Inclusion in the Association of American Universities and a Rose Bowl championship in 1994 proves that academics and athletics do indeed mix at the UW-Madison.







Situated among gentle rolling hills and wooded areas between Lakes Mendota and Monona is the 900-acre University of Wisconsin campus. Located in the state's capital city, Madison, the UW campus is one of the nation's most picturesque.

Filmmakers have selected the campus as the location for films about college life; one was the 1986 summer hit *Back to School* with Rodney Dangerfield.

In the fall of 1993, MTV included UW-Madison as one of four campuses to feature during its "Guide to Higher Education" tour.

There are many famous landmarks on campus, including tree-

lined Bascom Hill, North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise Hall (the tallest building on campus) and Picnic Point (a 129-acre peninsula used by joggers, walkers and bikers). One of the best loved and most visited areas of the campus is the Memorial Union Terrace, where students sit and study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, sailboards and swimmers enjoying Lake Mendota.

Wisconsin students include some of the nation's foremost scholastic achievers. The diversification of the student body and its campus life make the UW a truly special educational experience.

BIG TEN COUNTRY




Madison (population 196,053) is home to both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital. The city was designed so that the university and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of academics and politics.

One of the Midwest's most vibrant communities, Madison offers an endearing quality of life to both its residents and students.

The centerpiece of the city is the State Capitol. The campus is west of the Capitol and offers easy access to shopping malls, restaurants for every taste and popular night spots.

With a diverse population of




nearly 200,000, Madison offers the unique combination of big-city excitement and small-town charm. Madison is an action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, sports, arts and recreation.

Madison was listed as the second most livable city in the United States in a 1993 *Money* magazine survey.

Besides the UW Athletic Department, the city offers a large quantity and high quality of sports activities. *Outside* magazine ranked Madison as one of the top 15 sports towns in the nation several years ago.

MADISON



The nation's No. 2 city

Madison was listed second on *Money* magazine's 1993 list of the nation's most livable cities. Following are excerpts from the magazine's seventh annual survey.

"A popular t-shirt sold in Madison describes the state capital and home of the University of Wisconsin as the 'alternative to reality.' That's about right. Madison, which has ranked in our top 10 for the past three years, offers special attractions."

"Madison's awesome beauty and laid-back style appeal to most everyone. Walk along State Street's thriving pedestrian mall and you'll see the elderly on bicycles anduppies and hippies moving around the street vendors, New Age stores and coffee shops."

"For a relatively small city, Madison offers a number of surprises. For example, you can find Caribbean, Ethiopian, Thai and more than 20 other reasonably priced types of ethnic restaurants."



THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Wisconsin, founded in 1849, has been recognized as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, with many departments ranked among the nation's top 10.

Nobel Prize-winning research, a liberal tradition of shared governance and a diverse student body have given UW-Madison a worldwide reputation. Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly pursuit since 1910.

In the most extensive study on graduate level education of its kind, the *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States* rated Wisconsin tied for eighth (with UCLA and Michigan) for its academic quality. The other schools in the Top 10 were Cal, Stanford, Harvard, Yale, M.I.T., Princeton and Chicago.

Political atmosphere

Because of its roots in Wisconsin legislation, UW-Madison has always maintained close links with the state. With the passage of a federal act in 1862, it became one of the nation's first land grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life sciences.

Physical setting

UW-Madison is considered one of the most beautiful college campuses in the country, lying as it does along the shore of Lake Mendota. There are five lakes in the Madison area, two of which — Mendota and Monona — form an isthmus on which the State Capitol building sits.

Academic leader

The UW has been a leader in

many areas. Among the breakthroughs at UW: establishing the first academic programs in the U.S. for Scandinavian Studies (1875), Psychology (1888), Agricultural Economics (1909), Genetics (1910) and Wildlife Management (1939); launching the world's first space observatory; conducting the first bone marrow transplant in the United States; operating the nation's first radio station (WHA) in 1917; discovering Vitamins A and B; and finding evidence to link cancer with saccharine and cyclamates.

Student body

From an initial enrollment of 17, the student population has grown to more than 40,000, making it fifth-largest among public four-year institutions. Although almost 80 percent of the students come from Wisconsin — representing every county of the state — Madison's isthmus is truly an international community. Students come from more than 115 countries, and the UW ranks fifth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment (over 3,000).

Faculty

The UW-Madison faculty routinely wins national citations for teaching excellence, research and service. Much of the university's international reputation comes from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW faculty and alumni have accounted for 12 Nobel and 17 Pulitzer Prizes.

One of the nation's leading institutions for higher learning, the UW-Madison includes 11 schools, 133 academic departments, 17,340 employees and a \$1.2 billion budget. Majors are offered in 156 bachelors, 184 masters and 125 doctoral programs.




Department rankings

■ The School of Education is ranked No. 1 in the nation, according to a study conducted at the University of Illinois in 1990. In departmental rankings, Wisconsin placed second in educational administration and policy studies.

■ *U.S. News & World Report's* annual graduate school rankings, published in 1993, ranked UW-Madison in the top 12 of six science programs. The rankings were: computer science (tied for eighth), biology (tied for ninth), chemistry (10th), nursing (tied for 11th), health services administration (tied for 12th) and engineering (12th). Additionally, the magazine rated the UW's sociology department No. 1 in the nation.

■ The School of Business' MBA program ranks in the top five percent among all schools in a 1993 *U.S. News & World Report* survey. The school's real estate program ranks third and the

risk management program ranks fourth, the publication added.

■ Scholarly output by the marketing faculty ranks first in the nation according to a 1988 study in *Review of Business and Economic Research*. Faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication were ranked No. 1 in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by *Journalism Quarterly*.

■ UW Hospitals and Clinics is among the leading transplant centers in the nation. In 1993, *U.S. News and World Report* ranked the hospital among the top three percent in the U.S.

■ The plant pathology department tied for first with the University of California-Davis in a 1986 study by the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences.

■ The forestry department was the top research department in the country in 1986, according to the *Department of Agriculture*.

UW-Madison facts

Five stars for academics. The *Fiske Guide to Colleges* 1993 gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of just eight public universities to receive the five-star rating.

Top 10 rankings. The *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States*, the most comprehensive and recent survey conducted, ranked 15 departments in the top 10 in the nation. Sociology, German, chemical engineering and geography were ranked No. 1 or 2 in the nation, according to the 1983 study.

Leading executives. The university produced the third-highest percentage of CEOs at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies according to a 1987 *Wall Street Journal* survey. A 1992 *Standard & Poor's* survey ranks UW-Madison second for executives with undergraduate degrees.

First in private support. With gifts totaling more than \$128 million in 1990-91, UW-Madison is the leading public institution in gaining private support and sixth among all U.S. higher education institutions.

Total quality management. Wisconsin-Madison is a pioneer in the application of total quality management to higher education. The University was a runner-up in the 1993 Rochester Institute of Technology / *USA Today* Quality Cup Competition.

Scientists cited third most. UW-Madison scientists are the third-most frequently cited scientists in the world, according to a 1983 study by the *Surveys of Science Resource Series*.



