**BADGERS SAVED BY MOLL  
NEAR END OF THE GAME.**

Long Kick Averts Ignominious Defeat  
at Hands of Marquette, Making the  
Score Nine to Six.

Madison, Wis., Oct. 31.—[Special.]—  
"Keckle" Moll saved Wisconsin from ignominious defeat at the hands of Marquette today by kicking a goal from the thirty yard line at the close of the second half, making the score 9 to 6 in favor of the Badgers. Moll was unsuccessful in three previous attempts at drop kicks.

A spectacular run of fifty-five yards by Foley on a forward pass from Wright scored a touchdown for Marquette. The Badgers did not use the forward pass with success, being unable to withstand the heavy Marquette mass plays. After a continual exchange of punts between Moll and Meyer in the first half Dean fell on the ball after Moll had punted to Marquette's twenty-five yard line. Boyle gained fifteen yards and Wilce crossed the line for a touchdown after more punting. Wright passed the ball fifteen yards to Foley, who made his great run for the touchdown. Wright kicked a goal. The score at the first half was: Marquette, 6; Wisconsin, 5.

Late in the second half Capt. Rogers spectacularly intercepted a forward pass. This was the signal for a brace, and Moll soon had a chance at a dropkick from the fifteen yard line, but failed. **German Play.**

