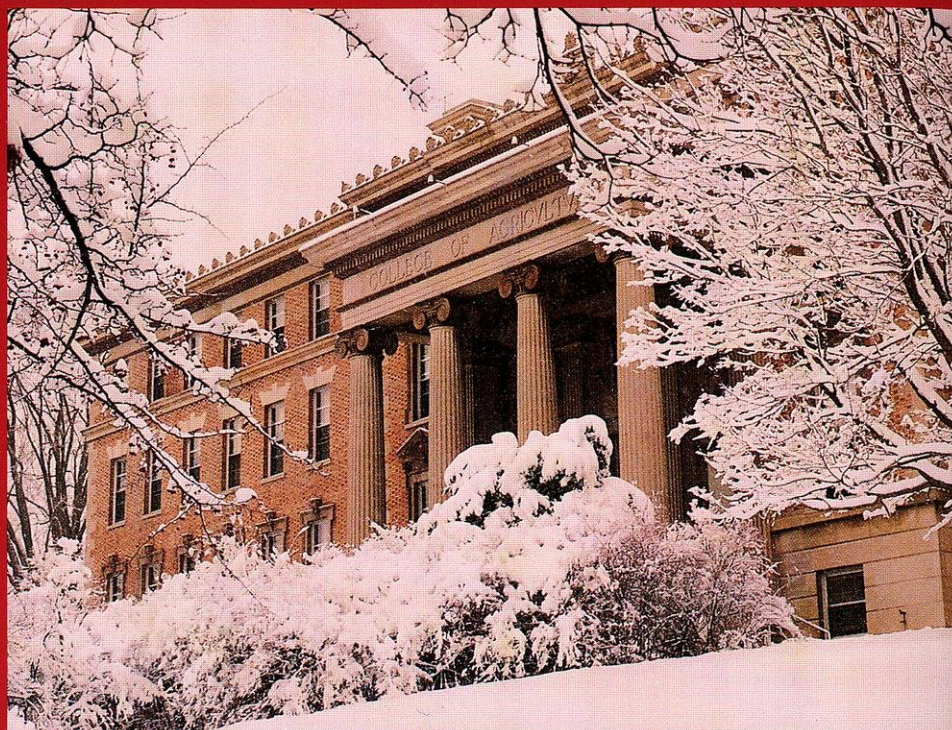


THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

The University of Wisconsin, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the University opened its doors to the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the University of Wisconsin includes 13 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, more than 43,000 students and 14,000 employees, nearly 4,000,000 volumes in 22 libraries, a \$750,000,000 budget, and research and development expenditures totalling \$185,000,000 (third largest in the U.S.).

Wisconsin has ranked among the top ten universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. Combining the results of seven major ratings since 1925, Prof. David Webster of the University of Pennsylvania, writing for the June 1983 *Change* magazine,



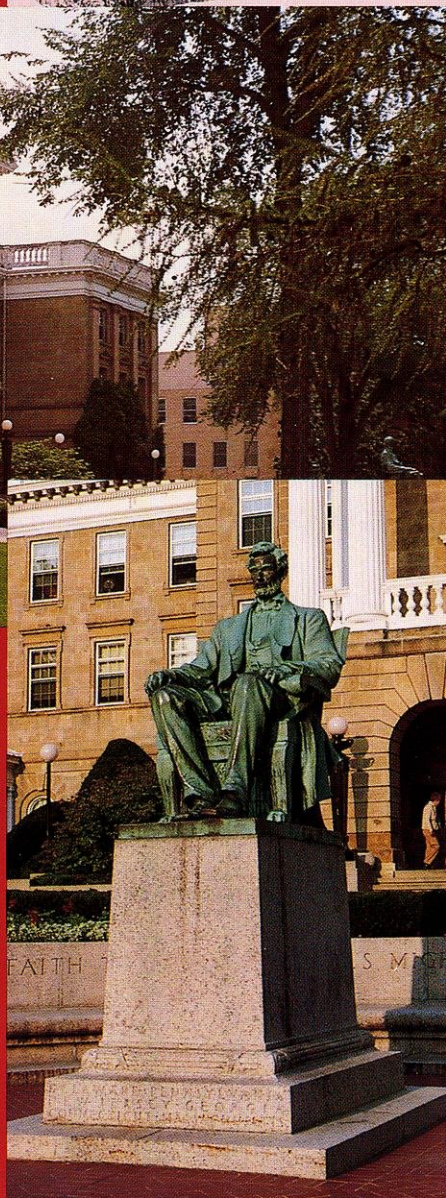
The UW's international activities extend the boundaries of the campus to all parts of the globe. The campus has about 3,600 foreign students from 125 countries, offers some 50 foreign languages for study, and has the largest overall number of international studies faculty and largest number of faculty of any university in East Asian, South and Southeast Asian, African and Latin American studies. Junior year abroad programs are offered for students going to Brazil, China, England, France, West Germany, Hungary, Israel, India, Italy, Spain, Sweden, Norway, Nepal, Thailand and Mexico and Quebec for summer study.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, education of physicians and other health professionals, research and public service. It includes the Medical, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Allied Health Professions schools; UW Hospital and Clinics; State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center—one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country.

More than 400 campus organizations offer a wide variety of activities for Wisconsin students—including social, political, philosophic or religious, sports, honorary, ecological, philanthropic, drama and music groups plus fraternities and sororities. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.

ranked the University of Wisconsin fourth in the nation—behind Harvard, California-Berkeley and Yale, and tied with the University of Chicago. More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections were offered in the fall of 1986. Majors are available in some 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's degree programs.

UW departments ranked among the top ten in the nation in the 1983 *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States* include Sociology (1st), German, Chemical Engineering and Geography (2nd), Statistics (4th), Plant Pathology, Molecular Biology and Biochemistry (5th), Spanish and Portuguese (6th), Zoology (7th), Political Science, Chemistry and Economics (8th), Mathematics (9th), and History (10th).

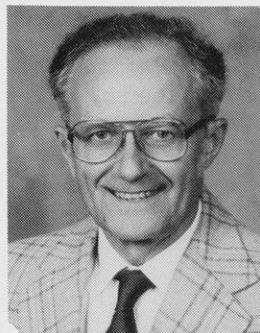

Jim Mott marks his 23rd year as Sports Information Director at the University of Wisconsin in 1988-89.

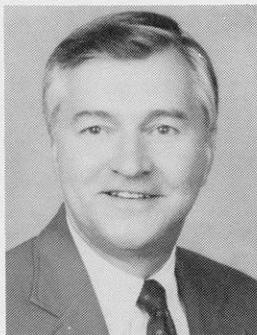

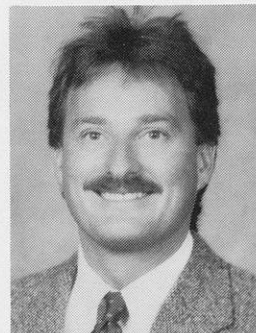

Prior to arriving at the UW, Doug was the Publicity and Publications Director for the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States in Colorado Springs from 1979-81, and was assistant sports information director at both Western Michigan University (1977-79) and Eastern Michigan University (1976-77).

COVERING THE BADGERS

WORKING PRESS

Wisconsin's working press-radio-television facilities are limited at the Dane County Coliseum. Visiting media should enter the Coliseum through the Press/Player's and official's entrance, located at ground level on the north end of the building.