The primary objective of the Department of Academic and Student Affairs office is to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes. Counseling and advising services, plus a number of academic help programs, are offered to all student-athletes at the University.



The academic and student affairs staff is available to assist the UW's 700 student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitor progress toward degrees, offer career guidance and serve as valuable resource people.

Staff members work with student-athletes who desire extra academic help. The department utilizes the services of more than 100 tutors to provide one-on-one assistance or group study help.

The department arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and coordinates the grant-in-aid program. Support groups are offered to students who become medically or academically ineligible for competition.




Football in the Big Ten Conference and at the University of Wisconsin is something special. Playing in one of the most prestigious conferences, whose crowds are large and enthusiastic, is what Wisconsin football is all about.

Followers of Big Ten football are the nation's most dedicated, evidenced by the string of 34 consecutive seasons that the league has ranked first or second nationally in attendance.

Located in the state capital of Madison, Camp Randall Stadium on a fall day is one of the most picturesque backdrops for college football. The Stadium is surrounded by wooded residential areas and is within walking distance of Lake Mendota.

Six times this fall, Madison will host exciting Big Ten football. Besides competitive gridiron action, fans enjoy some of the most entertaining pre-game tailgating in the nation and a post-game band celebration called the "Fifth Quarter" that is unrivaled.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

From its beginning almost 100 years ago, the Big Ten Conference continues to be recognized as one of the premier athletic leagues in the nation. In a time when consistent excellence is difficult to maintain, the Big Ten continues to be a showcase for the finest achievements in athletics and academics.

On-field success

Big Ten football has produced 10 national champs, 261 consensus all-Americans, 69 academic all-Americans and 12 Heisman Trophy winners, more than any conference in the nation. The league has enjoyed 51 bowl teams in the last decade, an average of 5.1 per year. That includes a record seven bowl teams in 1993.

Tradition

For the 99th season, Big Ten football teams will take to the field in pursuit of a conference championship. The league's storied history is built around legendary players and coaches like Red Grange, Tom Harmon, Alan Ameche, Nile Kinnick, Archie Griffin, Hopalong Cassidy, Crazylegs Hirsch, Desmond Howard, Dick Butkus,

Woody Hayes, Bo Schembechler and Joe Paterno. Wisconsin's Big Ten history includes championships in the first two (1896 and 1897) and most recent (1993) seasons of gridiron action.

Attendance

In the 32 years that the NCAA has maintained attendance records, the Big Ten has ranked among the top



two conferences nationally every season. On any given weekend during the fall, several hundred thousand football fans fill stadiums around the Midwest. The Big Ten was the first league to draw more than four million fans in one season (1985).

Six conference teams ranked in the nation's top 20 for average attendance in 1993, including the Badgers' climb to No. 10. Wisconsin, in fact, had the nation's largest attendance increase (14,129) over 1992.

Academics

In nearly every field imaginable, Big Ten faculty and students are on the cutting edge of formulating new knowledge. The Big Ten is the only league in the nation whose entire membership is included in the American Association of Universities, a group of elite academic institutions.

Exposure

More evidence of Big Ten football's popularity is found in the consistently high TV ratings and number of appearances. With bowl bids secured for its top four finishers — Rose (champion), Florida Citrus (second), Holiday (third) and Hall of Fame (fourth) — the league has one of the best post-season arrangements.

With Penn State's recent addition to the conference, the Big Ten features 11 institutions in eight states and reaches into such metropolitan areas as Chicago, Detroit, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Cincinnati, Columbus, Indianapolis, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh.


With its founding principles as the guiding force, the Big Ten will continue to be a national leader.

Playing college football in the Big Ten and at the University of Wisconsin is an opportunity for success, excitement and exposure.


Badger football is unique with its intense media coverage. Among the many media outlets that cover UW football are three local television stations, three radio stations, four major newspapers — two in Madison and two in Milwaukee — two student papers and a specialty publication dedicated solely to Wisconsin sports.

Coach Barry Alvarez, Badger players and the Wisconsin team were featured in nearly every major metropolitan newspaper during their Rose Bowl run of 1993. Additionally, Wisconsin was covered in *Sports Illustrated* four times last fall and reported on extensively in the electronic media as well. In fact, the Badgers were on ABC


or ESPN television a school-record seven times.

All games are broadcast on a state-wide radio network. Home games are replayed on television each week. Alvarez has a weekly media session that routinely draws 20 reporters, plus TV and radio shows that are heard in all corners of the state.

Part of the exposure for Wisconsin football is related to its schedule. Besides the highly competitive Big Ten slate, the Badgers have games scheduled in the next several seasons with Colorado, Syracuse, UNLV and Stanford plus a trip to Hawaii in 1996.




■ The Wisconsin Radio Network carries all Badger games, along with the Barry Alvarez Radio Show, on a state-wide network.






The University of Wisconsin recruits its football players from all over the United States.

Although the majority of the squad comes from Wisconsin, the Badgers feature players from 17 other states.



TRADITION

- Wisconsin played its first football game on Nov. 23, 1889 against the Calumet Club
- The Badgers gained their first football victory, a 106-0 shutout over UW-Whitewater, in 1890
- Phil King's club won the first-ever Big Ten football championship (1896)
- The "Hard Rocks" team of 1951 led the nation in total defense, set five Big Ten records and saw its defense

- Fullback Alan "The Horse" Ameche won the school's lone Heisman Trophy in 1954
- The second-ranked Badgers staged a furious fourth quarter rally but fell to No. 1 USC 42-37 in the 1963 Rose Bowl
- Wisconsin won its first Rose Bowl in 1993 en route to a 10-1-1 record, the winningest season in history

The University of Wisconsin football program has a tradition which dates back to 1889 when the UW played its first game. From winning the first two football titles in Big Ten history (1896 and 1897) to the storybook Rose Bowl championship of 1993, Badger football has much lore.


Tradition is measured over the long haul, and Wisconsin has had its share of outstanding teams and star performers.

Alan "The Horse" Ameche won the 1954 Heisman Trophy ... **Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch** led UW to the mythical national championship in 1942 and later served as Athletic Director ... **Pat "The Kangaroo Kicker" O'Dea**, arguably the best drop kicker in history, had a 62-yard field goal among his successes ... linemen "Cub" Buck, "Butts" Butler, "Tubby" Keeler and "Red" Weston were among the Badgers that made all-America teams prior to the 1920s ... **Billy Marek** was a three-time 1,200-yard rusher in the mid-1970s ... **Pat Richter** and **Ron Vander Kelen** were one of the most prolific pass combinations of their era ... **Brent Moss** had 11 straight 100-yard rushing games in the Rose Bowl season of 1993.

Who will be the future stars of Badger football? Like all traditions, time will tell.

CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

Camp Randall Stadium, built in

1917, is the home for Wisconsin's football team. The 77,745-seat facility is among the nation's top dozen largest college-owned stadiums.

The facilities

Distinguished by its impressive double-deck structure and horseshoe design, Camp Randall Stadium has been the Badgers' gridiron facility since its opening game on Nov. 3, 1917. Camp Randall Stadium has hosted 410 Badger football games and attracted more than 18 million fans.

