



Badgers Welcome Purdue for Homecoming

Wisconsin (6-1, 3-1 Big Ten) returns home to host Purdue (2-4, 0-3) today at 80,321-seat Camp Randall Stadium. Kickoff is set for 2:30 p.m. CDT.

The game will be televised live by ABC (Gary Thorne, Ed Cunningham and Dave Lamont).

The game also can be heard live on the 45-city Wisconsin Radio Network (Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas). WIBA (1310 AM, 101.5 FM) is the rightsholder in Madison. Wisconsin Public Television (Mike Heller and Scott Nelson) will carry its tape-delay telecast of the game at 10:30 p.m. CDT.

Wisconsin moved back into a first-place tie in the Big Ten after its dramatic 38-34 victory at Minnesota last Saturday. Freshman Jonathan Casillas blocked a Golden Gopher punt and sophomore Ben Strickland recovered it in the end zone with 30 seconds left to play to account for the winning points. UW trailed by 10 points on three separate occasions in the second half before pulling off the win.

Purdue dropped a 34-29 decision at home against Northwestern last Saturday. The Boilermakers, under head coach Joe Tiller, have lost four straight games.

UW-Purdue Series Info

Wisconsin leads the all-time series 37-29-8 ... the Badgers won last season's meeting in West Lafayette in dramatic fashion as DB Scott Starks returned a Kyle Orton fumble 40 vards for a TD with 2:36 remaining in the fourth quarter to account for the deciding tally in a 20-17 Wisconsin victory ... each of the last five meetings between the two programs has been decided by a touchdown or less ... Wisconsin's last win over Purdue in Madison came in 1998 (that game featured the debut of "Jump Around," the hip-hop song that Badger fans jump to at the end of the third quarter at Camp Randall Stadium).

Scoring in Bunches

Wisconsin is eighth nationally in scoring offense (40.7 ppg). The modern-era school record for scoring average is 34.1 ppg by the 1999 Badgers. Wisconsin has scored more points (285) through seven games than any Badger squad since the 1903 team registered 299 through seven contests.

The Badgers have already scored 36 more points (285-249) than it did all of last season.

UW has scored at least 40 points in four of its seven games this season. The 1999 Badgers eclipsed the 40-point

plateau an Alvarez era-high six times. Wisconsin hit the 40-point mark just seven times from 2000 through 2004.

It Ain't Over ...

Freshman Jonathan Casillas' blocked punt that was recovered by sophomore Ben Strickland in the end zone for the game-winning TD at Minnesota last Saturday is one of four Pontiac Game-Changing Play of the Week finalists. The winning play was announced on ESPN Thursday night.

Wisconsin's victory over Minnesota marked the 23rd time (second this season) during the Alvarez era that the Badgers have come back to win after trailing in the fourth quarter. Four of the past six fourth-quarter comebacks have been against nationally ranked opponents.

UW's 38-34 win at Minnesota last Saturday was the school's first when allowing 30 or more points on the road in a regular-season game since a 35-34 victo-

ry at Missouri on Sept. 15, 1984. Prior to the Minnesota win, Wisconsin had lost 27 straight regular season road games when allowing 30 or more points.

The Badgers have won three of their last four road games against nationally ranked Big Ten opponents.

Home Cooking

The Badgers are 15-3 in their last 18 home games and have won 10 straight at Camp Randall Stadium. That is the longest home winning streak in the modern era (since 1946) at Wisconsin and the sixth-longest current home winning streak in the nation.

Dynamic Duo

Senior WRs Ionathan Orr and Brandon Williams have combined for 31 receptions, 606 receiving yards

and eight TD catches in the past three games.

Orr (128) and Williams (113) each registered more than 100 receiving yards vs. Indiana on Oct. 1. That had not happened at Wisconsin since Oct. 23, 1993 when Lee Deramus (156) and J.C. Dawkins (131) each eclipsed the century mark in a loss to Minnesota.

Williams needs eight yards to become the first player in school history to accumulate at least 500 receiving yards in four different seasons and is tied with former Badger All-American Lee Evans for the most pass receptions in school history with 175.

Orr's four TD receptions at Northwestern on Oct. 8 were the second-most ever by a Badger. Only Lee Evans' five TD catches vs. Michigan State in 2003 eclipsed Orr's performance. Orr is now fourth on the school's career list for receiving TDs with 17 (Al Toon is third with 19).

Running Away

Heisman Trophy and Doak Walker Award candidate RB Brian Calhoun ranks No. 6 nationally in both allpurpose yardage (183.3 ypg) and

rushing yardage (137.0 ypg). He is second nationally with 14 rushing touchdowns.

Calhoun needs 41 yards to become the first Badger since Anthony Davis (2002 season) to rush for 1,000 yards. He would join an illustrious list of 1,000-yard rushers at Wisconsin, among them Davis, Michael Bennett, Ron Dayne, Terrell Fletcher, Billy Marek, Rufus Ferguson and Alan Ameche.

Calhoun became the first player in Wisconsin history to record 100 yards rushing and 100 yards receiving in the same game. He ran for 122 yards and registered 128 receiving yards against Northwestern.

B arry Alvarez, the winningest football coach in Wisconsin history, has completed 15 seasons at the head of the program he transformed from a perennial second-division finisher to one that is nationally respected and is a fixture on the postseason bowl scene.

Alvarez, whose overall record with the Badgers is 108-70-4, became Visconsin's Director of Athletics in April of 2004. He is one of just two people (UAB's Watson Brown) at the Division I level who serves as head football coach and athletic director.

Alvarez's list of accomplishments at Wisconsin is remarkable. Consider just a few of the most notable ...