WORKING TICKETS

All requests for working press credentials for University of Wisconsin Hockey home games must be made through the UW Sports News Service office. Requests should be made on your company's official letterhead and at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the press/player's entrance to the Coliseum. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations.

RADIO

Visiting radio stations will be admitted upon the recommendations of the visiting school and its sports information director.

Broadcast locations are assigned based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. Tickets will be held at the UW Sports News Service office thru noon on game day or at the Press/Player's Entrance to the Coliseum the day of the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photo passes are also limited because of space restrictions at the Coliseum. Requests should be submitted on your company's letterhead to the UW Sports News Service office and will be granted on a priority first-come, first-serve basis. Photographers are asked to consider the paying customers when working in the Coliseum.

PARKING

There is no reserved parking for visiting press at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum. Visiting media should plan to arrive at the Coliseum at least one hour prior to game time to avoid parking problems.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

UW coach and player interviews may be conducted in the media interview room outside the University of Wisconsin dress-

ing room following each game. No press will be permitted inside the University of Wisconsin locker room.

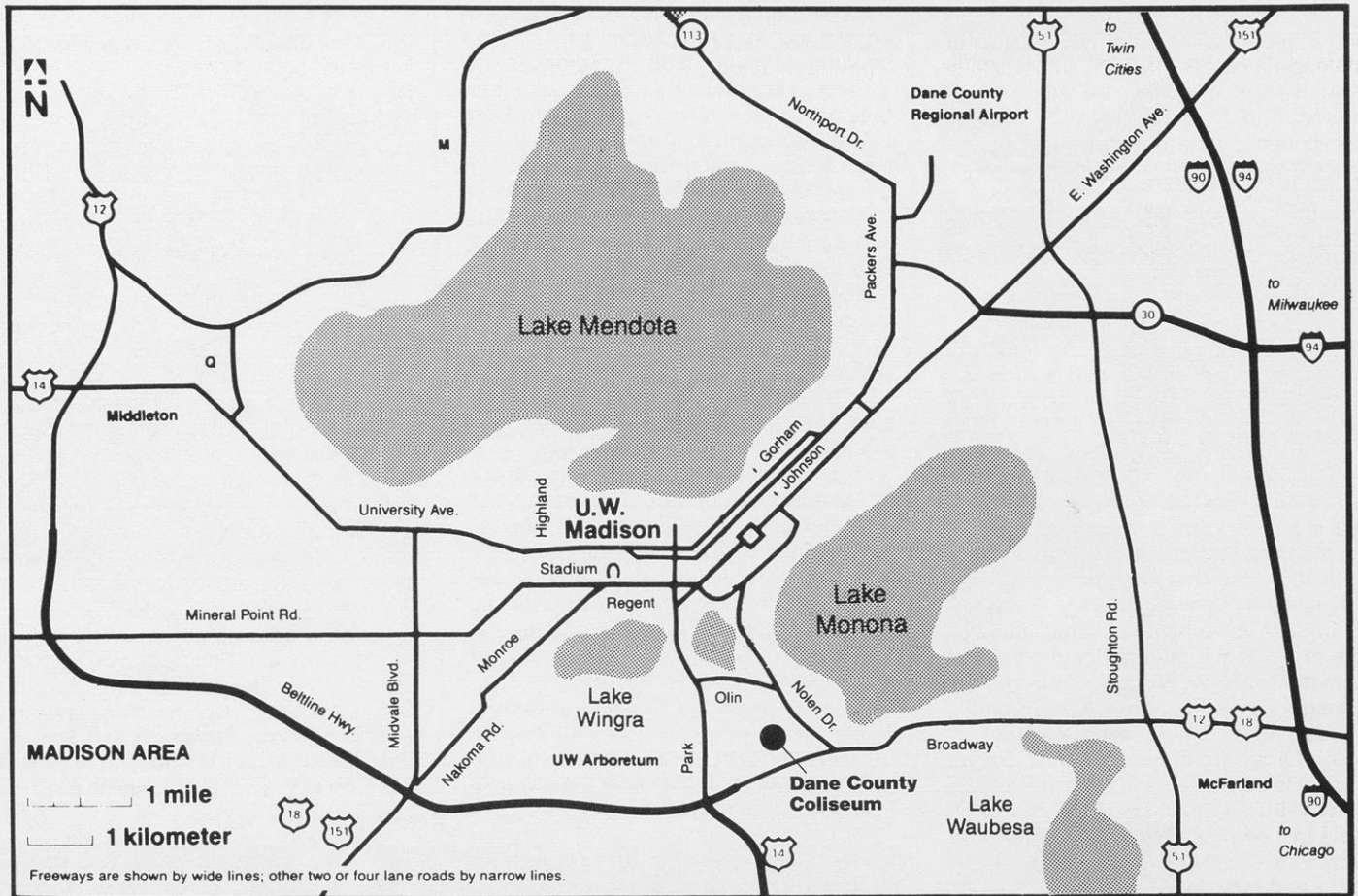
Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short post-game team meeting. Player interviews may also be conducted during the week following practice at the Coliseum or the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, usually 5:30-6:30 pm.

INTERVIEWING THE COACH

Head coach Jeff Sauer will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game session with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach Sauer will be conducted in the media interview room adjacent to the Wisconsin dressing room.

The best time to interview Coach Sauer during the week is between 10:00 am and 12:00 noon at the UW Hockey Office or following practice at approximately 5:30-6:00 pm.

1988-89 BADGER HOCKEY

LOOK OUT

If the adage "offense wins games, defense wins championships" usually proves true, then University of Wisconsin hockey coach Jeff Sauer should have something to smile about as he looks ahead through the 1988-89 campaign.

Last year's Badgers, victimized in part by a home-ice scheduling quirk (the Dane County Coliseum was not available) that forced them to go on the road for an NCAA Quarterfinal series (Wisconsin split at St. Lawrence, but lost the total-goals series), still compiled a sensational 30-13-2 (.689) overall record. The Cardinal and White finished second in the WCHA regular season standings at 22-12-1, captured the first-ever WCHA Final Four Playoff Championship at St. Paul and swept to the prestigious Great Lakes Invitational Tournament crown in Detroit over the Christmas holiday period.

Four Wisconsin hockey players earned All-American honors - left wing Paul Ranheim and defenseman Paul Stanton were named to the first team, and right wing Steve Tuttle and goaltender Dean Anderson were selected to the second team. Those four also earned all-tournament honors at both the WCHA Final Four and the Great Lakes Invitational.

In the playoffs, the Badgers rang up a nearly unblemished 6-1-1 (.813) record, but that one loss (at St. Lawrence) ultimately cost them a chance at the school's fifth NCAA Championship since 1973.

Up front, the '88-89 Badgers will be led by returning letterwinners JOHN BYCE, GARY SHUCHUK, CHRIS TANCILL, STEVE ROHLIK, DON GRANATO, DENNIS SNEDDEN, TOM SAGISSOR and JOE DECKER. Sauer's chief concern is replacing some of the scoring output of departed seniors Steve Tuttle, Paul Ranheim, Pat Ford, Glenn Revak and Tony Scheid - five players who accounted for 107 goals, 127 assists and 234 points.

"Offensively, we will look for improved production from players like Gary Shuchuk, Chris Tancill and Tom Sagissor as well as new scoring from Jon Helgeson, Doug Macdonald and Joe Decker. It will be difficult to replace players like Paul Ranheim, Steve Tuttle, Pat Ford and Glenn Revak, but we look for our offensive game to make steady progress as the season unfolds."

