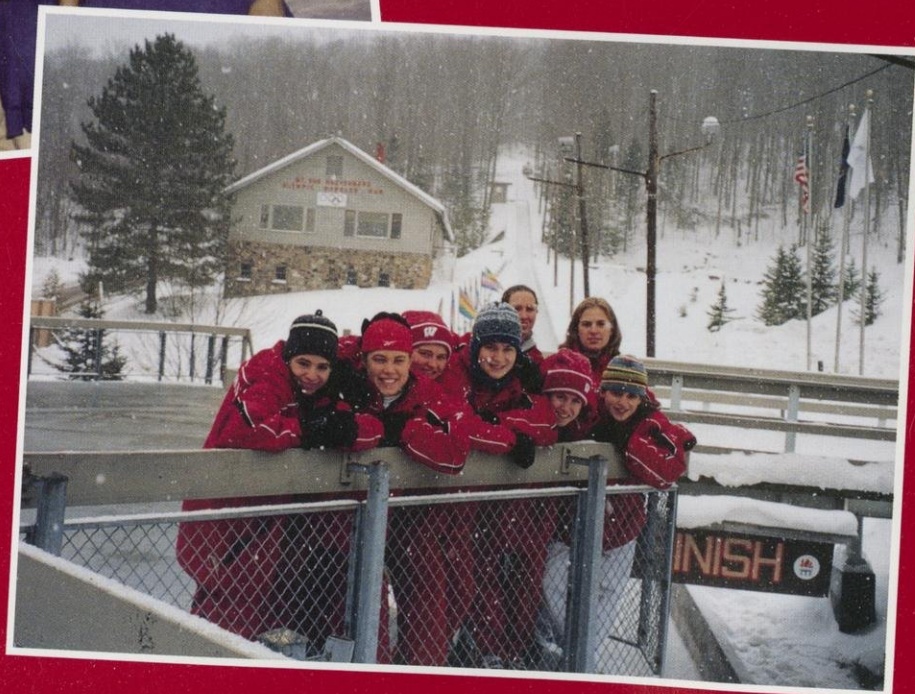

Head Coach Trina Bourget

Trina Bourget begins her second year as head coach of the Wisconsin Badgers, shunning her interim title for the full-time head coaching position.

Bourget advanced the Badgers another step towards the ultimate goal of a national title when she pushed her team to its first 20-win season in 2000-01. With wins over three top-five teams, the Badgers proved they could play with the best in the nation. She also had the Badgers in contention for a regular-season WCHA title with two weeks remaining in the season as the squad placed third for the second year. The Badgers would finish ranked seventh in all major polls and computer rankings.

Bourget arrived in Madison in the summer of 1999 after a successful two-year stay as head coach of Division III Sacred Heart University. Named the 1998-99 Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference/Koho Coach of the Year, she led the Pioneers, in their third year of existence, to a No. 8 national ranking. Their 15-4-3 record during the 1998-99 season, good for second in the ECAC, earned Bourget American Women's Hockey Coaches Association Coach of the Year runner-up honors.

Before her tenure at Sacred Heart, Bourget spent two years as assistant coach of Lincoln Sudbury Regional High School girls' hockey team in Sudbury, Mass., and held a similar position with the field hockey team at Shrewsbury High School in Shrewsbury, Mass. Her first college coaching experience came when she served as an assistant club-team coach of women's hockey at Holy Cross College located in Worcester, Mass., during the 1994-95 campaign. That same



year, Bourget also served as head coach of a boys' team in the Shrewsbury Youth Hockey Association.

Bourget's most recent coaching experience came this past summer when she joined the coaching ranks of USA Hockey. She served as co-coach of the USA Hockey Junior Olympic Development Camp in Lake Placid, N.Y.

A 1994 graduate of the University of New Hampshire, Bourget owns a bachelor of science degree in family and consumer studies. While at UNH, Bourget competed as a forward and defenseman for the women's hockey team where she helped the Wildcats to the ECAC Division I Championship in 1991, and runner-up finishes 1992 and 1993.

A former referee, Bourget brings a great understanding of all aspects of the game. She spent over 11 years in the official's stripes and received her "B" Pool

● Tracey Cornell

Ashton, Ontario, native Tracey Cornell begins her third season at Wisconsin after helping the Badgers to a 21-9-5 campaign last year.

The energetic Cornell came to Madison after spending the previous year as head girl's hockey coach at Cushing Academy in Ashburnham, Mass. Cornell led Cushing Academy to a 24-4-2 mark, the most successful season in the history of the program. Her team captured second during the regular season and advanced to the NEPSAC Championship.

Cornell's playing experiences include four years at Cornell University, as well as one year as a professional in Switzerland for the SC Reinach Lions. While at Cornell, she co-captained the hockey program her senior season earning Academic All-Ivy honors both her junior and senior years. Cornell helped the Big Red to the Ivy League hockey title during the 1995-96 season and served as assistant captain during the title run. The one-time Cornell Rookie of the Year also earned team honors as most inspirational player during her sophomore and senior campaigns.

Her stay with the SC Reinach Lions was successful. The Lions placed second overall in the top Swiss hockey league and were crowned Zurich Cup Tournament Champions during her 1997-98 season.

Cornell earned her bachelor of science degree in marine ecology from Cornell University in 1997. In addition to her time with the hockey program, Cornell played forward for a year with the Big Red women's soccer team.



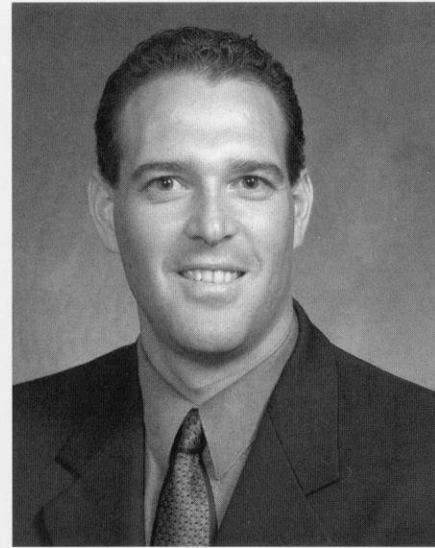
● Dan Koch

Koch spent the previous two years as an assistant coach with the women's hockey program at St. Mary's (Minn.) University working with the forwards and goaltenders. Also a third-grade teacher at Franklin Elementary School in LaCrosse, Wis., Koch helped lead the Cardinals to a Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title during the 1999-00 season and a third-place finish at the national tournament in the 2000-01 season.

Prior to his St. Mary's experience, Koch was the head coach of the LaCrosse Logan/Central High School boys' ice hockey team from 1996-99. He coached all-conference and all-state players during his three-year stint. Koch also coached various ice hockey teams from 1986-95 at all youth levels including park and recreation leagues and travel squads. He also coached soccer in the Madison area as an assistant varsity girl's soccer coach at Madison LaFollette and as an assistant for the boys' team at Monona Grove High School from 1986-90.

Koch earned his master's degree in education, teaching and learning this past May from St. Mary's University after earning his bachelor of science degree in elementary education in December of 1991 from the UW. He is a 1985 Madison LaFollette High School graduate.

Koch and his wife Jody, a school psychologist in Marshall, Wis., have a five-year old son, Connor.

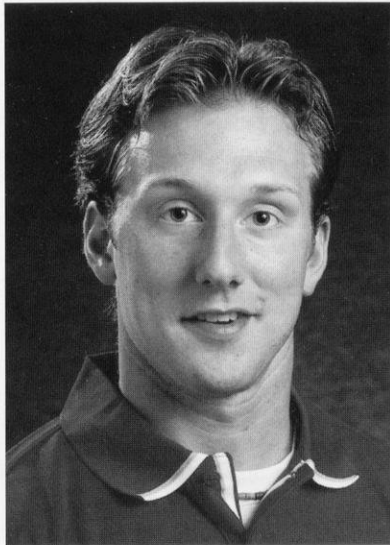

Eley earned her associate of arts degree from Fullerton College in Fullerton, Calif., after graduating from Monona Grove (WI) High School.

