

Badgers Battle Minnesota for The Axe

Wisconsin (8-0, 5-0 Big Ten) hosts Minnesota (6-3, 3-3) today at 81,318-seat Camp Randall Stadium (Field Turf). Kickoff is set for 2:36 p.m. CST.

The game will be televised live by ABC (Brent Musburger, Gary Danielson and Jack Arute). Wisconsin Public Television (Mike Heller and Scott Nelson) will air the game on a tape delay basis at 10 p.m. on Saturday.

The game also can be heard live on the 46-city Wisconsin Radio Network (Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas). WIBA (1310 AM, 101.5 FM) is the rightsholder in Madison.

Today is the final home game of 2004 for the Badgers, who are ranked No. 4 according to the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll and No. 5 in the latest Associated Press Top 25 Poll.

Wisconsin improved to 8-0 overall and 5-0 in Big Ten play after a 24-12 victory at home over Northwestern on Oct. 23. UW had a bye last weekend.

Minnesota lost 30-21 at Indiana last weekend and has dropped three of its last four games. The Golden

Robert Brooks and Scott Starks (#2) combined on this hit to force a Kyle Orton fumble late in the Purdue game. UW has recorded 12 takeaways on defense this season.

UW vs. Minnesota Series Info

Minnesota leads the all-time series 59-46-8, including a 37-34 victory last season in Minneapolis ... the Badgers hold a 29-22-6 edge in Madison and have won the last four meetings in Camp Randall Stadium (Minnesota's last win at Wisconsin was in 1994) ... today will mark the

114th meeting between the two schools (the mostplayed rivalry in Division I football) who annually play for Paul Bunyan's Axe ... Wisconsin and Minnesota have met every year since 1907 ... the series started on Nov. 15, 1890 (a 63-0 win by Minnesota in Minneapolis) ... the home team has won the last four meetings ... the schools have combined to average 71.3 ppg in the last four meetings.

Thanks for the Memories

Today is "Senior Day" at Wisconsin. The program's senior players and managers will be recognized on the field before the game. Wisconsin is 8-4-2 in regular-season home finales during the Alvarez era. That mark includes a 4-0 record against Minnesota.

Still Standing

Wisconsin has won its first eight games and can move to 9-0 for just the third time in school history with a win over Minnesota. The only two 9-0 starts in school history were in 1998 and 1901.

The Badgers have won eight games for the ninth time in the past 12 seasons. Prior to 1993, Wisconsin had won eight games a total of just eight times in its history (1889-1992).





Running back Anthony Davis, currently second on UW's all-time rushing list, will be playing his final home game today.

Wisconsin joins USC, Oklahoma, Auburn, Utah and Boise State as the only undefeated Division I teams left this season.

Badgering D

Wisconsin's scoring defense (8.5 ppg) and total defense (236.4 ypg) are ranked No. 1 and 2 in the nation, respectively, (both lead the Big Ten). Minnesota leads the Big Ten with the nation's No. 7 total offense (463.1 ypg) and No. 10 scoring offense (33.3 ppg).

Wisconsin is allowing just 3.79 yards per play this season. That is second-fewest in the nation behind North Carolina State (3.76).

The Badgers have allowed just 31 points in five home games this season (6.2 per game). The top such marks at UW since 1945 are: 5.2 ppg in both 1950 and 1951; 8.0 ppg in 1998; and 9.0 ppg in 1999.

Among the Best

Though they did not play last weekend, the Badgers moved up in all three polls. They are currently No. 4 in the A.P. poll and No. 5 in both the BCS and Coaches Polls.

Wisconsin has not played a regular-season game ranked as a top-five team nationally (according to AP) this late in the season since the No. 3 Badgers defeated No. 5 Minnesota 14-9 in Camp Randall Stadium on Nov. 24, 1962.

Key Player

RB Anthony Davis has carried 74 times for 509 yards and eight TDs in two career games against Minnesota. Davis missed the Minnesota game last season due to injury.

Wisconsin's offensive production has been measurably better in the five games in

which RB Anthony Davis has been in the lineup this season. The Badgers are averaging 25.2 points and 356.4 yards of total offense with

him in the lineup compared to 14.3 points and 272.7 yards without him

Home Cooking

A win on over Minnesota would give the Badgers an undefeated and untied home record for just the second time (1998) since 1962.

Rivalry Notes

Today's Wisconsin-Minnesota game will be the 114th meeting in the most-played rivalry in Division I football. The two schools have played every year since 1907 and have annually battled for Paul Bunyan's Axe since the 1948 game.

