FOOTBALL SCHEDULE

COVERING THE BADGERS

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER: Wisconsin's working facilities for press-radio-television are located on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium and can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6.

WORKING TICKETS: All Requests for Communications Center tickets must be placed with the Sports Information Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at the ground level entrance at Gate 6, Section E. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

RADIO: Each station admitted for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets. Booths are assigned and tickets mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Field passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV level, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30-yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

PARKING: A limited number parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 are available to working people only. They will be issued as requested.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS: Player interviews will be held in the "W" Club Annex following practice as prearranged with the Sports Information Office. There will be no player interviews allowed on Thursdays and Fridays.

Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches. All post-game interviews will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

COACHES INTERVIEWS: Dave McClain will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach McClain will be conducted in the Media Interview Room.

The Media Interview Room on game days is the Wisconsin Weight Training Room directly below the Wisconsin Dressing Room.

Best time to interview Coach McClain is from 2:30-3:15 Thursdays, or 2:00 to 3:00 Fridays before home games, or after practice each day.

YOUR HOSTS in Camp Randall Stadium and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, and **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club. He was named to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1979.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons — **William 18**, **David 15**, and **Eric 13**.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.


He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.



1980 WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Wisconsin football coach **Dave McClain** experienced trying times during the 1979 season, including the tragic death of two of his players and injuries to his top two quarterbacks. The Badgers struggled to a 4-7 overall record, including a 3-5 Big Ten mark. McClain's two-year totals at Wisconsin stand at 9-11-2 overall and 6-9-2 in Big Ten play.

McClain was forced to turn to his freshman crop last year, as a total of ten freshmen started at least one game last year. Two junior college transfers also started and two freshman kickers shared in the placekicking duties. The performance of these freshmen continually reinforced the superiority of McClain's recruiting ability.

Of the 38 returning lettermen for 1980 (20 offensively and 18 defensively), 15 were freshmen last year, while ten others were sophomores. Six starters from both the offense and defense are back, and they, along with the remaining underclassmen will form the nucleus of the 1980 Badger squad. There are currently 25 seniors on the Badger roster, but just thirteen of them have lettered and many have not seen much, if any varsity action.

The Badger offense in 1979 was a puzzle to McClain, as they were shut out on three occasions, but scored more than half their season points in three others. The major problem was finding a quarterback that could stay healthy. McClain used four last year, three of which returned for 1980.

Headlining the position is junior **John Josten**, who broke his ankle in the first game of 1979 and missed the rest of the season. Josten, who has three years of eligibility left, started four of the first five games as a freshman before being injured, missing the rest of the season.

Battling Josten is senior **Steve Parish**, who started five games last year before going down with a knee injury. Parish completed 57 percent of his passes and rushed for 145 yards. Senior **Kevin Motl** also saw some action starting at San Diego State.

The running back position is solid for McClain, with five lettermen returning.

All-Big Ten fullback **Dave Mohapp** leads the list of returnees. Mohapp rushed for 603 yards and was one of the best blocking backs in the league a year ago. Mohapp was also the fourth leading receiver with 12 catches for 119 yards. A hard-driving runner, Mohapp has been thrown for losses just three times in over 150 rushing attempts.

Backing up Mohapp is sophomore **Gerald Green**, whose 308 yards last year ranked third on the team. The 6-3, 240 pound Green has the speed and agility of a tailback. Like Mohapp, he rarely gets trapped behind the line of scrimmage, with just two tackles for loss in 66 carries.

At tailback McClain has the luxury of choosing between three sophomore speedsters, **Troy King**, **Chuck Davis** and **John Williams**. Davis was the second leading rusher with 407 yards last fall, while King and Williams had 96 and 56 yards respectively in limited action. Davis had a tremendous start as a freshman before being slowed by nagging injuries, while King had a good spring performance. Williams had the longest run by a Badger last year, a 40 yard touchdown scamper on his first play from scrimmage. He averaged 9.3 yards per carry on the season.

Replacing flanker **Tom Stauss**, the 1979 MVP, who was first in receiving and fourth in rushing, will be difficult for McClain. Probably the hardest worker on the team, Stauss played every backfield position during his Badger career. Heir-apparent to the flanker spot is another sophomore speedster, **Marvin Neal**. Although only catching 3 passes for 40 yards, he

rushed for 112 yards on 14 carries. He also returned 24 kickoffs for 494 yards, putting his name into the Badger record book in two categories.

