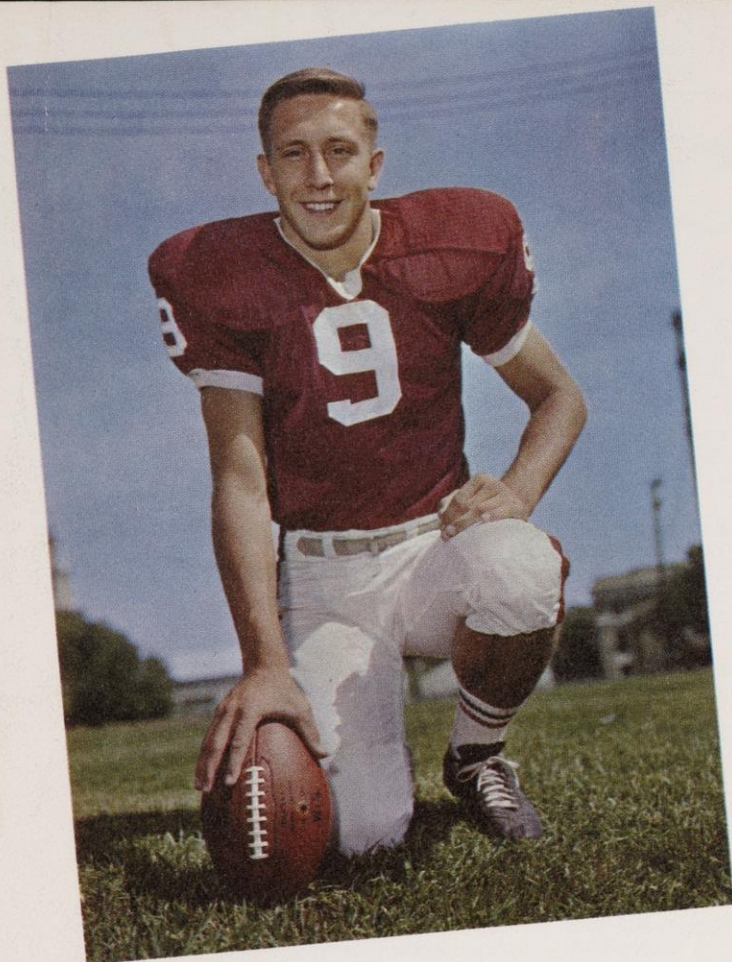

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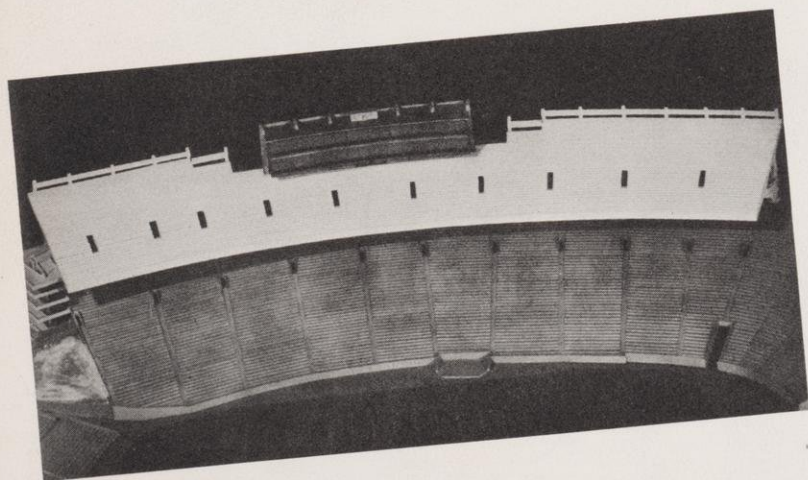

HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

They call it Camp Randall.
That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 65 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over, they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into white-washed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops was drilled—usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a time—and 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.

Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the leg-

islature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University had had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the University in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 63,435, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

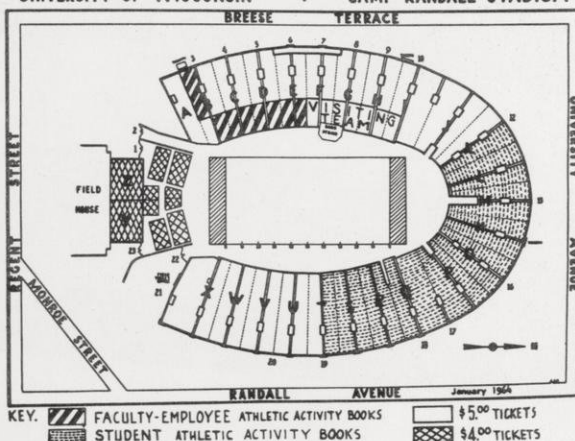
The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings. A week later, Ohio State visited Camp Randall and inflicted a 16-3 defeat on the Badgers; the Ohioans won the title that year with an unbeaten record. Wisconsin placed in a tie for third place with Northwestern.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horse shoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 13,800 for basketball games and other events.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR IVAN B. WILLIAMSON

The man who put Badger football on a solid foundation and who established a winning tradition, now heads up the University of Wisconsin intercollegiate sports program as its athletic director.

He is Ivan Baum Williamson, considered by many as the most successful coach in the modern era of Wisconsin football and hailed by many more as a resourceful, imaginative, and firm leader under whose direction the intercollegiate athletic program can continue its well-ordered, planned growth.

Ivy, as he is popularly known, succeeded to the athletic directorship following the untimely death of Wisconsin's beloved Guy Sundt, Oct. 25, 1955. Williamson was appointed as Guy's successor on Nov. 12 by the board of regents but did not take office until Dec. 1. Ivy is the sixth person to hold the position of athletic director. Others were Thomas E. Jones (1916-1924), George Little (1925-32), Walter Meanwell (1933-35), Harry Stuhldreher (1936-1950), and Guy Sundt (1950-55).