Minnesota has scored fewer than 20 points in a game just twice this season. Wisconsin has not allowed an opponent to score more than 17 points in any game this season.

Head Coach Barry Alvarez

arry Alvarez, the winningest football coach in Wisconsin history, has completed 14 seasons at the d of the program he transformed in a perennial second-division finer to one that is nationally respected is a fixture on the postseason bowline.

Alvarez, whose overall record with the Badgers is 99-67-4, became wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April of 2004. He is one of just two people (UAB's Watson Brown) at the Dission I level who serves as head to thall coach and athletic director.

Alvarez's list of accomplishments at Wisconsin is remarkable. Consider just a few of the most notable ...

- · winningest coach in school history
- coached three Big Ten and Rose Bowl champions
- only Big Ten coach ever to win the Rose Bowl in consecutive seasons
- needs one win to become just the 10th coach in Big Ten history with



100 victories at one conference institution

 has coached five national award winners, including Ron Dayne (Heisman, Doak Walker, Maxwell), Jamar Fletcher (Jim Thorpe) and Kevin Stemke (Ray Guy)

- guided UW to back-to-back Big Ten titles in 1998 and 1999 (hadn't happened at Wisconsin since 1896-97)
- bowl record of 7-2 (.778)
- coached the three winningest teams in school history

When Alvarez arrived in Madison in 1990, Wisconsin had compiled a 9-36 record during the previous four seasons and attendance at Camp Randall Stadium had dipped to an average of 41,734 per game (54 percent of capacity). The program sorely needed a boost and got it when new Director of Athletics Pat Richter hired Alvarez from Notre Dame, where he had been an assistant coach under Lou Holtz.

Alvarez's coaching career began at the high school level. He served as an assistant at Lincoln (Neb.) Northeast High from 1971-73 before taking over as head coach at Lexington (Neb.) High from 1974-75. His last prep coaching stop was at Mason City (Iowa) High

where he was head coach from 1976-78 and where his team won a 4A state title in his final year.

Iowa's Hayden Fry hired Alvarez as an assistant coach in 1979. The Hawkeyes played in six bowl games (two Rose Bowls) during Alvarez's eight years in Iowa City, compiling a 61-33-1 mark in the process. Alvarez's standout player with the Hawkeyes was LB Larry Station, a two-time All-American and twotime Academic All-American.

Alvarez left Iowa after the 1986 season to become linebackers coach at Notre Dame. He was promoted (linebackers to defensive coordinator to assistant head coach) by Holtz each of his three seasons as the Fighting Irish went 32-5 and won the 1988 national title. While in South Bend, Alvarez coached All-America linebackers Michael Stonebreaker, Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett.

Alvarez grew up in Langeloth, Pa., a small town among the coal mines and steel mills in western Pennsylvania. He starred as a prep linebacker and went on to play at Nebraska (1965-67) for legendary head coach Bob

Devaney. Alvarez was the leading tackler for the 1967 Cornhuskers, who led the nation in total defense and created a school-record 40 turnovers. Alvarez played in both the Sugar and Orange Bowls at Nebraska (the Cornhuskers were 25-7 during his three varsity seasons). Alvarez earned his bachelor's

degree in 1969 and added a master's degree in 1971, both from Nebraska.

Alvarez's family includes his wife Cindy, daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), son Chad, grandsons Joe and Jake Ferguson, Jackson Delzer and granddaughter Grace Delzer.



- Alvarez received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from the University of Nebraska in May of 2003.
- Barry was inducted into the Washington County (Pa.) chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in 2000.
- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, endowed a football scholarship at the UW in the spring of 2000. "I thought it was a small way for me to say thanks to the UW-Madison," Alvarez said of his quarter-million dollar contribution to the school's foundation.
- Alvarez added administrative duties to his job description in 2000 when he was named Associate Athletic

- Director. He became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April 2004, operating in a dual role as football coach as well.
- Alvarez was a finalist for ESPN's
 College Football Coach of the
 Decade Award in 1999. He was one
 of 18 coaches named to new positions in 1990 and is the only one
 still at the school which hired him.
- Alvarez was named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by *Hispanic Business* in October of 2001.
- Numerous former Alvarez assistants at Wisconsin have gone on to success on the professional level, among them Bill Callahan (former Oakland Raider head coach), Brad Childress (Philadelphia Eagles offensive coordinator), Jay Hayes (Cincinnati Bengals defensive line coach) and Jay Norvell (former Oakland Raiders tight ends coach).

