


COVERING THE BADGERS

WORKING PRESS:

Wisconsin's working press-radio-television facilities are very limited at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum. The Press should enter the Coliseum through the Player's Entrance at the North end of the building.

WORKING TICKETS:

All Requests for working press credentials must be made through the Sports News Service office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pick-up at the Player's Entrance of the Coliseum. Working press tickets contain assigned locations.

RADIO:

Visiting radio stations will be admitted upon the recommendations of the visiting school. Booths are assigned based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. Tickets will be held at the Sports News Service office or at the Player's Entrance of the Coliseum the day of the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS:

Photo passes are limited because of space at the Coliseum. Photographers are asked to consider the hockey fans when working in the Coliseum. Requests will be granted on a priority first-come, first-served basis.

PARKING:

There is no reserved press parking at the Dane County Coliseum.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS:

Player interviews may be conducted immediately outside the Wisconsin dressing room following each game.

Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches.

COACHES INTERVIEWS:

Jeff Sauer will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach Sauer will be conducted in the Coach's dressing room.

Best time to interview Coach Sauer is between 10 and 12 noon at the hockey office or daily after practice.

Your hosts in the Dane County Coliseum and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director, and **Doug Spencer**, Sports Information Assistant.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club. He was named to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1979.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons — **William**, 22, **David**, 19, and **Eric**, 17.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV

Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

Bob handles radio and television contracts for the athletic department and is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball, and hockey highlight films. He has also done color commentary on Wisconsin's hockey broadcasts, and has served in past years as producer-host of Badger Football on the state's public television stations.

He and his wife **Janis** are parents of daughters **Dawn**, 25, **Amie**, 22 and son **Adam**, 13.


Bob is a past president of the Madison Pen and Mike Club.



1984-85 WISCONSIN HOCKEY OUTLOOK

Perhaps it is only fitting that in a season where newness has taken on more meaning in college hockey than perhaps ever before, the 1984-85 University of Wisconsin hockey team might just follow suit with a "newness" all its own.

As the Badgers and their fellow members of the WCHA (Western Collegiate Hockey Association) prepare for an expanded league with newcomers Michigan Tech and Northern Michigan as well as an unprecedented 14-game swing with the newly-formed Hockey East, the new campaign promises more excitement and national exposure for the game than at any time in its history.

Every game between the WCHA and Hockey East will, along with all WCHA match-ups, count in the fi-

nal standings at the end of the regular season. (Each contest is worth two points in the respective association standings.) It will undoubtedly make for one of the best league races in memory, and with 68 points at stake in the WCHA, expect a pretty tight fight.

"I think the WCHA-Hockey East relationship is going to be a very exciting thing," said Badger Head Coach Jeff Sauer. "Not only for the fans but also for the players and coaches. It will give us a breath of fresh air in terms of preparing for teams on a week-to-week basis. At times, there might be a tendency to get somewhat passe getting ready to play the same teams again and again — you have a pretty good idea what they're going to do. Now we're go-

ing to have new areas to look at. I'm sure the fans are going to enjoy it. I know we, as a team, certainly are."

For Wisconsin and third-year coach Sauer, the opening of training camp in the fall brought with it a new eagerness and heightened expectations. In 1983-84, the Badgers managed to put together a very respectable 21-17-1 record despite being hard hit by both graduation and the U.S. and Canadian Olympic Hockey Teams following the NCAA Championship campaign of '82-83. There were several high points a year ago . . . the nine-game winning streak from November 4th to the 26th, the 3-1 and 9-0 sweep of Minnesota in the Coliseum, memorable games with the West German National Team and the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team, and a win and a tie in stormy Grand Forks against North Dakota in early February.

But there were also, as could be expected, a few disappointing ones as well. The Cardinal and White were 11-14-1 against the rest of the WCHA, including seven straight conference losses that dropped the Badgers from 6-4 on November 19th to 6-11 on January 20th.

For 1984-85, Sauer's third Badger team will be dominated by underclassmen. Of the 33 players listed on the pre-season roster, 18 are either freshmen or sophomores, while another nine are juniors. And of the six seniors, only three played regularly a year ago — Paul Houston, Paul Houck and Jeff White.

