
### HEAD COACH MARK JOHNSON

hen the women's hockey
Badgers needed a new head
coach, they looked no further
than their own backyard, the men's
hockey program.

The third head coach for the women's ice hockey program, Mark Johnson joins the staff after serving the men's program as an assistant coach since 1996. While with the men's program, he helped the team to a WCHA regular-season title during the 1999-00 season, as well as a WCHA Final Five championship in the 1997-98 campaign. Current NHL players Steve Reinprecht (Colorado Avalanche), David Tanabe (Carolina Hurricanes) and Dany Heatley (Atlanta Thrashers) are among those who played for the Badgers during Johnson's UW coaching career.

Prior to his time with the Badgers, Johnson coached in the pro ranks, directing the expansion Madison Monsters for the 1995-96 season and earning Colonial Hockey League Coach of the Year honors for their 37-30-7 mark. He also led a pair of area high schools, serving as the head coach for Verona High School for 1994-95, and as the assistant coach for Madison Memorial High School for 1993-94.

Most recently, Johnson served as an assistant coach with the 2002 U.S. Men's National Team that competed in the 2002 International Ice Hockey Federation World Championship, held April 26-May 11, in Gothenberg, Jonkoping, and Karlstad, Sweden. He had previously served in a similar capacity for the 2000 World Championship in St. Petersburg, Russia. In September 2001, he took part in the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Orientation Camp in Colorado Springs,



featuring 38 of the top American players in the NHL, as an on-ice assistant coach.

One of Wisconsin's most decorated athletes in any sport and a 1991 charter member of the National W Club Hall of Fame, Johnson helped hockey to the 1977 national championship as a frosh. The first Badger to win WCHA Rookie of the Year that season, he went on to become the school's second all-time leading scorer with 256 points on a school-record 125 goals and 131 assists in just three seasons. The 1978-79 WCHA MVP was a two-time first team All-WCHA pick and a two-time All-American. He was also recently selected as one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years."

Johnson has represented USA Hockey, as a player, in 13 international

tournaments, with his most recent appearance as part of the U.S. National Team at the 1998 IIHF (A-Pool) World Championship Qualification Tournament in Austria. Most notably, he led the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team's gold medal-winning effort with 11 points, including two goals in the "Miracle-On-Ice" against the Soviet Union and the game-winning goal against Finland in the final contest. The team attended the opening ceremonies of the 2002 Olympic Winter Games this past February to light the flame and was honored by Sports Illustrated as giving us the 'Greatest Sports Moment of the Century.'

Following his Olympic experience, Johnson embarked on a successful 11-year National Hockey League career. He began his pro tenure with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1980-82), before moving onto the Minnesota North Stars (1982). He also enjoyed stints with the Hartford Whalers (1982-85), St. Louis Blues (1985) and New Jersey Devils (1985-90). Over his 669 career NHL contests, the forward collected 203 goals, 305 assists and 508 points, highlighted by his 87-point season as captain of Hartford in 1983-84. He also tied an NHL All-Star Game record with three assists that year.

A 1999 inductee into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame, Johnson is the son of legendary Wisconsin men's head coach Bob Johnson (1966-82) and brother of former men's assistant coach Peter Johnson (1987-91).

Johnson, 44, earned his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from Wisconsin in 1994. He resides in Madison with his wife Leslie and his five children: Douglas, Christopher, Patrick, Mikayla and Megan.

### Assistant Coaches

#### Tracey Cornell

Ashton, Ontario, native Tracey Cornell begins her fourth season at Wisconsin. She has been with the program since the drop of the first puck and has done everything from recruit to co-coach the team during her tenure.

The energetic Cornell came to Madison after spending the previous year as head girl's hockey coach at Cushing Academy in



Ashburnham, Mass. Cornell led Cushing Academy to a 24-4-2 mark, the most successful season in the history of the program. Her team captured second during the regular season and advanced to the NEPSAC Championship.

Cornell's playing experiences include four years at Cornell University, as well as one year as a professional in Switzerland for the SC Reinach Lions. While at Cornell, she co-captained the hockey program her senior season earning Academic All-Ivy honors both her junior and senior years. Cornell helped the Big Red to the Ivy League hockey title during the 1995–96 season and served as assistant captain during the title run. The one-time Cornell Rookie of the Year also earned team honors as most inspirational player during her sophomore and senior campaigns.


Her stay with the SC Reinach Lions was also successful. The Lions placed second overall in the top Swiss hockey league and were crowned Zurich Cup Tournament Champions during her 1997–98 season.

Cornell earned her bachelor of science degree in marine ecology from Cornell University in 1997. In addition to her time with the hockey program, Cornell played forward for a year with the Big Red women's soccer team.

#### Dan Koch

Koch enters his second year with the women's hockey program. The assistant helped lead the team as co-coach during the second half of last season, proving his value to the Badgers.

He spent his two prior years as an assistant coach with the women's hockey program at St. Mary's (Minn.) University working with the forwards and goaltenders. Also a third-



grade teacher at Franklin Elementary School in LaCrosse, Wis., Koch helped lead the Cardinals to a Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title during the 1999–00 season and a third-place finish at the national tournament in the 2000–01 season.