John D. Wiley

hancellor John D. Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968 to 1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany, as a recipient of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Teaching.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials, and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982 to 1986, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

From 1986 to 1989, Wiley served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering, with oversight responsibility for all aspects of graduate study, grant submission, agency liaison, research infrastructure and centers, and technology transfer. From 1989 to 1994, he was dean of the UW-Madison Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

Prior to his appointment to the university's top position, Wiley served as provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs, which carries the responsibility of chief operating officer and deputy chancellor. As provost, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley was named UW-Madison's 27 chancellor on January 1, 2001. As chancelor, he has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning. He also has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea—the belief that the boundaries of the campus are the boundaries of the state and beyond—and to build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the university rich in accomplishment and tradition.

Wiley has presided over unprecedened growth on the west side of the campuwhich is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers. He also has mapped an east-side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area, with an expanded Elvehjem Museum of Art, new classroom buildings and additional music-performance space. Wiley believes that the arts and humanities are an integral component of the research enterprise.


"Nurturing an environment of creativity—encompassing industry, the arts and individual expression—is important for attracting and keeping these very mobile, highly sought, knowledge-based workers within our borders," Wiley says.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and to help build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

"The Wisconsin Idea offers a shared medium through which we can help the state achieve its maximum potential as a participant in a world economy that embraces learning and the advancement of knowledge as much as it does material production," he says.

More than 25 Hueber-coached players have made NFL rosters.

UW's offensive lines paved the way for a 1,000-yard rusher every year from 1996-2002 (during a Big Tenrecord 10 straight seasons).

- In 2002, tailback Anthony Davis rushed for a UW sophomore-record 1,555 yards behind Hueber's line that included Rimington Trophy finalist Al Johnson.
- The 2000 Badgers broke in a new tailback and fought a lot of lineup inconsistencies, but Michael Bennett finished third nationally in rushing. Three of Hueber's seniors (Casey Rabach, Bill Ferrario and Dave Costa) earned pro contracts.

Prior to being named deputy athletic director, Pollard served as the division's chief financial officer and senior associate athletic director. He developed a comprehensive strategic financial plan ("Keeping Big Red in the Black") that increased the division's operating reserve to \$7 million and

allowed the university to move forward on the \$107 million renovation of Camp Randall Stadium. He also assisted with the development of the school's inaugural preferential seating program that is generating more than \$9 million annually for the athletic program and he helped negotiate a multi-year, multi-million dollar contract for media and marketing rights that is the largest collegiate contract in the country.

Pollard has been the sports administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs since 2001-02 and served as the Tournament Manager when the UW hosted the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional.

In the fall of 2003, Pollard was selected by *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal* as a recipient of its "Top Forty Under 40" Award. It is given annually to the 40 most influential and creative individuals in sports under the age of 40. Pollard is the first college sports administrator honored by the magazine. Pollard is the president for

the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association (CABMA) and was chosen by his peers as the 2002 Business Manager of the Year.

Pollard is the campus chair of the Partners in Giving campaign that benefits more than 300 non-profit organizations. He led the 2003 campaign for the Athletic Department, which resulted in a 100 percent increase in participants and a 78 percent increase in contributions.

His other intercollegiate administration experience came as associate athletic director for administration at Maryland (1994-98) and associate athletic director for internal operations at St. Louis (1989-94).

Pollard, the 1987 NCAA Division III national champion in the 5,000-meter run and a two time Division III All-American, has a B.S. degree in business administration from UW-Oshkosh (1987). Pollard and his wife, Ellen, have four children, (Thomas, Annie, Maggie and James).



Cheryl Bailey Sports Admin.

Cheryl Bailey is in her 15th year at UW-Madison and third as senior associate AD for sports administration.

Bailey is also the school's senior woman administrator for the Big Ten and NCAA. She supervises a number of Badger sports and the compliance department. Bailey is the direct administrator for men's and women's hockey.

Bailey was hired in 1990 at the UW as an associate AD for women's athletics. She completed a four-year term (two as chair) with the NCAA Women's Basketball Committee in 2004, and is in the midst of a four-year term (2002-05) on NACDA's Executive Committee.

The former director of athletics for women's sports at Denison (1983-90), Bailey served that school as an assistant professor and women's soccer (11 years) and track (nine) coach. Bailey has a B.S. degree from Slippery Rock State (1977) and an M.A. from Ohio State (1983). She has three children: Kelly, Kenny and Peter.

Doug Beard, a college sports administrator in the state of Wisconsin since 1987, is in his second season on the

UW's senior-level administrative team as associate athletic director for administration. Beard supervises the budget and finance, event management, food and beverage service, human resources and sports medicine units.

