Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy Hirsch is the guiding force behind the resurgence in Wisconsin's athletic program.

He's into his fifth year as the school's seventh athletic director and his every move during that time has served to bring back spirit and vitality into an athletic program that ranks among the nation's finest.

Indeed, the school was one of three in the land that produced two national championship teams during the 1972-73 school year — hockey and crew — and football attendance reached an all-time high of 422,721 for six home games, an average of 70,454 per game and giving Wisconsin a fourth place ranking in football attendance.

Hockey attendance set an all-time collegiate record for the fourth straight season at 167,902 — including three straight years over 100,000 fans, and the Dane County Coliseum has been sold out for each of the Badgers' last thirty-two regular season home games over a two-year period.

This resulting wave of enthusiasm is the legacy of **Hirsch's** "Operation Turn-Around" that took him into every area of the State of Wisconsin and the nation meeting, talking — and listening — to high school coaches, athletes, fans, and followers on their home grounds.

The success of **Hirsch's** leadership since taking the athletic directorship on February 28, 1969 should not surprise anyone.

His career has been one of success.

He is a living legend to followers of Wisconsin football and to sports fans and people throughout the entire state even though he played just one season — as a sophomore in 1942 — for the Badgers.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as the great triple threat halfback on Harry Stuhldreher's 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

How did Elroy Hirsch receive the nickname "Crazylegs"?

It happened in the Wisconsin-Great Lakes game at Chicago in October, 1942 as **Hirsch** reeled off a 61 yard scoring run. Francis Powers of the Chicago Daily News coined the phrase — which was to remain with him throughout his career — in the press box that afternoon.

As **Hirsch** recalls, "One of my feet

was going one way, the other one in another direction on that run. I must have been a sight running down the sidelines."

And now that **Elroy Hirsch** is Wisconsin athletic director, does he prefer to be called Elroy or "Crazylegs"?

He answered that question easily for a reporter at a press conference when accepting the job: "Any name is better than Elroy."

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship that season. Only a 6-0 defeat by Iowa at Iowa City deprived the Badgers of Big Ten and national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus eight touchdowns, five by rushing and three by passing.

His play on Michigan's 1943 football team helped the Wolverines to a 6-0 conference record and a share of the Big Ten title with Purdue. The team's only loss was to Notre Dame and again the team he played for was ranked No. 3 in the final Associated Press poll behind Notre Dame and Iowa Sea-hawks.

Hirsch signed with the Chicago Rockets of the All-America Conference after the war, but the three years he spent carrying the ball for the Rockets — 1946-48 — were not happy ones. **Hirsch** suffered a fractured skull, a back injury, a badly torn right leg

ligament, and enough other aches and sprains to keep him immobilized on the bench or in the hospital for the major portion of his three years with Chicago.

Hirsch broke with the Rockets in the summer of 1949 and signed with the Los Angeles Rams. Because of his injury-weakened right knee, **Clark Shaughnessy**, then Rams' head coach, put **Hirsch** on a daily running routine, dreamed up a special headguard to protect **Hirsch** from further injury, and switched him to an end position.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.

Hirsch was one of the athletes — like **Otto Graham** and **Sam Huff** and **Gino Marchetti** — who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

The flankers have done much to provide glamor for the sport, their lithe bodies racing rapidly downfield to haul in a pass, and **Hirsch's** talents insured his place in that development.

In 1951, **Hirsch** displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by **Bobby Mitchell** of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and **Hirsch** had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like **Mitchell**!

That same season **Hirsch** caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by **Don Hutson** of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Hirsch grabbed 343 passes for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdowns during his career with the Rams.

He retired in 1957. He was named into the Wisconsin Hall of Fame in 1965 and to professional football's Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio in 1968.

More recently, he was honored by being named to the all-1950's team commemorating the National Football League's 50th anniversary season and subsequently, to the all-time All-Star NFL team as selected by designated voters in cities holding NFL franchises.

"Crazylegs" also proved himself a talented actor — he made three movies: *Zero Hour*, *Unchained*, and the famed *Crazy Legs*, released in 1953, in which **Hirsch** played himself.

Hirsch joined the Union Oil Company in 1957 as director of sports and special events. He left Union Oil to accept the position of general manager of the Los Angeles Rams in 1960. When the club was sold to **Daniel F. Reeves** in 1963, **Hirsch** became his assistant.

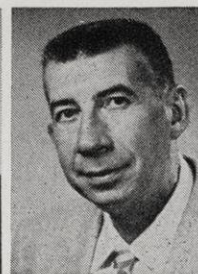

BADGER BASKETBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1973-74

This could be the Year-of-the-Badger in the 1974 Big Ten Basketball race.

Consider:

A) — Four starters return from the 1972-73 team that posted an overall 11-13 record and placed ninth in the Big Ten on a 5-9 mark.

B) — Seventy-four per cent of Wisconsin's scoring and 84 per cent of the rebounding strength from last year's team which played the nation's toughest schedule returns.

c) — Two of the returning regulars are among the tallest in the league — twins **Kim** and **Kerry Hughes**, both just a shade below seven feet.

D) — A talented freshman group headed by seven foot center **Tom Agardy** and including 6-8 forward **Pete Brey** and 6-4 guard **Jim Czajkowski**.

E) — Overall, eleven returning lettermen including an experienced corps of guards and a "power" forward in 6-8 sophomore **Dale Koehler**, Kewaunee.