- winningest coach in school history
- coached three Big Ten and Rose Bowl champions
- only Big Ten coach ever to win the Rose Bowl in consecutive seasons
- just the 10th coach in Big Ten history with 100 victories at one conference institution
- has coached five national award winners, including Ron Dayne (Heisman, Doak Walker, Maxwell), Jamar Fletcher (Jim Thorpe) and Kevin Stemke (Ray Guy)
- guided UW to back-to-back Big Ten titles in 1998 and 1999 (hadn't happened at Wisconsin since 1896-97)
 bowl record of 7-3 (.700)
- DOWN RECORD OF 7-3 (.700)



 coached the three winningest teams in school history

When Alvarez arrived in Madison in 1990, Wisconsin had compiled a 9-36 record during the previous four seasons and attendance at Camp Randall Stadium had dipped to an average of 41,734 per game (54 percent of capacity). The program sorely needed a boost and got it when new Director of Athletics Pat Richter hired Alvarez from Notre Dame, where he had been an assistant coach under Lou Holtz.

Alvarez's coaching career began at the high school level. He served as an assistant at Lincoln (Neb.) Northeast High from 1971-73 before taking over as head coach at Lexington (Neb.) High from 1974-75. His last prep coaching stop was at Mason City (Iowa) High where he was head coach from 1976-78 and where his team won a 4A state title in his final year.

Iowa's Hayden Fry hired Alvarez as an assistant coach in 1979. The Hawkeyes played in six bowl games (two Rose Bowls) during Alvarez's eight years in Iowa City, compiling a 61-33-1 mark in the process. Alvarez's standout player with the Hawkeyes was LB Larry Station, a two-time All-American and two-time Academic All-American.

Alvarez left Iowa after the 1986 season to become linebackers coach at Notre Dame. He was promoted (linebackers to defensive coordinator to assistant head coach) by Holtz each of his three seasons as the Fighting Irish went 32-5 and won the 1988 national title. While in South Bend, Alvarez coached All-America linebackers Michael Stonebreaker, Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett.

Alvarez grew up in Langeloth, Pa., a small town among the coal mines and steel mills in western Pennsylvania. He starred as a prep linebacker and went on to play at Nebraska (1965-67) for leg-

endary head coach Bob Devaney. Alvarez was the leading tackler for the 1967 Cornhuskers, who led the nation in total defense and created a school-record 40 turnovers. Alvarez played in both the Sugar and Orange Bowls at Nebraska (the Cornhuskers were 25-7 during his three varsity seasons). Alvarez earned his bachelor's degree in 1969 and added a master's degree in 1971, both from Nebraska.

Alvarez's family includes his wife, Cindy, daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), son Chad (wife Stephanie), grandsons Joe and Jake Ferguson and Jackson Delzer, and granddaughter Grace Delzer.

- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, endowed a football scholarship at the UW in the spring of 2000. "I thought it was a small way for me to say thanks to the UW-Madison," Alvarez said of his quarter-million dollar contribution to the school's foundation.

- Alvarez set a goal to become a collegiate head coach by his 42nd birthday and was named to the Wisconsin post three days after he turned 42.
- Alvarez added administrative duties to his job description in 2000 when he was named Associate Athletic Director. He became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April 2004, operating in a dual role as football coach as well.
- Alvarez grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW-Madison's nationally acclaimed

- dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- Alvarez, a big baseball fan, helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999.
- Alvarez was a finalist for ESPN's
 College Football Coach of the
 Decade Award in 1999. He was one
 of 18 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and is the only one still
 at the school that hired him.
- Barry Alvarez got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship. One of the staffs of which Alvarez was a member featured six men who went on to lead their own college programs: Alvarez; Kirk Ferentz, Iowa; Dan McCarney, Iowa State; Del Miller,

CHANCELLOR JOHN D. WILEY



hancellor John D. Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at the Jniversity of Wisconsin-Madison and eceived master's and doctoral degrees n physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968 to 1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany, as a recipient of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Teaching.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials, and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982 to 1986, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

From 1986 to 1989, Wiley served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering, with oversight responsibility for all aspects of graduate study, grant submission, agency liaison, research infrastructure and centers, and technology transfer. From 1989 to 1994, he was dean of the UW-Madison Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

Prior to his appointment to the university's top position, Wiley served as provost and vice chancellor for academ-

ic affairs, which carries the responsibility of chief operating officer and deputy chancellor. As provost, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley was named UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on January 1, 2001. As chancellor, he has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning. He also has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea—the belief that the boundaries of the campus are the boundaries of the state and beyond—and to build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the university so rich in accomplishment and tradition.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of the campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers. He also has mapped an east-side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area, with an expanded Elvehjem Museum of Art, new classroom buildings and additional music-performance space. Wiley believes that the arts and humanities are an integral component of the research enterprise.

"Nurturing an environment of creativity—encompassing industry, the arts and individual expression—is important for attracting and keeping these very mobile, highly sought, knowledge-based workers within our borders," Wiley says.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and to help build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

"The Wisconsin Idea offers a shared medium through which we can help the state achieve its maximum potential as a participant in a world economy that embraces learning and the advancement of knowledge as much as it does material production," he says. Camp Randall Stadium has the look of a winner, with its updated fan-friendly atmosphere. The stadium is a source of Wisconsin pride, but it is our fans and their rich history of loyalty that makes any Badger sporting event a truly special occasion.

Our student-athletes are also winners – on and off the field. On the playing fields, we've had many victories and championships to celebrate. And in the classroom, 186 Badger athletes registered a grade-point average of better than 3.5. Nearly one-quarter of our student athletes were Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2004-05.

I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.

In addition, athletics offers the university another opportunity to connect with alumni and friends.

GREAT MOMENTS IN CAMP RANDALL HISTORY

Each week this season, Wisconsin will be celebrating the Greatest Moments in Camp Randall Stadium history as voted on by you, the fans. The winning memories will be depicted on commemorative six-packs of Coca-Cola bottles in stores around the state this fall. This week, we remember Nov. 13, 1999 as Ron Dayne broke the NCAA all-time rushing record and UW clinched its second consecutive Rose Bowl berth.