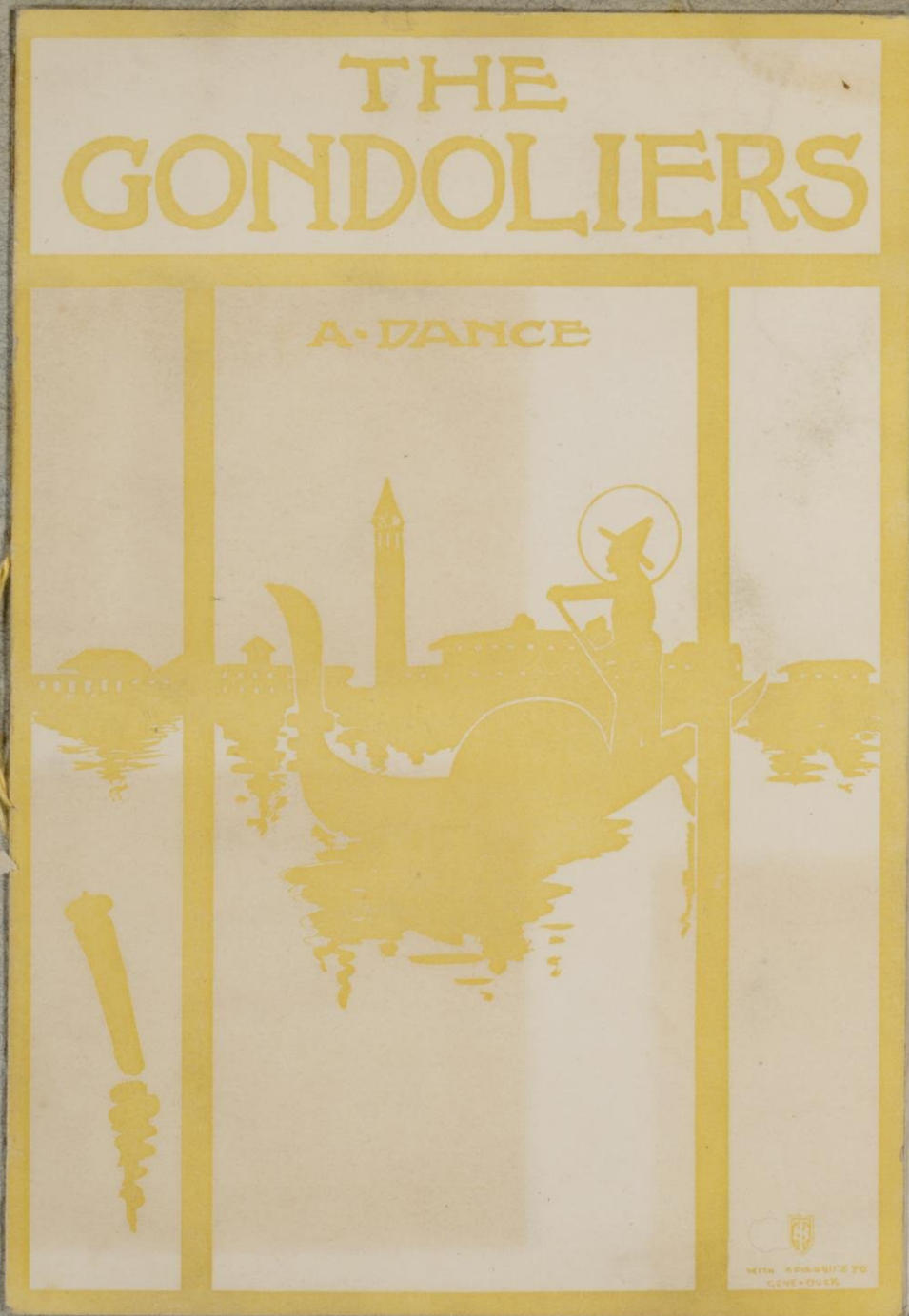

Dancing Doll a Pleasing and  
Highly Appreciated Success

The Dancing Doll, one of the most charming musical comedies ever produced in Madison, was given last evening at the Fuller by the Haresfoot dramatic club of the university. The book and lyrics were written by Horatio G. Winslow, '04, and the music was composed by Herbert Stothart. The fact of local authorship made the performance all the more pleasing to the packed house of college and town people. Another novel feature was the assuming of the roles of the fair sex, from leading lady to chorus girls by the fellows of the Haresfoot club.

Although this is the first time in the history of Wisconsin dramatics that an entirely original comic opera has been attempted, the play was received with great applause and the many catchy little songs were repeated again and again in response to the uproarious demand from the house. The play has two acts, the first on board the "Bounding Bedelia" and the second on an island, the home of a pirate band. A down-and-out actor has a dancing doll that he is about to sell when it is broken. In his dire need of money he induces Axel Axelson, "a good, honest Norwaygan feller," to impersonate the doll. When the ship is captured by pirates the doll is taken for the wife of King Blackbeard. Three or four different couples furnish the usual amount of lovemaking for a play of this kind.

Carl Cunningham as the dancing doll was splendid, but as a "Norwaygan feller" he was right in his element. His home is near enough to Minneapolis to make him a master of Swedish dialect. Milton Blair as Bendigo Bangs, the stranded actor, was equally well adapted to his part. Belial Bunderbuns, an ancient gentleman but an ardent lover, was act-

ed by Mr. Piffner in great style. Each member of the cast was amply fitted for his part, but those that made the greatest hits were the ones appearing in feminine attire. George B. Hill, Russell Crawford and William D. Richardson assumed these difficult parts with as much grace and sweetness as one could look for in Ethel Barrymore.

WISCONSIN WINS U.S.  
FORESTRY BUREAU

BADGER STATE GIVEN NOTABLE  
RECOGNITION BY THE FEDERAL  
GOVERNMENT.

TO ERECT \$30,000 LABORATORY.

Regents Already Have Set Aside  
Funds to Start Work—Big Interests are Aided.

The University of Wisconsin wins handsome recognition from the government of the United States, in being selected as the location for the great central and consolidated laboratory of the forest service. The choice of locations lay between Michigan and Wisconsin universities and Wisconsin has won.

The university regents have appropriated \$30,000 for the construction of a building, in the planning of which the forest service officials will take a hand.

The new establishment will represent the consolidation of three now maintained by the government and will carry on a most important branch of work.

FOR NEW PULP MATERIAL.

It is not distinctly in line with work commonly considered related to forestry. It relates rather to the uses and utilities of woods and their by-products to study of soils, fertilizers, etc., with reference to their adaptability in tree culture. The institution will have about twenty-five employes and from the start a salary list of over \$30,000 a year, with every prospect of doubling in size and importance in a very short time.

One important work to be carried on there will be the production of wood pulp from materials not now used. The government is very anxious to make these experiments succeed. Recently in Colorado, a weed was discovered whose sap makes rubber. It seems to be commercially valuable and practicable. It will be tried out at Madison with much care. In short, there is a vast field of usefulness for the laboratory.