Coach **John Powless**, starting his sixth year as Wisconsin's basketball mentor, lost only one regular from last year's team — Captain **Leon Howard**, a 6-5 forward who

Powless, naturally, is the twins strongest booster and feels, "They have a really good shot at making it big in the pros if they improve as much this year as they did the past two seasons."

Powless adds, "**Kim** is a very intimidating player with his defensive ability."

Kerry Hughes was named the Most Valuable Player in last year's Milwaukee Classic — He led the meet with 43 points including 25 in the title game against Marquette — And his shooting ability is excellent for a big man. **Powless** notes, "We'd like Kerry to be a little more physical in his play this year."

That may well be the case for both of the twins. **Kim** now tips the scales at 237 pounds on his 6-11½ frame while **Kerry**, one-quarter inch taller, presently weighs 230.

Dale Koehler, 6-8, 230 sophomore, appears set to play the power forward position opposite **Kerry Hughes** and he has shown promise of becoming an outstanding Big Ten player.

Both starting guards — Senior **Gary Anderson**, 6-5, and **Marcus McCoy**, 6-4 junior — return from last year's team and both are steady, capable backcourt performers. **Anderson** averaged 9.0 points per game last year after playing in sophomore campaign at forward two years ago and averaging 7.3 points.

McCoy, who became a starter in mid-season, scored at 7.8 points per game overall — 9.7 in Big Ten play to finish 36th — and reached a season's high of 21 points in Wisconsin's 99-88 win over Illinois here last February 10.

There's backcourt depth available — and experienced — in lettermen guards **Lamont Weaver**, 6-1 senior; **Bruce McCauley**, and **Bob Luchsinger**, all 6-3 juniors, along with **Mark Lotzer**, 6-0 sophomore who had a good freshman year with the varsity reserves.

Weaver, a senior, opened as a starter in the backcourt last year, but ran into illness and never regained his early season form. **McCauley**, a fine outside shot, started several games and averaged 5.2 points a game.

Powless recruited six freshmen and figures that several of them could help including **Tom Agardy**, a 7-0 center from Allen Park, Michigan, and **Jim Czajkowski**, a 6-4 guard from St. Rita High School in Chicago, Illinois, who averaged 31.2 points per game — the all-time best offensive average for a single season by a prep player in Chicago.

Forwards **Buddy Faurote**, 6-6, **John Lenahan**, 6-8, **Pete Brey**, 6-8, and guard **Bill Smith**, 6-2, all have good potential and should develop into steady Big Ten players.

Lettermen forwards counted upon to add to the team's overall potential include **Steve Wilhelm**, a 6-6 senior, and **Rick Piacenza**, a 6-5 junior.

Powless evaluates the 1974 Big Ten chase, thusly, "We have 74 per cent of our scoring and 84 per cent of our rebounding strength back from last year — though both Indiana, defending champion, and Purdue have the bulk of their offense back from last year, too."

He adds, "This year there will be a number of new faces — there are some very good young players coming into the Big Ten — and I'm certain that it will again be one of the tougher leagues in the country."

The Badger schedule shows thirteen home games including a home-and-home series with defending champion Indiana, but only one game against Purdue, and that at Lafayette.

The **Hughes** twins bring impressive credentials into their final Big Ten campaign.

Kim, Wisconsin's team captain, has been the regular center the past two seasons and last year ranked third in the conference in rebounding at 12.3 per game; tied for eighth in field goal accuracy at .503 and placed 20th in scoring at 14.7 points a game.

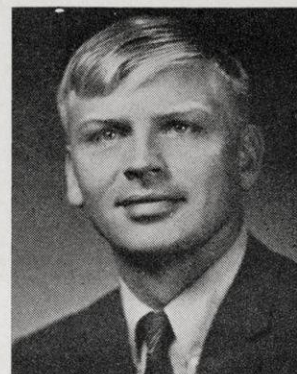
Kerry improved immensely last year over his sophomore year performance and ranked eighth in conference rebounding at 9.7 per game; placed sixth in field goal accuracy at .516; and ranked 23rd in scoring at 12.9 points a game.

DAVE VANDERMEULEN

Assistant Coach **Dave VanderMeulen** is in his fifth year as a member of the Wisconsin basketball staff following an highly successful prep coaching career at Pittsville and Rhinelander in the state.

Dave, a 1957 graduate of Madison East High School, played varsity basketball at Wisconsin under **Harold E. 'Bud' Foster** in 1958-59, and under **John Erickson** in 1959-60 and 1960-61 winning major "W" awards his junior and senior years. He scored a career total of 228 points in 44 games as a Badger with his single game high being 19 points in Wisconsin's 80-67 victory over Air Force Academy in the 1960-61 season.

His prep coaching career totalled 96 victories against 45 defeats for seven years. He coached three years at Pittsville High School with one Marawood Conference championship team before moving to Rhinelander in 1965 where he won two Wisconsin River Valley conference titles in four years.

He joined **John Powless'** staff on September 1, 1969, as freshman coach and guided Wisconsin's 1970 and 1971 freshman teams to 9-3 and 11-1 records, respectively, before becoming assistant coach in the summer of 1971.

Dave had the honor to serve as coach of the Big Ten All-Star team that toured Australia, New Zealand and the South Pacific in the summer of 1972 compiling a 22-1 record. Former Badger stars **Leon Howard** and **Lee Oler** were members of the team.