Before his St. Mary's experience, Koch was the head coach of the LaCrosse Logan/Central High School boys' ice hockey team from 1996–99. He coached all-conference and all-state players during his three-year stint. Koch also coached various ice hockey teams from 1986–95 at all youth levels including park and recreation leagues and travel squads. He also coached soccer in the Madison area as an assistant varsity girl's coach at Madison La Follette and as an assistant for the boys' team at Monona Grove High School from 1986–90.

Koch earned his master's degree in education, teaching and learning this past May from St. Mary's University after earning his bachelor of science degree in elementary education in December of 1991 from the UW. He is a 1985 Madison La Follette High School graduate.

Koch and his wife Jody, a school psychologist in Marshall, Wis., have a six-year old son, Connor, and two foster children, four-year old Jacob and one-year old Malik.



Sharon Eley is in her fourth year with the staff of the women's hockey program after working in the Wisconsin Athletic Administrative offices for a year and a half.


The Monona, Wis., native was instrumental in opening the Athletic Department Welcome Center located on the first floor of Camp Randall Stadium while in her administrative role.

### Administrative Assistant Paul Hickman





In her fourth year with Badger women's hockey, Laura Walluk is the team's athletic trainer.





### **Q&A WITH COACH MARK JOHNSON**

What do you like about the women's hockey program and the overall athletic department here at the UW?

I like getting involved in the hockey program at this early stage. The women's hockey program has only been around for four years and satisfaction will come down the road when I can look back and say I had a positive impact. It gives you a chance to get in, roll up your sleeves and go to work to put a blueprint together.

As for the department, I grew up here around the university. We moved here when I was in third grade and I used to hang around these offices growing up. I've been basically everything here now. I used to work in the maintenance department when I was going to school. I used to sell programs, cokes and hot dogs going up and down the aisles at the football games, and I worked basketball tournaments at the Field House. I was a stick boy for a long time and a student for three years. I was an assistant coach for six years and now have the opportunity to be a head coach so I've run the full gamut. When you talk about climbing the ladder, I guess I started way down at the bottom and now I am running my own program.

I like Madison, I like the university and I like the college game. I like the atmosphere that a coach is put in. I get to teach the game and work with the athletes at this age level. I think it is a real satisfying position to be in if you want to be a coach and make a living at it. From a family and professional standpoint, this is a real good spot to be in.

This is a top program at a top university. We have the ability to sell a quality program for the women who come in here from both an athletic standpoint, and equally important, from an academic standpoint. I would have graduated in four years, but left after my junior year to play professionally. The first thing I did when I retired from professional hockey after 13 years was to come back and get my degree. The university really sells itself when it comes to academics so we have the best of both worlds with a good solid hockey program.

#### What can you tell me about your staff?

I'm excited to work with them and hopefully they are excited to work with me.

Tracey has been around and in the trench-

es for a long time now and does an outstanding job from a recruiting standpoint. She also does an outstanding job with the organizational side including a lot of little things that people on the outside don't see. She compliments me in those areas.

Dan is the same way. He's only been around for one year, but he has a really big heart and a willingness to work at it. Once Tracey and Dan took over last year, the girls responded and that indicates to me that they have a good pulse and handle on what needs to be done.

They will be active, they will be involved and they will make decisions. They are not just going to push pucks around and push pencils. They will be coaches because three sets of eyes are a lot better than one. I've never said I know everything about hockey because I don't. It's an ongoing education and we learn something everyday in practice and in the games.

Forrest knows what the goaltenders are like and does a good job as a volunteer coach. He has been running around the country doing different hockey schools and educating himself. He understands the position and will be helpful in that area.

You have an experienced team, so what do you expect to see from them?

I want to see continued improvement from both an individual and team standpoint. If you can progress and make improvements on a daily, weekly and game-by-game basis, you are doing something right.

As for team goals, I'll probably sit down with the captains and staff and see what they want. In the college game, your senior and junior classes and those leaders inside the locker room are crucial. Our conversations will reveal their vision for themselves and the team. It might be totally different from mine. The senior class will have goals and expectations that are fairly high, which is good because that is where they should be. They are the ultimate leaders of the team and we are there to give direction and instruction. It will come down to what they want and how badly they want to do it.

Most teams that are successful have good upper class leadership. I foresee us being in a good position to have that in place.

You are a new leader for this team. How will you change things? Will you introduce your own style of play?

It's going to be a combination of pulling out some tapes and seeing where the team was at the beginning of last year and where they were at the end. We'll have meetings individually with the players to find out individual strengths and weaknesses, put them down on paper and analyze which way we want to go. We have a quality goalie, some depth in our defense and some scorers, so we have some tools to work with.

I think in hockey, some coaches tend to over-coach and that is where you have to be careful. I tend to be more on the creative and free side and then pull the reigns in. It all comes down to a few things: your ability to make a commitment to the team, having a real positive attitude, working hard, playing hard and being respectful to your opponents. Commitment level and work habits you can control, irrelevant of your talent level. The better they do in controlling those areas, the better chance this team has of being successful.