To help us look back on this great moment, we have reprinted an excerpt from "Tales From the Wisconsin. Badgers," a new book written by UW Director of Athletic Communications Justin Doherty detailing some of the best stories from UW football history.

The Perfect Day

Former Wisconsin director of athletics Pat Richter said it was like theater. That may be, but what scriptwriter could possibly have dreamed up the chain of events that took place in Camp Randall Stadium on an unseasonably warm November afternoon in 1999?

Everyone—coaches, players, fans, media-knew what was at stake as the ninth-ranked Badgers prepared all week to host Iowa. A Michigan victory over Penn State, combined with a Wisconsin win over the Hawkeyes, would give the Badgers their second straight Big Ten title (this time undisputed) and send them back to the Rose Bowl. In addition, tailback Ron Dayne, his drive to the Heisman Trophy continuing to gain momentum, needed just 99 yards to become the NCAA Division I-A career rushing leader. The sense of anticipation in Madison that week was undeniable.

"Coming in [toward the stadium] on the bus, you could feel the excitement," assistant coach Jeff Horton recalled. "It was just different coming in. You could tell it was cranked up even more than normal. People were on the streets and were well into their



partying. When we stepped off the bus, there was a big crowd there to see us."

The game was set for a 2:30 p.m. start. ABC was in town to televise the game, and the contest began with a clear sky and 67-degree weather at kickoff.

The Badgers had not even scored vet when the first cheer of the day swept through the crowd of 79,404.

Early in the first quarter it was announced that Michigan had upset Penn State, giving the Badgers the chance to win the league title outright.


Wisconsin struggled to move the ball on its first possession of the game but moved out to a 13-0 first-quarter lead after scoring drives of 80 and 73 vards. Iowa opened the second-quarter scoring with a field goal before quarterback Brooks Bollinger hit Chris Chambers with a 24-yard touchdown pass for a 20-3 Wisconsin lead. Next up was the record.

Dayne had rushed for 76 yards when Wisconsin took possession of the ball with 4:40 remaining in the first half. On first-and-10 from the Wisconsin 17-yard line, the Badgers called a 23 Zone play, and 31 yards later Dayne had bypassed the career rushing record that had been set by Texas's Ricky Williams just a year earli-

"[Fullback] Chad Kuhns told me, 'You can't do it without me.'" Dayne said after the game. "We ran 23-something, we got a couple names for it. When I broke out and then got up, Chad and everybody was around me."

Fans at the game that day will also recall a streaker who raced the length of the field during the stoppage that immediately followed Dayne's record

All that remained was finishing off the Hawkeyes, and the Badgers did that



With this run, Ron Dayne became the NCAA's all-time leading rusher.


by scoring once more in the first half for a 27-3 lead at the break before adding a pair of touchdowns in the second half.

Dayne rushed for 216 yards on 27 carries. Bollinger, who later called the game "the best football atmosphere I've ever been around," added 113 rushing vards and a touchdown to go along with 9-for-12 passing for 144 yards and three touchdowns. Wisconsin limited Iowa to just 247 yards in total offense.

As the clocked ticked down, head coach Barry Alvarez, who had spent much of the season watching games from press boxes due to knee problems, made his way to the field on crutches. Alvarez and Davne found each other on the Badger sideline and embraced.

"I'll never forget that big smile of his." Alvarez said after the game. "When you go down to the sideline and see him smiling and trying to work his way over to me, you'll always have that picture in your mind."

Jamie Pollard Deputy Athletic Director



Jamie Pollard was named Deputy Athletic Director for the UW-Madison in 2003 and in that role serves as the No. 2 administrator in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is responsible for the overall administration

of the Badgers' 23-sport, \$72 million athletic department. In addition, he represents Barry Alva ez at all national, conference and university neetings when necessary.

Prior to being named Deputy Athletic Director, Pollard served as the division's Chief Financial Officer and Senior Associate Athletic Director. He developed a comprehensive strategic financial plan ("Keeping Big Red in the Black") that increased the division's operating reserve to \$7 million and allowed the university to move forward on the \$109 million renovation of Camp Randall Stadium. He also assisted with the development of the school's inaugural preferential seating program that is generating more than \$9 million annually for the athletic program and he helped negotiate a multi-year, multi-million dollar contract for media and marketing rights that is one of the largest collegiate contracts in the country.

Pollard has also been the sports administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs since 2001-02. During that time the men's basketball program won back-to-back Big Ten championships, the 2004 Big Ten Tournament and advanced to the 2005 Elite Eight. He also served as the Tournament Manager when the university hosted the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional.

In the fall of 2003, Pollard was selected by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal as a recipient of its "Top Forty Under 40" Award. It is given annually to the 40 most influential and creative individuals in sports under the age of 40. Pollard is the first intercollegiate sports administrator ever honored by the mag-

Pollard has served as the President for the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association (CABMA) and was chosen by his peers as the 2002 Business Manager of the

He was appointed by UW-Madison Chancellor John D. Wiley to serve as the campus chair of the Partners in Giving campaign that benefits more than 300 non-profit organizations. Pollard led the 2004 campaign for the University, which resulted in 4,500 employees donating \$1.46 million. Both the number of donors and donation levels were records for the institution.

His other intercollegiate administration experience came as Associate AD for Administration at Maryland (1994-98) and Associate AD for Internal Operations at St. Louis (1989-94). In both roles, he assisted with balancing budgets and creating reserves while helping implement gender equity plans.

In addition to his role at Wisconsin, Pollard founded Collegiate Financial Services, LLC, a private data research company that provided strategic financial planning and research services to athletic administrators, university presidents and conference commissioners

Pollard, who was the 1987 NCAA Division III national champion in the 5,000meter run and a two time Division III All-American, has a B.S. degree in business administration from UW-Oshkosh (1987). He is in that school's athletic hall of fame. Pollard and his wife, Ellen, have four children, (Thomas, Annie, Maggie and James).