He is married and his father is **August VanderMeulen**, principal of Madison's LaFollette High School.

TED VOIGT

Ted Voigt is in his third year as a member of the Wisconsin basketball staff. He was named freshman coach in July, 1971 to replace **Dave VanderMeulen** who had been

moved up to varsity assistant when **Dave Brown** left to join the ranks of professional basketball.

In his two previous seasons on the Badger staff he coached Wisconsin's 1971-72 freshman team to an unbeaten 12-0 campaign and last year, as coach of the Varsity Reserves, came up with a 10-1 record.

He has displayed fine ability as a basketball tactician and strategist and does much of the scouting of Wisconsin opponents.

Ted prepped at Wauwatosa East High School and was a member of the talented outfit that captured the consolation title of the 1965 state public high school basketball tournament.

Ted earned three varsity letters at Wisconsin, two under **John Erickson** and the third under **John Powless**. He played in 49 games during his varsity career and scored 177 points as a 6'8" forward-center swingman. He is a positive example of **John Powless'**s abilities to develop the big man in college basketball.

Ted is married and he and his wife Gretchen are parents of a two-year-old son.

HEAD COACH

John Dale Powless is in his sixth season as the eighth University of Wisconsin basketball coach. He succeeded **John Erickson** in the job in April, 1968 following the latter's resignation to become general manager of the then newly-formed Milwaukee Bucks.

John is a native of Flora, Illinois, where he excelled in football, basketball and tennis in high school.

The 41-year-old **Powless** played collegiate basketball and tennis at Murray (Ky.) State University and ranks as one of the school's all-time greats in both sports. He was one of five charter members in the school's Hall of Fame which was originated in 1967.

He was a four year regular in basketball and in three years of varsity tennis never lost a tennis match and reigned as Ohio Valley conference singles champion for three straight seasons. He also had a share of the conference doubles title in the sport during the same three years.

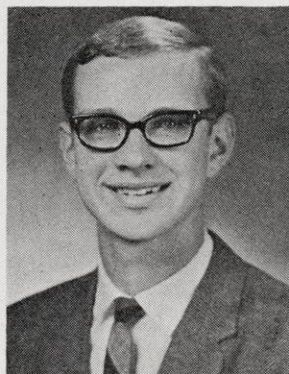
John was a standout 6-5 forward as a basketball player and led Murray State to the 1955 Kentucky Invitational title in a meet hosted by Louisville—later the NIT champion the same season. He missed playing in the 1956 NCAA meet when the Thoroughbreds lost the final game of the conference season and had to settle for second place behind Morehead State. His college coach was **Rex Alexander**.

OTTO BREITENBACH Assistant Athletic Director

Otto Breitenbach joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff effective July 1 following an highly successful tenure as athletic director and football coach at Madison's LaFollette High School.

The new Badger assistant athletic director is a native Madisonian and graduated in 1941 from Edgewood High school, where he was a three-sport star.

I have known Otto for over 30 years and have always felt his integrity, his ambition and personality would be a great asset to any organization. 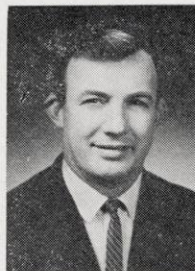

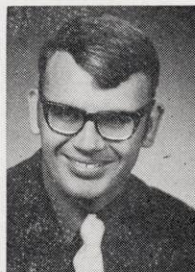
He was head trainer at Flint, Michigan Northwestern High School before joining **Stoddard** here in 1969. **Tom** is married and the father of a baby daughter.



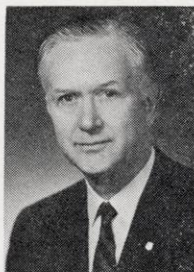

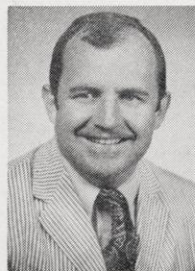

record of 36-9 including a 15-0 record during the 1962-63 Season.

Powless worked with **Ed Jucker**, then the head coach and **Tay Baker**, an assistant coach who guided Cincinnati's fortunes through 1972, during his stay in the Queen City.

The Bearcats posted a 78-6 record over the three seasons John was a member of the staff and won two NCAA titles—defeating Ohio State in the finals in both 1961 and 1962—and placing second to Loyola of Chicago in 1963; that's a record that had not been equalled in tournament play until the Lew Alcindor teams came along.

He came to Wisconsin as an assistant to **John Erickson** in May, 1963, and also served as Wisconsin's head tennis coach for five seasons. His tennis teams posted 52-39 dual meet records and finished in the Big Ten's first division three times and on two occasions—1966 and 1967—Wisconsin had the conference individual singles titlist.

WISCONSIN HOCKEY COACH

The seventh year of **Bob Johnson's** stint as head hockey coach of the Wisconsin Badgers will be the one he will always remember. For it was in his seventh year at the Badger helm that he realized the dream of everyone who has ever been in the coaching profession, a national championship.

During coach Johnson's tenure at Wisconsin he has brought the sport of hockey from a non-revenue sport to the number two money making sport in the Wisconsin Athletic Department. He has led the Badgers to two consecutive Big Ten titles 1971-72 and 1972-73, won the NCAA championship in 1973 and his teams have led the nation in attendance for the past four seasons.