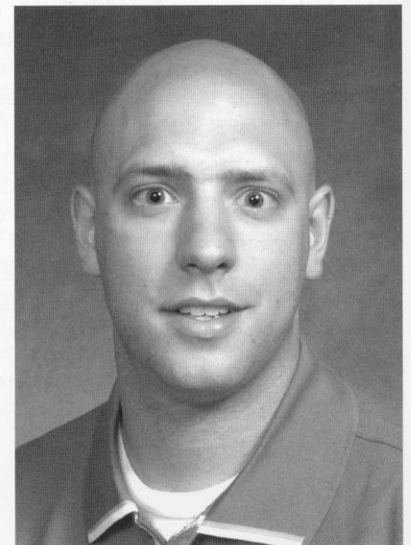
Eley and her husband Dennis have four children.

duties with the women's hockey program, Hickman spends time at the Eagle's Nest Arena in Verona, Wis., as a Zamboni driver.



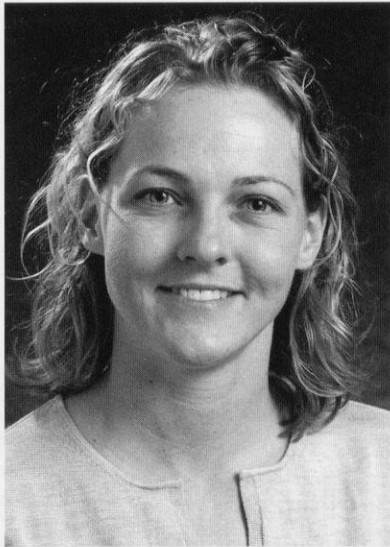
● Athletic Trainer Laura Walluk

● Strength Coach Paul Goodman

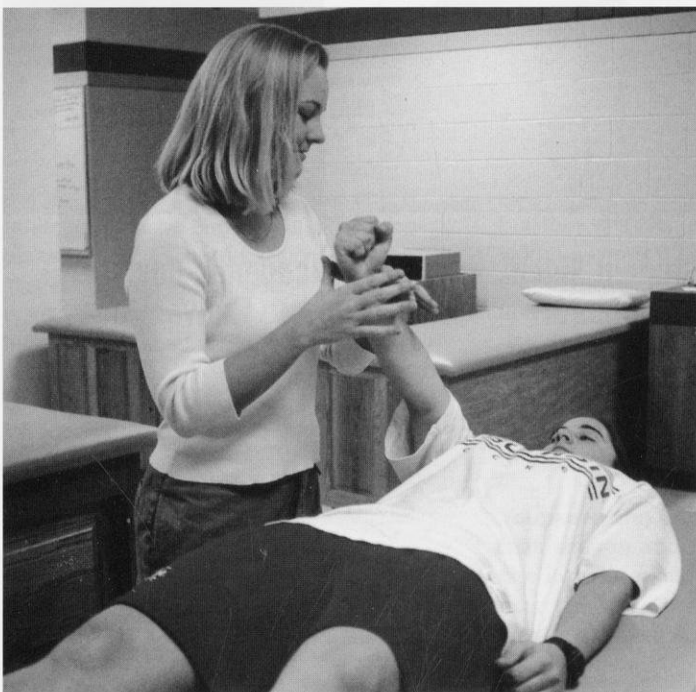
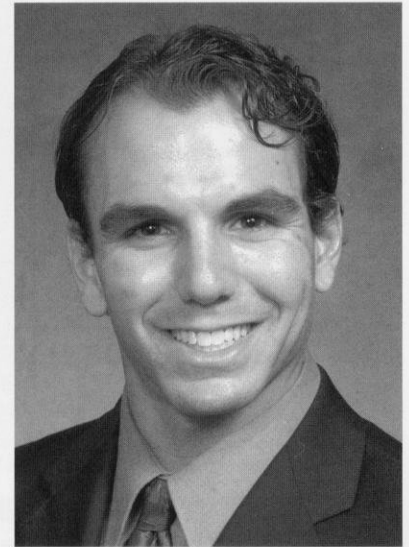

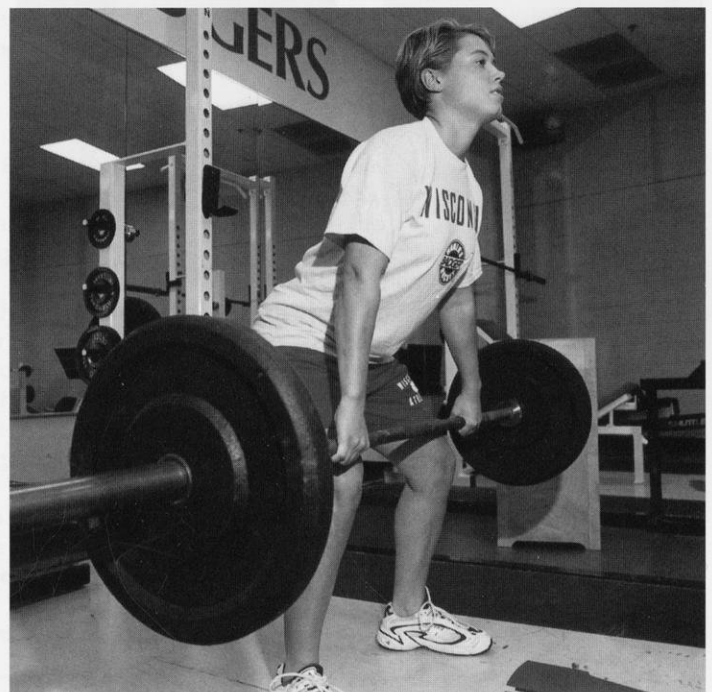

Athletic trainer Laura Walluk treats junior defender Sis Paulsen in the McClain Athletic Training Room.

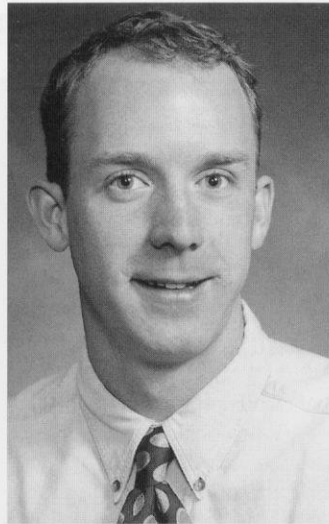

Q&A with Coach Trina Bourget

Why should a student-athlete choose to attend the University of Wisconsin?

Wisconsin is a world-class institution. The university offers the perfect blend of academic and athletic success. When a student-athlete earns her degree from Wisconsin, she will have opened the doors to a myriad of opportunities. Besides, Madison is a great place to call home for four years.

What makes Wisconsin different than other hockey programs?

Our location, academic reputation, and tradition of excellence in the athletic arenas make Wisconsin unique. Wisconsin is a university that has so much hockey history to offer to anyone who loves the game. To coach at a school where "Badger Bob" Johnson once coached gives me chills just thinking about it. He coined the phrase, "It's a great day for hockey!" Not to mention that his son, Mark Johnson, a 1980 Gold medalist, is currently an assistant coach for the men's hockey team. As the women's program continues to grow, we too, look forward to building a strong tradition of our own.

What kind of student-athletes are you recruiting to the University of Wisconsin?

The student-athletes that don a Badger jersey must possess a number of attributes in addition to physical talents. We want women who are strong in character and possess a positive attitude – women who put the team first. She should be highly motivated, mentally tough, and coachable. In addition to possessing strong hockey skills, prospective student-athletes must be successful in the academic arena. Being a Division I student-athlete is rigorous. Therefore, it is imperative that she be able to successfully balance academics and athletics.

What goals have you set for the Wisconsin program?

This season, a third of our roster will be comprised of incoming players. The past two seasons our team's success has been due in part to our team's chemistry. Any time you add new players to the mix, it changes the dynamics of the group. So the first goal is to get everyone working together and get everyone working on the same page. In addition, the coaching staff aims to develop the total student-

athlete, so that she will be able to maximize her potential on the ice, in the weight room, in the classroom and out in the Wisconsin community. Our team's outcome goals include becoming contenders for the WCHA League Title as well as putting ourselves in a position to battle for the National Championship.