Split end **Tim Stracka**, a junior this fall, will be the Badgers' top deep threat. Stracka caught 25 passes last year, second only to Stauss, and is the most experienced member of the Badger receiving corps. A host of Badgers will compete for the starting tight end spot, with senior **Joe Ruetz** and junior **Greg Rabas** the top two candidates. Ruetz has just three receptions in his career, while Rabas is in his first season with the Badgers.

The Badgers are not deep in the offensive line. Senior center **Joe Rothbauer** heads up a line that includes a sophomore and two juniors. Only left tackle **Jerry Doerger** has much experience, starting every game last fall and playing in seven games as a freshman. Sophomore **Bob Winckler** earned a starting berth last year and is the biggest man in the Badger line at 270. Other leading candidates includes guards **Leo Joyce** and **Pete Severson** and tackles **Steve Namnick** and **Ron Versnik**.

Wisconsin ranked seventh in the Big Ten offensively with 330.9 yards per game. The Badgers ranked fifth in rushing and sixth in passing last year.

Defensively the Badgers ranked ninth, yielding 416.5 yards per contest. The rushing defense was also ninth, as opponents averaged 241.6 yards per contest on the ground.

The Badger defense in 1979 was one of the youngest in the conference, as five freshmen started at one point during the year. As was the case a year ago, the Badgers have some big shoes to fill with the departure of **Tom Schremp**, **Kasey Cabral**, **Dennis Christenson**, **Terry Stroede**, **George Welch** and **Mickey Casey**.

Senior all-American candidate **Dave Ahrens**, a three-year starter, leads the Badger defense that again will be young in 1980. Linebacker **Dave Levenick** and cornerback **Ross Anderson** are the only other seniors slated to see much action in 1980. Ahrens has twice been named the **SPORTS ILLUSTRATED** "Player of the Week" in the past two years, and his 206 career tackles lead all returnees.

Junior linebacker **Larry Spurlin** was one of the few bright spots a year ago. He stepped into a starting role and made a team high 118 tackles last year. He, along with Levenick, Ahrens and junior **Guy Boliaux**, give the Badgers a fine set of experienced linebackers.

Sophomores **Tim Krumrie** and **Tom Booker** head the defensive line. Krumrie had 95 tackles in starting every game last year, while Booker

played behind **Tom Schremp**. Other leading candidates in the line include sophomores **Mike Herrington** and **Mark Subach**, junior **Mark Shumate** and senior **Tom Houston**, who sat out last year.

The Badgers also have a young, but experienced set of defensive backs. Anderson is the only senior, while sophomores **Clint Sims** and **David Greenwood**, along with juniors **Vaughn Thomas** and **Dan Messenger** make up the probable list of starters. Greenwood received honorable mention all-conference honors as a freshman with 65 tackles, as well as ranking fourth in the conference in punting. Sims, Messenger and Thomas all started at one point last year and saw extensive action. **Mathew Vanden Boom** and **Curtis Richardson** have been switched from offense to help shore up the secondary.

Wisconsin's kicking game is headed by sophomore **David Greenwood** who ranked fourth in Big Ten punting with a 40.1 yards per kick average in 1979. He averaged 40.5 yards for the season, including an 82 yarder against Air Force, one of the longest ever seen in Camp Randall.

Steve Veith, who reached the 100 point plateau in kick scoring in his career has completed his eligibility. Sophomore **Pat Hady**, a walk-on letterwinner in 1979, handled the kickoff assignment and with consistency, could take over as the PAT-field goal kicker in 1980.

The trio of Neal, King and Davis averaged nearly 20 yards per kickoff return between them, giving the Badgers a quick, experienced return squad. Tom Stauss did most of the punt returning and a replacement will need to be found for those duties.

The Badgers face another rough schedule in 1980. They will face six teams with winning records in 1979 (three others finished one game below .500) and only Northwestern failed to win more than 40 percent of their games. Five Badger foes made bowl appearances following the 1979 season and had a combined 48-12 record last fall.

The Badgers open up at home against Big Ten title contender Purdue and non-conference foe Brigham Young before making their first road trip. Teams travelling to Camp Randall include San Diego State, Ohio State, Michigan and Minnesota. On the road the Badgers will face UCLA, Indiana, Michigan State, Iowa and Northwestern.