THE BARRY ALVAREZ YEARS



Looking Towards the Future

As if his mark on the Badger football program was not enough, Barry Alvarez will look to continue his magical leadership with the entire Department of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin when he steps into the role of Director of Athletics on a full-time basis at the close of the football season.

The 58-year-old Alvarez is one of two men in Division I-A athletics (UAB's Watson Brown is the other) serving in the dual role of director of athletics and head football coach. He assumed both duties on April 1, 2004, when Wisconsin A.D. Pat Richter retired.

"One reason I feel confident in doing both jobs is because I've inherited such an outstanding group of people in the administration and I'll run the department much like I coach a football team," Alvarez said on Feb. 14, 2003, when it was announced that Richter was stepping down and Alvarez was taking over as Director of Athletics. "Put a good plan in order, hire good people to execute it and be flexible enough to make adjustments."

Richter was the one who lured Alvarez away from Notre Dame and gave him the opportunity become a Division I head coach, and to help give the Wisconsin Athletics Department a new look.

"It was obvious to both of us that football had to regain respectability for the entire department to get back To commemorate the final season under head coach Barry Alvarez, the Badger Gameday Football Program will highlight Alvarez in each of the publications this season. on its feet," Richter said. "Slowly but surely, the attendance increased every year to the point this summer the UW didn't even have a single-game ticket sale."

Alvarez's journey to become Wisconsin's Director of Athletics once started out as a dream. But his mentor and head coach at Nebraska, Bob Devaney, served in the same dual role. Devaney was most certainly one of the biggest influences on Alvarez's life. Devaney, much like Alvarez, took over the Cornhusker football-program and turned it around, into a winning tradition. Following his days on the sideline, Devaney became the university's athletics director. Under Devany's influence, it became obvious to Alvarez the he too would like to try his hand at leading both the football team and the department.


Alvarez owns a 114-71-4 record as the head coach of the Badger football program. He has guided the UW to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles and is a remarkable 7-3

in bowl games. He announced in July that he will hand over the reigns to second-year Wisconsin defensive coordinator Bret Bielema following the conclusion of this season. Bielema will replace him as head coach in January 2006 and Alvarez will remain the Badgers' Director of Athletics.

"I've had the opportunity to do both jobs and it's been a great challenge, a privilege and a true pleasure," said Alvarez at his news conference to announce he was stepping down as head coach. "I feel like we've done a good job in handling the responsibilities of both positions, but the demands certainly take a toll."

While Alvarez was coaching, he always had a keen interest in the administrative side of the Athletic Department. Richter named him to his Management Team in 2000. When Richter announced his plans to retire, Alvarez took on the Athletic Director responsibilities. After a one-year transition with Richter still on board, Alvarez began his dual role tenure 19 months ago.


The most recently completed academic year was a successful debut for Alvarez as A.D. The Badgers finished 19th nationally (their best in six years) in the NACDA Directors' Cup (an all-sports ranking), more than half of the student-athletes (52.3 percent) registered 3.0 gradepoint averages and the division set new standards for annual giving, ticket sales and sponsorship support. Additionally, the department opened the Porter Boathouse and completed the \$109 million renovation of Camp Randall Stadium.

"I thought we had a very good first year," Alvarez said of his first 12 months as the A.D. "I thought we were on top of it both in football and because of the excellent help we have in the administration. We were on top of everything and the administrative side. But I certainly didn't want it to slip. I just saw some potential for some things, and I don't want it to happen."

Alvarez said in July at the news conference announcing his retirement as head football coach that he did not want his edge to dull in either one of his current positions.

"I look forward with great enthusiasm to my future as the Badger Athletic Director," Alvarez said. "However, being a successful football coach is the first step toward being a successful A.D. I want to finish the year strong."

Alvarez will look to continue the success of the UW Athletic Department when he assumes the A.D. role to focus on Wisconsin's 23 varsity sports on a full-time basis next year. In the meantime, he is sure to enjoy his last few games and last few months as the head football coach.



Young Badger Defenders Starting to Make an Impact

Eight former Badger defensive players have been seeing increased playing time this season. Five rookies have made their team's final roster and are starting to make an impact on the defensive side of the ball.

Rookies Jason Jefferson, Jim Leonhard, Scott Starks, Erasmus James and Jonathan Welsh are on NFL rosters after being part of one of the best Badger defensive teams last year.

Leonhard and Jefferson are now teammates in Buffalo after the Bills signed Jefferson from the Philadelphia Eagles' practice squad on Oct. 12. Leonhard has played in two games so far this season but has yet to record a tackle.

Welsh, playing behind one of the leagues' best defensive ends, Dwight Freeney of Indianapolis, has played in each of the last three games and recorded his first career tackle vs. San Francisco last week. Scott Starks, best-known for college football's Game Changing Performance last season, has played in all six games this year for Jacksonville as a nickel and dime situational defensive back.

Last-year's All-American and first-round draft pick, Erasmus James has played in the last four games for the Minnesota Vikings.

Second-year man Alex Lewis of Detroit, has started 16 games in his career, tallying 59 tackles, two sacks and one interception. After starting the season opener vs. Green Bay, Lewis has missed the last four games with an ankle injury.

Fifth-year players, Nick Greisen of the New York Giants and Jamar Fletcher of San Diego have both seen increased time in the last two seasons. Fletcher's career stats include 97 tackles, three interceptions and a recovered fumble in 61 games. He made a season-high four tackles against the Raiders last week.

Greisen has 119 tackles, three sacks and four forced fumbles in 43 games. This season, Greisen has started the last two games, recording 20 tackles and recovering two fumbles.

Evans Makes an Impact for Bills

Lee Evans, the Badgers' MVP in 2003, has become one of the favorite targets for the Buffalo Bills in his second year in the NFL. Evans has now

played in all 22 games as a Bill, starting 15, including starts in five of six games so far this season.