IS SCHOOL OF FORESTRY.

Michigan, Illinois, Purdue and Cornell universities were all after the big laboratory, Michigan and Cornell making an especially strong showing. The railroad and switching facilities offered by the site at Madison had much to do with the decision.

The new laboratory will be available to university students and members of the faculty for investigate work and the members of the station staff will give lectures to students on the various phases of forestry in which work is being done in the laboratory. The university will thus have practically all the advantages of a school of forestry that will be the most thorough equipped in the country.

HELPS BIG INTERESTS.

All the experimental work in forestry carried on by the United States government east of the Rocky mountains will be concentrated in the laboratory here. This will be the only station of its kind maintained by the United States government with the exception of a smaller laboratory on the Pacific coast.

The character of the investigations to be undertaken makes the establishment of the station at Wisconsin of the greatest importance to the paper and lumber interests of the state.

# History, Object, and Work of Pythia

Aimee Zillmer, '11

The Pythian Literary society was founded in 1902 by a group of girls prominent in university circles who appreciated the advantages to be derived from exercise in debate, recitations and composition. Rules of organization were therefore drawn up and work was outlined which was aimed to develop women of poise, who could successfully address a small assembly.

Since then the Society has flourished, stimulated by friendly competition with other women's literary societies. The weekly meetings were held in the lecture room of Library hall until the completion of Lathrop hall, since when Pythia has had her own room on the fourth floor.

Each year the Sophomores of Pythia contend in the Sophomore Open from which the successful contestant is sent as Pythia's representative in the Junior Ex. Miss Gertrude Kitchell represented the society this year with the oration, "Kansas Struggle."

Probably the first step toward interscholastic work in a literary line among women was taken by Pythia this spring when the two offices of corresponding secretaries were created. It is intended that Pythia keep in touch with literary societies throughout the country. The advantages of a corresponding system were emphasized when the "Amazons" was produced, and suggestions were sent from Vassar where the play was recently staged. Gretchen Schoenleber and Agnes Hayes are at present acting as corresponding secretaries.

The first play presented at Lathrop Hall was given by a Pythian cast. "The Amazons," so successfully coached by Mr. Leo Tiefenthaler, was the most pretentious performance yet attempted. Two lesser plays were tried before, "The Villain Still Pursues Her," in 1908, written by the girls themselves, and "The Lamentable Tragedy of Julius Caesar," a musical tragedy in 1909.

Besides regular Friday night meetings, several evenings during the year are devoted to other affairs. At the close of each year, the Juniors of Pythia entertain the alumnae, honorary and active members at a banquet. The alumnae, the seniors, and the freshmen, each plan a program in spring. The joint social meetings of Philomathia and Pythia come twice a year, each entertaining the other once.

MEYERS WINS TOSS FOR SENIOR TREASURER.

Erwin Meyers won the treasurership of the senior class over Fred Carter by winning two out of three coin toss-ups. Rules Regarding Con

  - b. The regular examination for students conditioned for the summer session will be held at the end of the semester.

SPOHN WINS ELECTION

CARTER AND MEYERS TIE FOR SECRETARY.

Many Tickets Were Split—Vote Was Large and Election Clean.

William H. Spohn was elected president of the senior class yesterday by a majority of 112 votes over David Flanagan. Albert Birch got the first vice presidency with 136 votes majority, and Aimee Zillmer captured the second vice presidency with 192 votes. Fred Carter and E. A. Meyers tied for secretary with 186 votes, while Albert Ochsner carried off the treasury job with a 41 vote majority. Mike Timbers swept away all opponents in the sergeant-at-arms contest with 370 votes.

For secretary—Carter, 186; Meyers, 186.

For treasurer—Ochsner, 211; Roger Moore, 114; Loren Hebbard, 53.

For sergeant-at-arms—Michael Timbers, 370. No opposition.

F. G. Carter and E. G. Meyers, the two candidates for treasurer who each received the same number of votes, have expressed themselves as willing to decide the matter by flipping a coin. This will do away with the necessity of holding another election.
