PRESENT: Regents Arveson, Campbell, Grady, Jones, Sensenbrenner, Watson, Werner.

ABSENT: Regents Gelatt, Hodgkins, Kleczka.

Regent Kleczka was absent due to illness.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on May 13, 1950, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

The Regents then proceeded to the election of officers. In nominating Regent Sensenbrenner for President, Regent Jones stated:

"Mr. Werner, Vice President, I am sure that I voice what is in the minds of all of the other Regents when I say we are delighted that F. J. Sensenbrenner is back at the helm where the captain should be, and I welcome him back and nominate him for the Presidency for the ensuing year."

The motion was seconded by Regent Arveson.

Regent Werner took the Chair.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That the nominations be closed and that the Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Regent Sensenbrenner for the office of President. The ballot was cast and Regent F. J. Sensenbrenner was declared elected President for the ensuing year.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

I. Contracts, Leases and Agreements

1. That each of the following officers of the University of Wisconsin be authorized to execute all applications, notices, bonds, and other instruments required by the Bureau of Internal Revenue in connection with matters relating to the laws and regulations administered by the Alcohol Tax/United States Bureau of Internal Revenue, in connection with the use of tax-free alcohol in the laboratories of the University of Wisconsin at Madison and/or at its Extension Centers:

Vice President of Business and Finance Secretary of the Regents Controller.

Adopted.

2. That the agreement with Marathon County for use of the County Normal Building at Wausau, Wisconsin, by the University Extension Center at Wausau be renewed for a period ending June 30, 1953, under the same terms and conditions as the previous agreement approved May 28, 1948, except that subsequent renewals are to be for a three-year period subject to cancellation at any time upon one year's advance notice of intention to cancel; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.

That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign agreements with Alpha Epsilon Pi, 10 Langdon Street, Madison, and Phi Gamma Delta, 16 Langdon Street, Madison, for the furnishing of room, board, and other services for students enrolled in the Summer Institutes of the School for Workers for a period of eight weeks beginning June 25, 1950.

- 4. That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign an agreement between the City of Milwaukee and The Regents of the University of Wisconsin covering the use of space by the University of Wisconsin Extension Center at Milwaukee in the Boys' Trade and Technical High School, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, during the 1950-51 school year for Engineering courses, at a rental of \$71.00 per week. (Total estimated cost \$2414.00)

Renewal of Cooperative Agreement No. Api-3474 between The Regents of the University of Wisconsin and the Agricultural Research Administration, United States Department of Agriculture, for the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951, relating to services, supplies, and materials to be furnished by the University in connection with the operation of the National Barley and Malt Laboratory, Madison, at a total cost to the Government of not to exceed \$2500.
 - b. Project Agreement No. 5 under Contract AT(ll-l)-64 with the United States Atomic Energy Commission, covering research in the Department of Plant Pathology on "The Use of Radioactive Isotopes in determining the Role of Root-grafting in the Translocation of Water, Nutrients, and Disease-producing Organisms Among Forest Trees," during the period July 1, 1950, through June 30, 1951; under which the Government contributes \$8740.
 - c. Project Agreement No. 6 under Contract AT(11-1)-64 with the United States Atomic Energy Commission, covering research in the Department of Chemistry on "High Frequency Titration Procedures and Instruments," during the period September 1, 1950 through August 31, 1951, under which the Government contributes \$5400.