Byce, who should be a solid contender for All-WCHA honors after being honored as the Badgers' most improved player last winter, is the team's leading returning goal scorer and will serve as a tri-captain. He lit the lamp 22 times a year ago, including five power-play goals, four game-winners, two short-handers and one hat trick. In the Badgers' NCAA Tournament series win vs Lowell, he accounted for five goals, including a natural hat trick, and two assists.

For 1988-89, Coach Jeff Sauer returns 17 lettermen - headed by a veteran defense that has the potential to be one of college hockey's strongest. First team All-American blueliner and tri-captain PAUL STANTON heads up the group as a top candidate for the 1989 Hobey Baker Memorial Award. Along with Stanton are solid, experienced lettermen in ROB MENDEL, MARK OSIECKI, GREG POSS, KURT SEMANDEL, ROB ANDRINGA and RODGER SYKES. (Semandel and Poss, however, may be moved to forward.)

"Defensively, we have a good nucleus," said Sauer. "We have WCHA experience, we have leadership and we have the ability to move the puck quickly out of our end. We feel defense will be the strength of our team in '88-89."

In Stanton, Sauer has one of the nation's best offensive defenseman. Named Wisconsin's most consistent player last winter, Paul ranks as the top returning scorer among defensemen in the WCHA, after contributing nine goals and 38 assists for 47 points in 45 games a year ago. In Mendel, he has a heads-up, defensive-minded blueliner who was selected as one of the top three performers at last winter's World Junior Championships held in the Soviet Union. In Osiecki, he has one of the college game's premier shot blockers. In Andringa and Sykes he has a pair of sophomores with dominating potential, and in Poss and Semandel he has multi-letterwinners who know the ropes, have excellent speed, and the ability to play at forward as well.

Shuchuk and Tancill head into their junior seasons intent on becoming offensive leaders. Both players have lettered their first two years; Shuchuk has career totals of 26-23-59 in 86 games while Tancill has a similar 22-37-59 in 84 games.

Rohlik, the team's other tri-captain, and Sagissor, are hard-working defensive forwards who each have two letters and 75 games under their belts, while Granato, Snedden and Decker came to the forefront as three of the league's more effective first-year forwards last winter. A player who has the potential to make an impact is sophomore forward JON HELGESON, a rugged 6-4, 215-pounder who missed most of his freshman campaign with a shoulder injury.

In goal, JOHN LAMBIE is the returning letterman, after serving as a back-up to record-setting Dean Anderson throughout 1987-88. But Sauer expects his two highly-touted freshmen - Curtis Joseph and Duane Derksen - to stage a great battle for the goaltending duties. "We should see some great competition between Curtis and Duane," said Sauer. "Both of them are 20-year olds, both have been in pressure situations before, and both have great athletic ability."

Other varsity candidates for 1988-89 include wingers JOHN PARKER and BRIAN SERGENIAN, and defensemen KURT STAHURA and CHRIS JENSEN.

Sauer's incoming freshman class includes four other promising student-athletes in addition to goaltenders Joseph and Derksen. They are defenseman SEAN HILL, forwards BRETT KURTZ and DOUG

MACDONALD and defenseman CHRIS NELSON. Also new to the team will be first-year forward candidate JASON FRANCISCO.

Wisconsin faces another challenging schedule in 1988-89. In addition to 28 tough WCHA encounters, the Badgers will play seven games against Hockey East teams in what marks the final year of the scheduling agreement between the two leagues, and non-conference encounters vs St. Cloud State, Illinois-Chicago, Alaska-Fairbanks, and Moscow Dynamo from the USSR.

All 1988-89 home games are tentatively set for 7:35 pm.

Hockey Team Trainer

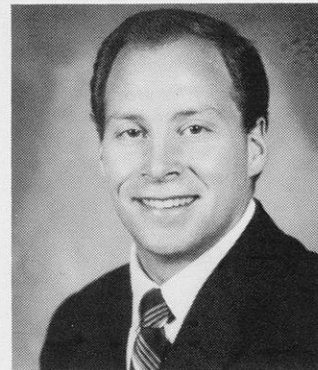

HEAD COACH JEFF SAUER

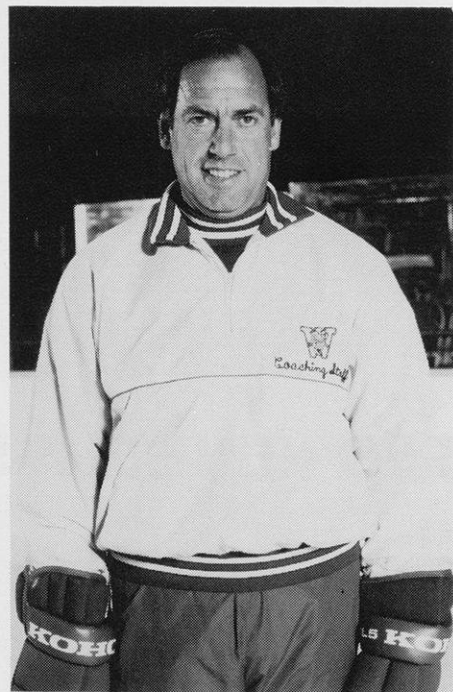


One of the most respected and influential coaches in the collegiate game today, 1988-89 marks the seventh year for Jeff Sauer as the guiding force of the University of Wisconsin ice hockey program.

In six seasons at the helm of the Badgers, Sauer's teams have averaged nearly 27 victories per year and have compiled an impressive 159-90-8 record and a .634 winning percentage. His 1987-88 squad put together a 30-13-2 overall mark, won the 23rd Annual Great Lakes Invitational Tournament in Detroit and the first WCHA Final Four Playoff Championship in St. Paul, advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals, and fashioned a 22-12-1 record and second place WCHA finish.

The Badgers' 30 victories in '87-88 marked the 11th time since 1971 that Wisconsin teams have won at least 23 games, and was the 18th time in the past 21 seasons that the UW has won 20 or more games. Under Sauer's leadership, the Badgers have won 30 or more games twice and at least 21 games all six seasons.

In addition to being one of college hockey's top coaches, Sauer has a wealth of international hockey experience as well. He is a regular consultant to USA Hockey Teams and served as one of four head coaches at the Olympic Festival in North Carolina in 1987. In the spring of 1985, he served as an assistant coach to Dave Peterson for the 1985 USA Hockey Team that participated in the annual IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia. That team put together a fine fourth place finish - just out of the medal picture and behind World Champion Czechoslovakia, runner-up Canada, and third place Russia.



Sauer guided his first Wisconsin Hockey team to the 1983 NCAA Championship.

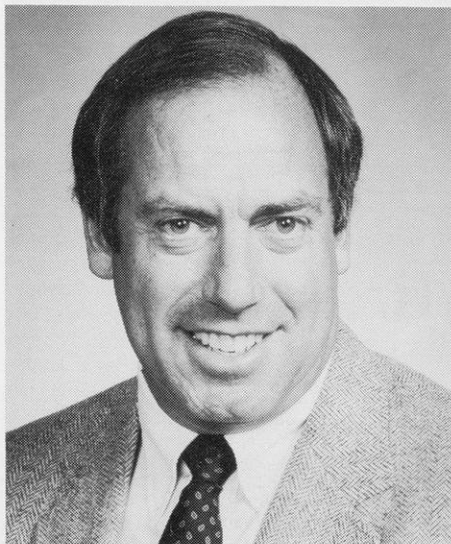
Sauer reached a personal milestone in 1987-88, posting his 300th career coaching victory earlier in the year. It was a victory that put him into select company in college hockey circles. Only 45 years old, Jeff will also mark his 18th season as a Western Collegiate Hockey Association head coach this winter, qualifying him as the "Dean" of league coaches.

