GIFTS

- (a) \$1000.00 - Mr. Irwin A. Meyers, Chicago, Illinois, to be added to a previous contribution to the Julius E. Olson Scholarship Loan Fund. (Trust Funds)
- (b) 10.00 - The Eta Chapter of Omicron Nu to be added to the Abbey Marlatt Memorial Scholarship Fund in accordance with the terms approved by the Regents at their meeting on January 15, 1944, when the fund was established and as amended by Regent Action on June 18, 1948. (Trust Funds)
- (c) - A gift from Mr. Howard J. White in Windsor Locks, Connecticut to the University of Wisconsin Library of Subscriptions to two current periodicals and the Memorial Edition of Markham Poems to establish a memorial to William J. McCue, Jr., a former University of Wisconsin Journalism student who was reported missing in action over the North Sea on January 1, 1945. Additional volumes will be presented from time to time to add to the William J. McCue, Jr. Memorial.
- (d) - Mr. Gilbert Durand, contractor, Spooner, Wisconsin, has provided a gift of rubber tile floor covering valued at approximately \$100 for the kitchen in the new Service Building at the Spooner Branch Agricultural Experiment Station. (15-452)
- (e) - The Wisconsin Association of Church Musicians desires to present a library of organ and sacred choral music to the Bureau of Information and Program Services of the University of Wisconsin Extension Division. This library shall be known as the Louise Fulcher Memorial Library. The present value of the gift is \$450, and will be increased from year to year. It is the desire of the donors that this music be loaned to organists and churches throughout the State of Wisconsin.

- (f) \$ 100.00 - Mr. J. P. Keating, Neenah, Wisconsin, to be used in whatever manner is felt best to assist the boys and girls who receive treatment in the Orthopedic Hospital for children. (15-206)
- (g) 500.00 - From the Milwaukee Foundation Committee for two scholarships to be awarded during the 1950-51 academic year in accordance with the terms of award accepted by the Regents on April 23, 1949. These two scholarships are in addition to three scholarships which were authorized and accepted by the Regents on the above date. (15-789)
- (h) 387.98 - Fellows of the American College of Physicians who have taken a post-graduate course in the University Medical School during the period November 28, 1949, to December 2, 1949, have made this contribution in recognition of the merit of the course of instruction and ask that this sum be added to the Medical School Library Building Fund. (15-764)
- (i) 25.00 - Mr. Merrill Chase, Chicago, Illinois, an additional contribution to the Merrill Chase Student Loan Fund. (Student Loans)
- (j) 45.00 - The Wisconsin Alumni Club of Dayton, Ohio, to be used for grants-in-aid to worthy students of the University of Wisconsin who will be recommended by the Wisconsin Alumni Club of Dayton, and approved by the Committee on Loans and Undergraduate Scholarships. Eligible freshmen must rank in the upper half of their high school class, continuing students must have maintained a "C" average or better. (15-459)
- (k) 160.00 - Anonymous contributions, to be added to the Medical School Library Building Fund. (15-764)
- (l) 3.50 - Advisory Board of the University Y.W.C.A. to be added to the Christina Murray Memorial Fund. (Trust Funds)
- (m) 225.00 - Government of France, for the continuation of a scholarship program for American students of French residing at the Maison Francaise. Either graduate or undergraduate students are eligible for the award which is to be made upon the recommendation of the faculty of the French Department by the Committee on Undergraduate Scholarships, or the Graduate School, as the case may be. (15-874)
- (n) 250.00 - Wisconsin Law School Association, to be added to the Wisconsin Law School Education Fund, which is to be used in obtaining the necessary supplies and clerical help incurred in the preparation of experimental and supplemental legal educational materials appropriated for student use in the Law School. (15-840)