There will be some new kinks—we are going to carry a few more women than

in previous years so that will create some interesting situations.

The bottom line is that everyone needs to make a commitment to what is best for the team and make contributions, whether big or small. Everybody needs to feel that they are as important as the next person.

I am big on attitude. I think it shapes you as an individual and controls your daily life. You can control your attitude. The coach may bench you, the coach may not play you or you may not think you are being treated fairly, but you still have control of that attitude. If your attitude is shaped in the right direction, your chances of succeeding on the ice, in the classroom and when you walk away with your diploma, are good.

That is the journey we start off here this year and if I can create an atmosphere where they are coming in everyday smiling, ready to learn and work hard, we will have a lot of fun. We all want to win, we all want to play and we all want to make a contribution. If we can have fun and work hard, we will succeed in what we do.

### What does it mean to have the WCHA Final Five at Ralph Engelstad Arena?

It is a big deal. Women's hockey programs need to make progress and take little steps. I think having the tournament there this year is one of those steps that are positive. The venue, in the college ranks, is the best rink in the country. When you speak of all rinks, including NHL, it is in the top two or three for sure.

It's a big tournament, and on the men's side it has evolved into one in which the teams that go are very proud. It's become a great tradition and one that sells out. You have the best teams in the league competing in an atmosphere that has a lot of energy, a lot of enthusiasm and a lot on the line. On the women's side, the tournament is becoming special to the teams that go there. Making it professional and making it first class is appreciated by the teams that have worked hard to get themselves in position to play there. When you go to a venue that size, it makes a statement. As time goes on, hopefully the crowds will get bigger and bigger.

You bring some unique experiences to women's college hockey. How will they affect the program on the ice and in recruiting?

Anytime you have experience it is going to help. It helps on the ice, recruiting and for improving the overall program. You take your experiences as a college player, a professional player, a college coach and a professional coach and incorporate them into the atmosphere that we are in at the UW. The deeper your experience, the better off you are because you are able to learn from the mistakes you have made over the course of time.

From a recruiting standpoint, getting people to feel comfortable with your coaching staff, the atmosphere that you are working in and the school you are working for is a real key. When people know you and can recognize your name, your background, what type of person you are and what type of coach you are, it is an asset that can only be helpful.

What attributes will you be looking for when you are out recruiting?

At this level you need a mix. We look at a student-athlete's academics in combination with a talent level that can play for a Division I team. The pool is getting deeper and deeper as we go along in time. For hockey skills, I look at skating, puck handling, hockey sense and commitment to improvement. Hopefully, we can provide someone with that mix an opportunity to grow. At this time, there really is no professional hockey or place for women to play after college unless they play for a national or Olympic team, so they need to be well-rounded. They need to get their diploma and move on with their lives when they graduate, and at the same time be a talented enough player to make a contribution.

It's an information gathering process and the more information gathered on a student-athlete, the better chance you have to make an educated decision on whether they will fit into your program. The same thing goes for the student-athlete's side. They need to educate themselves on the University of Wisconsin and all the things we offer and can provide. The better job both parties do in gathering information, the better chance of making a decision that will be in the best interest of both parties.

We will try to find and identify student-athletes to the best of our ability. We are looking for the top players, whether they are from Wisconsin, the United States, Canada or Europe, who will make our program solid year after year.

You said the pool of student-athletes is getting larger. Does that make it easier to recruit?

It makes the level of play better. When you widen the base of players, it makes for a higher quality of player. The younger players who are coming up will be able to see goals that the girl's now didn't have before. There weren't many college programs five years ago, but now you have different leagues and different universities providing scholarships. It gives an incredible opportunity for those that get the chance.

The recruiting process is ongoing, whether it is a deep pool or not. You try and identify women that will make your program better. The State of Minnesota probably has the highest numbers because of its high school programs and it will continue to grow, but there are good women players all over. Making it easier or harder will depend on other universities continuing to add programs. If universities continue to add women's hockey programs, which I hope they do, then it makes it challenging because there are more schools competing for those talented players. If we see a leveling off of women's programs added, it will make it easier because there will be more players and only so many scholarships.

You have to stay on top of the recruiting process because that is a program's bloodline. You must continue to do a good job because what sells a student-athlete on a school is your academics, your team, the league you play in, the program you run and the social atmosphere of the program. If those are really solid, then you have the ability to recruit anybody.

### 2002-03 Women's Hockey Preview

he 2002–03 season marks a turning point in the Wisconsin women's ice hockey program. The Badgers begin their fourth year and will graduate their first senior class. The group - Kendra Antony, Kathy Devereaux, Kelly Kegley, Julia Ortenzio, Sis Paulsen, Jackie MacMillan, Michelle Sikich and Kerry Weiland - have become some of the signature names and faces of the Wisconsin Badgers.

But before goodbyes are shared, there is the business of their senior seasons to attend to. They are an experienced bunch, but, like the rest of the team, will deal with a new leader behind the bench. Mark Johnson, one of the UW's all-time great hockey players and one of the men's team's assistant coaches the last six seasons, assumed the role of head coach this past spring. The leading scorer for the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team's "Miracle on Ice" performance will look to share his magic, and his experiences as an 11-year National Hockey League veteran and NHL All-Star, with his eager brood.