In his first year at Wisconsin in 1982-83, Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach had ever done before. His Badgers captured the 1983 NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the best marks in school history at 33-10-4. It marked the fourth national championship for Wisconsin since 1973. Four members of that team - Pat Flatley, Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver and Marc Behrend - played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo and have since become stand-out players in the National Hockey League.

Known for their second-half peaks, Sauer's Wisconsin hockey teams have put together some impressive numbers during

the January-March stretch runs. His 1982-83 team compiled a 23-4-2 record and an .828 winning percentage after Christmas; his youthful '84-85 club ran up a 19-9 mark and a .679 winning percentage after November 30th; while his '85-86 club went 14-5-0 (.737) from December 30th to March 2nd. In 1986-87, Wisconsin fashioned an 8-1-0 tear from late December to late January. And just a year ago, Sauer's Badgers skated to an impressive 14-4-2 (.750) second-half record (Jan. 15-Mar. 27).

Among his other list of "notables" in the coaching profession are: head coach of the South team at the 1983 National Sports Festival; member of the 1984 US Olympic Hockey Committee; 1983 and 1988-89 Chairman of the WCHA Coach's Committee; and a stint on the NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee. Jeff also directs his own hockey school in Madison and has

worked with the Stan Mikita Hockey School for the Hearing-Impaired in Chicago during the off-season.

Sauer had big shoes to fill when he left a comfortable position as head hockey coach and athletic director at Colorado College to replace the highly successful Bob Johnson in 1982. But his character, determination to succeed and his positive rapport with student-athletes, fans, and media have proved he was the ideal choice.

At Colorado College, where he had served as the Tigers' Head Coach since 1971, Jeff won more than 180 games and was twice named WCHA "Coach of the Year". His first award came following his rookie season of 1971 and the second following the 1975-76 campaign when Colorado College posted a fine 23-14-0 record and finished third in the final WCHA standings. Sauer also guided his '80-81 Tigers to third place in the WCHA.

Wisconsin hockey fans will probably never forget the almost legendary "Black Sunday" in March of 1981 when Sauer's CC Tigers came back with a miraculous 11-4 upset over the Badgers in the Dane County Coliseum to claim the two-game, total-goals playoff victory. (Wisconsin had won the opening game 8-2.)

A 1965 graduate of Colorado College, Jeff earned a Bachelor's degree in Sociology. During his undergraduate years in Colorado Springs, he competed in both varsity hockey and baseball for the Tigers.

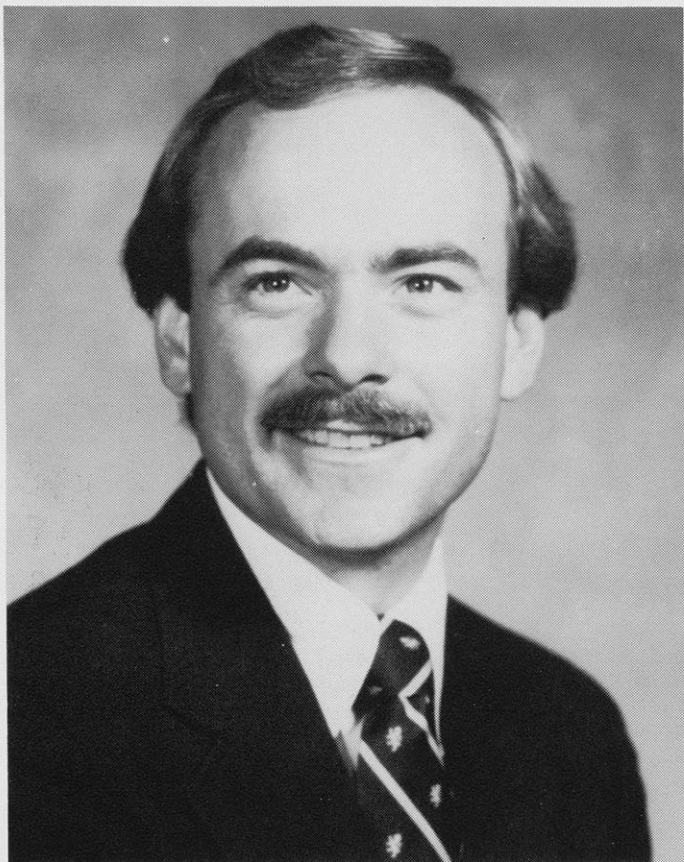
In 1966, Sauer began his coaching career as an assistant to Bob Johnson at Colorado College. Then when Johnson took over the head coaching duties at Wisconsin, Sauer again served as his assistant coach.

Jeff and wife, Jamie, are the parents of two children - son Chip, 13, and daughter Beth, eight.

Marking his seventh year overall as an assistant coach with the Wisconsin Hockey program in 1988-89 is Mike Kemp.

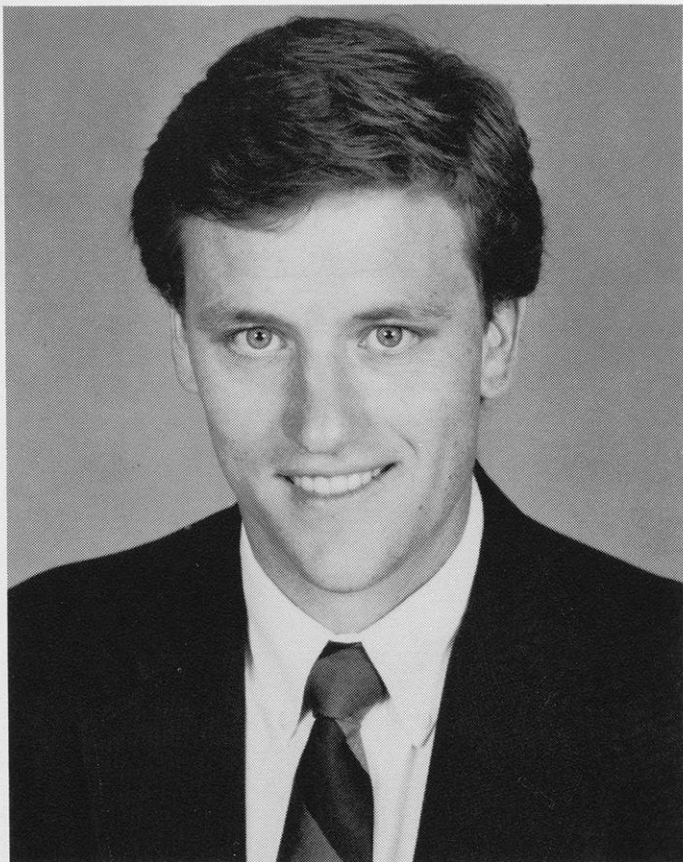
In addition to his numerous on and off-ice duties with the Badger Hockey team, Kemp also coordinates recruiting efforts for head coach Jeff Sauer and works with the Badgers' penalty-killing units.

From 1983-85, Mike served as administrative assistant coach to Sauer as well as executive director of the Blue Line Club. One of his chief duties in that role was producing the official program at all Badger home games.

In 1981-82, the 35-year-old native of Duluth, Minnesota served as administrative assistant under former Badger coach Bob Johnson, but moved on to the University of Illinois-Chicago for the '82-83 season as an assistant hockey coach for the Flames.