Beard joined the UW staff in 2001 as assistant AD for event management as well as helping administer the department's internal operations. He was promoted to associate AD in 2002. Before coming to Wisconsin, Beard worked at UW-Milwaukee from 1989-2001 and UW-Stout from 1987-89.

Beard, originally from Kennebunkport, Maine, has a B.S. degree in business administration from New Hampshire (1985) and an M.A. degree in athletic administration from Kent State (1987). His wife's name is Patricia and his stepdaughter is Lindsay.




John Chadima Operations

Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then reenter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section GG, in the new 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the new south end zone concourse.




Stadium Renovation

amp Randall Stadium, the fourtholdest college football stadium in the country, is in the midst of a \$107 million renovation project that will fully conclude in 2005. The project will include:

- increased seating capacity to 80,112 (in 2005);
- creation of new and wider concourses to provide safe and convenient fan access;
- renovation of old (and addition of new) restrooms throughout the facility;
- installation of three video replay boards plus improved sound and lighting systems;
- addition of private suite and clublevel seating areas on the east side of the stadium;
- construction of a new ticket office with convenient on-site parking
- development of a consolidated office building for athletic department staff
- expansion of accessible facilities for disabled fans and visitors.






Three levels of suites and club seats were added to the east side of the stadium, along with permanent lighting for late afternoon and night games.




Rock the Vote

Tobacco Center Receives \$8.5 Million Federal Grant

The Center for Tobacco Research and Intervention, a program of the Medical School at UW-Madison, has been awarded \$8.5 million for research on tobacco dependence and its treatment. The research, to be conducted in Madison and Milwaukee, will study the long-term consequences of smoking.

Researchers hope to be able to individualize tobacco dependence



"The information obtained from this new research will be very practi-

cal," says Michael Fiore, the center's director and professor of medicine.
"We will be looking at how smoking and quitting affects people's mental and physical health, social relationships and lifestyle. And from this, we'll be able to provide more specific treatment options for smokers who want to quit and their clinicians."

Faculty Members Receive Fulbright Grants

Three faculty members at UW-Madison will teach and research abroad after being awarded Fulbright Scholar grants. The Fulbright Program provides funds to allow near-

ly 800 U.S. faculty and professionals to travel to some 140 countries in an effort to build understanding between nations. Recipients are selected on academic or professional achievement and extraordinary leadership potential in their fields.

Michael Collins, a microbiology professor in the Department of Pathobiological Sciences in the School of Veterinary Medicine, will travel to Austral University of Chile in Valdivia, Chile. He is lecturing and continuing his research on Mycobacterium paratuberculosis as part of an effort to strengthen Chile's animal health infrastructure for its growing dairy industry.

Cynthia L. Haq, professor of family medicine and population health sciences and director of the UW Global Health Program, will research and talk about how to improve primary health care through family medicine. She will be at Makerere University in Kampala.

Robert Skloot, professor of theater and drama, and Jewish studies, will hold a distinguished professorship in American Drama and Theater at the University of Utrecht in Utrecht, Netherlands.







Women's Hockey





an! My last game at the "Camp." Where do I begin? It has been a long, hard journey that seemed to go by extremely fast. I have definitely established some life-long memories here. From the worst times to the best times, all have been learning experiences.

It seems like just last season I was stepping in for Mike Echols after he was injured in the Virginia game my freshman year. I was so excited to get in the game. But my excitement was crushed by the yelling and screaming of every coach on the sideline after I tried to press on the first play I was in and lined up off-sides. You learn and you live. I learned not to let my mistakes become bad habits.

One more thing. This is a little off the wall but I will say it anyway. Fans take it easy on players. Try not to be so critical. Believe it or not, athletes have feelings too. Imagine that it was your son or daughter that people were booing and cursing at. It would not feel so good. I hope this does not come out the wrong way, because the support at Camp Randall is amazing and I've already written about the unbelievable fans we have.







In each game program this season, we will be running an excerpt from the new book Third Down and a War to Go: The All-American 1942 Wisconsin Badgers, written by Terry Frei and published by the Wisconsin Historical Society Press. The book chronicles the 1942 Badger football team, including Frei's father, Jerry. Through extensive research and interviews with the remaining Badgers, their families, and combat comrades, Terry Frei tells the often heart-wrenching story of this band of brothers, describing their successes and losses both on the football field and in service to their country.

Excerpt Six

n April 1, 1945, three of the 1942 Badgers' starters-All-American end Dave Schreiner, tackle Bob Baumann, and halfback Bud Seelinger-landed on Okinawa with the Sixth Marine Division. By the third day, the Sixth Division was almost across the thin Ishikawa Isthmus.