Johnson took over the coaching reigns at Wisconsin in time for the 1966-67 season. After three years as an "Independent" in college hockey Johnson's Badgers joined the tough Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA). Their first year in the league 1969-70 Wisconsin surprised the college hockey world by finishing fourth (all other first year teams had finished last) and then took third place in the NCAA tournament at Lake Placid, N.Y. In 1970-71 Wisconsin finished third in the WCHA

and second in 1971-72 with the best won-lost percentage in the league.

Three out of the past four years Johnson has led Wisconsin to the NCAA tournament. After finishing third in the tournament in 1970 Wisconsin finished third again in 1972 and this last season 1973 won the National Championship.

Wisconsin fans have responded to this winning hockey in record numbers. The Badgers have led the nation in collegiate hockey attendance for the past four seasons and this past season drew an all-time collegiate record of 167,902 for twenty home games. This broke the previous all time collegiate record of 157,142 in twenty games set by Wisconsin the previous season.

Johnson, 43, is a native of Minneapolis, Minn., where he excelled in hockey, football and baseball at Central High School. He played collegiate hockey at the University of North Dakota in 1950-51 and at the University of Minnesota in 1952-53 and 1953-54. Following Army duty in Korea and a short fling in minor league baseball with the Chicago White Sox organization, Johnson turned to coaching and began his career at Warroad, Minn., High School in 1956. A year later he became head hockey coach at Minneapolis Roosevelt where his teams won 51 of 60 conference games in 6 seasons through 1962-63.

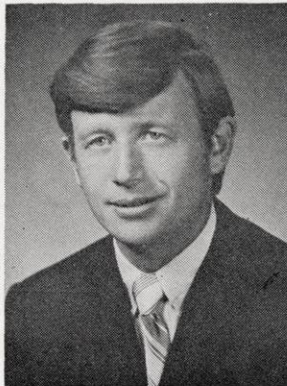
In 1963 Johnson started a three year stint as hockey and baseball coach at Colorado College. His hockey teams had a record of 29-51-3 and in baseball he was named Coach of the Year for the NCAA College Division Rocky Mountain District in 1964 and 1965.

Johnson received a Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota in 1954 and a Masters degree in 1961 and a Ph.D. also from Minnesota in 1963. He is currently a full professor of Physical Education at Wisconsin. Bob and his wife, Martha, are the parents of five children.

His 7 year record at Wisconsin is 158-73-6 and his overall ten year coaching record is 187-124-9.

ASSISTANT WISCONSIN HOCKEY COACH

Bill Rothwell was named assistant Wisconsin hockey coach on May 21, 1971, replacing former assistant Jeff Sauer, who accepted the job of head hockey coach at Colorado College.

Rothwell, 35, was assistant hockey coach at Ohio State University for three years prior to accepting the Wisconsin job. He has a varied hockey background which included four years of competition at the University of New Hampshire, 1964-68, eight years of play in amateur hockey leagues in New England, Canada and the Midwest, two years of competition with the U.S. Army hockey team in Europe and four years of high school hockey in New Hampshire.

An accomplished tennis player, Rothwell played for the First U.S. Army team in 1956 and for the University of New Hampshire tennis team in 1965-68, serving as captain in 1968. He also served as tennis professional at Rye Beach, New Hampshire Country Club from 1964-71 and was assistant tennis coach at Ohio State University during the 1971 season. Rothwell also played baseball for the U.S. Army 82nd Airborne Divisional team in 1957 and 58 and soccer at the University of New Hampshire in 1965-68.

Rothwell received a Bachelor of Science degree in physical Education from the University of New Hampshire in 1968, a Master of Arts degree from Ohio State University in 1969 and a Doctorate degree from Ohio State in 1971.

He and his wife, Sandi, are the parents of a baby boy.

1972-73 — THE CHAMPIONSHIP YEAR

In 1972-73 Wisconsin reached the pinnacle of collegiate hockey success by capturing their first NCAA Championship at the Boston Garden. In their seventh year under head coach Bob Johnson, the Badgers set school records for most victories in a single season (29), the longest winning streak overall (11), and in WCHA play (9), broke all existing attendance records, and for the second straight year the Badgers were the Big Ten Champions.

The 1972-73 team set a total of six team records and tied another. Wisconsin skaters set twelve new individual records in WCHA play, tied five other league marks, and set five new overall records.

From November 4, 1972, thru December 22, 1972, the Badgers went undefeated (12 games), winning 11 and tying one, to set a new mark for consecutive wins overall, 11, and conference non-losses at 10. For the fourth consecutive year Wisconsin won the St. Louis Tournament, defeating Minnesota 5-1 for the title. In competition against Big Ten schools the Badgers were 8-3-1, to again win that conference crown.

Wisconsin finished third in the WCHA with an 18-9-1 mark and 47 points, and for the fourth consecutive year advanced to the WCHA playoffs.

The Badgers first met Minnesota and defeated the Gophers 14-10 in a wild two game total goal series. In the WCHA final play-offs Wisconsin traveled to South Bend, Ind., to face Notre Dame. The Irish and the Badgers battled down to the final minutes of the second game of the series and on a goal by Dave Pay Wisconsin won the second game 4-3 and the series in total goals 8-7. In beating Notre Dame Wisconsin earned the right to advance to the NCAA tournament for the third time in four years.

The semi-final game against the top seeded team from the east, Cornell, was one of the most exciting in Badger hockey history. Wisconsin trailed in the game 4-0 and 5-2, but battled back to tie the contest with only five seconds remaining in regulation time on a goal by Dean Talafous. In the sudden death overtime period it was Talafous again who scored for the Badgers, winning the game with 37 seconds left in the period.