Assistant Coach

Peter Johnson enters his second season as a full-time assistant hockey coach at the University of Wisconsin for 1988-89. He was originally named to head coach Jeff Sauer's staff in August, 1987.

A 1983 University of Wisconsin graduate with a B.S. degree in Physical Education, Peter is the son of legendary UW hockey coach Bob Johnson and brother of former Badger and 1980 US Olympic Gold Medal winner Mark Johnson.

Prior to returning to the Madison campus, Peter spent two seasons (1985-86 and 1986-87) as an assistant hockey coach at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. There, his duties included recruiting, assisting in practice planning, on-ice coaching, off-ice training and scheduling for junior varsity games.

Johnson has also served as an assistant coach at Bowling Green State University (1984-85) and as a graduate assistant coach (1983-84) at BGSU while earning his Master of Education degree in Athletic Administration.

Peter played four years of collegiate hockey at Wisconsin under his father, Bob, and was a forward on the Badgers' 1981 NCAA Championship team. The 1981-82 Wisconsin team, which he captained, placed second in the national tournament.

During his four years at the UW, Johnson played in 153 games and scored 159 points on 82 goals and 77 assists. His point total is the 17th best all-time mark at the UW. He also earned four varsity letters, was named the team's most improved player for 1979-80, and earned the team's Ivan B. Williamson Award for scholastic achievement for 1981-82.

Peter was a member of United States National Hockey Teams in 1982 and 1983, was a participant in National Sports Festivals in 1981, 1982 and 1983, and took part in the World Ice Hockey Tournament in 1982 at Helsinki, Finland.

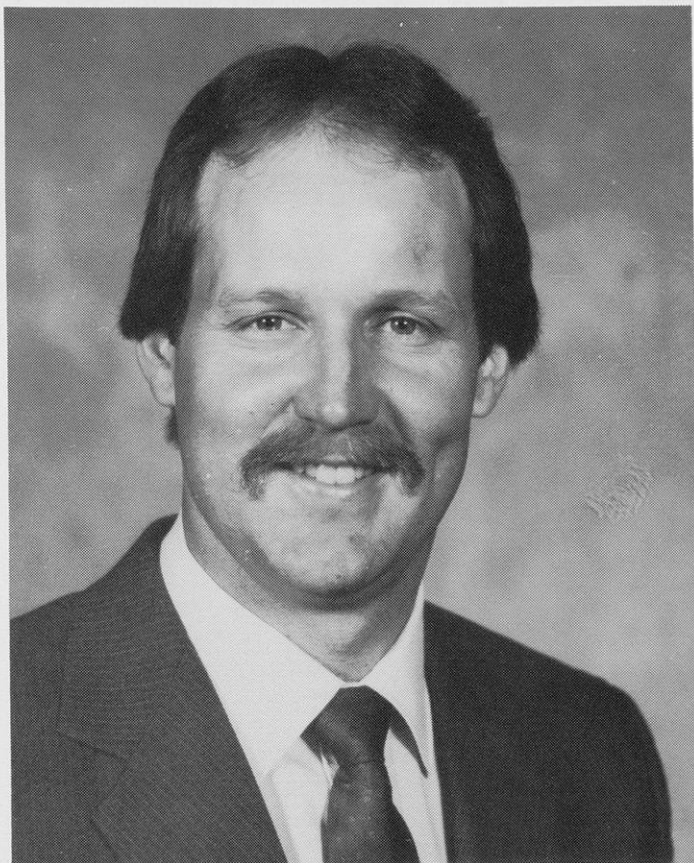
Howard is credited with helping develop such recent Badger goaltending standouts as Marc Behrend, Terry Kleisinger, Mike Richter and Dean Anderson.

Originally from Spy Hill, Saskatchewan, Ian was a four-year letterwinner on defense for Badger hockey teams from 1974-79.

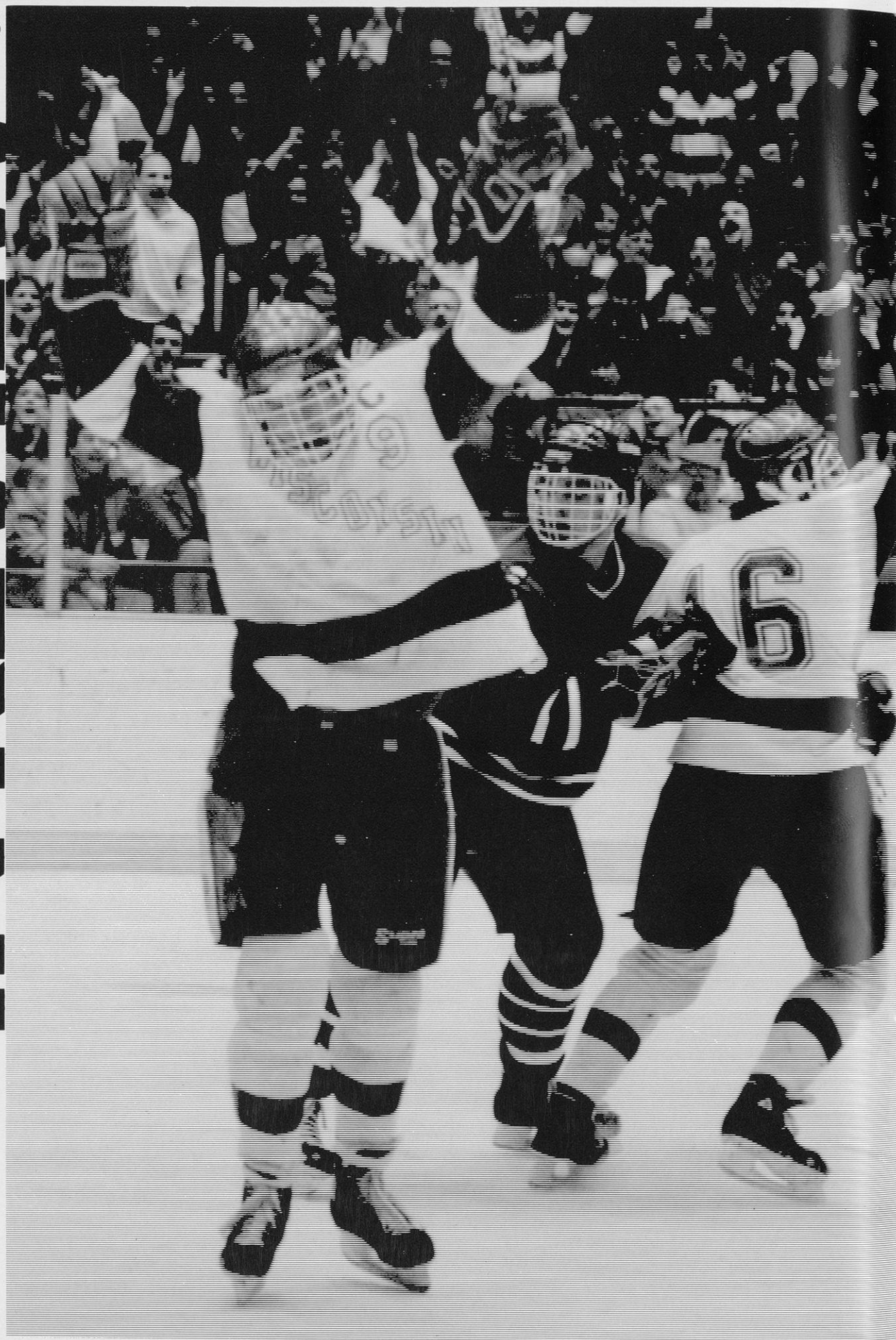

Recognized by many as the premier collegiate hockey league in the United States, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association proudly marks its 30th year of competition in 1988-89.

