The Secretary presented recommendations amending the By-Laws of the Regents to designate the duties of the Vice President of Student Affairs and relating to the membership of Regent committees. Upon motion of Regent Gelatt,

VOTED, That Section 6, Chapter IV of the By-Laws of the Regents be created to read as follows:

Section 6. The Vice President of Student Affairs shall be responsible to the President of the University and shall perform such duties in the administration of the work relating to student life, services, and records as may be assigned to him from time to time by the President.

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Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That paragraphs (1) and (2) of Section 1 of Chapter III of the By-Laws of the Regents be amended as follows:

- (1) Educational Committee consisting of ~~four~~ such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board immediately following the Annual Meeting. The President of the Board shall serve as an ex officio member and shall designate the chairman of the Committee.
- (2) Business and Finance Committee consisting of ~~five~~ such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board immediately following the Annual Meeting. The President of the Board shall serve as an ex officio member and shall designate the chairman of the Committee.

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Regent Renk presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the resignation of John J. Creamer, associate professor of English, Milwaukee Extension Division, be accepted; to take effect September 11, 1951. (Professor Creamer is resigning because of physical disability.

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Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the appointment of Frank L. Kozelka, associate professor of pharmacology and consultant in neuropsychiatry, be changed, beginning October 1, 1951, to professor of clinical pathology, Psychiatric Institute; salary at the rate of \$9,000 per annum, twelve months' basis; charge \$4,000 to Psychiatric Institute, and \$5,000 to Wisconsin General Hospital.

Regent Renk reported that at the September meeting of the Regents the question of the Regents meeting with representatives of the students was referred to the Educational Committee. Regent Renk reported that the Educational Committee suggested that the Regents have a dinner meeting with a group of nine students on November 9, 1951. Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was

VOTED, That the Regents have a dinner meeting at 6:00 P.M. on Friday, November 9, 1951, with a group of nine students consisting of three women students, one a representative of the Women's Self-Government Association, and two to be selected at large by the Women's Administrative Committee, three men students, one a representative of the Wisconsin Men's Association, and two to be selected at large by the Men's Council, one representative of the Union Directorate, one representative of Student Board, and one representative of The Daily Cardinal.

Regent Kleczka presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Renk, it was

VOTED, That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to purchase from John D. Quartuccio and Jennie Quartuccio the vacant lot on Fahrenbrook Court described as:

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a contract, subject to the approval of the State Chief Engineer, in the amount of \$3968 with Steiro Engineering Company, Madison, low bidder, covering construction of a Transformer Vault at Sterling Hall. (Chargeable to Buildings and Grounds, 1-E, Remodelling.)

Vice President Werner left the meeting  
and Regent Gelatt assumed the Chair.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the request of the Madison Gas and Electric Company for an easement for the construction of an electric line on property owned by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, the property being known generally as the Charmany Farm, located in Section 25, Town of Middleton, Dane County, Wisconsin, be granted, and that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign the agreement.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That \$6600 be appropriated from the 1-E Reserve for Remodelling and Improvements for remodelling a portion of the Education Building to provide space for a Government research project.

Vice President Werner resumed the Chair.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That \$4660 be appropriated from 1-E Unbudgeted Receipts to provide funds for the erection and operation of an Information Center as authorized by the Regents at their meeting on September 8, 1951, to be distributed as follows:

\$1000 for construction and equipment of the booth  
3660 for operation of the Information Center during the remainder of the fiscal year 1951-52, as follows:

\$3586 Salaries and Wages  
74 Supplies and Expense.

President Fred displayed a map showing the present parking lots, the extent to which they could possibly be expanded, and locations where it might be possible to construct parking lots in the future.