Besides the playing field, Camp Randall houses the athletic department offices, lounge and study areas for athletes, film, training and weight rooms and a display of Badger football memorabilia.

The Stadium is the centerpiece of Wisconsin's athletic complex. Located on the same block on the west side of campus are the Dave McClain Athletic Facility, the Badgers' state-of-the-art indoor practice building, and the Wisconsin Field House.


The history

Camp Randall Stadium and its grounds have a rich history prior to its affiliation with Wisconsin athletics.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the Wisconsin Agricultural Society, which held its annual state fair on the grounds. When hostilities broke out in 1861, the society gave the land to the government for a major military training center. More than 70,000 troops attended training drills at the complex.

After peace was restored in the nation, the land was returned to State Fair property. The Fair later moved to Milwaukee, and Wisconsin's Civil War veterans urged the legislature to purchase the land. In 1893, the state presented the site to the university as a memorial athletic field.


Intercollegiate athletics began on campus in 1881, and football joined the scene in 1889. The first games were played on a field on the lower part of campus. The stadium was built at its present site in 1913. However, a tragic collapse of the wooden bleachers in 1915 prompted the UW to make plans for concrete stands.

Two years later, a 10,000-seat concrete stadium was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money came from athletic department revenues.



the present Camp Randall Stadium was a thrilling 10-7 homecoming victory over Minnesota in 1917. Capacity of the structure has increased several times, jumping to 51,000 by 1951.


A revision of the seating arrangements in 1955 boosted the capacity to 52,788. In 1958, the running track was removed, the playing field was lowered 10 feet and seats were



DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Pat Richter, the former Wisconsin all-America gridiron star and the last nine-time letterwinner in school history, continues to work his magic as Director of Athletics at his alma mater.

During a time of budget tightening, presidential reform and gender equity concerns, Richter has built one of the most-respected intercollegiate athletic programs in the nation.

Entering his fifth season as Director of Athletics, Richter enjoyed a



'93-94 campaign that included many accomplishments. A Rose Bowl victory over UCLA was the Badgers' first appearance in Pasadena since Richter's 1962 squad lost to No. 1 USC. Wisconsin was first nationally in college football attendance increase and finished fifth in the coaches' final poll.

The men's basketball team made its first appearance in the NCAA tournament in 47 years, won 18 games for only the fourth time in school history and advanced to the second round of the national tourney. The hockey team participated in its national championship for the seventh year in a row and 19 of the division's

20 sports have competed in NCAA post-season play during his tenure.

In 1994, Wisconsin finished among the national leaders for the prestigious Directors' Cup, presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) for all-around athletic success.

Perhaps most satisfying to Richter, however, was the department's elimination of what was a \$2.1 million deficit in 1990. The Badgers were a huge success at the gate last year by filling their venues for football, basketball and hockey to 98.3 percent of capacity. The entire basketball season was sold out on a season ticket basis for the first time in Wisconsin history.

Named to his position in December of 1989, Richter is in charge of 20 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes, more than 160 employees and a large physical plant.

As an athlete

Richter's affiliation with Badger athletics started as an undergraduate, when he earned three letters in football, basketball and baseball.

Pat earned all-America (1961-62), academic all-America (1962) and all-Big Ten (1961-62) honors as a football end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl and set a game record with 11 receptions in one of the best Rose Bowls ever.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior, Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor (given for proficiency in scholarship and athletics).

Richter earned all-league honors in baseball and led UW in hits, homers and RBI three times. Pat earned his scholarship for basketball, where he played three years.

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture in 1964, Pat was a first-round draft pick of the NFL's Washington

Redskins. He played from 1963-71.

Professional life

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After working at a Madison law firm, he worked his way up to Vice President of Personnel at the Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State




Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association. Pat was included in the inaugural class of the Athletic Department Hall of Fame in 1991. Last spring, he was a finalist for induction into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.


Personal life

Richter and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim. Barry was a member of the 1994 U.S. Olympic hockey team and currently plays in the New York Rangers' organization.





McCLAIN CENTER



The Dave McClain Athletic Facility, opened in 1988, is a symbol of the Athletic Department's commitment to maintaining a first-class sports program.


The 166,264-square foot facility compares favorably with the best indoor training centers in the nation. Named in honor of the late Wisconsin football coach Dave McClain, the

structure provides a suitable environment for practice during inclement weather.

A 76,380-square foot main floor features an artificial playing surface (90 yards) with a ceiling high enough for kicking drills. The lower level includes locker rooms, training facilities (including on-site X-ray machines) and a spacious weight room.

On the second level, a theater-style auditorium (seating for 150), classrooms for individual position meetings and a player's lounge are some of the highlights. The entire facility cost \$9.5 million to build.

McClain, the Badgers' head coach from 1978-85, led the Badgers to bowl games in 1981, 1982 and 1984. He died of a heart attack in the spring of 1986.



TRAINING ROOM

The Wisconsin Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

Headquartered in the McClain Center, the department also maintains facilities at Camp Randall Stadium, the UW Field House, the Natatorium, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium and the Dane County Coliseum.

The Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provide dietary analyses,


measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve an athlete's flexibility.

The UW is one of a handful of schools with an on-site X-ray machine, enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries and prescribe treatment and rehabilitation.

Athletic trainers and physicians work together to design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A wide variety of facilities and equipment, including a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters,

and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of general fitness during recuperative time.

Dennis Helwig, a 1974 UW graduate, coordinates the Sports Medicine Program. He is assisted by five athletic trainers, one physical therapist, two graduate assistant trainers and 30 student trainers. Team physician coverage is headed by Dr. Jim Keene and Dr. Greg Landry of the UW Hospitals and Clinics. Orthopedists Dr. Ben Graf and Dr. John Orwin round out the medical staff.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game.

During the off-season, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshman players arrive, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibil-

ity and endurance are collected. Measures of body composition, weight and frame-size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Individual programs are established for each player by strength and conditioning coach John Dettmann.


The UW also offers a sports nutrition program, coordinated by Dave Ellis. The program assists athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals. Badger athletes also benefit from speed conditioning workouts designed by former track all-American Robert Hackett.



FALL CAMP

The University of Wisconsin is one of the few schools in the nation that has an off-campus facility for its fall training camp. The Badgers spend their session at the Holy Name Seminary in Middleton, Wis. The squad has access to several practice fields, an auditorium, classroom facilities, a swimming pool, game room, dining areas and living quarters for players and staff.




WALK-ONS



Not all high school football players earn scholarships to compete in college. That doesn't mean there isn't an opportunity for those individuals, especially at the University of Wisconsin, where walk-on athletes have a history of contribution.

The Badgers' walk-on program has produced a number of players who were contributors to the school's recent successes.

Lineman Joe Panos became a walk-on success story. Virtually unrecruited out of high school, Panos transferred from UW-Whitewater in 1991. He changed positions at UW, earned a scholarship, became a three-year starter, captained the Rose Bowl team and was drafted by the Eagles.

"I certainly appreciate the opportunity that the UW coaches gave me to prove my worth," Panos said. "There is a genuine attempt at helping unrecruited guys like me develop, both as players and people."