"Dave complained to me that he wasn't getting his share of action," Captain Clint Eastment recalls. "He wanted to get more action. I said, 'Just wait a while. It's a long campaign.'"

Eastment was right. The three Badgers, all first lieutenants, were in the thick of it.

In early June, Baumann's and Schreiner's company was involved in a battle to the south of the port city of Naha. Captain Eastment moved ahead with scouts and left Baumann in charge of the company.

Years later, John McLaughry-a Marine who had played for the New York Giants-wrote his memories of what happened next. He said Baumann's platoon "was blind-sided by heavy enemy fire . . . I was in radio contact with Bob who was only some 50 yards away on the

reverse side of the ridge and . . . he was hit and died as we were discussing how to extricate his platoon."

Sergeant Gus Forbus was with Schreiner. "It was really hot, with snipers firing and mortars, you name it," Forbus says. "We were in trouble, and we were trying to get out of there. So Dave and I were evacuating our dead and wounded. We were running; there's no walking when you're under fire like that."

Bodies littered the trail and its side. Schreiner was used to that, but as the firing continued, something clicked in his mind when he and Forbus ran by one of the many corpses.

Schreiner didn't stop.
"That looked like
Bob!" he hollered to
Forbus.


"Now, don't you go back there!" Forbus responded.

With eyes misting, Schreiner kept running. "We got the ones out we were carrying," Forbus recalls. "He didn't go back. I wouldn't let him go back."

Later, Schreiner was told he was right.

The body was Bob Baumann's.
Two days later, according to a
dispatch by Marine Corps correspondent Don Petit, Schreiner was heroic
in grenade battles for two hills near
Naha. Petit wrote that Schreiner
twice charged up the hill and tossed
grenades into Japanese positions,
and the one hundred enemy soldiers
withdrew.

Eastment was severely wounded that day. "Dave Schreiner pulled me out of the line of fire," Eastment says. "He looked at the holes. He said I had four of 'em, so we thought that I'd been hit by four bullets. But

I found later, there were only two bullets that made the holes."

Eastment's fighting was over, and he hated leaving his men behind. Schreiner became company commander.

On June 18, Schreiner wrote to his parents, telling them: "Don't forget a company commander is a pretty safe spot."

But there was one more pocket of resistance on the southern end of the island.







Wisconsin Traditions

adger nickname

ne athletic teams' nickname (Badgers) as borrowed from the state. The territy was initially dubbed the "Badger" ate. The reason for the moniker was be because of badgers in this region, at instead because of an association at lead miners in the 1820s. Cospectors came to the state looking ar minerals. Without shelter in the inter, the miners had to "live like adgers" in tunnels burrowed into hill-des according to folklore.

Bucky Badger

Ladgers in various forms have been recognized as the school mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white striped sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by artist Art Evans. At that time, the badger went by names like Benny, Buddy, Bernie, Bobby and Bouncey. Art Lentz, the department's publicity director, had the idea to bring the mascot to life.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped his handlers. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was hired to mold a papermache badger head. Cheerleader Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A contest was staged to name the mascot. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or Bucky. The name came from the lyrics in a song which encouraged the football team to "buck right through that line."

Bucky Badger has persevered through the years, even surviving a threat by then assistant attorney general, Howard Koop, in 1973. He suggested that Bucky be replaced by Henrietta Holstein, a loveable cow. Koop argued that "kids love cows. A generation could grow up supporting the university and Henrietta Holstein." Koop's effort to overthrow Bucky failed.

Bucky even survived a cameo appearance by former Sports Illustrated writer Rick Telander. In preparation for a book about the department, Telander wore the Badger costume at a 1991 volleyball game. Telander overcame "terminal claustrophobia" in his first and only act as Bucky.

Bud song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've Said It All," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karmen for Budweiser beer commercials.

The song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. We had, just by accident, added this beer commercial to the tunes we play. I told the





Leckrone said the song became a otball tradition after a 1978 comeom-behind victory over Oregon. Visconsin was behind by three touchowns, and the crowd was really dead. I ayed the song to get everyone pepped . About 20 seconds after that, isconsin scored a TD. I played it ain, and we scored another touchown. From then on, the band could ever play enough 'Bud,'" said eckrone.

ifth Quarter

ne Wisconsin band has become mous for its post-game celebration alled the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, has sing, dance and cheer with the hand as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give the fans something to listen to on their way out, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience-participation activities.