In the championship game Wisconsin overcame a 2-1 Denver University lead and scored three consecutive goals to win 4-2 and bring their first NCAA crown back to Madison.

Attendance records continued to fall as Wisconsin enjoyed the greatest support any collegiate hockey team has ever received. In 20 home games the Badgers drew 167,902 fans, an all-time collegiate attendance record both at Wisconsin and in the nation. The Badgers averaged 8,395 in the 8,431 seat Dane County Coliseum and 16 sell-out standing-room-only crowds enabled Wisconsin to lead the nation in collegiate attendance for the fourth consecutive year.

Wisconsin's final record of 29-9-2 marked the sixth straight year that the Badgers have won 20 or more games to give coach Bob Johnson a record of 158-73-6 for his seven seasons at Wisconsin.

ANTHONY JOHN GILLHAM

Head Fencing Coach

On August 31, 1972, **John Gillham** became the seventh head fencing coach in Wisconsin history, succeeding **Archie Simonson** who resigned after 21 years of coaching.

In his first year at the helm of the Badger swordsmen, **Gillham** compiled an 9-9 record and a third place finish in the conference meet. In the NCAA meet Wisconsin finished in 23rd place with Big Ten champion **Harry Chiu** named to the All-American team.

Gillham received his Ordinary National Certificate in Mechanical Engineering in 1954 from Bournemouthe College and was a design draughtsman for Vickers England, Limited, doing subcontract work for the Atomic Energy Authority.

In 1965 **John** emigrated to Canada with his family from London, and then came to the United States and Beloit, Wisconsin in 1967 as a design draughtsman with the Beloit Corporation.

The 38-year-old coach first took up the sport of fencing in 1952 in England, and is proficient in teaching all three weapons — foil, epee and sabre in sport. He won the 1972 Wisconsin Open sabre title and represented Wis. in Mid-West Fencing Championship meet three straight years.

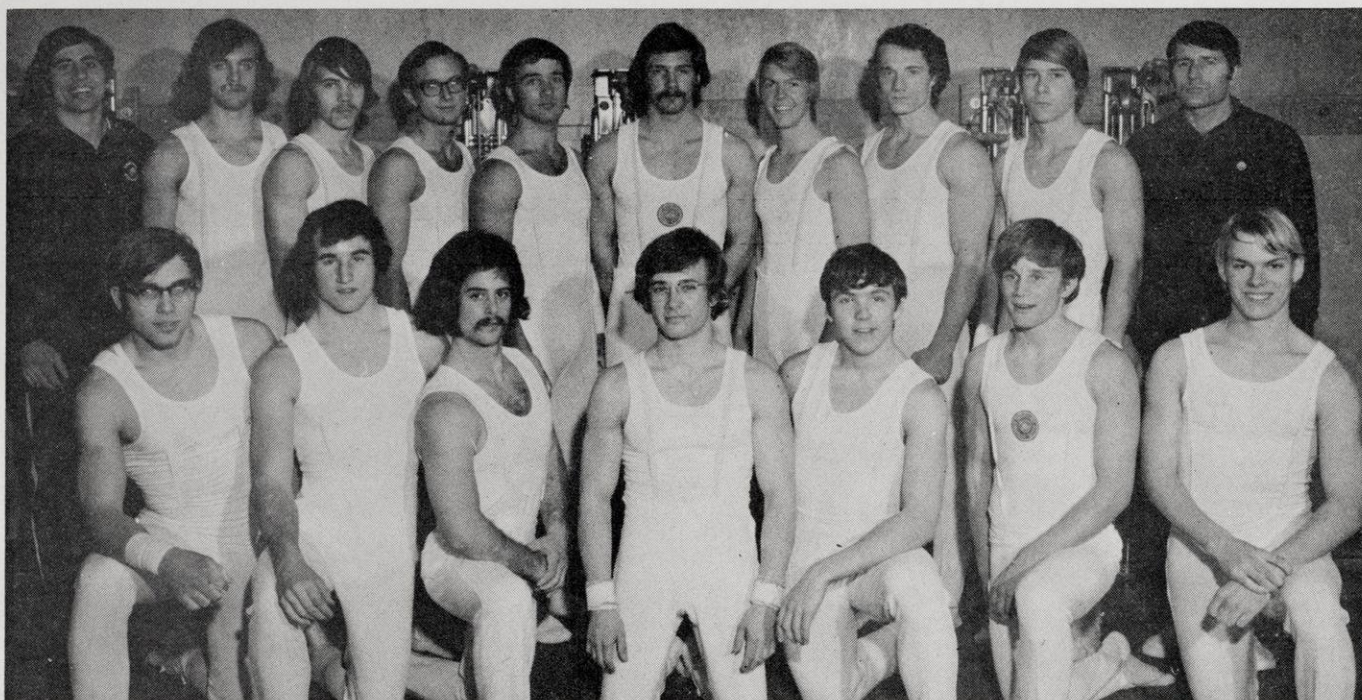

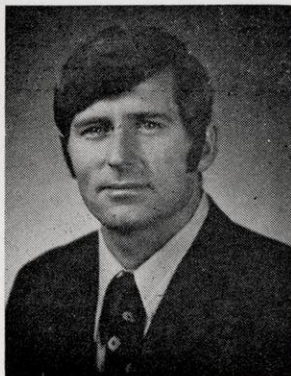

Mar. 1-2-3 — Ann Arbor, Mich. — 63rd Annual Big Ten Swimming and Diving Championship Meet — Wisconsin placed 3rd with 241 points, while Indiana won its thirteenth consecutive title with a total of 572.