What do you like best about coaching at the University of Wisconsin?

Wow, that's a tough question! I don't know if I could put my finger on just one thing I like best about coaching at the University of Wisconsin. What first comes to mind are the people that I come into contact with, whether it be our players, coaching staff, support staff, administration, faculty, or fans. It is the people that make this university what it is. We have a tremendous core of student-athletes. Not only are they talented, but they are also a great group of young women who are strong in character, will and determination. As a player, you will spend a lot of time with your teammates, and I can't think of any other people you would rather spend your time with. I would also be remiss if I didn't include how great it is to work at a university that has such a strong hockey tradition.

You were the interim coach during last season and have now replaced the interim part of your title and are now the head coach. What do you think you have done to earn the job?

There were several factors that the administration took into account when deciding to hire me as the permanent

head coach. A few of those determining factors were: growth of the program, ability to recruit and academic success of the student-athletes.

The program certainly experienced growth and moved forward in a positive direction in just its second season. We finished the season ranked seventh in the nation, third in the WCHA with a record of 21-9-5 and beat powerhouses such as Duluth, Harvard, and Minnesota-Twin Cities. This showed our administration and the rest of the hockey community that the Badgers are a team on the rise.

With regards to recruiting, we've brought in our largest class yet. Three of the women from our incoming class have been associated with the Canadian Under 22 National Team. Our three US players have all had experience playing on the US Select Festival Camps held at the Olympic Training Center in Lake Placid, NY. Our final recruit also has accomplished herself on the soccer field as well. She was selected to Canada's World Cup Soccer team.

Our student-athletes have had success in the academic arena as well. Six of our returning players were named to the WCHA All-Academic Team. I am proud to say that the team had over a 3.2 grade point average last semester.

How would you describe your coaching philosophy?

When I think about my coaching philosophy, a Chinese Proverb comes to mind. "Those who want to leave an impression for one year should plant corn. Those who want to leave an impression for ten years should plant a tree. Those who want to leave an impression for a lifetime should educate a human being." As a coach, I have a tremendous responsibility to the women I coach. Not only do I want to develop them as hockey players, but I also want to foster their development as people. Hockey is the arena of life. Lessons these women learn on the ice will carry over into their daily academic and personal lives as well.

The relationship between the men's and women's hockey teams is unique at Wisconsin. Explain.

We have Coach Sauer and Jackie MacMillan to thank for such a terrific relationship between our two programs. Jackie, our first recruited player, came to Wisconsin a year before the team hit the ice. Coach Sauer allowed her to practice

with the men's team during the 1998-99 season. That really helped her game and also fostered our relationship with the men's program. I don't think many, if any, programs in the country get along as well as the men's and women's hockey teams at Wisconsin. Coach Sauer and the rest of his staff have treated us like family.

Two years ago, the program surprised everyone with the success it had in its first year. Last year the program began earning respect with some big wins. What is the goal this season?

In two years, our program has made tremendous strides. We look to continue to cultivate a culture of success, one in which hard work and a "team first" attitude are the cornerstones of the program. The goal this season is for our team to play to its potential. Our players need to play hard and smart and when the final buzzer sounds, I want our players to walk off the ice having had no regrets. If we focus on the things we can control, then the outcome should take care of itself.

There were some extremely large crowds at Badger women's hockey games during the inaugural season with many people getting their first exposure to the sport. Now that the program is three years along, what can fans expect?

The talent level is phenomenal. They should come back, because they don't know what they are missing. We've added depth to all of our positions from goaltending, to defense, right up to the forward line. With our Captain Sis Paulsen leading the charge, along with fellow returnees Jackie MacMillan and All-Americans Meghan Hunter and assistant captain Kerry Weiland, among others, will prove to have an exciting brand of Badger Hockey.

The face of women's hockey continues to change as it grows. Can you explain what is new in the world of women's hockey this season?

This being an Olympic year, the WCHA is going to put together an all-star team to play the US National team. The Visa Skate to Salt Lake Tour will commence at the Kohl Center here in Madison. It should prove to be an exciting weekend. Badger fans will get a chance to see one of our

own, defender Nicole Uliasz, wear the red, white, and blue jersey. Fellow Badgers, Sis Paulsen, Kerry Weiland, Kendra Antony and Karen Rickard will suit up for the WCHA All-Stars.

This year will only be the second opportunity for teams to battle for an NCAA National Championship Title. It should prove to be an interesting year in women's hockey. Many teams will lose players to their national teams for the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City, Utah. The race will be on for the top four slots to see who will be competing in NCAA Final Four. Also new this season is the expansion and restructuring of the ECAC League that will split into two NCAA Division I leagues with the addition of new programs such as Vermont, Connecticut, Colgate, and Quinnipiac. While the ECAC grows and competition gets diluted, the WCHA league will be as strong as ever. Unlike the two previous seasons when all of the WCHA teams made the league playoffs, this year only five of the seven teams will get the opportunity to compete for the WCHA Championship. This race for the five spots will make it exciting for the fans, coaches, and players alike.

2000-01 Women's Hockey Preview

After impressive seasons in its first two years of competition, the Badger women's hockey program is poised for more. Wisconsin ranked as high as No. 5 in the nation during 2000-01, earning victories over the eventual NCAA champions and four of the five top-10 teams it faced. Armed with stellar goaltending, a deep defensive corps and some high-powered offense, the Badgers now look to take the next step.

● Goaltenders

Junior Jackie MacMillan has demonstrated the ability to carry her entire team on her back the past two years and is ready for a repeat performance if need be. The First-Team all-WCHA goaltender as a frosh, MacMillan dropped her goals against average by almost a half goal last season as a sophomore while posting an 18-8-5 season. Her 18 wins placed her in a tie for third in the country.

Behind the anchor of the program resides junior Jen Neary, who when called on during her two years has performed admirably. In 2000-01, Neary blanked two opponents on her way to a 3-1-0 mark in 10 appearances.

Athletic newcomer Jessica Bernal adds security to the position, having taken part in USA Hockey Development Camps in Lake Placid, N.Y., in the past.

● Defense

Returning as the heart and soul of the defense are junior Second-Team All-American Kerry Weiland, the national defense scoring leader, and WCHA all-Tournament selection junior Sis Paulsen, a past First-Team all-WCHA performer. Paulsen, the team captain, and Weiland, the assistant captain, lead a skilled back line.

A pair of newcomers may make the Wisconsin blue-line the most feared in the country. Wisconsin-native Molly Engstrom, one of the top new defenders in the country, is a three time competitor at the USA Hockey Olympic Development Camp. The Badgers' first Canadian defender also joins

the team in the form of Canadian Under-22 National Team member Carla MacLeod. The Calgary, Alberta native has spent the last five years with the Oval X-Treme program.

The pair will have to make up for the loss of powerful Nicole Uliasz, who was one of 25 selected to the 2001-02 USA Hockey Women's National Team. Uliasz will train and tour with the national team in the hopes of earning one of the 20 coveted spots for the Winter Olympic Games this coming February in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Also in the mix is returning sophomore Kathryn Greaves. The second-year defender showed the ability to consistently move the puck out of the defensive zone to get the Badger attack started.

● Forwards

Center Meghan Hunter returns as the nation's leading scorer after sharing the country's scoring lead with 42 goals and 78 points as a frosh. One of 10 finalists for The Patty Kazmaier Award, Hunter was a Second-Team All-American and the WCHA Rookie of the Year. She is now a member of Canada's Under-22 National Team. Junior Kendra Antony made up the other half of a dynamic duo for the Badgers with 50 points and sits just five points shy of becoming the first Badger to reach 100 career points.

A group of three solid forwards led by sophomore Karen Rickard add balance to the UW scoring attack. Rickard ranked third on the team with 15 goals last season, as herself (27 points), junior Kelly Kegley (24) and sophomore Steph Millar (21) all finished within six point of one another.

