




The Droeshout Portrait of Shakespeare with Ben Jonson's Inscription


The Droeshout portrait of Shakespeare appeared on the title-page of the first folio edition in 1623. Ben Jonson wrote the lines which appear opposite the engraving in the early editions. The Chandos portrait is considered to be the most authentic likeness.