Williamson first came to Wisconsin in February, 1949, to take over the head football coaching responsibilities. In his seven seasons, Wisconsin won 41 games, tied four, and lost 19 against all opponents. His Big Ten record was just as impressive, the Badgers winning 29 against 13 setbacks and four ties. In addition, Wisconsin tied for the championship in 1952, played in the Rose Bowl, and for the first six years was in title contention or Rose Bowl consideration right up to the final gun of the season.

He came to Wisconsin with an excellent background. He played football at Michigan during the seasons of 1930 through 1932, won honors as an all-conference end, and captained the team in his senior year. In that three-year span, Michigan won or shared three Big Ten titles and lost only one game while winning 24 and tying two.

At Michigan, "Ivy" also earned two basketball letters and his football coach at that time, Harry Kipke, said, "Ivan Williamson is the smartest player I have ever had or hope to have."

Before coming to Wisconsin, Williamson was head coach for two years at Lafayette College. His 1947 team won six games and lost three, while in 1948, his charges won seven games out of nine, bowing only to Army and Rutgers.

Born in Prairie Depot, Ohio (now called Wayne), on Feb. 4, 1911, Williamson was graduated from Bowling Green high school after excelling in both scholarship and athletics. He entered Michigan and upon his graduation had not only won laurels as one of the outstanding athletes in Wolverine history but wound up with special honors in scholarship. He also holds a masters' degree from Michigan, obtained in 1940. He is married and has twin sons, Jack and David, age 27. Son Jack is a 1960 graduate of Stanford, while David completed his college education at Wisconsin in January, 1961.

Following his graduation in the spring of 1933, Williamson coached football and basketball at Roseville, Mich., high school, producing an unbeaten eleven. In the spring of 1934, he accepted a position as assistant coach on the Yale football staff, serving there under Raymond "Ducky" Pond through 1940, and under Emerson "Spike" Nelson in 1941.

In June of 1942, he entered the Navy and put in a season of coaching under Patsy Clark at Pensacola, Fla., Navy base. His war-time service also included duties at the naval station in Sanford, Fla., the Gun-nery school at Hollywood, Fla., the Cadet Selection board at Detroit, Mich., and the training carrier, USS Wolverine, Chicago.

After his discharge in 1945, he resumed his former football duties at Yale, this time assisting Howie Odell. He left there in 1947 to take over head coaching duties at Lafayette.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH MILT BRUHN

Genial Milt Bruhn enters his tenth campaign as the guiding hand of Wisconsin's football fortunes, and the 1965 goal is to bring the Badgers back to a first division berth in the Big Ten. Wisconsin's 1964 3-6 record was only the third sub-500 performance by a Bruhn-coached team in his nine previous years at the helm.

Under Bruhn the Badgers have attained undisputed Big Ten titles in 1959 and 1962—their first such titles since 1912—while their No. 2 rating in the final 1962 national football polls was the highest any Wisconsin gridiron team has ever attained. The 1942 Badgers ranked third nationally, while the 1959 team ranked 6th. Coupled with Wisconsin's 1958 national rating of 7th, it gave Bruhn the distinction of being the only Badger coach ever to guide the school's football teams to successive years in the top ten football teams of the nation.

The genial mentor also ranks as the only Wisconsin football coach of the current century to guide the Badgers to two Big Ten football titles during his coaching tenure at the school. Only Phil King, who came West from Princeton in 1896 to coach Wisconsin and the fabled Pat O'Dea, has ever directed a Wisconsin football team to more than two titles during his stay in the head coaching position.

King won outright titles in 1896 and 1897, first two seasons the conference was organized, and gained a title tie with Michigan for the 1901 championship. Dr. C. P. Hutchins was the coach when the Badgers won in 1906, playing a limited schedule of three games, none against traditional rivals.

Bill Juneau coached the 1912 Badgers to the undisputed title with a perfect record, and that was the last time a Wisconsin team was to rule the Big Ten alone until Bruhn's 1959 Badgers posted a 5-2 record in gaining the conference title. Only interruption in this drought was the 1952 co-championship team directed by now-athletic director Ivan B. Williamson.

Bruhn is the 21st coach to head up varsity football at Wisconsin since that sport was inaugurated on the Madison campus in 1889. Only Harry Stuhldreher has served a longer tenure as head football coach at Wisconsin.

Wisconsin under Bruhn has won 47 games, lost 32 (including two Rose Bowl games), and tied four. Only Phil King's 65 victories in an eight year tenure back near the turn of the century ranks ahead of Bruhn's win total.

And in the matter of Big Ten wins, no Wisconsin coach exceeds Bruhn, who has seen his nine Badger squads win 31 games, lose 28, and tie four. Coupled with Ivan Williamson's seven year mark of 29-13-4 immediately preceding Bruhn's tenure, Wisconsin has won 60 games, lost 41 and tied 8 in one of the school's most successful eras of Big Ten competition. The overall record for the sixteen years is a fine 88-51-8.

Bruhn's admitted love in football is 'defense', but in 1961 and 1962 his Badgers played wide open football, annexing national statistical titles both years. In 1961 the Badgers topped the nation in passing with an average 188.4 yards per game, while in 1962 their scoring average of 31.7 points per game (285 in 9 games) was the nation's best in that category. Wisconsin also ranked 7th in forward passing in 1962 (160.4 yards per game, and 10th in total offense (349.1 yards per game).

Coaching has been Milt Bruhn's life. As Milt tells it, he first became interested in coaching at Minnesota. "When I first went there I didn't have a lot

of confidence in myself so far as becoming a Big Ten player. But after I learned I could play the game, I decided to stay with it. I've always liked to work with young men."

Bruhn, graduate of the University of Minnesota in 1926, was appointed head football coach at Wisconsin succeeding Ivan B. Williamson, when the latter moved up to the position of Athletic Director following the death of Guy Sundt. Bruhn, however, did not assume responsibilities until Jan. 1, 1956. He had been varsity line coach at Wisconsin since 1949.