New additions up front include two-sport star Amy Vermeulen, who scored the game-winning goal for Canada's Under-22 National Team in its first international victory in soccer, and Jackie Friesen, a 2001 Canada Under-22 National Team player. Vermeulen will begin her hockey season once the Badgers' soccer season ends.

Also joining the offense is Jocelyn Cookson, the game-winning goal scorer in the Minnesota State High School Championship Game for Bloomington Jefferson in 2001. Kathy Devereaux rounds out the newcomers. The former University of Calgary Dino assistant captain enters her time with the Badgers as a junior after spending the last four seasons with the Oval X-Treme.

Grit is also part of the Badger forwards with juniors Julia Ortenzio and Melanie Schmitt, and sophomore Steph Boeckmann all returning. The trio regularly created havoc for opposing forwards and defenders trying to get the puck out of their own zone.

● The Season

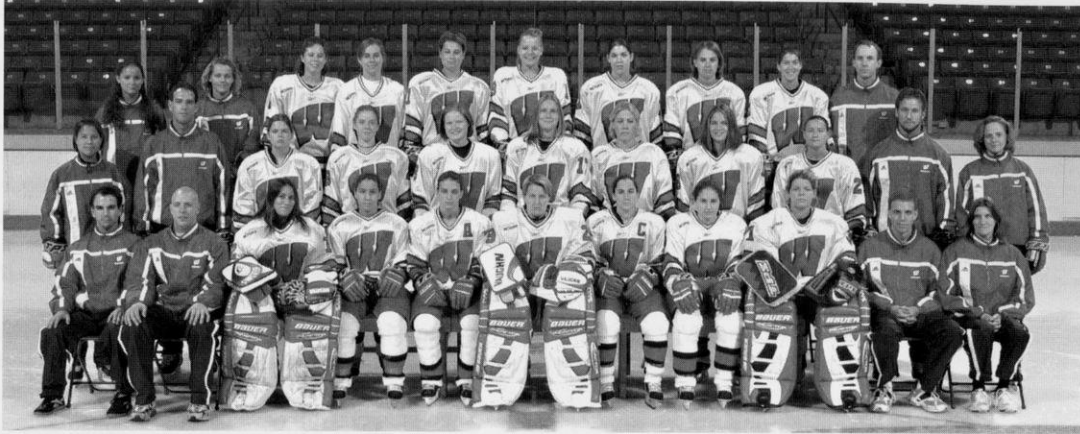
The Badgers have moved away from the Alliant Energy Center, its predominate home rink during the first two seasons, and will call the Kohl Center its home in 2001-02. Wisconsin faces off on the Olympic-sized ice for three series, while also playing at Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, Wis., and Hobbs Ice Arena in Eau Claire, Wis., the site of a series during the inaugural season two years ago.

A return to the site of the 1980 Olympic miracle also highlights the Badger schedule with a game against 2002 NCAA Runner-up St. Lawrence and a possible match-up with the 2001-02 U.S. Women's National Team.

No matter where they play, the Badgers will look to negotiate their way through college hockey's grueling schedule and survive for a chance at the 2002 NCAA Championship in Durham, N.H. 2000-2001 Season Highlights

WHAT SOHPOMORE SLUMP?: The University of Wisconsin (21-9-5, 13-6-5 WCHA) finished third in the WCHA regular season and third at the WCHA Women's Championship in Rochester, Minn., March 8-10. The Badgers finished three points out of second place and seven from first. In the 1999-00 season, Wisconsin was 12 points from second and 13 from first.

NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED: The Badgers finished the season ranked seventh in both the U.S. College Hockey Online Poll and the USA Today/American Hockey Magazine Poll. After beginning the season ranked 10th in the USCHO Poll, the Badgers climbed as high as fifth after wins over eventual national champion Minnesota-Duluth and NCAA Frozen Four participant Harvard. The Badgers also finished the season ranked seventh in both the RPI and pairwise rankings computed by U.S. College Hockey Online.

FIRST THINGS FIRST: The Badgers scored the first goal in 24 of their 35 games this season and were 18-4-2 in those games. Meghan Hunter led with seven game-opening goals.

BIG WINS: The 2000-01 Badgers earned the program's first win over a ranked opponent in the third game of the season and ended up defeating three more ranked opponents as the season progressed. The first came against eventual national champion Minnesota-Duluth on the road. The Bulldogs were ranked No. 3 at the time before the Badgers claimed a 4-2 win on Oct. 20. Wisconsin followed the win with one over then-No. 5 and Frozen Four participant Harvard on Nov. 4, 3-1. Wisconsin would also down then-No. 9 Providence and then-No. 3 Minnesota. The Badgers also earned three ties against ranked foes including two against then-No. 2 Minnesota-Duluth and another against then-No. 3 Minnesota.

MEET PATTY KAZMAIER: Freshman Meghan Hunter became the first Wisconsin Badger to earn consideration for The Patty Kazmaier Award. The award is given to the top women's collegiate hockey player in the country. Hunter was one of the 10 finalists named for the award. Harvard junior Jennifer Botterill was the winner.

ALL-AMERICANS: Two Wisconsin Badgers were selected to the Jofa/AHCA All-American team, the first Badgers to be selected. Both freshman Meghan Hunter and sophomore defenseman Kerry Weiland made the second team. Wisconsin had more selections than any other WCHA team and tied with Harvard, Northeastern and St. Lawrence for the most selections in the country.

NATION'S BEST: Freshman center Meghan Hunter finished the season tied for the national scoring lead with 78 points. She recorded 42 goals and 36 assists, also tying for the lead in goal-scoring. Hunter led the nation with five hat tricks and 33 power-play points.

Sophomore Kerry Weiland also led the country in scoring among defenseman with 49 points on 12 goals and 37 assists. Her 37 assists were tops in the WCHA among all players.

ALL-WCHA: The awards for the 2000-01 WCHA season were doled out on March 7 at the annual awards banquet prior to the WCHA Women's Championship. Seven Badgers were honored at the festivities.

Chosen First-Team All-WCHA were freshman forward Meghan Hunter and sophomore defenseman Kerry Weiland. Hunter was also honored as the WCHA Rookie of the Year.

Named to the WCHA All-Academic Team were Gretchen Anderson, Kendra Antony, Julia Ortenzio, Melanie Schmitt,

Michelle Sikich and Kerry Weiland. Each had at least a 3.0 grade-point average in their last two semesters, had completed at least a year of school at Wisconsin before the start of the 2000-01 season and had competed in at least 50 percent of the Badgers' games this season.

WCHA ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAM: Two Badgers were named to the WCHA All-Tournament following the WCHA Women's Championship. Meghan Hunter (Oil Springs, Ont.), who led the Badgers with four goals, three assists and seven points, was selected as one of the three forwards. Defenseman Sis Paulsen (Eau Claire, Wis.) was chosen as one of the two defensemen after recording a goal and five assists and six total points for the championship.

PLAYERS-OF-THE-WEEK: The Badgers were recognized five times during the season by the WCHA for outstanding individual performances. Meghan Hunter earned player of the week honors twice (10/30, 11/20) and was once named the league rookie of the week (11/13). Steph Millar earned rookie of the week for Dec. 11 while Kerry Weiland was league player of the week for Feb. 18.

U.S. College Hockey Online also recognized two Badgers for their performances during the season. Goaltender Jackie MacMillan was chosen defensive player of the week, Feb. 6, while Kerry Weiland earned a similar distinction, Feb. 21.

TEAM HONORS: With the team banquet, seven Badgers were honored for their athletics, academics and community service during the 2000-01 season. Meghan Hunter was named rookie of the year, while linemate Kendra Antony earned the team's offensive player of the year award. Kerry Weiland earned the team's defensive player of the year distinction. Jen Mead won the Badger Award for sportsmanship and dedication. Sis Paulsen and Kathryn Greaves were each chosen as recipients of the first National W Club Community Service Award. The award will be given to a player from each varsity sport for community involvement. The student-athlete of the year was Melanie Schmitt.