"We have a good nucleus of returning forwards, including six of our top nine scorers from a year ago," said Sauer, "as well as some excellent freshmen forwards to add to that group. The new players entering our program were recruited especially for their expertise in certain areas of the game, and thus we think we'll be pretty solid up front. We hope we've added some strength and depth at center and at the wings, and hope several of them can make a contribution this winter."

Top returning scorer is senior center Paul Houston, who led the team in goals with 25 and points with 48. From Toronto, Ontario, Houston also topped the Badgers in power-play goals with nine and winning goals with three, and now ranks 26th all-time at the UW in scoring with 49 goals, 59 assists and 108 points. In action a year ago, the shifty Houston had at least one point in 22 different games, had multi-goal games on nine separate occasions, and was the Badgers'


"Most Consistent Player". He had 26 WCHA points with 14 goals, and earned honorable mention All-WCHA honors by the media and second-team league status as picked by opposing players.

Along with Houston, Sauer will look to explosive senior winger Paul Houck, who has 136 career points entering 1984-85 on 67 goals and 69 assists to rank 16th all-time in school annals. The 5-11, 185-pounder got off to a slow start in

'83-84 after scoring 38 goals in '82-83, but came on strong to finish with 20 goals and 20 assists for 40 points in 37 games. He, too, earned All-WCHA honorable mention acclaim from the media and second-team All-WCHA status from opposing players. Houck has been instrumental on the Badger power-play the past two seasons, with 22 man-advantage tallies. He had 23 WCHA points in 24 games last winter, and notched at least one point in 25 different games.

A strong group of juniors, featuring Jim Johannson, Dave Maley, Ernie Vargas and Marty Wiitala, will figure strongly into Wisconsin's hopes at the forward position. Johannson ranked fifth in overall team scoring last season with 17 goals and 21 assists for 38 points, but led the Badgers in WCHA scoring with 29 points. He added five power-play goals, had at least one point on 24 different occasions, and was named Wisconsin's "Most Competitive Player". Maley, one of the Badgers' biggest players at 6-2, 205, has 78 points in his first 85 games with the UW, and has led his class in scoring as both a freshman and a sophomore. A year ago, #20 had ten goals and 28 assists for 38 points overall as well as 25 points in league play. He could be a key player for the Cardinal and White.


One of the most gifted hockey players on the team, winger Marty

Wiitala hopes 1984-85 will be the year he explodes offensively. A superb skater, Wiitala upped his freshman point total of 18 to 30 in '83-84, notching at least one point on 19 different evenings. (Wiitala and Johannson, incidentally, were members of the 1984 U.S. National Junior Hockey Team along with Tony Granato and Gary Suter and all four players missed four games over the Christmas Holidays in 1983.) A seldom-penalized player, Wiitala has the potential to be a dominating force on the ice. Also back is last season's "Most Improved Player" in winger Ernie Vargas from Coon Rapids, Minnesota. The 6-2, 200-pounder came on strong late in the '83-84 campaign, eventually finishing with five goals and 15 assists — more than three times his offensive output as a freshman. He is expected to make a strong impact on the squad this year as a two-time letterman.

Also at forward is one of last season's first-year delights in center Tony Granato, who displayed the talent that figures to make him one of college hockey's most exciting players in the next couple of years. In 35 games, the Downers Grove, Illinois product had 14 goals and 17 assists for 31 points to rank eighth on the Wisconsin team. Granato scored at least a point in 20 different games last winter, and also notched a point in each of three exhibition

games against West Germany and the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team. Granato also had five power-play goals, two game-winners, and one short-handed tally.

Others who will challenge for regular duty in 1984-85 are senior Tom Ryan, junior Steve Tschipper, and sophomore Paul Graveline, who played in 21 games as a freshman, including 11 WCHA contests. Also hoping to contribute to the Badgers' fortunes are sophomores Tony Scheid and Judd Sondreal.

