Articles of Association

Know all men by these presents, that the undersigned, A. L. Sanborn, Charles A. Brown, and John M. Oliv, adult residents of the state of Wisconsin, do hereby make, sign and agree to following articles organization to-wit:

1. The undersigned have associated, and do hereby associate themselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation, under chapter 86 of the revised statutes of the State of Wisconsin for the year 1878, and the acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.
2. The name of said corporation shall be the Madison Park and Pleasure Drive Association, and its location shall be in the city of Madison Dane County Wisconsin
3. The business and purpose of this corporation shall be to open, extend, and improve park and pleasure drives in and about the city of Madison, in said Dane County.* It shall have power to acquire by purchase or gift, and to hold the legal title to lands to be used for this purpose.* It shall have the power to acquire by purchase or gift, and own all kinds of tools, machinery, and implements necessary to carry on the work of the corporation; and generally to do and perform any and all things whatsoever convenient or necessary, in or out of this state, in carrying on the business aforesaid, or any part thereof.
4. This corporation shall be formed without capital stock.
5. The general officers of said corporation shall be a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer, and the number of directors shall be five.
6. It shall be the duty of the president, and in his absence, of the vice president, to preside over all meetings of the corporation and of the directors of the corporation; and sign all deeds and instruments for the transfer, conveyance or assignment of any of the property of the corporation which may be directed to be

sold by the corporation, and all other instruments contracts and papers necessary or convenient in the transaction of the business of the corporation, except when some other officer, committee or person may be duly authorized thereto by the corporation, or by the board of directors.

7. The duty of the secretary shall be to be present at all meetings of the members and directors of said corporation; to keep a true and correct record of the proceedings of such meetings; he shall also sign all checks, drafts or orders for the payment of money, drawn by the corporation on its treasurer, and all deeds, and instruments for the sale, conveyance or transfer of any of the property of the corporation which it may sell or dispose of; and also to sign all contracts or instruments ordered to be made by the corporation or the board of directors; and generally to perform all duties incident to the office of secretary.

8. The treasurer shall have charge of all moneys and securities of the corporation: he shall keep a full and complete account of the moneys received and paid out by him, and of all other property of the corporation which shall come into his possession or to his knowledge and shall make to the board of directors, annually, and as often as required by said board of directors, full and complete reports thereof, accompanied with proper vouchers, and generally to perform all the duties incident to the office of treasurer.

9. The president of the corporation shall be ex-officio president of the board of directors and a member thereof and the secretary shall be ex officio the secretary of the board and a member thereof the other three members of the board of directors shall be chosen by the members of the corporation at their first meeting and thereafter at the annual meeting; said directors shall continue in office until their successors shall be elected. Three of said directors shall be a quorum, and the president, secretary and one of said directors, to be selected by the board of directors shall be the executive committee of said board and of the corporation.

10. In case of the absence, sickness, or disability of any of any of the ^{officers} general of the corporation, the board of

directors may supply his place by appointing a temporary officer, and any vacancy in the board of directors shall be filled by said board. The president may call special meetings of the corporation at any time he may see fit by notifying each member thereof. He may also upon the request of any five members of the corporation call such a meeting, and if he shall neglect or refuse to do so, such meetings upon such request, may be called by any member of the corporation. Either the president or the secretary may call special meeting of the board of directors, by giving notice to each member of the board, of the time and place of such meeting.

11. Persons may become members of said corporation by signing these articles of association and subscribing a sum of money for the objects and purposes of the corporation, and the by-laws shall fix the minimum annual sum that shall entitle one to membership.

The members of said corporation shall lose their right vote as such, upon their failing to renew or continue an annual subscription not less in amount than the minimum sum fixed by the constitution and by-laws of the association, and any member may be discharged or expelled as provided by law.

12. The first meeting of the corporation for the election of officers and directors shall be held on the 10th day of July, 1894, at ten o'clock in the forenoon thereof, at the club room of the Business Club of the city of Madison, in the city of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin.

On motion John M. Olin was elected chairman and chas A Brown secretary.

The articles of association were read.

Moved and carried that the articles of association be amended by striking out all that part of article III which gives the association power to acquire title to real estate, so that article III as amended shall read as follows:

(X) The business and purpose of this corporation shall be to open, extend, maintain and improve parks and pleasure drives in and about the city of Madison in said Dane County. It shall have power to acquire by purchase or gift and own all kinds of tools, machinery and implements necessary to carry on the work of the corporation and generally to do and perform any and all things whatsoever convenient or necessary, in or out of this state, in carrying on the business aforesaid, or any part thereof." (X)

Moved and carried that the articles of Association as amended be adopted.