1979 saw Badger fans set a new record for six home games with an average of 73,979 fans per contest. The attractive 1980 home schedule, pitting the Badgers against foes with a combined 52-17-1 record, jeopardizes that record as the Badgers enter their 85th Big Ten football season.

THE HEAD COACH—DAVE McCLAIN

Dave McClain became the 24th head coach at the University of Wisconsin on December 16, 1977, replacing John Jardine.

The 42 year-old McClain, a native of Upper Sandusky, Ohio and a 1960 graduate of Bowling Green University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education, came to Wisconsin from a highly successful coaching stint at Ball State where he posted an overall 46-25-3 record.

In his first season with the Badgers, he became the first coach since Ivan Williamson in 1949 to post a winning mark as a rookie coach. He led the Badgers to a 5-4-2 season, including a 3-4-2 Big Ten mark—good for 6th place in the final league standings.

McClain played football at Upper Sandusky High School and Bowling Green University, where his teams went 45-5-4. McClain played both quarterback and safety while at Bowling Green.

He started his coaching career at Crestline, Ohio, High School with an 8-1 record and then returned to Bowling Green as a graduate assistant in 1961, where he served as freshman offensive coach and earned his master's degree in Education.

He then served as an assistant coach at Cornell University under Tom Harp in 1962; at Miami (Ohio) University under Glenn E. "Bo" Schembechler from 1963 to 1966; at the University of Kansas under Pepper Rodgers in 1967 and 1968; and at the Ohio State University under W.W. "Woody" Hayes in 1969 and 1970 before accepting the head coaching job at Ball State.

He coached seven seasons at Ball State, with only his first one a loser at 4-5-1. He was named Mid-American Conference "Coach of the Year" in 1975 after a 9-2 season. His three year MAC record of 13-4 included the conference title in 1976.

His first Badger squad opened with 4 straight wins and finished at 5-4-2—good for the team's first winning record since 1974. His 1979 squad posted a 4-7 overall mark, including a 3-5 Big Ten record.

Dave and his wife, the former Judy Perry, have three children—son Tom 14; and daughters Mindy 12 and Marcy 10.

BILL DUDLEY, Quarterbacks and Receivers; Offensive Coordinator





BOB PALCIC, Tight Ends and Tackles

Bob Palcic, 32, came to Wisconsin with coach Dave McClain and has coached the tight ends and tackles for the past two seasons. He had rejoined McClain's staff at Ball

State in 1976 to serve as offensive line coach after spending the previous two seasons at the University of Dayton.

He was a graduate assistant at Ball State in 1973 following two years as an assistant coach at Carroll High School in Dayton.

Bob is a 1971 graduate of the University of Dayton, where he was a three-year defensive starter and co-captain of the school's 1970 football squad. He was the recipient of the school's Zulli Trophy, which is awarded to the outstanding senior exemplifying leadership, sportsmanship, and character.

After his collegiate football career, **Bob** received a bonus to sign a contract with Toronto of the Canadian Football League, but was stricken with mononucleosis. The next year, he signed with Ottawa of the CFL.

The Detroit, Michigan native lettered four years in football and twice in basketball at St. Agatha High School in the Motor City before graduating in 1962.



Doug and his wife, **Faye**, have two sons, **Joseph 6**, and **Jerome 3**.









A native of Chicago, **Mike** earned three letters while competing at St. Laurence High School.





The Wausau native came back to Wisconsin — where he gained collegiate fame as a star sophomore running back in leading the Badgers to a No. 3 ranking during the 1942 football season — from the Los Angeles Rams on February 28, 1969.

His original appointment as athletic director slated to end in 1979, was first extended in 1974 by the school's athletic board through June 30, 1984, and again in April, 1979 through June 30, 1988 by Chancellor Irving Shain upon recommendation of the Athletic Board.

Emeritus Professor Frederick W. Haberman, at that time Athletic Board Chairman, pointed out, "This extension is, of course, a mark of confidence by our university administration and by the Athletic Board.

"Mr. Hirsch has earned our support. His services to the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics and to the University in general are very valuable. Under his leadership we have never had a deficit budget, we have been phenomenally successful at the box office, we have received more private funds than ever before, we have upgraded the physical plant considerably, we have maintained competitive status in almost all our sports and we have been consistently free of scandal.

"He has presided over a program that is educationally responsible and fiscally efficient and has done so with dignity that befits a great university."

