PARKING FACILITIES AND PRICE WILL INCREASE THIS YEAR

A total of close to 1,000 parking places are available this year within a three to four block area of Memorial Union.

The number of short-term meters (30 minutes) in lot 1 east of the Memorial Union will be increased and plans are for conversion later of the remaining eight-hour meters to two-hour in order to encourage turn-over in that lot. The upper level of lot 6 in the Helen C. White Library will continue to provide eight-hour meters.

The evening special event parking in the lower level of lot 6 will be doubled in price this fall, from 50 cents to one dollar. However, the 200 special event places in the old First National Bank Building lot on the corner of Park and Johnson streets (lot 7) will continue at the evening rate of 50 cents.

In addition, there are 360 spaces for evening parking in lot 46 at the corner of Johnson and Lake streets which will be available for one dollar.

For those attending events at Union South, lot 14 across Randall Ave. from Union South has metered parking.

Metered parking continues at 25 cents an hour but will be raised to 40 cents in selected lots later in the year. The campus bus fares will be increased from 20 to 30 cents, effective September 1.

CRAFTSHOP TO OFFER CHILDREN'S CREATIVE ARTS

Two sessions of Creative Arts classes for children and a special series of Holiday Gift Workshops will be offered during the fall semester by the Memorial Union Craftshop.

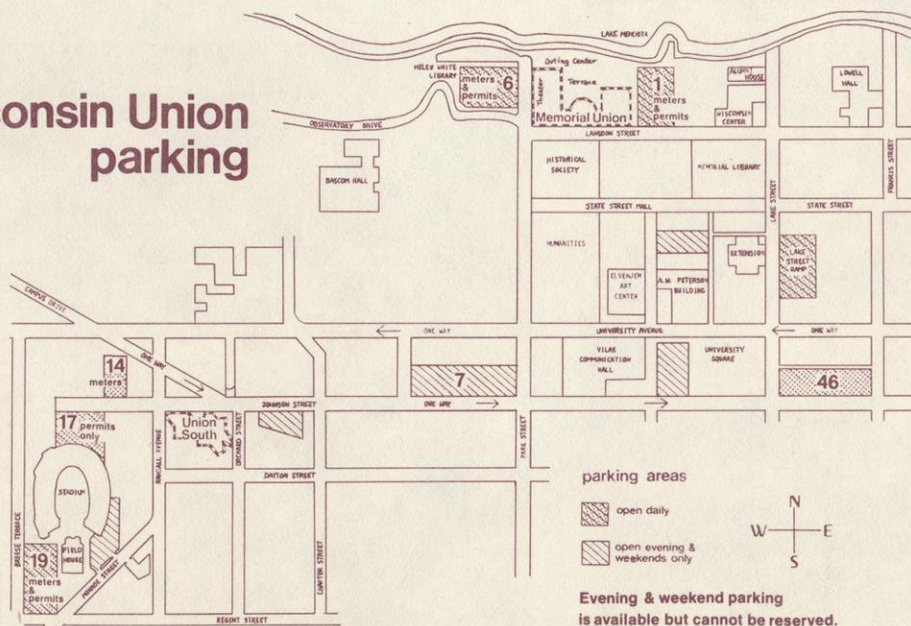
Puppet-making, marionettes, film animation, mixed media, drawing and painting and ceramics are among the classes offered during the first two sessions.

Registration for the first session ends September 7 and courses will run each Saturday and Sunday, September 12 through October 11. Registration for the second session ends October 19 and classes will be on Saturdays and Sundays from October 24 through November 21.

The Holiday Gift Workshops will feature instruction in making pinatas, wind chimes, Ukranian eggs, cornhusk dolls and ornaments, bread dough ornaments and a variety of other holiday knick-knacks. Classes will run from December 5 through 20 on Saturdays and Sundays. Registrations will be taken through November 30.