WCHA-member teams have claimed an unprecedented 20 NCAA Division I Championships in the past 29 years, including 11 of the last 16 with the University of North Dakota last skating to the national title in 1987. And since the NCAA Tournament began in 1948, the WCHA has claimed 30 national ice hockey titles! Three member institutions - Wisconsin, North Dakota and Minnesota - have accounted for ten national championships since 1973. The Badgers earned the NCAA Championship in 1973, 1977, 1981 and 1983, North Dakota took the crown in 1980, 1982 and 1987, and Minnesota captured the national title in 1974, 1976 and 1979. In NCAA final four competition, the WCHA has had two teams in the final four an impressive 34 of 39 times since 1949!

The names of ex-WCHA players are legendary, and although the list is too numerous to mention them all, you can start with John Mayasich, Bill Hay, Bill Masterton, Gordon "Red" Berenson, Lou Nanne, Tony Esposito, Keith Magnuson, Wayne Thomas, Dennis Hextall, Ron Grahame and 'Chico' Resch. And more recently, the WCHA can boast of the likes of Ed Mio, Neal Broten, Chris Chelios, James

Since 1950, the WCHA has had more than 135 of its players earn All-American honors, while another 80 (total does not include 1988) have played on USA Olympic Hockey Teams. 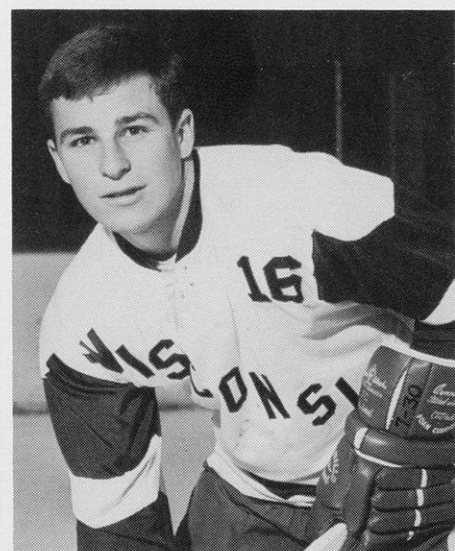

GREAT MOMENTS IN WISCONSIN HOCKEY

MARCH, 1962: Wisconsin Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced the return of ice hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28-year absence.

DECEMBER 6, 1963: A rebound goal by Chan Young 5:10 into the sudden death period gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate victory, a 3-2 decision over Macalester.

FEBRUARY 22, 1964: Wisconsin concluded its first season of hockey in the modern era with an 8-5-3 record.

DECEMBER 11, 1964: In an effort to upgrade the program, the Badgers schedule eight games against WCHA teams, but unfortunately, the Badgers go on to lose all eight of those games.

FEBRUARY 22, 1966: After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers finally post a victory, a 5-4 overtime win over Minnesota. Jim Petruzates scored on a break-away just two minutes into the overtime period.

APRIL 1, 1966: Following the retirement of John Riley, Bob Johnson was named head coach of the Wisconsin hockey program.

MARCH, 1968: Wisconsin hockey hit the national spotlight as Bert DeHate, a sophomore center, wins the national scoring title with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists. DeHate hits for seven hat tricks, a Badger record, as the team goes 21-10-0.

MARCH 30, 1969: After another successful season, including an 11-9-2 mark against WCHA teams, the Badgers are admitted to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

MARCH, 1970: Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA and qualifies for the NCAA Championships, where they post a third place finish. Defensemen John Jagger of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario becomes the first Badger player to earn All-American honors.

MARCH, 1972: The Badgers make their second appearance at the NCAA Championships in three seasons, again coming away with a third place finish.

MARCH 16, 1973: Wisconsin stuns Cornell, 6-5, in overtime to advance to the finals of the NCAA Championships. A goal with five seconds left in regulation time by sophomore Dean Talafofus ties the game. Talafofus then tallies the game-winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

MARCH 17, 1973: With a 4-2 victory over WCHA rival Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship for the first time in the school's history.

MARCH 25, 1977: After missing the NCAA playoffs for three years, the Badgers make it to the final four again. Les Grauer scored the tying goal against New Hampshire and Mike Eaves won it in overtime, 4-3, to

move the Badgers into the finals.

MARCH 26, 1977: Senior Steve Alley culminated the Badgers' finest season with a goal 23 seconds into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for the second NCAA Championship. Wisconsin finished the season at 37-7-1, and was the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Three players were named to the All-American squad—defenseman Craig Norwich, goaltender Julian Baretta and center Mike Eaves. Coach Bob Johnson was named national coach of the year, while his son, Mark, was named freshman of the year.

MARCH 25, 1978: Wisconsin fans took Providence, Rhode Island by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championships, and were resultingly proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans" by the city of Providence. Mike Eaves concluded his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson earned All-American acclaim. The Badgers finished fourth in the tournament.

MARCH, 1979: Record crowds saw the Badgers (25-13-3) play as 21 of the 23 home games were sellouts and the average crowd of 8,654 at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum was just eight short of a sellout. Mark Johnson closed out his

Badger career as the top goal scorer (125) in Wisconsin history. He was named to the All-American team for the second time and was collegiate player of the year.

MARCH 27, 1981: Wisconsin returned to the NCAA Championships for the sixth time since 1970 after defeating the best team in the east, Clarkson, 9-8, in a total goal series at Potsdam, NY. After a 5-1 win over Northern Michigan in the semi-finals, the Badgers advanced to the finals for the third time.

MARCH 28, 1981: The Badgers gained the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 win over Minnesota. The "back door" Badgers proved they were the champions after defeating the No. 1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota). The season also marked the end of the ten-team WCHA, as the three Michigan schools and Notre Dame dropped out and joined the CCHA to cut expenses.

MARCH 27, 1982: Wisconsin makes its seventh NCAA Championship appearance but finishes second to North Dakota. The Badgers compiled the second best record in school history at 35-11-1. Center John Newberry and defenseman Bruce Driver receive All-American honors while goaltender Marc Behrend is named NCAA tourney "MVP".

JUNE 1, 1982: Coach Bob Johnson resigns after 15 great years at Wisconsin. He had

guided the Badgers to three NCAA Championships, seven national tournament appearances, a record of 367-175-23, and the best attendance of any college hockey program in the country.

JULY 8, 1982: Jeff Sauer, previously head coach at Colorado College and former assistant to Bob Johnson at Wisconsin, is named the school's fourth coach.

MARCH 5, 1983: Sophomore defenseman Chris Chelios and sophomore winger Paul Houck score the tying and winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota, 6-5, in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA Playoff Championships in Minneapolis.

MARCH 24-26, 1983: After sweeping past Minnesota in Williams Arena to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship and the No. 1 seed in the West, first-year coach Jeff Sauer's Badgers swept St. Lawrence, 6-2 and 7-1, in the NCAA Quarterfinals in Madison to move to the NCAA Championships for the third straight year and eighth time overall since 1970. In Grand Forks, North Dakota, the Badgers claimed their fourth national championship since 1973 with a 2-0 win over Providence in the semi-finals and a 6-2 victory over Harvard in the finals. Senior goaltender Marc Behrend was named the NCAA tournament most valuable player for the second time in his career.