Newcomers at forward are Micky Doner of Edmonds, Washington; Pat Ford of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan; Scott Mellanby of Islington, Ontario; Paul Ranheim of Edina, Minnesota; Glenn Revak of Winnipeg, Manitoba; and Steve Tuttle of Vancouver, British Columbia. This group, possibly one of the strongest contingents of freshman forwards in recent history at Wisconsin, could make a strong impact on the team's roster as the campaign moves along.

The Badgers averaged a respectable 4.44 goals-per-game in 1983-84, but were held to two or fewer goals on seven occasions. One of the biggest areas of concern for Sauer and his coaching staff was the squad's inability to come up with the crucial power-play goal in several key games. (Wisconsin converted on 40 of 190 man-advantage opportuni-

ties for a percentage of 21.2). Another area Sauer hopes to improve is Wisconsin's first-period output. Wisconsin was outscored 57-47 in first period play, but held 58-45 and 66-53 goal advantages in the second and third periods respectively.

Defensively, the 1984-85 Badgers must be stronger if the team hopes to make a run at the league title. Wisconsin surrendered an average of 4.00 goals-per-game last year, well above their impressive team goals-against average of 2.78 in 1982-83.

"Our defensive style of play is probably the area of greatest concern for us," added Sauer. "We've brought in two 20-year-old defensemen as freshmen in Garry Bunz and Ken MacKenzie as well as an excellent 17-year-old prospect in Victor Posa. And with the return of Tim Thomas as well, who missed all of the 1983-84 season, the picture is even brighter. Those are four good hockey players we did not have a year ago, and four players who can definitely make a positive contribution."

Thomas, who has regained his eligibility at the University of Wisconsin, played 55 games with the 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Team and was the last player cut from the final Olympic roster of 20. He had 22 points playing both defense and for-

ward. He will have two years of eligibility remaining at Wisconsin, and with his versatility, he should be a big bonus this winter.

Sauer returns six lettermen on defense, led by sophomore Gary Suter and junior Matt Walsh. Suter, an honorable mention all-WCHA selection as a freshman, displayed great poise as a first-year player and is expected to be an anchor on the Badger blueline. In 35 games (he missed four as a member of the 1984 U.S. National Junior Hockey Team) in '83-84, the 5-11, 185-pounder had four goals and 18 assists for 22 points and played effectively on both the power-play and man-short units.

Walsh, a two-time letterman, is one of the better body-checkers in college hockey and provides some strength around the UW net. He had 19 points a year ago and has missed just three games his first two years at Wisconsin.

Other returning letterwinners who could see a lot of playing time on defense are sophomore Mike McGrath and senior Jeff White, both of whom played in every Badger game in 1983-84. McGrath had 12 points as a freshman, including one game-winner and one short-

handed goal. Both players were rushed into regular duty when Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver, Pat Ethier and Jeff Andringa did not return, and both did a solid job in a tough situation.

Players who saw action at the blueline last winter and who are also back include two-year letterman Eric Faust, who battled a broken wrist throughout the '83-84 season but still managed to play in 27 games, and sophomore Dennis Will. Sauer expects continued improvement from both as they challenge for a regular spot.

"How fast our defensive play comes around will tell a lot as to how we get started," continued Sauer. "Our youth is a concern, but we are confident that our young players are quality athletes. Our goaltending is relatively untested, and that, too, is an area we will have to strengthen. Gary Baxter will be one of the goaltenders and this will be an excellent opportunity for him. Dean Anderson comes to us very highly rated and hopefully will add to that position as well as Jim Lozinski, who is eligible for 1984-85 after transferring from the University of Denver."

Baxter, a junior, was 10-6 a year ago in 889 minutes of play and posted a 3.71 goals-against average. He had a shutout against Minnesota and finished with a save percentage

of .882 with 410 saves. His career record is 15-9-2 with a 3.68 GAA and an .879 saves percentage. Baxter was also in the nets when the Badgers stunned the 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Team 4-2 last January 7th, playing his finest collegiate game to date with 39 saves. He has shown tremendous potential on occasion and in 1984-85 will have the chance he has waited for after playing behind Marc Behrend and Terry Kleisinger much of the last two years.