Johnson will look to a stellar defense to anchor his squad. The team finished the 2001–02 regular season as the nation's best defense averaging 1.41 goals-against per game. They completed the year ranked second, but still helped goaltender Jackie MacMillan to the nation's lowest goals-against average.

The second-team All-WCHA goal-tender, MacMillan allowed just 1.30 goals against on average to lead the nation. She also ranked fifth in the country with a .934 save percentage and ranked third with 22 victories. MacMillan looks to Californian Jessica Bernal as her returning back up.

It may not matter who the Badgers play in goal because of their defensive corps. Sophomore Carla MacLeod exploded onto the scene, collecting more points along the blue line than any other league rookie defender. The WCHA All-Tournament defender finished the season with 25 points on 23 assists and a pair of goals. Her numbers put her third among league defenders in scoring, fourth among league rookies in scoring and third among league players in assists

2001–02 captain Sis Paulsen shared the league's fourth spot for defense scoring with 23 points while posting a four-point weekend that was good enough for WCHA Player of the Week honors. Fellow classmate Kerry Weiland, Wisconsin's first women's hockey first-team All-American, proved her worth with selection to the All-WCHA first team, the Academic All-WCHA squad, the WCHA All-Tournament and the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-District team. Weiland nearly single-handedly brought the team the WCHA Final Five title with two goals in the championship contest.

Sophomore Molly Engstrom, a league rookie of the week last year, threatens opponents with her powerplay point shots. Last season, she connected four times for power-play goals to rank second on the team and seventh in the league.

In addition to the decorated defensive foursome, Wisconsin welcomes the return of U.S. National Team player Nicole Uliasz. The sophomore spent the fall semester of the 2001–02 season touring with players that represented the United States at the Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Putting the puck in the net to complement a stingy defense will land squarely on the shoulders of the Badger forwards. Despite playing six less games than the league scoring leader, junior Meghan Hunter used a torrid second-half scoring pace last season to climb within three points of the league scoring title. Her 1.41 points-per-game average was tops in the league, as were her seven game-winning goals. Hunter will again be relied upon to lead the UW offense.

All-time leading scorer senior Kendra Antony, who ranked sixth in the league with 39 points a year ago, will help. Antony became the first player in school history to crack the career 100point barrier early last year and boasts 134 points in three seasons with the UW.

After Hunter and Antony, three UW defenders paced Badger point scorers, but junior forwards Steph Millar and Karen Rickard stood third and fourth in goal scoring. Millar recorded nine goals and 18 points, while Rickard posted 10 goals and 16 points.

The scoring burden will also fall on sophomore Jackie Friesen. The towering forward collected 15 points with seven goals in her inaugural campaign. She made her second Canadian Under-22 National Team this past summer. Senior Kathy Devereaux, a WCHA Rookie of the Week last season, will use her speed to create headaches for her opponents and scoring chances for her teammates.

The return of senior Michelle Sikich to the lineup will be a welcome addition. The former co-captain, a red-shirt last season, brings 30 goals in two years wearing cardinal and white. Sikich's former linemate, senior Kelly Kegley, has shown scoring touch as well - she shared the team scoring lead as a frosh.

Wisconsin looks forward to the point in the season when sophomore Amy Vermeulen joins the lineup. She will begin the season with the Badger soccer squad before displaying her vision on the ice. The forward spent most of the summer helping Canada to a runner-up finish at the FIFA Under-19 Women's World Championship.

Other returners up front include gritty senior Julia Ortenzio, versatile junior Kathryn Greaves, and sophomores Jocelyn Cookson and Leah Federman.

Five newcomers infuse enthusiasm into the program, as well as more scoring. Grace Hutchins, a gifted scorer from neighboring Illinois, joins Ms. Minnesota Hockey finalist Sharon Cole, a gifted play-maker. Michigan's Katie Temple will also look for playing time.

A pair of Wisconsin student-athletes who played on high school boys' teams will play with the Badger women as well. Local product Nikki Burish, the first Badger from Madison, joins brother Adam on a UW hockey roster. Megan Horras, Appleton United's all-conference honorable mention goaltender, gives the Badgers a bright future in keeping the puck out of the net.

The UW opens the season with a pair of home games against Northeastern, Oct. 12-13. Two weeks later, the Badgers dive into their league schedule with two games against twotime defending NCAA champion Minnesota-Duluth. Thirty-three games are scheduled for the Badgers, with more on tap should the Badgers make the WCHA Women's Final Five at Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, N.D. A trip to the NCAA Women's Frozen Four in Duluth, Minn., that would extend the season past the 35-game mark, would also be a well-deserved end to the careers of this senior class.

# 2001-02 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

MAKING STRIDES: In its third season, the Wisconsin women's ice hockey team (22-11-2, 17-6-1 WCHA) took another step towards joining the elite in college hockey. The Badgers finished in a second-place tie in league standings, earning the No. 2 seed for the WCHA Women's Final Five. The Badgers then took second in the postseason tournament, their highest finish to date. It was the second-consecutive season Wisconsin reached 20 wins.