Evans has recorded 62 catches for 1,044 yards with nine touchdowns so far in his career. This season, Evans has yet to catch a touchdown, but has been the main target on third downs when the Bills go to the air. This season, Evans has caught five passes on third downs, all resulting in first downs for the Buffalo offense.

COACHES' CORNER



Each week this season, the Badger Football Gameday Program will take fans inside the UW coaching staff and find out what it's like to try and prepare the Badgers for a game. A different assistant coach will be profiled each game. Hopefully fans can get a glimpse inside the life of the coaches.

This week, we sat down with cooffensive coordinator and tight ends coach Paul Chryst, who is in his second season at UW. Chryst was the Badgers' tight ends coach in 2002 and spent 2003 and 2004 as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Oregon State.

How much of an offensive game plan is catered to what you do well vs. the opponent's weaknesses?

I think it's really intertwined. Unless its something glaring that they're going to give you, you better do what you do well. Within that though I think you can make adjustments. It may be small. The more that you can stick with what you do, you've got a chance to do it well. Especially if you've been doing it well, you can build on that confidence.

What is your philosophy on trick plays and when the best time to call them is?


You don't have the luxury of wasting a play so there has to be a valid reason for running the play. It has to be designed properly to give it a chance to succeed. If it is, then it really becomes less of an "exotic." When you call it, you don't think, "Boy I hope this works." You expect it to work.

Do you have any favorite drills you use?

At this point in the season there are different things. There are drills that you do in the spring and in fall camp that apply mostly to fundamentals. At this point in the year, your individual time is limited so the drills you do had better apply specifically to the game. Depending on the point of the season you are at, we try to pick and choose our drills accordingly.

How do you approach film study? Do you concentrate on what you've done or what the defense will be doing?

You need to have a pulse of what you do well and at the same time you have to match up against your opponent. The first couple days of preparation is figuring that out. And to do that you have to spend a lot of time studying your opponent. What is their base? What's their philosophy? Once you get that, then it's what do we do and how does that fit? What adjustments do we have to make in our base to apply to that specific defense. With players, what you have to do is take all that time and condense it. You have to teach them your opponents' run defense, these are their coverages, these are their change ups. We have to teach our players what to expect.

What is it like sitting in the coaches' booth on game days?

There's pluses and minuses. It does give you a different perspective and you can see the whole field. It's a little more sterile environment. The great thing about game day is that it's the players' day. That's the thing you miss by being up there is you don't get the pulse of the team like you would being on the sidelines. That's why communication is key with the entire staff.



In addition, Bucky Badger and the UW Spirit Squads are always fan favorites. The entire atmosphere, which undoubtedly includes the best











WISCONSIN TRADITIONS

Badger nickname

The athletic teams' nickname (Badgers) was borrowed from the state. The territory was initially dubbed the "Badger" state. The reason for the moniker was not because of badgers in this region, but instead because of an association with lead miners in the 1820s.

Pro pectors came to the state looking for mir erals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tun rels burrowed into hillsides according to folklore.

Bucky Badger

Bad Jers in various forms have been recogn zed as the school mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white striped sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by artist Art Evans. At that time, the badger went by names like Benny, Buddy, Bernie, Bobby and Bouncey. Art Lentz, the department's publicity director, had the idea to bring the mascot to life.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped his handlers. It was decided in the interest

of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the Madison Zoo. The Badger Yearbook replaced the live badger with a small raccoon named Regdab (badger spelled backwards) and passed it off as a "badger in a raccoon coat."

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was hired to mold a paper-mache badger head. Cheerleader Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A contest was staged to name the mascot. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or Bucky. The name came from the lyrics in a song which encouraged the football team to "buck right through that line."

Bucky Badger has persevered through the years, even surviving a threat by then assistant attorney general, Howard Koop, in 1973. He suggested that Bucky be replaced by Henrietta Holstein, a loveable cow. Koop argued that "kids love cows. A generation could grow up supporting the university and Henrietta Holstein." Koop's effort to overthrow Bucky failed.

Bucky even survived a cameo appearance by former Sports Illustrated writer Rick Telander. In preparation for a book about the department, Telander wore the Badger costume at a 1991 volleyball game. Telander overcame "terminal claustrophobia" in his first and only act as Bucky.

Bud song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've Said It All," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karmen for Budweiser beer commercials.

The song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. We had, just by accident, added this beer commercial to the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 comefrom-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a TD. I played it again, and we scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud,'" said Leckrone.



Motion W

When Coach Barry Alvarez came to Madison, he decided that the helmet logo needed to be updated to signal a new era. He entertained 15-20 designs in 1990 before Rayovac artist Rick Suchanek developed the "Motion W," which originally included a tail at the back of the logo. Alvarez thought the tail was a bit much, but when it was removed, decided to go with it. The University bought the rights to the design, and the logo has been adopted by all other UW sports.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer with the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give the fans something to listen to on their way out, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience-participation activities.

"On, Wisconsin"

The school's fight song was originally composed in 1909 by Chicago's William Purdy, and the words were written by Carl Beck. Purdy and Beck had been fraternity brothers at Hamilton College (Clinton, N.Y.) and were roommates in Chicago. Purdy was going to submit the song for consideration to win a \$100 prize that the University of Minnesota was offering for a new football song. When Beck heard the music, he offered to write words and suggested that Purdy offer it to Wisconsin, where Beck had once studied. The song was an instant hit on campus and spread throughout the world.



Some 2,500 schools have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. "On, Wisconsin" was sung for the first time at the 1909 homecoming game vs. Minnesota.

The music was adapted by Band Director Michael Leckrone in 1969. The original version had been played virtually unchanged since its inception. "I got a

lot of flak for the change," Leckrone said.
"The old version was one you had to wait on. I wanted to generate immediate crowd reaction, so I stepped it up a bit."