Panos became the emotional leader of the winningest team in history. "Walk-ons have that extra drive because they're trying to prove something," said Alvarez. "I love that spirit and determination in my players."

Several contributors on last year's team began their careers without scholarships but earned them in time. OLBs Chris Hein (a Rose Bowl starter) and his back-up Chad Cascadden are former walk-ons. Punter Sam Veit, a two-time academic all-league honoree, kicker Rick Schnetzky and WR Vince Zullo also walked on at the UW.

"Walk-ons are important to our program," Alvarez said. "There's a history of walk-on success here. Without question, there is a very real chance to earn a scholarship through this program."

THE BAND

From its origination in 1885, the University of Wisconsin Band has established an enviable reputation as one of the nation's best marching bands.

Director Michael Leckrone, starting his second quarter-century at Wisconsin, is nationally renowned for his arrangements. He was one of the band's innovators in helping the group achieve its national acclaim.

The 240-member band has developed its reputation with electrifying performances throughout the country. A regular at all Wisconsin home football games, the band also performs at one road football game

each season. Leckrone and his troops realized a dream last fall with its inclusion in the prestigious Rose Bowl Parade and halftime celebration. The band also traveled to Tokyo in 1993 to perform in the Coca-Cola Bowl.

Along with impressive pre-game and halftime shows, the UW band is renowned for its "Fifth Quarter" post-game celebration. Fans typically remain in Camp Randall Stadium after the game until the bands' audience-participation gala is completed.

Known for its innovative shows, precise marching and playing style and intense energy, the band draws attention wherever it appears. After a



Badger football trip to Las Vegas several years ago, the performance earned a headline of "Best Show in Town" in the local paper.

Beyond its regular appearances at Badger sporting events, the Wisconsin band performs concerts around the state and throughout the Midwest. Its annual spring concert regularly packs the UW Field House and this year was extended to three performances to accommodate the interest.

The most-played rivalry in Division I college football history continues this fall when Wisconsin and Minnesota meet in Madison on Oct. 22. The Badgers and Golden Gophers play for the 104th time in a series that began in 1890.

The UW-UM series is the nation's oldest and has been played continuously for 87 years. The neighboring schools have met on the gridiron in 103 of the last 104 seasons (the exception was 1906). The game has alternated sites between the university campuses since 1946.

Much prestige was always associated with the game, and the significance was emphasized with its place on the schedule. Between 1933 and 1982, the Wisconsin-Minnesota game was the final regular-season contest each season.

The series took an added twist in 1948 when more than state bragging

rights were on the line. After a 16-0 setback that season, the Wisconsin lettermen's group, the National "W" Club, presented Minnesota with the axe wielded by Paul Bunyan. He was the mythical giant of Midwestern lumber camps.


Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus. Since the tradition was started, UW leads the series 22-20-3.

Minnesota regained possession of the Axe after last year's 28-21 win in Minneapolis.

WISCONSIN TRADITIONS

Badger nickname

The University's nickname, "Badgers," was borrowed from the state. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of the animals in the region, but rather an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Band caps

When a Badger team wins an athletic contest, the members of the band all turn their hats around and wear them backwards. According to Band Director Mike Leckrone, the practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at their victory in days when they marched out with the departing crowd.

"On, Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by Chicago's William Purdy. Words were written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit on the UW-Madison campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainstorm of UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank after each game.

Graduating law students

At the homecoming game, graduating law students throw canes over the crossbar of the goal post in a pre-game ceremony. If they catch their canes, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the UW-Madison in 1910.

Fifth Quarter

Football games traditionally last four quarters, but there is a special post-game celebration at Wisconsin games known as the "Fifth Quarter." Win or lose, the Wisconsin marching band performs a half-hour post-game concert. Members play their instruments, dance the polka and generally tear around the field. Fans wait for the celebration since Director Michael Leckrone added crowd-participation gimmicks. A local sportswriter dubbed the ritual the "Fifth Quarter."


Bucky Badger

Badgers in various forms have been recognized as the UW mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white letter sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by artist Art Evans. A 1949 homecoming pep rally contest was staged to give a name to Madison's favorite badger. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or

Bucky, for short. The homecoming rally committee came up with the name but credit was given to a randomly chosen sorority. The name apparently came from a line in a song. The lyrics encourage the Wisconsin football team to "buck right through that line."



When Barry Alvarez assumed the reins of the Wisconsin football program in 1990, one prognosticator boldly predicted that the Badgers would be in the Rose Bowl within five years. Although many people scoffed

at the prediction, Alvarez' 1993 club made that dream a reality.

What does Alvarez think of that prediction made four years ago? "I guess he underestimated us too," said Alvarez. The '93 squad left a legacy that Alvarez hopes to build upon this fall.

After making the observation that he had his "first legitimate Big Ten team," Alvarez guided his squad to a 10-1-1 record, a Rose Bowl victory and rankings of fifth (coaches) and sixth (media) in the final polls.

The challenge facing the '94 Badgers is handling the added expectations for a club that returns 15 starters from the winningest team in UW history.

"Most of our ballclub is back," Alvarez said last spring. "This group, in addition to its experience, has achieved significant success."

The 1993 club earned the school's first Big Ten championship in 31 years, and Alvarez realizes that staying on top will be a challenge. "That's a roadblock for us to negotiate this fall," he said.

Alvarez is confident his 1994 team can be better than the Rose Bowl champs, but he's anxious to see if they'll gel like last year's squad.

Offensively, the Badgers smashed records of all sorts last fall. All the principles return from that unit except RT **Joe Panos**, the team's emotional leader, and four-year starting FB **Mark Montgomery**.

The defense must do some retooling. Gone are defensive line fix-

tures **Lamark Shackerford** (an all-America choice) and **Carlos Fowler**, leading tackler **Yusef Burgess** and safeties **Reggie Holt** and **Scott Nelson**, who finished eighth and 10th in career tackles.

"We must replace some very experienced players on defense," Alvarez admitted. "There is talent ready to step in, but you're always cautious when experience is lacking."

The '93 offense was the first in school history to gain better than 5,000 total yards and average more than 200 yards per game rushing and passing. The rushing (250.8) and passing (204.4) norms were both second-best in UW history. Wisconsin led the Big Ten in total offense and finished second in both rushing and scoring.

A punishing ground game was the signature of the Rose Bowl championship squad. With the return of Big Ten and Rose Bowl MVP **Brent Moss**, along with tailback mate **Terrell Fletcher**, Alvarez is confident the



Tailback Brent Moss is the nation's top returning rusher (136.4 yards per game) from last season.


strong rushing attack will continue.

Moss, the nation's top returning rusher, smashed a 19-year-old school record with 1,637 yards and ended the year with 11 consecutive 100-yard games. Fletcher fell just shy of the coveted 1,000-yard mark and averaged 6.0 yards per carry. The duo's total of 2,633 yards last fall was the most ever by a pair of Big Ten teammates. **Carl McCullough** is a highly touted sophomore who simply needs an opportunity to show his skills.

