(President Werner had appointed Regent Kleczka to serve as a member of the Executive Committee for this meeting in place of Regent Rennebohm who was absent from the state.)

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Gifts and Grants -

1. That the following gifts and grants be accepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements:

GIFTS

- (a) \$ 300.00 The Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Florists! Association, for the establishment of a scholarship of \$150 per year for the 1952-53 and 1953-54 academic years. A scholarship shall be awarded to a student majoring in commercial floriculture in the Department of Horticulture by the Dean of the College of Agriculture through the Loans, Fellowships and Scholarships Committee upon recommendation of the Department of Horticulture. (Fund 15-574)
- (b) 112.00 Friends of Frankie T. Graber for the establishment of the "Frankie T. Graber Scholarship" in the College of

- (b) (Cont.) Agriculture. The selection of the student to receive the award shall be made by the Dean of the College of Agriculture through the Loans, Fellowships and Scholarships Committee of the College of Agriculture upon recommendation of the School of Home Economics. A first scholarship shall be awarded so that it may be paid beginning in September, 1954. Additional contributions may be made to this fund from time to time. (Fund 15-534)
- (c) 300.00 F. H. Peavey & Co., Minneapolis, Minnesota, for the establishment of the "F. H. Peavey & Co.-Van Dusen Harrington & Company Scholarship" during the 1953-54 academic year. A scholarship shall be awarded by the Loans, Fellowships and Scholarships Committee of the College of Agriculture to a junior student majoring in Animal Husbandry or Agronomy, who is in need of financial assistance and who has demonstrated a high degree of efficiency preferably in Animal Husbandry and secondarily in Agronomy to be used during the student's senior year. (Fund 15-551)
- (d) 500.00 University of Wisconsin Physical Education Alumnae Association to be added to the Blanche M. Trilling Scholarship Fund. (Trust Fund)
- (e) Standard Oil Company of California, San Francisco, California, for the continuation of a graduate fellowship in the Department of Chemical Engineering during the 1953-54 academic year. Funds will be provided in support of this fellowship as follows:
 - (a) A stipend of \$1500 for the fellow.
 - (b) Payment of incidental fees of \$75 per semester.
 - (c) Out-of-state tuition if the recipient of the fellowship is an out-of-state student.
 - (d) If fees and tuition are paid by the Veterans Administration, only a stipend of \$1500 will be provided and funds for (b) and (c) above will not be provided.
 - (e) If the recipient of the fellowship is a nonresident even though receiving "G.I." benefits, the donor will provide an amount equal to the non-resident tuition for unrestricted use in the Department of Chemical Engineering.

- (f) 2,000.00 Socony-Vacuum Laboratories, Paulsboro, New Jersey, for the continuation of a Socony-Vacuum Fellowship in Chemistry during the period July 1, 1953 through June 30, 1954. (Fund 15-717)

- (g) \$1,000.00 C. W. Tomlinson, Ardmore, Oklahoma, to be added to the principal account of the Charles R. Van Hise Research Fellowship in Geology. (Trust Fund)
- (h) 2,000.00 Visking Corporation, Chicago, Illinois, to renew a fellowship in the Department of Chemical Engineering during the period July 1, 1953 through June 30, 1954. \$1500 of the fellowship is to be given to the student in equal amounts over a twelve-month period. The balance may be used to cover the cost of fees, laboratory equipment, etc. (Fund 15-23)
- (i) 3,300.00 The Rockefeller Foundation, New York City, to support a playwright in residence to be associated with the Wisconsin Idea Theatre during the period November 1, 1952 to October 31, 1953. \$3,000 is designated as a stipend and \$300 to be used for travel. Any unexpended balance as of November 30, 1953, will revert to the Rockefeller Foundation. (Fund 15-594)
- (j) 25.00 Daughters of Demeter, Madison, Wisconsin, to be added to the Frankie T. Graber Scholarship Fund. (Fund 15-534)
- (k) 998.00 Friends of the late Judge George A. Affeldt, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to be utilized in providing a suitable memorial for Judge Affeldt in conjunction with the University Hospitals. (Fund 15-613)
- (1) 225.00 Drs. William E. Gilmore, S. E. Gavin, Robert F. Schilling, and Norman O. Becker, plus one anonymous contributor, to be added to the Robert C. Gavin Memorial Loan Fund for Medical students. (Student Loan)
- (m) 39.75 Brown's Book Shop, Inc., Madison, Wisconsin, to be added to previous payments of royalties on the sale of the "Heat Power Engineering Laboratory Manual" written by the College of Engineering staff members, and to be used to purchase equipment for the Mechanical Engineering Department. (Fund 15-902)
- (n) 10.00 Wisconsin High School Forensic Association to be added to the Gertrude E. Johnson Scholarship Fund. (Trust Fund)
- (o) Mr. and Mrs. Albert B. Tibbets, Brewster, New York, a gift of a collection of 304 books of interest to "teenagers" for the Library School of the University of Wisconsin.