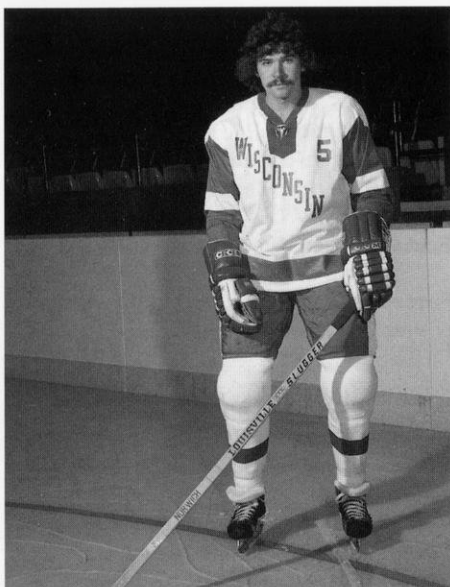

UW-Hockey Highlights



Craig Norwich was a member of Wisconsin's 1977 NCAA Championship team. Norwich led all Badgers with 83 points that season from the blue line. He is still the career defense scoring leader with 42 goals.

● NCAA Championships

In winning five NCAA Championships, the Wisconsin men's ice hockey program has proved itself to be one of the elite in college hockey. The UW ranks third in the collegiate hockey community along with Denver for most national titles. The Badgers won their first national crown in 1973 and followed with titles in 1977, 1981, 1983 and 1990.

● NCAA Appearances

The Badgers have appeared in 19 NCAA Championships and have been in the NCAA Frozen Four 10 times. In its first national championship appearance in 1970, Wisconsin finished third at the NCAA Championship.

● All-Americans

Badger players have earned 33 all-American honors since 1970, the most of any school in the WCHA. John Jagger was the first all-American at UW, earning the honor in 1970. Three players in Wisconsin history have two first-team all-America accolades in Craig Norwich, Mike Eaves and Mark Johnson.

● Attendance Leaders

Fans of Wisconsin ice hockey continually show their support in mass. The Badgers have led the nation in attendance for nearly 25 years averaging close to 8,500 spectators per game at the Dane County Coliseum. That average has skyrocketed the past four seasons as the men made the move to the Kohl Center, which seats 15,237 people for hockey.

● Legendary Coaches

Wisconsin men's ice hockey has been fortunate enough to have two legendary coaches in its ranks.

Bob Johnson coached at Wisconsin for 15 years and compiled a 367-175-23 record. He is the winningest coach in UW history with a .670 winning percentage. Johnson also coached the 1976 U.S. Olympic Team in Innsbruck, Austria, as well as coaching the 1973, 1974, 1975 and 1981 U.S. National Teams. In honor of his lifelong service to hockey, USA Hockey has dedicated "Bob Johnson Drive" in Colorado Springs.

Jeff Sauer, the current coach of the Badger men's team, is considered by many in the hockey community to be one of the greatest mentors of all time. Sauer is the winningest coach in WCHA history with 639 career wins and ranks fifth on the NCAA's all-time win list. Sauer, in his 31st year as a collegiate coach and 20th with UW, has guided his team's to a pair of NCAA titles (1983, 1990), 12 NCAA appearances, two WCHA titles in 1990 and 2000, and five WCHA Playoff Titles.

● Badgers in the Pros

The Badgers have had 30 players go on to play in the National Hockey League, and 11 that are currently on a NHL roster. Chris Chelios, one of the most notable former Badgers, has had great success in the NHL as a nine-time All-Star and three-time Norris Trophy Winner. Curtis Joseph is one of the NHL's top goaltenders. He guided the Edmonton Oilers into the Stanley Cup playoffs in 1997-98.

● Olympians

Wisconsin has had 18 of its players have the highest distinction of representing their country in Olympic play since 1976. Bob Lundeen was one of the first UW Olympians, playing on the 1976 US team. ● Women's History

On April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program. Ice Hockey, brand new to the athletic department, already had a longstanding history at the UW.

A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for over 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women: Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz, the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice throughout the years.

The three founders of the club organized a women's scrimmage hour at 10:15 p.m., on Sunday nights at the new campus skating rink dubbed "The Shell." The trio put up signs throughout campus and recruited players by word of mouth. In the spring of 1975, once they had enough "regulars", they applied for Club Sport status through the UW's Recreation Sports division. During the early years, they recruited players by putting up tables during spring and fall registration. In 1976, the group scheduled its first competitive game against the University of Minnesota club team.

By 1981, the number of club members had reach such a height that the club split into two separate squads. The following year, the club became a charter member of the Minnesota Women's Hockey

Association, now called the Minnesota Girls' and Women's Hockey Association.

One important source on campus provided the critical encouragement and support to the club: men's head coach Bob Johnson. Johnson was instrumental in getting the club interviewed during radio broadcasts of the men's games. With his support, they also arranged to play some games at the Dane Country Coliseum immediately after the men's team played.

A concerted effort led to a second club expansion for the 1992-93 season. The club split into three teams after putting up posters, having a description of the team in a university recreational sports pamphlet and sitting at tables during annual sports recruiting days at the union each fall.

In 1991, Prior to the expansion, pee-wee girls from throughout Madison then skating with boys' teams. All that changed when a new team of girls formed, the Wisconsin Challengers. Members of the UW Club assisted in the formation of the new organization in an effort to generate more interest in hockey in young girls of

Madison. The team soon formed a midget squad as well.

Interest continues to explode each season and the Wisconsin Recreation Department now sponsors three club teams. The A team travels throughout the Midwest competing against other club programs. The current club teams, A, B, and C, continue to play even with the establishment of the varsity program. In fact, three members of the Badgers' inaugural team made the squad from the ranks of the UW Club.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998 when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media. A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years.

The Badgers officially opened its history on October 8, 1999 when 3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota-Duluth at the Kohl Center. With Olympic Gold Medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Governor Tommy Thompson in attendance, and the game televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television, the Badgers finally hit the ice.

The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey.

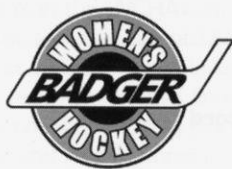

● WCHA History

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, or WCHA, is the oldest of the Division I college hockey leagues recognized by the NCAA. It was formed in 1959 as an outgrowth of two earlier western college associations, the Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League and the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League.

The Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League, the first version of the WCHA, was founded in 1951 by Colorado College, Denver, Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech, Minnesota and North Dakota. The league changed its name to the WIHL in 1953 to better reflect the location of its members.

Throughout the 1950s, the WIHL was very successful in winning NCAA championships. Except for 1949 and 1954, all of the NCAA crowns were won by the WIHL teams. Michigan alone won six titles.

There was no conference play during the 1958-59 season, but the league began play again in 1959 with the WCHA moniker.

In 1966, Minnesota-Duluth became the first team to be added to the league, followed by the addition of Wisconsin in 1969 and Notre Dame in 1971.

WCHA members captured most of the national hockey championships during the 1960s and 1970s. Except for 1967, 1971-72 and 1978, the national champion trophy remained in the display case of a WCHA team.

In 1981, Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech and Notre Dame resigned and joined the more compact Central Collegiate Hockey Association. In 1984, the WCHA reclaimed Michigan Tech and welcomed Northern Michigan from the CCHA.

The 1986-87 season saw the University of North Dakota win the NCAA title. In 1989-90, the Wisconsin Badgers put the WCHA back on top by sweeping to the WCHA and NCAA Championships with a 36-9-1 record.

With the 1990-91 campaign, the league added a new member in St. Cloud State. In 1992, the membership voted to accept the University of Alaska Anchorage as a full-time member beginning with the 1993-94 season.

After ten distinguished years as the guiding force behind the success of the WCHA, Otto Breitenbach retired as commissioner. At the end of the 1993-94 season. Named as his successor was Bruce McLeod, a major contributor to the league

over the years, and a former UMD Bulldog hockey player.