The proposed by-laws of the Association were read by the secretary.

Moved and carried that there be added to the by-laws Article III a new section being known as section two immediately following section one, as follows:

"Section 2. If for any reason the officers shall not be elected at the regular annual meeting, then they may be elected at any special meeting called for that purpose. At any meeting of the stockholders seven members shall constitute a quorum."

Moved and carried that section two of article IV be amended by adding the words "or at any time at a weeks notice on request of any five members of the Association".

Moved and carried that the words "the directors or" in section one Article V be struck out.

Moved and carried that the By-Laws as amended be adopted, and they were adopted as follows:

"By-Laws of the Madison Park and Pleasure Drive Association"

Article I

Sec 1. Any person who shall subscribe to the articles of Association, and shall agree to contribute to the purposes of the Association a sum not less than twenty-five dollars per annum, shall become a member thereof, but shall lose his right to vote if he shall fail, on notice from the secretary, to renew his subscription on or before the first day of April, next succeeding the calendar year for which his subscription is made. The subscription for the present calendar year shall be paid one half forthwith and the balance on or before the first day of October 1894. After the present calendar year, one half the subscription for the calendar year shall be paid on or before April first, and the other one half on or before August first of each year. All persons subscribing shall be deemed to have assented to, and shall be governed by the laws of said Association.

Sec 2o. Membership in the Association shall entitle each person to one vote.

Article II

Sec. 1. The Annual meeting of the Association for the election of officers shall be held on the first Monday of March of each year. Each officer shall hold office until the next succeeding annual meeting of said Association or until his successor shall be elected.

Article III

Sec. 1. At the annual meeting of the Association the board of directors immediately after their election, shall select one of their members as a member of the executive committee, which person so selected, together with the president and secretary, shall constitute the executive committee thereof, and the members of such committee shall hold their office until the next annual of the Association or until their successors are chosen. Any vacancy in such executive committee may be filled by the board of directors. Any two of such executive committee shall constitute a quorum.

Sec 2. If for any reason the officers shall not be elected at the regular annual meeting then they may be elected at any special meeting called for that purpose. At any meeting of the stockholders seven members shall constitute a quorum.

Sec 3. The Association or board of directors, at any meeting may determine how the money of the Association shall be expended, but in case such determination is not made by the board of directors or the association, the executive committee shall make such appropriation of the funds of the Association to the purposes of the Association as to it shall seem proper, but subject at all times to the control of the board of directors or of the Association

Sec 4. The executive committee shall have charge of the work done by the Association, and shall employ such labor and purchase such tools, machinery and materials as shall be necessary and proper for carrying out the purposes of the Association, and shall have power at any time to discharge any person in the employment of the Association

Article IV

Sec 1. No money shall be paid out except on warrant on the treasurer, signed by the secretary, and countersigned by the president of the association.

Sec 2. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to make, one week before the annual meeting of the association, a report in writing of the work done and money expended, by them during the year, or at any time, at a weeks notice on request of any five members of the association.

Sec 3. It shall be the duty of the secretary of the association to make a detailed report, as such secretary to the board of directors of the association, at least one week before the annual meeting.

Sec 4. It shall be the duty of the treasurer of the association to make, one week before the annual meeting a detailed report in writing to the board of directors showing all receipts and expenditures of the money of the association during the year.

Sec 5. It shall be the duty of the board of directors to examine such reports, and lay the same before the members of the association at its annual meeting, and such board of directors shall make its report to the association at such meeting.

Article V

Sec 1. Any by-law or any part of any by-law may be suspended for any meeting of its members of the association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

Sec 2. These by-laws may be amended at the annual meeting of the association, or any special meeting of the association called for that purpose."

Whereas, the directors are assured that their action in establishing pleasure drives have received the hearty approval of the general public; and,

Whereas, it has been in the past, and will be in the future, the aim of the directors to locate drives without respect to private benefits, or imaginary damages, to the persons owning lands through which such drives are located; and,

Whereas, the directors have sought to locate such drives solely for public benefit, whereby the manifold and unsurpassed beauties of Madison's environment might be unfolded for the education and enjoyment of our citizens and of students, and of "strangers within our gates;" and,

Whereas, the directors being mindful of the attractive environments of the north and south shores of Lake Monona, offering additional opportunities to unfold the most charming of landscape and water scenic effects, to an extent challenging the attractions of any drive yet constructed and fully agreeing with the remark made by Hon. Marvin Houghitt, president of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Co, that he "doubted if we fully appreciated the benefits Madison would derive by establishing a system of drives around our lakes," therefore be it,

Resolved, that it is the sense of the directors of the Madison Park and Pleasure Drive Association that a pleasure drive should be secured around and along the shores of Lake Monona.