- d. Lease with the Corps of Engineers, United States Army, Office of the District Engineer, Chicago District, covering the University's use and occupancy for residential purposes during the one year term beginning July 16, 1950, and ending July 15, 1951, of Staff House No. 5, located at Badger Ordnance Works, Baraboo, Wisconsin, at an annual rental of \$384 to be paid by the University.
- e. Supplement No. 1 to Contract No. W-11-175-TNG-(AAV)-414 with the United States of America Fifth Army, terminating training as of March 20, 1950, of an officer enrolled in a course in Chemistry, and establishing the exact dates of the first semester of the academic year 1950-51.
- f. Amendment No. 10 to Navy Department, Bureau of Ordnance, Contract No. Nord-9938, covering research in the Department of Chemistry, extending the contract from August 31, 1950 through November 30, 1950, providing an additional \$56,000 for research under Task Order WIS-1, and continuing the overhead rate of 12.04% through December 31, 1950.
- g. Amendment No. 4 to Office of Naval Research Contract No. N7onr-28503, covering research in the Department of Physics, providing for extension of the termination date of the contract from June 14, 1950 to June 30, 1950, with no increase in funds.
- h. Office of Naval Research Contract No. Nonr-07100 covering research in the Department of Physics on "Infrared Polarization Phenomena," during the period June 15, 1950 through June 15, 1951, at a cost of \$4458 to be paid by the Government.
- i. Memorandum Agreement with the United States Fish and Wildlife Service for research by the Department of Zoology, concerning the premature spawning of Salmon, during the current season, under which the Government agrees to pay travel and subsistence costs for cooperating members of the Department.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Arveson, action No. 2 (a) to (d), inclusive, listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (II. Report of Actions Taken) was approved.

The Secretary reported that the July meeting of the Regents would be held at La Crosse on July 15, 1950, at the invitation of Regent Gelatt.

The Secretary reported that the term of C. F. Hedges as a Regent appointee on the Board of Visitors would expire on June 30, 1950. Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED, That C. F. Hedges, Neenah, be reappointed to the Board of Visitors for a term ending June 30, 1954.

The Secretary reported that, in accordance with the action of the Regents on April 15, 1950, requesting that consideration be given to the reorganization of the Regent committees in order to expedite the work of the Board, copies of a proposal of the reorganization of the Regent committees together with a recommendation for the amendment of the By-Laws had been sent to the Regents for their consideration. (Copies were distributed to the Regents at this meeting.)

The following motion was made by Regent Watson, and seconded by Regent Campbell:

That the By-Laws of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin and resolutions previously adopted by the Board be amended, effective July 1, 1950, as follows:

- 1. That all of Chapter III of the By-Laws as published in 1939 and as subsequently amended, and that all resolutions previously adopted relating to standing and special committees of the Board, except the resolution of April 12, 1947, relating to the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee, be repealed.
- 2. That Chapter III of the By-Laws of the Board be enacted and adopted to read as follows:

CHAPTER III

Committees of the Board

Section 1. There shall be four standing committees of the Board of Regents as follows:

- (1) Educational Committee consisting of four members appointed annually by the President of the Board immediately following the Annual Meeting. The President of the Board shall serve as an ex officio member and shall designate the chairman of the Committee.
- (2) Business and Finance Committee consisting of five members appointed annually by the President of the Board immediately following the Annual Meeting. The President of the Board shall serve as an exofficio member and shall designate the chairman of the Committee.
- (3) Regent Faculty Conference Committee consisting of all members of the Board of Regents, the President of the University, nine elected members of the University Faculty, and the Chairman of the University Committee, ex officio.
- (4) Executive Committee consisting of the President of the Board, who shall serve as chairman, the Vice President of the Board, the chairman of the Educational Committee, and the chairman of the Business and Finance Committee.

Special committees may be appointed from time to time as necessity de-mands.

Meetings of committees may be called by the Chairman, or by the Secretary of the Board upon the request of two members, or upon the request of the President of the University.

Duties of the Educational Committee

Section 2. The Educational Committee shall have charge of consideration of all matters of an educational nature related to the instructional, research, and public service functions of the University, the academic personnel, and to student services and welfare.

Duties of the Business and Finance Committee

Section 3. The Business and Finance Committee shall have charge of consideration of all matters related to finances, trust funds, business operations, new construction and improvements, and to non-academic personnel.

Duties of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee

Section 4. The Regent-Faculty Conference Committee may consider and make recommendations to the appropriate person, board, or agency on any matter relating to or concerning the University in all its departments, colleges, schools, and activities, whether educational, business, or otherwise.

Duties of the Executive Committee

Section 5. The Executive Committee shall have the powers of the Board, when the Board is not in session, and shall provide for the execution of orders and resolutions not otherwise specially committed or provided for. A separate record of the proceedings of this committee shall be kept by the Secretary, and the same shall be submitted to the Board for approval at the next regular or special meeting.