Wisconsin's schedule features first-ever series with Lowell, Yale, and Maine as well as home and home series with WCHA members UM-Duluth, Michigan Tech, and Northern Michigan. The Badgers have only two games with North Dakota, Minnesota, Denver, and Colorado College, with the Fighting Sioux and the Tigers appearing on Coliseum ice.

Just how good the 1984-85 Wisconsin hockey team will be remains to be seen, but the squad certainly does have a great deal of promise. There are a number of outstanding athletes on the roster, but a good number of them are lacking experience. If the returning upperclassmen can take charge at the outset, and Sauer can mold together an improved defense, Wisconsin hockey fortunes should definitely be on the upswing in '84-85.

Jeff Sauer enters his third season as Wisconsin's Head Hockey Coach in 1984-85. In two years with the Badgers, Sauer owns a 54-27-5 record, and a winning percentage of .657.

A year ago, despite losing nine of the 22 players that claimed the NCAA title in 1982-83, the Badgers still managed to post a 21-17-1 record, the 14th time in the past 17 years Wisconsin has won 20 or more games. Included in these 21 wins was a 4-2 Wisconsin victory over the 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Team (The Badgers were the only college team to beat the USA).

(Three members of the '82-83 team — Pat Flatley, Marc Behrend and Chris Chelios — played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo and then went on to star in the National Hockey League.)

In 1982-83, Jeff Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach had done before. His University of Wisconsin Badgers captured the NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the school's best records in history with a 33-10-4 mark.

The UW managed to finish third in the WCHA regular season standings in '82-83 with a 15-9-2 record, just one point out of second place.

The Badgers then went on to beat Colorado College, North Dakota and Minnesota in two-game, total-goal series to claim the WCHA Playoff Championship and gain the No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

Following the Christmas break, Wisconsin compiled a 23-4-2 record and an .828 winning percentage, including two NCAA Quarterfinal wins over St. Lawrence and, of course, the victories over Providence and Harvard in the semifinals and finals that vaulted the Badgers to their fourth national title since 1973.

In the summer of 1983, Sauer served as Head Coach of the South team at the 1983 National Sports Festival in Colorado Springs. He was a member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Committee, and in '82-83 was Chairman of the WCHA Coach's Committee and served on the NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee. He directs his own hockey school in Madison, works with the Stan Mikita Hockey School for the Hearing-Impaired, and is involved with several nationwide hockey clinics in the summer months.

The 41-year-old Sauer had big shoes to fill when he left a comfortable tenure at Colorado College to take over for Bob Johnson in July of 1982. But after his first two years, Sauer has proved he was, indeed, the perfect choice. And with 13 seasons in the WCHA now behind him,

Jeff is now the "Dean" of league coaches.

Sauer came to Madison from Colorado Springs, where he had served as that school's Head Coach since 1971. He won more than 180 games at CC, and was twice named WCHA "Coach of the Year". His first award came following his rookie season in 1971 and the second following the 1975-76 campaign when Colorado College posted an impressive 23-14-0 record and finished third in the final WCHA standings. Sauer also guided his '80-81 Tigers to third place.

Wisconsin hockey fans will probably never forget the almost legendary "Black Sunday" in March, 1981, when Sauer's CC Tigers came back with a miracle 11-4 upset over the Badgers in the Coliseum to claim the two-game, total-goals playoff victory.

Jeff is a 1965 graduate of Colorado College, where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Sociology. During his undergraduate years in Colorado Springs, he competed in both varsity hockey and baseball.



Jeff and his wife, Jamie, have two children — Chip, 9 and Beth, 4.



In his ninth season as assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin is Grant Standbrook.

Standbrook has played an instrumental part in three Wisconsin NCAA Championships—1977, 1981 and 1983. He has had, in addition to his on-ice coaching duties, responsibility for the Badgers' off-ice conditioning program and has served as the program's chief recruiter.