Resolved further, that during the present season the right of way for such a drive be secured, if possible, and that a contract for such right way be entered into in writing between this Association and the owners of the land through which such drives shall pass. The president and secretary of this Association are hereby authorized to enter into such contracts on behalf of the Association.

Resolved, further, that in case such right of way should be

secured during the present year, then it is the sense of this board that said dam should be constructed during the year 1900.

Resolved further, that the State Journal and Madison Democrat be invited to publish foregoing preamble and resolutions as a notice to the owners, or interested, property holders, abutting the shores of Lake Monona, inviting their co operation with this association, and requesting that they severally notify Charles N. Brown, secretary of this Association, concerning the granting of rights of way for the purpose named.



Contract

It is hereby agreed on this 10th day of December, 1896 by and between William Woodard, and John Woodard, and Lucy Woodard, his wife, all of the town of Westport, Dane County, Wis., parties of the first part, and the Madison Park & Pleasure Drive Association, an organized under the laws of Wisconsin, and located at Madison, Wis., party of the second part, as follows:

Whereas, said parties of the first part are the owners of certain lands in said town of Westport, the said William Woodard being the owner of the legal title to a portion of said lands, and the said John Woodard being the owner of the legal title to the other part of said lands, and said Lucy Woodard, his wife, having an inchoate right of dower in and to the lands owned by the said John Woodard, through which lands, so owned by said parties, it is desired to construct a road for park and pleasure drive purposes,

Now, Therefore, said parties of the first part hereby agree with the party of the second, and its successor or successors, for the consideration herein expressed, to give and dedicate to the public for the public use for park and pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes only, a strip of land of the width and located and described as follows: Commencing at a point on the town line between the said town of Westport and town of Madison, in said county, 443 feet east from an iron stake in edge of the top of the ^{bank}, next to the waters of Lake Mendota, in said county, where a wooden stake has already been driven, a strip of lands three rods in width, extending from said points along and across section thirty-six, in said town of Westport, to the waters edge of said Lake Mendota, to a point where a stake has heretofore been placed, the center line of said piece of land being along the line of stakes heretofore placed on said land for the purpose of locating said line of said road.

From the point where said line of road comes to the waters edge, as above described, the land for said park and pleasure driving, riding, and walking purposes shall consist of a strip of land three rods in width, extending from said point northwesterly along the waters edge of Lake Mendota to the section line between sections thirty-five and thirty-six, in the said town of Westport, the center line of said last described strip of land being twenty-four feet and nine inches from the waters edge of Lake Mendota at an ordinary

stage of water, excepting, however, a strip of land about fifteen rods in width, more or less, on the water front of said lake, owned by one H Verhuseen.

From the said section line between said section thirty-six and thirty-five, in said town of Westport, west to the Asylum grounds, in said section thirty-five, owned by the State of Wisconsin, said land for park and pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes shall consist of and include a strip of land three rods in width, the south two rods of which shall comprise, so far as the same has been laid out across said tract of land, the road or avenue heretofore dedicated and platted by said William Woodard, as part of Woodward Grove.

It being the intention of the said parties of the first to agree to dedicate to the public, for the uses and purposes above named, the land above described, so as to furnish for the public, for said purposes, a continuous strip of land from said point of beginning, to the town, ^{line} between Westport and Madison to said Asylum grounds, excepting a strip of land so owned by said Verhuseen. And said parties of the first part agree further that in case they, or either of them, shall become the owner or owners of said strip of land, so owned by said Verhuseen, they agree to dedicate to the public, for park and pleasure drive purposes, a strip of land across the same, of the same width as the road on either side of the same, and so as to form a continuous drive between the said town of Madison, at the said point of beginning, as above described, and the said Asylum grounds.