The Vice President of Business and Finance reported on the plan for the operation of the Information Center. In reply to an inquiry by Regent Watson, the Vice President of Business and Finance stated that a report would be made at the end of the fiscal year as to the number of persons who use the services of the Information Center.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That \$13,420 be appropriated from the 1-E Library Reserve to the budget of the General Library to provide funds for the preparation of books and other library material for moving to the new Memorial Library, as follows:

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That \$16,600 be appropriated from 1-E Unbudgeted Receipts to Medical School Capital to provide funds for the purchase of microscopes.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That \$40,000 be appropriated from 1-E Unbudgeted Receipts to the Division of Buildings and Grounds to provide funds for vacation and sick leave allowances for employees paid at prevailing hourly rates, as authorized by the 1951 Legislature after the 1951-53 appropriation to the University was approved.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Laird, it was

VOTED, That the Trust Officer be authorized to accept contributions received from the University of Wisconsin Foundation and other donors to the Kiekhofer Memorials as described in President Fred's report which was incorporated in the minutes of the Regents' meeting of September 8, 1951, and that the funds so received by the Trust Officer be deposited with the State Treasurer, and credited to a separate account designated "William Henry Kiekhofer Memorials" in the Consolidated University Trust Fund; that the funds be invested in accordance with the policies of the Regents and State Statutes governing the Consolidated University Trust Fund, and that both principal and income be available for expenditure, on authorization by the Regents, for the purposes of memorials to the late Professor William H. Kiekhofer, deceased.

Regent Gelatt presented a statement reporting the background and the present status of the study being made of the teaching of American History and American Institutions at the University. (Copy attached) Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was

VOTED, That the statement presented by Regent Gelatt relating to the status of the study of the teaching of American History be made a matter of record and included in the minutes of this meeting.

Regent Watson stated that he thought it appropriate for the Regents to indicate their approval of some of the things that were being done well at the University. He stated that the Freshman Forum Program at the University of Wisconsin was an excellent program which the University faculty had been offering for several years and which was unique in being offered only at the University of Wisconsin as far as he knew. Regent Laird stated that Radio Station WHA should also be commended for broadcasting the Freshman Forum Program and making it available to the people of the state. Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Laird, it was

VOTED, That the Secretary be directed to address communications to the committee in charge of the Freshman Forum expressing appreciation of the Regents for the high quality of the Freshman Forum Program, and to Radio Station WHA for making the Freshman Forum Program available to the people of the state.

Justice Timothy Brown, Mr. Bernhard Mautz and Mr. E. O. Rosten, representing the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and University Houses, Inc., appeared before the Regents. Justice Brown stated that they were present to offer the transfer of the University Housing Project on Eagle Heights to the Regents of

the University of Wisconsin as a gift from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and University Houses, Inc. He stated that the Foundation wished to give it to the Regents at this time and to dedicate the income from the project for research in the natural sciences. He stated that the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation was not able to build and give the University a building for general purposes because under the charter of the Foundation the use of the income was limited to research in the natural sciences. He stated that the Foundation was giving this property to the Regents as a gift in the same manner as if the gift consisted of securities. Justice Brown presented to Vice President Werner three original copies executed on behalf of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and University Houses, Inc. of an "Agreement between the Regents of the University of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and University Houses, Inc." with letter of transmittal from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation attached (EXHIBIT A attached). Justice Brown stated that this agreement covered the transfer of the University Housing Project to the Regents and cancelled the leases, management contract, notes and mortgage which were entered into for the construction and operation of this project.

Vice President Werner read the letter addressed to the Regents by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation which had been handed to him by Justice Brown and which is attached as part of EXHIBIT A.

Regent Kleczka stated that the recommendation to transfer the University Housing Project to the Regents had been considered by the Business and Finance Committee. He stated that this proposal constituted a gift to the Regents of an investment by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation of two and three-quarter million dollars and was being made at this time instead of some forty-five years from now when the property would be otherwise transferred to the Regents under the terms of the original arrangements. Regent Kleczka reported that in addition this gift makes available each year to the University for research in the natural sciences the net income from the operation of the project. He reported that during the brief period the project had been in operation some \$61,000 had been paid on the principal of the funds borrowed for construction in addition to the annual payment of interest at  $2\frac{1}{2}\%$  on the funds borrowed for construction. He stated that this was one of the largest gifts ever made to the University in its history and that it was, with pleasure, that he moved adoption of the following recommendation:

That the Regents accept the offer of the Trustees of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and of University Houses, Inc. to accelerate the provisions of the leases, management contract, mortgage notes and mortgage relating to the housing project known as University Houses located on the Eagle Heights Farm by cancelling the mortgage indebtedness and transferring the property to the Regents at this time, with the provision that the net income from the operation of the property, during the unexpired term of the original agreements, be devoted to research in the natural sciences; that the President and the Secretary be authorized to sign an agreement with Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and University Houses, Inc. providing for the transfer of the said property to the Regents subject to existing leases and agreements with tenants and subject also to the existing agreement dated December 30, 1946, with the

Village of Shorewood Hills for the furnishing by the said Village of fire fighting facilities, water mains, and sewer mains, and providing further for the cancellation of the mortgage indebtedness on the property and of various agreements and leases all of which provisions are set forth more fully in the copy of the "Agreement between the Regents of the University of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and University Houses, Inc.," attached hereto and identified as EXHIBIT A; that the said property and the net income from the operation of the property after November 30, 1951, the effective date of the aforementioned agreement, and until June 30, 1997, unless an earlier date is fixed by agreement between the Regents and the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, shall be deemed a gift and donation within the meaning of Section 20.41 (15) Wisconsin Statutes, and shall be used for the support of research in the natural sciences at the University of Wisconsin, including the support of research professorships; that until otherwise ordered by the Regents, the responsibility for the operation and management of the said properties be assigned to the Division of Residence Halls; and that the Secretary of the Regents express to the Trustees of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and to the officers of University Houses, Inc. the gratitude and thanks of the Regents for this generous gift.

The motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt and adopted unanimously by a rising vote.

Mr. Bernhard Mautz, President of University Houses, Inc., handed Vice President Werner a quitclaim deed covering a right-of-way from the Village of Shorewood Hills to the University Housing Project.

President Fred made the following statement expressing appreciation of the University for this gift:

"This gift is another example of the many generous grants made by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to the University for the enrichment of its program. These grants are made from proceeds resulting from the careful development of discoveries in basic science. Even before tendering this magnificent gift, the Trustees of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation had made available to the University Research Committee sums totalling over \$6,000,000. These funds have been used at the Research Committee's discretion to further basic inquiry into many areas and have proved to be of tremendous value in stimulating research throughout the University.

"The construction of University Houses by the Foundation at a time when housing was critical has aided the entire University by helping to attract better faculty to our campus.

"We are deeply grateful to the Trustees of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation for this gift and for their long-time support of many aspects of our University program which could not have been undertaken without this help."

Vice President Werner stated that, on behalf of the Regents and the State of Wisconsin, he wanted to express sincere appreciation for this generous gift. He stated that the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation had made available in 1946 and 1947 two and three-quarter million dollars for this housing project which was very much needed by the University and which would cost the University a great deal more than that sum if constructed at the present time. He stated this gift is comparable in value only to the gift to the University by the late Kemper K. Knapp.

Justice Brown thanked the Regents for their generous expressions of appreciation and stated that it should be remembered that this gift had been made possible by Dr. Harry Steenbock, who, by denying himself the value of his patents and, who, in desiring that the profits from his patents be turned back to the University, had made possible the creation of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation. He stated that Mr. George Haight and the late Mr. William S. Keyes likewise should be remembered for making this gift possible because of their participation in the development of this particular project and in the development of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation. Justice Brown stated that this gift was tangible evidence of what can be done through the cooperation of the Regents, representing the administration of the University, and the faculty through the giving up of the profits of their research, and the alumni through participating in the commercial development of research at the University.

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Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 11:15 A.M.

A STATEMENT CONCERNING THE TEACHING OF AMERICAN HISTORY  
(Read by Regent Charles D. Gelatt at the Board of Regents Meeting  
October 6, 1951)

The Regents have for many years been interested in maintaining and strengthening the work of the University in educating young people for responsible citizenship in America.