Bruhn was born July 28, 1912, at St. Bonifacius, Minn., and attended Mound, Minn., high school where he won letters in both football and basketball. He enrolled at Minnesota in 1932, winning letters in both his favorite sports.

He was left guard on the Gopher eleven, winners of Big Ten Conference championships in 1934 and 1935 and also claimants of unbeaten records for those two seasons. Milt also was catcher on the baseball team which won the Big Ten championship in 1935 and he captained the team in his senior year.

Following his graduation, he went to Amherst College (Mass.) as football line coach and freshman coach in basketball and baseball. He remained there until 1943 when he returned to his alma mater, Minnesota, as end coach for that season.

He joined the Colgate University football staff as line coach in 1944, then transferred in 1946 to Franklin Marshall College as line coach, in addition to being head baseball and basketball coach.

He went to Lafayette College in 1947 as line coach under Williamson and then to Wisconsin with Ivy. His keen analysis provided excellent defensive performances for the Badgers as they compiled a fine seven year record under Williamson.

Milt is married, has two children, Peter and Mary Anne. Pete is a 1964 graduate of Wisconsin and is currently on active duty with the U. S. Air Force as a pilot trainee. He won a major "W" as a center on the 1962 Big Ten title and Rose Bowl team. Mary Anne is a junior at Wisconsin this year.

WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1965

The rebuilding of Wisconsin's football continues as Coach Milt Bruhn's biggest project in 1965.

Last season's three won, six lost campaign dropped the Badgers into the Big Ten's second division for only the third time since Bruhn became head coach in 1956.

Injury and illness can be pinpointed in some Measure for 1964's lack of success. At no time during the season were the Badgers ever at full playing strength. The pieces just never fell together.

Sophomore **Chuck Burt**, expected to step in and lead the attack at quarterback, was felled on the third day of practice by infectious mononucleosis and missed the entire season.

Injuries and illness caused at least twelve players who won either a major or a junior "W" award to miss at least one game during the course of the season and knee injuries resulted in operations for Co-Captain **Ron Frain**, a key defensive back, after the fifth game and **Kim Wood**, hard-running sophomore fullback after the sixth game of the season.

It was felt prior to the 1964 season that the Badgers had good offensive potential, but lacked defensive experience and depth.

Offense Fell Off in 1964

The Badgers paced the Big Ten in total offense in 1963 with an attack that averaged 305 yards per game (321 yards for the entire season and 17th ranked nationally), with the passing game averaging 157.9 yards per game (ranking 13th nationally).

The offense fell off to a 7th place ranking in final conference statistics averaging 137.7 yards per game rushing and 125.6 yards per game passing. Subsequently, the Badgers scored just 98 points all year—the first time since 1956 that they had failed to score at least 148 points or more in a season.

And while the offense fell off in 1964, problems loom ahead in 1965. Gone are the top three rushers of last season (**Ron Smith**, **Carl Silvestri**, **Ralph Kurek**) who carried the ball 67 per cent of all the Badger rushing plays and accounted for 976 yards of the net total of 1055 yards, or 93 per cent of the ground attack.

Quarterback **Hal Brandt** has graduated, and he threw 176 of Wisconsin's 222 passes last year; accounted for 85 of the team's 104 pass completions; 1,059 of the 1,243 yards gained passing and threw four of the five touchdown passes turned in by the Badgers.

And the top three pass receivers (**Jim Jones**, **Ron Leafblad**, and **Ron Smith**) have completed their playing days. They caught 62 passes (of the 104) for 792 yards (of the 1,243) and four (all by Jones) of the five touchdown passes.

Six Offensive Lettermen Return

Graduation hit elsewhere, too. Gone are starting offensive linemen like tackle **Lee Bernet**, guard **Jon Hohman** and center **Ernest von Heimburg**.

Only six lettermen from the offensive platoon return for 1965 action. They include reserve ends **Louis Jung** (6-2, 193) who caught 11 passes for 121 yards, one a 20 yards scoring pass against Iowa; and **Joel Jensen**, (6-1, 218) with 5 receptions for 48 yards. The latter has been awarded an extra year of competition by the Big Ten.

Senior linemen **Mike Sachse** (6-2, 225) and **Chuck Currier** (6-1, 224) are the only offensive platoon starters from 1964 returning. Both are slated for action at tackle this year, though **Currier** started at right guard most of last season. He underwent a knee operation this spring April and missed all of the spring drills.

Backfield lettermen who saw limited action in re-

serve roles include quarterback **Jesse Kaye** (6-0, 180) and **Tom Jankowski** (6-1, 195), a hard-running halfback who had a rugged time getting started last season.

Kaye, understudying **Brandt**, completed 18 of 41 passes for 175 yards, including a 52-yard touchdown toss to **Jim Jones** against Northwestern that ignited a rally that fell just short of victory.

Jankowski, slated to see action at fullback this year, paces the returning backs as he gained 118 yards in 42 carries for a 2.8 yard average per carry.

Highlight of spring drills was the running of senior **Jerry Hackbart** (6-1, 180), Waunakee who has regained eligibility after sitting out the 1964 season. A cousin of Badger quarterback **Dale Hackbart**—who led Wisconsin to the 1959 league title—**Jerry** has speed, and the breakaway ability so essential in a Big Ten halfback. His impressive spring showing made the shift of **Jankowski** to fullback possible.

And don't count hard-charging **Kim Wood** (6-0, 217) out of the offensive backfield, either. The Barrington, Ill., junior was just breaking into the line-up at fullback (he had a long gainer against Michigan State) when he suffered a knee injury and was sidelined for the final three games.

Switched to Offense

Two juniors who won major "W" awards as defensive performers—**Phil Sobocinski** (6-2, 230) at tackle and **Tony Loukas** (6-2, 220) at linebacker—have been moved into the offensive line as a result of their spring performances. **Sobocinski** is slated for action at left tackle, while **Loukas** appears set in the role of offensive center.

Junior "W" award winner **Richard LaCroix** (5-10, 211) who developed late last season—playing 48 minutes—continues to show promise and will start at right guard.