JANUARY 7, 1984: Wisconsin becomes the first and only American college team to

defeat the 1984 US Olympic Hockey Team when the Badgers stun USA, 4-2, before 8,732 at the Dane County Coliseum.

NOVEMBER 23, 1985: The University of Wisconsin records its 500th victory since starting hockey in 1963 with a 6-2 victory over WCHA-rival North Dakota in the Coliseum.

DECEMBER 30, 1987: Wisconsin beats CCHA-members Michigan, 6-0, and Michigan State, 4-3, to win the 23rd Annual Great Lakes Invitational Tournament before 19,482 at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit, MI. Goaltender Dean Anderson, defenseman Paul Stanton and forwards Paul Ranheim and Steve Tuttle are named to the all-tournament team, and Anderson also receives the tourney "MVP" award.

MARCH 6-7, 1988: Wisconsin defeats North Dakota, 2-1, and Minnesota, 3-2, to claim the first WCHA Final Four Playoff Championship before nearly 14,000 at the St. Paul (MN) Civic Center. Anderson, Stanton, Ranheim and Tuttle are voted to the all-tournament team while Anderson picks up his second tourney "MVP" honor of the season. Later that month, Paul Ranheim and Paul Stanton are named first team All-Americans, while Dean Anderson and Steve Tuttle are honored with selection to the second All-American team. The '87-88 Badgers compiled a 30-13-2 record—the school's fourth 30-victory campaign.



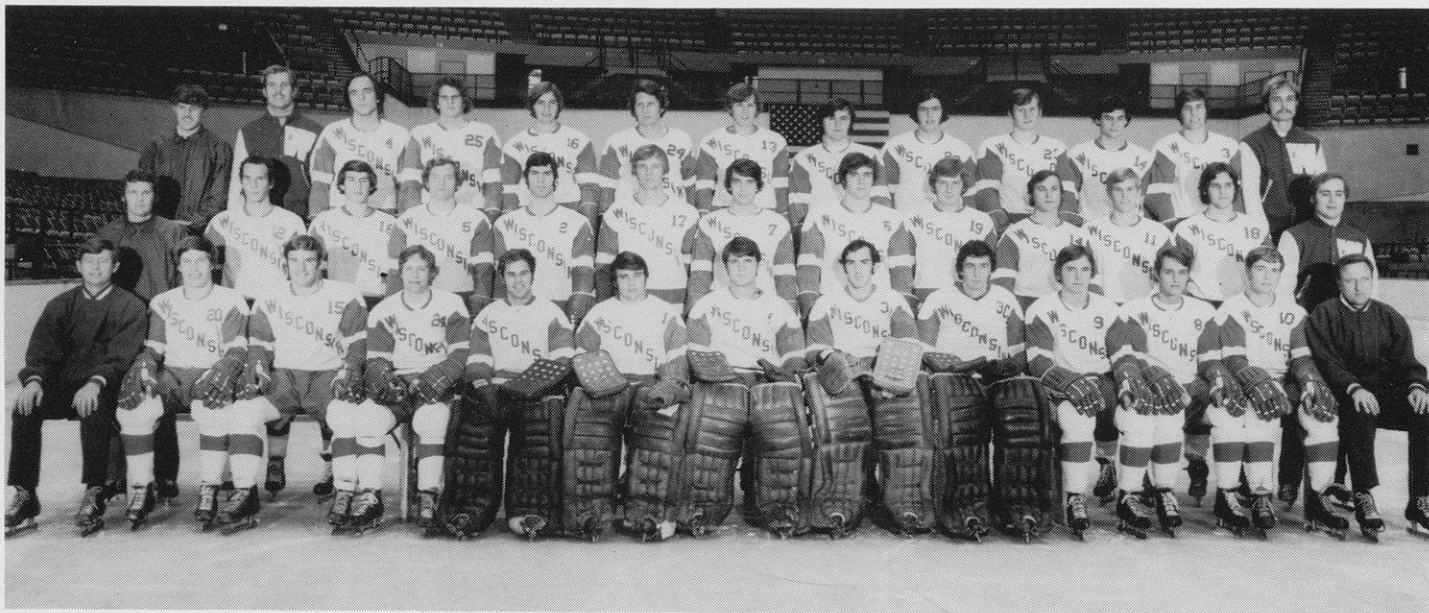

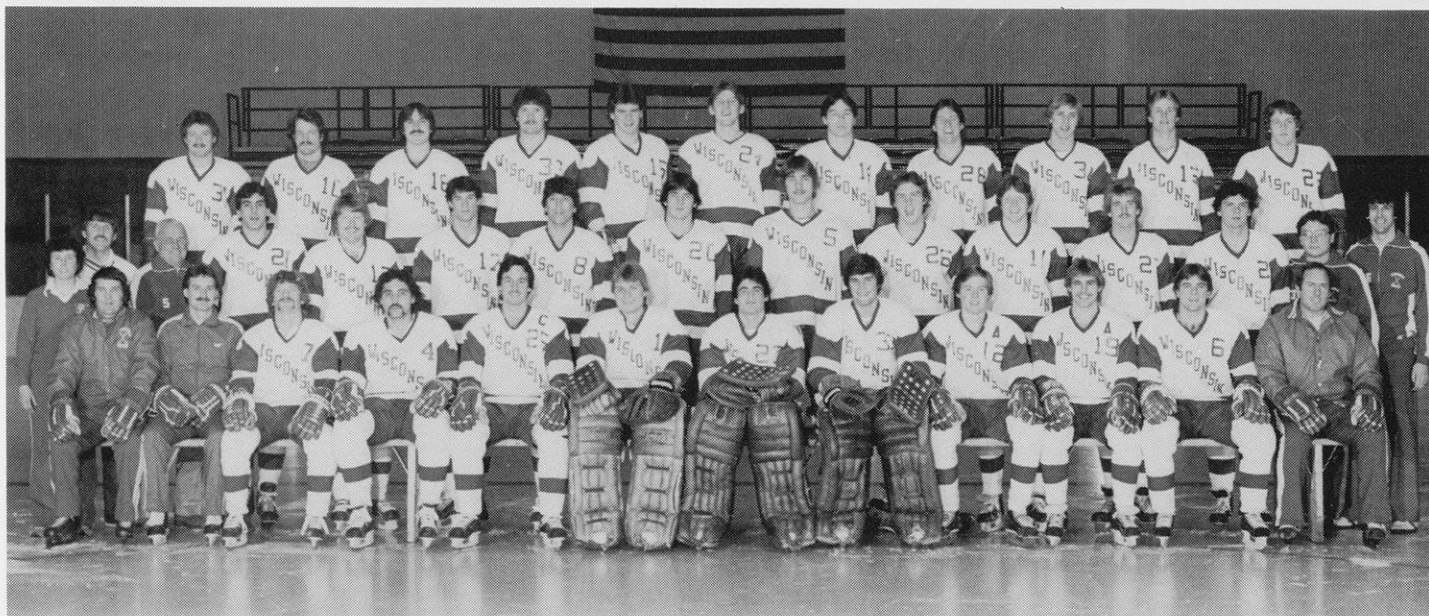

THE DANE COUNTY MEMORIAL COLISEUM HOME OF THE BADGERS



Home ice for the University of Wisconsin Hockey Team is the impressive Dane County Memorial Coliseum, one of the college game's finest facilities and home to the NCAA attendance leader for 19 consecutive seasons.

With theater-style seating for 8,644, the Coliseum is the second largest collegiate ice facility in the nation. The ice surface is 200' by 85'.