JAZZ TO DOMINATE UNION STATION WEDNESDAY NIGHTS

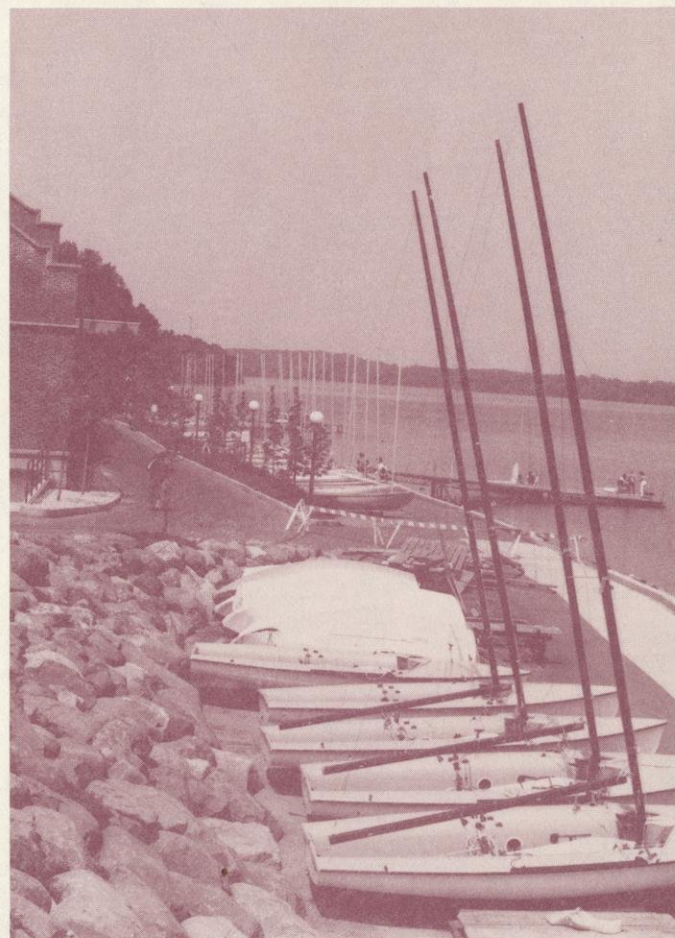

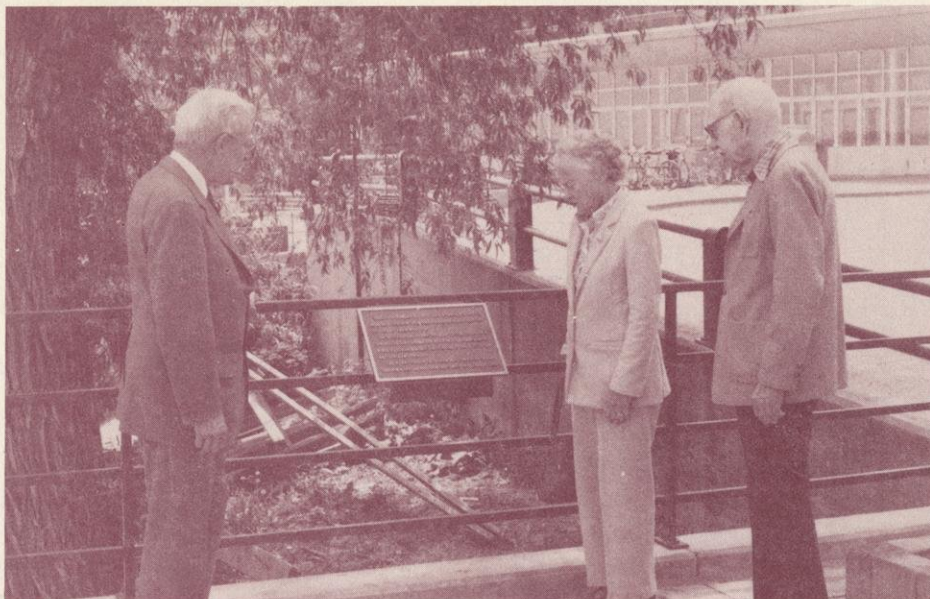
1980-81 was a record year for new life members of the Wisconsin Union. 952 people took out lifetime memberships in the organization.