Sophomores are counted upon to complete the offensive platoon. **William Fritz** (6-1, 212), **Warren Dyer** (6-1, 212), and **John Tietz** (6-3, 200) are fine looking end prospects. **Fritz** appears set at the tight end (right) position, while **Tietz**, if he's fully recovered from a knee operation last winter (he missed spring work, too) will challenge **Louis Jung** for the flex end (left) position. **Dyer** can play both offense and defense.

Guard **John Roedel** (6-2, 213) appears to be set at left guard; his older brother **Herb** was a starter on Marquette's final football team in 1960. **Tom Domres** (6-3, 225) may play both ways at tackle.

Burt to Direct Attack

Expected to lead the attack is **Chuck Burt** (6-1, 189), still a sophomore (granted an extra year of eligibility) possessing a good arm, especially at short range, and capable of executing the action pass.

A pair of small, but speedy backs are expected to play the flanker position vacated by **Jones'** graduation. They are **Dennis Lager** (5-11, 181) and **Gary Bandor** (5-10½, 164).

It was known prior to the 1964 season that Coach Bruhn and his staff would have problems aligning the defensive platoon. They were not proved wrong.

Wisconsin's defense yielded 324.7 yards per game over the season's course (196.8 yards rushing and 127.9 yards passing) and ranked tenth in final conference listings. The 190 points given to nine opponents ranked as a new high for a Bruhn-coached team.

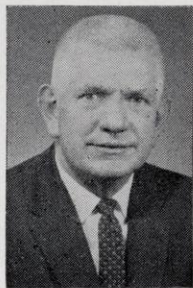
There can be only improvement in 1965.

The situation is reversed from a year ago. There exists a hard core of nine returning lettermen on the defensive platoon—following the shift of **Sobo-**

FRED MARSH

Assistant Coach

Fred E. Marsh, graduate of Bowling Green University in 1933 with a BS. degree in Education was appointed as assistant coach on Feb. 14, 1956 by Milt Bruhn. Prior to that, Marsh had been coach of junior varsity and chief scout under Ivy Williamson since February of 1949.

Fred was born August 24, 1910 at Bowling Green, Ohio, and attended the same high school as Williamson. He was basketball captain in his senior year, graduating in 1928 and later enrolling at Denison University where he played two seasons of football as a guard. He transferred to Bowling Green in his junior year, also competing two seasons, being selected on All-Ohio

honorary teams. In addition, he won major letters as a guard on the basketball team. Following graduation, he remained at Bowling Green as freshman football coach and, in 1934, took over the duties as director of health and physical education at Bowling Green University as assistant football coach and also completed work on his master's degree.

From 1942 to 1946, he served in the Navy, then returned again to his alma mater as assistant athletic director and freshman coach in both football and basketball. He came to Wisconsin in 1949 at the invitation of Ivy Williamson.

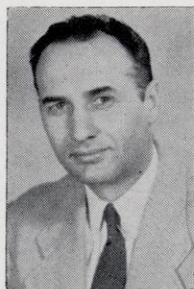
Fred is considered an excellent scout, once having held such an assignment on a seasonal basis for the Cleveland Browns pro team. His junior varsity football teams at Wisconsin, until the schedules were dropped for lack of opponents, had excellent records.

Marsh is married, has two daughters, Marilyn Lee and Melinda Sue.

LaVERN VAN DYKE

Assistant Coach

LaVern Van Dyke, graduate of Stevens Point in 1941 and recipient of a masters degree at the University of Wisconsin in 1950, was appointed assistant coach on a full-time basis Jan. 7, 1956. Previously, since 1949, he had been affiliated with the coaching staff on a seasonal basis, working with a sporting goods concern during the off-season.



Van Dyke

Van Dyke was born October 20, 1916 and graduated from Kimberly high school in 1934, winning All-Northeast Wisconsin honors as an end. He played four years of football at Stevens Point State, also won letters in basketball and track. Following graduation, he coached football and basketball at Waupaca high school for one year, then entered the army for a four-year period. While in the service he coached and played with the Camp Kilmer, N. J., basketball team, later was discharged with the rank of captain in 1946. Active in the Army Reserve program, he holds the rank of lieutenant colonel.

He returned to Waupaca as high school basketball coach in the fall of 1946. Van Dyke enrolled at Wisconsin in January of 1949 to work on his advanced degree, and joined the football staff in the fall. He is married, but has no children.

PAUL SHAW

Assistant Coach

Paul R. Shaw, graduate of Pittsburgh in 1938 and also holder of a master's degree in education at his alma mater in 1947, was appointed assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin in February, 1949.

Prior to that, Shaw had served in a similar capacity for three years at Lafayette College, the last two of which were under Ivy Williamson, and Shaw followed Ivy to Wisconsin when the latter took over the head coaching reins.

Shaw was born Nov. 3, 1914 at Bradford, Pa., starring in all sports at the high school there. At Pittsburgh, he played end on the Panther football teams of 1935, 1936, and 1937 coached by Jock Sutherland whose gridiron success was phenomenal during that era.

Following graduation, Shaw assisted in coaching at Hazelton, Pa., high school from 1938 through 1941, then entered the army Air Corps. He was a lieutenant from 1942 to his discharge in July, 1946.

He went to Lafayette College as end coach in September of 1946 and since then has been associated with both Williamson and Milt Bruhn, the present Wisconsin head coach.

At Wisconsin, he developed many fine ends, four of which were named to All-American teams—Pat O'Donahue and Hal Faverly in 1951, Don Voss in 1952, and Pat Richter in 1961 and 1962. Others who were rated highly in conference and midwest all-star selections included Gene Felker (1950), Bob Wilson (1949), Ron Locklin (1953), James Temp (1954), Dave Howard (1955), Dave Kocourek (1958).

Paul is married and has one daughter, Deborah.