Prior to his tenure here at the UW, Grant was Bob Johnson's assistant coach for three years with the USA National and Olympic Teams. He is a graduate of the University of Minnesota-Duluth (1961), where he lettered in hockey two years and served as an alternate captain in 1960-61.

Standbrook began his coaching career at Churchill High School in Winnipeg in 1961, and then took over as head coach at Greenway High School in Coleraine, MN where his teams posted a record of 56-21-2 from 1963-66.

Grant entered the collegiate coaching ranks in 1966 when he joined the staff at Dartmouth College. He became that school's head coach in 1970, and held that position for five years. He also coached

soccer and lacrosse, and was a member of the Canadian championship soccer team in 1963.

Grant, 45, and his wife, Joy, have three children, and all three are enrolled at the UW. They are Todd, Jill and John.

MIKE KEMP

Administrative Assistant Coach

Entering his third season with the Wisconsin hockey program in 1984-85 is Mike Kemp, who will again serve as administrative assistant coach to Jeff Sauer.

In 1981-82, the 31-year-old Kemp served as administrative assistant under former Badger coach Bob Johnson, but moved on to Illinois-Chicago for the 1982-83 season as an assistant coach for the Flames. Under Sauer, Kemp has recruiting and coaching as well as a wide range of administrative duties with the Badger program. He also serves as executive director of the Blue Line Club, of which one of his primary duties is the publication of the official game program at all home games.

A native of Duluth, MN, Kemp is a 1975 graduate of Gustavus Adolphus, where he majored in public relations and business. After a year of graduate work at Nebraska-Omaha, he returned to Gustavus Adolphus, where he was the assistant hockey coach as well as the

women's golf coach.

Mike and his wife, Julie, were married in September, 1982.

BILL HOWARD

Goaltending Coach

A key to the Badgers' tremendous success at the goaltending position in recent history has been Bill Howard, who returns in 1984-85 to again assist Sauer in this critical area. Howard is credited with helping develop Marc Behrend and Terry Kleisinger into two of college hockey's top netminders the past three years.

Howard, 39, was a successful high school coach during his ten years at Madison Memorial. His Spartan teams won two state titles and posted an impressive 136-72-1 record.

As a collegiate player, Howard enjoyed a distinguished career at Colorado College, where he performed under former Wisconsin coach Bob Johnson.

In the off-season, Howard is actively involved in numerous summer hockey camps and seminars, including an intensive goaltending school in St. Louis, Mo. He also serves as color commentator on WIBA's hockey broadcasts.

Originally from Grand Forks, ND, Bill and his wife Bonnie have two sons — Troy, 10, and Casey, 9.

Nearly three million fans have watched Badger hockey in the Coliseum since 1967, and since 1972, the UW has drawn 2,327,478 people for an average of 8,433 — or better than 97% of capacity.

Twelve All-Americans . . . names like Brian Engblom, Craig Norwich, Mike Eaves, Mark Johnson and Pat Flatley have worn the Cardinal and White. Olympians — ten in all — have been part of the Badgers' "international" tradition . . . players like Steve Alley, Bob Lundeen, John Taft, Bob Suter, Mark Johnson, Marc Behrend, Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver, Pat Flatley and Ed Lebler.

At Wisconsin, the Badgers have entertained a number of international hockey teams over the years — the Coliseum and Madison are a favorite stop for touring European squads. The UW has played host to teams from the Soviet Union, as well as to the West German and Austrian National Teams, and the U.S. National and Olympic Teams have played on Wisconsin ice eight different times.

WCHA - HOCKEY EAST

A POSITIVE STEP FOR COLLEGE HOCKEY

When it was unveiled on December 2, 1983, the newly-formed alliance between the Western Collegiate Hockey Association and the Hockey East Association sent a wave of excitement and anticipation through college hockey circles across the country.

A revolutionary concept and a positive step forward for the collegiate game, the WCHA-Hockey East alliance has sparked renewed interest and promises to provide a degree of excitement possibly never seen before.

"To say these are exciting times for the WCHA," said Commissioner Otto Breitenbach, "is a vast understatement."