Motion W

When Coach Barry Alvarez came to Madison, he decided that the helmet logo needed to be updated to signal a new era. He entertained 15-20 designs in 1990 before Rayovac artist Rick Suchanek developed the "Motion W," which originally included a tail at the back of the logo. Alvarez thought the tail was a bit much, but when it was removed, decided to go with it. The University bought the rights to the design, and the logo has been adopted by all other UW sports.

"On, Wisconsin"

The school's fight song was originally composed in 1909 by Chicago's William Purdy, and the words were


written by Carl Beck. Purdy and Beck had been fraternity brothers at Hamilton College (Clinton, N.Y.) and were roommates in Chicago. Purdy was going to submit the song for consideration to win a \$100 prize that the University of Minnesota was offering for a new football song. When Beck heard the music, he offered to write words and suggested that Purdy offer it to Wisconsin, where Beck had once studied. The song was an instant hit on campus and spread throughout the world.

Some 2,500 schools have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. "On, Wisconsin" was sung for the first time at the 1909 homecoming game vs. Minnesota.

The music was adapted by Band Director Michael Leckrone in 1969. The original version had been played virtually unchanged since its inception. "I got a lot of flak for the change," Leckrone said. "The old version was one you had to wait on. I wanted to generate immediate crowd reaction, so I stepped it up a bit."

Paul Bunyan Axe

The most-played rivalry in Division I-A football continues this fall when Wisconsin and Minnesota meet. The UW-UM series is the nation's oldest and has been played continuously since 1907. The game has alternated sites between the university campuses since 1946. Much prestige was always associated with the game, and the significance was emphasized with its place on the schedule. Between 1933 and 1982, the Wisconsin-Minnesota game was always the final regular-season contest for each school.



The series took an added twist in 1948 when more than state bragging rights were on the line. After a 16-0 setback that season, the Wisconsin letterwinners group, the National "W" Club, presented Minnesota with an axe wielded by Paul Bunyan. He was the mythical giant of midwestern lumber camps. Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song, "Varsity," was the 1934 brainstorm of then-band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to salute UW-Madison President Glenn Frank after each game.







uring the Barry Alvarez Era, Wisconsin home football games have become an extraordinary event. Alvarez has led the Badgers to a 51-28-3 home record, including undefeated home slates in the Rose Bowl seasons of 1993 and 1998. The UW has averaged more than 75,000 fans a game since 1993.

Those fans not only get to enjoy the action on the field, but they are also entertained by the nationally renowned Wisconsin Marching Band. Under the direction of Michael Leckrone, the UW Band performs impressive pre-game and halftime shows. The band is probably best known, however, for its "Fifth Quarter" post-game celebration. Fans typically remain in Camp Randall Stadium after games until the band's audience-participation gala is completed.

In addition, Bucky Badger and the UW Spirit Squads are always fan favorites. The entire atmosphere, which undoubtedly includes the best fans in the country, makes Saturdays at Camp Randall a unique experience.

This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$76 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8.500 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2003-04, the Big Ten distributed over \$115 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

- Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- Big Ten Universities host more than 70 Nobel laureates as faculty, students or researchers.
- Big Ten Universities enroll students of whom over 41 percent have graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class, while 74 percent graduated in the top quarter of their class.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

- The Big Ten Conference, with the unanimous support of its head football coaches, forwarded a recommendation to the NCAA Football Rules Committee last winter and was granted the right to experiment with instant replay on a one-year trial basis.
- The Big Ten Conference collected data from 68 televised football games in 2003. The study showed there would have been 42 replay opportunities in the 68 games, approximately .65 replays per game. The rate of reversal was 54 percent, or 23 of 42 reviews would have been overturned. On a base of 10,800 football plays in 2003, 8-12 plays (of the aforementioned 23) could have been viewed as having a significant affect on the game.
- The Big Ten instant replay model and the NFL instant replay system are different. In the Big Ten model, only the Big Ten Technical Advisor, working in the press box, can stop a game to review a play. Unlike the NFL model, in the Big Ten neither the coaches nor the game officials on the field may ask for a review.
- In order for a play to be changed the Technical Advisor must have indisputable video evidence that an error occurred. Television broadcast of the game will be the sole source of whether there is indisputable video evidence.
- The types of plays that are reviewable include plays that are governed by the sideline, goal line, end zone and end line, passing plays, and other detectable infractions, such as forward progress with respect to first down.
- Throughout the conference, the Big Ten had more than 8,500 student-athletes playing on over 270 teams in 2003-04. Those student-athletes received in excess of \$76 million in direct financial aid.
- Big Ten student-athletes graduate at a rate of 10 percent higher than all Division I student-athletes.
- The Big Ten recognized 1,894 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2003-04 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,500 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

- In the past 10 years (1994-95 through 2003-04), the Big Ten claimed 41 NCAA team championships including 25 since 1998-99.
- Big Ten athletic programs have won more than 185 team national championships and 1,100 individual NCAA titles. In 1999-00, the Conference celebrated six NCAA team titles (men's soccer, women's volleyball, wrestling, men's basketball, fencing, men's gymnastics), the most for the Big Ten in the last 10 years.