- (o) \$ 250.00 - Anonymous contribution to be added to the Medical School Library Building Fund. (15-764)
- (p) 25.00 - Dr. James B. Bingham, Seattle, Washington, to be added to the Medical School Library Building Fund. (15-764)
- (q) 200.00 - From the former students of Dr. Walter J. Meek to be added to the Walter Joseph Meek Student Award Fund which was established August 28, 1948. (15-841)
- (r) - Mrs. Carl A. Johnson, Madison, Wisconsin, a gift of a five-volume set of books entitled "North American Wild Flowers" to the Department of Horticulture. This five-volume set was written by Mary Vaux Walcott and published by the Smithsonian Institute in 1926. Each volume contains descriptions and full-color illustrations of approximately eighty different flowers.
- (s) 53.00 - To be added to the Friends of the University of Wisconsin Library Fund in accordance with the purposes of this organization. (15-822)
- (t) - Mr. P. A. Narielwala, New Delhi, India, a gift of sixteen books written by Mahatma Gandhi to be added to the Gandhi Memorial Book Collection of The University of Wisconsin Library. This memorial was established by the Regents on October 15, 1949. (15-987)
- (u) 100.00 - Wisconsin Garden Club Federation, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to be added to the renewal scholarship accepted by the Regents on September 10, 1949. This scholarship is to be awarded during 1949-50 to a senior student majoring in the field of Horticulture who has demonstrated talent and ability in the field of Horticulture, Conservation or Plant Research. (15-720)
- (v) 1500.00 - Marschall Dairy Laboratories, Inc., Madison, Wisconsin for the acquisition of land to be added to the University of Wisconsin Arboretum. (15-460)
- (w) 4000.00 - An anonymous contribution for the establishment of The Thoracic Surgery Fellowship Fund to be used in the Medical School for the training of young men in thoracic surgery and for research in this field of medicine. This fund may be expended for the following purposes:

1. To provide stipends for fellows at the rate of two to three thousand dollars annually for training in addition to the usual surgical residency training in this field embracing surgery of the heart and lungs.

2. To purchase equipment and animals necessary in the furtherance of research projects which may be developed.
3. To provide for the publication of reports of work performed and research done.
4. Such other purposes as may be deemed essential in carrying out the above, such as travel expense for the fellow in attendance at national meetings of this speciality or travel for observation of outstanding work as being done in other centers.

Additional contributions may be accepted to increase this fund from time to time. (15-457)

- (x) \$ 2925.00 - University of Wisconsin Foundation, a gift from Harry W. Adams, Beloit, Wisconsin, in support of research in the Department of Chemical Engineering during the period February 1, 1950 through June 30, 1950. (15-458)

GRANTS

- (a) \$ 1000.00 - Mr. Edward A. Bacon, Washington, D. C. for the establishment of a research grant for "a pharmaceutical and biological study of Euphorbia Lactifolia", beginning January 1, 1950 in the Department of Pharmacy and Zoology. (15-461)
- (b) 12,000.00 - Wm. C. Grunow, Val-Lo-Wil Farms, Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, for the establishment of an industrial research grant to study "The Development of Improved Methods for the Control of Diseases affecting chickens used in the Intensive Production of Broilers", during the period February 1, 1950, through January 31, 1952, in the Department of Veterinary Science. (15-462)
- (c) 25,915.00 - The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, New York City, for the establishment of a research fund to study the influence of nutritional factors on resistance or susceptibility to poliomyelitis, during the period January 1, 1950 through December 31, 1950 in the Department of Medical Microbiology and Preventive Medicine. (15-329)
- (d) 965.00 - Wildlife Management Institute, Washington, D. C., for the continuation, until March 31, 1950, of a research fellowship in the Department of Wildlife Management, to study ringneck pheasant populations in a limited geographic area. (15-774)

- (e) - That the grant from the Rockefeller Foundation for research in the economics of housing, School of Commerce, in the amount of \$58,500, during the period January 1, 1947 through December 31, 1949, be extended for one additional year with no increase in funds. The balance in the fund as of December 31, 1949, except for \$5500, reverts to the Foundation. Of that balance, \$4500 is to be used for publication of the results of the investigation and \$1000 is to be used for a research assistant. Any balance remaining as of December 31, 1950, will revert to the Rockefeller Foundation. (15-369)
- (f) \$ 2750.00 - Mr. Ben S. McGiveran, Chicago, Illinois, for continuation of research fellowship to study the productivity of lakes for fish in the Department of Zoology during the period January 1, 1950 through December 31, 1950. (15-824)

Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Grady, recommendation No. 1, Gifts (a) to (x), inclusive, and Grants (a) to (f), inclusive, listed under Gifts and Grants was adopted.

President Fred presented a recommendation and made a statement regarding the purchase of the former Governor's Mansion and Estate at 130 E. Gilman Street, Madison. Regent Grady expressed appreciation for the gift which made this purchase possible. (President Fred's and Regent Grady's statements are attached as Exhibits A and B.)

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the Knapp Committee \$60,000 be appropriated from accumulated income in the Knapp Fund for the purchase of the Governor's Mansion and Estate located at 130 E. Gilman Street to be used as a Graduate Student Center until such time as the Regents decide otherwise; and that the Center be named appropriately in honor of Kemper K. Knapp. That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized and directed to complete the purchase of the property which is legally described as follows:

Lots 8, 9 and the Northeast one-half of Lot 7, Block 95,
original plat, City of Madison.