Assistant Coach

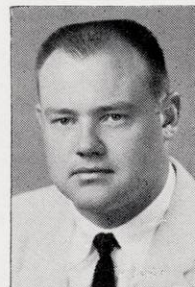
Deral Teteak, a 1953 University of Wisconsin graduate in physical education, was appointed assistant coach on March 6, 1958, moving up to the varsity to fill the vacancy created by the departure of Bob Odell. He served in 1957 as freshman coach.

Teteak, nicknamed "Little Bull", gained lasting fame in the memory of Wisconsin football fans as a member of the famed "Hard Rocks" of the 1951 season, starring as a linebacker on the defensive platoon. He was a regular in 1949, 1950, and 1951, and capped his senior year by being named to the All-Big Ten and All-Midwest honorary first team. His greatest collegiate football thrill occurred in the 1951 Pennsylvania-Wisconsin game when he scored a touchdown from his line-backing position on defense by recovering a Penn fumble in the end zone.

He enrolled at Wisconsin in 1947 after gaining All-State honors as a fullback at Oshkosh high school. His first high school rushing attempt netted 72 yards and a touchdown from the fullback position as a junior.

Teteak played professional football with the Green Bay Packers for five seasons, 1952-56, starring in a defensive role.

Teteak was born in Oconto county, Wisconsin, on December 11, 1929, and is married. He is the father of three children.

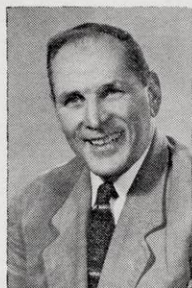

CLARK VAN GALDER

Assistant Coach

Clark Van Galder, newest member of Wisconsin's football coaching staff, returned to familiar surroundings to embark on another phase of his interesting career, in January, 1959.

Born on Feb. 6, 1911, at Janesville, Wisconsin, Clark graduated from Janesville High School in 1928, and from LaCrosse State in 1932, with a B.A. degree. He participated in football, basketball, baseball, and track in his high school and collegiate days.

His first coaching job was at South Milwaukee high school, from 1932 to 1938, enjoying good success in football, basketball, and track. His 1934 football team won the Milwaukee Suburban conference title, his 1937 and

1938 basketball teams made the state tournament, the former placing second in Class B to Beaver Dam, and his 1935 track team won the state Class B title.

He then moved to Racine Washington Park high school, staying ten years, winning the 1939 Big Eight conference football title, the 1943 State High School Basketball crown, and his cage teams won or tied for five Big Eight titles.

In 1948 he moved to his alma mater to coach football and basketball, winning state college football crowns in 1949, 1950, and 1951, and compiling a 31-5-1 mark. His basketball teams won state collegiate titles in two of his four years at the helm.

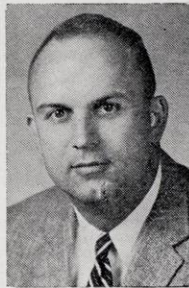
He took over at Fresno State College, Fresno, California, in the autumn of 1952, and in seven years his teams won 46, lost 22, and had two tie games. His 1958 team won the California Collegiate Athletic Association football title with a 4-1 mark, though the season's record was 5-5.

Van Galder is married and has five sons, the oldest being Gary, a Stanford football star in 1956-57 at end, who is interning at a Portland, Oregon hospital at the present time. The Badger assistant received his M.A. degree in education from the University of Southern California in 1952. Son Tim, fourth oldest, is currently a junior quarterback at Iowa State.

FRED JACOBY

Assistant Coach

A highly successful high school coach at Madison West high school, Fred Jacoby was appointed Wisconsin freshman coach on March 6, 1958. His appointment followed the naming of former Badger assistant coach, Bob Odell, as head coach at Bucknell University, and the promotion of Deral Teteak to the varsity staff.

Fred is a 1948 Ohio State graduate in Physical Education. He hails from Logan, Ohio, is 37 years old, married, and has three sons, Thomas, 4, Robert, twenty-two months, and Steve, three months. He entered Ohio State with the intention of playing varsity football, but an injury sustained in his freshman year ended his playing days.

He has coached at Bremen, Ohio high school, Washington Court House, Ohio high school, and Madison West high school. His record at Bremen was 24-3 for three years, and at Washington Court House was 9-0 in his only season, 1952, at that school. Only his 1950 Bremen team did not win a championship.

Summer school study for his master's degree in Physical Education brought him to Wisconsin where he received the advanced degree in 1953. That same summer he was appointed to the head football coaching job at Madison West.

His five years at West produced the same success that marked his Ohio coaching career. A mediocre first season (1953) netted only three wins, five defeats, but in four ensuing seasons his teams won 27 of 32 games, winning one undisputed Big Eight conference title, sharing another, and finishing second the other two years. His 1957 team was the first unbeaten, untied team ever produced at West.

Fred is in charge of recruiting for the Wisconsin staff, and devotes much hard work in attracting to Wisconsin boys of high calibre, both in playing the game of football, and in accomplishing the scholastic work necessary for being eligible at Wisconsin.

JOHN COATTA

Assistant Coach

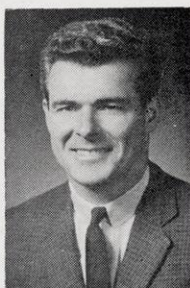
A star quarterback in his playing days at Wisconsin, John Coatta returns to his alma mater as an assistant coach after six highly successful years as an assistant coach at Florida State University.

He left private business in Madison in 1959 to accept an assistant coaching job at Florida State when former Wisconsin assistant coach Perry Moss was named the school's head coach.

Coatta proved to be a versatile and well-liked member of the Florida State football staff. Under Moss he was defensive backfield coach, and when the current Florida State coach, Bill Peterson, took over in 1960, John became offensive backfield coach.

In 1964 Florida State compiled an 8-1-1 winning record, plus a convincing 36-19 win over Oklahoma in the Gator Bowl, with Coatta accepting a new assignment as coach of the ends and linebackers.