A TALE OF TWO CITIES: The Badgers finished the season among the best in the nation. In its last 18 games, Wisconsin went 15-3-0. Six of the 15 wins came against teams ranked in the nation's top 10 and three came against eventual NCAA champion Minnesota-Duluth. All three of the losses were on the road and by one goal, while two were at the hands of the No. 1 team in the country. Wisconsin led the WCHA with an 11-1-0 conference mark during the second half of the season.

WCHA WOMEN'S FINAL FIVE: Seeded as the No. 2 team for the 2002 WCHA Women's Frozen Four, the Badgers faced the eventual NCAA champions in the first round and skated to a 4-1 victory over Minnesota-Duluth.

The Badgers advanced to face WCHA regular-season champion Minnesota, then ranked No. 1 in the nation. After falling behind, 3-0, at the midpoint of the game, the Badgers mounted a furious comeback. Outshot 9-7 after one period, the Badgers held advantages of 17-9 and 14-4 over the final two periods, ending the game with a 40-20 edge in shots. Junior Kerry Weiland scored a powerplay goal late in the second period to draw within 3-1. The defender scored again late in the third period to make it a 3-2 contest, but the Badgers never got the tying score.

STREAK BUSTERS: Wisconsin broke the two longest unbeaten streaks in WCHA history. On Jan. 6, 2002, in Duluth, Minn., the Badgers defeated previously undefeated Minnesota-Duluth with a 3-1 win. The Bulldogs were 13-0-3 at the time and were in the midst of a 23-game unbeaten string dating back to Feb. 17, 2001. Wisconsin would go on to sweep UMD and hand the Bulldogs their first-ever home sweep.

On Feb. 16, the Badgers struck again. Wisconsin traveled to Minneapolis and snapped Minnesota's 24-game unbeaten streak with a 2-0 win over the Gophers. The loss at home was the first for Minnesota since Oct. 22, 2000, a span of 30 games. The home shutout loss was the first since Dec. 4, 1999 for the Gophers, a 45-game stretch.

ON THE DEFENSIVE: At the end of the regular season, Wisconsin led the nation with a 1.41 goals-against per-game average. They finished the entire season with the second-rated defense, averaging 1.46 goals-against per game.

The Badger defense was also offensiveminded with four Badger defenders in the top 10 of WCHA defense scoring. Frosh Carla MacLeod was third with 25 points, Sis Paulsen was tied for fourth with 23 points, Kerry Weiland was sixth with 22 points and Molly Engstrom finished tied for 10th with 15 points.

SHUTOUTS: Nine of Wisconsin's 22 victories came in the form of shutouts. The Badgers shutout then-No. 10 Ohio State and Minnesota State three times, while also blanking then-No. 1 Minnesota, Boston College and Findlay. Wisconsin went over four games in one stretch, a span of 261 minutes, 35 seconds, without allowing a goal.

ALL-AMERICANS: Junior assistant captain Kerry Weiland and sophomore Meghan Hunter were rewarded for the second-consecutive season as Jofa/American Hockey Coaches Association All-Americans.

Weiland was named first-team All-American as a defender, the first Badger to reach such acclaim in the three-year history of Wisconsin women's hockey. She was a second-team selection as a sophomore. Hunter was named a second-team All-American forward for the second year. Weiland and Hunter were two of just four repeat selections on the team.

The Badgers had the second-most representatives on the squads and the most of any team in the WCHA.

ALL-WCHA: Three Badgers were selected to All-WCHA teams. Junior defender Kerry Weiland and sophomore forward Meghan Hunter made the first team for the secondstraight season. Junior goaltender Jackie MacMillan earned her second All-WCHA honor with her pick to the second team.

ACADEMIC ALL-WCHA: Ten Badgers qualified for the WCHA All-Academic Team, second most in the league. Named to the squad were juniors Kendra Antony, Kelly Kegley, Jackie MacMillan, Julia Ortenzio, Sis Paulsen, Melanie Schmitt, Kerry Weiland, and sophomores Stephanie Boeckmann, Kathryn Greaves and Stephanie Millar.

ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAM: A pair of Wisconsin defenders, junior Kerry Weiland and frosh Carla MacLeod, helped the Badgers to a runner-up finish at the WCHA Women's Final Five and were honored for their performances. Weiland scored both Wisconsin goals in the championship game against Minnesota, while MacLeod set up three of the UW's four goals in the semifinal win over eventual NCAA champion Minnesota-Duluth.

ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT: Junior Kerry Weiland became the first women's hockey Badger to make the Verizon Academic All-District team when she made the first team of the spring at-large squad. The first-team All-

American is a legal studies major with a 3.52 grade-point average.

SCORING LEADER: A torrid second-half of the season brought sophomore Meghan Hunter to the top of the UW scoring chart. The center collected 45 points on a team-leading 23 goals and 22 assists. Junior Kendra Antony ranked second with 39 points. Hunter also led the team with 11 power-play goals, seven game-winning goals and 119 shots.