Along with the welcome addition of Michigan Tech and Northern Michigan to the WCHA this season, the WCHA and Hockey East have entered into a joint scheduling agreement for the 1984-85 campaign. Interleague play is the key feature of the agreement, with games played between the two associations counting in the respective league standings during regular season play.

"I think I speak for the entire WCHA in saying that we're extremely excited about the new prospects unfolding as a result of the addition of two great hockey schools — Michigan Tech and Northern Michigan — as well as our alliance with the Hockey East Association, which represents hockey excellence in the Northeastern section of the country," added Breitenbach.

Each WCHA school — Colorado College, Denver, Michigan Tech, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth, North Dakota, Northern Michigan and Wisconsin — will play one two-game series against each of the seven Hockey East schools, with all 14 games counting in the league standings of both the WCHA and Hockey East. WCHA schools have either three or four home series against Hockey East opponents.

Within the WCHA, each school plays three of the other schools four times each, and the remaining four

schools just two games each. For the purposes of scheduling only, the league is broken down into two groups; Colorado College, Denver, Minnesota and North Dakota all playing one another four times; and Michigan Tech, Minnesota-Duluth, Northern Michigan and Wisconsin in the other four-school grouping. Each WCHA team has a total of 34 league games, with 68 possible points at stake.

In the Hockey East, each school plays all six league opponents three times for a total of 18 games. Combined with their 16 games vs. WCHA opponents, they too, will have a total of 34 league games and 68 possible points in the final regular season standings.

"Before the historic meeting between the WCHA and Hockey East schools last December in Minneapolis," said Breitenbach, "the WCHA Expansion Committee had spent nearly two years looking at various alternatives. To have seen it all fall into place so suddenly, at one meeting, was somewhat unexpected, and a pleasant surprise."

The seven members of Hockey East are Boston College, Boston University, University of Lowell, University of Maine, University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University and Providence College. Together with the eight-members of the WCHA, schools that currently belong either to the WCHA or to Hockey East have claimed 13 of the last 14 NCAA Championships, so the competition should be nothing less than fast and furious.

Lou Lamoriello, Commissioner of Hockey East, called the alliance "the greatest thing that's happened to intercollegiate hockey", while

WCHA Executive Committee chairman Dr. George Schubert of North Dakota added, "we are excited about bringing together these institutions of higher education committed to quality academics and intercollegiate hockey programs. To the best of our knowledge, this is the first agreement for regular competition on a national scale in college athletics."


As far as statistics go, each league will have its own scoring champion, statistical leaders and so on — based on the 34 league games. (There will be no "overall" scoring champion named, as such.)

For playoffs, each league will conduct its own post-season tournament entirely independent of each other. In the WCHA, all eight teams enter the first round of the playoffs, with the No. 8 finisher visiting the No. 1 team, No. 7 at No. 2, No. 6 at No. 3, and No. 5 at No. 4 in two-game, total-goals series. Those are followed by semi-final and championship series, as in past seasons, with the playoff champion gaining an automatic berth in the eight-team NCAA tournament field.

The regular season Hockey East champion receives a bye in the first round of league playoffs. The other six teams are involved in two-game series to decide the other three participants in the single-game semi-finals and finals at the Providence Civic Center.

For officiating, all games in which a WCHA school is the home team and all games that Hockey East is the host, the traditional format of two referees and one linesman will be used.

Certainly, the 1984-85 hockey season will be one to remember.





GREAT MOMENTS IN WISCONSIN HOCKEY



DEAN TALAFIOUS STUNS CORNELL WITH OVERTIME GOAL IN 1973 NCAA SEMIFINALS.

March, 1962—Wisconsin Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28-year absence.

December 6, 1963—A rebound goal by Chan Young 5:10 into the sudden death period gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate win, a 3-2 victory over Macalester.

February 22, 1964—Wisconsin concluded its first season of hockey in the modern era with an 8-5-3 record.

December 11, 1964—In an effort to upgrade their program, the Badgers scheduled eight games against WCHA teams, but unfortunately, the Badgers lost all eight of those games.