A called vote was taken, all Regents present voting "Aye". The motion was declared carried and the By-Laws were ordered amended accordingly.

Regent Werner presented the report of the Finance Committee. Upon motion

of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the remittance of \$398.33 received from the First Wisconsin Trust Company as the University of Wisconsin's share by order of the Court of the residue of a separate trust established in accordance with the Last Will and Testament of Ida M. Sivyer, deceased, which separate trust has been liquidated by order of the Milwaukee County Court, be added to the principal of the Sivyer Educational Fund Scholarship account in the University Trust Funds. (The present principal of this account is \$40,000, which is the amount of the original bequest. The income is used as directed in the Will to provide at least two annual scholarships to worthy and deserving students.)

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That the principal of the Robinson-Edwards Professorship Fund (Florence Porter Røbinson Estate) be transferred from the Consolidated Trust Funds and the Miscellaneous Trust Fund to a segregated trust account, and that the income be added to principal annually until the principal sum produces an annual return of not less than \$6000, as provided by the terms of the Last Will and Testament of Florence Porter Robinson, deceased.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That income of 3.3% for the year 1949-50 be distributed to the individual accounts in the Consolidated University Trust Funds on the basis of the principal amount of each account on July 1, 1949, and that earnings in excess of 3.3% be credited to the Suspense Account.

Regent Werner moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Finance Committee:

- 4. (1) That in accordance with the authority provided by section 36.161(2) Wisconsin Statutes, the Regents authorize the Committee on Loans and Undergraduate Scholarships to award not to exceed 250 scholarships to freshmen who are bona fide residents of the State, who during their high school course were good students, who possess qualifications for leadership, and who are in financial need; and that the scholarships remit the general incidental fee in each of the two semesters in which the recipient is a freshman. Those attending the University at Madison will be required to pay the regular Infirmary and Memorial Union fees.
- (2) That to be eligible for such scholarships the student should rank in the top one-fourth of his high school graduating class, have the recommendation of his principal, and demonstrate to the Committee on Loans and Scholarships a clear need for the financial aid provided.

The motion was seconded by Regent Arveson.

Regent Jones stated that, although he had no intention of placing scholarship in low repute, he could not support this recommendation because in a state-supported University all of the young people of the state who are qualified to enroll in the University should be treated on a basis of equality and that to provide scholarships to a limited number on the basis of scholastic attainment would be discriminatory. After considerable discussion of the question of policy involved, Regent Werner withdrew his motion, and the second was withdrawn by Regent Arveson. Regent Werner then moved the adoption of the following motion:

That in accordance with the authority provided by section 36.161(2) Wisconsin Statutes, the Regents authorize the Committee on Loans and Undergraduate Scholarships to award not to exceed 250 scholarships to freshmen who are bona fide residents of the State, who during their high school course were good students, who possess qualifications for leadership, and who are in financial need; and that the scholarships remit the general incidental fee in each of the two semesters in which the recipient is a freshman. Those attending the University at Madison will be required to pay the regular Infirmary and Memorial Union fees.

The motion was seconded by Regent Campbell.

It was then moved by Regent Jones and seconded by Regent Grady that the motion be amended by the elimination of the words "not to exceed 250". A called vote was taken on the amendment, Regents Campbell, Grady, Jones voting "Aye"; Regents Arveson, Sensenbrenner, Watson, Werner voting "No". The amendment was declared lost.

A called vote was taken on the above motion which had been moved by Regent Werner and seconded by Regent Campbell. Regents Arveson, Campbell, Sensenbrenner, Watson, Werner voted "Aye"; Regents Grady and Jones voted "No". The motion was declared carried. On this roll call Regent Grady stated that he was voting in the negative because he was opposed to the provision on limiting the scholarships to 250; Regent Jones stated that he was voting in the negative because of the discriminatory aspects of the recommendation; and Regent Watson, voting in the affirmative, stated that he would always support the administration's definition of "good students".