100 POINTS: The first three Badgers in program history broke the 100-point career plateau last season. The first was junior forward Kendra Antony, who currently leads all career scorers with 134 points. Antony reached 100 points on Oct. 13, in her 72nd career game. Her third-period assist against St. Cloud State gave her the mark. Sophomore Meghan Hunter became the second member of the club with her assist against Findlay on Jan. 13 in her 53rd career tilt. Junior Kerry Weiland became the first defender and third person overall, to reach the milestone. Weiland's 100th point came at Boston College. Her third point of the contest, on an assist, put her at the mark in her 92nd game.

50 WINS: Junior goaltender Jackie MacMillan became the first Badger goaltender to record 50 career wins when she made 15 saves to shutout then-No. 10 Ohio State in a 3-0 victory on Feb. 23. The milestone was reached in her 80th career decision. For the season, MacMillan won all 22 games for Wisconsin, the first season a UW goaltender reached 20 wins

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK: The Badgers were recognized seven times during the season for individual performances and twice by U.S. College Hockey Online. Four players were named WCHA Players of the Week including Kendra Antony, Sis Paulsen, Jackie MacMillan and Meghan Hunter (twice). Two Badgers, junior Kathy Devereaux and frosh Molly Engstrom, were selected WCHA Rookies of the Week. Goaltender Jackie MacMillan was twice recognized as the U.S. College Hockey Online National Defensive Player of the Week.

**POLLS:** Preseason No. 4, according to the *USA Today/American Hockey Magazine* Poll,
Wisconsin also reached the No. 4 ranking in the U.S. College Hockey Online Poll during the season. The No. 4 rating was the highest in history for the UW women. The Badgers finished ranked seventh in both polls. The Badgers also finished the season seventh in the pairwise rankings.







# WISCONSIN HOCKEY TRADITION

#### NCAA Championships

In winning five NCAA Championships, the Wisconsin men's ice hockey program has proved itself to be one of the elite in college hockey. The UW ranks third in the collegiate hockey community along with Denver for most national titles. The Badgers won their first national crown in 1973 and followed with titles in 1977, 1981, 1983 and 1990.

#### NCAA Appearances

The Badgers have appeared in 19 NCAA Championships and have been in the NCAA Frozen Four 10 times. In its first national championship appearance in 1970, Wisconsin finished third at the NCAA Championship.

#### All-Americans

Badger players have earned 33 All-American honors since 1970, the most of any school in the WCHA. John Jagger was the first All-American at UW, earning the honor in 1970. Three players in Wisconsin history, Craig Norwich, Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson, have two first-team All-America accolades.

#### Attendance Leaders

Fans of Wisconsin ice hockey continually show their support in mass. The Badgers have led the nation in attendance for nearly 28 years averaging close to 8,500 spectators per game at the Dane County Coliseum. That average has skyrocketed the past four seasons as the men made the move to the Kohl Center, which seats 15,237 for hockey.

#### Legendary Coaches

Wisconsin men's ice hockey has been fortunate enough to have two legendary coaches in its ranks.

Bob Johnson coached at Wisconsin for 15 years and compiled a 367-175-23 record. He is the winningest coach in UW history with a .670 winning percentage. Johnson also coached the 1976 U.S. Olympic Team in Innsbruck, Austria, as well as coaching the 1973, 1974, 1975 and 1981 U.S. National Teams. In honor to his lifelong service to hockey, USA Hockey has dedicated "Bob Johnson Drive" in Colorado Springs.

Jeff Sauer is considered by many in the hockey community to be one of the greatest mentors of all time. Sauer is the winningest coach in WCHA history with 655 career wins and ranks fourth on the NCAA's all-time win list. Sauer spent 31 years as a collegiate coach and 20 with the UW. He guided his teams to a pair of NCAA titles (1983, 1990), 12 NCAA appearances, two WCHA titles in 1990 and 2000, and five WCHA playoff titles.

#### Badgers in the Pros

The Badgers have had 30 players go on to play in the National Hockey League, and 10 that are currently on an NHL roster. Chris Chelios, one of the most notable former Badgers, has had great success in the NHL as a nine-time All-Star and three-time Norris Trophy Winner. Curtis Joseph is one of the NHL's top goal-tenders. He guided the Edmonton Oilers into the Stanley Cup playoffs in 1997–98.

Wisconsin has had 18 of its players earn the highest distinction of representing their country in Olympic play since 1976. Bob Lundeen was one of the first UW Olympians, playing on the 1976 US team. Mark Johnson and Bob Suter were members of the 1980 gold medal-winning U.S. Olympic Team in Lake Placid, N.Y. Johnson was the team's leading scorer with five goals and six assists for 11 points.

# Wisconsin Women's Hockey History

#### **Women's History**

On April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program. Women's ice hockey, brand new to the athletic department, already had a longstanding history at the UW.

A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for over 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women: Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz, the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice throughout the years.

The three founders of the club organized a women's scrimmage hour at 10:15 p.m., on Sunday nights at the new campus skating rink dubbed "The Shell." The trio put up signs throughout campus and recruited players by word of mouth. In the spring of 1975, once they had enough "regulars", they applied for Club Sport status through the UW's Recreation Sports division. During the early years, they recruited players by putting up tables during spring and fall registration. In 1976, the group scheduled its first competitive game against the University of Minnesota club team.