Coatta is a Dearborn, Michigan native who won major "W" awards in 1949, 1950, and 1951 as the quarterback on Badger teams that won 18 games, lost



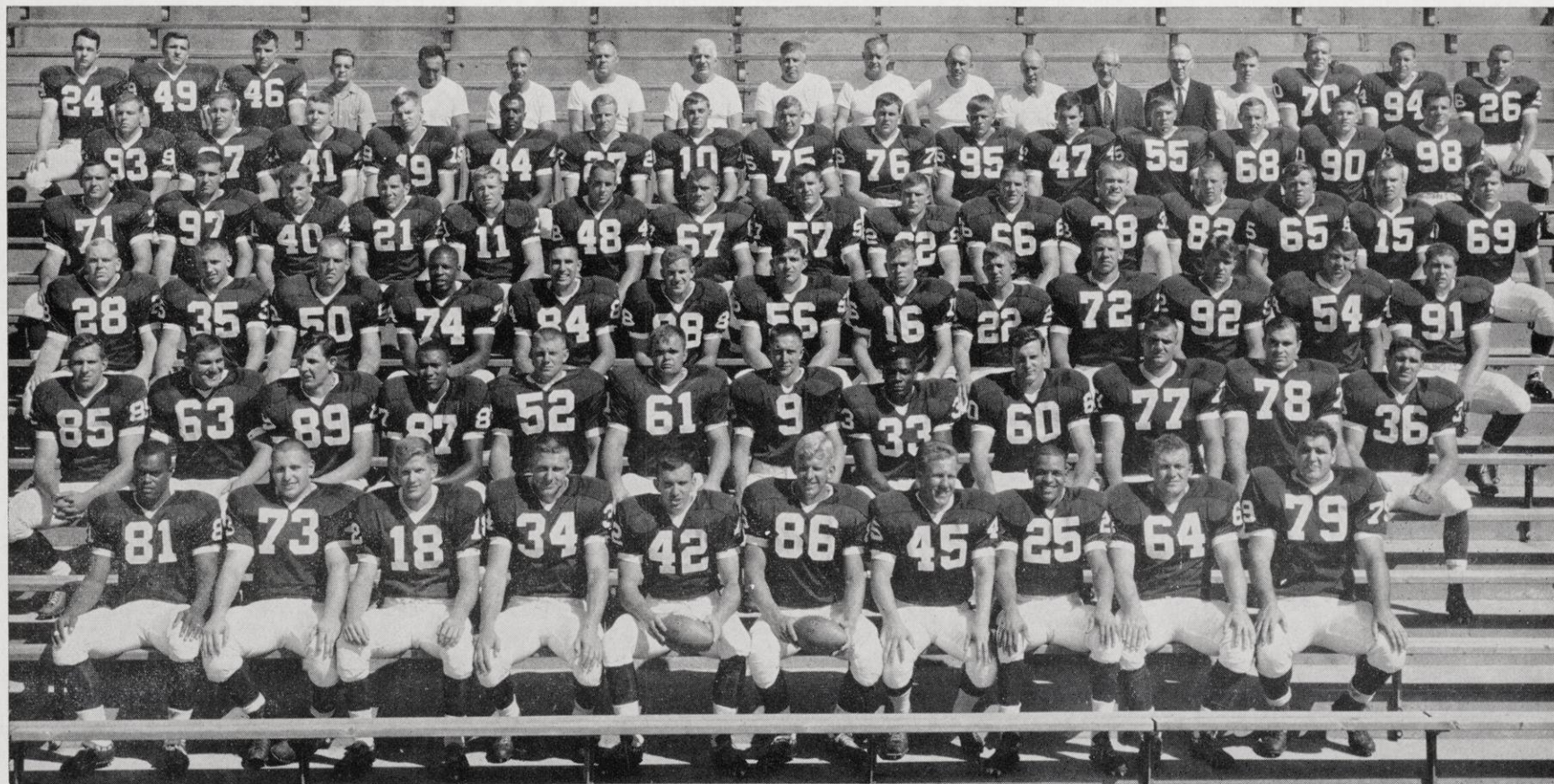

7, and tied 2 under the coaching guidance of Ivan Williamson.

He was a versatile prep athlete at Dearborn High School playing football, basketball and baseball. He attended Kiski Prep in Pittsburgh for one year before enrolling at Wisconsin in the autumn of 1948 and lettered in football, basketball, baseball, track and ice hockey.

He was a highly effective short passer and still holds the Big Ten record for completion accuracy of .642 set in 1950 on 52 completions in 81 attempts in seven conference games. Against Ohio State in 1950 he threw ten straight completions in a 19-14 loss to the Buckeyes in as fierce a game as ever played between two Big Ten schools. In 1951 at Illinois he completed 19 passes in 32 attempts for 164 yards though Wisconsin lost 14-10.

John is 36 years old, married and his family numbers three sons and two daughters. He received both his B.A. and M.A. degrees in Physical Education from Wisconsin.

ciński and Loukas to the offense—and the tip-off on their expected performance this year may have been the showing of Wisconsin's defense against Minnesota in the 1964 finale.

Gophers Held to 180 Yards

The highly touted Gophers were held to 92 yards rushing on 28 plays and gained just 88 yards through the air (31 attempts, eight completions) as Wisconsin closed out the season on a 14-7 victory note.

Defensive ends Rodger Alberts (6-0, 220) and Eric Rice (6-4, 210) seemingly developed overnight last year: while middle guard Mike London (6-2, 227), linebackers Bob Richter (6-0, 205) and Tom Brigham (6-0, 192) and defensive halfbacks Dave Fronek (6-2, 187), this year's team captain and Jim Grudzinski (6-2, 180) form the hard core of the defense.

The tackle positions seemed in doubt early in the spring sessions, but the play of Bill Maselter (6-5, 230) and Nate Jenkins (6-2, 210), the latter granted an extra year of eligibility due to injury, brightened the outlook as the drills closed.

Available to back up the tackles are junior "W" award winner Mike Sonnenberg (6-1, 230) who played brilliantly in the Minnesota game, though he's been hampered much of the time by injury, and sophomores Tom Domes (who may also play offense) and Don Bliss (6-4, 228) a raw-boned Pennsylvanian who may surprise.