The foregoing agreement is upon and in consideration of the following terms and conditions:

First. That the said party of the second part shall see that Halle Steensland, of the city of Madison, in said Dane County shall dedicate to the public, for public use for park and pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes only, a strip of land of sufficient width for a pleasure drive, described as follows: Beginning at a point in the public highway, called the Westport road, just east of the point where said highway crosses the tracks of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, in the town of Madison, in said county, extending thence westerly to the water edge of Lake Mendota, including the road heretofore constructed by said Steensland, now in use, and thence through and over the land of said Steensland, in section one, in said town of Madison

along and over some road to be hereafter designated by said Steensland, but so located as to make a proper and suitable connection with said road to be constructed over the lands of the said parties of the first part, at the beginning thereof on the line between said towns of Westport and Madison; but in case a pleasure drive is laid out along or near the waters of Lake Mendota between what is known as the Fuller woods, in section one of said town of Madison, and the land owned by said Steensland in said section one, in said town of Madison, then said road from said Westport road west to the water's edge of said Lake Mendota as above described, it is not to be considered as any condition or part of this agreement.

Second: That a road for pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes shall be constructed over the land owned by said parties of the first part, and put in good condition for travel for pleasure driving purposes on or before August 1st 1897, which road said party of the second part hereby agrees and binds itself to build on or before the time named, at its own expense, in case it can secure similar agreements from said Steensland, his heirs or assigns, and said A. Veerhusen, his heirs or assigns as to right of way for pleasure driving purposes over said lands owned by said Steensland and Veerhusen respectively.

Third: That said party of the second part shall, as a part of this agreement, construct two bridges of sufficient height and dimensions to permit of the easy passage of cattle under the same, one of said bridges to be built on said section thirty-six, on the land owned by said John Woodard, at a point where said road crosses the ravine in a grove of standing timber, on said section thirty-six, and the other of said bridges to be constructed on the land of William Woodard, in section thirty-five, at the point where said road crosses a ravine on said land in said section thirty-five.

Fourth: That said road through the said land owned by said parties of the first part shall be constructed before and work shall be done on that part of the road which is to pass through the lands owned by said Steensland.

Fifth: That said drive through the land owned by said Steensland if said drive is secured, shall be constructed and put in good condition for pleasure driving by said party of the second part, at its own expense, on or before November 1, 1897.

Sixth: That the duty and burden of maintaining said pleasure

drive across the lands so owned by the said parties of the first part,^{after}, the same have been constructed, as above stated, shall not rest upon the parties of the first part, their heirs or assigns: but in case such pleasure drive, after the same shall have been so constructed, shall not be maintained in reasonable condition for pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes, for any continuous period of three months, between the first of May and the first of November, of any year, then the same shall be considered abandoned, and said parties of the first part, their heirs and assigns, shall have the right to close up such part of said drive as shall pass over the lands so owned by them, as above described.

Seventh: Said party of the second part agrees to use its best efforts to secure a road along the northern edge of what is known as the Fuller woods, in section one, of said town of Madison, west to the lake, and thence along or near the waters of Lake Mendota to the land owned by said Steensland, as above described, and also agrees to use its best efforts to secure the macadamizing of what is known as Sherman Avenue, from the point where Gorman street is now macadamized to the bridge crossing the Catfish, at the point where once was situated the Robbins & Ballyell mill; and when said Sherman Ave shall have been so macadamized than said party of the second part agrees further to use its best efforts to secure the macadamizing of the Westport road from said Catfish bridge to the north side of Fuller's woods, the desire being on the part of the parties of the first part, to secure a road from the city of Madison through, to, and upon the Asylum grounds, that shall be in good condition for pleasure driving at all times of the year, when such driving is desirable.

Eighth: If at any time, a drive is constructed on and across the said Asylum grounds, so as to connect with the west end of said pleasure drive, across said lands of said party of the first part, such connection shall be made only upon the express condition that said drive shall be used for pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes only, except such uses that are directly connected with Asylum property on the part of the agents of the State, and if, at any time, such drive should be used for any other, or different, purpose, then the said parties of the first part reserve the right to shut up said pleasure at the point where the said connection may be made.

Contract between Halle Steensland and Association

It is hereby agreed that on this 8th day of February 1897, by and between Halle Steensland and Sophia Steensland, his wife, of city of Madison, Dane Co. Wisconsin parties of the first part and the Madison Park and Pleasure Drive Association, a corporation organized under the laws of Wisconsin, and located at Madison Wisconsin, party of the second part, as follows:

Whereas Halle Steensland is the owner of the legal title of certain lands in Section one, in the town of Madison, Dane County Wisconsin in which said Sophia Steensland, his wife, has an inchoate right of dower, and through which said lands so owned by said parties of the first, it is desired to construct a road for park and pleasure driving purposes,