The most-played rivalry in Division I-A football continues this fall when Wisconsin and Minnesota meet. The UW-UM series is the nation's oldest and has been played continuously since 1907. The game has alternated sites between the university campuses since 1946. Much prestige was always associated with the game, and the significance was emphasized with its place on the schedule. Between 1933 and 1982, the Wisconsin-Minnesota game was always the final regular-season contest for each school.

The series took an added twist in 1948 when more than state bragging rights were on the line. After a 16-0 setback that season, the Wisconsin letterwinners group, the National "W" Club, presented Minnesota with an axe wielded by Paul Bunyan. He was the mythical giant of midwestern lumber camps. Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song, "Varsity," was the 1934 brainstorm of then-band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to salute UW-Madison President Glenn Frank after each game.

Slab of Bacon

The Slab of Bacon trophy was the precursor to Paul Bunyan's Axe as the prize in the Wisconsin-Minnesota football series. Apparently, the trophy was presented to the winning school by a sorority from the losing institution. The trophy was discontinued in the 1940s and was discovered by UW Sports Information intern Will Roleson in a storage room at the UW Department of Athletics in 1994. It is currently housed in the football office at Wisconsin. "We took home the bacon," Coach Barry Alvarez said, "and kept it."

Each week in the Badger Gameday Program, senior wide receiver Jonathan Orr will give us an inside look at what it's like to be a UW football student-athlete. Orr has played in every game during his career. Through seven games, Orr leads the team with six touchdown receptions and is second on the team with 362 receiving yards. He ranks among the top 10 in UW history in career receiving yards and touchdowns.

Off the field, Orr and teammate Joel Nellis have spearheaded a service project called "Yes, We Can." The project, run in conjunction with some Madison-area elementary schools, aims to increase donations to local food pantries.

Keeping the Axe

f you have not heard by now, the Axe will remain in Madison. That's right, we went toe to toe with the Golden Gophers of Minnesota in a game that came down to the end. We were down by three points with less than a minute left in the fourth quarter, when true freshman Jonathan Casillas blocked a punt and junior Ben Strickland recovered it for a touchdown. Any hope Minnesota had was pretty much put to rest when they fumbled on the proceeding kickoff and we recovered it.

The fact that we won the game was important of course, but this victory was even more significant because of Paul Bunyan's Axe. This axe symbolizes the longest ongoing rivalry in college football. It represents bragging rights between the two

bordering states. It symbolizes a team's place in history that can never be erased.

I had two previous opportunities to touch the axe after victories, but I intentionally did not. I wanted to save the experience for my senior year. After this victory I can truly say it was worth the wait. In addition to getting that axe in the palm of my hands, engraved in my mind for the remainder

of my life will also be the emotions that were displayed amongst our teammates.

After the punt was recovered for a touchdown I clearly recall Brandon White and I hugging and jumping around in circles. I remember Jarvis Minton dancing like he was on Soul Train. Coaches were running around and giving high-fives. As a matter of fact I recall needing to catch my breath before departing from the field, because I was exhausted from the celebration.

I think it was Yogi Berra who said it best "It ain't over till its




My first memory was the Bowling Green game, the smell of brats, cold refreshments, and team spirit that I have never seen anywhere before. I have since purchased tickets to every home game.

RACING TO THE TOP

In 2004, a dream came true for University of Wisconsin men's cross country runner Simon Bairu. He had dreamed of one day winning the NCAA individual cross country championship but last year, was more concerned with helping the Badgers win the team title. In the closing minutes of last year's race though, Bairu realized his dream was about to become a reality.

"I noticed that I was feeling better and better and guys around me were feeling worse and worse," Bairu said of last year's NCAA meet. "So the group of 10 slowly turned into a group of eight which slowly turned into a group of five. I noticed that I really wasn't getting tired and with about two kilometers to go, that's when it first really hit me that I could actually win the meet."

Bairu crossed the finish line with a time of 30:38 and became the first Badger runner to win the individual title since 1985. It also capped a stellar season for Bairu, who led the Badgers to a second place finish at the NCAA Championships while earning All-America, All-Big Ten and Big Ten Runner of the Year honors.

While Bairu had the dream to win the title, many other factors played into his first-place finish according to Wisconsin head coach Jerry Schumacher.


"It takes a lot of hard work, it takes talent, it takes some luck. It just takes a lot of things coming together on a particular day to happen," Schumacher said. "That was Simon's day. Everything came together for him really well and he was able to win the national title."

Senior Simon Bairu won the NCAA individual title last year and will try to help the UW win its seventh consecutive Big Ten championship on Oct. 30.

Before winning the championship in 2004, Bairu placed 34th his freshman year and jumped to ninth place his sophomore year. Besides the long hours training, Bairu credits the way his parents raised him growing up as another factor that helped him win the title.

"[The way they raised me] was always aim to be the best," Bairu said. "So I think my training was always aimed at that. I was never happy to settle with the position I was at. Two years ago when I was ninth, I was happy, but I was hungry to do more the following year. And I think that attitude of wanting to be the best really contributed to it."

Now in his senior season, Bairu continues to lead the Badgers as one of the elite teams in men's cross country. The Badgers have remained in the No. 1 or No. 2 spot of the MONDO NCAA Division I Men's Cross Country Poll for the entire season and placed second at the Roy Griak Invitational on Sept. 24. At the Griak, Bairu finished first out of 225 runners with a time of 23:43. The

Regina, Saskatchewan, native earned Big Ten Runner of the Week honors following his Griak Title.

Besides his individual accolades, Bairu has assumed a leadership role that has become noteworthy to Schumacher over the past two years.

"Simon was here when he had upperclassmen kind of showing him the way," Schumacher said. "He learned it from them and he's developed in that system. Now he's passing it down to the young guys as well. We really expect that from the upperclassmen on our team. That's something that is great for me because I really don't have to coach that. They do that on their own. That's a valuable part of the program we have.