Marcin Could Help

Additional help is forthcoming from senior Ray Marcin (5-10, 212) who played as a sophomore in 1963, then was ruled ineligible for 1964 play. He's in summer school, and if he does passing work, he'll and the linebacking corps, which also includes sophomore Dave Aegerter (6-1, 215), who likes the going rugged, and Bill Wehrspann (6-2, 205), who won a junior "W" award last season, playing an outstanding game against Minnesota.

Other sophomores that could help are end Kent Seery (6-5, 207) and guard Sam Wheeler (6-2, 200), and the aforementioned Warren Dyer, who looms as the most versatile performer on the squad.

The defensive backfield is completed by junior "W" award winner Bob Grossman (5-11, 181) at safety opposite Captain Dave Fronek, Letteman Gary Pinnow (6-0, 188) and sophomores Stuart Victor (5-11, 183), Dick Schumitsch (6-1, 188) and Charles Koch (6-0, 182) are slated for reserve duty.

Sophomores Gale Bucciarelli (5-10, 193) and Koch were sidelined during spring drills by injury; both have the capability to play either offense—Bucciarelli at fullback, Koch at left halfback—and defense. They should make their presence felt in the early preparations this autumn.

The Badgers lack a consistent punter, though the chore will likely be handled by Captain Fronek. He averaged 34.3 yards as a sophomore, and last season, hampered by a leg injury, averaged 33.0 yards for ten punts.

The schedule appears "murderous."

The home opener is September 18 against an improving Colorado team from the Big Eight. Then follow Southern California—June 1964 conqueror of Notre Dame—and Iowa, possessing the Snook to Noonan air attack, to Madison.

Ohio State and Illinois, headed by All-American fullback, Jim Grabowski, complete the home schedule.

Road encounters are against Nebraska, seeking a third consecutive Big Eight title; Northwestern; Michigan, defending Big Ten champion; Purdue, logical contender in the 1965 race, and Minnesota.