A post war survey by the New York Times on the requirements of various college and university curricula indicated that American History was a required subject in many large and small colleges and universities, but that American History was not required by many others. This survey was followed by a number of newspaper and magazine articles urging that a knowledge of history of the United States was essential to the proper discharge of the responsibilities of citizenship.

In the spring of 1950 the Regents requested the administration to study the curricula of the various colleges and schools of the University, and determine what steps might be taken to insure that all graduates of the University of Wisconsin acquired a knowledge of American History and government. In the fall of 1950 the administration requested the faculty Committee on Courses to study this problem, and about the same time the Regents appointed a special committee to study the problems. The Regent committee consisted of Regents Gelatt, Chairman; Campbell, Jones, Kleczka, and Sensenbrenner.

During the year of 1950-51 the Regent committee and the faculty committee held two meetings to discuss this problem. The report of the faculty Committee on Courses was presented to and adopted by the faculty in April 1951 (Faculty Document 994). The specific recommendations of Faculty Document 994 follow:

1. That no single course in education for citizenship be required of undergraduates.
2. That faculty advisers continue to encourage students to elect courses which will increase their effectiveness as citizens.
3. That each department, school and college re-examine its recommendations and requirements to encourage its students to elect courses which will increase their effectiveness as citizens.

This action of the faculty was discussed at length by the Regents, but no action on the document was taken by the Regents. The Regent committee felt that some more positive course of action than that adopted by the faculty was needed. The administration was requested to confer with the faculty and to re-study the problem. During the summer of 1951 the President met with the Administrative Committee of the faculty and a representative group of the faculty members to discuss the matter. It was agreed that this subject could best be studied on the school and college basis, in view of the wide variations in the curricula of the different schools and colleges. The task of reviewing the problem was assigned to either a special or standing committee of each of the schools and colleges enrolling freshmen. These committees are at work and reports will be presented to the respective school and college faculties sometime this fall. The reports and recommendations of the several faculties will then be transmitted to the Regents.

This is the normal procedure, approved by the Regents, for matters of the curriculum.

Gentlemen:

I am pleased to inform you that at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation on September 10, 1951, the Board voted to transfer to the University of Wisconsin the property known as University Houses. In making this grant the Foundation Board of Trustees stipulated that until June 30, 1997, the net income from University Houses shall be used for the support of research in the natural sciences at the University of Wisconsin, including the support of research professorships.

To implement this transfer, the Board of Trustees of the Foundation and the Board of Directors of University Houses, Inc., have approved and executed a proposed agreement, of which I am enclosing three signed originals. The effect of this proposed agreement is to accelerate the provisions of the various instruments relating to University Houses previously entered into between the Regents, the Foundation and University Houses, Inc.

The management contract between the Regents, University Houses, Inc., and the Foundation dated April 9, 1947, provides in part as follows:

"The three parties further mutually acknowledge that at the end of the term of said lease and mortgage according to the terms of said documents and upon payment of the obligations of the Corporation incurred or assumed incidental to the management, maintenance and operation of said properties, all properties covered thereby shall become and be the property of the University. And thereupon said Foundation, at whose pleasure the members of the Corporation acquire and hold their membership therein, will procure the amendment of the Articles of Incorporation of said Corporation so as to transfer to the University the Foundation's control over such memberships or, at the option of the University, will dissolve the Corporation, with consequent distribution of the assets of said Corporation as in its aforesaid Articles provided."

The Foundation believes that in view of the terms of the proposed three party agreement enclosed, no useful purpose will be served by continuing in

existence the Corporation known as University Houses, Inc. It, therefore, suggests that steps be taken by the Foundation to dissolve that Corporation. However, we note that under the above quoted provisions of the management contract, at the University's option the Foundation is obligated either to dissolve University Houses, Inc., or to procure an amendment of the Articles of Incorporation of University Houses, Inc., so as to transfer to the University, control over the memberships therein. Therefore, the Foundation requests that the Regents at their convenience advise the Foundation what disposition they wish the Foundation to make of University Houses, Inc.