Inside, the hockey Badgers make use of dressing room facilities that rank as fine as any. Each player is assigned an individual stall (3½ × 6) for equipment and personal belongings.

Located just adjacent to the Wisconsin dressing room is a modern training room which includes a whirlpool and all the various modalities and exercise equipment for treatment of rehabilitation of injuries.

The Badgers also have at their disposal a newly-renovated and fully-equipped weight room located inside the Coliseum.

Recognized as the home of some of the nation's best collegiate hockey fans, the Coliseum and the University of Wisconsin hockey team have attracted the nation's largest crowds every year since the Badgers initially joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Association for the 1969-70 season.

The University of Wisconsin has set American college hockey attendance records for 19 consecutive seasons dating back to 1970. Some 3,648,141 Badger fans have watched UW hockey teams in the Coliseum since 1967, and since 1969, the UW has drawn 3,266,146 for 393 home dates

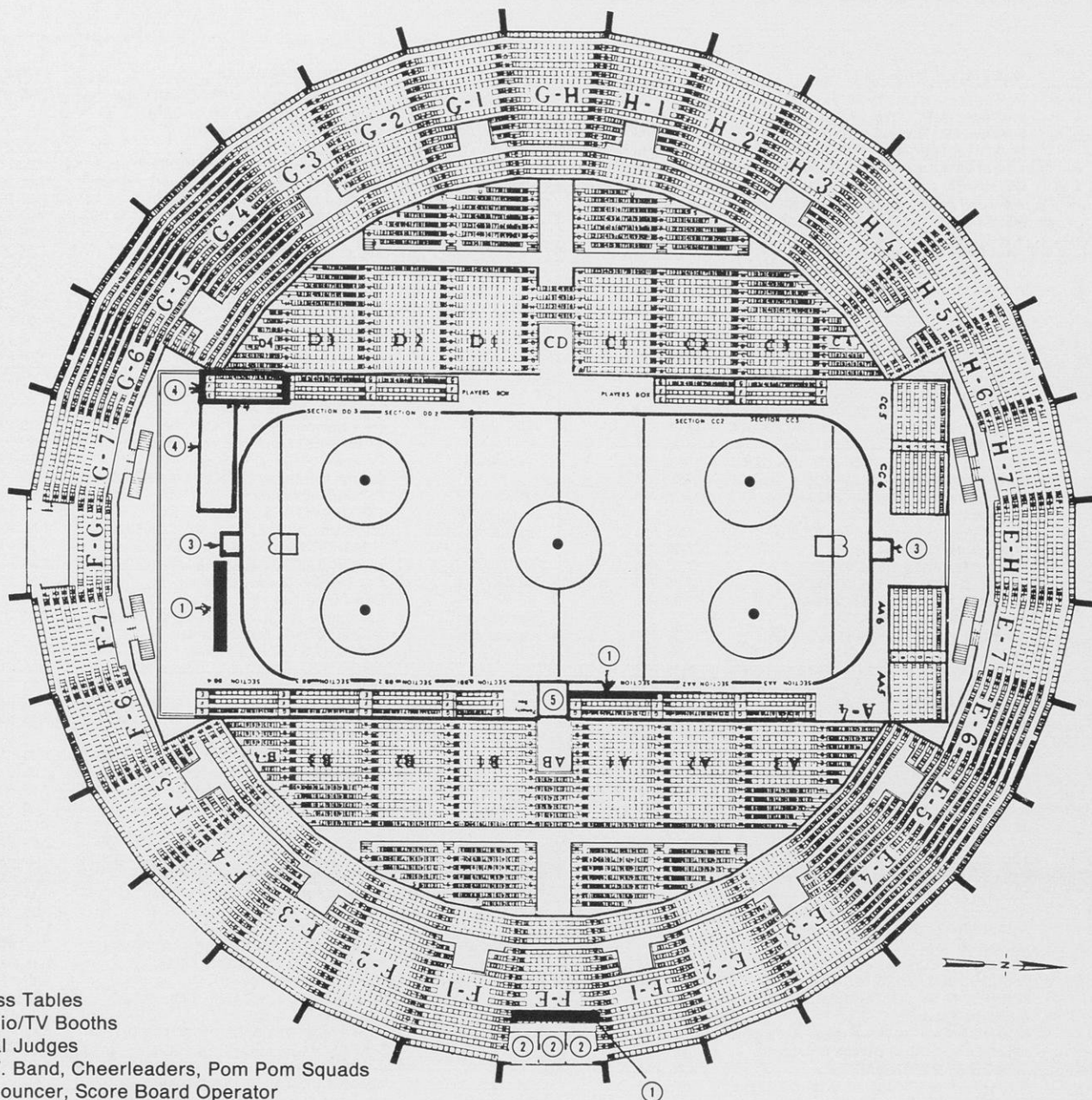
(not counting exhibitions)—an average of 8,311 per game.

In 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set an all-time NCAA single season record, while the 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 is both an NCAA and University of Wisconsin record.

Along with some of college hockey's best fans, the hockey Badgers can lay claim to one of the sport's best home-ice records.

Wisconsin teams have a won-loss-tie record of 353-133-17 for a home-ice winning percentage of .719 since 1963.

Witnessing a Badger game in the jam-packed Dane County Memorial Coliseum is like nothing else in college hockey.

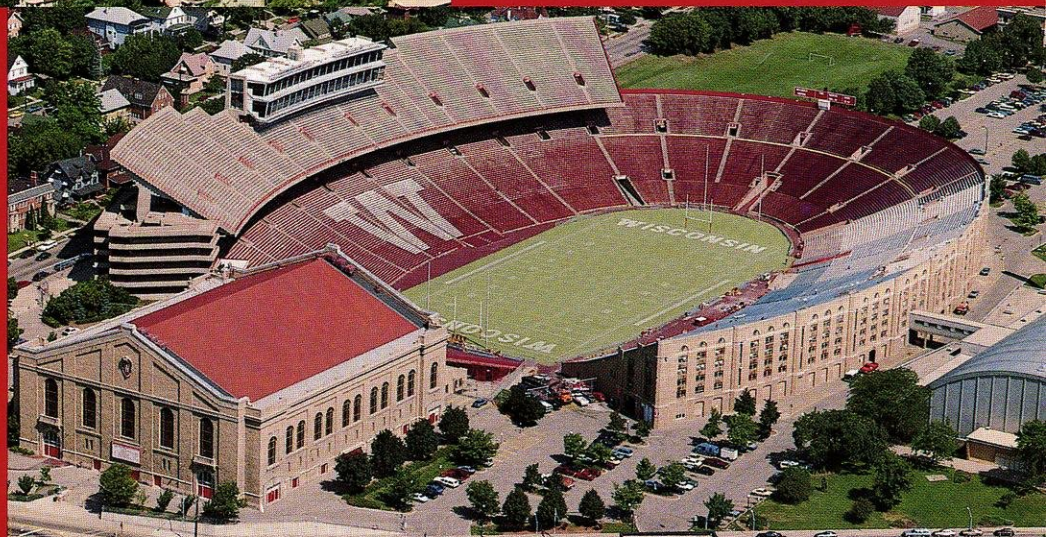
THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

The Wisconsin Union has been providing a variety of services and an extensive program of social, cultural, and recreational events for students. Memorial Union, on the shores of Lake Mendota, is a center of activity for some 18,000 people every day. Another 10,000 enter Union South, and more than 11,000 meals are served daily in the Wisconsin Union's 11 restaurants and delis.