Now, therefore, said parties of the first, ^{and} hereby agree with party of the second part, and its successor or successors, for the consideration herein expressed, to give and dedicate to the public for the public use for park and pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes only, a strip of land of the width and located and described as follows: commencing at a point in what is known as the Westport road just east of the place where the railway tracks of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company crosses said Westport road, extending thence to the water's edge of Lake Mendota over the right of way two rods in width owned by said Halle Steensland, as provided in and by a certain deed executed by him to the Kutz & Haegle Ice Company, recorded in volume 155 of Deeds page 391, in the office of the register of deed for Dane County, Wis., and in a certain agreement and plat thereto attached, between said Halle Steensland and said Kutz & Haegle Ice Company, which agreement and plat were recorded in the office of the register of deeds for Dane County Wisconsin October 26th, 1895, on page 504 of Miscellaneous Records for said county: thence, from the westerly end of said Dane County right of way so described in said plat, a strip of land forty feet in width along the lake shore of Lake Mendota to the boat house owned by said Halle Steensland; thence northerly along the fence to a point directly opposite a line drawn due east and west from the east end of Second Avenue, in said plat of Steensland; thence west along said line to point forty feet west of the east end of said Second Avenue: thence north along and over the east forty feet of lot one, in block eight, of said plat of Steensland to Third Avenue; thence westerly along and over Third Avenue to Capitol Avenue; thence northerly along and over Capitol Avenue to Northwest Avenue; thence along and over said Northwest Avenue toward the lake to opposite, or about opposite

the northeasterly end of Second Avenue, and thence in a suitable curving line, substantially the same as walked over and indicated by John M. Oliv, in company with Halle Steensland, on Tuesday January 19, 1897, to a point on Bay Avenue, about opposite the line between lots six and seven, in block ten, of said plat of Steensland, or to a point southeast of said line between said lots, such distance as may hereafter be agreed upon between said Steensland and Wayne Ramsay and Burr W. Jones, of the city of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, and thence to Bay Avenue, thence along and over said Bay Avenue to the end thereof, and thence from the end of said Bay Ave. in a curving line easterly and then northerly so as to connect with drive to be laid across the land of said Woodard as hereinafter mentioned said right of way over the lands of said Steensland to be forty feet in width. It being the intention of said parties of the first part to agree to dedicate to the public for the uses and purposes above named, the lands above described, but it is further understood and agreed between both parties to this agreement that said right of way to be so dedicated by said parties of the first part, their heirs and assigns, it is to be used as and for pleasure driving, walking and riding purposes, and not for heavy traffic, except such as may be necessary to the reasonable use of the premises adjoining, or premises owned by said Halle Steensland, his heirs and assigns, in section one.

The foregoing agreement is made upon and in consideration of the following terms and conditions:

First: That said party of the second part shall see that John P. Woodard and William Woodard, of the town of Westport Dane County, Wisconsin, dedicate to the public for public use for park and pleasure driving and walking and riding purposes only, a strip of land three rods in width, described as follows: Commencing at a point on the town line between said town of Westport and the town of Madison, in said county, four hundred forty-three feet east from an iron stake in the edge of the top of the bank next to the waters of Lake Mendota, in said county, where a wooden stake has already been driven, a strip of land three rods in width, extending from said point along and across section thirty six, in said town of Westport, to the waters edge of Lake Mendota, at a point where a stake heretofore been placed the center line of said piece of land being along the line

of stakes heretofore placed on said land for the purpose of locating said line of said road.

From the point where said line of road comes to the waters edge as above described, the land for said park and pleasure driving riding and walking purposes shall consist of a strip of land three rods in width, extending from said point northwesterly along the waters edge of Lake Mendota to the section line between sections thirty-six and thirty-five, in said town of Westport, the center line of said last described strip of land being twenty-four feet and nine inches from the waters edge of Lake Mendota, at an ordinary stage of water.

From the said section line between said sections thirty-six and thirty-five, in said town of Westport, west to the Asylum grounds, in said section thirty-five, owned of the State of Wisconsin, said land for park and pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes shall consist of and include a strip of land three rods in width, the south two rods of which shall comprise so far as the same has been laid out across said tract of land, the road or avenue heretofore dedicated and platted by said William Woodard, as part of Woodward Grove.

Second: That said road through the said land owned by said John P. Woodard and William Woodard shall be constructed before any work shall be done on that part of the road which is to pass through the lands owned by said Halle Steensland.

Third: That said drive through the land owned by said Halle Steensland shall be constructed and put in good condition for pleasure driving by said party of the second part, at its own expense on or before November 1, 1897.