Sophomore **Dan Striebel** and freshman **Gregg Plummer** set all-time school records during the meet with **Striebel** establishing new records for the 200 yard individual medley in 1:58.83 and the 200 yard freestyle in 1:44.87 to place seventh and fifth, respectively in the events.

Plummer set a school mark in the 500 yard freestyle with a time of 4:46.3 and placed ninth in the event in conference competition.

Striebel also placed third in the 100 yard freestyle in 47.40 seconds matching similar finishes by **Nigel Cluer** and **Paul Jarvie** who placed third in the 200 and 100 yard breaststroke events, respectively.

Wisconsin's 400 and 800 yard freestyle teams of **Brad**

Horner, Striebel, Bruce Preston, and Neil Rogers set new school records for those events. The new 400 yard freestyle relay time was 3:11.52, and the new 800 yard freestyle relay time was 7:04.1.

Mar. 29-31 — Knoxville, Tenn. — 50th Annual NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships. Wisconsin tied for 25th with four points. Indiana won their sixth straight championship with 358 points.

Sophomore **Murphy Reinschreiber** and Freshman **Gil Cyr** scoring the Badger points with 11th place finishes in their specialties.

Reinschreiber set an all-time Wisconsin school record of 1:52.1 for the 200 yard butterfly in placing 11th in the event, while **Cyr** placed 11th in the one-meter diving competition.

The Badgers broke three individual and three relay school records in the meet with **Reinschreiber** lowering his time for the 200 yard butterfly from 1:53.45 to 1:52.1 this year in the national meet.

Freshman **Brad Horner** also broke the old school mark of 1:53.45 by touring the 200 yard butterfly in 1:53.3 but did not place in the top twelve nationally.

Freshman **Neil Rogers** set a new mark for the 100 yard butterfly of 51.66 seconds — breaking **Jamie Halpin's** 1970 mark of 51.80 seconds — but also failed to place in the event.

Junior **Nigel Cluer** broke the oldest mark on the school's record book — **Bob Blanchard's** 1965 time of 1:00.6 for the 100 yard breaststroke — by turning in a time of 1:00.2, but again, did not place.

Wisconsin 400 and 800 yard freestyle relay teams of **Bruce Preston, Dan Striebel, Neil Rogers and Brad Horner** set new school records for the events at 3:10.5 and 7:03.3, respectively, and did not place, while the 400 yard medley team of **Jim MacDonald, Cluer, Rogers and Striebel** was clocked in 3:32.47 for another school record but no points in the meet.

WISCONSIN SWIMMING STAFF

JACK PETTINGER Head Swimming Coach

Jack Pettinger was appointed the Wisconsin head swimming coach in 1969. In his first season he guided the Badger tankmen to an 8-4 season and a fifth place finish in the Big Ten Championships.

Last season the Wisconsin swimmers had an 11-3 dual meet mark, finished third in the Big Ten Meet and picked up four points in the NCAA Meet in tying for 25th spot.

Coach Pettinger is a graduate of the University of Michigan where he was a member of the Wolverines' 1959 and 1961 NCAA championship teams in the butterfly and distance freestyle events. He graduated with an A.B. degree in history and since has received an M.S. degree in physical education from Indiana.

Before coming to Wisconsin Pettinger served as an assistant coach under the renowned James "Doc" Counsilman at Indiana which has won 12 straight Big Ten championships and four straight NCAA crowns. While at Indiana Pettinger also participated in much study and research on the mechanics, physiology, and psychology of competitive swimming.

Pettinger and his wife Jane are the parents of three sons and a daughter.

Jerry earned his doctor's degree in Physical Education from Wisconsin.

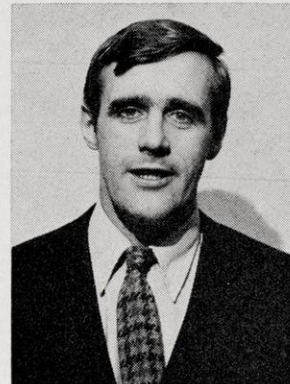

WILLIAM PERRIN Head Track Coach

Bill Perrin is in his third year as the Wisconsin head track coach after serving two years as an assistant to Bob Brennan, who succeeded Charles "Rut" Walker in 1969 in building Wisconsin to a national track power.

The 41-year-old native of Wood River, Illinois, served for seven years as assistant track coach at Indiana before coming to Wisconsin. He worked with the Hoosier field event men, and during his stay there his athletes set school records in five of the six field events.

Perrin is a 1956 graduate of Missouri Valley College in Marshall, Mo. where he starred in football as a single wing tailback and in track as a pole vaulter, while earning a bachelor's degree in education.

Following graduation, he served for two years in the U.S. Army, beginning his coaching career as head of the Camp Yokohama track and field team while serving in Japan in 1957.

Bill returned to college to obtain his master's degree in 1959 from Northeast Missouri Teachers College; and as a graduate assistant there, he served as field events coach for the school.

Coach Perrin then moved to Alton, Ill., where he coached cross country and track. In three years his teams finished second, fourth and third in the state high school meets.