"Part of Simon's job in that role this year is to help replace that and help find someone who steps into that role for next year. You want someone who wants to see the program thrive and be successful after they're gone. He wants that and he's trying to pass down all those things he's learned to that next group."

While it may appear that Bairu has achieved everything possible in the cross country world, he still has one more goal before his time is up as a Badger.

"My goal this year is pretty simple, it's to help Wisconsin win its first team title in I think it's almost 10 years now," Bairu said. "I've done the individual thing and the only thing left is the team title. I'm hoping maybe this year will be our year."

Schumacher also has a similar goal for his team.

"Our team goal is to be ready to contend for the national title,"
Schumacher said. "I think we have a team that can contend and again, winning a team title is no different from winning an individual title. It takes being ready to do it and being good enough to do it and it also takes a lot of different factors coming together at the right time and the right place. It's not easy to do and the more times we put ourselves in that position, the better chance we have of doing it."



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954
Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.

Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the

stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kickoff. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.





Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Kohl Center Gate B reception desk (608-263-5645).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.

CAMP RANDALL STADIUM RENOVATION

NEW LOOK, SAME OLD CHARM FOR CAMP RANDALL

One of college football's legendary facilities—Wisconsin's Camp Randall Stadium—has just undergone a four-year, \$109 million renovation. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements, however, have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm; rather, the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch their beloved Badgers play on Saturdays in the fall.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds.

Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3, 1917.









THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Foun led in 1896, the Big Ten has sustaine a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the prior y of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integ ity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$82 r illion in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,500 men and women student-thletes who compete for 25 champions aips, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2004-05, the Big Ten distributed over \$116 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference

institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

- Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- Big Ten Universities host more than 70 Nobel laureates as faculty, students or researchers.
- Big Ten Universities enroll students of whom more than 41 percent have graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class, while 74 percent graduated in the top quarter of their class.
- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised national-



ly, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.

- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- Throughout the conference, the Big Ten had more than 8,400 student-athletes playing on over 270 teams in 2003-04. Those student-athletes received in excess of \$82 million in direct financial aid.
- Big Ten student-athletes graduate at a rate of 10 percent higher than all Division I student-athletes.
- The Big Ten recognized 1,952 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2004-05 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,700 studentathletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- In the past 10 years (1995-96 through 2004-05), the Big Ten claimed 40 NCAA team championships and 155 individual titles.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

The Big Ten Conference will begin year two of its college football instant replay program in 2005. In addition, other leagues will also implement their own instant replay system after the NCAA approved the Big Ten's proposal to allow all NCAA conferences and independent institutions to experiment with the use of video replay for the 2005 season.

The goal of the Big Ten's football television replay plan is to: See, Review, Change (if warranted). Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of indisputable video evidence is met can a play be overturned.

Only the Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game. Neither the game officials nor the coaches may ask for a review. The Technical Advisor will have the sole authority to change a call, or no call, on the field. Unlike the NFL model, officials working Big Ten games will not have the ability or capacity to view the replay(s).

The Big Ten Conference replay system allows for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected once the standard of indisputable video evidence is met. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

During the 2004 campaign, play was stopped in only 28 of 57 contests (49 percent) for a total of 43 stoppages and 21 overturned calls (49 percent of stoppages). The length of the 57 games utilizing instant replay in 2004 was only three hours and 16 minutes, compared to three hours and 13 minutes in all 2003 contests. Less than one stoppage occurred per game in 2004, as the Big Ten's average length of review was only two minutes and 39 seconds, compared to the National Football League average of three minutes and 20 seconds for its instant replay system.



National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

These seven former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.



Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962), nicknamed "The Kangaroo Kicker," was a two-time All-America fullback and punter between 1896-99. He also was a two-time team captain.



Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.



Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference MVP in 1942.



Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.




Marty Below (elected in 1988), a rugged right tackle, earned All-America praise as a senior.







LEGACY OF CAMP RANDALL



Today's Camp Randall experience is one of boisterous cheering, fan camaraderie and first-class football among a sea of red. This, however, was not always the case. On the same ground that today's young student-athletes do battle on the gridiron, young soldiers-to-be prepared for battle in the Civil War. From 1861 to 1865 the area where Camp Randall Stadium stands served as Civil War training grounds. In this season's game programs this page will be dedicated to the legacy of Camp Randall and its history in its pre-football days.


fter the war, the Camp Randall grounds went back to their original use, the state fair grounds. When the fair moved to Milwaukee the state legislature purchased the land, and in 1893, presented the site to the University of Wisconsin for use as a memorial athletic field.

Intercollegiate athletics had begun on campus in 1881, with football added in 1889. With the new land, the University built a stadium at its present site in 1913. Though it has undergone many changes, the stadium built in 1913 is the same as the newly renovated stadium of today.

To remember all those who trained at Camp Randall and served in the Civil War, a portion of the land gifted to the University was set aside as a memorial park. Named the Grand Army of the Republic, or GAR, Park, there are several historical items preserved from the war that are on display in the park.

While the site is now owned by the University, the Wisconsin
Department of Veteran Affairs still has some authority over the modifications that can be made to the site. The state bylaws specify that, "No structures other than the Camp Randall memorial building project shall be played or erected upon Camp Randall memorial park unless authorized by the legislature."

The lot has also been used for Civil War reenactments. In the



spring of 2000, the Wisconsin Veterans Museum hosted a Civil War encampment at Camp Randall. During the two-day event, Civil War re-enactors used historically accurate uniforms and equipment to re-create the daily routine of the soldiers that were trained at Camp Randall in the 1860s. From marching drills to musket inspection to leisure time and meal preparation, school groups and other visitors to the camp got a chance to see how Wisconsin's Civil War ancestors may have lived while at camp.