Martin continued his charitable support as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles where he won the team's 2000 Ed Block Courage Award.







or many players their football career ends when they graduate college. For the few that are talented and lucky enough, they can enjoy a few more years playing professionally. Former Badger offensive lineman, Paul Gruber has played football 15 of the last 20 years.

Following his collegiate career Gruber was the fourth overall pick in 1988 NFL Draft. After playing 12 years for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Gruber retired in 2000 and later moved to Colorado to enjoy the outdoors, his family and life.

Starting from his rookie season Gruber was an integral part of the Bucs' offense. He started all 16 regular season games in 10 of 12 seasons and set club records for games played and started (183). Lining up next to 12 different starting left guards, protecting 12 quarterbacks,





under the direction of four coaches, Gruber was regarded as the cornerstone of a franchise that didn't have a winning record until his 10th season.

Though playing in his own games has prevented him from returning to Camp Randall Stadium, Gruber credits the University of Wisconsin and the football program with helping him to where he is today.

"I think the process and some of the difficulties that you go through on a daily basis, just being at an institution with such high academic standards and graduating—going through that process prepared me," said Gruber. "Also, I think Dave McClain was a great role model. For me he was a role model for the way you conduct yourself."

Gruber was never voted to a Pro Bowl and like many offensive linemen, was not always the

most recognized player in the game. Still, when he announced his retirement then-Buccaneers head coach Tony Dungy had this to say

about him:

"You always
knew he was a
good player, very
solid ... and he
played the game
the same way
every time. When I
got here you saw
how he prepared
and played, and
you understood why

every game was the same. He did everything the same way and wouldn't allow himself to have a poor game."

Enjoying his retirement, Gruber works from home as an investor allowing plenty of time to explore the nature surrounding his home near Vail, Colo. Gruber and wife, Brenda, have three children, Blake (15), Chase (13) and Ashlyn (10), all of whom share his athletic and active lifestyle. With the mountains out their back door the Grubers enjoy skiing, snowshoeing, snowmobiling and hunting.

ntering this season, the expectations were high for the Wisconsin men's cross country team. The Badgers returned all of their finishers from a team that placed second at the 2003 NCAA Championship and added a healthy Matt Tegenkamp, a senior who earned two All-America honors before missing most of last season with an injury.

Thus far, UW has met those expectations. At last Sunday's Big Ten championship, the Badgers, currently ranked No. 1 in the country, cruised to the title, winning by a conference-record margin of 81 points. It was their sixth consecutive Big Ten championship. Junior Simon Bairu, sophomore Chris Solinsky and Tegenkamp finished 1-2-3 as Wisconsin's top six runners

placed among the top 13. UW's 23 total points were the fourth-lowest total in 90-year history of the event.

"I think the guys really performed well today. They did a great job," said UW coach Jerry Schumacher after the race. "You can never anticipate going 1-2-3 like that; that was really neat the way that worked out. We just went in to have our best performance, to have our best race today. I thought they did a great job."

For Bairu, it was his second consecutive individual title, joining Matt Downin, Tim Hacker and Don Gehrmann as the only Badger runners to accomplish that. A UW runner has now won six of the last seven Big Ten individual titles.

Solinsky, Tegenkamp and senior Josh Spiker, the sixth-place finisher,

> joined Bairu on the All-Big Ten first team. Junior Bobby Lockhart and sophomore Tim Nelson placed 11th and 13th, respectively, to earn second-team allconference honors.

> "Going into the race, we wanted to work together, help each other stay as relaxed as possible," said Bairu of the Badgers' lead trio. "The way I look at it, I was just fortunate to feel the best out of the three. I think on any given day, any one of us could have won it and I was fortunate enough to win it."

Up next for the Badgers is the NCAA Great Lakes Regional in Ypsilanti, Mich., on Nov. 13. UW has captured four of the last five regional titles, including the last two in a row.

After that, Wisconsin gets the shot it's been waiting for all season, the NCAA Championship.
After consecutive runner-

up finishes at the national meet, the Badgers hope they have the right blend of talent and experience to capture the fourth NCAA title in school history. The others were in 1982, 1985 and 1988. Coach Schumacher was a part of that 1998 champion.