We shall appreciate being advised of the action of the Regents in connection with the enclosed proposed agreement.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN  
THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN,  
WISCONSIN ALUMNI RESEARCH FOUNDATION  
AND UNIVERSITY HOUSES, INC.

THIS INDENTURE Made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1951, by and between The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, a body corporate, Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, a Wisconsin corporation, and University Houses, Inc., a Wisconsin corporation, all of the city of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to for purposes of convenience as the Regents, the Foundation and the Corporation respectively, which Indenture shall be effective as of 12:00 P.M., November 30, 1951.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Because of the then existing housing shortage in the city of Madison, it was considered necessary in 1946 to take steps to provide additional housing for faculty members, administrative staff and students at the University of Wisconsin, and the Foundation indicated to the Regents a willingness to arrange for the construction and financing of a housing project through the medium of the Corporation which was set up for that purpose, and

WHEREAS, the following steps were taken to effectuate the construction and financing of said housing project:

1. A 50 year lease dated April 9, 1947, from the Regents to the Corporation of an area of land on the Eagle Heights Farm, said land being more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

1. A parcel of land lying in the south 1/2 of the Northwest 1/4 of Sec. 16 and the Southeast 1/4 of the Northeast 1/4 of Sec. 17, Town 7 North, Range 9 East, Dane County, Wisconsin, more particularly described as follows: Commencing at a point on the South line of the Northeast 1/4 of Section 17, and distant 658.5 Westerly from the East 1/4 corner of said section; thence Easterly along the East and West 1/4 line of Sections 17 and 16 2055.5 feet; thence North 0 degrees 14'44" East 195.7 feet; thence North 01 degrees 24'30" East 354.18 feet; thence North 88 degrees 49'17" West 1221.0 feet to the Easterly boundary of the E. J. Young property; thence, continuing along the Easterly boundary of the E. J. Young property South 29 degrees 26' West 42.5 feet; thence South 38 Degrees 29' West 194.0 feet; thence South 17 degrees 46' West 65.0 feet; thence South 31 degrees 26' West 33.0 feet; thence South 82 degrees 26' West 666.05 feet; thence South 01 degrees 03' West 200.0 feet to point of beginning; also an easement extending Easterly from the East line of the above described premises to University Bay Drive, with permission to construct thereon a 24 foot roadway and permission to use the abutting land for the necessary construction maintenance and drainage of said roadway.

Lot Nine (9) and that part of Lot Ten (10), Block Twelve (12), Plat of College Hills, Village of Shorewood Hills, Dane County, Wisconsin, described as follows: Beginning at the Southwest corner of said Lot Ten (10); thence Easterly forty-five (45) feet along the Southerly line of said Lot; thence Northerly on a line parallel to the Easterly line of said Lot Ten (10) to the Northerly boundary thereof; thence along said Northerly boundary to the Northwest corner thereof; thence along the Westerly line to the place of beginning.

2. A 50 year lease dated April 9, 1947 from the Corporation to the Regents of the buildings, improvements, additions and equipment erected or to be erected on said land.

Said notes were issued by the Corporation and were payable to the order of the Foundation, each note bearing interest at the rate of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ % per annum.

4. A \$2,500,000.00 mortgage from the Corporation to the Foundation dated April 9, 1947, to secure payment of \$2,500,000.00 of the above notes, said mortgage containing the description given in paragraph 1 above.

5. An increase of the aforesaid \$2,500,000.00 mortgage to \$2,750,000.00 pursuant to agreement between the Regents, the Corporation and the Foundation dated October 30, 1948.

(See contract No. 166, item 7, Regent files)

6. A management contract between the Regents, the Corporation and the Foundation dated April 9, 1947 whereby the Corporation was employed by the Regents as its agent to manage, operate and maintain the premises during the term of the mortgage.