Regent Jones presented the Report of the Constructional Development Committee. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Grady, it was

VOTED, That subject to a mutually satisfactory adjustment of land areas between the College of Agriculture and the Department of Athletics, and approval thereof by the Steering Committee, the location of the indoor practice building as shown on plot plan S-1 (4335), and the plans and specifications as prepared by the architects, be approved. It is understood that the matter will be referred again to the Campus Planning Commission and the Regents unless there is a mutually satisfactory agreement between the College of Agriculture and the Department of Athletics which has the approval of the Steering Committee.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

I. Report of Actions Taken

1. In accordance with authority granted by the Regents for the Vice President of Business and Finance, or, in his absence, the President of the University, to sign proposals, agreements, contracts and contract supplements of the United States Government for research work, educational programs and for services requested by the Government for military personnel and/or veterans assigned to or enrolled in the University of Wisconsin, and for other educational services of the University, the following contracts and agreements have been signed:

- (a) Memorandum agreement with the Veterans Administration covering the furnishing by the University, during the interim period pending completion of a formal contract, of instruction, books, supplies and equipment as approved by the Veterans Administration to persons designated by the Veterans Administration as entitled to education, training or vocational rehabilitation under the provisions of Public Laws 16 and 346, 78th Congress, as amended, effective June 18, 1949, with the understanding that the University will be entitled to receive payment for such services from the date of the memorandum agreement at the rates mutually agreed upon in the contract to be executed.

- (b) Amendment to Agreement (V3030V-349) with the Veterans Administration for services relating to the counselling of veterans, providing for an increase effective January 3, 1950, in the counselling fees paid the University by the Government from \$19 to \$25 per case.
- Re. changed to V3030SL. 3*
- (c) Veterans Administration Out-Lease V3030R-9 covering the rental by the University of approximately 428 square feet of space on the second floor of the building at 448 State Street, Madison, at a rental of \$57.06 per month for the period July 1, 1949 to June 30, 1950, for use by the University Veterans Testing and Counselling Center.
- (d) Veterans Administration Contract No. V1001V-191 covering the furnishing by the University during the period November 1, 1949 to October 31, 1952 of education and training by correspondence under provisions of Public Laws 16 and 346, 78th Congress, as amended, payment to the University by the Government to be in accordance with Schedule A attached to the contract.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1 (a) to (d), listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) was adopted.

2. In accordance with the authority granted by the Regents on September 27, 1947, for the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign contracts and leases not in excess of \$2500, the following contracts, leases and orders have been signed:

- (a) Agreement letter dated December 21, 1949, constituting a proposal by The Macmillan Company, New York City, to negotiate with the National Bibliophile Service for an initial offset reprinting of 500 copies each of Volumes III and IV of HISTORY OF LABOR IN THE UNITED STATES by Perlman, Lescohier, Brandeis and Taft, at a reprint fee of 50¢ per book, payable one-half to The Macmillan Company and one-half to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin. (Authority for the Director of Business and Finance to sign a similar proposal for the initial reprinting of 750 to 1,000 copies of these works was granted by the Regents at their meeting on June 18, 1948. Negotiations were not completed by The Macmillan Company.)
- (b) Rental from the Board of Education, Racine, of the Washington Park High School Gymnasium for use by the Racine Extension Center for practice on February 3, 10 and 17, and for games on February 5 and 19, 1950, at a total cost of \$85.00.

Upon motion of Regent Arveson, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 2 (a) to (b), listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) was adopted.

II. Miscellaneous

1. That Mr. Earl J. McKenna be deputized as a University police officer.

Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1 listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (II. Miscellaneous) was adopted.

Regent Grady presented the report of the Executive Committee and read the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee held on January 4, 1950.

Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the action of the Executive Committee on January 4, 1950, in awarding contracts for storm sewers for the Dairy Building and for Engineering Building equipment be approved. (Regent Grady refrained from voting because of holding stock in one of the companies to which a contract award was made.)

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the balance of the actions voted by the Executive Committee on January 4, 1950, be approved, ratified and confirmed, and that the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee held on January 4, 1950, as circulated, be approved.

President Fred made the following statement in connection with the gift of \$30,000 from the Alexander and Margaret Stewart Trust accepted by the Executive Committee of the Regents on January 4, 1950.

"I want to recommend acceptance of a gift amounting to \$30,000 from the Alexander and Margaret Stewart Trust; the funds to be used in cancer research in the McArdle Memorial Laboratory.