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a supplementary agreement with the U.S. Geological Survey for an investigation of water resources of the State of Wisconsin, each party to expend not to exceed \$1,050 for the remainder of the fiscal year, 1949-50, in addition to the original allotment of \$15,000 by each party.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the following budget for the 1950 School of Banking, to be conducted on the Madison campus in the School of Commerce during the period August 20 to September 2, inclusive, be approved:

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the University operating budget of \$28,943,143 for all services for the fiscal year July 1, 1950 to June 30, 1951, including the salaries, fund allocations, appointments, reappointments, and promotions listed in the budget schedules as revised by the Finance Committee be approved.

A called vote was taken, all Regents present voting "Aye". The motion was declared carried.

The Secretary reported that Regent Kleczka had requested President Sensenbrenner, in writing, that his vote be recorded in favor of the adoption of the budget for the year 1950-51, as recommended by the President and the administration of the University, and as recommended by the Finance Committee, and as amended by the Regents. President Sensenbrenner asked that Mr. Kleczka's letter be filed with the record of the meeting and that the record show his vote in favor of the budget.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That authority be granted for the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign a contract with private architects on a time and material basis, total cost of approximately \$2,000.00, to complete the plans and specifications for the Residents and Interns Dormitory.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That inasmuch as the house which is now used by the Nursery School will be removed to make room for the new State Laboratory of Hygiene building, the administrative officers be authorized to proceed with the remodelling of appropriate space to provide necessary facilities for the Home Economics Mursery School and to charge the cost thereof to the Reserve for Capital Purchases, Remodelling and Contingencies, and to report the estimated cost to the Board at a subsequent meeting.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the Constructional Development Committee be authorized to act for the Regents, upon recommendation of the Steering Committee of the Campus Planning Commission, in matters relating to the exterior design of the State Laboratory of Hygiene Building.

Regent Grady voted "No", stating that he would want to see the final design.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Campus Planning Commission, the preliminary floor plans and elevations of the Chemical Engineering Unit of the east wing of the Engineering Building as presented by the architects and the building committee (Scheme C, Unit 2, Revised 6/9/50) be approved and that authority be granted to complete the plans and specifications.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the administrative officers be authorized to negotiate with architects on various proposals, for the preparation of preliminary plans for the construction of approximately 200 family living units for married students and junior faculty, which can be considered at the next Regent meeting.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Campus Planning Commission, authority be granted for the employment of architects to prepare preliminary plans and outline specifications for a new dormatory to house approximately 600 students to be located at the northwest corner of University Avenue and Park Street, and to include replacement of the present Chadbourne Hall. That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract for architectural services to be charged to Fund 5-A. The scheduling of the construction work should give due consideration to:

- (a) Early elimination of the fire hazard in Chadbourne Hall.
- (b) The needs of the department of physics and the school of pharmacy for laboratory space now provided in temporary buildings on the site under consideration.

In presenting the following resolution in memory of Dr. Edward Ashel Birge, Regent Grady stated:

"Since our last meeting we have been brought to the melancholy realization of the passing of a great scholar and scientist, one who has been associated with this University for the past seventy-five years - Dr. Edward Ashel Birge. I therefore desire to present a resolution which has been prepared by one well qualified and for many years closely associated with Dr. Birge, and I take pride in presenting it to this Board with the fine thought and choice of language so characteristic of its author, Dr. George C. Sellery."

"MEMORIAL RESOLUTION

"The Regents of the University of Wisconsin mourn the death of Dr. Edward Ashel Birge (1851-1950), the last living link with the now distant days of Bascom, Chamberlin, and Adams, when the young University began to realize its modern duties. The Regents mourn; but their sorrow at the ending of a notable life, seventy-five years of which were spent in the service of the University, is swallowed up in contemplation of the achievements of that life and of the inspiration which it has been to all the friends of this and other universities.

"Dr. Birge was a scientist, a pioneer in the field of limnology. He was also a humanist, rejoicing in the values of great literature, with which his mind and heart were stored. He was also a lay theologian, whose studies of St. Paul were embodied in fourteen annual sermons on the Apostle to the Gentiles. As a professor of zoology he did the spade work for the premedical sciences, and as dean and president he exemplified the virtues of the well-rounded University administrator, who saw no conflict between science and the humanities (and as a Christian no conflict between science and religion).