Alvarez is excited about the prospect of another strong running game because the Badgers are 18-5-1 in his career when Wisconsin outrushes the opponent. The mark is 3-18 when UW is outrushed.

Beyond the star-quality at tailback, Alvarez is confident in the running game because of the return of four offensive line starters. Two of them, **C Cory Raymer** and **LG Joe Rudolph**, were on the all-Big Ten first team.

Raymer, considered the best center in college football by some experts, should be considered for the

Outland Trophy. Rudolph, a converted linebacker, found his niche on offense and is known as a standout pulling guard.


Senior **Mike Verstegen** has started three seasons at LT and has quietly established himself as one of the league's most underrated blockers. Junior **Steve Stark** is the returning starter at RG, while sophomore **Jerry Wunsch** earned Panos' spot in the spring.

For the fourth year, **Michael Roan** will handle TE chores. Roan is coming off a first-team all-conference season when he had 34 receptions. **Matt Nyquist** will see time either as the second tight end or at fullback. He worked at both spots in the spring.

Junior **Ron Johnson** is No. 1 at fullback despite Nyquist's late training camp tryout.

All-America candidate **Lee DeRamus** is a game-breaking wideout. DeRamus surpassed Al Toon's UW season record with 920 yards last season. He should break Toon's career marks early this fall.

of Moss, is coming off a 36-catch season. Veterans **Vince Zullo**, **Keith Jackson**, **Michael London** and **Jevon Brunston** are in the wings. Freshman speedsters **Reggie Torian** and **Tony Simmons** are exciting prospects.

QB **Darrell Bevell** entered last season as one of the biggest question marks on offense and ended as the nation's No. 3-rated passer. Bevell broke 10 school records and established conference marks for completion percentage in a game and season.

Another of Alvarez' coaching goals is to stop the run. Last year's Badgers allowed just 130 yards per game rushing but more importantly surrendered just 16.3 points per game. That was the best figure at Wisconsin since 1963.

The biggest concern is in the trenches. Senior **Mike Thompson** is the leader on the line. Thompson has started every game in his career (34), gained all-league mention three times and led the league in sacks as a junior.

Rod Spiller was a pleasant surprise in the spring, holding off fellow

sophomore **Bryan Jurewicz** for the tackle slot opposite Thompson. Junior **Jason Maniecki**, a physical run defender, has Shackerford's vacated spot. **Al Jackson**, a junior college all-American, will challenge Maniecki in the fall.

It would be a boost if all-star OLB **Chad Yocom** can return from a back injury. He missed all of spring ball and is a question mark for the fall. In his absence, sophomore **Tarek Saleh** and senior **Sylas Pratt** are the rush linebackers. **Rob Lurtsema**, who missed the spring, is also available. Wisconsin natives **Chris Hein** (11 starts last year) and **Chad Cascadden** comprise the two deep at drop OLB.

Junior **Eric Unverzagt** is the top returning tackler (75). Starting opposite Unverzagt will be a sophomore, either **Pete Monty** or **Pete Diatelevi**. Both saw action as reserves last fall.

The secondary is expected to be the most improved area of the defense.

Senior **Jeff Messenger** led the Big Ten in interceptions as a CB but will shift to his natural position at FS. Former JC teammates **Kenny Gales** and **Donny Brady**, who combined for seven interceptions last fall, hold the cornerback spots. Senior **Jamel Brown** is the SS.

Redshirt freshman **Jason Suttle** caught the attention of the staff at CB. With Suttle in the lineup, the Badgers have a "four-corner" secondary with Brady playing SS. The quartet of Messenger, Gales, Brady and Suttle are all former or present cornerbacks.

Punter **Sam Veit** returns for his fourth season as the starter. His impressive placement abilities are the reason that the Badgers downed seven punts inside the 5-yard line. Placekicking duties will be shared by senior **Rick Schnetzky** and sophomore **John Hall**. Schnetzky, a walk-on, was perfect on 17 PATs.







HEAD COACH

Miracle workers are few and far between, but the efforts of fifth-year Wisconsin coach Barry Alvarez border on the miraculous.


Inheriting a program that was ranked No. 107 in Division I-A four years ago, Alvarez quickly and efficiently developed a team that last year won a school-record 10 games, including the Rose Bowl.

The rags-to-riches story is a best-seller for a school that once considered its post-game band celebration the highlight of football weekends.

Alvarez is the man responsible for this resurrection.

During his tenure, Alvarez reversed the fortunes of a program that had hit rock bottom and raised it to the Top 5 in college football.

When Alvarez was handed the reins of the program, the Badgers had won just 20 percent of their games in the previous four years, finished no better than eighth in the Big Ten standings, averaged a 45-year low of 41,000 fans per home game and were included on lists of the worst programs in the country.



A Rosy season

The 1993 Badgers will long be remembered as the squad that established new standards. The winningest team in UW history ...


- was co-champ of the Big Ten and won its first Rose Bowl
- finished fifth (CNN/USA Today) and sixth (Associated Press) in the final polls
- posted the NCAA's largest attendance increase and ranked 10th nationally in average (75,507)
- had an .875 winning percentage, the best by a Big Ten team since 1979
- boasted eight first-team all-Big Ten players, three more than the school's previous high
- ranked in the nation's Top 25 for 14 straight weeks after being rated a total of 10 times in the prior 30 years
- improved its record by 5.5 games from '92, the largest one-year gain in school history.

For those achievements, Alvarez was named national Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, the Bobby Dodd Foundation, *College and Pro Football Newsweek* and *College Sports* magazine.

Alvarez also became the first Wisconsin coach to earn the Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year Award. He received 94 percent of the first-place votes.

The Badgers have posted a 21-23-1 overall record in Alvarez' four seasons. Compared to the 9-36 mark of the four years prior to his arrival, UW has a 12.5-game improvement under Alvarez. Wisconsin has posted an impressive 17-7-1 (.700) mark in the last 25 games. Prior to the recent success, it took UW 75 contests (17-58, .227) to win the same number of games.

Besides the obvious on-field improvement, home crowds have increased an incredible 80.9 percent since his arrival. The Badgers played before seven sellouts (four at Camp Randall Stadium) in 1993. Additionally, network television showed seven games last fall. The previous high was five TV appearances in 1984.



HEAD COACH

Steady gains

Before exploding on the national scene last year, Alvarez' first three seasons showed steady improvement. "My goal is to get better every week," Alvarez said of his main coaching theme. "The wins will take care of themselves if you keep getting better."

Alvarez was appointed as the school's 27th football coach on Dec. 31, 1989, one day after his 42nd birthday. "My old coach, Bob Devaney (Nebraska) told me that I should set a goal for myself to take a head coaching job by the time I was 42," Alvarez said. "I missed it by one day."

Alvarez' first Badger team (1990) won one game. However, the Badgers were within striking distance in the fourth quarter of 10 games.

The visible gains actually started in 1991, when the Badgers (5-6) were the nation's fourth-most improved squad. Three non-conference wins to open the year earned Wisconsin several votes in the Associated Press poll. A two-game winning streak to end the season were Alvarez' first Big Ten wins.