(See contract No. 166, item 4, Regent files)

7. A contract between the Corporation and the Village of Shorewood Hills, dated December 30, 1946, whereby the Village agreed to furnish fire fighting facilities, water mains and sewer mains for the project which is located outside the corporate limits of said Village so as not to be otherwise entitled to have such facilities furnished by the Village, and the Village further agreed to convey to the Corporation a one-half interest in certain sewer mains and water mains, in consideration of an undertaking by the Corporation to pay to the Village annually a sum of money equivalent to the tuition rate of non-resident pupils to the Shorewood Hills School multiplied by the number of children residing upon the project actually in attendance at the school during any school year.

8. An easement deed from William R. Curkeet and Mary N. Curkeet, his wife, to the corporation for a right of way to construct, lay and maintain a pipe line for water and a pipe for sewer over and through certain lands in the Village of Shorewood Hills, Dane County, Wisconsin, said lands being more particularly described in said easement deed which was dated July 21, 1948, and recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds for Dane County, Wisconsin, on the 10th day of April, 1950, in Vol. 229 of Misc. on page 130, Document No. 795597, and

WHEREAS, the building project was completed pursuant to the foregoing arrangement and has been occupied by University tenants for some time and the unpaid principal amount of the mortgage has been reduced by some \$61,900.62 and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Foundation and the Corporation to accelerate the provisions of the aforesaid leases, management contract, mortgage notes and mortgage by transferring the property to the Regents at this time and by cancelling the mortgage indebtedness, but with a proviso that the net income from the property, during the unexpired term of the above mentioned leases, be devoted by the Regents to research in the natural sciences, and

WHEREAS, none of the documents hereinbefore mentioned have been recorded in the office of the register of deeds for Dane County, Wisconsin, so as to necessitate the recording of any conveyances, mortgage satisfactions, or other

documents in carrying out the terms of this agreement, except the easement deed mentioned in paragraph No. 8 above, which is to be assigned to the Regents by a recordable instrument.

NOW, THEREFORE, In consideration of the mutual agreements of the parties hereto as herein set forth,

IT IS AGREED that subject to existing leases and agreements with tenants and subject to the existing agreement dated December 30, 1946 between the Village of Shorewood and the Corporation for the furnishing of fire fighting facilities, water mains and sewer mains by said Village:

a. That the Corporation hereby grants, sells and conveys to the Regents, its successors and assigns, or its nominee, all of its right, title, and interest in and to the following described sewer and water mains:

Sewer Main

The sewer main extending from the intersection of Oxford Road and Bowdoin Road, in the Village of Shorewood Hills, to Shorewood Boulevard and thence along Shorewood Boulevard to the intersection of said sewer with the intercepting sewer of the Madison Metropolitan Sewer District between Madison and Middleton on Shorewood Boulevard.

Together with a like interest in all ways, easements and other hereditaments and appurtenances therewith belonging.

Water Main

The 8 inch main on Oxford Road from the point where it connects with the 6 inch water main at Bowdoin Road in the Village of Shorewood Hills to the 8 inch main on Shorewood Boulevard.

The 8 inch main on Shorewood Boulevard from its connection with the said main on Oxford Road to the connection of said main with the main of the City of Madison on Shorewood Boulevard.

The 6 inch water main on Bowdoin Road from the 8 inch main on Oxford Road to the 8 inch main on Shorewood Boulevard.

Together with a like interest in all ways, easements and other hereditaments and appurtenances therewith belonging.

b. That the Corporation hereby grants, sells and conveys to the Regents, its successors and assigns, without any reservations or exceptions whatever, all buildings, improvements, additions, easements, leases, fixtures and equipment or personal property of any character or description used or useful by said Corporation in its operation of said project.

c. That the documents hereinbefore mentioned in paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 be and they hereby are canceled, satisfied and terminated, and each of the parties hereto in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained does hereby release each of the other parties from all obligations therein contained, except as provided in paragraph g. hereof.