Fourth: It is further understood that said party of the second part shall cause to be constructed, at some point to be designated by said Halle Steensland, along said drive east of Second Avenue which extends over the unplatted land of said Steensland, a proper culvert for hogs and calves to pass under, and that it will also cause to be built across the ravine next to John P. Woodard's land, a suitable culvert under which cattle and horses can freely pass.

Fifth: It is further understood and agreed between all of the parties hereto, and as one of the conditions hereof, but in case said Steensland should fill up his marsh that adjoins the westerly end of said drive over said Kurz & Haegle Ice Company's land, said right of way, so far as it extends over said marsh, may, if so desired by said Steensland, be moved from the waters edge of said Lake Mendota not to exceed two hundred feet, exclusive of the roadway, which is

also to be filled by said Steensland, with the further understanding and agreement that in case a driveway for pleasure driving purposes is constructed along the waters edge or along the edge of the bank of said Lake Mendota across the land of said Kutz & Haegle Ice Company, which lies just south of the land owned by said Steensland, then said driveway is not to be charged by said Steensland.

Sixth: This agreement is made upon the condition that certain parties, (excepting the Osborne heirs) to whom said Steensland has heretofore sold lots, in the plat of Steensland in said section one, shall sign an agreement releasing all their right, title and interest in a certain right of way two rods in width, which extends east from a certain monument on the division line between lots one and two to the public highway known as the Westport road, all in section one, township seven, north of range nine east, Dane County, Wisconsin, which right of way is described in a certain deed conveyed by said Halle Steensland to A.B. Van Slyke and recorded in volume 134 on page 308, in the office of the register of deeds for said Dane county.

In pursuance of our talk held this morning, will you please drop me a line to the effect that in case the public desire the proposed pleasure drive, as it passes through your land, in sec 1. town of Madison, to be three rods in width, instead of forty feet, as heretofore agreed upon, and that the extra nine and one-half can be had for the same purposes, and on the same conditions as the forty feet, on payment to you of \$200: the extra nine and one half feet to be added upon the northerly and easterly side of said drive, and not on the southerly or westerly side of said proposed drive

Contract between John P Woodard et al. and the Madison Park Pleasure Drive Association as to the right of way connected with overhead bridge.

This Indenture, Made this 31st day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety seven, between William Woodard, widower, and John Woodard and Lucy Woodard, his wife, all of the town of Westport, Dane County Wisconsin, parties of the first part, and the Madison Park & Pleasure Drive Association, an organization organized under the laws of Wisconsin, and located at Madison. His party of the second part:

Whereas, said party of the second part has constructed a pleasure drive extending from the city of Madison along the northeastern shore of Lake Mendota to and upon what is known as the asylum grounds; and

Whereas, it is desired by said party of the second part to secure a connection for park and pleasure driving purposes between the drive so constructed, as above stated, and the Westport road lying east thereof; and

Whereas: said land passes through the land owned by the parties of the first part in section thirty-six, township eight north range nine east, Dane County Wisconsin; and

Whereas: said parties of the first part have heretofore granted to Frank M Wootton and Addie B McGowan, a right of way two rods in width extending from what is known as the Westport road west to the lake, along the town line between the towns of Madison and Westport, in said Dane county;

Now, Therefore, in consideration of said Frank M Wootton and Addie B McGowan having, heretofore, given up and surrendered said right of way, and agreed to abandon the same; and in further consideration of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company having, heretofore, agreed to construct an overhead crossing, across its tracts and right of way, in the southwest quarter of the south east quarter of said section thirty-six, in said township eight north of range nine east, Dane county, Wisconsin, which strip of land is described as follows: namely: Commencing in the center of said pleasure drive heretofore constructed by the said party of the second part across said section thirty-six at a point five hundred seventy feet north from said town line between said towns of Madison

and Westport, extending thence easterly along a line of stakes heretofore set to right of way of the said Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, and thence across said right of way and tracks over said overhead bridge to be constructed by said railway company, and thence easterly across the remaining portion of the south east quarter of said section thirty-six to Westport road, along a line of stakes heretofore set, which line of stakes, on both sides of said railway tracks and right of way, marks the center line of said three rod strip of land, so dedicated by the parties of the first part, said strip of land to be used for park and pleasure driving, riding and walking purposes, but not for heavy traffic, except such as may be reasonably necessary for the proper use and management of the lands owned by the said parties of the first part, their grantees and assigns, through which said road passes.
