This action shall apply to the 1931-32 distribution.

Director Goodnight came to the meeting to present the budget for the 1933 summer session and the following action was taken:

VOTED, That in view of the uncertainty with regard to legislative appropriations and realization of estimated fee receipts, the Regents approve the 1933 summer session budget, totaling \$109,945.86, with reservation of the right to reduce the salary scale (after the opening of the session) if absolutely necessary, to balance the budget.

^{8.} That upon the recommendation of Mr. Halverson, the resignation of Howard Christiansen, Dormitory Fellow in Bashford House, Tripp Hall, be accepted, effective January 7, 1933.

9. That the memorandum of agreement dated November 2, 1927, (and amended December 4, 1929) between the University and Mr. Robert Erickson for the rental of a part of the University Boat House be amended as follows:

For the fiscal year 1932-33, the rental shall be \$300 instead of \$500. Adopted.

10. That the part of the University Boat House used for the rental of canoes, row boats, etc., be leased to Robert Erickson, the present lessee, for a period of five years, beginning July 1, 1933. The rent for the first year shall be \$300 and for subsequent years it shall be \$500. These rental amounts may be changed by mutual agreement. The University reserves the right to cancel the lease upon one year's notice.

In connection with presenting application before the Federal Commissioner of Internal Revenue for exemption from admissions' taxes to state university and college athletic contests, it was VOTED, That the University of Wisconsin should stand its share of the cost of carrying the matter to the courts for determination, if this is decided to be necessary or desirable.