GIFTS (Cont.)

(p) Carbide and Carbon Chemicals Company, Division of Union Carbide and Carbon Corporation, New York City, for the renewal of the Union Carbide and Carbon Fellowship in Physical Chemistry for the period July 1, 1953 to June 30, 1954, as follows:

\$1400 for single fellow, or 2100 for married fellow, plus 1200 to be used for the payment of tuition and fees with any remainder to be used for the purchase of research apparatus and chemicals. (Fund 15-742)

The recipient of the award shall be chosen by the Chairman of the Chemistry Department and approved by the donor. (Fund 15-222)
- (s) 350.00 The von Schleinitz Foundation, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, for the establishment of the von Schleinitz Foundation Fellowship in German. The fellowship may be awarded at the discretion of the German Department either annually or every two years to an undergraduate or a graduate student, who is deemed especially deserving. (Fund 15-620)

- (e) 200.00 Employers Mutual Liability Insurance Company of Wisconsin, Wausau, Wisconsin, to be added to a fund to support research on "Reactions of silica in foundry sand" in the Department of Geology. (Fund 15-591)
- (f) 6,000.00 The Carnegie Corporation of New York, New York City, to provide additional support of the Andean Area Research Project being carried on in Venezuela by some members of the Departments of Sociology and Anthropology, and Geography. Part of this contribution is to be used to provide transportation from Madison to Caracas, Venezuela and return for two graduate students and the remainder to provide them with funds for travel, food, lodging and miscellaneous expenses while in Venezuela. RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Appointment -

1. That John T. Mendenhall be appointed associate clinical professor of surgery beginning January 1, 1953, without salary or tenure. Dr. Mendenhall will be chief of surgery at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Madison.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Jones, recommendation No. 1 listed under Appointment was adopted.

- Leaves of Absence -

1. That Hugo H. Sommer, professor of dairy and food industries, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from January 26 to March 5, 1953. (Professor Sommer will serve as advisor and witness in the rindless Swiss cheese case for defendants including Wisconsin State Department of Agriculture.)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, recommendation No. 1 listed under Leaves of Absence was adopted.

2. That Christine Gunlaugson, assistant professor of music, be granted leave of absence on summer session basis, for the second semester of 1952-53; salary for the semester \$2385 to be distributed as follows: \$1208 to be charged to Music LA-LE, p. 68, and \$1177 to University Summer Session Trust Funds.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendation No. 2 listed under Leaves of Absence was adopted.

- Salary and Service Adjustments -

1. That the appointment of Mrs. Lois G. Nemec, associate professor of education, Extension Division, be changed from 1/2 time for the second semester of 1952-53, to 3/4 time for the second semester of 1952-53; and that her salary be increased from \$3525 to \$4025 for the academic year; charge increase, \$500, to 2A-2-AB-Spec. Classes-30-Ext. Staff. (Mrs. Nemec was on 3/4 time for the first semester.)

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Jones, recommendation No. 1 listed under Salary and Service Adjustments was adopted.