"The family was engaged many years ago in the lumbering activities around Wausau. At the time of Mrs. Margaret Stewart's death in 1946, her Will directed that her estate income be used to help in the fight against cancer.

"Plans for the utilization of the grant in forwarding cancer studies have been discussed by the Trustees of the estate with Dr. Harold Rusch of the McArdle Memorial Laboratory.

"I am especially pleased to recommend acceptance of this gift for the University research program as a memorial to a former Wisconsin resident."

RESOLVED, That a special committee be appointed by the Regent-Faculty Conference, as a sub-committee thereof, to confer with the Joint Survey Committee on Retirement Systems as to possible revision of the present State Retirement System as it affects University faculty members, so as to correct inequities which have arisen because of changed conditions since the institution of the System in 1921, and to bring the operation of the System more closely in line with the original legislative intent; that such special committee consist of representatives of the Regents of the faculty section of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee, of the University Committee, and of the University Retirement Board; and that such special committee report back to the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee at the earliest convenient date.

The Regent-Faculty Conference Committee recommended that the Regents approve further study of the existing program of retirement for University of Wisconsin faculty employees and related matters with a view to possible improvements to meet present and foreseeable conditions.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the above report and recommendation of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee be approved.

-

Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That Regents Grady, Kleczka, Watson and Werner, be appointed representatives of the Regents on the sub-committee of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee to confer with the Joint Survey Committee on retirement systems.

Regent Kleczka presented the following Resolution in memory of former Governor Julius P. Heil, and upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Grady, the Resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

RESOLUTION

"The Regents of the University of Wisconsin record with sorrow the recent death of former Governor Julius P. Heil.

"His life - from immigrant boy and orphan to Governor of this State is a pattern of success which may well be emulated by the generations to come.

"A remarkable figure - he was endowed with special qualities of being very human, extremely generous, friendly and always well intentioned.

"Hosts of his personal friends mourn his passing. They will keenly miss the lovable nature of this self-made man and long remember his sincere affection for Wisconsin and his fellow man.

"The Regents of this University express their gratitude for the outstanding services rendered by Julius P. Heil to the citizens of this State as they enshrine his name on the University's roll of honor.

"Our sympathy and condolence is extended to his survivors in this, the hour of their bereavement. Therefore, be it resolved that this resolution be spread upon the records of this Board and a copy thereof presented to his family."

Statement by President Fred
Regarding Purchase of Former Governor's Mansion at
130 E. Gilman Street
Madison, Wisconsin

Seldom has an item come before this Board which pleases me more than the recommendation which has just been presented. I am convinced that this proposal is one which will contribute greatly to the growth and stature of the University of Wisconsin.

The old Executive Mansion of the State of Wisconsin has been praised for its "personality and distinction." A chapter about the house occupies a prominent place in John Drury's volume on Historic Midwest Houses, published recently by the University of Minnesota Press.

The house was built of Madison sandstone in 1854 by Julius T. White, later a Civil War general. The land was originally owned by James Duane Doty, a territorial governor of Wisconsin. In 1868 the residence was purchased by the Eau Claire lumberman, J. G. Thorp. When his daughter married Ole Bull, the house became the American home of the famous Norwegian violinist.

In 1882, when Jeremiah M. Rusk was elected governor of Wisconsin, he bought the house and made it his home. Three years later the State Legislature voted to purchase the property and make it the official residence of the state's governors. This has been its role for more than sixty-five years until this past year.

Thus its rich background makes the old executive mansion an important historic shrine for the people of Wisconsin.

The Graduate School plans to make almost immediate use of the Governor's Mansion. It is expected that a room or rooms can also be reserved for visiting Knapp Fund professors and lecturers.

Kemper K. Knapp, one of the great friends of the University of Wisconsin, upon his death left to the University a considerable sum of money which makes possible the purchase of this historic and valuable site. The bequest of Mr. Knapp was made to the University to be used as the Board of Regents saw fit. However, he did express a hope that the funds might be used in such a way as to provide opportunities for needy and worthy young people from the states of Wisconsin and Illinois to attend the University of Wisconsin and that a part of the funds might be used to develop fine qualities of citizenship in our University community. The University, for the past few years, has carried on programs in both of these areas, and these have contributed much to the University. Both programs will be continued. I think it particularly appropriate that a portion of the accumulated income from the Knapp Bequest should be used to purchase this piece of property and that this be established as a memorial to the late Kemper K. Knapp. I am confident that this will make a worthy and distinguished memorial to one of the most loyal and devoted friends of the University.

