Method for Increasing Their Accuracy Discovered liby L. S. Smith.

Number five, er.gineering series, of the university bulletin, entitled "An experimental study of field meihods which will irsure to Stadia measure ments greatly increased accuracy," is how ready for distribution at the library and may be obtained by students or others who are interested in the ubject
The writer, Leorard S. Smith, in structor in engineering, began this systematic study nearly four years ago while topograpier on the international oundary survey between the United States and Mexico, and has continued the study in Wisconsin since coming to the university.
By the stadia is meant a very 'uick method for making field measurements by means of a telescope and rod instead of by tape or chain. Such a method, though extensively used by engineers, has been in the past limited to rough work, because it was found that it was always affected by large systematic errors. Mr. Smith has discovered both the true cause and also an easily applied remedy for such errors, so that in the future it will be ros, so to posc so the surveyor's chain.