Chancellor Shain stated in a letter to Hirsch, "I am very pleased to take this present action. My own observations certainly support the opinion of the Athletic Board that you are one of the outstanding athletic directors, not only in the Big Ten, our 'home' conference, but also in the country at large. I am personally, as well as professionally, delighted to have you as a member of our university staff."

Hirsch commented, "I'm extremely pleased with the decision. It's just wonderful."

He said his major objectives for the decade ahead are, "coping with inflation and acquiring proper funding for women's athletics. My other ambition is to have Wisconsin in a football bowl game."



Following the 1942 season when the Badgers posted an 8-1-1 record, Elroy played at Michigan in 1943 as a Marine trainee, — football, basketball, track and baseball — to become the only athlete at Michigan ever to win an "M" in four sports in one season.

Elroy had an highly successful professional football career that started in 1946 as a half-back with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference. Later, he put in nine great seasons with the Los Angeles Rams as one of the all-time great ends.

He's been named to the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, (1965), to professional football's Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio (1968), to the National Football Hall of Fame in New York (1974), and to the Madison Sports Hall of Fame (1977).

He's also a member of the all-time NFL All-Star team for his play as end and flanker with the Los Angeles Rams that served to change the game from one of two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

Elroy and his wife, Ruth, have two children — son Win Stephen, Los Angeles, and daughter Patricia Caroline, a senior at Wisconsin.



He's a native Madisionian and is a 1941 graduate of Edgewood High School where he was a three-sport star.



The 42-year-old Florida native coached Wisconsin's receivers in 1974 and 1975 after coming from the University of Kansas where he had been an assistant coach since 1971.


Bob played collegiately at Florida A & M as a linebacker and defensive end under the tutelage of Jake Gaither.



Grants-In-Aid


LaVern Van Dyke is in his 32nd year as a member of the Wisconsin Athletic staff and serves as director of the Grants-In-Aid program.

TWO BADGER NUMBERS RETIRED

Two football jersey numbers have been retired in Wisconsin's football history. They are No. 80, worn by All-American end **Dave Schreiner** when he was an All-American end in 1941 and 1942; and No. 83, worn by quarterback **Allan J. Shafer** in 1944.

Schreiner was killed in action with the U. S. Marine Corps during the battle of Okinawa, June, 1945. Shafer was fatally injured in the second half of the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa football game and died shortly after Wisconsin had defeated the Hawkeyes 26-7 in Camp Randall Stadium, November 11, 1944.

CAMP RANDALL HISTORY

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 87 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U.S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the 1966 addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.

The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

There have been three enlargements to Camp Randall Stadium since the end of World War II. The first, in 1950 and 1951, saw the completion of the horseshoe at the north end of the stadium.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

The addition of the second deck on the west side of the stadium in 1966 added almost 13,000 prime viewing seats, including the modern Communications Center.

The current capacity of 77,280 makes Camp Randall Stadium the fifth largest college owned stadium in the United States—exceeded only by those at Michigan, Stanford, Ohio State and Tennessee.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 12,204 following renovation in 1976.





Ranking "distinguished" or strong in 26 of the 29 academic disciplines surveyed by the American Council on Education, with particular praise on the departments of chemical engineering, geography, Spanish, botany, history, bacteriology, and biochemistry.

Second nationally in number of doctorates awarded in the past four decades.

Third in providing federal executives holding doctorates, in total gifts received by state universities, and in contributions from business and corporations.

Fifth in number of full-time students, and seventh among alma maters of presidents serving the nation's largest corporations.

A recent national faculty survey ranked six University of Wisconsin-Madison departments among the top five in the nation and overall, ranked Wisconsin 8th nationally.

The survey, by the Chronicle on Higher Education, asked more than 4,000 faculty members of America's four-year colleges and universities to "name the five departments nationally in your discipline that have the most distinguished faculties."

Eighteen per cent of the faculty members responding said a UW-Madison department was among the top five in their field.

Six UW-Madison departments — Agriculture, Biological Sciences, Education, Foreign Languages, History, and Sociology — ranked among the top five nationally, while Chemistry, Economics, Engineering, Mathematics, and Statistics, Political Science, and Psychology were listed among the top ten nationally.

Excellence results from the continued financial support provided by the citizens of Wisconsin, and from the University's dedication to providing maximum educational opportunities for all state citizens, the acquisition of new knowledge through research, and the application of knowledge to the improvement and use of society.