The Badgers posted their second straight 5-6 mark in 1992 and climbed in the league standings for the third consecutive season.

Among the memorable accomplishments of 1992 was the 20-16 upset of 12th-ranked Ohio State. It was the UW's first win over a nationally rated foe in eight years. The Badgers again received votes in the national polls and ended the season one victory shy of a bowl bid.

Successful assistant coach

The former assistant coach at Notre Dame and Iowa has long been associated with strong winning traditions. He coached in a bowl game nine consecutive years at Notre Dame and Iowa.

For three seasons, Alvarez was a defensive assistant for Lou Holtz at Notre Dame. He served as linebackers coach in 1987, was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1988 and worked as assistant head coach in 1989.

Notre Dame finished 17th, first and second in the final Associated Press poll the three seasons Alvarez was there. The Fighting Irish won an incredible 23 consecutive games in 1988 and 1989.

The 1988 Fighting Irish team won a national championship and posted a perfect 12-0 record. As coordinator, Barry's defense ranked third nationally in scoring, 10th against the run and 13th in total defense. A Fiesta Bowl victory over West Virginia capped the undefeated season.

Notre Dame was 12-1 in 1989 and the nation's No. 1 team for 11 straight weeks. Alvarez' defense keyed a 21-6

Orange Bowl victory over top-ranked Colorado. The 1989 Notre Dame defenders were nationally ranked in every category: scoring defense (12th), turnover margin (13th), rushing defense (14th), total defense (14th) and passing defense (43rd).

Alvarez coached all-America linebackers in each of his three seasons in South Bend. Michael Stonebreaker was a consensus all-America pick in 1988. Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett also made all-America squads under Alvarez.

As an Iowa assistant, Barry coached linebackers from 1979-86. The Hawkeyes went to postseason games the last six years, including Rose Bowls in 1982 and 1986. Alvarez helped the Hawkeyes turn a program that hadn't had a winning season in 17 years into a regular bowl game participant.

Alvarez coached five first-team all-Big Ten linebackers at Iowa. His prize pupil was Larry Station, a two-time consensus all-America linebacker. An academic all-American as well, Station is the Hawkeyes' career tackle leader.



"He showed me how you need to mingle with people. Bob had a special manner about him. I watched how he worked in the community. 
Being a players' coach

"I knew we had to be patient. When you take a job that's down, you have to make it a good job. That doesn't happen overnight. I never questioned whether we were doing it right or not. I had seen what we were doing work at other places. I never wavered in my confidence."






Bill Busch


A 1974 graduate of the UW, he was an assistant trainer with the Philadelphia Eagles (1975) before returning to his alma mater.

Helwig and his wife, Jan, are the parents of one son, Christopher.





Jim Roberts is in his eighth year working at the UW and his third as head of the department's video operation. Roberts is also in charge of the athletic department's computerization project.


Roberts came to the UW from Tulsa, where he was the school's equipment manager and director of athletic dorms.






Darrell Bevell celebrates after scoring the game-winning TD. Captain Joe Panos and Vince Zullo (87) share in the excitement.



Alan Ameche:
1954 Heisman winner

Alan Ameche, the bruising fullback from Kenosha, Wis., is the only Badger football player to win the Heisman Trophy, given to college football's top player.


Ameche, a two-time all-American, won the trophy in 1954, the same season he earned first-team all-America mention from 21 different organizations.

The Big Ten's leading rusher twice in his career, Ameche brought much distinction and honor to the UW. He was an academic all-American as a junior and senior.

Nicknamed "The Horse" for his rugged running style, Ameche left Wisconsin as the NCAA's career rushing leader. He led the Badgers to a 26-8-3 record during his career and a berth in the 1953 Rose Bowl.


RETIRED NUMBERS

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch #40

Although he played football only one season at Wisconsin, Hirsch is one of the most beloved figures in Badger sports history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He also starred for nine seasons with the Los Angeles Rams before returning to Wisconsin as Director of Athletics from 1969-87.


Dave Schreiner #80

The two-time all-America end (junior and senior) was named Western (later the Big Ten) Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three seasons at Wisconsin as an end both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and the National W Club Halls of Fame and the University of Wisconsin's all-time team.



Allan Shafer #83

The memory of former QB Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally wounded during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football injury.



Alan Ameche #35

Ameche is one of the greatest backs in UW history and the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner. Nicknamed "The Horse," he was a two-time all-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time leading rusher. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl, where he rushed for 133 yards against USC. The five-time Pro Bowl pick was inducted in the NFL Hall of Fame in 1975.



ALL-TIME TEAM


In conjunction with the centennial celebration of college football in 1969, Wisconsin fans were asked to select the University's all-time team.

The 11-man unit features Heisman Trophy winner **Alan Ameche**, who was voted Wisconsin's all-time greatest player. Ameche, a two-time all-American, concluded his brilliant career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. The other members of the squad:

Ken Bowman — three-year letterman (1961-63), first-team academic all-Big Ten and academic all-American.

Howard Buck — captained the 1915 squad and was named all-Big Ten and consensus all-American.

Pat Harder — led the Big Ten in rushing as a sophomore and was an all-America fullback in 1942 ... named the Badgers' team MVP in 1941.

Pat Richter — all-American on the field and in the classroom, Richter was named Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in 1989 ... won an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award.

Dave Schreiner — two-time all-America end and the 1942 Western Conference Player of the Year ... captained the Badgers in 1942 when he was team MVP.





Attendance increase

Wisconsin was the national leader for attendance increase in 1993 after its home-game average grew 14,129 fans per game. The Badgers averaged 75,507 fans at their five home games in 1993 and had four sellouts. Wisconsin and national champion Florida State were the only schools that had increases of at least 10,000.

Wisconsin's No. 1 ranking for attendance increase was the third time in four years that the school has been in the nation's top three for attendance improvement. The Badgers had the third-largest gains in both 1990 and 1992.

Since Barry Alvarez came to Wisconsin in 1990, the school has witnessed an 80.9 percent increase in its home crowds. The Badgers averaged just 41,734 fans per game in 1989, the year before Alvarez was hired at Wisconsin.

1953 Rose Bowl — January 1, 1953 at Pasadena, CA

PASADENA, Calif. — Southern Cal scored the game's only points on a 22-yard touchdown pass from Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael in the Trojans' 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl. It was the Badgers' first postseason appearance.

The Badgers dominated the game from a statistical standpoint, outgaining USC by 120 yards. Led by tailback Alan Ameche's 133 yards, Wisconsin had a 211-48 advantage on the ground. However, both defenses rose to the occasion when necessary.

One of Wisconsin's best scoring chances came in the opening minutes of the third quarter. Ameche broke

loose for a 54-yard run as the Badgers got to the USC 21-yard line. On third down, Archie Ray Burks fumbled on an end run and the Trojans recovered.

USC then put together the game-winning drive (73 yards), which ended on Bukich's touchdown pass. Wisconsin countered with a 13-play, 84-yard drive that ended at the Trojan 2-yard line when Jerry Witt was stopped a yard short of a first down on a fake field goal play.

Coach Ivy Williamson's club became the first in Badger history to play in a bowl game and the first to play before a crowd of more than 100,000.