In his four years at Wisconsin Perrin has coached ten Big Ten champions in field events, including Big Ten indoor and outdoor triple-jump champion Patrick Onyango, and Pat Matzdorf, world record holder in the high jump until last July.

Perrin is well known among the track and field world, especially for his published writings on training devices and for his invention of a trainer which is in wide use by pole vaulters who favor the fiberglass pole. In 1972 Coach Perrin accompanied the "Track and Field News" tour to the summer Olympic Games in Munich.

Bill is married and the father of four children.

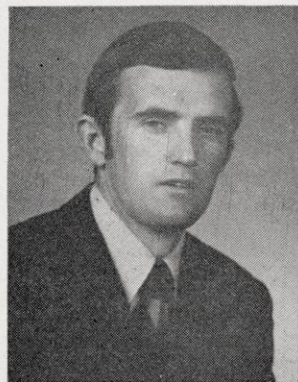
DANIEL R. McCLIMON Head Cross Country Coach Assistant Track Coach

Dan McClimon was named to the Wisconsin coaching staff in 1971 to serve as head cross country coach and to assist Head Coach Bill Perrin in track. In his first year as head cross country coach his team was 4-3 in dual meets and finished fourth in the Big Ten. The 1972 team was

undefeated in dual meets, placed third in the Big Ten, and 15th in NCAA competition.

McClimon is a 1964 graduate of St. Ambrose College in Davenport, Ia., with a B.A. in physical education and biology, and earned his M.S. degree in physical education from Washington State in 1965.

Dan began his coaching career at Blackhawk Junior College in Moline, Ill., in 1965 and in three years there guided the school to the Illinois Junior College cross country championships

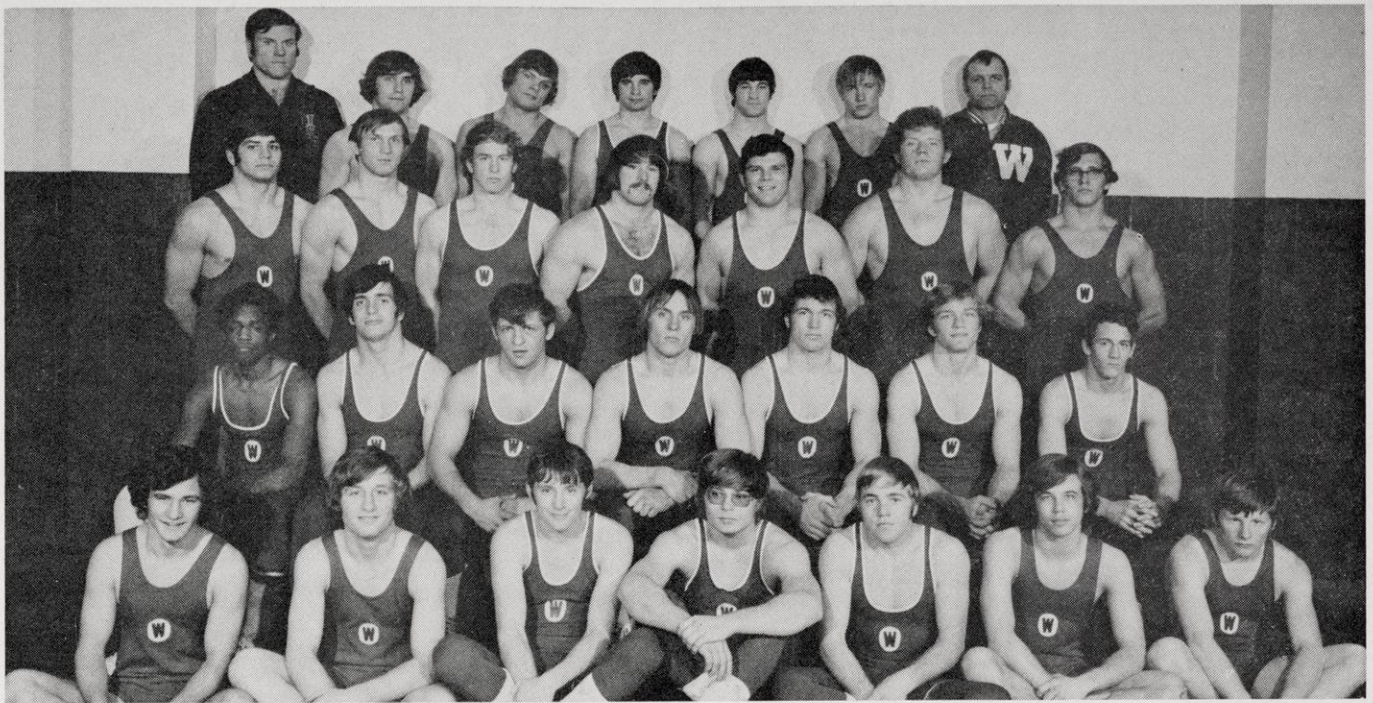

DUANE KLEVEN Head Wrestling Coach

Duane Kleven became Wisconsin head wrestling coach in 1970, and in his first season he guided the Badgers to a 13-4 record, tying the school record for most wins in a single season. Last year his grapplers were 12-3-1, finishing third in the Big Ten and 12th in the nation.

The 33-year-old Stoughton native was an outstanding high school wrestler, and he was a member of varsity wrestling teams at Wisconsin where he received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1961 and master's degree in physical education in 1963.