Men's Hockey

Wisconsin (1-1-0, 0-0-0 WCHA) begins league play with a visit to St. Cloud State (1-1-0, 0-0-0 WCHA) ... the Badgers split their opening weekend of the season two weeks ago against St. Lawrence at the Kohl Center, while the Huskies split last weekend at Northern Michigan ... the Badgers own a three-game winning streak over the Huskies, including two victories by shutout ... in the teams' last meeting on Jan. 8 in St. Cloud, Ryan MacMurchy scored all the Badger goals in a 4-2 victory ... the Badgers are 21-14-1 in WCHA openers since joining the league for the 1969-70 season, are 19-16-1 in WCHA road openers and 12-7-1 when they open the WCHA season on the road.

Women's Hockey

After two weeks at home, the Badgers (3-1-0, 1-1-0 WCHA) will take their show on the road with a trip to WCHA foe Minnesota State (3-1-0, 1-1-0 WCHA) ... facing off at All Seasons Arena in Mankato, Minn., the Badgers hope to continue their 24-game unbeaten streak against the Mavericks ... the lone blemish on the Badgers' 23-0-1 all-time record vs. MSU came Nov. 30, 2002 when the teams tied 3-3 in Madison, Wis. ... both teams are 3-1-0 after Minnesota State earned a conference sweep of North Dakota at home and an upset split while visiting then-No. 5 Mercyhurst.

Men's Rowing

The Wisconsin men's crew will be opening their 2005-06 season at the Head of the Charles regatta in Boston ... at the Head of the Charles in 2004, the men's team finished 19th in the championship Eights and fifth in the championship Fours ... the course is three miles in length and will take place on the Charles River.

Women's Lightweight Rowing

and return home to play host to Ohio State tomorrow in the final home conference game of the year ... freshman Elise Weber recorded the only goal for Wisconsin over the weekend ... senior Marisa Brown needs just four starts to tie the UW record of 88 game started in a career. There are four remaining regular-season games on the schedule.

Volleyball

No. 8 Wisconsin (15-2, 7-1 Big Ten) wraps up the first half of the Big Ten season with two road matches this weekend, vs. Michigan State last night and vs. Michigan tonight ... head coach Pete Waite recorded his 100th Big Ten win at Wisconsin as the Badgers swept Indiana, 3-0, last Friday. Waite, who is the only UW coach to record 100 conference wins, is 100-27 (.787) in league play in his seventh year at Wisconsin ... with her ninth kill of the match, senior Aubrey Meierotto became the 15th UW player to record 1,000 kills in a career. The 6-0 outside hitter shared match-high honors with 15 kills against the Hoosiers to bring her career total to 1,006.

NCAA GUIDELINES

What Every Badger Fan **Should Know**

with increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

o you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/c National Letter of Intent signees; o you have ever been involved in any way I omoting the Badger athletic program. nce an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person reains that identity forever, even if that perso no longer contributes to or supports the anletics program.

NCA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by



an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a studentathlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost serv-

b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) promising to provide any of the above:

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- · Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;
- · Compensation for only work actually performed; and
- · Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. ACCOMPLISHED WALK-ONS FOR THE BADGERS

They may have been told by many nonbelievers in their senior years of high school that they weren't big enough or fast enough to contribute to a Big Ten football program. However, a number of individuals have gone on to make their mark on the University of Wisconsin football program during the Alvarez era by originally joining the team as a walk-

Below is a partial list of some of the individuals that joined the Badgers as non-scholarship players, only to make major impacts at the UW and beyond.

- Bob Adamov, linebacker: four-year letterwinner; team captain and starter on the Badgers' 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; Ivan Williamson Scholastic Award winner in 1998; one of nine senior starters named team MVP his final season.
- Chad Cascadden, linebacker: named the team's Special Teams Player of the Year in 1994; Academic All-Big Ten selection his senior year; letterwinner on UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; played for the NFL's New York Jets.
- Matt Davenport, placekicker: semifinalist for Lou Groza Award: consen sus first-team All-Big Ten in 1997 and 1998; scored 99 points as a senior the most in school history for a placekick er; career field goal percentage (868) is No. 1 at UW.
- Jason Doering, safety: team captain in both 1999 and 2000; led Badger defensive backs in tackles his final three seasons; ranks fourth all-time in career

solo tackles (250); starter on two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; currently plays for the NFL's New York Giants

- Joe Panos, offensive tackle: team captain in 1993; starter on the Badgers' 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; first-team All-Big Ten and second-team AP All-American in '93; played for the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles and Buffalo Bills.
- Mark Tauscher, offensive tackle: three-year letterwinner; member of two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squads, including a starter on the 1999 team; helped Ron Dayne become NCAA all-time leading rusher; currently a starter for the NFL's Green Bay Packers.
- Donnel Thompson, linebacker: team captain in 1998 and 1999; starter on a pair of UW Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; ranks 10th all-time in career tackles; two-time team-leader in tackles; played for NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers and Indianapolis Colts.
- Mike Schneck, long snapper: threeyear letterwinner at Wisconsin; member of 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team signed free agent con tract with Pittsburgh and currently plays for the Steelers
- Sam Veit, punter: four-year starter and letterwinner: member of UW's 1993 Bg Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; ranks third all-time in career punts (209) and career punting yards (8,016); three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection

LEONHARD WAS ULTIMATE WALK-ON SUCCESS STORY

Jim Leonhard's (pictured left) football accomplishments are worth noting all by themselves: three-time first-team All-American, three-time first-team All-Big Ten, holder of several Big Ten and school records for his play as both a defensive back

and punt returner. But that's only half the story.

Leonhard's accolades off the field are just as impressive. A 2004 first-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American as selected by CoSIDA, Leonhard was honored in New York as one of 15 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes (with that goes an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship).

The 5-8, 186-pound Leonhard (who once won a team basketball slam dunk competition), a native of tiny Tony, Wis. (pop. 105), will go down as one of the most decorated players (let alone walk-ons) of the Alvarez era.






