Smokers to Puff Vile Weed for Test of Brains

It makes you fat,
It makes you lean,
It lifts the brains

Just sit and smoke—40 cents an hour.

A call has been issued by Prof. M. V. O'Shea of the department of Education, for men who smoke to submit themselves to tests. The big idea is to find out whether or not smoking effects the mental capacity and intelligence.

In order to do this 18 men who smoke will be selected, who will devote three hours each afternoon to a test period.

A feature of Professor O'Shea's announcement is that the men will not only be paid for their time but that the smokes will be provided.

At the same time it is planned to run 18 men who do not smoke. By means of comparison of these two groups, Prof. O'Shea is gathering data that will be published in the near future. The tests will begin Monday afternoon.

FIRST MIXER HELD TONIGHT

The first all-university mixer will be held tonight at 8 o'clock in the gymnasium of Lathrop hall. It is hoped that all the students will take advantage of this opportunity to get acquainted. Between the dances there will be special stunts under the direction of Prof. E. B. Gordon.

Arrangements have been made for the different groups to get acquainted, and Professor Gordon says, "We are going to give everyone the opportunity of becoming acquainted with people from his own state. That is the first thing they want to know, 'Who is here from Kansas? Who is here from Ohio?'"

Scherer's orchestra will furnish the music for the mixer, and there will be plenty of mixing stunts to afford relaxation and entertainment after the first week of school.

Mixers will be held the first three Friday nights, according to Dean S. H. Goodnight.

DRAMA EVENTS SCHEDULED ON REGULAR PLAN

Minstrels and Vodvil Alternate; Haresfoot and Joint Play Get Trip

A permanent dramatic program for student productions has been adopted by the faculty. The plan which originated in the sub-committee on oratory and debates was decided upon as a means of preventing conflicts in the arrangement of plays.

Under the present plan Union Vodvil and the Engineers' Minstrels come in alternate years. This is a change in the old system under which the Minstrels alternated with the Circus and Vodvil was staged every year.

Road Trips

Haresfoot and the Joint Production are allowed to go on the road. This will be an innovation in that it will permit both men and women to make the trips with the Joint Production. The Joint Production which is staged by Edwin Booth, Red Domino, and Twelfth Night has been a regular event since 1905 when "Trelawney of the Wells" was staged by Edwin Booth and Red Domino.

In 1901 Haresfoot made its first trip with "A Colonial Girl," playing in Fond du Lac, Oshkosh, Appleton, Green Bay, La Crosse, and Winona. Since that time the club has been permitted to go on every year.

Women Included

Permission for women to go on tour with student plays and events was granted last summer, but during the past year the dancing trips were the only ones made.

NURSES' SCHOOL READY BY FALL

Five and Three Year Courses Open to High School Graduates

The university training school for nurses will be opened with the beginning of the first semester. There are to be two courses, a three year course for high school graduates, leading to the certificate of graduate nurse, and a five year course with the degree of bachelor of science and the graduate nurse's certificate. A special feature of the courses is the training for public health nursing.

The first two years' work in both courses will be the same as that in the Letters and Science course, and in the third year the students will begin their majoring in the medical sciences," said Miss Florence Patterson, superintendent of the hospital. "Since the state hospital will not be completed for some time, those starting in the three year course this year will be forced to take their work in surgery and obstetrics at some outside hospital. In determining the hospital in which to do this work, the nurses will have the same choice as the students in the Medical school."

The students in the five year course will, however, be able to complete all their work here.