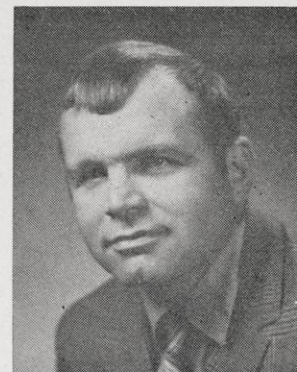
After a year of coaching at Madison's Wisconsin High School, military service followed for Kleven; but he still found time for coaching baseball and football while serving with the First Cavalry Division in Korea in 1963.

He resumed his wrestling coaching career at Racine Park High School in 1964, and in five years there, his teams compiled a 39-5-2 dual meet record and captured two state titles. In those five years, five individual performers won state titles under his guidance.

Kleven joined the college coaching ranks in 1969 at Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh, and the Titan wrestlers had their finest season ever in the one season he was coach: a 10-7 dual meet record, a second place finish in the state collegiate meet, a third place finish in the Wisconsin State University meet, and a 13th place finish in the NAIA national meet.

During the course of his career, Kleven has been a featured speaker and instructor on wrestling clinic staffs throughout the state, including the Badger Wrestling Clinic in Madison and his own "Titan Takedown School" at WSU-Oshkosh.

He is married to the former Mona Jacobson of Stoughton and they are the parents of a daughter and a son.

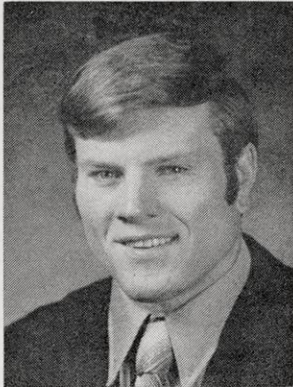

RUSS HELICKSON

Assistant Wrestling Coach

Russ is a native of Stoughton, Wisconsin, and has experienced success at all levels of wrestling.

The 25-year-old Hellickson was state prep champion at 180 pounds in 1966 with a 29-0 record representing Stoughton High School, where he also played football and baseball.

He was a member of Wisconsin's football and wrestling teams during his first two years as an undergraduate before devoting all his time to wrestling. Russ won major "W" awards all three years as a varsity wrestler and was team captain his senior year of 1969-70.

His three year varsity record showed 47 wins, ten defeats and one draw with nineteen wins by pin.

He won the Wisconsin State Collegiate Wrestling title at 191 pounds in both 1968 and 1969 and was named the meet's outstanding wrestler both years. In Big Ten competition as a junior he placed second at heavyweight and as a senior was second at 191 pounds. Both years he reached the quarter-finals of the NCAA meet at 191 pounds before being eliminated from competition.

Russ had a great 1971 campaign. He won the 220-pound title in the US Greco-Roman championship meet and was runner-up in the 198 pound classification in US freestyle competition.

He won the gold medal at the 1971 Pan-American Games in Colombia at 198 pounds in freestyle, and later finished third in World Games competition at Sofia, Bulgaria.

Russ is married to the former Nancy Chritton of Stoughton. They are editors of the **Crossface**, the state's popular news magazine devoted to Wrestling.

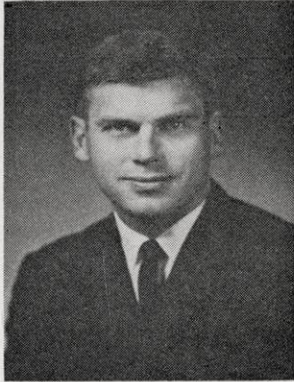
In pitching, **Andy Otting** was seventh in ERA's with a 2.20. **Otting** was 4-1 against Big Ten opposition.

Steve Land, 30, played for Tom Meyer as a first baseman at Northern Illinois in 1964 as a senior and served as an assistant coach there in 1965.

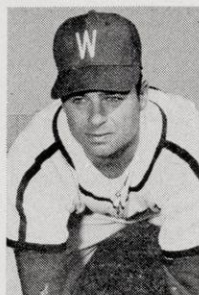

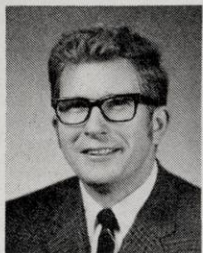

Wisconsin's fourth place finish in the conference was the highest since 1950 when they also notched fourth place.

DENNIS SCHACKTER Head Tennis Coach

On September 20, 1972, **Denny Schackter** became the 15th head tennis coach at Wisconsin, succeeding **John Desmond**, who retired. At that time he was the youngest man ever to hold a head coaching position for more than an interim period at Wisconsin. The 26-year-old **Schackter** still is the youngest head coach on the Badger staff.

In his first year he directed the tennis team to a 14-8 mark and a fourth place finish in the Big Ten meet, the highest finish for the Badgers since 1950.

Denny is a 1965 graduate of Madison West High School where he was a member of the school's tennis team that placed second in the state competition.

In 1970 he received his Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education and History from Wisconsin.

Schackter taught elementary physical education in the Madison school system, and directed the Madison Tennis Club's Junior Development Program for two summers. He also handled the publicity for many of the events held at the Nielsen Tennis Stadium.

His coaching experience includes a stint at Middleton High School where his team won the Badger Conference and finished sixth in the state tournament. Previous to taking over the reins of the Badger netmen, he assisted **Desmond** in the coaching of Badger junior varsity and freshmen players. **Denny** also is the Assistant Director of the Nielson Tennis Center.
