redshirt freshman Audra Jeffers were named to the all-tournament team at the Falcon Invitational. Reineke, a 6-3 middle blocker, averaged 3.11 kills and 1.56 blocks per game while hitting .628 on the weekend. Jeffers, a 6-2 opposite hitter, led the Badgers with 3.86 kills per game and hit .411 in three matches ... Senior Sheila Shaw became the 14th player in UW history to record more than 1,000 kills in her career. The 6-1 middle blocker totaled a match-high 11 kills against Butler last Saturday to up her career total to 1,002.

Wisconsin begins a six-game road stint this week ... Junior Aaron Hohlbein was named the Big Toe Soccer Invitational defensive MVP while teammate and sophomore Sho Fujita was named the offensive MVP. Also earning distinction and joining Hohlbein and Fujita on the all-tournament team were Reid Johnson and Jake Settle.

Women's Golf

The Wisconsin women's golf team welcomes Arkansas-Little Rock, Illinois State, Iowa State, Kansas State, Minnesota, Missouri, New Mexico State, Oklahoma, Purdue, TCU and Texas A&M for the Badger Invitational this weekend ... The event will be held at the par 72, 6,241-yard University Ridge Golf Course in Verona, Wis. The 12-team field will play 36 holes Sunday in a shotgun format starting at 8 a.m. and then return to finish with 18 holes on Monday.

Women's Cross Country

The women's cross country team opens the 2005 season on today ... The Badgers are led by three upper-classmen, seniors Linsey Smith (formerly Blaisdell) and 'A Havahla Haynes and junior Katrina Rundhaug. Smith redshirted last season but was a regional qualifier in the 5000 meters during the track season. Haynes was a second-team All-Big Ten runner in last season and Rundhaug placed 59th at the 2004 NCAA Cross Country Championship.

Bucky Gets Small

A team of UW-Madison chemistry researchers has put a new twist on a philosophical riddle: How many Bucky Badger mascots can you fit on the head of a pin?

The answer: 9,000, with a little help from nanotechnology.

NanoBucky, created in the lab of Robert J. Hamers, is composed of tiny

carbon nanofiber "hairs," each just 75 nanometers in diameter. A nanometer is equivalent to 1 billionth of a meter.

Nanofibers, a form of carbon developed in the last several years, have many applications and could play a role in the development of such things as tiny sensors for detecting chemical and biological agents.

The fibers, and NanoBucky, are "grown" in a plasma deposition chamber where a mix of gases is used with electrical current to grow nanofibers on a silicon substrate with a nickel catalyst. The pattern for the catalyst is composed on a computer and is then traced on the substrate by a beam of electrons.


Two former Badger gridiron stars (Alan Ameche and Pat Richter) have been inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

NCAA GUIDELINES

What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

- a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;
- b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;
- c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;
- d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by



an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

- a) providing gifts or reduced cost services;
- b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;
- c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;
- d) providing use of an automobile;
- e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;
- f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;
- g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;
- h) promising to provide any of the above;

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;
- Compensation for only work actually performed; and
- Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 





and punt returner. But that's only half the story.

Leonhard's accolades off the field are just as impressive. A 2004 first-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American as selected by CoSIDA, Leonhard was honored in New York as one of 15 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes (with that goes an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship).

The 5-8, 186-pound Leonhard (who once won a team basketball slam dunk competition), a native of tiny Tony, Wis. (pop. 105), will go down as one of the most decorated players (let alone walk-ons) of the Alvarez era.

ACCOMPLISHED WALK-ONS FOR THE BADGERS

They may have been told by many non-believers in their senior years of high school that they weren't big enough or fast enough to contribute to a Big Ten football program. However, a number of individuals have gone on to make their mark on the University of Wisconsin football program during the Alvarez era by originally joining the team as a walk-on.

Below is a partial list of some of the individuals that joined the Badgers as non-scholarship players, only to make major impacts at the UW and beyond.

- **Bob Adamov, linebacker:** four-year letterwinner; team captain and starter on the Badgers' 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; Ivan Williamson Scholastic Award winner in 1998; one of nine senior starters named team MVP his final season.

- **Chad Cascadden, linebacker:** named the team's Special Teams Player of the Year in 1994; Academic All-Big Ten selection his senior year; letterwinner on UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; played for the NFL's New York Jets.

- **Matt Davenport, placekicker:** semi-finalist for Lou Groza Award; consensus first-team All-Big Ten in 1997 and 1998; scored 99 points as a senior, the most in school history for a placekicker; career field goal percentage (.868) is No. 1 at UW.

- **Jason Doering, safety:** team captain in both 1999 and 2000; led Badger defensive backs in tackles his final three seasons; ranks fourth all-time in career

solo tackles (250); starter on two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; currently plays for the NFL's New York Giants.

- **Joe Panos, offensive tackle:** team captain in 1993; starter on the Badgers' 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; first-team All-Big Ten and second-team AP All-American in '93; played for the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles and Buffalo Bills.

- **Mark Tauscher, offensive tackle:** three-year letterwinner; member of two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squads, including a starter on the 1999 team; helped Ron Dayne become NCAA all-time leading rusher; currently a starter for the NFL's Green Bay Packers.

- **Donnel Thompson, linebacker:** team captain in 1998 and 1999; starter on a pair of UW Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; ranks 10th all-time in career tackles; two-time team-leader in tackles; played for NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers and Indianapolis Colts.

- **Mike Schneck, long snapper:** three-year letterwinner at Wisconsin; member of 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; signed free agent contract with Pittsburgh and currently plays for the Steelers.

- **Sam Veit, punter:** four-year starter and letterwinner; member of UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; ranks third all-time in career punts (209) and career punting yards (8,016); three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.