By 1981, the number of club members had reached such a height that the

club split into two separate squads. The following year, the club became a charter member of the Minnesota Women's Hockey Association, now called the Minnesota Girls' and Women's Hockey Association.

One important source on campus provided the critical encouragement and support to the club: men's head coach Bob Johnson. Johnson was instrumental in getting the club interviewed during radio broadcasts of the men's games. With his support, they also arranged to play some games at the Dane County Coliseum immediately after the men's team played.

A concerted effort led to a second club expansion for the 1992-93 season. The club split into three teams after putting up posters, having a description of the team in a university recreational sports pamphlet and sitting at tables during annual sports recruiting days at the union each fall.

In 1991, prior to the expansion, peewee girls from throughout Madison were skating with boys' teams. All that changed when a new team of girls formed, the Wisconsin Challengers. Members of the UW Club assisted in the formation of the new organization in an effort to generate more interest in hockey in young girls of Madison. The team soon formed a midget squad as well.

Interest continues to explode each season and the Wisconsin Recreation Department now sponsors three club teams. The A team travels throughout the Midwest competing against other club programs. The current club teams, A, B, and C, continue to play even with the establishment of the varsity program. In fact, three members of the Badgers' inaugural team made the squad from the ranks of the UW Club.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998 when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media. A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years.

The Badgers officially opened their history on October 8, 1999 when 3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota-Duluth at the Kohl Center. With Olympic Gold Medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Governor Tommy Thompson in attendance, and the game televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television, the Badgers finally hit the ice.

The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey.

#### WCHA History

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, or WCHA, is the oldest of the Division I college hockey leagues recognized by the NCAA. It was formed in 1959 as an outgrowth of two earlier western college associations, the Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League and the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League. The Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League, the first version of the WCHA, was founded in 1951 by Colorado College, Denver, Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech, Minnesota and North Dakota. The league changed its name to the WIHL in 1953 to better reflect the location of its members. Throughout the 1950s, the WIHL was very successful in winning NCAA championships. Except for 1949 and 1954, all of the NCAA crowns were won by the WIHL teams. Michigan alone won six titles.

There was no conference play during the 1958–59 season, but the league began play again in 1959 with the WCHA moniker.

In 1966, Minnesota-Duluth became the first team to be added to the league, followed by the addition of Wisconsin in 1969 and Notre Dame in 1971.

WCHA members captured most of the national hockey championships during the 1960s and 1970s. Except for 1967, 1971–72 and 1978, the national champion trophy remained in the display case of a WCHA team.

In 1981, Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech and Notre Dame resigned and joined the more compact Central Collegiate Hockey Association. In 1984, the WCHA reclaimed Michigan Tech and welcomed Northern Michigan from the CCHA.

The 1986–87 season saw the University of North Dakota win the NCAA title. In 1989–90, the Wisconsin Badgers put the WCHA back on top by sweeping to the WCHA and NCAA Championships with a 36-9-1 record. With the 1990–91 campaign, the league added a new member in St. Cloud State.

In 1992, the membership voted to accept the University of Alaska Anchorage as a full-time member beginning with the 1993–94 season.

After 10 distinguished years as the guiding force behind the success of the WCHA, Otto Breitenbach retired as commissioner at the end of the 1993–94 season. Named as his successor was Bruce McLeod, a major contributor to the league over the years, and a former UMD Bulldog hockey player.

North Dakota won the 1996–97 national championship for the WCHA with a 6-4 win over Boston University in Milwaukee. The championship gave the conference its 30th national team title.

Following the 1996–97 season, Northern Michigan left the WCHA to rejoin the CCHA. Minnesota State University, Mankato filled the void beginning with the 1999–2000 season. The same season, North Dakota won the national title with a 4-2 win over Boston College in Providence, R.I.

The 1999-2000 season also marked the first year for the WCHA-Women's League. Bemidji State, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth, MSU, Mankato, Ohio State, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin made up the charter membership. Sara Martin was hired in June of 1999 to serve the league as the Associate Commissioner. Martin, who earned college degrees from Wisconsin and MSU, Mankato, served the WCHA as tournament director for the 1994, 1996 and 1998 WCHA Final Five Playoff Championships, and was tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Div. I Men's Ice Hockey Championship.

The women's league has quickly established itself as a force, sending two teams to the four-team national championship in its first season and having conference runner-up Minnesota take home the national title. League-member Minnesota-Duluth won the inaugural NCAA Frozen Four Championship at Mariucci Arena in Minneapolis in 2001 and met President George W. Bush at the White House to help celebrate. The Bulldogs repeated the performance during 2002 in Durham, N.H., and made a return trip to the White House.



# **FACILITIES**

isconsin plays nine of its home games at the state-of-the-art Kohl Center during the 2002–03 season. The 15,237-seat arena, the second largest college-owned facility in the country, is named after U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history.