February 22, 1966—After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers finally post a victory, a 5-4 overtime win over Minnesota. Jim Petruzzes scored on a breakaway just two minutes into the overtime period.

April 1, 1966—Following the retirement of John Riley, Bob Johnson was named head coach of the Badger hockey program.

March, 1968—Wisconsin hockey hit the national spotlight as Bert DeHate, a sophomore center from St.

Paul, MN, wins the national scoring title with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists. DeHate hits for seven hat-tricks, a Badger record, as the team goes 21-10.

March 30, 1969—After another successful season, including an 11-9-2 mark against WCHA teams, the Badgers were admitted to the WCHA.

March, 1970—Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA and qualifies

for the national tournament, where they post a third place finish. Defenseman John Jagger of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario becomes the first Badger player to win All-American honors.

March, 1972—The Badgers make their second NCAA appearance in three years, but again come away with a third place finish.

March, 16, 1973—Wisconsin stuns Cornell 6-5 in overtime to advance to the NCAA finals. A goal with five seconds left in regulation time by sophomore Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous then tallies the game-winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

March, 17, 1973—With a 4-2 win over WCHA rival Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA championship for the first time in the school's history.

March, 25, 1977—After missing the NCAA playoffs for three years, the Badgers make it to the final four again. Les Grauer scored the tying goal against New Hampshire and Mike Eaves won it in overtime 4-3, as the Badgers advanced to the finals.

GREAT MOMENTS CONTINUED

March 26, 1977—Senior Steve Alley culminated the Badgers' finest season ever with a goal 23 seconds into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for their second NCAA title. Wisconsin finished the season at 37-7-1 and was the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Three players were named to the All-American squad. Johnson was named Coach of the Year, and his son Mark was named Freshman of the Year.

March 25, 1978—Wisconsin fans took Providence by storm for the NCAA tournament, and were proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans". Mike Eaves finished his career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson were All-Americans. Wisconsin was fourth in the NCAA's.

March, 1979—Record crowds saw the Badgers (25-13-3) play as 21 of the 23 home games were sell-outs and the average crowd of 8,654 was just eight short of a sell-out. Mark Johnson closed out his Badger career as the top goal scorer in Wisconsin history. He was named to the All-American squad again

and was the college "Player of the Year".

March 27, 1981—Wisconsin returned to the NCAA final four after defeating the best team in the East, Clarkson, 9-8 in a total goal series at Potsdam, NY. After a 5-1 win over Northern Michigan, the Badgers advanced to the finals again.

March 28, 1981—The Badgers regained the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 win over Minnesota. The "back door" Badgers proved they were the champions after defeating the #1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), CCHA (Northern Michigan) and WCHA (Minnesota). The season also marked the end of the ten-team WCHA, as the three Michigan schools and Notre Dame dropped out to join the CCHA.

March 27, 1982—Badgers finish 2nd in NCAA tournament, and compile the second best record in Wisconsin Hockey history at 35-11-1. Center John Newberry and Defenseman Bruce Driver receive All-American status.

June 1, 1982—Bob Johnson resigns after fifteen years at Wisconsin. Johnson had guided the Badgers to three NCAA Championships and the best attendance of any college hockey program in the country.

July 8, 1982—Jeff Sauer, Head Coach at Colorado College and former assistant to Bob Johnson at Wisconsin, is named as the second full-time coach of the Badgers.

March 5, 1983—Sophomores Chris Chelios and Paul Houck score the tying and winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota 6-5 in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA Playoff championships in Minneapolis.

March 24-26, 1983—After sweeping Minnesota in Williams Arena to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship and the No. 1 seed in the West, first-year Coach Jeff Sauer's team swept St. Lawrence 6-2, 7-1 in the NCAA Quarterfinals in Madison to move to the final four for the third straight year. In Grand Forks, ND, the Badgers claimed their fourth NCAA Championship since 1973 with a 2-0 win over Providence in the semifinals and a 6-2 victory over Harvard in the finals. Senior goaltender Marc Behrend was named the Tournament MVP for the second time in his career.