1960 Rose Bowl — January 1, 1960 at Pasadena, CA

PASADENA, Calif. — Underdog Washington scored the game's first 17 points en route to a 44-8 Rose Bowl victory over the Badgers. It was Wisconsin's second Rose Bowl trip.

Washington tallied the first TD on a 6-yard run by Don McKeta about 10 minutes into the game. George Fleming booted a 26-yard field goal after the Huskies recovered one of four Wisconsin fumbles. Fleming then returned a punt 53 yards for a score on the final play of the period for a 17-0 first quarter lead.

Badger fullback Tom Wiesner tallied Wisconsin's only points on a 4-yard run with 5:27 left in the opening half. Dale Hackbart connected with

Al Schoonover for a two-point conversion cutting the lead to 17-8.

Husky quarterback Bob Schloredt, who shared game MVP honors with Fleming, tossed a 23-yard TD pass to close first-half scoring. Schloredt completed four passes for 102 yards and was the game's top rusher (81 yards).

Wisconsin mounted a final challenge in the third quarter, but four plays inside the Husky 10-yard line failed. Washington then marched 93 yards on 10 plays for another tally. Milt Bruhn's Badgers entered the game with a defense that had surrendered barely 10 points per game for the regular season.

BOWL GAMES

1963 Rose Bowl — January 1, 1963 at Pasadena, CA

PASADENA, Calif. — A 23-point fourth quarter explosion wasn't quite enough as the Badgers dropped a 42-37 Rose Bowl encounter to Southern Cal. The Trojans had claimed a 42-14 lead on the first play of the fourth quarter before the huge Badger comeback.

USC raced to a 21-7 halftime lead and extended it on the first play of the third stanza. Quarterback Pete Beathard hit Hal Bedsole for a 57-yard score. But then Badger QB Ron VanderKelen led one of the biggest charges in bowl history.

VanderKelen reached paydirt on a 17-yard scamper cutting the margin to 28-14. Southern Cal responded

with a pair of TD passes by Beathard and USC led 42-14 with 14:54 left to play.

Lou Holland (13-yard run) and Gary Kroner (4-yard reception) tallied for the Badgers within three minutes. A bad center snap on a punt resulted in a UW safety and a 42-30 Trojan advantage. After the free kick, VanderKelen hit three straight passes, including a 19-yard score to Pat Richter for the final tally.

VanderKelen, the game MVP, set both Wisconsin and Rose Bowl records with 401 yards passing. Richter caught 11 of those aerials for 163 yards. The 79 total points was a Rose Bowl record that stood for 28 years.

1981 Garden State Bowl — Dec. 13, 1981 at East Rutherford, NJ

AST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Tennessee scored 18 straight points in the first half and held on to defeat Wisconsin 28-21 in the Garden State Bowl.

The Badger defense limited UT to 89 yards rushing, but Volunteer QB Steve Alatorre unleashed a potent passing attack. Alatorre threw for 315 yards. WR Anthony Hancock caught 11 passes for 196 yards.

After Fuad Reveiz booted a field goal in the first quarter, Wisconsin assumed its only lead of the game on a 3-yard run by Jess Cole. Willie Gault returned the ensuing kickoff 87 yards to give Tennessee a lead it never lost.

Reserve quarterback Randy Wright came off the bench to throw a pair of second-half touchdown passes for the Badgers. Wright hit Jeff Nault and Thad McFadden on scoring tosses in the final period.

The game featured two high-powered offenses that combined for 49 points, 793 total yards and 49 first downs. The teams averaged just under five yards per offensive play.

Wisconsin's fourth bowl in school history and first non-Rose Bowl drew a crowd of 53,220. The Badgers' seven victories were the most since UW won the same number in 1974.

1982 Independence Bowl — Dec. 11, 1982 at Shreveport, LA

SHREVEPORT, La. — Wisconsin won its first bowl game in the school's history with a 14-3 Independence Bowl victory over Kansas State.

Randy Wright threw a bowl-game record two touchdown passes and the Badger defense set a scoring record in the matchup between Big Ten and Big Eight schools before 24,684 fans. The anticipated crowd was more than 49,000, but a 23-mile-per-hour wind dropped temperatures to 10 below zero.

Wright, the game offensive MVP, completed only nine of 24 throws. However, his 87-yard throw to Tim Stracka was the longest in Wis-

consin and Independence Bowl history. The UW defense limited Kansas State to 192 total yards in the Wildcats' first-ever postseason appearance.

"Winning our first bowl game was a big accomplishment for our program," Coach Dave McClain said.

KSU had taken a 3-0 lead on Steve Willis' 29-yard field goal before the Badgers scored 14 straight points. Tim Krumrie was the game Defensive MVP. He helped limit the Kansas State running attack to less than two yards per carry.

Game totals showed five turnovers, 14 punts, 22 completions in 59 attempts (37 percent) and 14 penalties.

1984 Hall of Fame Bowl — Dec. 29, 1984 at Birmingham, AL

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — A fumbled snap on a 26-yard game-winning field goal attempt was the deciding play in Wisconsin's 20-19 loss to Kentucky in the Hall of Fame Bowl.

Trailing by a point after the Wildcats' Joe Worley booted a 52-yard field goal with eight minutes left, the Badgers drove inside Kentucky's 20-yard line.

Todd Gregoire's field goal attempt with 1:55 left never materialized after holder Bob Kobza dropped the center snap. Gregoire, a freshman, had tied a school record with four field goals earlier in the game.

Wisconsin assumed a 13-0 lead on a pair of Gregoire three pointers and a 3-yard TD pass from Mike Howard to Thad McFadden. The Badgers outgained their SEC foe both on the ground and through the air.

However, UW was assessed 13 penalties for 133 yards, both Hall of Fame Bowl records. The Badgers threw two interceptions. Kentucky, which was making its second straight postseason appearance in Birmingham, had no turnovers.

More than 7,500 Badger fans made the trip to the UW's third bowl game in four seasons.

BOWL GAMES

1994 Rose Bowl — January 1, 1994 at Pasadena, CA

PASADENA, Calif. — The Wisconsin defense forced six turnovers while the offense churned out 250 yards rushing as the Badgers downed UCLA 21-16 in the Rose Bowl. It was the Badgers' first-ever New Year's Day bowl victory and second-ever postseason triumph.

Over 70,000 Badger fans attended the game and provided a distinct home field advantage in the Bruins' normal home facility.

"I told our players it was like a home field advantage with the crowd," Coach Barry Alvarez said.

UCLA, a 7-point favorite, opened the scoring with a 27-yard field goal by Bjorn Merten. That 3-0 lead, however, was UCLA's only advantage during the game.

Badger tailback Brent Moss then went to work, scoring on a pair of short runs that propelled Wisconsin to a 14-3 halftime lead.

Moss, the Rose Bowl Most Valuable Player, rushed for 158 yards on a career-high 36 carries.

The Bruins closed the gap to 14-10 with a touchdown run early in the fourth quarter.

Wisconsin countered when quarterback Darrell Bevell provided the game's most unlikely play two possessions later. On second-and-eight from the UCLA 21-yard line, Bevell weaved his way to the end zone. It was the longest run of his career.