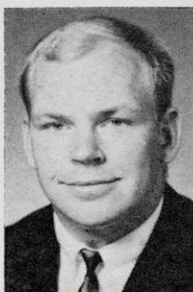

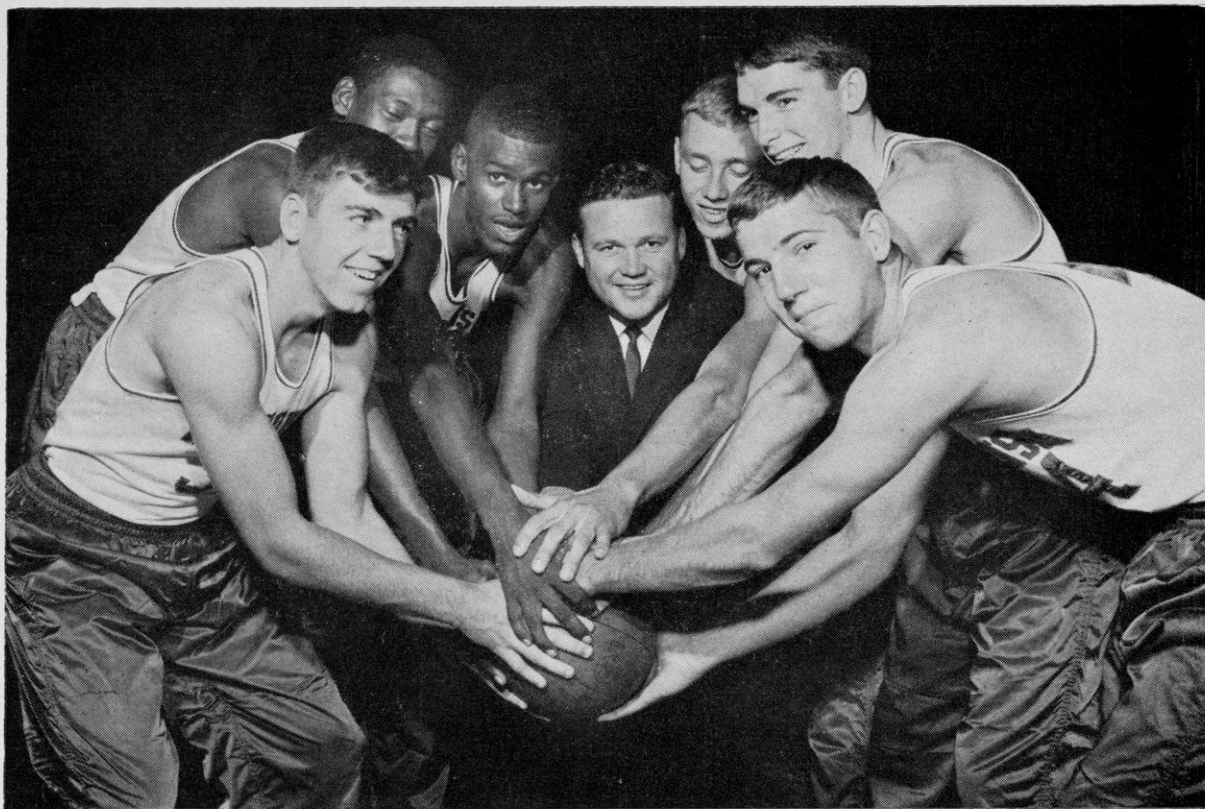

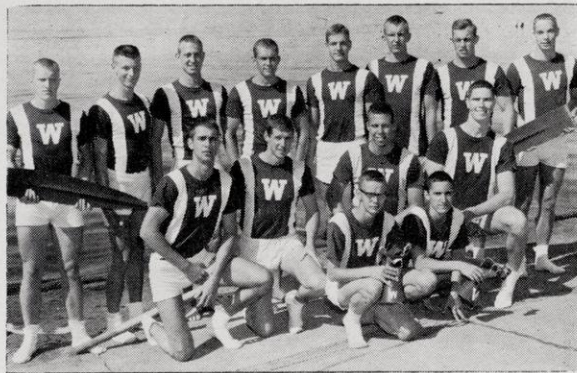

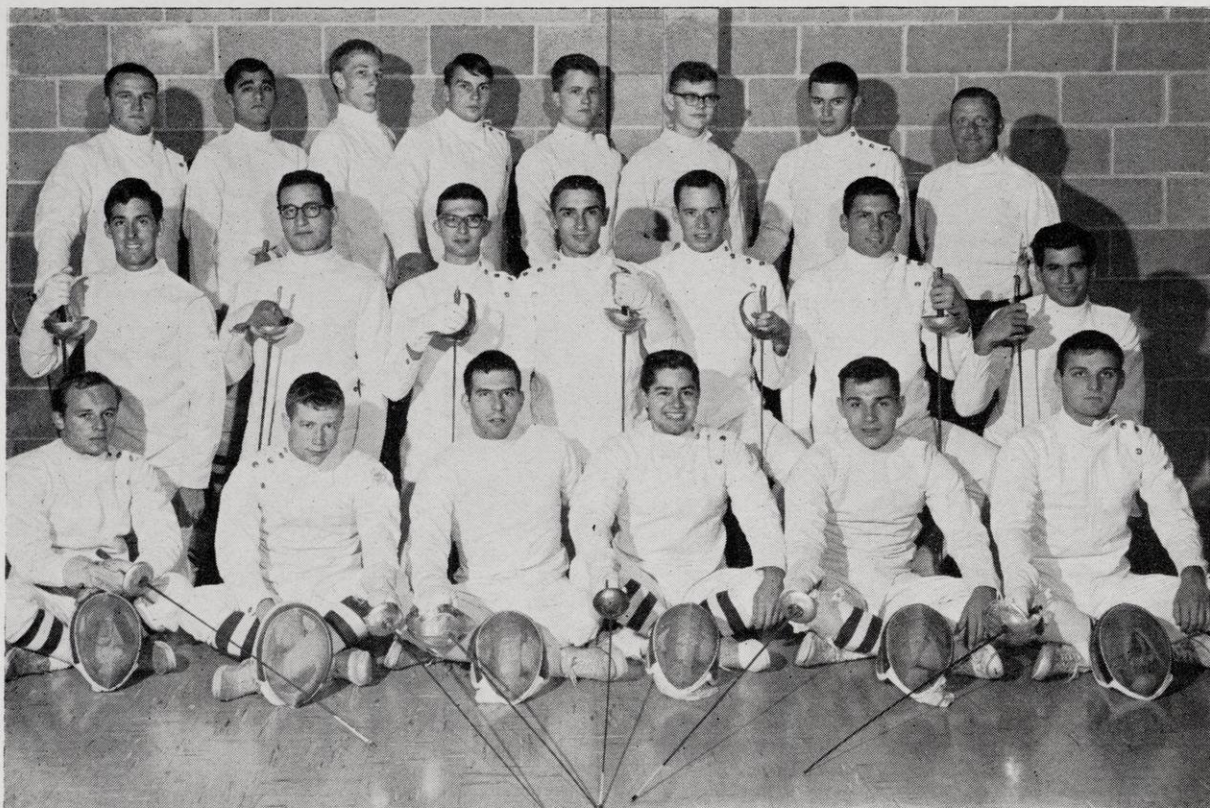

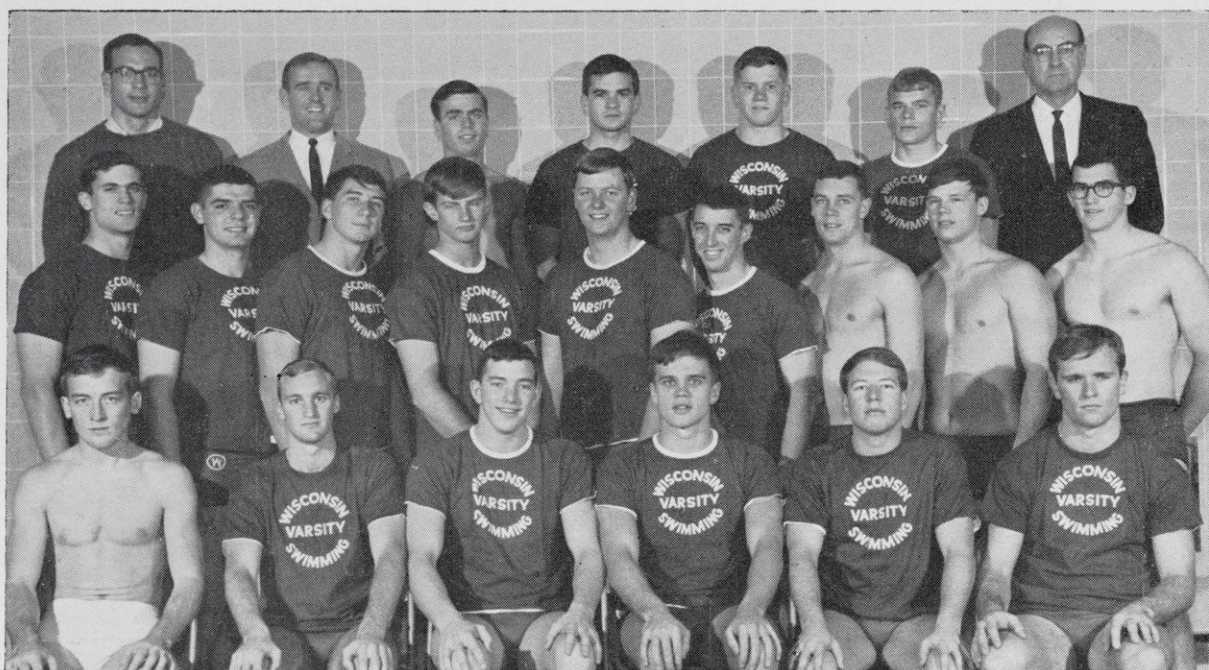