January 7, 1984—Wisconsin becomes the first and only American college team to defeat the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team when the Badgers stun USA 4-2 before 8,732 at the Coliseum.

THE DANE COUNTY COLISEUM HOME OF THE BADGERS



The Dane County Memorial Coliseum, one of college hockey's premier arenas, serves as the home of the University of Wisconsin hockey team.

With theater-style seating for 8,732, the Coliseum is the second largest college hockey arena in the nation. The ice surface is 200' by 85'.


Inside, the Badgers have one of the finest dressing room facilities in college hockey. Each player is assigned an individual stall approximately 3½' x 6' for his equipment and personal belongings. Also lo-

cated in the dressing room is a training room which includes a whirlpool and all the various modalities and exercise equipment for treatment and rehabilitation of injuries. The Badgers also make use of a fully-equipped weightroom inside the Coliseum.

Recognized as the home of some of the nation's very best hockey fans, the Coliseum and the University of Wisconsin hockey team has attracted record crowds since the Badgers joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Association for the 1969-70 season.

Wisconsin has set American college hockey attendance records for 15 consecutive years, dating back to 1970. Nearly three million fans have watched Badger hockey in the Coliseum since 1967, and since 1972, the UW has drawn 2,327,478 people for 276 home dates — an average of 8,433 or better than 97% of capacity.

In 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set an all-time NCAA record, while the 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 is both an NCAA and University of Wisconsin record.


WISCONSIN VS. U.S. OLYMPIC TEAM

On paper, it looked to be a mismatch. The 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Team came to Madison for a weekend series with the Badgers with a 32-14-8 pre-Olympic record. The swift and talented Americans had run up a 3-3-1 record against National Hockey League teams, a 3-2-1 mark against the Soviet Selects, a 3-4-3 record against the Canadian Olympic Team, and an 11-0-0 mark against some of the best American college teams.


Coach Jeff Sauer's Badgers, meanwhile, were just hoping for a strong showing . . . a weekend performance to launch them on for the second half of the WCHA season.

But what happened that weekend in the jam-packed Dane County Memorial Coliseum will be remembered by Badger hockey fans for years to come.

On Friday night, the USA jumped out to a 2-0 first period lead on a goal and an assist by ex-Badger Chris Chelios and the strong goaltending of former NCAA Tour-

ney "MVP" and Wisconsin stand-out Marc Behrend. Freshman Gary Suter brought the UW to within one on a power-play goal near the end of the second period, but the American's Pat LaFontaine tallied his 48th goal of the pre-Olympic schedule at 19:23, with another assist to Chelios, to put the U.S. up 3-1 after two.

Behrend, who led the Badgers to NCAA titles in 1981 and 1983, registered 26 saves in the American's 4-1 victory, with Chelios assisting on the fourth goal as well.

Saturday, however, the Badgers came back to become the first and only college hockey team to defeat the Olympians during the pre-Olympic schedule. 8,732 Badger faithfuls witnessed one of the most intense and dramatic games ever played in the Coliseum, as Sauer's Badgers pulled out a 4-2 win.

Badger goalie Gary Baxter played perhaps the finest game of his career with 39 saves, including 20 in a second period that could have put the UW team away. Paul Houck got Wisconsin off to a 1-0 first period lead at 11:19, but the USA's Mark Kumpel made it 1-1 at 15:19 of the second and that's the way the third period began. Phil Verchota notched a goal at 1:31 to put Lou

Vairo's Americans up 2-1, but the Badgers stormed right back with Gary Suter scoring from Tony Granato and Marty Wiitala just 15 seconds later to make it 2-2. The rest is history.

Dave Maley, from John Johannson, gave Wisconsin a 3-2 lead at 2:04 while Wiitala's shorthanded

goal at 12:33 provided the final 4-2 margin in favor of the Badgers. You should have heard the place.

Also noteworthy during the "Olympic" weekend, was the unveiling of the 1983 NCAA Championship banner, hoisted by Marc Behrend, Ted Pearson, Chris Chelios and John Johannson.