North Dakota won the 1996-97 national championship for the WCHA with a 6-4 win over Boston University in Milwaukee. The championships gave the conference its 30th national team championship.

Following the 1996-97 season, Northern Michigan left the WCHA to rejoin the CCHA. Minnesota State University, Mankato filled the void beginning with the 1999-2000 season. The same season, North Dakota won the national title with a 4-2 win over Boston College in Providence, R.I.

The 1999-2000 season also marked the first year for the WCHA-Women's League. Bemidji State, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth, MSU-Mankato, Ohio State, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin made up the charter membership. Sara Martin was hired in June of 1999 to serve the league as the Associate Commissioner. Martin, who earned college degrees from Wisconsin and MSU, Mankato, served the WCHA as tournament director for the 1994, 1996 and 1998 WCHA Final Five Playoff Championship, and was tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Div. I Men's Ice Hockey Championship.

The women's league has quickly established itself as a force, sending two teams to the four-team national championship in its first season and having conference runner-up Minnesota take home the national title. League-member Minnesota-Duluth won the inaugural NCAA Frozen Four Championship last year and met President George W. Bush at the White House to help celebrate.

Facilities

The Badgers will take advantage of the state-of-the-art Kohl Center during the 2000-01 season with three home series at the 15,237-seat arena. The second largest college-owned facility in the country, the building is named after U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history.

The \$76.4 million building contains an ice surface 200 feet long by 100 feet wide. The arena is also used for men's hockey, and men's and women's basketball, as well as concerts and other special events. Artists such as the Backstreet Boys, Shania Twain, Matchbox 20, The Dave Matthews Band and Elton John among others have graced the Kohl Center stage.

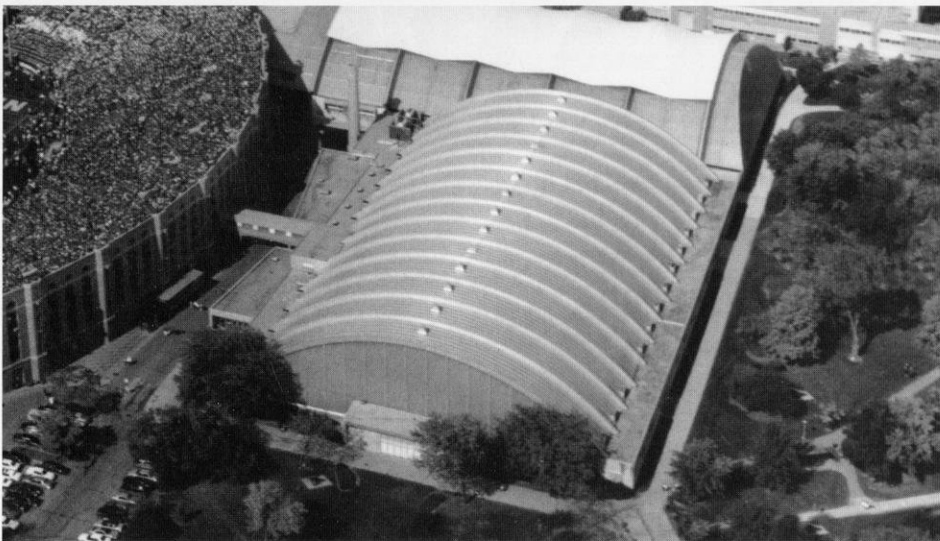
The facility also includes the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion and plaza, built primarily from a \$10 million pledge from former all-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas. The pavilion houses three full-sized basketball courts and is used by the two basketball teams for practice sessions when the Kohl Center is booked for other events.

The Badgers will also play home games at Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, Wis., just west of Madison. The 1,300-seat arena provides a more intimate setting for the Badger women. Located at 2615 Evergreen Road, the rink opened in late 1999 when the Badger played host to then-No. 1 Harvard.

Wisconsin does most of its practicing at The Shell located adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium on campus. Construction is expected to begin during the 2000-01 season on a new locker in conjunction with an expanded Wisconsin Wall of Fame on the south side of The Shell.

● A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW–Madison covers 933 acres along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the Capitol, traveling down historic State Street, Bascom Hall serves as a centerpiece to campus. It sits atop the beautiful tree-lined Bascom Hill, which offers a magnificent view of downtown Madison. The city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison’s lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum enhance UW–Madison’s reputation for scenic beauty.

Points of interest on campus include a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln on Bascom Hill; North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula of woods, trails and beaches that juts out into Lake Mendota; and Science Hall and the Armory-Gymnasium, both of which are National Historic Landmarks.

A favorite area for UW students to gather is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Madison’s largest lake, Mendota.

Camp Randall Stadium is the place to be on a Saturday afternoon, especially during the infamous Fifth Quarter after a football game when the band entertains. The newly opened Kohl Center is home to the UW men’s and women’s basketball and men’s ice hockey teams as well as a regular concert stop.

● The Student Body

More than 41,000 students populate the UW campus, including more than 10,900 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation’s most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 102 foreign countries. UW–Madison ranks ninth in the nation for total international student enrollment.

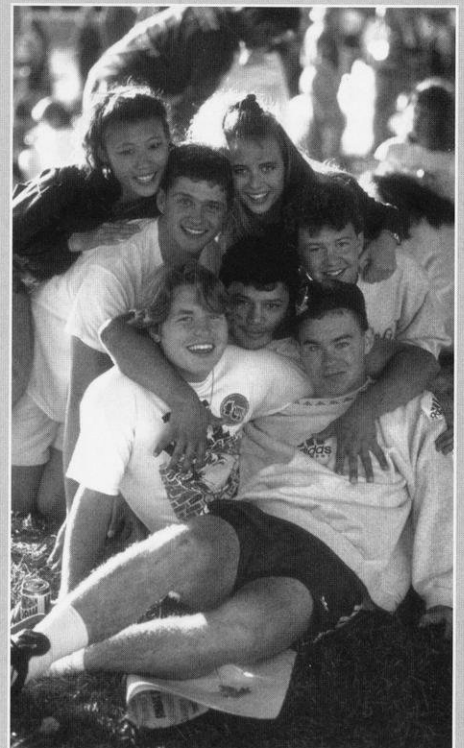

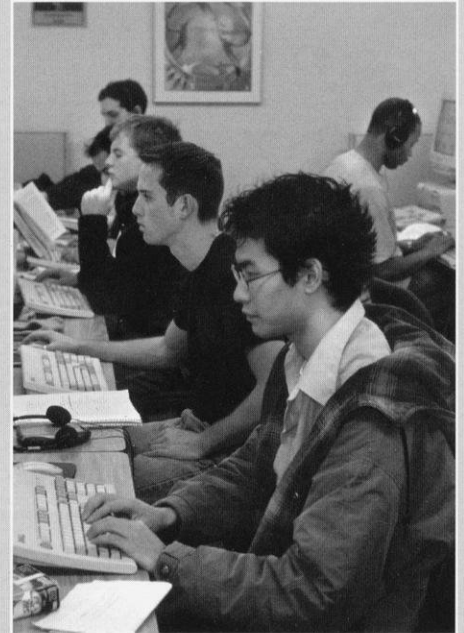

Funding & Support

▶ **Federal Grants:** In 2000, UW-Madison received more than \$331 million in federal awards.

▶ **Research and Development Funds:** UW-Madison ranked fifth in the country for research and development expenditures in 2000, with \$566 million, according to the National Science Foundation.

▶ **Tuition:** Over the last 10 years, tuition for undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for Big Ten schools, ranking second-lowest for resident tuition and third-lowest nonresident tuition among the public institutions.