"We're in an exciting position, being ranked No. 1 right now," Schumacher said. "We don't mind being in that position. If we were ranked 20th, we'd try do the same thing, which is go out there and run our best and see what happens. But we're really excited to head into this part of the season."

The Badger runners are very experienced at the NCAA meet, with 10 runners on the roster having competed at the national championships during their careers.

Tegenkamp, Spiker, Bairu, Lockhart and Solinsky have each earned All-America honors in the past.

Tegenkamp placed eighth in 2001 and 12th in 2002 before missing last year's race. Spiker was ninth in 2001, as was Bairu last year.

Solinksky earned a 15th-place finish as a freshman last year while Lockhart was 23rd in 2002.

"We have to work on some things for the upcoming NCAA championship," said Schumacher of his team. "I think if we keep working towards improving ourselves as a team, it should be a fun part of the end of the season for us."

The NCAA Championship will be held in Terre Haute, Ind., on Nov. 22. The men's race begins at 11 a.m.


"This is the start of the championship season," Tegenkamp said following the Big Ten meet. "We knew we were the strongest team here; all we had to do was just go out and run our race and we would have the team title.

"With what our team did today, I think it just shows how deep we are, how strong we are, and what we're capable of doing this year."



Michael Bennett, who had been placed on the injured list because of a sprained right knee for the first six weeks of the season, made his return on Sunday to the football field for the Minnesota Vikings.

In Week Seven of the NFL season. Bennett returned to the playing field against the Tennessee Titans. Although Bennett saw very limited action, it was a win for the former UW running back who carried the ball just once for no vards. Last week versus the Giants, Bennett carried the ball five times for 20 yards scoring on a 10-yard touchdown run.

The addition of Bennett to the star-studded Minnesota offense, featuring the likes of Duante Culpepper and Randy Moss, plans to add even more depth to one of the NFL's most potent backfield trios with rookie sensation Mewelde Moore and Onterrio Smith.

He also set the Vikings' record for the longest reception by a running back with an 80yard touchdown reception against Pittsburgh.

In his second season, Bennett played in all 16 games, accumulating 1,296 yards and five touchdowns, which earned him a trip to the Pro Bowl. He averaged 5.1 yards per carry and his longest run of the season was for 85 yards.

Playing in his third-year for the Vikings, Bennett was hampered with a foot injury which allowed him to play a total of eight games. On the season, Bennett had 90 carries totaling 447 yards and one touchdown.

Bennett is the first Badger ever drafted by the Vikings in the first round. You can see him in action this week on Monday Night Football against the Indianapolis Colts.

Two former Badger gridiron stars (Alan Ameche and Pat Richter) have been inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

To gain admittance to the Hall, student-athletes must be former Academic All-Americans who distinguished themselves off the playing field after graduation.

Ameche, who played professionally after graduation, retired in Philadelphia after his career and became one of the city's philanthropic leaders. Richter played profootball in Washington before returning to the UW to earn his law degree. He worked at a Madison law firm and at Oscar Mayer before his appointment as Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin.







ALAN AMECHE (1951-54): 1954 Heisman Trophy winner ... set NCAA career rushing mark (3,345)

KEN BOWMAN (1961-63): 10-year NFL career with Packers ... played in East-West Shrine Game

HOWARD "CUB" BUCK (1913-15): Labeled by some as the best lineman of his era ... consensus All-American

PAT HARDER (1941-42): Second pick in NFL draft ... MVP of *Chicago Tribune* College All-Star Game

ELROY "CRAZYLEGS" HIRSCH (1942): Set many receiving records with Rams ... eventually served as Badger A.D.

DAN LANPHEAR (1957-59): Madison native was a 1959 All-American before pro career with Oilers

ARLIE MUCKS, SR. (1914): All-American on gridiron and silver medalist at Olympics (discus)

PAT RICHTER (1960-62): Hall of Fame inductee both on field and in classroom ... former Badger A.D.

DAVE SCHREINER (1940-42): First twotime All-American ... three TD catches in one quarter still a school record

RON VANDER KELEN (1962): Passed for 401 yards vs. No. 1-ranked USC in the 1963 Rose Bowl

ROBERT "RED" WILSON (1946-49): Big Ten MVP in 1949 ... played baseball for the Chicago White Sox, Cleveland Indians and Detroit Tigers



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarter-back Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.





What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ...


You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.



Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative / booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost services;

b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile:

e) providing rent-free or reducedrent housing; f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) promising to provide any of the above;

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;
- Compensation for only work actually performed; and
- Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 


