WISCONSIN WINS U.S. FORESTRY BUREAU

BADGER STATE GIVEN NOTABLE RECOGNITON BY THE FED-ERAL GOVERNMENT.

TO ERECT \$30,000 LABORATORY.

Regents Already Have Set Aside Funds to Start Work-Big Interests are Aided.

The University of Wisconsin wins nandsome recognition from the government of the United States, in being selected as the location for the great central and consolidated lab-oratory of the forest service. The choice of locations lay between Michigan and Wisconsin universities and Wisconsin has won.

The university regents have appropriated \$30,000 for the construction of a building, in the planning of which the forest service officials will

take a hand. The new establishment will represent the consolidation of three now maintained by the government and will carry on a most important branch of work. FOR NEW PULP MATERIAL.

It is not distinctly in line with work commonly considered related to forestry. It relates rather to the uses and utilities of woods and their by-products to study of soils, fertilizers, etc., with reference to their adaptibility in tree culture. The institution will have about twenty-five employes and from the start a salary list of over \$30,000 a year, with every prospect of doubling in size and importance in a very short time.

One important work to be carried on there will be the production of wood pulp from materials not now The government is very anxious to make these experiments succeed. Recently in Colorado, a weed was discovered whose sap makes rubber. It seems to be commercially valuable and practicable. It will be tried out at Madison with much care. In short, there is a vast field of usefulness for the laboratory.

IS SCHOOL OF FORESTRY. Michigan, Illinois, Purdue and Cor-nell universities were all after the big laboratory, Michigan and Cornell making an especially strong showing. The railroad and switching facilities offered by the site at Madison had much to do with the decision.

The new laboratory will be available to university students and members of the faculty for investigate work and the members of the station staff will give lectures to students on the various phases of forestry in which work is being done in the laboratory. The university will thus have practically all the advantages of a school of forestry that will be the most thorough equipped in the

HELPS BIG INTERESTS.

All the experimental work in forestry carried on by the United States government east of the Rocky moungovernment east of the Rocky houn-tains will be concentrated in the lab-oratory here. This will be the only station of its kind maintained by the United States government with the exception of a smaller laboratory on the Pacific coast.

The character of the investigations to be undertaken makes the establishment of the station at Wisconsin of the greatest importance to the paper and lumber interests of the


TWO HUNDRED GRADUATES OF MADISON HIGH SCHOOL IN ANNUAL BANQUET.





More artistic and pleasing than ever before were the varied and graceful dances rendered by the 'varsity girls. The arrangements of the seats, in a huge rectangle about the campus, enabled the audience to get a better view of the spectacle than in previous years.

The grand march, which began the program, was led by the seniors in cap and gown, followed by the rose dancers, the floral arch maidens, the scarf dancers and the folk-dancers in

their bright, many colored costumes.

Perhaps the most beautiful of the dances was the rose dance. This was an entirely new feature of the program, and probably the most artistic dance ever seen here at a May fete. The girls taking part were costumed in pink and green to represent roses.