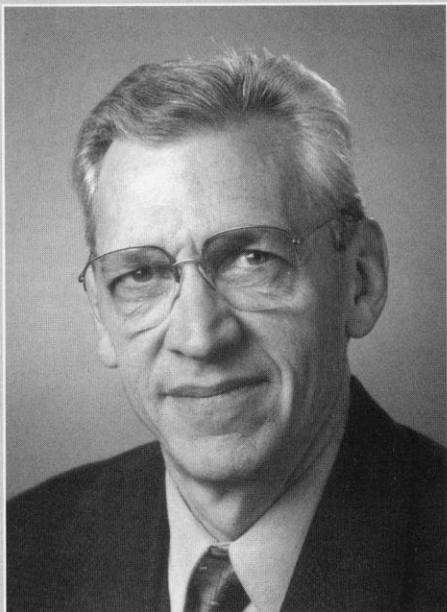

John Wiley was named chancellor of Wisconsin in January 2001 becoming the university's 27th leader.

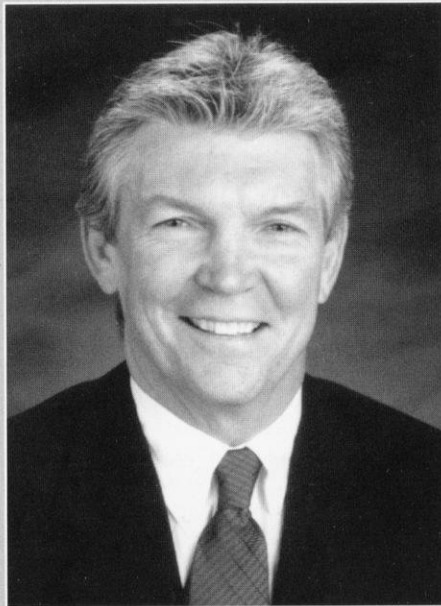
Prior to being named chancellor, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He was also the dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

Wiley joined the Wisconsin faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. He was the co-founder of several highly successful research centers.



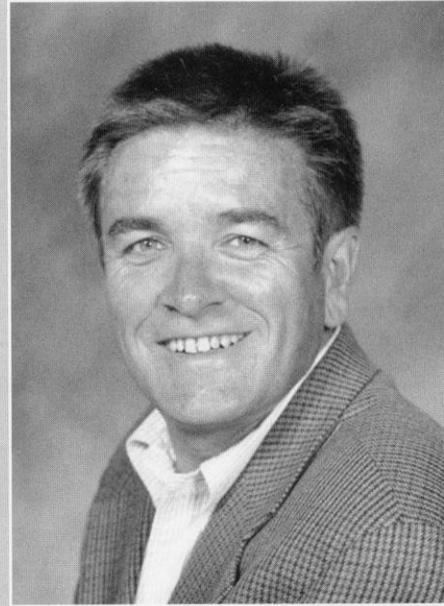
● Pat Richter

He received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., becoming vice president of personnel prior to moving to the athletic department.



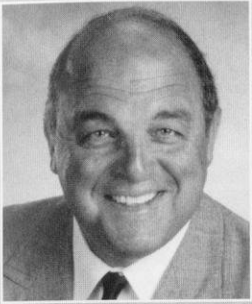

David McDonald, the former chair of the UW Athletic Board, is in his first year as the Special Assistant to the Chancellor for Athletics.

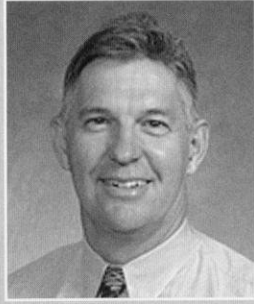
McDonald, a professor in the History department, was a member of the board since 1994 and chaired the personnel committee for one year.

A native of Saskatchewan, Canada, McDonald earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Toronto. He received his Ph.D. from Columbia University.



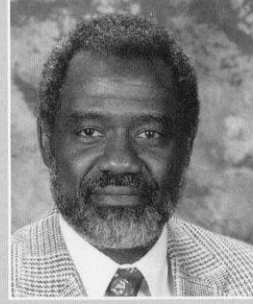

Wisconsin Athletics—A Winning Program

The University of Wisconsin—Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

Celebrating over 100 years of competition in some men's sports, Wisconsin's men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 12-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, ice hockey, lightweight rowing, openweight rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

● One of the Nation's Best

In the last six years, Wisconsin has ranked among the top 35 NCAA Division I programs in the nation. In 2000-01, the UW ranked 19th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best college sports programs in the country.



The Wisconsin men's and women's cross country teams both won the Big Ten Conference Championship on their home course in 2000. The women won a record-tying sixth consecutive title while the men's team won its second consecutive championship.

Seventeen of Wisconsin's 23 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships in 2000-01. The volleyball team finished second at the NCAA Championship while the men's cross country team was fifth. The wrestling team finished 10th as Donny Pritzlaff won his second consecutive individual title at 165 pounds.

Qualifying for post-season competition as teams or individuals were men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, women's golf, men's hockey, men's and women's rowing, women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's track and field, volleyball and wrestling.



The Wisconsin men's rowing team won the Ten Eyck Trophy, which signifies overall program excellence at the Intercollegiate Rowing Championship, for the second consecutive year.

The University of Wisconsin regained its title as the No. 1 overall athletic program in the Big Ten Conference in 2000-01. The Badgers lead the league's all-sports standings last season after finishing third in 1999-2000. Wisconsin has finished first three times and second five times since 1990-91.

The Wisconsin volleyball team won the 2000 Big Ten Championship and finished second in the NCAA Tournament.

The Badgers crowned five Big Ten team champions in men's and women's cross country, men's indoor and outdoor track, and volleyball. The women harriers won a record-tying sixth consecutive title while the men's harriers won their second consecutive title. The Badger men's track and cross country teams won the Big Ten "Triple Crown", conference titles in all three running sports, for the second consecutive year and for the fifth time in the last seven years.

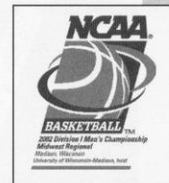
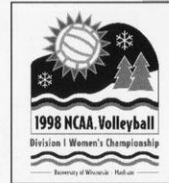
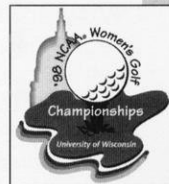
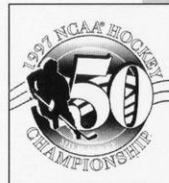
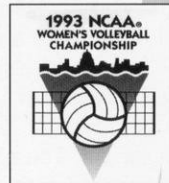
In the last eight years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell-out in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television showcasing University Ridge.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament will come to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers play host to a regional in the Kohl Center.



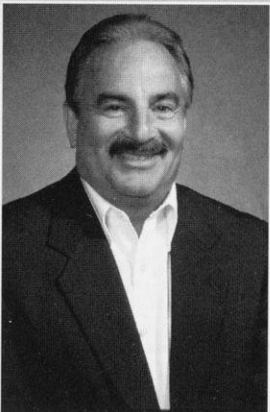
Academic & Student Services

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. University of Wisconsin athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director Alan Zussman supervises a staff of five advisors and three learning specialists which conduct the program offered to the nearly 750 student-athletes. The advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Thomas Browne, Chris Butler, and Jerry Darda along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt, Mary Ellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas, have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

● Fetzer Student-Athlete Center

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is the newest aid to Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The Center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of

different shapes and sizes including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 40 PC's while the entire Center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.



Endowed Athletic Scholarships

As more and more colleges and universities turn to innovative and effective ways of meeting the mounting financial challenges of supporting their intercollegiate athletic programs, it becomes increasingly evident that one of the most successful strategies is the establishment of endowed athletic scholarships.

At the University of Wisconsin-Madison, endowment funds to support athletic scholarships are normally created through gifts to the UW Foundation. A portion of the income from the endowed fund is used each year for scholarship support, and the remainder is reinvested in the principal.

Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of 11 full-time and two graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jan Helwig, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Heidi Stettler, Laura Walluk, and Ian Woods utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nations finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director

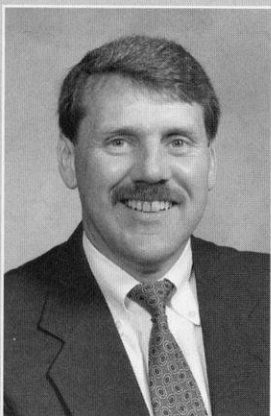
Dr. Ben Graf is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician Dr. John Orwin while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength & Conditioning

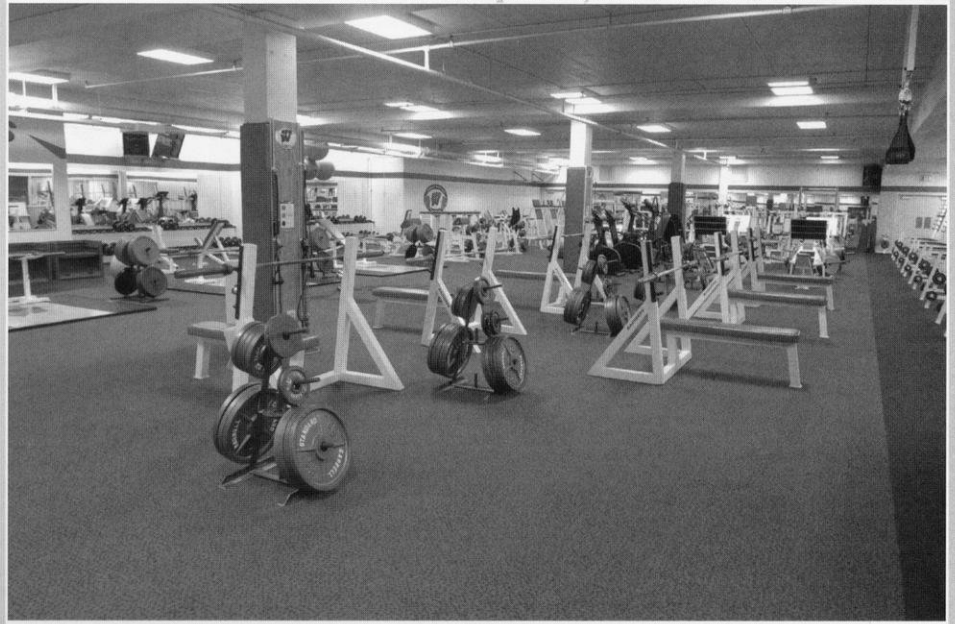
The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component of all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Head strength and conditioning coach John Dettman along with assistant coaches Brian Bott, Ryan Feek, Paul Goodman, Scott Hettenbach and Andrea Tyndall work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athletes' performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight room located in the McClain Center, Camp Randall Stadium and Kohl Center.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features over 45,000 pounds of free weights and over 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Badger Den is comprised of purely free weight equipment. There are five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull up station and a station to do dips. There is also three lat

pull machines as well as seated row machines. The Stadium weight room also has a complete set of dumbbells from five pounds up to 85 pounds. There is also a set of plyometric boxes for plyometrics as well as for alternative leg exercises.

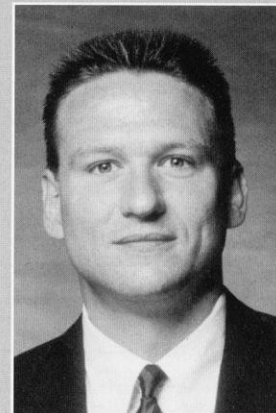

The McClain Athletic Facility features a 90-yard indoor practice field with newly resurfaced artificial turf. The lower level houses the Fetzer Student Academic Center, the headquarters of the Badgers' Sports Medicine staff, a fully-equipped weight room and locker rooms for football, track, softball, and soccer.



Camp Randall Stadium is the home of the football Badgers and has a seating capacity of 76,634. The stadium will be renovated beginning in 2001, increasing seating and adding an athletic department office building.



The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell, which seats 2,500 fans, features a 200-meter Martin rubber track with throwing and jumping areas in the infield.

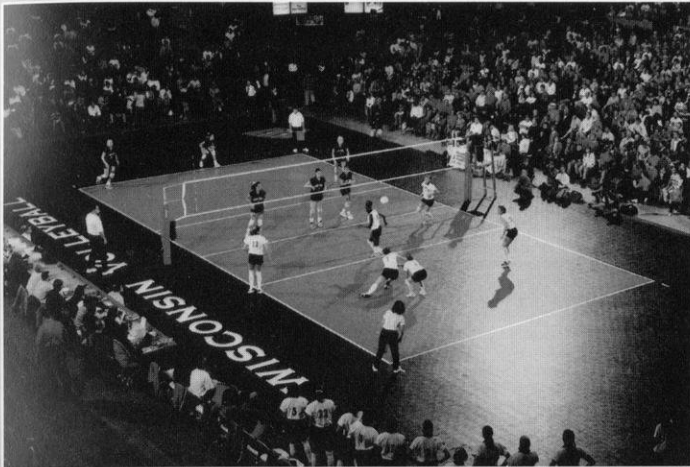


The Goodman Brothers Softball Complex has an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 220 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet. The facility includes dugouts, locker areas, players' lounge, grandstand seating for 1,600 and media facilities.



The Kohl Center is the home of the Badger basketball and hockey teams. One of the finest on-campus athletic facilities in the nation, the \$76 million facility includes a separate practice gym, locker rooms and lounge areas, and coaches' offices.





The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 10,600, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger volleyball team as well as the competitive facility for the wrestling squad.



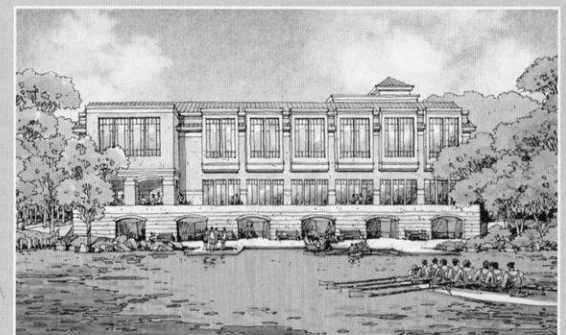
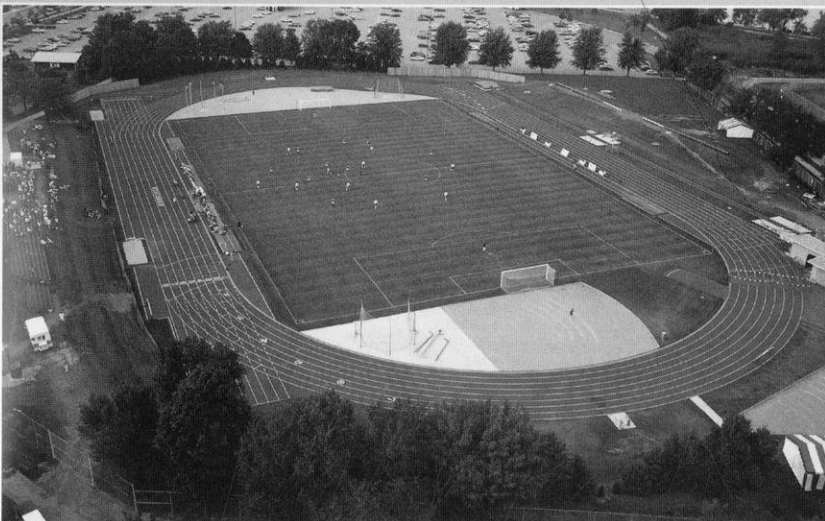
Nielsen Tennis Stadium is the year-round home of the Badger tennis teams. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators.



The swimming and diving teams have two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The “Nat” contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF (pictured above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.



University Ridge, one of the finest golf courses in the Midwest, features a par-72, 18-hole course, 15,000-square foot practice green and a 5,000-square foot chipping green.

Wisconsin Traditions

● Badger Nickname

The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather by an association with lead miners in the 1820's. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

● Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original live badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot would be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal of Plymouth, Wis., was directed

by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from the school song, "On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW gridiron heroes to "buck right through that line."

● Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. Just by accident, we had this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"

● Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.



Badger fans are known throughout the nation for their support of Wisconsin teams both at home and on the road.

● On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

● Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.