459 STATE BONUS STUDENTS HERE IN SUMMER SESSION

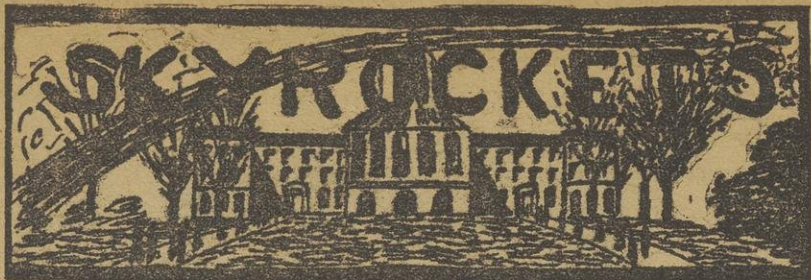
Large Number of Disabled Soldiers Also in Attendance

Exactly 459 state bonus students have registered for the summer session. The bonus students in order to get their pay from the state must carry a minimum of six credits of work and must attend at least 90 per cent of their classes.

There are also in attendance 137 federal students, including 29 new ones. Among the schools from which the bonus students have come here are: Carroll college, Columbia university, Northwestern, Milwaukee School of Engineering, Marquette, La Crosse, Normal and Chicago, Tech.

VESPER PROGRAM SUNDAY TO HAVE SPECIAL SERVICE

Campus Religious Council Holds
Meeting for All
Students

A special Vesper service will be held Sunday evening, July 4, on the upper campus under the auspices of the Campus Religious council. Dean Scott H. Goodnight will act as chairman and Prof. Edgar B. Gordon will lead the singing.

It is a regular custom to hold the Vesper service on the upper campus during the Summer Session. This meeting, however, is expected to be an unusually large one and great pains have been taken to secure an excellent speaker.

Lumpkin to Speak

Rev. H. H. Lumpkin, D. D., will be the speaker Sunday night. Rev. Lumpkin is a man of wide experience, having spent considerable time as a missionary in Alaska. For five years he was rector of the St. Mathews church at Fairbanks. The church and his residence were both made of logs. Rev. Lumpkin has also spent considerable time on the trail, preaching and giving help to the Indians and Eskimos, and in the mining camps. These expeditions were made with dog teams and often resulted in trying experiences. Because of his faithful service in the far north, he was chosen honorary member of the Pioneers of Alaska.

Offer Plans

Rev. Edw. W. Blakeman has been chosen chairman of the program committee and will be assisted by Fern Constance, John G. Baker. The instrumental music will be in charge of Mrs. Geo. N. Qualley, formerly organist and choir director in Rockford, Illinois. Frank Kuehl, business manager of the 1921 Badger, will have charge of the publicity. John A. Potts has been chosen chairman of arrangements and will also have charge of the ushering.

Leo H. Kohl, president of the Campus Religious Council of the University of Wisconsin, was chosen chairman of the summer vesper services. Sunday evening vesper services will be held on the upper campus from July 4th to August 1st inclusive. During the summer session, students come to the university who frequently are unable to attend during the fall and winter months. The Sunday evening vespers have proved very popular in past years and the outlook for this year is very promising. On July 11th Rev. A. J. Soldan will be the speaker of the evening.

HONORS WON BY 107 GRADUATES

Women Capture 51 Places in
Studies and Six for
Theses

Under the new system of honors for general scholarship, inaugurated last year at the University of Wisconsin, high honors were awarded at Commencement to 17 of the 969 members of the graduating class, and honors were awarded to 90. Women students captured 5 of the high honors and 46 of the honors.

High honors were awarded to those who made an average grade above 91 in all their studies, and honors to those who averaged above 87. Honors for graduating theses were awarded to 19 students, of whom 6 were women.

Awarded High Honors

They are to be cared for under the direction of Dr. F. Gaensler of the Memorial and the county hospitals of Milwaukee.

Plans are progressing rapidly for

the group of buildings which will go to make up the university's hospital. The group will count about fifteen acres, the ground extending from Orchard street to the university high school, and from Linden to University avenue. The nurses' home will be located north of Linden.

According to the present plans the hospital will accommodate about four hundred patients, and will treat practically all cases, including medical, surgical, obstetrical, psychiatric, orthopedic, and those of the ear, eye, nose and throat. The hospital will be completed in time for those starting the five years' nurses' course to complete their work here.