The Bruins pulled to within 21-16 after Wayne Cook connected with Mike Nguyen on a 5-yard pass with 3:38 left.

Wisconsin tried to run out the clock to preserve the

win, but made just one first down and had to punt.

UCLA took over on its 38-yard line and drove 44 yards to the Badgers' 18. With 15 seconds left, Cook scrambled for a gain of three yards, but the clock expired before the Bruins could run another play.

UW had won the Rose Bowl. The victory boosted Wis-

consin to fifth (coaches) and sixth (media) in the final national polls and concluded a 10-1-1 season, the winningest in Wisconsin history.

UCLA had the offensive statistical edge, outgaining the Badgers 500-346. The game was won by Wisconsin's opportunistic defense, which recovered five fumbles.

The Bruins' J.J. Stokes set a Rose Bowl record with 14 receptions for 176 yards. He broke the previous marks set by UW Director of Athletics Pat Richter.

"Somebody told me Stokes broke my record, but that meant UCLA was behind. I'd rather have us win than have the record," Richter said.

"The win, as much as it was for our players and coaches, was for our fans," said Alvarez. "They supported us all the way."

Plenty of faces will change for 11th-year head coach Bill Mallory and the Hoosiers in '94. Thirteen starters, including nine on the defense, have departed from last year's Independence Bowl squad. 1994 Outlook

For the first time since 1988, Michigan will begin the season without a Big Ten title to defend. Fifth-year head coach Gary Moeller has 12 returning starters at his disposal to improve upon last year's 8-4 record. The entire offensive backfield returns, paced by two-time all-league TB Tyrone Wheatley (1,129 yards) and senior QB Todd Collins, who passed for 2,509 yards and 17 TDs. 

1994 Outlook

New head coach Rick Minter, a Notre Dame assistant last season, inherits a Cincinnati program which last year posted its best record (8-3) in two decades. 



The fax number is (608) 262-8184. Requests should be received at least one week in advance of the game. Credentials are either mailed or left at Will Call (gate 6).

Credentials will be issued according to the following priorities: 1) national publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication; 2) newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director; 3) television and radio stations originating a live broadcast; 4) television and radio stations covering for nightly

news; and 5) all other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis. Spouses, dates, non-workers and children are not allowed in the media areas as dictated by the NCAA Media Guidelines book.

Photographers & camera operators: Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers, TV reporters and camera operators on assignment. You must display both a credential and an armband prominently to be on the field level. Your game credential alone will not give you access to the sidelines. Armbands can be picked up in the Reinke Room of the Wisconsin Field House. Flipcards and refreshments are available in the Reinke Room two hours prior to kickoff. Media members cannot shoot between the 25-yard lines. Wisconsin follows NCAA and Big Ten guidelines regarding event photography.

Parking: A limited number of parking passes are available to working media. They will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis.

Game-day services

Media services: Working facilities for the press are located on the fourth level of the Communications Center. Flipcards, notes and programs are delivered to each working location prior to kickoff. A complete statistical package will be available after the game. Final statistics are entered immediately after the game on the league's Fax-On-Demand service. If media members do not want to access this service, there will be a \$10 charge to fax game statistics.

Interviews: With approximately four minutes left in the game, media members will be escorted to the interview areas by Associate SID John Estes. Coach Barry Alvarez meets the media in the McClain Auditorium (second floor). Requested players are available in the weight room (lower level of McClain facility). The UW locker room is closed to the media.

When the start button is pushed, information will be faxed back immediately.

The 1983 graduate of Iowa earned degrees in marketing, journalism and management sciences. A native of Sioux City, Iowa, Steve is single and resides in Madison.

John Estes is in his fourth season as Associate SID at the UW. Prior to Wisconsin, he held a similar position at Northwestern. Estes handles media relations duties for men's basketball and assists with football.

John, who has degrees from

Drake (B.A., 1981) and Western Illinois (M.A., 1987), edits the football and basketball game programs. He and his wife, Dianne, live in Middleton.

Julie Kluge begins her fifth campaign as a full-time member of the Sports Information staff. Kluge, a native of Benton, Wis., directs publicity for the Badgers' hockey team.

Julie was formerly an assistant publicity director for the WCHA (1989). The 1988 graduate of Wisconsin has B.S. degrees in zoology and secondary education.

Game coverage on radio

Beginning this fall, exclusive radio coverage of Badger football will be heard on the 35-station Wisconsin Radio Network. The University Athletic Department and Learfield Communications entered into an agreement last fall for radio broadcast rights for UW football and basketball.

Learfield has chosen WIBA (1310 AM) and WOLX (94.9 FM) as its rights holders in the Madison market and WTMJ (620 AM) in Milwaukee to carry Badger games.

Entering his first season as football play-by-play announcer is Matt Lepay. The voice of Badger basketball the past six seasons, Lepay adds full-time football duties this fall. He previously handled pre- and post-game reporting duties for Badger football. Lepay, a 1984 graduate of Ohio State, has hosted the Barry Alvarez and Stu Jackson radio coaches' shows since their inceptions.

Joining Lepay on broadcasts for both football and basketball this year is Mike Lucas, long-time sports columnist at the *Capital Times*. Lucas, who has worked on the broadcast teams for Wisconsin's delay TV package, also provides daily sports commentaries on WIBA.

Game coverage on television

Every Badger home football game is televised on a delayed basis by Wisconsin Public Television. The Madison affiliate is WHA (channel 21 or cable channel 11). Broadcast across the state educational network, Badger replays air Saturdays at 10:30 p.m. The network includes WHA-Madison, WPNE-Green Bay, WLEF-Park Falls, WHWC-Menomonie, WHLA-La Crosse, WHRM-Wausau, and WMVT-Milwaukee. Sportscaster Paul Braun handles play-by-play. Former Badger player Merritt Norvell adds color commentary. Live coverage of UW football, on either ABC or ESPN, will be announced later.


Barry Alvarez Radio Show

Directions to Camp Randall Stadium

From the Dane County Airport — Take Packers Avenue south to Johnson Street. Johnson Street (which changes into Pennsylvania Avenue then Gorham Street then University Avenue) winds through residential areas and past Lake Mendota. Stay on University Avenue until Randall Avenue (look for Milan's Sub Shop). Turn left on Randall. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe Street). Camp Randall Stadium is located on the right side of Monroe Street.

From I-94 — Take I-94 to Highway 30 West. Take Highway 30 to 151 South (State Capitol), which is also called Washington Avenue. Take Washington

Avenue to First Street. Right on First Street to Pennsylvania Avenue. Left on Pennsylvania Avenue, which becomes Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue through campus until Randall Avenue (look for Milan's Sub Shop on the left side of University Avenue). Turn left on Randall Avenue. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe Street). Camp Randall Stadium is located on the right side of Monroe Street.

From I-90 — Take the Madison beltline (Highway 12 & 18). West on the beltline. Exit on Park Street north (right turn). Take Park Street to Regent Street. Turn left on Regent Street and go approximately six blocks. The Stadium is on the right.