- Special Contracts -

- 1. That William H. Peterson, emeritus professor of biochemistry, be employed on a special service contract, from November 1, 1952 to June 30, 1953, inclusive, on part-time basis, in the College of Agriculture, for research on antibiotics; salary at the rate of \$390 a month, total for the period, \$3120; charge \$1560 to 15-361, Merck & Co., and \$1560 to 15-129, Squibb.
- 2. That Leslie E. A. Kelso, emeritus associate professor of electrical engineering, be employed on a special service contract from February 1 to June 30, 1953, on a part-time basis, in the College of Engineering, for instructional purposes because of staff shortages; salary \$1200 for the period; charge to special Regent appropriation for reemployment of Carnegie annuitants (June 19, 1952).
- 3. That John R. Price, emeritus professor of electrical engineering, be employed on a special service contract from February 1 to June 30, 1953, on a part-time basis, in the College of Engineering, for instructional purposes because of staff shortages; salary \$1600 for the period; charge to special Regent appropriation for reemployment of Carmegie annuitants (June 19, 1952).

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendations 1 to 3, inclusive, listed under Special Contracts, were adopted.

- Promotion -

1. That Theodore C. Erickson be promoted from the rank of associate professor of surgery (neurosurgery) to professor of surgery (neurosurgery), beginning February 1, 1953, with no change in salary.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendation No. 1 listed under Promotion was adopted.

Regent Kleczka, as Chairman of the Special Regent Committee on the Law Deanship, presented the recommendation of that Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University and the Special Regent Committee on the Law Deanship, John Ritchie be appointed Dean of the Law School and Professor of Law, effective July 1, 1953, at a salary of \$15,000 on the annual basis.

Regent Kleczka read a letter from Dean Oliver S. Rundell dated January 30, 1953 (EXHIBIT A attached) and a letter from Mr. Oscar T. Toebaas, President of the Wisconsin Bar Association, dated January 29, 1953 (EXHIBIT B attached).

VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Steering Committee of the University Campus Planning Commission, the final plans and specifications be approved and authority be granted to advertise for bids for the Animal Isolation Building and the sewer connections.

Upon recommendation of the Vice President of Business and Finance, and upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the Secretary be authorized to sign in the name of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin a petition for annexing, to the Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District, the Charmany Farm which is described as follows:

The east one-half (E 1/2) of the northeast quarter (NE 1/4) of Section twenty-five (25), town seven (7) north, range eight (8) east, also the northwest quarter (NW 1/4) of section thirty (30), town seven (7) north, range nine (9) east, excepting from the above described lands the following parcels:

Parcel I: Commencing at the northwest corner of the east one-half (E 1/2) of the northeast quarter (NE 1/4) of Section twenty-five (25) town seven (7) north, range eight (8) east, thence east forty (40) rods; thence south sixty (60) rods; thence west forty (40) rods, thence north sixty (60) rods to place of beginning, being fifteen (15) acres more or less, being the same premises as those described in Vol. 336 of Deeds, page 38, Instrument No. 485195.

Parcel II: A parcel of land in the northeast quarter (NE 1/4) of the northwest quarter (NW 1/4) of section thirty (30), town seven (7) north, range nine (9) east, being in the Town of Madison, consisting of two (2) acres of land, more particularly described as follows: Commencing in the northeast corner of the northwest quarter (NW 1/4) of said section, running thence due west along said section line 280 feet; thence due south 311-1/2 feet; thence east 280 feet to the quarter section line, thence due north 311-1/2 feet to the place of beginning, being the same premises as those described in Vol. 340 of Deeds, page 231, Instrument No. 4999333.

Upon recommendation of the Vice President of Business and Finance, and upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Kleczka, the following three recommendations were adopted:

- 1. That the Governor be requested to release an additional \$2000 from the appropriation made in section 20.419-3 Wisconsin Statutes to provide additional funds needed for architects' services and minor construction work in connection with the remodeling of the Education Building.
- 2. That the State Building Commission be requested to appropriate funds for the preparation of plans and specifications for remodeling the Extension Division Building in Milwaukee. (Preliminary estimate of cost of remodelling \$35,000; estimated maximum cost of plans and specifications \$3500.)
- 3. That the Governor be requested to release \$50,000 from the appropriation made in section 20.419-3 Wisconsin Statutes to provide funds needed for remodelling and equipment in the Medical School Building (Service Memorial Institutes), and in buildings used by the College of Agriculture.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.