"Dr. Birge's teaching was made vital by research, and research was his refreshment from administration. As dean (1891-1918), acting president (1900-1903), and president (1918-1925), he continued to find spare time to keep alive his investigations of the life of our lakes, and when he laid down the duties of the presidency in 1925 he plunged with happy alacrity into full-time research, which continued for almost a full quarter century. Retirement had no terrors for him; it was merely a change of occupation.

"Dr. Birge's services were not confined to the University. His memberships in civic, state and national societies were so numerous as to constitute a veritable roll of honor.

"The Regents tender their sympathy to Dr. Birge's family and record their pride in his accomplishments."

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Jones, the resolution in memory of Dr. Edward Ashel Birge was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

President Fred presented the resignation of Harry A. Stuhldreher as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, effective September 30, 1950, and stated that Mr. Stuhldreher has accepted a position with the United States Steel Corporation. President Fred read Mr. Stuhldreher's letter of resignation and expressed appreciation for the services rendered by Mr. Stuhldreher at the University. Upon recommendation made with regret by President Fred and concurred in by the Athletic Board, and upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was

VOTED, That the resignation of Harry A. Stuhldreher, as Professor and Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, effective as of September 30, 1950, be accepted with regret and with full appreciation for what he has done for the development of the athletic program at the University.

President Fred, upon recommendation of the Athletic Board, recommended the appointment of Guy M. Sundt as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, with rank of Professor, effective October 1, 1950; salary at the rate of \$9500 on the twelve months basis. Upon motion of Regent Arveson, seconded by Regent Grady, it was

VOTED, That Guy M. Sundt be appointed Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, with rank of Professor, effective October 1, 1950, at a salary of \$9500 on the twelve months basis.

Regent Sensenbrenner made a statement expressing appreciation for the services Harry Stuhldreher had rendered the University.

The meeting adjourned at 12:15 P.M.

PROPOSED COMBINED COURSE IN CIVIL ENGINEERING AND CITY PLANNING

The idea of establishing a combined course in civil engineering and city planning originated in the Committee on the Regional Planning Course. The proposed curriculum has been approved by that Committee.

The five-year combined course in civil engineering and city planning is designed to provide professional training in city planning for students who are enrolled in the civil engineering course. Two degrees would be granted at the end of the fifth year: Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering and Bachelor of Science in City Planning.

It is believed that this combined course will provide needed professional training for men who wish to engage in municipal engineering work and city planning. The combined course will be administered by the Department of Civil Engineering. Members of the Civil Engineering staff will serve as advisers.

Emphasis is placed on problems encountered in the modern city by city planners and municipal engineers. Courses in city planning theory and design, municipal engineering practice, architecture, airports, and traffic control are required in order to train the student in techniques of city planning. Courses in land economics, urban geography, municipal government, public finance, population problems, statistics, social organization, and local planning administration are required in order to give the student a foundation in economics and social studies. A course in public speaking is included to develop the student's ability in oral presentation.

I am happy to recommend the acceptance of a rare literary treasure this morning. The Franklin J. Matchette Foundation of New York has presented to our library the \$100 memorial edition of the "The Mystery of Hamlet, King of Denmark, or What We Will" by the poet, Percy MacKaye.

This is the most ambitious work of an American playwright who has devoted more than half a century to literary study and authorship.

Both devotees of Shakespeare, Percy MacKaye and his wife lived and breathed his work. Mrs. MacKaye, who died in 1939, appears as Sylvia in the Prelude to the Volume of four plays, and this magnificent memorial edition is dedicated to her. The entire work, in fact, is in the form of an Elizabethan garland of four wreaths, a dedicatory love poem.

The four plays treat the complicated pattern of events leading to the poisoning of Hamlet's father in the orchard by his brother Claudius. Familiar lines and sometimes whole scenes from Shakespeare's Hamlet are used in the immense fabric of this astonishing work. The four plays were first performed at the Pasadena Playhouse in 1949.

Walton Pyre, a Wisconsin alumnus and the brother of the late "Sunny"

Pyre, suggested to the foundation that the gift be presented to our library, where,
as he wrote, "it can be properly preserved and made available to the entire student body as well as to the speech and dramatics departments."

I recommend its acceptance.