The \$76.4 million building contains an ice surface 200 feet long by 100 feet wide. The arena is also used for men's hockey, and men's and women's basketball, as well as concerts and other special events. Artists such as the Backstreet Boys, Shania Twain, Matchbox 20, The Dave Matthews Band and Elton John, among others, have graced the Kohl Center stage.

The facility also includes the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion and plaza, built primarily from a \$10 million pledge from former All-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas. The pavilion houses three full-sized basketball courts

and is used by the two basketball teams for practice sessions when the Kohl Center is booked for other events.

The Badgers will also play home games at Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, Wis., just west of Madison. The 1,300-seat arena provides a more intimate setting for the Badger women. Located at 2615 Evergreen Road, the rink opened in late 1999 when the Badgers played host to No. 1 Harvard.

The UW will also play one contest at the Eagle's Nest in Verona, Wis. The



Badgers open the season in the town just southwest of Madison when they play host to Northeastern on Oct. 12.

Wisconsin holds practice at the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, also know as The Shell, located adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium. Beginning with the 2002–03 season, the team will have use of a brand new locker room built as an addition to the south end of the practice facility. Included in the complex is a skate sharpening room, coaches room, classroom complete with practice goal and boards, as well as dress down and locker rooms. The new area is part of the expanded Wisconsin Wall of Fame.

The women's hockey team also makes use of the McClain Athletic Facility, just north of the The Shell. The McClain houses the 15,000 square-foot Fetzer Academic Center, where student-athletes take advantage of 40 personal

computers, 11 study rooms, open area with 30 study carrels, a 55-seat auditorium and a full-time advising staff.

The McClain includes a weight room, with more than 50 wieght machines and 45,000 pounds of free weights, a 90-yard indoor football practice field and one of the finest sports medicine complexes in the nation. The sports medicine area includes a 50-foot, two-lane rehabilitation pool and an onsite x-ray facility.





ore than 41,000 students populate the UW campus with almost 29,000 undergraduates, more than 8,000 graduate students and more than 2,000 professional students in numerous fields.

# STUDENT HOUSING

The University Residence Halls provide you with a comfortable, smokefree living environment and many resources to help you succeed academically at the university.

Each UW-Madison residence hall has unique qualities based on its architecture, size, and location. But much of your living experience is ultimately shaped by the residents who live there. Each hall's "personality" changes every year based on the residents' contributions to their community.

The undergraduate residence halls are divided into smaller units called "houses" where 50 to 80 residents live and form a community. #### **JOHN WILEY**

John Wiley was named chancellor of Wisconsin in January 2001, becoming the university's 27th leader.

Prior to being named chancellor, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He was also the dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

In his positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He has also been deeply involved in fundraising.

As provost, Wiley was chief operating officer and deputy chancellor working in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at Wisconsin as a National Science Foundation fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.

Wiley joined the Wisconsin faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. He was the co-founder of several highly successful research centers.

#### PAT RICHTER

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, became Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An All-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963–71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic All-America honors in 1962. He was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. Richter received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the Verizon/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., becoming vice president of personnel prior to joining the athletic department staff.

#### DAVID MCDONALD

David McDonald, the former chair of the UW Athletic Board, is in his second year as the special assistant to the chancellor for athletics.

McDonald, a professor in the history department, was a member of the board since 1994 and chaired the personnel committee for one year.

A UW professor since 1988, McDonald offers courses in the history of pre-revolutionary Russia, as well as modern Europe. His research and publications cover a variety of topics including: bureaucratic politics in the early twentieth century, nineteenth century Russian thought, and the social history of the eighteenth century nobility.

A native of Saskatoon, Sask., in Canada, McDonald earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Toronto. He received his Ph.D. from Columbia University.





# ■ WISCONSIN ATHLETICS MISSION STATEMENT

The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Wisconsin-Madison dedicates itself to the mission of providing athletic opportunities to a wide range of students and an environment in which all student-athletes can achieve their academic and competitive goals. # **BADGER NICKNAME**

The nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

## **BUCKY BADGER**

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

### **BUD SONG**

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

# ■ FIFTH QUARTER

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

### ON WISCONSIN

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

# **ACADEMIC & STUDENT SERVICES**

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. Wisconsin student-athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system.

Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors and three learning specialists who conduct the program offered to the nearly 750 student-athletes. The advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Thomas Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda and Alan Zussman along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt, Maryellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas, have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic All–Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

# FETZER STUDENT-ATHLETE CENTER

The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.



# SPORTS MEDICINE

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.


The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of 11 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jan Helwig, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Laura Walluk, Ian Wood, and Chad Gabbard utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician Dr. John Orwin while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

# STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component of all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Head strength and conditioning coach John Dettmann along with assistant coaches Brian Bott, Ryan Feek, Paul Goodman, Scott Hettenbach, Kerri Ariens, and Jim Snider work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Camp Randall Stadium and Kohl Center.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Badger Den is comprised of purely free weight equipment. There are five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a station to do dips. There is also three lat-pull machines and seated row machines. The Stadium weight room has a complete set of dumbbells from five pounds to 85 pounds. There is also a set of plyometric boxes for plyometrics and for alternative leg exercises.