STATEMENT BY REGENT GRADY
REGARDING THE KEMPER K. KNAPP BEQUEST
ON THE OCCASION OF THE PURCHASE OF THE FORMER GOVERNOR'S MANSION
WITH AN APPROPRIATION FROM THE KNAPP FUND

Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Board:

I am proud of the opportunity of joining in the approval of the recommendation made by President Fred that the home of Wisconsin's Governors shall become the property of the University of Wisconsin; that it may be preserved in the fullness of its traditions and as a tribute to the memory of a distinguished son, through whose generosity this action becomes possible, and in fitting testimony of our appreciation that it forever be designated as a memorial to Kemper K. Knapp.

The most serious and solemn hour in the life of man is when he realizes that he is about to die. We can imagine that in the mind of our benefactor there was then recalled the experience of leaving his Green Lake County home to attend this great State University. He remembered and appreciated that it was through the inspiring teaching of his day that he was enabled to travel the high road of success.

It was the purpose of the framers of our Constitution that the sons and daughters of Wisconsin should be provided with the opportunities and advantages of a State University, the cost of which was to be and has been so readily borne by the citizenry of our State. An appreciation of its purpose and pride in its possession was expressed by President James B. Angell of Michigan on the occasion of the celebration of its Golden Jubilee in 1904, when he said:

"Herein is to my mind one of the great charms and the chief source of strength of the state university, that it belongs to the people, to the whole people of the state, that every citizen is a proprietor and stockholder in it. If some billionaire should propose to this State to reimburse the state for what the university has cost and to endow it even more liberally on the condition that the citizens should lose this sense of proprietorship, I should hope, I should expect, that this state would spurn the offer."

Many appreciated contributions have been made to this university, but to Kemper K. Knapp must be accorded the distinction of having provided by his will the largest bequest ever made by an individual for immediate use. It was unique not only in the generosity of the sum provided, but it was made without solicitation and freed of the slightest restraint or restriction in its use; it was given with the hope that it might be used for the highest and noblest purpose of providing education and developing character of those who might avail themselves of the afforded opportunities in the years to come.

His act in so providing was characterized by a realization that it was here in Wisconsin that these opportunities were afforded him. When the curtain was about to rung down on the drama of his eventful life, he appropriated a large portion of his accumulations to the source of his success. This beneficent

act was prompted by the noble impulse to express appreciation and a charitable desire to aid the deserving.

He has set a great and beautiful example, and let it be hoped that this noble action may be emulated by others to whom the flow of fortune has brought wealth, not only through the University's training, but from the vast natural resources of our State and afforded opportunities.

Although this great benefactor lived his adult life in an adjoining state, there was still dear to him his native home and he thought of the state in which he was born and of his debt to this University, and thus he named her as the chief object of his bounty.

He exemplified the splendid virtues fused within his spirit when he thus manifested his appreciation of the favors conferred in another day, and when he was bidding farewell to life, he laid at the feet of his Alma Mater, the accumulations of his successful career and by act expressed more clearly than could words, the hope that he might repay in gratitude's usury, all she had given him. His act evinced the thought that was in the mind of another expressed long ago in circumstance slightly varied, when it was said:

"The monarch may forget the crown that on his head an hour
hath been;
The bridegroom may forget the bride his wedded wife of
yestereen;
The Mother may forget the child that smiled so sweetly
on her knee;
But I will remember thee Glencairn and what thou hast
done for me."

UNIVERSITY COMMITTEE REPORT ON THE ORGANIZATION OF THE
STUDENT-FACULTY CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

At the October meeting the faculty approved a motion "that the faculty accept in principle the establishment of a Student-Faculty Conference Committee." The motion requested the University Committee to consult with the Student Board on this subject and to bring to the faculty recommendations as to detailed arrangements.

The University Committee reports that it has conferred with representatives of the Student Board on the matter and that the following implementation is agreeable to the Student Board and is recommended by the University Committee:

1. That the committee be entitled the Student-Faculty Conference Committee on Educational Affairs;
2. That the membership consist of three faculty members and three students; the faculty members to be chosen by the University Committee from among its membership; the student members to be chosen by the Student Board.
3. That the New Committee shall not in any way curtail or supplant the present powers and duties of the University Committee.
4. That the function of the Committee be to confer and recommend concerning matters of educational interest or educational policies of the University;
5. That the Committee be empowered to report recommendations either to the University Committee or to the faculty directly.
